APPRENTICESHIP:

A structured program that allows people to earn while they learn by combining paid, on-the-job training with classroom instruction. In Wisconsin, there are three types of apprenticeships: Registered Apprenticeships, Youth Apprenticeships, Certified Pre-Apprenticeships.

Enrolling more Wisconsin residents in apprenticeships that could change their lives requires support and collaboration.

Ascendium's support for apprenticeships in Wisconsin includes two major investments. The first recognizes that the cost of tools, clothing, equipment, and other expenses can keep people from pursuing apprenticeships. That's why Ascendium offers \$2,000 scholarships to eligible construction and industrial trade apprentices through the Tools of the Trade Program in partnership with the Wisconsin Technical College System.

WRTP | BIG STEP in Milwaukee is developing Wisconsin's future workforce by creating more opportunities for residents to pursue apprenticeships. They're working across sectors to recruit, develop, and retain a qualified workforce in construction, manufacturing, and emerging industries. With support from Ascendium, WRTP | BIG STEP and their partners will significantly expand apprenticeship pathways in Wisconsin over the coming years.

Apprenticeships will continue to be a critical part of Wisconsin's workforce development for years to come.

Industries offering apprenticeships have expanded to include high-demand jobs that pay family-sustaining wages like nursing, financial services, and cybersecurity. For the third year in a row, the state set a record for the number of registered apprentices, which helped to address local labor gaps.6
