
Some of the booths will be offering breakfast early as well.

Opening 1 p.m. April 24 Sunday, the Wee Folks Pet Show puts center focus on children and their family pets for ribbons and carnival wristbands.



Contestants are split into two main groups, Dogs and Other Animals.

Dogs can place in Best Costume, Best Trick, Looks like Owner, Best on Leash along with Largest and Smallest. Other animals can place in Best Costume, Best Trick, Most Unusual in addition to Largest and Smallest.

First place and Best in Show win trophies and wristbands for the carnival. Judges ask that no fish be entered.

Puppy power, RC car races new Midway offers in 2022

Racing cars, flying puppy dogs and cuddly, friendly animals will be on the Wharton County Youth Fair Midway this year.

Fair organizers have signed new acts RORRing Entertainment and The Good Karma K9Z Stunt & Trick Dog Show – for fairgoers enjoyment.

"We actually chose these acts in January 2020," fair administrator Cindy Blaha said. COVID, however, forced directors to cancel the fair that year and put on only an abbreviated event in 2021.

Directors, she said, are hoping the two along with long-time favorite Noah's Way Exotic Petting Zoo will help entertain the younger crowd.

RORRing Entertainment lets children of all ages explore their need for speed safely with RC car racing.

"It's four kids at a time in a competi-

tion, I think it's (going to be popular)," Blaha said.

The Good Karma K9Z Stunt & Trick Dog Show features high-flying pups, leaping over barriers and into the air to catch objects among other activities.

Unlike many petting zoos, Noah's Way isn't just a wandering pack of always hungry goats.

"They bring a good variety," Blaha said. "It's always crowded in there."

The business' hand-raised animals vary each year depending on what's small on the farm. Past visitors have included a camel, pot-bellied pigs, llamas, deer, Wallabies, a bison, antelope and exotic cattle.

There will not be a hypnotist this year. "Over the last couple of years, (the act) just didn't seem to be drawing the crowds," Blaha said.



Top bulls, riders coming to Bull Blowout

The Wharton County Youth Fair will have the best of the best and that's no bull!

Correct that, it's all bull – and their riders – when the PRCA Xtreme Bulls Tour comes to Johnson Arena on April 27-28.

"We will have 35 riders each night," said Carola Foltyn, who, along with her husband Lane Foltyn, has been coordinating the bull riding event for many years.

The cowboys will be competing for \$26,000 in prizes, which includes \$12,000 in added money from the Wharton County Youth Fair.

"The top eight win money," Foltyn said.

The Bull Blowout is a PRCA (Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association) event, so it draws some of the top bull riders on the circuit, according to Foltyn.

"We'll have riders from the U.S., Canada, and I think Australia," she said.

Money won on the PRCA Xtreme Bulls Tour counts toward the PRCA World Standings for bull riding, which determine the qualifiers for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas, but it does not count toward the PRCA's all-around standings.

In addition to top riders, Foltyn said the event will feature some of the best bulls from top stock contractors in the country.

Another favorite of fans of the sport are the bullfighters, often called clowns because of the makeup and outrageous outfits they wear. Among the bullfighters coming this year is Bryce Redo, who was most recently seen locally at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Along with Redo will be barrel man/funnyman Robbie Hodges.

Each evening the bull riding will take an intermission for some mutton busting. The event features local youngsters who ride sheep.

On a more solemn note, there will be an empty saddle ceremony at the event on Thursday, April 28.


"This is to pay respect to the fair directors who have died in the past few years," Foltyn said.








New carnival brings classics, thrillers to fair

The Wharton County Youth Fair will offer new carnival rides at the Crescent fairgrounds next week.

Moore's Greater Shows replaces the Mighty Thomas Carnival on the northside of the Midway. "We felt like we weren't getting rides that attracted the older kids," fair administrator Cindy Blaha said. "We're hoping they will be a good fit."

Moore's has been in business 75 years and will bring a mix of classics,





thrillers and kiddie rides.

The exact offerings had not been released as of press time, but Blaha said to expect always-popular attractions like the century wheel and Starship as well as new adventures like the Top Gun for those brave of heart and strong of stomach.

"I'm not really sure how to describe it. It rocks," Blaha said.

Another ride directors hope teens will enjoy is the El Loco. "Four sections go up in the air and it's twisty-turny," Blaha said.

Pre-sale carnival bands are available for \$30 per section (roughly a five hour time period) presale or \$35 at the gate.

The carnival will be open Wednesday and Thursday for one section each day 5 to 10 p.m.

Friday will have two sections as rides get going early for Students Day. There will be two sections of ride times on Saturday as well.

Assorted businesses throughout the county are offering the pre-sale bands.



adults entered the category this year.


This year is the inaugural year for the Country Store at the fair. Depending on the number of articles submitted, participants will have items entered in the show available for sale in the store.

The creative crafters will receive some of the funds

obtained through the store sales, but a percentage will go to the WCYF.

For example, the store will work this way: Senior Division participants must produce 60 articles, of which 30 must be brought to the fair, 15 of those can be exhibited in the store. Junior, intermediate and high divisions have to enter 50

The open youth category invites participants who are not part of the FFA or 4H organizations.


This is Gary's first year as chairperson of the committee but she has the backing of past executives and members who she says all work as a team.





events are full, and the fun is about to begin for those who enjoy watching intense pint-sized competition.

Pig chase

The pig chase has four age categories – 6-7-year-olds, 8-9-year-olds, 10-11-year olds, and 12-13-year-olds. All participants receive a free T-shirt and each winner will be awarded an armband for the carnival. The participants try to catch a pig, and when they catch one they must take it to a judge and stay with the judge until the prizes are awarded.

Goat loading

The goat loading features teams of three youngsters between the ages of 5 to 16, but the combined ages cannot add up to more than 35 years. Each team pushes a wheelbarrow to a goat that is staked. a wagon. They load the pig and holder into the wagon and then push and pull it to the finish line. Prizes are awarded to the first and second place teams overall.


Chicken chase

"This is a fun way for families to come out and enjoy the fair," Schubach said.




