## Baltimore Promoter Sets Bait Invites Floyd To Facilities

Baltimore (AP)—Boxing promoter Al Flora has wired an invitation to Floyd Patterson to come to Baltimore and inspect the city's facilities for a heavyweight title match between Patterson and champion Sonny Liston.

Patterson said earlier this week he would not give in to the desire of Jack Liston, Liston's adviser, to move the scheduled fight from Miami Beach to Baltimore.

"The one place the fight definitely will not be held is Baltimore," Patterson said Sunday.

"It's not a fight town and never was. Liston might sell some peanuts there, but he would never sell the fight," Patterson, whose preference remains Miami Beach, was referring to Liston's ownership of concession rights at Baltimore's Civic Arena.

## Touted JC Quintets Advance

Hutchinson, Kan. (AP)—Three highly-rated teams—Phoenix, Ariz., Moberly, Mo., and Independence, Kan.—have advanced into the quarter-finals of the National Junior College Basketball Tournament.

With Dick Ervin scoring 25 points, Phoenix easily defeated the tournament's Cinderella team, Southern Union College of Waller, Ala., 83-70.

Phoenix will meet Wilmington, N.C., in the quarter-final game.

Two more quarter-final games will be played Thursday night, the semifinals Friday night.

Independence overcame a 4-point halftime deficit and defeated Murray State of Tishomingo, Ala., 56-32 with Rick Park scoring 34.

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## Cipriano on Recruiting Trail Idaho St. Cage Boss Resigns

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Pocatello, Idaho (AP)—John Evans, basketball coach at Idaho State College since 1959, announced his resignation Tuesday for what he said were "personal reasons."

Evans' resignation came only hours after the announcement that Joe Cipriano would quit as University of Idaho basketball coach to go to the University of Nebraska as head coach.

The 33-year-old Evans declined comment on his plans. The resignation becomes effective at the end of the current school year.

"I have enjoyed the finest cooperation from the administration and my fellow coaches," he said, "and it is for purely personal reasons that I am submitting my resignation at this time."

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## Cipriano on Recruiting Trail

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Joe Cipriano's fast break as Nebraska basketball coach was slowed down Wednesday.

Fog was the principal deflator in Cipriano's delayed airplane flight from Moscow, Idaho to Hutchinson, Kan., where he'll concentrate on his first recruiting duties as NU basketball coach.

Husker athletic director Tippy Dye named Cipriano as Nebraska's head basketball coach late Tuesday afternoon. NU's Board of Regents promptly approved the selection.

It's a real bustle. Nebraska Chancellor Clifford M. Hardin, told the Regents. "He has all the qualities you look for in a basketball coach."

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## Nelson Is Pan Am Candidate

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Dick Nelson, long shot artist for the Nebraska Wesleyan University Pan American basketball team, is under consideration by the NCAA for a Pan American Games berth.

Nelson is being considered as a member of one of two NCAA teams to participate in the Pan American Games to be held in Kansas City, Aug. 12.

The Geneva junior was second in scoring for the Plainsmen during the 1962-63 basketball season with 463 points and a 17.2 average per game.

He also was selected for two tournament teams—the Midwest Holiday basketball tournament in Lincoln and the NCAA Midwest Regional Tournament at Brookings, S.D., during the past season.

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## Phone Co. to Check Cails

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Post Says 'Rigging' Conversation Overheard by Atlanta Salesman

Atlanta (AP)—Telephone company officials are hunting for records of a long-distance telephone call reportedly made by a salesman.

The Saturday Evening Post says Butts, former athletic director at the University of Georgia, telephoned Bryant at the University of Washington.

Previously, Evans had coached high school teams in Idaho. Grayson formerly coached at Nebraska Wesleyan.

In 4 years at Idaho State College, Evans' teams had an overall record of 60 wins and 41 losses. However, the team's record was 9-16 during the 1962-63 season, the poorest since 1950.

Both Butts and Bryant denied they rigged the game, which Alabama won 35-6. The magazine says an Atlanta insurance salesman, George Burnett, overheard the telephone conversation.

John J. Ryan, Georgia director of Southern Bell Telephone Co., said it is possible for a call to be cut into a long-distance call as Burnett claims happened to him.

But even if records of the telephone call are found, Ryan said, the company could release them only under a subpoena.

The Post article says a telephone company official, not identified, confirmed that the call was made.

Ryan said Tuesday:

"More than 4,000 student cheerleaders at a pep rally, reportedly confirmed the call."

Bryant told about 4,000 students at a meeting called by the University of Alabama Student Government Association Tuesday night that the game was rigged.

"I'm an old man, but I've got lots of fight left and I'm tough. If the Good Lord's willing, we'll keep on winning."

He also told the students: "You can bet your life that I never have or never will use the team to win a bet at 10 million to one odds for 10 million dollars."

The student government group passed a resolution backing Bryant.

The crowd waved posters: "We Back Bryant" and "Beat Bryant Square."

Prior to Bryant's talk, Ed. Littleman of Birmingham, president of the Student Legislature, read the group's resolution supporting the coach.

"I said in part:

"... The Student Legislature of the University of Alabama does hereby express its confidence in and support of Coach W. B. Bryant."

It is the opinion of the legislature that investigation will completely uphold his personal integrity and his loyalty to the university."

This legislature does not intend to take any action against Bryant, the University of Alabama and its students and administration, the state of Alabama and her residents by this publication . . .

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## People Backing Bryant Students, Solons Behind Bear

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Tusculum, Ala. (AP)—A University of Alabama student leader says coach Paul Bryant's integrity is reflected in the men who play football for him.

Two resolutions by important groups are passed in support of Bryant.

The Alabama legislature considers several resolutions, one of which is to back the Crimson Tide mentor.

Boyd, 31, whose teams have a 49-18 record in 6 years of Alabama AC play, will take over from Clair Markey, freshman coach who left the varsity team after Cazzetta's release last month.

Cazzetta had a 14-4 record this year at Seattle when he announced he was resigning effective at the end of the season.

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
