'It's going to be great'

New Illuminate Isanti hosts excited for event's start

Karla Anderla and Jen Beauchane just couldn't stand the thought of Illuminate Isanti being extinguished after only running for three years. So, when the Isanti City Council strongly alluded to canceling the event due to what it considered excess city expenses setting up and putting on the event, the two stepped up to take the reins, creating a volunteer group to take over the Christmas light display in Bluebird Park.

"People might say I'm crazy," Anderla admitted. "It's not like we have the time to do it, we don't. We felt it was an important event that the city had started. It had great potential. It was a great idea. We just felt there was a lot of things being done that wasn't promoting it the way it could have been. It wasn't going in the

direction it could have gone. It could have grown a lot, and I felt it wasn't really growing.'

Thus, "Isanti Together" was

"We know a lot of people in the community, have been part of other groups with them," said Anderla, who is the owner and operator of the popular Now That's Waffles food truck. "We're kind of a force to be reckoned with. So, we weren't going to let this thing go."

After an extended negotiation period, Isanti Together and the city reached a memorandum of understanding agreement. Basically, Isanti Together was charged with fundraising, setting up a majority of the displays, running the event, and then tearing it down afterward.

For its part, the city would allow public works to transport all the wooden storage containers holding the displays to Bluebird

Park and set up the larger displays. There was no maximum time limit to accomplish those tasks, just as long as it took to complete the job, and with the condition that city tasks, such as snow removal, take top priority.

The city is also acting as fiscal host for the event. Under the agreement, Isanti Together needed to at least raise enough money to cover the costs of holding the event, such as paying Santa, purchasing giveaway merchandise, adding to or replacing displays, etc. As of the week before Thanksgiving, they had raised around \$20,000, which was enough to cover all of this year's expenses. Any additional funds collected will go into a fund earmarked for future Illuminate Isanti events.

According to Anderla, the

Cambridge approves cannabis store, with added condition

The Cambridge City Council's decision on which cannabis store application to approve might best be compared to a high-stakes track

race — complete with a photo finish and official review. In the end, one of the two potential cannabis stores walked away with involved with the prize; however, it is yet to be determined if it is the true "winner."

According to City Administrator Evan Vogel, **Evan Vogel** based on the council's re-City Administrator quest, the security camera timestamp was reviewed, indicating when the potential owner of the cannabis store proposed for North Main Street physically dropped off his application at City Hall, and compared it to the email received

timestamp for the application from the potential owner of the cannabis store proposed for North Cleveland

Based on those two timestamps, the owner of the North Main Street location "won" the race by

> a mere nine minutes. However, when reviewing each application, it was determined that the North Main Street owner originally didn't provide a copy of his driver's license, meaning the North Cleveland Street location's owner was first to turn in a complete application.

Vogel said based on those findings, and understanding the council appeared to be solidly against raising the maximum number of stores allowed to two, it was

Isanti County asking state to allow local option sales tax referendum

Isanti County is taking the first steps towards holding a local option sales tax referendum, which could be on the ballot as early as the 2026 general election. If approved, the sales tax increase would pay for the construction of a new Highway Department facility.

According to County Engineer Justin Bergerson, based on state statute, a local government my call for a local option sales tax referendum vote; however, first it must obtain state legislative approval to do so. If it gained that approval, a referendum vote would have to be called within two years of the legislative

Bergerson said the governing body must adopt a resolution that identifies the proposed tax rate, describes the cap ital project to be funded, and provides documentation of its regional significance and the estimated revenue needed to complete the project. It must also

contain a maximum number of years to collect the sales tax.

Bergerson said the estimated amount to be collected is currently \$23 million, which includes the facility construction, plus administration, engineering, and additional costs. He said the tax could also reimburse the cost to purchase the land, which the county has already completed. He said the amount is intentionally set a little higher to allow for some wiggle room. If that wasn't added, any overages in the project's costs would have to come from a capital improvement or general fund, or be assessed to residents via a levy increase.

Based on a .25%, which equates to 25 $\,$ cents for every \$100 spent, it is estimated the county would raise \$1.7 million annually. To allow for some possible fluctuations in consumer spending, Bergerson said the county would set an expiration date of 25 years, as state statute dictates an expiration at whichever comes first:

'A Very Good Christmas Carol' coming to Event Center

The characters of Ebeneezer Scrooge, Bob Marley, Tiny Tim and more will be brought to life in "A Very Good Christmas Carol" at the Braham Event Center on Dec. 19.

What makes this production different from other depictions of Charles Dickens' classic novel, however, is that only two performers will be part of the show, portraying London street urchins acting as narrators and some of the larger roles in the production.

The rest of the actors? They will be plucked straight from the audience during the performance.

But introverts need not be concerned. These parts are on a strictly volunteer basis, said Jeffrey Nolan, who acts in the show with Hawken Paul. The pair also adapted the script and direct the

"I think that the reason why we wanted to make this a show that involves the audience quite a bit is that I think 'A Christmas Carol' is such a lovely story about community, and that was what we really wanted to highlight with our production," Nolan said. "By making it involve the audience so much and having people come on stage, I think we're often able to get a really lovely bond with our audience and with them, with each other, by the end of our show. We can just say to the audience this is such a big story, we just need your help to tell it.

"That was the hook behind it and that's why the show came about, and then it's been gradually growing a little bit each year as we've been able to tour more and more and more people have been hearing about us."

For those unaware of the Dickens

classic, "A Christmas Carol" tells the story of Ebeneezer Scrooge, a miserly man who, on Christmas Eve, is visited by the ghost of his long-deceased busi-

The production is coming to the Braham Event Center on Dec. 19.

ness partner Jacob Marley. Marley tells Scrooge he will be visited in the night by three spirits who represent Scrooge's past, present and future. Scrooge learns how his behavior affects others and what will happen if he doesn't change his ways.

This is the third year Nolan and Paul have been performing their two-man show. They were first contacted by the Northern Lights Opera Company in Park Rapids to produce a two-man "Christmas Carol" that would be suitable for traveling to other venues.

"And then we got to writing, and we got to thinking about it, and we realized that we could make this an audience

interactive show," Nolan said. The audience will help not only with acting out roles and improvising lines but will add sound effects and take part in the singing of Christmas songs. "And then we also have people come

up for a dance scene as well, and we teach a little dance," Nolan said. While he noted that there are songs in the show, it is not a musical.

"We just sing a little bit," he said. It is also similar to old-time road shows in that the actors show up to different venues prepared only to see an empty space. There is no scenery to speak of.

"It's just the two of us," Nolan said. "The whole show fits into the back of my car. It's all of our costumes and props that we carry around a big steam-

Nolan describes this iteration of the show as a comedy with serious elements, especially when it comes to Tiny Tim's illness and the change Scrooge undergoes through his visits from the three spirits.

"For the large bulk of it, it is funny and we're having a good time," he said. "But I think the story has so much heart in it that when Hawken and I were writing it we thought it would be a real shame to lose that.

"When we originally were starting, we were thinking of making it more of like a parody of it and the more we read the story and were taken by it, we said we really wanted to tell a very earnest version of this albeit a little funnier. Scrooge's redemption is treated very seriously, and I appreciate how we are able to, yes, make it a much more lighthearted version, still having the room in it to when we see the Cratchits mourning Tiny Tim, it feels real; it feels affecting. And we see the terror that Scrooge has about what his life might

become if he doesn't change." The pair opened this year's tour, as is tradition, in Park Rapids right after Thanksgiving. They will take it to several small venues across the state.

"It's a completely family-friendly show. Families are encouraged, and it's two hours with an intermission, so it's super easy," Nolan said.

He added that bringing children to the production is a great way to get them interested in acting and theater.

"It's a lovely way to get your kids involved on stage," he said, "and it's a super fun night where you're gonna laugh. You'll maybe cry a little bit, too.'

Parents, guardians urged to prioritize kids' safety around cold water

As temperatures fall and ice begins forming on ponds, small lakes, and other waterways across the state, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds parents and guardians to talk with their kids about $t\bar{h}e$ importance of safety on the ice and around the water. It's especially important with many children at home over Thanksgiving break.

Falling into the water this time of year, whether through thin ice or into open water, can turn tragic quickly. It has the potential to incapacitate even the strongest swimmers, so it's up to parents and guardians to teach their kids about the dangers of cold water, and ensure they're properly supervised anytime they're around water. Already this season, a DNR conservation officer and other rescue personnel saved two teenagers who fell through thin ice in northern Minnesota.

"Kids tend to be curious about the water, but they might not understand the dangers," said Capt. Adam Block, boating law administrator for the DNR. "Every type of waterway can be dangerous this time of year, from small neighborhood ponds all the way to our largest lakes and rivers.'

Wearing a foam-filled life jacket is the best way to

stay safe around cold water or survive an unexpected fall in. Foam is better than inflatable life jackets this time of year, since the latter might not fully inflate in cold water. In addition, Block recommends people carry a phone in case they need to call for help, let others know where they're going and when they plan to return, and plan for how to deal with an unforeseer



• The drawbar or other connection may not exceed 15 feet from one vehicle to the

· When one vehicle is towing another and the connection consists of a chain, rope. or cable, the connection must display a white, red, yellow,

or orange flag or cloth not less than 12 inches square.

Talking digital detox and mental health with University of Minnesota

The holiday season is meant to bring rest and celebration, but it often becomes stressful as we rush through to-dos, check off lists and even lose sight of what actually matters to us. Any change in routine even if invited — can stir emotions and demand extra mental energy. Technology and artificial intelligence has the potential to support, but also undermine our intentions, depending on how intentionally we navigate them.

Sabine Schmid, PhD, with the University of Minnesota Medical School, discusses why intentionally disconnecting from electronic devices, AI and all things virtual this season may support our mental health, and how reconnecting with people, nature and the physical world can help us feel more grounded and human.

Q: Why do so many people feel drawn to "unplug" during the holi-

Dr. Schmid: The seductive allure of digital tools, while undeniably enriching, is also subtly drawing us away from our bodies, our relationships and the physical world right in front of us. Holidays interrupt our routines, and that disruption gives us a chance to notice just how much of our daily life is mediated by screens and digital notifications. Many of us spend the year immersed in virtual spaces — constantly reachable, constantly stimulated, unaware of the consequences, until we can suddenly realize something's gone missing.

Humans evolved in physical environments: in contact with other people, nature, touch, movement, shared meals and shared silence. When the gap between our digital life and our physical life becomes too wide, it creates tension. The desire to unplug isn't a rejection of technology; it's our nervous system signaling a need to reduce certain inputs for optimal functioning.

Q: What are your tips for disconnecting from electronic devices without creating new stress?

Dr. Schmid: It's helpful to start with intention rather than strict rules. Instead of saying "no screens at all," try identifying what you hope to gain: more presence with loved ones, a calmer mind, time outdoors or simply relief from constant

Then consider small, manageable

steps: Designate short "device-free

- windows" each day.
- Leave your phone in another room during meals or conversa-
- Replace one digital habit with a physical one: a walk, a puzzle, a handwritten card or cooking with someone.

If you feel anxious without your devices, that's normal. It signals how intertwined our tools have become with our routines. By approaching unplugging with curiosity rather than judgment, you create space for choice rather than deprivation.

Q: How can reconnecting with the physical world support mental well-being during the holidays?

Dr. Schmid: Our bodies are constantly sending us information through breath, temperature, muscle tension and sensory input. When we spend most of our time in digital environments, we stop noticing these signals. Reconnecting with the physical world reactivates our senses and grounds us in something real and stable.

Being in nature, touching snow or soil, listening to wind or voices instead of notifications — these experiences calm our physiological stress systems. Sharing physical space with others reminds us that relationships are built through eye contact, tone of voice and shared activity. Even simple tasks like cooking, decorating or taking a walk invite our minds back into our bodies. Presence is a physical act, not just a mental intention.

Q: What advice do you have for people who feel lonely or disconnected in an increasingly digital world?

Dr. Schmid: Loneliness often feels sharper at the holidays because we expect closeness — and the contrast can be painful. Technology can help us stay connected, but it can also create a sense of distance if it replaces embodied, in-person moments.

My advice is to reconnect with something physical, even if it feels small: reach out to one person in real time, take a walk in a familiar neighborhood, visit a public

space like a library or café or join a community activity. Being around others — even strangers — helps remind us that we exist in a shared physical world.

It's also important to allow yourself the full range of emotions that holidays bring. Loneliness isn't a sign of failure; it's a signal that connection matters deeply to us. And connection doesn't always require words — sometimes it's found in shared silence, shared space or shared experience.

Q: How does your academic work at the University of Minnesota inform your clinical perspective on unplugging and reconnecting with the physical world?

Dr. Schmid: In the mood disorders program at the University of Minnesota Medical School, we explore, study and apply a variety of exciting and innovative interventions for depression. The detrimental effects of chronic stress and social isolation on our mental and physical health are well established. A significant part of my work focuses on evidence-based, mindfulness-based and cognitive-behavioral approaches - all of which return people to the present moment and to their physi-

Research consistently shows that time in nature, in-person connection, sensory grounding and mindful attention reduce symptoms of stress and depression. None of these require technology; they require

Unplugging during the holidays isn't about rejecting innovation it's about remembering that our hodies and brains are built for real-world contact. When we reconnect with the physical, we reconnect with our numanness.

Dr. Sabine Schmid is a clinical psychologist and associate professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the Universitv of Minnesota Medical School. initial plan was for Isanti Together to become a 401(c)3 non-profit after this year's event. However, the group and the city will hold a "debriefing" after the event concludes to determine if or how they will go forward next year.

"We're trying to figure all that out," Anderla said. "We're all trying to figure it out together."

SETTING UP

"They (the city) weren't joking when they said it was a lot of work," Anderla said of setting up the displays. "It is a lot more work than even I anticipated."

In order to prevent battling inclement weather at the last minute, the group began setting up the displays in the middle of October.

"It was slow going at first," Aderla said. "It's been a learning curve. Lots of lists. Lots of check-marking.

"We've had a lot of volunteers come out," she added. "It was quite touching. It's not like we've had 50 people come out, (but) those 10 people or five people or that one person that came out, has

made a big difference."

As it turned out, their timing was impeccable, given the two snowstorms that bookended Thanksgiving weekend. The last displays were placed a week before Thanksgiving, which only left plugging them all in. Fortunately, the winds from the first of the two storms only did minor damage that was easily repaired. As of Dec. 1, "94% of the displays are plugged in and ready to go."

THE EVENT ITSELF

The group decided to primarily keep the same schedule as last year, but with a few logistical changes. The lights and music will automatically turn on at 5 p.m. each night from Dec. 11 through Dec. 25. They will also automatically turn off at 10 p.m.

Plus, each Thursday through Sunday from 5 to 8:30 p.m. will feature what the group has tagged the "Festival of Lights." During those times, there will be food vendors, Santa and the Grinch, carolers singing, and a variety of "Reindeer Games." Businesses and other organizations will be on hand to welcome attendees and run the various activities. In order to have the carolers and Reindeer Games in the amphitheater, Santa has been moved to an enclosed area under the picnic table pavilion.

In the event of inclement weather at any time during the two weeks, an announcement of the event's closure will be made via social media at least three or four hours in advance.

THE FUTURE

Although Anderla acknowledges

there are no guarantees the event will take place in 2026 or beyond, Isanti Together is going forward under the premise that it will. The group has already discussed different possible ways of storing the displays for the rest of the year in order to free up the space at the police department.

"It (holding the event in 2026) will have to be voted on (by the council), she said. "It might have to be a year-toyear thing until we get this all figured out. This year seems to be working out pretty well. Maybe this is how it continues. We will just work together, going forward."

Even if this winds up being the event's swan-song, though, Isanti Together is determined to make this year's event the best one yet.

"We're only trying to make it better," Anderla concluded. "That's the ultimate goal."

ISANTI COUNTY: Sales tax increase considered fairest way to fund new facility

the total amount collected or the maximum years it would be collected.

Bergerson said a local option sales tax is the fairest way to collect the needed funds for the project, especially considering anyone who makes a purchase at a local business is utilizing the county's roads.

"We are a regional hub," Bergerson said. "Our big

box stores attract a lot of area residents. Some of those are not (county) residents, though they still use our county roads to get to those businesses.'

Bergerson said a recent study shows 27% of county sales originate from non-residents. He said only consumable goods that are currently taxable would be subject to the added sales tax. He added that vehicles are not assessed the additional tax.

After a brief discussion, the commissioners ap-

proved by a 4-1 vote the resolution to request Minnesota Legislative authorization to impose a local option sales tax in Isanti County, pending subsequent voter approval. Commissioner Todd Christensen cast the lone nay vote.

"I have to do a little more research for myself on the sales tax," Christensen said.

Director Caroline Moe, the
city was informed it will be
receiving \$87,000 more in tax
collections than what was budgeted for. She said she always
assumes a certain amount of
taxes that will go uncollected,
and this year, that amount
was lower than predicted.

Additionally, the county just gave her an updated, lower tax base than previously calculated. These two adjusted amounts meant Moe was able to present to the council three options for its final levy: keep it at the preliminary levy amount of 5%, decrease the levy to 3.51%, or meet in the middle at a 4.11% levy.

Moe said whichever the council chose, the city's tax rate would go down, meaning a decrease in residents' property taxes, assuming the property's value didn't increase. On the flip side, if the council chose to stay at the preliminary levy amount, the newly discovered extra money could be used to lower the projected 2027 levy, which is currently expected to be in the double-digit percent increase.

No matter which levy amount the council chose, Moe said the increase is primarily due to a sharp increase in staff insurance rates. She said she projected a 10% increase across the board.

"We're very concerned about what's going to happen with health insurance premiums," Moe said. "We have heard they could be heading very out of control this year. We have projected a 10% increase, and we hope that's enough."

Moe again emphasized the inequities in property valuations for commercial properties compared to residential properties. Although a certain big box store is seeing a small increase in its property valuation over last year, it has still seen a 10% decrease in valuation since 2015, equating to a 40% drop in city taxes over that same time.

Meanwhile, a sample residence in Goldenwood has seen a 96% increase in its valuation, leading to a 31% increase in city taxes.

"We are very frustrated with the state of Minnesota's taxing system," Moe said. "We think the taxing system needs some guardrails to make the system fairer between residential and commercial properties. But the state appears to have no interest in attacking this problem."

During the discussion on the three options, Mayor Jim Godfrey and Council member Molly Christian both showed a preference for the 3.51% increase, while the other three were leaning towards the 4.11% increase.

"I just look at the 4.11% as a responsible, middle ground to have the ability to impact next year's levy," Council member Aaron Berg said.

Ultimately, the council approved going with the 4.11% increase by a 3-2 vote, with Godfrey and Christian voting nay.

CANNABIS: Concerns over hazardous waste at proposed store location prompt added condition

"through gritted teeth" staff's recommended approving the North Cleveland Street's application, repeating his prediction such a vote might result in a lawsuit against the city by the other potential store's owner.

"There is still legal risk involved with this decision," Vogel said. "I understand what you (the council) are looking for. So we are prepared to meet that recommendation and give you a recommendation to advance only one dispensary. I do think that comes with a not insignificant legal risk. We may be spending staff time and other resources defending a land-use claim."

Council member Bob Shogren's motion to do just that failed due to a lack of a second.

"I'm a little surprised that motion died on the vine," Vogel said. "I will underscore that, politically distasteful or not, a decision must be made. If there is something other than that motion, something must be done; otherwise, we will be at a much higher level of exposure to litigation."

Council member Aaron Berg raised his concern over the potential of hazardous waste in the ground at the North Cleveland Street site. That location had previously been a recycling center that accepted all forms of scrap metal, including items with gas-powered engines and other chemicals. He asked if the council could add a condition the owner conduct a soil sample study to determine if hazardous waste remains.

Community and Economic Director Marcia Westover indicated that technically, the council was approving an interim use permit application, so it could attach such a condition to its approval. Westover also said the council could set the number of years of the IUP to whatever it wished, with the standard being two years.

Berg then made a motion to approve the North Cleveland Street IUP application for a period of two years, with the condition the owner perform a soil sampling for possible hazardous waste. That motion was seconded by Shogren. During the discussion, Mayor Jim Godfrey

indicated he had reconsidered his previous position and was willing to increase the maximum number to two in the interest of avoiding potential costly litigation.

"Personally, I wish we could say zero," Godfrey said. "I wish the state hadn't crammed this down our throat. But, we have to represent the best interests of the citizens of Cambridge... and to burden them with the expenses of a bunch of legal fees and staff time, we're definitely adding to the burden of what we have budgeted. By the time we get done with the court case, we would probably have a population of 12,500 and have to go to two anyway."

Council member Molly Christian voiced her open disdain for the city being forced to allow any cannabis stores to open. She also indicated she felt a majority of the residents were against it as well.

"I have seen the impact of addiction," Christian said. "Our constituents don't want this. We don't want this. I cannot morally vote for this."

Ultimately, the council approved Berg's motion on a 3-2 vote, with Godfrey and Christian voting nay.

JJ's Bowl allowed to sell alcohol again

A small business victory more than five years in the making: JJ's Bowl and Lounge in North Branch is finally in compliance with local liquor license laws.

City code has been updated, via ordinance, to allow bowling centers to sell liquor without requiring a "fully functional" restaurant on-site.

According to a staff report signed by city administrator Matthew Hill, city code was out of alignment with state statute, which allows bowling centers to sell liquor regardless of the presence of a restaurant.

JJ's lost its restaurant, Karma Grill, in April 2019. By March 2020, the state had not exercised its right to revoke the license, at which point the city granted an official extension for JJ's to find a new restaurant tenant.

By August 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic was in full swing, and restaurants and other social businesses were struggling. The city granted JJ's another extension for 90 days.

Finally, in November 2025, North Branch has agreed to change its code in a way that allows JJ's, or any other bowling center, to sell liquor without a restaurant.

JJ's sells frozen pizza, but still does not have a full kitchen.

The North Branch Golf club was not so lucky. The operator of the city's only golf course currently holds a limited liquor license, but wanted to add strong beer and intoxicating liquor to their offerings.

In this case, Minnesota statute does not show precedent for a golf course or club to serve that type of liquor without a restaurant operating on-site, according to the staff report.

Minnesota DNR EagleCam goes live

The EagleCam shows the nesting behavior of a breeding pair of bald eagles, featuring the same active nest as last season. This season, however, viewers will enjoy an improved view of the nest, as the camera has been repositioned and an antenna has been added to offer a sharper image. Since 2013, the Nongame Wildlife Program has provided the DNR EagleCam as a way for people to easily connect with nature as they witness the fascinating lives of breeding birds.

The EagleCam is going live on GivingTuesday, a global movement to inspire generosity. Donations to the Nongame Wildlife Fund ensure a future for Minnesota's at-risk wildlife and support the maintenance and repairs of the EagleCam. Xcel Energy also generously donates its services to make the EagleCam possible. Gifts to the Nongame Wildlife Fund can be made on Minnesota income tax forms or the DNR website (mndnr.gov/donate).

"The recovery of the bald eagle population is a conservation success story. The DNR's EagleCam celebrates this success and gives us a unique opportunity to witness these once endangered birds as they prepare for and raise new chicks," said Kristin Hall, Nongame Wildlife Program supervisor. "Donations to the Nongame Wildlife Program helped restore the bald eagle population in Minnesota and aided their recovery nationally. That shows what is possible for the hundreds of at-risk wildlife that still need our help."

The previous EagleCam, located at a different site, is also live and continues to display the territory once occupied by the original EagleCam nest, which fell in April 2023. It provides viewers an opportunity to see other wildlife that occasionally visit the site.

Both cameras can be viewed on the DNR website (mndnr.gov/eaglecam) and on the DNR YouTube channel (youtube.com/channel/UCkibG4ONyUmGlnOR3F3qq6Q). Viewers can also find information on bald eagles and learn about the work of the DNR Nongame Wildlife Program.

Viewers tuning into the DNR EagleCam this month will observe an eagle pair courting and upgrading their nest. They bring in new nesting material and



large sticks each year as a bonding activity. The pair typically increases their activity at the nest as winter progresses and will usually have two or three eggs by mid-February, which the adults incubate for about 35 days. Both adults participate in incubating the eggs and caring for the chicks. Once the chicks hatch, the camera will show the intriguing process of bald eagles raising their chicks. The EagleCam pair successfully fledged two eaglets last season. "MNDNR

Rush City woman faces assault charges after incident involving throwing rocks, acid

According to the criminal complaint, Pine County law enforcement responded to the report of Shirley Marge Hockensmith, 45, throwing rocks at a man in Rush City, with the man saying that she threw muriatic acid at him. He said he and Hockensmith got into an argument about a missing cat and cigarettes. The parties accused each other of using illicit substances.

The man told officers that after Hockensmith threw rocks at him, she then tackled him to the ground and wrapped her hands around his neck and choked him, saying she was going to kill him. He said the choking made it more difficult to breathe.

According to the complaint, after the man was able to get Hockensmith off of him, she then picked up a tote bin containing muriatic acid, a corrosive liquid used for cleaning, and dumped it onto the man.

Law enforcement observed dried white spots on the man's face and jacket and multiple objects strewn about the yard. The tote bin had a residual of a liquid that had a faint cleaner smell to it with rubber gloves nearby.

Hockensmith had left the residence, and law enforcement was unable to reach her. Later that day, law enforcement was called to a report that Hockensmith was blocking the man at the residence when he was trying to leave on his motorcycle. According to the report, Hockensmith took his keys and ran behind the house. When a Pine County deputy arrived, he saw the man on his knees while Hockensmith was holding the back of his head and yelling at him. Law enforcement also observed red marks on the man's neck and discolored hair where the dried liquid was that morning.

After being given a miranda warning, Hockensmith's statement to law enforcement was incoherent, but it is believed that she said she was the victim of both incidents after the man got mad she would not give him cigarettes.

The felony assault by strangulation comes with a maximum jail sentence of three years and/or a \$5,000 fine. The terroristic threats felony charge comes with a maximum jail sentence of five years and/or a \$10,000 fine. The domestic assault misdemeanor charge comes with a maximum jail sentence of 90 days and/or a \$1,000 fine.
