#### Old Newsboys Deliver Again —Selling Special Zoo News

Hawking newspapers - like military service or that fateful march up the aisle — is apparently a past experience that a lot of men share.

When the Henry Vilas Park Zoological Society put out the call for old newsboys a few weeks ago, more than a hundred vintage hawkers responded.

DOCTOR, LAWYER, industry chief - it seems they all got their start peddling papers, bundling up against the cold while shouting "extra" or flinging a folded paper on a front porch. And they're back at work today!

Newsboys, of course, improve with age. That's why the Zoo Society had no doubt well up to the task of selling special zoo editions of The Wisconsin State Journal for at least \$1 a copy.

The proceeds from the sale supplied without charge by The State Journal, will go to benefit the zoo. The money will be used for such projects as purchase of animals, upgrading cage facilities, and perhaps provide a "down payment" for constructing permanent elephant quarters, a 200 goal since 1918.
