North Branch Midsummer Days festivities return for 2021

The North Branch American Legion and Chamber of Commerce are bringing back the area's staple of summer, Midsummer Days, for its 95th anniversary. The festivities will run from June 16-20 with events taking place in Central Park, the American Legion Post #85 and under the Legion Tent.

The American Legion has been working to plan the event, and despite the difficulties they've come across due to the pandemic, they say they are, "trying to do pretty much everything that we have done in the past, to the best of our ability." The events will follow all COVID compliance required by the state of Minnesota and hand sanitizer will be at the gates and around events.

Wednesday kicks off the festivities at 5 p.m. with the start of the Family Fun Show Carnival, which offers rides, games and food. From 6-10 p.m., \$18 buys a wristband worth unlimited rides for the evening for

"wristband night."

Thursday's events begin at 10 a.m. with Family Bingo taking place under the American Legion tent all day. Kids under 12 can play for free until 6 p.m. At the American Legion Bar, a meat raffle will be starting at 5 p.m. and the Carnival runs from 4 - 10 p.m.

Friday expands on the previous day's events with the Carnival opening at 1 p.m. and Family Bingo from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m., followed by Coach Purse Bingo at 5:45 p.m. At 8:30 p.m., those who are 21 or older can gather under the Legion Tent for the street dance with free admission and featuring a cash bar and live entertainment by rock band Off The Record.

Saturday includes the most events, starting at 8 a.m. with the Midsummer Golf Tournament at the North Branch Golf Course. At 9 a.m., the Kiddie Midsummer Olympics will be held at the old athletic

Isanti to add performance center to Bluebird Park

Uses for Bluebird Park in the City of Isanti will be expanding with the addition of a performance center, which was approved by Isanti City Council in a split vote at its June 1 meeting. Council members Jimmy Gordon and Paul Bergley opposed the project; Mayor Jeff Johnson and council members Steve Lundeen and Dan Collison voted in favor of the project.

Introducing the topic, Parks, Recreation, and Events Coordinator Alyssa Olson broke down the costs, which were higher than the original estimated \$248,230 due to increased labor and material costs. The new costs are estimated to be \$298,884, and that is with lighting and sidewalk installation.

"I don't think that its going to get used the way that you guys do, that's not a problem we disagree,' Gordon said. He stated that he thought the city should have a subcommittee of residents planning and raising funds for these types of projects, with the subcommittee raising half the money in order to make sure it is something that the residents of the city really want. He also said he thought the money for this project could be better spent towards the new liquor store or other needed infrastructure projects.

Another thought was that city street dances could be moved to the park with the new performance center. Gordon noted that the point of street dances was to have them on the street downtown to showcase businesses downtown.

"You can have concerts in the park and you have a better public safety standpoint on it," Johnson said. "I mean, I think both police and fire would both say it would be easier, I hate to say corral our residents, but that's what it would be essentially, is we are corralling them in the park and easier to

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Cambridge Walmart to cover virtual camp costs

While some youth programs are opening back up, parents are still weary to send their kids to in-person activities. Enter: virtual Minnesota Business Venture (MBV). Walmart Cambridge has signed on to sponsor local high school students to attend Best-Prep's virtual summer camp this July. The sponsorship covers the registration fee, four days of content, digital programming costs, and a tool kit with bonus gifts. Space is limited, but spots are being held for these sponsorship recipients.

MBV is a four-day virtual summer program that provides high school students with real-world skills, offering a rare opportunity to hear from business owners, build skills needed for resumes and future jobs, develop financial literacy skills, and more. MBV offers two sessions: July 12-15 and July 26-29, from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.

While past years of Minnesota Business Venture have taken place for a full week on a college campus, in 2020 and 2021, students will participate at home virtually with their computers, tablets, or smart phones.

Students will work in small teams or "companies" to create a fictitious product and business plan that is presented at the end of the session. Other activities include mock interviews, team-building exercises, scavenger hunts, and a special session called "Ask an Influencer," where students will learn from local celebrities and influencers about their experiences. Speakers will be from companies including Minnesota Vikings, Angie's Popcorn, WCCO, Great Clips, Black Garnet Books, and more

"We're thrilled to host MBV online again this year for Minnesota high schoolers. Students will meet new friends from around the state, network with business professionals, and gain confidence in their education and future plans," said BestPrep's Minnesota Business Venture Program Manager, Janae Olinger.

MBV registration is open for all Minnesota high school students completing grades 9-12. Enrollment is typically \$50, but this sponsorship covers this fee for local students. Additional financial aid is available for students who demonstrate financial need. Students who do not have access to a device or internet will be supplied with what they need. Overwatering Plants

Why is overwatering so detrimental to plant health?

Healthy roots are the foundation for healthy plants. Once it has grown a substantial root system the plant starts putting its energy in growing a larger plant and more flowers. Roots are important to a plant because they are its primary source of water and food and are also important for the uptake of oxygen. The roots of the plant take up water but they also need air to breathe.

Over-watering, in simple terms, drowns your plant. Soil that is constantly wet won't have enough air pockets and the roots can't breathe.

CPR for Overwatered Plants

• Move the plant to a shady area, even if it is a full sun plant. Once the roots are healthy move the sun plants back to a sunny location.

• Be sure the pot is draining. If no drainage holes exists add some or re-pot the plant into a pot with drainage holes. Do not allow the pot to sit in water, this will keep the soil too wet.

• If possible, create additional air spaces around the root ball. One way of doing this is slowly tilt the pot to its side and then gently tap the container, the soil ball should now be loose within the container. Carefully re-stand the pot up when completed there should be small air pockets between the pot wall and around the soil ball. This will allow the soil to dry quicker and at the same time bring oxygen to the root zone.

• If the plant isn't too large, re-pot into a different pot. Be sure to add new soil. This will give the roots nice, clean soil to

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grow into.

• Begin watering only when the surface of the soil is dry to the touch. Do not allow the plant to get extremely dry, this additional shock could be enough to kill the plant. If the plant is wilting badly, you can mist or syringe the plant's foliage with water which will prevent too much leaf scorch. Do not fertilize until the plant returns to its normal condition. Treating with a broad-spectrum fungicide can be helpful.

• Even if you take all of these steps there is no guarantee that your plant will bounce back. It partially depends on how badly the roots have been damaged. If you have a tendency to kill a plant with kindness and are composting more than survive, you might look at changing your soil mix to a lighter, fluffier soil. Make sure you have plenty of drainage holes in your containers. If you tend to keep plants on the wet side you might want to steer clear of plants that are more prone to problems from over-watering.



Voter laws not 'Jim Crow,' but are suppression

To the editor.

Julie Peterson's response to my letter was well researched. Ms. Peterson said she read all of the recent voting laws, (quite a task with 400 laws in legislatures) and found no racism. I agree, there is little comparable to the "Jim Crow" south in these laws. In many ways, these are worse. The Jim Crow laws were blatantly racist. The new laws are presented as "protecting the vote" when there was NO significant voter fraud found in the 2020 election. If there was really voter fraud, more than 1 of the 60-plus court actions brought by Republicans would have proved it. So, there was no provable fraud.

These laws are really about voter suppression. The suppression in these laws is not just against minority voters, but anyone who does not vote Republican. This strategy dates back to 1980. Paul Weyrich, cofounder of the Heritage Foundation said "... They want everybody to vote. I don't want everybody to vote. ... As a matter of fact, our leverage in the elections quite candidly goes up as the voting populace goes down."

Ever since, Republicans have tried to suppress voting. In 2016, courts ruled that changes to North

Carolina's election law targeted black voters "with almost surgical precision." In a 2014 Texas voter ID case, U.S. District Judge Nelva Gonzales Ramos detailed how hard it is for some people to get a photo ID. Of the 254 counties in Texas, 78 do not have a permanent license bureau. Along the Mexican border, the nearest license bureau is up to 125 miles away. A person without a driver's license will need to have a family member or a friend drive them to the License Bureau to get a photo ID card. Now ask yourself this - would you want to drive your Uncle Bob two hours each way and then stand in line at the License Bureau for another hour?

Legislatures sped up passing these suppressive laws starting in July of 2013. Why at this particular time? In June, 2013, the Supreme Court struck down requirements for legislatures to "pre clear" new voting laws. This was to stop laws designed to suppress voting. Laws were passed in massive numbers after the Supreme Court's ruling because they would not have passed the preclearance test and would have been thrown out.

Make no mistake, these new voting laws are meant to be suppressive and against democracy. **Jeffrey Benny**

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TALKING WITH THE EXPERTS

Cancer survivors face a life-long journey

June is National Cancer Survivor Month. In honor of that, Karim Thomas Sadak with the University of Minnesota answers questions about advances in cancer treatments, ways you can support a loved one who is a cancer survivor and more.

Q: What advancements in cancer treatments have been made in recent years?

Dr. Sadak: Some of the biggest advancements in recent years have been new strategies to intervene and either stop or reverse the long-term complications of cancer treatments, called late-effects. For decades, we were learning about what the late-effects were. Now the pendulum has swung, and we are focusing our research on preventing or catching these late-effects earlier. The use of certain medications, as well as physical medicine and rehabilitation treatments, are becoming interventions that can help keep a cancer survivor healthy and happy.

Q: What are some of the challenges cancer survivors face?

Dr. Sadak: A cancer survivor's jour-

ney is life-long and never fully ends. Because of this, the late-effects can present challenges across the physical, mental and social aspects of well-being. Some challenges are mental health-related and others are more subtle and related to neurocognition (i.e., how the brain works and processes information). Financial challenges can come into play and insurance-related barriers to care exist as well. The biggest challenge is probably that the risks are varied and cut across many different aspects of well-being and quality of life. With the proper care from a cancer survivor specialist, the challenges can all be addressed so a survivor is never alone in facing these challenges.

Q: What are things you can do to support a loved one who is a cancer survivor?

Dr. Sadak: Be an ally in all aspects of well-being. Friends and family that support each other in living healthy lifestyles, help each other in meaningful and lasting ways. Go for walks with your loved one, send messages of positivity, and sometimes it's just being a good listener for your loved one. Be present for your loved one, however and whatever that means to that person make sure they know that they are not alone in this journey.

Q: What resources are available for cancer survivors?

Dr. Sadak: Many medical centers have medical teams that specialize in care for cancer survivors. Now that care can be accessed virtually, these care teams have professionals that can point a survivor in the right direction for any and all resources that may be needed and/or available.

Q: What are you doing to advance research helping cancer survivors?

Dr. Sadak: Health systems everywhere are complex and hard to navigate. We are doing the research to find ways to make it easier for survivors to get the care that they need and stay engaged in their survivor-focused care. We can't let survivors slip through the cracks of our health systems when there is so much that we can do to help keep them healthy and having the highest quality of life. Our research will identify, create and test new and stateof-the-art ways to engage survivors and help them navigate their survivorship journey. Our research is informing how we deliver care ensuring that it is for survivors and by survivors.

KARIM THOMAS SADAK is the director of the Cancer Survivor Program for the Division of Pediatric Hematology/ Oncology in the Department of Pediatrics at the University of Minnesota Medical School and Masonic Cancer Center member. His areas of expertise include providing care to childhood cancer survivors and transitioning childhood cancer survivorship care to age-appropriate settings for adolescents and young adults.

Childhood trauma more common than realized

Trauma is an experience which completely overwhelms a person's ability to cope, causing them to feel overwhelmed. Examples of events that might be traumatic include experiencing or witnessing abuse, natural disasters like floods or fires, and life-threatening situations like severe car accidents or school shootings. While these events may be 'in the past' now, traumatic memories get stored differently from other types of memories, causing part of the brain and body to react like the traumatic experience is still ongoing.

You may be familiar with the way media shows Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD): often a military veteran, who has flashbacks when something reminds him of the war. The reality is that trauma can affect people in a number of ways, especially for children.

A young child may compulsively re-enact the trauma using their toys. They may "regress" to earlier stages of development, such as "baby talking" or difficulties with tolleting during the day or night. They may become clingy with caregivers or become socially withdrawn. Emotionally, they may appear sad, anxious, angry, or any combination of the three. They may have a hard time staying still or focusing, as their brain and body are reminded of the traumatic experience. They may seem to "space out" or "shut down" at times. They may develop new fears of people, places, things, or even smells and sounds that remind them in some way of the trauma. If a child you know has experienced or witnessed something that may have been traumatic. or you see a sudden change in their behavior (such as any of the above symptoms), how can you help? One of the things you can do is to be a safe and supportive adult in their life. Studies have found

that having just one supportive adult can make a big difference for children's wellbeing. They may want to talk about what they have been through, or they may not be ready to talk about it, because the emotions it brings up can be overwhelming.

Another thing you can do to help them is bringing them to therapy. There are a number of types of therapy that have been found to be successful in helping children work through and move on from trauma, including play therapy and a number of types of talk therapy.

If the child wants to talk about the trauma, there are several ways you can support them. Letting them know you understand their feelings, with statements like, "That sounds like it was really scary," can help children know you are listening and it's okay to have those emotions. In some cases, children may need to be reassured that the trauma was not their fault in any way, and that they are safe now. It can often be painful for adults to hear that their child has been through something traumatic and seeking out your own therapist can also be a great way to make sure you're able to be there for the child. Lastly, remember that you and your family are not alone. Childhood trauma is more common than people realize, and there is no shame in getting support. Early intervention can help a child process the trauma right away. Another important note is to recognize that persons who experienced childhood trauma grow up to be adults who may sometimes struggle with after affects of their experience. It is never too late to get help.

maintain the public safety in that, and that was the original intent of a whole performance center."

Collison pointed out the numerous events that can take place at a performance center, such as open mic night, kids dances, and plays.

Olson noted that she will be working with a number of organizations to fill the scheduling for the space. Bergley said that, although in favor of the project, he thought it should not be done this year due to people still struggling after the pandemic. Collison and

Johnson pointed out this wasn't an issue when the project was planned and budgeted for construction this year.

RESIDENTS OBJECT TO DEVELOPMENT

Voicing their concerns over safety, a group of Isanti residents nearly derailed plans for Fairway Greens South, a development of 45 single-family plots on the northeast side of Isanti.

Residents' concerns over the development were entertained for nearly two hours at the council meeting. The residents live on Wendover Street Northeast, which will be extended to accommodate access to the development, but there will not be another access to the street.

Introducing the topic, Community Development Director Sheila Sellman stated a public hearing took place at the May 18 Isanti Planning Commission meeting regarding the preliminary and final plat for Fairway Greens South. A preliminary plat with the same plat configuration was approved in 2014 (preliminary plat Fairway Greens Phase Seven), according to Sellman.

However, the final plat of Fairway Greens Phase Nine in 2017 platted the site into Outlot A. The developer is now asking the city to approve the 2014 preliminary and final plat, which is allowed since there are no changes to that plan, Sellman explained.

"This development is governed under our planning and development, and you have 15 years to execute this plan," Sellman said regarding the development agreement. "So, that's why staff is recommended approval. It also meets our zoning code. We did reach out to the county engineer and he said that this plat has restricted access along County Road 5, so we will not be able to get a second access along that road."

She acknowledged the city received a petition of signatures from people that would like a second access. There were 54 people who expressed their opinion via an online poll, but 26 that signed it were not in Isanti, and five that signed did not provide an address.

"The development was already approved years ago and unfortunately everybody in the city knows that the city is going to grow," Johnson said, noting the city had exhausted its options in getting a second outlet to satisfy the residents. "If they wanted to put in houses on my street, I'd unfortunately have to live with that, because I know the city is going to grow. I knew it before I bought my home. Not what I would probably want to hear as a homeowner, but it is what it is."

The main concern for the current residents of Wendover Street is not having another outlet for the development. All residents of the current homes (24 lots) and the residents of the potential 45 additional homes will only have one inlet/outlet to Wendover Street Northeast via Eighth Avenue Northeast.

Residents argued that this would not only increase traffic on the street, which already is a problem, but other concerns included fire safety and bus stops. They cited Isanti Fire District Chief Al Jankovich's concern over not providing two separate and approved fire apparatus roads for developments with more than 30 homes. At one point, Johnson offered delaying approval of the final plat to the July 6 meeting of city council, but the developer, Anthony Hanson, noted that would drastically affect his plans for starting the development of the area and potentially cost him a lot of money – a gamble he was not willing to take.

Residents were encouraged to go to the county board meeting to ask the county to re-examine whether a second access could be obtained off of County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 5. Isanti County Commissioner Mike Warring was in attendance at the meeting and also encouraged them to come to the county board meeting, but cautioned this would not be a quick or easy solution. The road would have to be widened and turn lanes installed, which potentially would mean the acquisition of additional land, all of which was not in the budget this year.

Sellman and city engineer Jason Cook of Bolton and Menk also cautioned the council that even if the county would allow for a second access, the estimated \$350,000 cost to build the city street to the access would fall on the city or the developer and may not be feasible.

The plat was finally approved by the council, with the City of Isanti entering into an agreement with the developer for the city to have first right of refusal for lots 10, 11, and 12 for a potential city street to exit the development to CSAH 5.

A tragic weekend on area roads was bookended by a pair of fatal crashes, with one occurring just south of Isanti and the other just north of North Branch.

The first fatality was the result of a collision between a Buick Lesabre and a semi trailer on Highway 65 on Friday, June 4 resulting in a 25-year-old Cambridge woman dying at the scene.

According to the Minnesota State Patrol's incident report, at about 6:07 p.m., a Freightliner semi, driven by 32-year-old Aklilu Alem Gebremichael of Dallas, TX, was crossing the northbound lanes of Highway 65 at 285th Lane NE, when a 2000 Buick Lesabre, driven by 25-year-old Bianca Mae Rogalski of Cambridge, which was traveling northbound on Highway 65, struck the semi towards the rear of the Freightliner on the drivers side.

INFORM, VACCINATE, REPEAT Isanti County Public Health's COVID efforts continue, however minimal percentage increases noted

Isanti County Health and Safety Coordinator Molly Wiemann is starting to sound like a broken record when it comes to providing COVID-19 vaccination updates to the Isanti County Board of Commissioners: the county is working very hard to vaccinate as many residents as possible, but the county continues to be one of the lowest percentages in the state.

As of June 7, 35% of Isanti County residents have received at least one dose, which is third lowest ahead of only Kanabec County's 34% and Todd County's 30%. By comparison, Chisago County currently sits at 47%. The state of Minnesota as a whole has over 47% of residents who are considered fully vaccinated.

Another update was given to Isanti County Community Health Board June 2 regarding the vaccination rates in Isanti County, where the county is at, and what the roadblocks are in getting all residents vaccinated.

Not only has public health provided multiple vaccine clinics, but its also conducted polling to see who is interested in getting the vaccine and who is not, according to Wiemann. Information has been placed in the newspapers and on social media, and public health is currently working on a radio ad, she added.

"We've really tried to reach every outlet we can with outreach and education as we move forward with this," Wiemann said, noting that public health will take time to re-evaluate the needs of the community and the county as it looks at vaccination rates.

The county will be hosting vaccination clinics every Monday beginning June 7 at the Isanti County Government Center offering all three vaccines – Moderna, Pfizer, and Johnson and Johnson. The clinics will be walk-in or pre-register, whichever residents prefer.

"We'll also keep looking at the possibility of continuing to do mobile clinics, because we do see that they are

pretty popular," Wiemann said, noting one mobile clinic at the Isanti County Fairgrounds vaccinated 20 people in an hour. Mobile clinics can also take place at upcoming community events and fairs.

"I just want to make it very clear that we are doing a lot of work and we're trying to make the best use of our time, too," she continued, noting there are only eight injectors in public health and the county has other programs that exist. "We're trying to make sure that we are managing the flow, because we are seeing some burnout."

In evaluating what the community needs and wants from public health, the county will be partnering with Minnesota Department of Public Health to do a pilot outreach program. "Hopefully it's a great way for us to poll our whole community and see is it really vaccine hesitancy, is it convenience issues, is it more education – what do we need to give our community," Wiemann said.

Isanti County Commissioner Terry Turnquist praised Wiemann and Isanti County Public Health for the job they have been doing in getting residents vaccinated, noting they basically developed a program from nothing.

He then asked if it was vaccine hesitancy that's holding Isanti County residents back from being vaccinated.

"That's a great question, and that's a hard question to answer," Wiemann said. "I think it's a little bit of everything. I think there's some politics that play a role in it, I think there's hesitancy because it's a new vaccine, I think it's education, there's three vaccines and they all have different efficacies and they all have different adverse reactions. So, I think there's a little bit of everything and I think it's hard to pinpoint exactly what it is, but I do think hesitancy does play a role in why Isanti County's rates a little lower. We're a pretty conservative county, so, I don't want to say that's a true fast fact, but I think that is what we're kind of seeing."

Turnquist also said that someone who had COVID-19 said he did not need to get the vaccine, asking Wiemann if there is any truth to that statement. Wiemann said people can get COVID-19 multiple times, reiterating that Isanti County Public Health wants everybody to get vaccinated to create herd immunity and protect residents. She said it all goes back to education, and there is a lot of misinformation out there that public health needs to combat, as well.

PILOT TRAINING PROGRAM APPROVED

"This is kind of a rare, unique opportunity that we have, and the Happiness Advantage/Orange Frog team has agreed to provide a pilot workshop with no commitment from the county to share this initiative, which would be a consideration for the board for potential recovery plan funds," said Isanti County Administrator Julia Lines. "The whole goal is to combat the mental well-being impact the pandemic has had, and this goal is very well-researched and there's a lot of proven outcomes for this initiative in other school districts and cities, but never have they tackled a whole county."

The pilot workshop will take place Thursday and Friday, June 10 and 11 and there are a lot of community members interested in participating, despite the short notice, Lines said.

"We will learn about this, and then on June 14 when we have committee of the whole we can share what these community representatives thought of the pilot and if the county board is really interested in it, I think this will be a unique opportunity to promote kindness and well-being and mental well-being, especially, throughout this county and then the board consider a whole initiative if all these community partners are invested. I think we need that buy-in from all the community leaders if we're going to move forward with this to really make positive change."

She noted the organization is willing to fly in and provide a lot of resources for the workshop, without a financial commitment. "They are pretty confident we're going to love it and they are also excited about the opportunity of sort of a big research project to see if this work can create positive outcomes at the end of the day. So, they'll include us in their research and their journals and their books and everything that they are doing," Lines said. "It's a winwin situation and pretty soon hopefully you'll start seeing some orange frogs pop up all across the county and spread some happiness and some well-being."

If the county decides to participate in the initiative after the initial workshop, American Recovery Plan funds received by the county will be used to fund the program.

ISANTI RESIDENTS OPPOSE APPOINTING AUDITOR/ TREASURER

A handful of Isanti County residents voiced their opinion opposing appointing the county auditor/treasurer during the public comment section of the Isanti County Board meeting, stating they did not want their right to vote to be taken away. The board had previously tabled any action on this topic during their April 7 meeting following a public hearing, however they have yet to place it back onto an upcoming agenda.

Two additional Isanti County residents spoke during public comment session asking that the county evaluate whether it is possible to provide a second outlet onto County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 5 for the Fairway Greens South development that will extend Wendover Street Northeast in Isanti to create an additional 45 lots for single-family homes. Their concerns are the additional traffic and public safety. See the Isanti City Council article starting on page 1 for more information.

Cambridge teen fatally shot in Minneapolis

One of the victims in a series of fatal shootings over the weekend in downtown Minneapolis has been identified as a 17-year-old Cambridge-Isanti High School student. According to multiple reports, Nicholas Enger was observing cars "hot rodding" early Saturday morning, June 5, when an argument broke out between drivers, during which someone pulled out a gun and opened fire. A stray bullet from that gunfire allegedly struck and killed Enger. As of press time, no suspects have been arrested and the incident remains an open investigation. In response to news of Enger's death, grief counselors have been set up at Cambridge-Isanti High School. A memorial service will be held for Enger on Saturday, June 12 at Cambridge First Baptist Church (see page 6 for his full obituary).

High-to-extreme fire danger across Minnesota this weekend

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) cautions residents and visitors in northern Minnesota to be aware of elevated fire conditions through the weekend. An unintentional spark from a campfire or other outdoor activity in the hot, gusty and abnormally dry conditions could ignite a wildfire.

William Glesener, DNR wildfire operations supervisor, says that despite the green-up of vegetation, many areas in northern Minnesota are two-to-three inches below average for spring rainfall. This shortfall has dried out trees, shrubs and grasses in the region, and when combined with forecast conditions—temperatures near 100 degrees, low humidity and gusty winds—the result is an increased risk for wildfires.

"Don't be fooled just because things look green," Glesener said. "This is a dangerous time for wildfires."

He notes that, as a result of dry conditions, wildfire response crews have reported more intense wildfire activity than is typical for this time of year.

"With nine out of ten wildfires known to be human-caused, it will take everyone doing their part to prevent wildfires this weekend," said Casey McCoy, DNR fire prevention supervisor. "Be extra cautious with campfires and any outdoor activities that could produce heat or a spark as you enjoy the weekend."

Fire prevention reminders include:

• When enjoying a campfire, keep the fire small and manageable, no more than three feet in diameter and three feet high.

• Keep a hose or water nearby.

• After a campfire, drown-stir-repeat until it is out cold.

• If a campfire is too hot to touch, it is too hot to

leave.

• Fireworks are not allowed in state forests, state parks, or on any other state lands.

• Hot mufflers on recreational vehicles or other equipment can ignite tall grass if care isn't taken whenever the vehicle is stopped and idling.


DNR wildland firefighters throughout the state are ready to respond on the ground and in the air. Aircraft provide critical support to firefighters through detection flights on established routes and by dropping water or fire retardant to slow a fast-moving wildfire. Because fire danger remains high-to-extreme, aerial detection and suppression efforts will continue.

The DNR reminds everyone that a Temporary Flight Restriction (TFR) may ban the use of Unmanned Aircraft Systems (drones) within five miles of a wildland fire. Even without TFR, drones pose a risk to aircraft. While most drone pilots know the regulations and the importance of not flying near wildfires, drone incursions continue to happen in Minnesota.

"The safety of air and ground resources is a priority," said Glesener. "When a drone is discovered in restricted airspace, all suppression aircraft are required to land or return to base until the air space is clear. That's valuable time that could be used to slow and suppress a wildfire. When you fly over a wildfire, we can't."

Minnesota's wildland fire management agencies report that nearly 1,200 wildland fires have burned an estimated 33,500 acres since the beginning of March 2021. The dry conditions have been building since last fall, and many areas in northern Minnesota remain abnormally dry or in moderate drought.

Fire prevention is a shared responsibility. Monitoring weather conditions, checking current fire

Minnesota Fishing License: Eligible for one individual Minnesota resident annual fishing license effective through February 2022. Must be redeemed by July 30, 2021. Recipient must be eligible to hold a Minnesota fishing license. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the Department of Natural Resources which will reach out to Minnesotans to complete their fishing license application.

Minnesota State Parks Pass: Eligible for one Minnesota State Parks annual pass. Minnesotans will receive the pass in the mail from the Department of Natural Resources. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the Department of Natural Resources which will mail the State Parks pass.

Minnesota Zoo Admission: Eligible for one adult admission at the Minnesota Zoo through September 8. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the Minnesota Zoo which will email information in order for Minnesotans to redeem their admission.

Northwoods Baseball League Tickets: Eligible for one reserved ticket to attend a Northwoods League baseball game during the 2021 season. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the Northwoods League and Minnesotans will call the ticket office of the team they select and provide their full name and address for verification to reserve their ticket. Tickets are based on availability at the time of calling. Participating teams include the Rochester Honkers, Willmar Stingers, Mankato MoonDogs, St. Cloud Rox and the Duluth Huskies.



Minnesotans who get their first COVID-19 vaccine dose May 27 through June 30 will be eligible to choose their preferred vaccine reward from the nine options listed at right in "Vaccine Reward Options."

In order to be eligible for the vaccination rewards, Minnesotans 12 years of age and older must receive their first dose between May 27, 2021 and June 30, 2021. Beginning June 1, 2021, Minnesotans can verify their first dose and indicate their preferred vaccine reward at mn.gov/covid19/summer. Rewards will be available for the first 100,000 requests made by eligible Minnesotans. Reward requests must be submitted to the Minnesota Department of Health by 11:59 p.m. on June 30, 2021, and will be fulfilled on a rolling basis throughout the month of June 2021 and no later than July 16, 2021.

State Fair Tickets: Eligible for two admission tickets to the 2021 Minnesota State Fair. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide recipients' contact information to the State Fair which will email tickets no later than July 16, 2021.

Valleyfair Single-Day Admission: Valid for one Valleyfair admission ticket and the chance to purchase additional tickets for the same date at a discounted rate during the 2021 season. The Minnesota Department of Health will provide a unique code via email in order for Minnesotans to redeem this offer.

Visa Card: Eligible for a \$25 Visa Card to be used anywhere Visa is accepted. Minnesotans will receive the cards by mail or email from the Minnesota Department of Health or a State of Minnesota Vendor.

Letters from an area Civil War soldier

Editor's note: This month's "Repeating History" features letters written during the Civil War that may contain language with ethnic and racial prejudices that were once common but are no longer acceptable in today's society. They are being presented unedited as they were translated in their entirety from Swedish.



Repeating History Sam Klocksien Isanti County Historical Society

Olaf Liljegren was born in Sweden in 1830 and immigrated to Minnesota around 1858. Although residing in both Washington and Chisago Counties before the war, he claimed Cambridge as his home. Olaf had ties to many families in the area, notably the Edblads of Cambridge Township. His connection to both Isanti County and the Edblads is not entirely clear, but it's believed

that Olaf's family knew the Edblads before leaving Sweden and traveled with them on the way to Chisago and Isanti Counties. Some evidence from written correspondence and oral history indicates Olaf and a young pioneer woman named Mary Edblad had a romantic connection as well. Hints to this relationship are evident in some of Mary's writings throughout her life. Whatever his connection truly was to Isanti County, there is written correspondence indicating his devotion to the Edblads and the Cambridge area. In his letters, he often refers to, "coming home to Cambridge" after the war.

Olaf enlisted with the 3rd Minnesota Volunteer Regiment at Fort Snelling in 1861. Olaf quickly excelled through the ranks to become a lieutenant in the predominantly Scandinavian, Company D. Seeing service throughout the South, Lieutenant Liljegren saw action at the pivotal siege of Vicksburg, Mississippi; Murfreesboro, Tennessee; and Corinth, Mississippi. A remarkable and unforeseen series of events on the Minnesota frontier eventually found Company D headed home to defend against the Sioux Uprising of 1862. Taking part in the Wood-Lake Battle in Yellow Medicine County, Lieutenant Liljegren helped area settlers to safety and fought several skirmishes against the Sioux.

Lieutenant Liljegren made a return trip to Minnesota during a furlough in February of 1864. He stayed with the Edblad family at their log home along the banks of the Rum River just north of Cambridge, and in one of his letters upon returning to Little Rock, Arkansas thanks them for their hospitality. In the letter, Olaf also sent his well wishes to the Congers, Norelius', Hoffs, and 'all the Swedes around there.'

Throughout Lietentant Liljegren's service, he wrote letters (in Swedish) to his father who still resided in Sweden. In those letters, he described his experiences on the battlefield as well as daily life as a Union soldier. An equal amount of written correspondence was sent to the Edblads, particularly Mary Edblad. The letters to the Edblads were written in both English (to Mary) and Swedish

(to Mary's father, Isak) and generally consisted of inquires of Cambridge and the surrounding areas. Although many letters contained minimal punctuation and mis-spellings, Olaf's bi-lingual writing capabilities are impressive.

Sadly Olaf Liljegren never returned home from his service during the Civil War. His last letter was sent on May 1, 1864, addressed to Mary. Lieutenant Olaf Liljegren contracted malaria and died on September 24, 1864, in Pine Bluff, Arkansas. He is buried at Little Rock National Cemetery in Little Rock, Arkansas.

I am very thankful for your letter the 25 ult. I should have answered it before but somehow had no time Our first regiment orders to go to Camden some 170 miles from little Rock we stated as far as this place and waited untile we heard about Steeles with his forces had driven back by the rebels and our going out there deemed un-necessary. We were going to guard a trail of suplise for Steels Army one was sent out previously consisting off about 200 wagons and mules (6 mules for each wagon) which was unfortunately *Captured by the rebels and destroyed* and the forces with it fought well but was overpowered by emense odds.

General Steele was fighting yesterday about 30 miles from here. We could hear the cannon and wished to there to render them some assistance but in vain we got no order to go. General Steele was fighting against immense odds, but whipped the rebs, took several pieces of artillery, though lost some of his wagons. He is pulling back to Little Rock and expects the rebs will follow him but I don't belief they will come tonight, it arrived a ambulans train with about 120 wounded among them were some negro soldiers which fought in the engagement desperately and showed no mercy to the rebs. All the reports can not be fully credited

I will close my writing tonight and wish you a sound hapy Sleep and a little softer bed to sleep in than I have. One blanket around me on the hard damp ground no tent and or Bagages left in Little Rock. Good night. yours Truly Olaf Liljegren

My Dear Father!!!

Rock, Ark.

April 20th 1864

I am overcome with signs of love from you. I have been surprised with two letters which I must answer at once. The earlier I thought to answer when I got some peace and quiet, for up to now have been mostly on trips. But before this time came, I got, quite unexpectedly, a letter in Memprils, on my journey from Si.Paul to Little Rock in Arkansas (a chance meeting) and also one from S.K. Sw. written by Mr.Olson in [illegible]...well put together and one enclosed to Eric

Bong. I am glad to hear that everyone is in good health and feels as fine as conditions allow. For my part, I am well. I am completely returned to health. I am also glad to hear the timber business is lively, rivers and streams are cleared. I would really like to be there and have a hand in it, but since you can't be in more than one place at a time, I am content with being in this bloody drama of a war which is being played right here in America for people's freedom. The rights of both the blacks and the whites are abused to the greatest degree, much more the formers, since it cannot be remembered otherwise Every true freedom-loving person ought to consider it his highest duty to defend a people whose freedom has been crushed, the dearest [illegible]...he owns in life.



Bistodeau, Sibell qualify for state golf meet

GIRLS GOLF

The North Branch Viking and Cambridge-Isanti girls golf teams each finished off their seasons in style, with each team sending a member to their respective state golf meets.

Viking junior Hailey Bistodeau earned her first state meet berth by carding a two-day score of 175, which was good enough for third overall in Section 4AA. Bistodeau shot an 89 on the first day of sections, which was played at Highlands National in St. Paul. She bettered her score by three strokes on the second day, parring eight holes.

As a team, the Vikings finished in third place on the first day, enabling the entire team to advance to the section finals.

Bluejacket senior Jasmyn Sibell earned her second straight state meet berth (there was no spring sports season last year due to COVID) by placing fourth in Section 7AAA with a two-day total of 162. Sibell shot a 79 on the first day of the tournement, held at Grand National Golf Club, which put her in second place entering the second day. There, she shot an 83.

As a team, the Jackets finished in sixth place on day 1. The top three

teams advanced to play on day 2. The state golf meet will be held on June 15 - 16. Bistodeau will compete in Class AA, which will be held in Jordan. Sibell will compete in Class AAA, which will be held at Bunker Hills in Coon Rapids.

TRACK AND FIELD

The Bluejackets had an excellent meet during the Mississippi 8 Conference Meet, held in North Branch. The boys team claimed the M8 team championship, racking up 187.5 points compared to runner-up Monticello's 153. The Jacket girls finished second, scoring 164 points. Monticello was the girls champ with 188.5 points.

The Jacket girls won seven events on the day, lead by both the 4x100 and 4x200 relays. Anika Larson took first in the 200, with Aiyana Knight winning the 400. In the field events, Ada Schlenker took first in the high jump, Larissa Block took first in the long jump, and Emily Jones took first in the triple jump.

The Jacket boys, on the other hand, used team depth to earn their championship. C-I "only" had three first place finishes - from Jacob Ziebarth (high jump), Ethan Hintermeister (pole vault), and Trent Beseth (discus). However, they had a plethora of other top-three finishes, highlighted by a

1-2-3 sweep in the pole vault, with Riley Wilson taking second and Micah Wilson placing third. Those results were enough to secure the team trophy.

For the Vikings, Paige Bauer (pole vault) earned the only first place finish for the girls, who finished a distant third as a team. Harrison Toussaint continued to dominate both the hurdles events, taking first in both the 110 and 300 for the Viking boys, who finished sixth as a team.

BASEBALL

After taking a surprising loss in the first round of the Section 7AAA tournament, North Branch has rebounded, securing a lopsided 11-2 win over Cloquet, plus close, one run wins over Duluth Denfeld (4-3) and Princeton (2-1). Unfortunately, the Vikings' season came to an end in the next game with another one-run score. This time, it was Chisago Lakes who came up on the better end of a 2-1 score.

For the Jackets, their postseason was short and tough. C-I lost to Andover 12-1 in the opening round and then fell to Anoka 18-4 in the next round, ending their season.

SOFTBALL

The Vikings, who were given the #2 seed for the Section 7AAA tournament, cruised through their first two games, beating both Duluth Denfeld and Cloquet 10-0. The wins set up a semifinal game versus their nemesis this season - Chisago Lakes, who has beaten North Branch twice during the regular season. This time, however, the Vikings came out on top when it counted most,

earning a 5-1 win over the Wildcats. The win sent North Branch to the section championship undefeated, thus giving them a distinct advantage as the winner of the Hibbing versus Chisago Lakes game would then have to beat

the Vikings twice in order to advance to state. As it turned out, the championship

will be the fourth (and possibly fifth) meeting of neighbor rivals North Branch and Chisago Lakes as the Wildcats rallied from a late-inning deficit to Hibbing to pull out the win. Since the two teams are so close to each other, the championship was moved from Grand Rapids to Forest Lake. Game time is 5 p.m. on Thursday, June 10, with the if necessary game starting approximately a half-hour after the conclusion of the first game, assuming Chisago Lakes is the winner. If North Branch comes out on top in either game, it will be the Vikings who will advance to the State Class AAA tournament, which will be held in North Mankato on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 15-16.



Minnesota State courts ramp up in-person court proceedings

CONTRIBUTED MINNESOTA JUDICIAL BRANCH

The Minnesota Judicial Branch announced the next steps in a deliberate, gradual return to more in-person court proceedings and modifications to its COVID-19 health and safety protocols.

"The Minnesota Judicial Branch has relied on public health experts throughout the pandemic," said Minnesota Supreme Court Chief Justice Lorie S. Gildea. "Based on revised guidelines at both the federal and state level, we will continue our gradual return to more in-person proceedings in court facilities in a deliberate and responsible manner that prioritizes health and safety."

A new statewide order expands in-person court proceedings in accordance with revised health and safety protocols in the Minnesota Judicial Branch's COVID-19 Preparedness Plan. Under the order, the following is in effect June 14, 2021, through September 6, 2021:

•Criminal jury trials will be held in person.

•Civil jury trials can be held in person.

•Major Criminal, Juvenile Protection (including Child in Need of Protection or Services and Permanency cases types), and Juvenile Delinquency trials and contested hearings will be held in person.

•Criminal settlement conferences will be held in person.

•Grand jury proceedings will be held in person.

•Mandatory Misdemeanor Criminal

trials and contested hearings are to be held in person beginning August 2, 2021.

•All other district court proceedings will be held remotely unless the chief judge of the judicial district grants permission for an in-person proceeding based on extenuating circumstances.

•Appellate courts: Proceedings in appeals before the Minnesota Court of Appeals and the Minnesota Supreme Court will continue as scheduled by those courts.

•Public Service Counters: At least one public service counter in each county, and one in the appellate courts, will be accessible between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday – Friday, excluding court holidays. Counter service can be provided remotely, by appointment, or in person.

•Self-Help Services: Self-Help services will continue to be conducted by appointment, remotely, or by telephone.

•Courthouse Terminals: Courthouse (public access) terminals are available to the public and media based on hours established by the local district court.

•Media Access: Media may attend in-person court proceedings held in courtrooms and to record those proceedings as permitted by Court Rules. See Section 18 of ADM20-8001 for additional details on media access to in-person and remote proceedings.

FACE COVERINGS REQUIRED INSIDE COURTROOMS AND JURY DELIBERATION SPACES

The Minnesota Judicial Branch has modified its COVID-19 Preparedness Plan based on recent changes in guidance from the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention and the Minnesota Department of Health. Currently, all state courts require six-feet social distancing and mandatory use of face coverings in all areas of a court facility. Beginning June 14, 2021:

•Social distancing is not required in court facilities for brief interactions or when people are wearing face coverings. Brief interaction is defined as when two or more different households are within six feet of each other for less than 15 minutes total within a 24-hour period.

•Face coverings are required inside courtrooms and in jury deliberation spaces. Presiding judges may allow for removal of face coverings in the courtroom if deemed necessary, as long as six feet of physical distance can be maintained while the face coverings are removed. Face coverings in public areas of a county-owned court facility will be required if local government guidelines mandate their use. Any person who wishes to wear a face covering in a court facility may do so.

Because court proceedings involve people from multiple households and often last longer than 15 minutes, masking helps manage risk in courtrooms and allows for the safe, gradual expansion of the types of cases that are most effectively conducted in person.

Your drinking water comes from a groundwater source: three wells ranging from 410 to 427 feet deep, that draw ater from the Mt. Simon aquifer.

Cambridge works hard to provide you with safe and reliable drinking water that meets federal and state water quality quirements. The purpose of this report is to provide you with information on your drinking water and how to protect

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency sets safe drinking water standards. These standards limit the amounts specific contaminants allowed in drinking water. This ensures that tap water is safe to drink for most people. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulates the amount of certain contaminants in bottled water. Bottled water must provide the same public health protection as public tap water.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Cambridge Monitoring Results

This report contains our monitoring results from January 1 to December 31, 2020.

We work with the Minnesota Department of Health to test drinking water for more than 100 contaminants. It is not unusual to detect contaminants in small amounts. No water supply is ever completely free of contaminants. Drinking water standards protect Minnesotans from substances that may be harmful to their health.

How to Read the Water Quality Data Tables

The tables below show the contaminants we found last year or the most recent time we sampled for that contaminant. They also show the levels of those contaminants and the Environmental Protection Agency's limits. Substances that we tested for but did not find are not included in the tables.

We sample for some contaminants less than once a year because their levels in water are not expected to change rom year to year. If we found any of these contaminants the last time we sampled for them, we included them in the tables below with the detection date.

Some contaminants are monitored regularly throughout the year, and rolling (or moving) annual averages are used to manage compliance. Potential Health Effects and Corrective Actions (If Applicable)

Fluoride: Fluoride is nature's cavity fighter, with small amounts present naturally in many drinking water There is an overwhelming weight of credible, peer-reviewed, scientific evidence that fluoridation reduces tooth decay and cavities in children and adults, even when there is availability of fluoride from other sources, such as fluoride toothpaste and mouth rinses. Since studies show that optimal fluoride levels in drinking water benefit public health, municipal community water systems adjust the level of fluoride in the water to an optimal concentration between 0.5 to 0.9 parts per million (ppm) to protect your teeth. Fluoride levels below 2.0 ppm are not expected to increase the risk of a cosmetic condition known as enamel fluorosis

Some People Are More Vulnerable to Contaminants in Drinking Water

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. The developing fetus and therefore pregnant women may also be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water. Drinking Water Sources

Minnesota's primary drinking water sources are groundwater and surface water. Groundwater is the water found in aquifers beneath the surface of the land. Groundwater supplies 75 percent of Minnesota's drinking water. Surface water is the water in lakes, rivers, and streams above the surface of the land. Surface water supplies 25 percent of Minnesota's drinking water.

Contaminants can get in drinking water sources from the natural environment and from people's daily activities. There are five main types of contaminants in drinking water sources.

-Microbial contaminants, such as viruses, bacteria, and parasites. Sources include sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, pets, and wildlife.

-Inorganic contaminants include salts and metals from natural sources (e.g. rock and soil), oil and gas production, mining and farming operations, urban stormwater runoff, and wastewater discharges.

-Organic chemical contaminants include synthetic and volatile organic compounds. Sources include industrial processes and petroleum production, gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants such as radium, thorium, and uranium isotopes come from natural sources

(e.g. radon gas from soils and rock), mining operations, and oil and gas production. The Minnesota Department of Health provides information about your drinking water source(s) in a source wate assessment, including:

Lead in Drinking Water

You may be in contact with lead through paint, water, dust, soil, food, hobbies, or your job. Coming in contact with lead can cause serious health problems for everyone. There is no safe level of lead. Babies, children under six years and pregnant women are at the highest risk.

Lead is rarely in a drinking water source, but it can get in your drinking water as it passes through lead service lines and your household plumbing system. Isanti is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but it cannot control the plumbing materials used in private buildings.

Read below to learn how you can protect yourself from lead in drinking water.

1. Let the water run for 30-60 seconds before using it for drinking or cooking if the water has not been turned on in over six hours. If you have a lead service line, you may need to let the water run longer. A service line is the underground pipe that brings water from the main water pipe under the street to your home.

-The only way to know if lead has been reduced by letting it run is to check with a test. If letting the water run does not reduce lead, consider other options to reduce your exposure.

2. Use cold water for drinking, making food, and making baby formula. Hot water releases more lead from pipes than cold water

3. Test your water. In most cases, letting the water run and using cold water for drinking and cooking should keep lead levels low in your drinking water. If you are still concerned about lead, arrange with a laboratory to test your tap water. Testing your water is important if young children or pregnant women drink your tap water.

(Example: 981 Cypress Street South may sprinkle lawn on May 21, 23, 25, etc.) There will be NO sprinkling from noon to 6:00 p.m. All non-established lawns can water every day for a period of six weeks except for the hours of noon to 6:00 p.m. Over seeding or spot patching of existing established yards can be watered every day with a hand-controlled hose. This is in effect from May 1 through August 31st.

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
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
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
