I. INTRODUCTION

Ongoing threats of bioterrorism events, Communicable Disease outbreaks, and pandemics require public health isolation and quarantine measures to prevent community transmission of infectious agents.

- **Isolation:** Isolation separates a sick person with a Contagious Disease from people who are not sick.
 - Isolation lasts for the period of communicability of the disease, which varies by disease and the availability of treatments.
 - In most cases, Isolation is voluntary; however, federal, state, and local governments have the authority to require Isolation of a sick person to protect the health and safety of the public.
- **Quarantine:** Quarantine separates and restricts the movement of people who were exposed to a Contagious Disease to determine whether they become ill with the disease. For example, a person may be asked to remain at home to prevent further potential spread of the disease.
 - Quarantine lasts only as long as necessary to protect the public by: (1) providing public health care (such as immunization or drug treatment, as required); and (2) ensuring that Quarantined persons do not infect others if they have been exposed to a Contagious Disease.
 - Quarantine is usually voluntary; however, federal, state, and local governments have the authority to require Quarantine of an exposed person.

II. DEFINITIONS

- **Case:** Individual who has been diagnosed with a communicable disease or who has symptoms that meet the case definition of a Communicable Disease.
- **Contact:** Individual who has been in contact with a Case or otherwise has come in contact with a Communicable Disease in such a way that the individual may be incubating the Communicable Disease.
- **Infectious Disease:** A disease caused by a microorganism which has the potential to infect new individuals. An Infectious Disease may or may not be a Communicable Disease. An example of an Infectious Disease which is not a Communicable Disease is a disease caused by toxins from food poisoning or infection caused by toxins in the environment, which as tetanus.
- **Communicable Disease:** An Infectious Disease that is contagious and can be transmitted from one source to another by infectious bacteria or viral organisms.
- **Contagious Disease:** A very communicable Disease capable of spreading rapidly from one person to another by contact or close proximity.

- **Community Controls:** Actions limiting public movement as necessary to enact Isolation or Quarantine, such as, but not limited to, cancellation of public gatherings or screening individuals for symptoms.
- **Institutional Controls:** A legal or regulatory mechanism designed to protect public health and safety or the environment as defined by law.
- **Sanitary Perimeter:** A boundary established by the Park City-County Health Officer to prohibit or restrict movement of people, animals, vehicles, or materials that may spread a communicable disease.

III. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Plan is to provide guidance and structure to Park County regarding initiation, continuance, and release of persons under Isolation or Quarantine. The Plan describes the circumstances, authority, and events that may necessitate specific leadership decisions, response action, and communication mechanisms. Specifically, the purpose of the Plan is to:

- 1) Establish the decision-making criteria used by the Park City-County Health Officer (PCCHO) to determine when Isolation and/or Quarantine beyond the capacities of day-to-day communicable disease practices are necessary to minimize health impacts of a disease outbreak;
- 2) Describe procedures and decision criteria for accomplishing Isolation and Quarantine, both voluntary and involuntary, for a single infectious case up to a large outbreak situation;
- 3) Describe specific procedures for supporting home-based Isolation and Quarantine of small and large numbers of people;
- 4) Define roles and responsibilities for Park City-County Health Department (PCCHD), local health care partners, and local response agencies;
- 5) Describe how communications and coordination will occur between PCCHD, local and state entities;
- 6) Assist PCCHO and response partners, with limiting the spread of Infectious Diseases, illnesses, and death; and
- 7) Provide, direction for communication with the Isolated and Quarantined individuals, the public, and the media.

This Plan is a dynamic document that will be periodically updated to reflect new developments in the understanding of Isolation and Quarantine. The Plan will also incorporate changes, as necessary, in response roles and improvements in response capability development through ongoing planning efforts.

IV. SCOPE

This Plan is an annex to the Park City-County Health Department's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). The Plan primarily focuses on the roles, responsibilities, and activities of the PCCHD as well as partners providing non-health services in support of Isolation and Quarantine. Additionally, specific responsibilities for key response partners are included to

highlight points of coordination between agencies during situations involving Isolation and Quarantine.

This Plan applies to:

- All disease outbreak emergencies requiring Isolation and/or Quarantine implementation, coordination, and/or management beyond the capacities of routine PCCHD operations;
- PCCHD and partner agencies with whom there are established contracts, memorandum of understandings/agreements, or procedures for disease outbreak events; and
- Persons in Park County either infected with or exposed or potentially exposed to the infectious agent in question.

Continuum of Isolation and Quarantine:

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has developed updated (March 2024) general guidelines for preventing the spread of respiratory viruses such as COVID-10, RSV, and Influenza which can be found at [CDC.gov](https://www.cdc.gov).

These general guidelines are:

- Stay Up to Date with Immunizations;
- Practice Good Hygiene;
- Take Steps for Cleaner Air; and
- Distance, Mask, and Test.

Isolation and Quarantine are two of a number of measures used to stop or slow the spread of Communicable Diseases. Isolation and Quarantine may be applied to individuals and to groups, on a voluntary or involuntary basis.

When Isolation and/or Quarantine is applied the following terms may be used to deal handle the situation:

- **Passive Monitoring:** The subject of the Isolation or Quarantine performs self-assessment.
- **Active Monitoring without Explicit Activity Restrictions:** A person evaluates the subject of the Isolation or Quarantine on a daily basis (or more often if needed) by phone or in person for signs and symptoms.
- **Active Monitoring with Activity Restrictions:** A person is separated from others for a certain period of time depending on the suspected illness and is evaluated in-person, by phone, texting, Facetime, or other techniques.
- **Working Quarantine:** People are allowed to work, but are on activity restrictions when not on duty. They are monitored for symptoms before reporting for work, and must use appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE) while working:
 - **Essential Workers** – could include, but not limited to, law enforcement, healthcare workers, long-term care, emergency medical services, others as determined by federal, state, or local authorities.

- **Focused Measures to Increase Social Distance:** Interventions targeted at specific groups who may have been exposed (for example, workers in a building) meant to decrease interactions and transmissions.
- **Community-Wide Measures to Increase Social Distance:** This is applied to a whole area, region, community, etc.
- **Widespread Community Quarantine:** This is a legally enforceable quarantine of a large area.

V. SITUATION AND ASSUMPTIONS FOR ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE

This Plan applies to Communicable Diseases events requiring Isolation and Quarantine. While Isolation (and to a lesser extent, Quarantine), are techniques used in the everyday management of certain routinely occurring Infectious Disease, this Plan does not apply to routine Tuberculosis program controls.

1. PCCDH may utilize Isolation and Quarantine as one of several tools to reduce the spread of Communicable Disease.
2. Isolation and Quarantine planning efforts should address the unique needs and circumstances of vulnerable populations that are economically disadvantaged, homeless, have limited language proficiency, have disabilities (physical, mental, sensory, or cognitive limitations), have special medical needs, experience cultural or geographical isolation or are vulnerable due to age, as well as those of incarcerated persons.
3. The ability to implement this Plan is based not only on the number of people and type of disease suspected, but on the distribution of individuals throughout Park County. There is a difference in supporting a small number of households and a large number of households, even if the total number of people affected may be the same.
4. All policies and procedures to assure the care of protected health information (PHI) apply. Policies and procedures recognize that PCCDH may make necessary disclosures to protect public health.
5. Large scale Isolation and Quarantine events will require the participation of many public health resources such as the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services (DPHHS), as well as coordination with multiple communities and agencies.
6. PCCDH will prioritize gaining voluntary compliance from ill or exposed persons and implementing the least restrictive means possible to reduce the spread of infection.
7. PCCDH will coordinate closely with health care partners and facilities to assist with achieving voluntary compliance of ill or exposed persons.
8. Isolation and Quarantine may require the involuntary detention of individuals who may pose a threat to the public's health and do not cooperate with orders from the PCCDH.
9. An individual's cooperation with voluntary Isolation and Quarantine will be assumed in good faith unless there is evidence to the contrary.
10. Persons in Park County who are Isolated or placed under Quarantine will be supported by partners to the extent possible.

11. Activation of the Plan will likely involve mobilization of other public health emergency response capabilities. Consequently, access to resources (including workforce resources) may be limited.

VI. OPERATIONS

1. Activating the Plan

- a. This Plan will be activated when the day-to-day resource and plans are insufficient to address the Isolation and Quarantine needs of the community.
- b. The PCCHO, in consultation with the PCCHD Director and the Park City-County Board of Health will determine which components of the Plan must be activated. This group will be referred to as the Public Health Emergency Advisory Group (Advisory Group)
- c. The PCCHO will authorize the use of Isolation and/or Quarantine as strategies to control a Communicable Disease outbreak based on the advice of the Advisory Group or as authorized or mandated by federal, state, or other local authorities.
- d. PCCHD will seek voluntary compliance with requests for Isolation or Quarantine, unless the PCCHD advises the PCCHO that the following conditions are present, making it necessary to immediately initiate involuntary detention for the purposes of Isolation or Quarantine:
 - i. There is reason to believe that the individual or group is, or is suspected to be, infected with, exposed to, or contaminated with a Communicable Disease or chemical, biological, or radiological agent that could spread to or contaminate others if remedial action is not taken; and
 - ii. There is reason to believe that the individual or group would pose a serious and imminent risk to the health and safety of others if not Isolated or Quarantined.

2. Command and Control

- a. PCCHD will be the lead agency in coordinating the local health and medical response to an outbreak situation requiring Isolation or Quarantine of individuals or groups.
- b. The Incident Command System (ICS) may be used to manage the event. In a long-term event (i.e. COVID-19 pandemic), the ICS may not be useful and other forms of management may be established.
- c. PCCHD may activate the Advisory Group to coordinate the County-wide public health and medical response during an outbreak.
- d. This Plan is an annex of the PCCHD EOP which is a Chapter of the Park County EOP and will respond under the auspices of the County-wide plan.

3. Health Worker Protection

PCCHD staff tasked with implementing this Plan through direct interaction with individuals or groups who are suspected of being infected or exposed face potential exposure to the disease themselves. In order to protect these workers, PCCHD will provide them with PPE, which may include eye, face, head and hand protection, depending on the response. Staff members who may need to use PPE will be trained in advance of the implementation of this Plan.

4. Compliance

It is assumed that most of those who are requested to remain Isolated or in Quarantine will be compliant and follow the instructions of the PCCHD. However, it is understood that there will be instances when people choose not to comply with PCCHD directives.

If the capacity of the PCCHD during a local event is or is expected to be exceeded, assistance will be requested from the Multi-County Public Health Emergency Preparedness Group (MCPHEP) and DPHHS.

a. Determination of need for Isolation or Quarantine.

- i. The PCCHO or designee shall, upon receipt of a report of a Communicable Disease, confirm the diagnosis with laboratory or health care provider. A confirmed case follows CDC's case definition.
- ii. If the case is not confirmed, but is suspect, or probable, the PCCHO may handle the case as Communicable until medical or laboratory information rules out the or presence of a Communicable Disease.
- iii. Upon confirmation of the diagnosis or determination that the disease meets a case definition of a Communicable Disease, the PCCHO shall consult the most recent "Control of Communicable Disease Manual" (CCDM) for specific guidance.
- iv. If the disease is not specifically listed in the CCDM (i.e. novel virus), the PCCHO and or PCCHD shall consult guidance with DPHHS and the CDC to determine the least restrictive yet effective control measures available, including Isolation or Quarantine.
- v. Contacts to cases will be identified according to the CCDM, DPHHS, and/or CDC.
- vi. In the case of a large-area event or a pandemic, the State of Montana through the Governor's Office may issues Executive Orders during a "State of Emergency" (Section 10-3-104(2)(a), MCA) outlining specific actions.

b. Requesting Isolation or Quarantine.

- i. Initiate contact with individual or group suspected of being infected or exposed.
- ii. Determine whether interpretation services are needed to facilitate communications; if so, coordinate with interpreter services.

- iii. Enter cases and contacts(s) in a database and document information related to cases including dates and times of all verbal and written communication.
- iv. Verbally communicate the following information to the infected or exposed individual or group;
 - o Explain the circumstances regarding the infection or exposure, the nature and characteristics of the illness, and the potential for and means of spread of infection to others. (Provide written material when available).
 - o Request that the individual or group Isolate or Quarantine themselves.
 - o If necessary, explain that the PCCHO has the authority to issue an emergency detention order or petition the court *ex parte* for an order authorizing involuntary detention if the individual or group does not comply with the request for Isolation or Quarantine.
- v. If an individual is a patient at Livingston HealthCare, coordinate with the Infection Control Director as well as the patient to ensure hospital-based Isolation and appropriate infection control measures are practiced.
- vi. Complete a written request for voluntary compliance with Isolation or Quarantine instructions, including the location and dates of Isolation or Quarantine, suspected disease, medical basis for Isolation or Quarantine, and relevant patient information.
- vii. Make reasonable efforts to obtain cooperation and compliance with the request for Isolation or Quarantine from person(s) so requested and document efforts.
- viii. Alert PCCHO, law enforcement, and County Attorney's Office about situations where a person or group indicates unwillingness to comply.
- ix. Recommend the PCCHO whether involuntary detention should be initiated.

c. Involuntary Detention for Purposes of Isolation or Quarantine.

- i. The PCCHO may authorize initiation of involuntary detention for purposes of Isolation or Quarantine under the following conditions:
 - o There is reason to believe that the individual or group is, or is suspected to be, infected with, exposed to, or contaminated with a Communicable Disease or chemical, biological, or radiological agent that could spread to or contaminate others if remedial action is not taken; **AND**
 - o There is reason to believe that the individual or group would pose a serious and imminent risk to the health and safety of others if not detained for purposes of Isolation or Quarantine; **AND**

- PCCDH has made reasonable efforts, which have been documented, to obtain cooperation and compliance from the individual or group with requests for medical examination, testing, treatment, counseling, vaccination, decontamination of persons or animals, Isolation, Quarantine, or inspection and closure of facilities, or the PCCHO has determined that seeking voluntary compliance would create a risk of serious harm.
- ii. If the above conditions are met, the PCCHO may initiate involuntary detention or restrictions of movement through the following orders:
 - Notification of Active Monitoring;
 - Notification of Direct Active Monitoring and Restrictions on Movement;
 - Order to Seek Appropriate and Necessary Evaluation and Treatment;
 - Order for Isolation; or
 - Order for Quarantine.
- iii. PCCHD will coordinate with and brief law enforcement officials what orders have been issued and type of enforcement needed.
 - PCCHD will provide technical information to law enforcement regarding nature of the illness and appropriate protective actions and equipment to be used during enforcement of orders.

5. Monitoring

PCCHD will coordinate the management of the monitoring of individuals or groups. Depending on the disease, size of event, and available resources, the following may be initiated.

- Contacting the individual(s) requiring Isolation or Quarantine to evaluate the suitability or their residence for Isolation or Quarantine; determine whether evaluation can be implemented using a telephone questionnaire or an in-person review is necessary.
- Develop a schedule of check-in-calls for each individual or group under Isolation or Quarantine.
- Verify that the individual(s) are at a specified location and monitor their health status.
- Continue conduction regular check-in calls with each individual until they are released from Isolation or Quarantine.
- Record information gathered during check-in calls.
- Respond to irregularities such as change in health status and failure to respond to call(s).
 - If repeated attempts to locate individuals subject to Isolation or Quarantine, including telephone calls and site visits, are unsuccessful, PCCHD will notify the PCCHO and the County Attorney's Office regarding the need to pursue involuntary detention.
- Keep the PCCHO regular situation updates regarding each individual's status.

6. Access to Housing

It is assumed that in most instances those who need to be Isolated or Quarantined will be accommodated within their own homes. However, PCCHD recognizes that some instances of disease outbreak or suspected infection will affect individuals or groups who do not have access to housing. This may include members of the homeless community as well as visitors to the area who are no longer able to stay in their hotels or with the friends and family who were accommodating their visit. PCCHD will coordinate with community partners to determine the best option to Isolate or Quarantine those individuals.

7. Access to Services

The Plan works under the main assumption that, as stated above, most people who need to be Isolated or Quarantined will be able to stay in their own homes. However, even in those instances there may be situations where those people will still need additional wraparound support services, such as food, water, clothing, shelter, means of communication, services related to cultural and religious beliefs, services related to medical needs, and, if involuntary detention is initiated, legal representation. The direct provision of such services is outside the mission of the PCCHD, necessitating coordination with human services agencies and community-based organizations to provide these services, which may include meal or grocery delivery, provision of medications, housing and utility assistance, assistance with childcare, and accommodations related to cultural and religious customs. If involuntary detention is initiated, a person or group of persons has a right to be represented by legal counsel.

8. Release from isolation or Quarantine

The PCCHO, in consultation with DPHHS, will determine whether to release an individual or group from Isolation or Quarantine when Isolation or Quarantine is no longer necessary by apply the following criteria:

- a. The individual is no longer suspected to be infected with, exposed to, or contaminated with a Communicable Disease or chemical, biological, or radiological agent; OR
- b. The individual is no longer deemed to pose a serious and imminent risk to the health and safety of others if released from Isolation or Quarantine.

If the release of a detained person is authorized before the expiration of a detention order, the PCCHO will coordinate with the County Attorney's Office to accomplish the release.

9. Communications

The PCCHD will serve as the lead agency in Park County for risk communications messaging and public education. PCCHD will do the following:

- a. Asses and respond to the information needs of health care providers and other partners;
- b. Assess and respond to the information needs of the general public;
- c. Identify any logistical constraints to effective communication;

- d. Intensify public education efforts about the hazard and steps that can be taken to reduce exposure to infection. Information may be disseminated via web site posting, newspaper editorials, flyers, and billboards, radio broadcast, and social media. Depending on the nature of the outbreak the Health Department Emergency Communications Plan may be implemented;
- e. Coordinate with other county health departments to develop common health messages and education material through the MCPHEP; and
- f. Protect the identity of the individuals to the extent possible and is required by law.

VII. RESPONSIBILITIES

1. Lead: Park City-County Health Department

- Lead agency in the management of a Communicable Disease outbreak.
- The PCCHO will assess the public health threat, evaluate potential consequences based on established criteria, and determine whether Isolation and/or Quarantine are necessary in any given outbreak situation.
- The PCCHO may initiate the Isolation or Quarantine of individuals as a protective action to limit the spread of infectious agents or contaminants to others.
- Under specific circumstances, PCCHO may immediately order or seek a court order to detain infected or exposed individuals and place them in Isolation or Quarantine.
- In all cases where Isolation and Quarantine is considered, PCCDH will address the basic needs of individuals placed in Isolation and Quarantine include, but not limited to, food, clothing, shelter, medical care, communication with family members, legal counsel (if involuntary detention is initiated), and others, if needed.
- Coordinate with community agencies regarding an appropriate placement for individuals who are Isolated or Quarantined, if they cannot stay at their homes or do not have suitable home environments.
- Establish an Advisory Group to coordinate response.
- Address public concern via this Plan or Emergency Communication Plan.
- Coordinate with DPHHS, CDC, and health departments in adjacent jurisdictions to develop common messaging and education materials.

2. Primary Agencies

- a. Park County Attorney's Office
 - i. Petition the court ex parte to authorize involuntary detention, once need is determined by PCCHO and Advisory Group.
 - ii. Represent PCCHD and PCCHO in any petition or appeal hearings required to carry out involuntary Isolation and Quarantine.
 - iii. Coordinate with PCCHD and PCCHO and law enforcement to serve notice related to involuntary Isolation and Quarantine.
- b. Park County Sheriff's Office
 - i. Assist with service of notice related to involuntary Isolation and Quarantine, if needed.

- ii. Execute arrest warrants related to Isolation and Quarantine cases, if needed.
 - c. Emergency Medical Services
 - i. Provide transportation of infectious individuals through coordination with PCCHD.
 - d. Human Service Providers
 - i. Provide access to mental health and other psychological and spiritual support. Coordinate with local specialty providers including faith-based organizations, if needed.
 - ii. Arrange transportation, if needed, to provide Isolated or Quarantined individuals with access to medical treatment or other critical services.
 - iii. Coordinate with other local community-based organizations or public utilities to ensure the ongoing provision of basic utilities to residences of persons Isolated or Quarantined.
 - iv. Coordinate with other local community-based organizations, other human service providers, and local businesses to provide basic support supplies (clothing, food, and laundry services) to individuals who are Isolated or Quarantined.
 - v. Coordinate with education providers for continued education of children who are Isolated or Quarantined.
- 3. Support Agencies
 - a. State Government
 - i. Coordinate with DPHHS and local sources to provide temporary financial assistance for persons Isolated or Quarantined, if needed.
 - ii. Coordinate with the State to provide surge support for events that exceed local capacity or when events affect multiple jurisdictions.
 - b. Health and Medical
 - i. Livingston Healthcare
 - ii. Community Health Partners/One Health
 - iii. Bozeman Deaconess
 - iv. Behavioral Health Providers

VIII. AUTHORITIES

Under Montana State laws and rules, the local health officer has the authority to act to control disease that are threats to public health. Typically, persons who have been infected with or exposed to a Communicable Disease voluntarily comply with the PCCHD instructions. If necessary, however; the PCCHO may initiate involuntary detention for purposes of Isolation and Quarantine.

State laws and rules do not contain procedures governing local health officers' activities to achieve voluntary compliance with instructions for Isolation and Quarantine. However, local health officer must follow specific procedures when initiating involuntary detention for purposes of Isolation and Quarantine.

There is reason to believe that you are infected or have been exposed or at reasonable risk of having [name of the disease], or being contaminated or passing such communicable disease or contamination to other persons; and thereby pose a significant threat to the public health and that isolation is necessary and is the least restrictive alternative to protect or preserve the public health.
