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Cambridge looking into additional ADA parking at post office

Following up on a public comment from a resident, the city of Cambridge will look into possible solutions to improve access to the post office for people with mobility issues.

During her comments before the council, the resident noted the only handicapped parking spot close to the post office is on the north side of 2nd Avenue SW. Meanwhile, the

handicapped ramp to the post office is on the south side of the building.

"Especially in the winter-time, getting into the post office is difficult," she said.

Additionally, she said with only one ADA parking spot, just finding a parking spot near the post office is hard, even though there are no customers actually in the post office.

"More than occasionally, I see people taking up even two

spots and then walking over to the bar," she said.

She requested the city consider designating a handicapped spot directly in front of the post office, plus designating a couple of spots as being for post office customers only.

The council readily agreed to instruct city staff to look into the requests. At the same time, however, City Administrator Evan Vogel cautioned not to expect immediate results.

"It is not a matter of going

out and painting the curb blue and putting out a couple signs," Vogel said. "It has to meet certain underlying requirements. And it has to be directed. I do not know if there are areas in close proximity to the post office that meet those criteria or not. But I'm happy to direct staff to look into it. It will just take time."

Council member Aaron Berg made the suggestion that staff also look into the possibility of

cutting out of the sidewalk an ADA ramp directly in front of the post office's ramp.

As for creating a couple parking spots only for post office customers, Vogel said creating such a limit is very difficult to enforce.

"That is a pretty ineffective method of patrol and enforcement," Vogel said. "It's very intensive for staff and very challenging to navigate. It tends to cost more than it benefits by a fair margin."

DECISION UP TO COMMISSIONERS

Despite the fact Seiberlich still doesn't need the county commissioners' permission to extend the contract until there is money involved, he said he is putting the onus on the commissioners to make the final call.

"I want to work with you, not against you," Seiberlich told the commissioners. "If you tell me no, I will not do it. I'm sorry to put that on you now, but I am. I'm asking you to trust me as your sheriff."

"I trust you wholeheartedly," Commissioner Todd Christensen responded, "but I'm concerned for the future. I am worried about potential government intrusion, and that's a concern I get from my constituents."

"We saw that same thing when body-worn cameras, tasers, fingerprints, and DNA was first introduced," Seiberlich countered.

"I've been comfortable with your approach from the beginning," Commissioner Bill Berg said. "I apologize I haven't been public enough with my position on this. I would be comfortable with the added (five) months of research."
"We're not paying for them now, so

I'm not completely opposed to, say, let's see what the data shows," Commissioner Steve Westerberg said. "But I could go either way right now."

PUBLIC COMMENT

Westerberg and Christensen, along with Chair Alan Duff, agreed they weren't ready to make a final decision on going beyond the trial period until they heard more public input. Not only that, but they preferred it to be an agenda item during one of the board's upcoming evening meetings. They said this will allow the public to voice their opinion during the public comment period. It would also allow Seiberlich to relay this information to a predicted larger audience.

Since the commissioners declined to give a definitive yes or no for the extension of the trial period, Seiberlich said he would make that decision himself and extend the trial period to Dec. 31. He added that once the commissioners do come to a collective decision, he will honor that decision, even if it is before the end of the year. Failing that, the commissioners will have to make a formal decision when Seiberlich officially requests the funding in the 2027 budget for a full one-year contract.

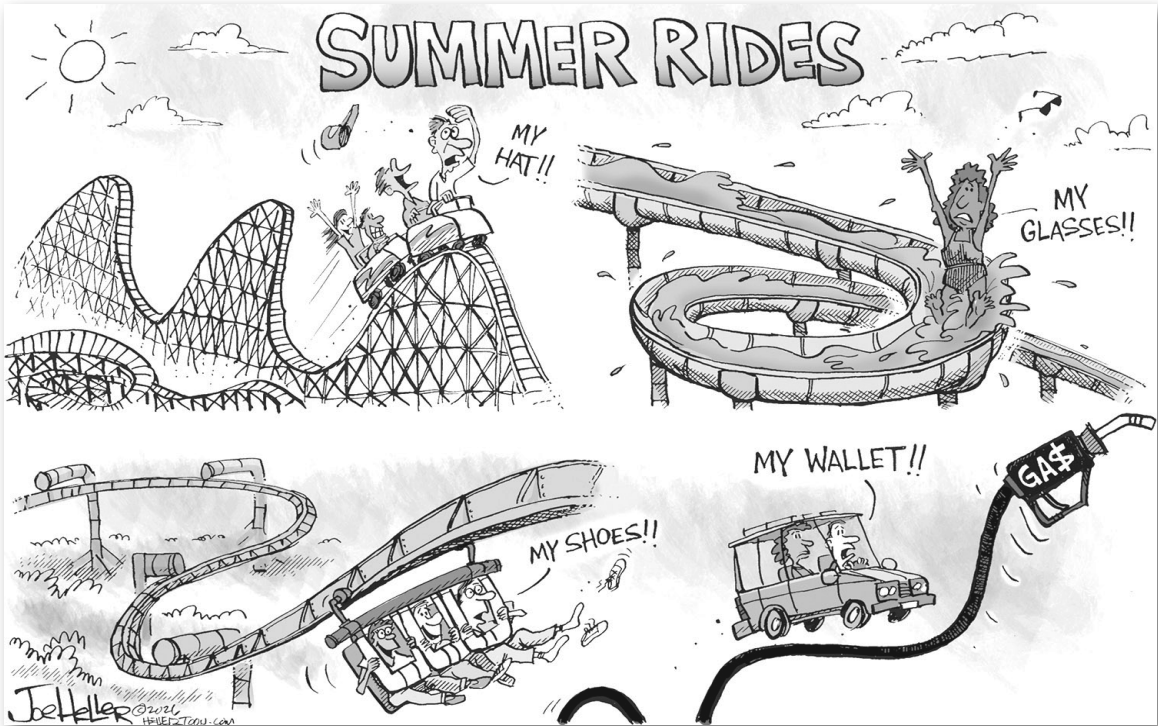

Question: I noticed a person walking along the road the other day that was using a white cane from what I assumed to be visually impaired. I thought this needs to be brought to attention more for all of us that share the streets and highways. Thanks.

Answer: Minnesota statute states that it is unlawful for any person to carry a white painted cane unless said person is a blind person.

Any person operating a motor vehicle in this state shall bring such motor

vehicle to a stop and give the right-of-way at any intersection of any street, avenue, alley or other public highway to a blind pedestrian who is carrying a cane predominantly white or metallic in color, with or without red tip, or using a guide dog, when such blind person enters said intersection.

MnDOT to test work zone speed safety cameras on I-35W and Highway 65 this summer

The Minnesota Department of Transportation will soon begin testing a new method for improving work zone safety: installing speed safety cameras at two highway construction sites.

"Everyone deserves to get home safely each day," said MnDOT Commissioner Nancy Daubenberger. "Speeding in work zones is the top safety concern we hear from the people who work on our roads. These camera systems, which have been used in other states, offer another tool that may help improve safety for everyone who works in, and travels through, the limited space within work zones."

The two work zones where the work zone speed safety cameras will be installed are:

I-35W in Burnsville, north of the I-35W/I-35E split.
Highway 65 Cambridge to Braham, near Braham.

People entering these two work zones will see orange signs alerting them when the speed safety camera systems are in use and capturing images of drivers violating the speed limit. Registered owners of vehicles recorded traveling 10 mph or more above the work zone speed limit may receive warning letters. The warning letters will include the recorded speed of the vehicle, a photo of the vehicle's license plate and educational information about work zone safety. The systems will only record images of license plates; no images of vehicle occupants will be recorded.

No fines will be issued as part of the work zone speed safety camera pilot project. The main goals this summer are to test camera systems and their effectiveness as work zone safety devices and to educate drivers on the importance of driving safely in work zones.

The speed safety cameras pilot project is one component of the Walz-Flanagan Administration's

work to improve highway safety for everyone. Since 2019, MnDOT has installed hundreds of safety improvements on Minnesota's highways, including 82 roundabouts, 83 J-Turns and 115 miles of high-tension cable barrier.

MnDOT's work zone speed safety cameras are part of a larger pilot project authorized by the 2024 Minnesota Legislature to study the feasibility and effectiveness of speed safety cameras in Minnesota. Studies show speed safety cameras are effective at reducing severe crashes, deaths and serious injuries in the areas they're installed. MnDOT has the option to test and evaluate the cameras in up to two more work zones in 2027 or 2028.

Since 2021, there have been more than 11,000 crashes in Minnesota work zones. Twenty-two people have died and 609 people were injured in speed-related work zone crashes in Minnesota. Speeding contributed to 38% of all work zone fatalities, and 31% of the work zone crashes that involve speeding are fatal or cause injury.

FEEDBACK SOUGHT THROUGHOUT THE PILOT PROJECT

Minnesotans traveling through the work zones are encouraged to provide feedback on work zone speed safety camera systems, the pilot project, its communications and their experience as they navigate these work zones. Nearly one-third of adults receiving publicly funded long-term care report unmet needs

For many older adults, people with disabilities, and others who require ongoing medical or personal assistance, long-term services and supports (LTSS) are essential for living independently and carrying out everyday activities. These services, which include help with bathing, dressing, preparing meals, transportation, and other daily needs, allow millions of people to live as independently as possible.

According to a new study from the University of Minnesota School of Public Health (SPH), many people using publicly funded LTSS programs aren't getting all the care they need, leading to reduced community participation and lower satisfaction with how they spend their day-to-day lives.

To conduct the study, researchers analyzed survey data from more than 61,000 adults receiving publicly funded LTSS in 27 states. They reviewed data from a nationally representative sample of adults receiving publicly funded LTSS in their homes, assisted living facilities, and nursing homes. Researchers examined whether participants felt their services met their needs and goals and how those responses related to measures of quality of life, including community participation and satisfaction with daily activities.

The study, published in the Journal of the American Geriatrics Society, found:

Nearly one-third of participants reported unmet service needs. About 29%

of adults receiving publicly funded LTSS said the services they received did not fully meet their needs and goals.

Unmet needs were linked to lower quality of life. Participants whose needs were not fully met were significantly less likely to report being active in their communities or satisfied with how they spent their day.

The type of long-term care program mattered. Participants enrolled in the Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE), a Medicare and Medicaid program that coordinates medical and long-term care for older adults, reported fewer unmet needs than those receiving traditional Medicaid-funded services. Adults receiving home- and community-based services were also more likely to report unmet needs than those living in residential care settings.

"Long-term services and supports are designed to help people live with dignity and independence, but our findings suggest the current fragmented system isn't consistently delivering on that promise," said Romil Parikh, SPH researcher and lead author. "As our population ages and more people rely on these services, policymakers have an opportunity to strengthen coordination across programs and ensure people receive the support they need to live the lives they want."

The study authors noted that their findings highlight the need for more coordinated approaches to delivering and funding long-term services and supports in the U.S.

After two clinic visits it was determined that Steve had a fungal infection called blastomycosis. Steve was admitted to the hospital in Wyoming, Minnesota. It was believed that Steve's condition was improving until he suffered a cardiac event and was transferred to Fairview Southdale Hospital in Edina.

Steve was transferred again a few days later to M. Health Fairview University of Minnesota Medical Center-East Bank and connected to a heart and lung ECMO machine to allow his lungs to heal from the blastomycosis. After two cardiac events, which occurred at Southdale, antifungals were used to eradicate the blastomycosis from his body. Variations of this treatment continued for more than two weeks as infectious disease and cardiac doctors did their best to improve Steve's condition. Despite the medical teams' valiant efforts and constant prayer from loved ones, Steve's condition did not improve. Every medical course of action was taken, but the blastomycosis continued to mercilessly ravage his lungs, while the antifungal intended to treat his condition was battering his liver into dysfunction. Unfortunately, this is a known side effect of this medication. A balance could not be found to restore his body's health. Steve went home to Jesus on July 20, 2026.

Steve is survived by his wife, Misty Kittelson; stepdaughters, Mackenzie (Joeven) and Abigail; brother, Scott; sister, Sherri; uncles, Doug (Vicdan) and Gene; parent-in laws, Randy and Leanda Cross, brother-in-law, Heath (Jill) Cross, nephews, Trent and Jesse and niece, Hannah. 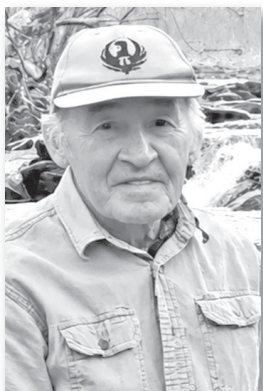

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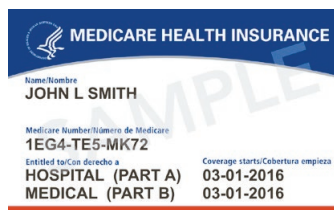
