Badger Fans Silent in Defeat

Leave Bowl Quiet But Loyal Crowd

PASADENA, Calif. — A mighty quiet group of Wisconsin fans left the Rose Bowl Thursday after the Badgers' 7-0 loss to Southern California.

It was a tough one to lose because it was close enough to have gone either way, and Badger fans could not quite believe it was over.

Badger rooters have long been used to cheering the bad news at the stadium as they "varsity" at the end of the game, the thousands of Wisconsin rooters all joined in, disappointed only with the score and not with their team.

Wisconsin players and coaches returned to their hotel here shortly after the game, and there was a large number of friends and fans waiting to meet them.

Wisconsin's head coach on a true championship performance in the Tournament of Roses, a performance in true Badger tradition that this Rose Bowl crowd will not soon forget.

The Wisconsin band opened the halftime ceremony with the playing of the Wisconsin state song, "On Wisconsin," and the traditional singing of "Varsity."

Salutes to the two teams which the time was dedicated to a secret of the following, as Badger bandmen played the Southern California fight song, then formed their familiar "W" and led a spirited "On Wisconsin" and the traditional singing of "Varsity."

Then the band gave its left-handed salute to every California with two selections—"Waltz 'Til the Sun Shines, Nellie" and "Obey the Weather."

Traffic Fatalities Reach 106 in First Hours of Holiday

CHICAGO (AP) — Holiday traffic fatalities peaked Thursday as the nation observed a comparatively quiet New Year's day.

The United Press tabulation Thursday night showed 106 traffic fatalities across the country. There were seven deaths in fires, four in plane crashes and 14 in miscellaneous mishaps for an overall toll of 131.

A highway fatalities mounted slowly but steadily, safety officials said they hoped the nation had learned a lesson from the Christmas holiday last week, when an all-time record high of 388 deaths were reported.

The National Safety Council had predicted that 419 would die in traffic over the four-day New Year's holiday.

But many sections of the nation reported that drivers, apparently more cautious during the festive hours of New Year's Eve,

Madison Girl, Ex-City Man Killed in Accidents

A Madison girl, a former Madison man, and two other persons were fatally injured in traffic accidents during Wisconsin's New Year's holiday.

The Madison girl, Alice M. Anderson, 18, of 4307 Maher ave., was killed in an accident early Thursday near Fond du Lac. Three Madison men and another Madison girl were injured in the accident.

The other traffic fatalities were: Claude William Ellis Jr., 20, West Allis, formerly of Madison; Larry Barker, West Allis; and Rudolph Deibler, St. Dubois, Ill.

Miss Anderson was killed when the car she was driving left Highway 131 on a curve a mile southeast of Lanesville in Fond du Lac County and overturned.

Passengers in the car who were injured were Shirley Ann Pfeil, 20, of 208 W. Deen ave., injured right leg; Naval Almena Diehl Frantz, 14, Madison; Mr. Marvin Hank, 24, Boone; and Frank Williamson, 35, of 228 S. Fair Oaks ave., who suffered minor bruises.

House Committee Calls for End to Wage, Price Curbs

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Small Business Committee called Thursday for abandonment of price, wage, and material controls to provide "a smooth transition back to free competition."

The committee of six Democrats and five Republicans, including Chairman Republican Floor Leader Charles McNichols of Indiana, agreed unanimously that price "ceiling" laws "are in the shoddy shoddy category."

And it stopped at what it called "the determination in the calendar of persons" in the government's present emergency control agencies.

The committee, headed by Rep. W. Paul Douglas, D-Ill., said that the most far-reaching agreement favoring control can be found by comparing the benefits to be derived from the present stabilization program with the disadvantages and hardships which accompany regulations.

From 4 p. m. until almost 7 p. m. Thursday the streets around Capitol Square were almost deserted. Few persons were seen on the sidewalks, and cars moved only slowly.

Some viewers wondered whether the Badger float had been "sighted" in the parade area. Others asked if the band was supposed to march.

All reported "sightings" of the parade were "chance" sightings of a chance to see the Badger entries in the fabulous Parade of Roses.

Reception Gives TV Viewers Here a Break as Thousands 'Attend' Game

Thousands of Madison residents who crowded around television sets here Thursday were pleased with the Madison reception as well as the game.

A large number of Madison residents had traveled to Milwaukee to attend the game. A large number of television reception apparatuses were set up in the city.

About 150 persons watched the game on television at the Elks Park hotel which was filled with viewers. The West Side Business Men's Association Clubroom, 801 Adams, was jammed with an estimated 125 members and guests who came to watch the game.

Blast During Warehouse Fire Kills 40, Injures 360 in Chile

VALPARAISO, Chile (AP)—Tons of dynamite stored in a Chile waterfront warehouse exploded early Thursday, killing more than 40 persons and injuring 360 others, some of them New Year's revelers who had gathered to watch the fire.

Authorities said the death toll probably would exceed 60, with 21 bodies identified so far. Scores of persons were reported injured after the blast. Flaming debris over a wide area fell on a street below. It had been struck by a giant aerial bomb.

Reliable sources said 10 to 14 tons of dynamite were stored in the waterfront warehouse. The blast sent bodies flying through the air and turned what had been a New Year's "added attraction" into the worst disaster.

Youth Held for 'Chuting' Over Rose Bowl Crowd

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—A 20-year-old Alaskan parachuted over the Rose Bowl Thursday during the halftime intermission in what he said was an attempt to "get a good picture" of the stadium, crowded with 112,000 fans for the December California-Wisconsin football game.

Taken into custody immediately by Pasadena police, the youth gave his name as Bob Simlar. He said his home is in Fairbanks, Alaska.

Simlar said he cut his hand slightly as he hit the Elks Park hotel at 2,700 feet altitude.

Coast Ends Big 10 Reign in Seventh Try; Southern Cal Triumphs in 11th Showing

PASADENA, Calif.—Wisconsin's football team became the first Western Conference representative to lose in the Rose Bowl since the modern pact was signed when the Badgers dropped a torrid battle to Southern California, 7-0, here New Year's Day afternoon before a crowd of 101,500.

This was the seventh game of the Big 10-Pacific Coast Rose Bowl pact, and it was the 11th appearance of Southern California in the Rose Bowl.

The "double natural" figures of seven and eleven paid off with a victory for Coach Jesse Hill's Trojans.

The game was played on a beautiful, sunny afternoon and on a good field. Conditions were right for a fair test, and Southern California proved to be the better team.

At least the Trojans made better use of their opportunities than did Wisconsin.

Southern California penetrated inside Wisconsin's 25-yard line three times and scored one touchdown. The Badgers were inside Southern California's 20-yard line five times and failed to score.

The winning play was a forward pass from Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael that was good for 22 yards and a touchdown. Sam Tangelakis then came in and booted the extra point.

It was expected that this would be a rough, rugged game. It got so rough in the later stages that the officials stopped Southern California's Elmer Willstone out of the contest for flagrant roughness.

Willstone is the boy who intends to try a professional boxing career, and he probably was getting in some advance practice in the Rose Bowl.

Both Loss Key Men

It's true that Wisconsin lost Don Voss, William DeFornell, and late in the second quarter with an injury, and that half-back Bill Hutcheson and tackle Dave Suminski missed some action for the same reason.

But Southern California lost Jimmy Sears in the same manner during the first half, and Sears was a vital part of the Trojan offense and defense. He suffered a broken leg in the first quarter.

That part of the crowd here which was cheering for the Trojans went wild at the finish, and the goal posts in the Rose Bowl lasted about as long as a snowball in you-know-where.
