Dear Mr. Rickert,

I'm writing in response to the public records request you made it the Madison Police Department. It was for all documents and bank security video related to the investigation of MPD case number 2018-75627, including the name of the security guard who shot him and the names of all witnesses or other people interviewed in the investigation.

Under the Wisconsin Public Records Laws, records custodians must carefully weigh the competing public interests involved when deciding to release any record in their possession. Custodians begin with a presumption of complete public access to such records. However, custodians must consider whether inspection of the record could result in harm to the public interest that would outweigh the benefits of such inspection. When such harm substantially outweighs the benefits of public inspection, such records or portions thereof, must remain confidential.

After consideration, I am releasing to you the requested records with redactions. We have redacted personally identifiable information composed of dates of birth, home address, and private telephone numbers related to cooperating contacts. Release of this information would facilitate identity theft crimes and thus, would be contrary to the well-established public interests in crime prevention and reduction (Wis. Stat. 19.36(13)). Additionally, releasing this information would be contrary to the public interests in crime detection and crime fighting in that witnesses may be reluctant to report what they know to the police if they have to fear that this personal and sensitive information is subject to release upon a public records request.

We have redacted portions of these records that relate to a medical diagnosis and drug information. Multiple state and federal statutes protect the sensitive nature of medical information by declaring such records confidential. These statutes require the Madison Fire Department to keep such protected health information confidential. I interpret the Madison Police Department to have a likewise obligation. Therefore, I have redacted the details/description relating to any medical conditions and treatment.

We have redacted portions of these records that show the moments of death for the decedent, including medical treatment that was provided to him. I believe that the release of video showing these moments would cause emotional pain to the family of the decedent should they view it. I also believe that it would cause emotional pain or injury to some members of the public who might view it, including children. I do not believe it is in the public interest for that emotional pain to take place, or to see a disturbing video where somebody is killed.

I understand your request for the names of the bank security guard who shot the decedent and witnesses, but I must deny your request for the release of those names and have redacted them from the records, along with anything that might lead to identifying them. We have also redacted the name of the security guard's parents and roommate, which could lead to identifying the security guard. There are concerns about possible retaliation by the decedent's friends or associates towards the bank security guard or those who witnessed this incident and gave a statement to the police about what they saw, particularly due to information given by family members that the decedent might have been a member of a gang. It is not uncommon for fellow gang members to seek some sort of retribution against those who have done something against the gang or gang members, or even been a witness to activities involving gang members. I believe that based on Wis. Stat. 19.35(1)(am)2.a. I must redact their names. Additionally, it is of the utmost importance for law enforcement to have the cooperation of uninvolved witnesses in incidents such as this. It is in the public interest for such incidents to be investigated as thoroughly as possible. If witnesses have concerns their safety would be endangered simply by telling law enforcement what they saw they would be reluctant to give that information, similar to the reason personal identifiable information is redacted.

As I indicated to you in a telephone conversation last week, we are still working on the redaction of necessary parts of the bank security videos. I am hopeful that those efforts will be completed within a week. I will keep you updated on the status of that portion of your request.

I have reached the above conclusions after weighing the reasons for non-disclosure against the public interest in disclosure. For the reasons set forth above, I have concluded that the public interest in non-disclosure of portions of the record requested outweighs the public interest in disclosure. Pursuant to Wis. Stat. 19.35(4)(b), I advise you that this determination not to disclose a portion of the requested record is subject to review by Mandamus under Wis. Stat. 19.37(1), or upon application to the Wisconsin Attorney General or the Dane County District Attorney. - I have redacted information in this report due to the fact that it contains confidential juvenile material. Wis. Stats. 48.396 and 938.396 relating to peace officer's records of juveniles prohibit the release of such records except in certain circumstances.
 I have redacted information in this report as release of these records would reveal highly personal and private information. It is my belief that disclosure of the information would likely have a substantial adverse effect on reputations and privacy interests of individuals mentioned in the reports without any counterbalancing benefit to the public.
 I have redacted information under authority of Wisconsin Statute 19.36(8) Identities of Law Enforcement Informants. I must balance competing public interest when determining whether or not to release a record in my custody. I have



Background Information

On 3/1/18, I was working for the City of Madison in my official capacity as a City of Madison Police Officer and wearing my full MPD military-style uniform. I was working as 3F5, between the hours of 3:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m., and operating fully-marked squad E1828, which is equipped with an in-car Arbitrator.

Initial Dispatch Information

On 3/1/18, at approximately 4:50 p.m., I was dispatched to Chase Bank, located at 4513 Milwaukee St., in the City of Madison, County of Dane, reference an armed robbery. I was located on Sprecher Rd., near Milwaukee St., and did activate my emergency lights and siren and responded with due regard.

The initial available information was that there was an armed robbery in progress with someone being detained. Call notes also stated, "Laying down on the ground on the back bleeding." Call notes also indicated a "subject still on site with handgun." The caller was watching the live cameras. Further, call notes indicated that the caller could see a male white "with black long sleeve shirt, black pants and short haircut." The caller also reported seeing on camera that the "subject holding the gun drawn onto someone on the ground." Call notes stated "suspect on the floor is in all black with a black hat on." I did ask dispatch to clarify if the suspect was the one shot and who was holding the gun.

Arrival On Scene

PO Hagen and I arrived on scene at approximately 4:53 p.m. moments after two Dane County Deputies who entered the bank before us. Upon entering, the Dane County deputies began giving medical attention to a male laying on his back on the ground. The male's head was facing west and his feet were facing east. I observed the male to be a light skinned male, wearing glasses and a black hat, black sweat pants and a black zip up sweatshirt with a silver zipper. I did put on latex gloves and frisked this male and did not locate any weapons.

I turned my attention to others in the bank. I observed a white male, who I know to be the security guard from past contacts, later identified as was standing standing to the left of the furthest left teller window (east side of the building).

The camera can be watched live and reviewed from a web site and clips can be downloaded and saved.

I did review the cameras and saw that a 4:47:10 p.m. a black vehicle drives westbound past. I did not see the vehicle park as it drove past the camera's frame. I was able to see the tires and the black passenger-side baseboards of the vehicle. At 4:47:52 p.m. I did see a person walk eastbound on the sidewalk past. The person appeared to be wearing gray or white shoes, black sweat pants, and a black top. The camera did not capture above the person's waist.

I did save a clip from 4:46:30 p.m. to approximately 4:48:10 p.m. on a flash drive. I subsequently burned the clip to a CD and property tagged it as evidence under property tag number 404318 and secured it in locker EPD 23 at the East District Property room. I also made a working copy. I completed the Video Retrieval form and it is attached to this case.

Disposition of Vehicle

At 7:09 p.m., Schmidt's towing arrived on scene. A 7:13 p.m., Schmidt's began the transport to the VIF with myself and PO K. Henderson following. At approximately 7:23 p.m. we arrived at the VIF and the vehicle was secured inside garage. I secured the doors, trunk, gas tank and hood with red evidence tape. I also secured the open driver window.

Officer Information

On 3/1/2018 I was working in an official capacity as a Madison Police Officer working the 3F1 shift operating full marked squad E1931 while wearing full MPD military style uniform. My Arbitrator microphone was synced at the start of my shift. The entirety of my actions during this call were recorded through the Arbitrator microphone system. All files were properly uploaded to the Arbitrator server prior to the end of my shift.

Initial Information

At 4:50pm, I was dispatched to the Chase Bank at 4513 Milwaukee Street, City of Madison, County of Dane for a report of an armed robbery in progress. While en route, dispatch advised there was one subject on the ground bleeding from his back who had been shot and another subject had a gun pointed at the person who was on the ground. The suspect was described as wearing all black and lying on the ground.

Actions on Scene

I arrived on the scene by driving westbound on Milwaukee Street towards Chase Bank. I observed an MPD squad directly behind me as I approached. It appeared a Dane County Sheriff's Office squad was already parked on Milwaukee Street in front of Chase Bank. I parked my squad car in the eastbound lanes of traffic on Milwaukee Street near the east most exit of Chase Bank. I immediately withdrew my duty handgun from the holster and approached the scene.

I entered the bank and observed two DCSO deputies. One of the deputies was placing the subject on the ground into handcuffs. The other deputy was standing nearby slightly to the left upon entering Chase Bank. I observed a male white wearing a black zip up North Face jacket, dark blue jeans, and tan military style boots with both of his hands placed against the wall by the teller counter. I later identified the subject via WI photo DL as I could see that the suspect on the ground had what appeared to me to be a single gunshot wound to his upper back area. I aimed my duty handgun at the suspect lying on the ground since he was not yet in custody and was the suspect for what dispatch advised was an armed robbery. I could see what appeared to be blood coming from this area as well as pooled on the ground nearby. I advised dispatch that EMS was needed and then that there was one suspect in custody. I observed one of the DCSO deputies begin life-saving measures on the suspect immediately after he was placed in custody. PO Magsamen contacted and other individuals inside the bank while I maintained coverage of the suspect.

Once the suspect was in custody, I heard identify himself as a security guard. The advised that he had shot the suspect. I asked if he had any other weapons with him at this time. The advised that he had a pocket knife in his front pocket. I could see the clip from this pocket knife. I requested that the stay where he was. At this time other officers arrived on scene. I advised PO L. Miles to stand by outside temporarily to make sure that no one who was not police or EMS could enter the bank. I was also concerned of the possibility that there may have been another individual involved in the robbery.

I saw there was a handgun on the ground. The handgun appeared to be a Glock full size handgun that had an American flag print on it. Advised that was his handgun and he had placed it on the ground. NARRATIVE:

On 3/1/18 at 4:50pm I was dispatched to the Chase Bank, 4513 Milwaukee St., City of Madison, for a report of a robbery in progress. I was dressed in full MPD military style uniform and was operating a fully marked squad car. I activated my emergency lights and siren and responded to the location. While en route, dispatch updated us that one person had been shot.

INITIAL OBSERVATIONS:

Upon arrival, Deputy Bach and Deputy McNalley from the Dane County Sheriff's Office were already on scene performing lifesaving measures on the suspect of the robbery, identified as **Louis Narvaez**. Narvaez was laying on his back next to the teller counter and had already been placed in handcuffs. Other MPD officers were also already on scene assisting.

MEDICAL ASSESSMENT:

I could see Narvaez was not breathing and not moving on his own. I could see a small amount of blood on the floor but I could not see corresponding blood on Narvaez. As a result, I began cutting off Narvaez's shirt to look for injuries consistent with a gunshot. I cut through all of Narvaez's shirts along the front of his body and removed them. I rolled Narvaez onto his left side and was able to see a small injury consistent with a gunshot would on his upper back. I noted there did not appear to be significant bleeding coming from the wound so no further action was taken to address that wound. I then rolled Narvaez onto his back and Deputy Bach continued. A short time later, Madison Fire Department personnel arrived on scene and began treatment of Narvaez.

At 5:07pm, I was advised by Madison Fire Department Paramedic Todd Cole that they had ceased all lifesaving measures on Narvaez.

SCENE STANDING:

At this point, I remained inside the Chase Bank to maintain standing during the investigation until the scene was released at 9:36pm. Once the scene was released, I remained on scene with Det. Ware until the bank manager, entering and locked the bank. Det. Ware and I were the last MPD personnel to leave the bank.

I asked to describe Narvaez. Stated that the "do-rag" covered his head and face. advised that he could only see Narvaez's neck. Advised that Narvaez appeared to be about 5'06" to 5'07" with a med-heavy build. Stated he could not be sure on weight because Narvaez wore baggy clothing. Could not recall much in the way of details about Narvaez's clothing. He thought Narvaez had dark pants and maybe wore something green. Trecalled that Narvaez had tattoos on his neck and arms, but he could not recall specific tattoos. After seeing Narvaez on the ground being treated without the "do-rag," he believed that Narvaez might be Latino. I asked if he had seen Narvaez in the bank early in the day, and he said no.

NARRATIVE

On 03/01/18, Madison Police Department (MPD) officers responded to a robbery/death investigation at the Chase Bank at 4513 Milwaukee St. in the City of Madison, County of Dane, State of Wisconsin. See previous reports.

ACTIONS AT CHASE BANK

Shortly after the call at the Chase Bank was aired by dispatch, Det. B. Ware and I responded to the Chase
Bank at 4513 Milwaukee St. to assist with the investigation. I began by taking a statement from
a bank employee and victim of the robbery. See previous report for details of
statement

After I finished with the MPD investigators video recorded and photographed the inside of the bank. Around 6:30 pm, the Dane County Medical examiner, Dr. Vincent Tranchida, arrived at the scene. Dr. Tranchida was assisted by Ashley Page, a medicolegal investigator with the Dane County Medical Examiner's Office. Both entered the bank at about 6:41 pm. Dr. Tranchida and Page did their initial assessment and pronounced the subject later identified as Luis M. Narvaez Jr. deceased at 6:47 pm.

I noted that Narvaez wore numerous layers of clothing. I saw that all of Narvaez's shirts had been cut off by the Madison Fire Department personnel. I noted that Narvaez had a black hooded sweatshirt, black 2Pac t-shirt (white picture of front), and a black ribbed tank top. I saw that Narvaez wore a light wash pair of blue jeans with a belt. On top of the blue jeans, Narvaez wore black sweatpants or trackpants. Narvaez wore dark socks and gray Nike Jordan basketball shoes with red soles. I saw a plain black winter cap to the left of Narvaez's left foot. I observed a black almost nylon item to the right of Narvaez's torso. I know from past experience this is a black translucent head covering often referred to as a "do-rag." I observed numerous tattoos on Narvaez's arms, stomach, chest, back, and neck.

I observed a pair of eyeglasses sitting on the teller counter near where Narvaez fell. I would describe the glasses as having thicker black frames with rectangular lenses. Later at 7:46 pm, I collected the sunglasses as evidence. At around 8:14 pm, I secured the glasses into East District temporary locker #1.

Dr. Tranchida and Page continued with a more thorough examination of Narvaez. I observed that they

located a set of Chrysler vehicle keys in front right pocket of the black pants. Page turned the vehicle keys over to me. I had received information that Narvaez arrived at the bank in a Chrysler sedan registered to a female. Similarly, I packaged those keys at 7:46 pm and then secured them in East District temporary locker #1 at 8:14 pm.

Page located a black leather wallet in the back left pocket of one of the pairs of pants. Page turned the black wallet over to me. I opened the wallet and located a Minnesota photo identification card for Luis M. Narvaez. I found a social security card for Narvaez, numerous credit cards for Narvaez, and health insurance cards for Narvaez as well. At 7:46 pm, I bagged the wallet with contents. At 8:14 pm, I secured the wallet in East Temporary locker #1.

When they turned Narvaez from his back onto his side, I observed a single bleeding circular defect in the upper left side of Narvaez's back. From my training and experience, I believed the circular defect to be a gunshot wound. I did not find an exit wound. I observed corresponding holes in the black tank top, black t-shirt, and black sweatshirt. Each clothing item had a red staining around the hole, which I believed to be blood.

At 7:36 pm, Page and Dr. Tranchida moved Narvaez into the white body bag. At 7:37 pm, Page sealed the body bag with #0041605. All Faith's Funeral Home arrived and removed Narvaez for transport to the morgue at 7:42 pm.

OFFICER INFORMATION

On Thursday, 3/1/18, I was assigned patrol as 3F3 from 3:00 PM to 11:00 PM. I was dressed in full MPD uniform and was operating marked squad E1910. I was acting in official capacity as a police officer for the City of Madison. From 3:00 PM to approximately 6:45 PM, I had a ride along with me.

DISPATCH INFORMATION

At approximately 4:50 PM, myself and several other MPD officers were dispatched to Chase Bank, located at 4513 Milwaukee Street, City of Madison, Dane County, for an armed robbery. Officers quickly utilized a tactical channel. While en route, Dispatch advised that a subject had been shot. I responded in emergency mode with my lights and siren activated.

ARRIVAL ON SCENE

Prior to my arrival, officers had stabilized the lobby area of the bank and tended to the patient who had been shot. The bank had not been completely cleared yet and it was unclear if there was more than one suspect. There were several employees and customers still inside the bank. PO Natalie Deibel, PO Lyjya Miles and I did a protective sweep of the rest of building including the basement. No other suspects were located.

EVIDENCE

Once the protective sweep was completed, I was directed by Sergeant Jen Kane to replace a Dane County Deputy who was standing by with evidence. At approximately 5:01 PM, I replaced Sergeant McNally who was standing by with a gun on the floor.

The gun was a black Glock with a USA flag decal on it. The Glock had a magazine inserted in it. The gun was on the floor in between the sitting area and the first bank teller window, on the East side of the building.

I also observed a 15 round, black magazine in a black case, and a green pocket knife resting on the counter to the East of the first bank teller window, next to the pin pad for credit/debit cards.

At approximately 6:11 PM, Sergeant Kane instructed me to clear from the inside of the bank and respond to Diamond Drive and Garnet Lane to meet PO Micaela Magsamen who was with an unoccupied vehicle.

K9 TRACK

I responded to meet PO Magsamen. I observed a Dodge Stratus with WI registration ABM4805 parked in front of 4426 Diamond Drive on the North side of the street. I remained with PO Jim O'Donnell and his K9 partner during the K9 track from the vehicle. The track ended at the front door of Chase bank.

DISPOSITION OF THE VEHICLE

I responded back to the vehicle and remained with PO Magsamen until Schmidt's Towing arrived. Schmidt's towed the vehicle to the MPD Vehicle Impound Facility. PO Magsamen and I secured the vehicle inside of the

On 03.01.18, I was acting in my official capacity as an Investigator for the City of Madison Police Department Forensic Services Unit (FSU). I responded to the Chase Bank, located at 4513 Milwaukee St., reference a homicide investigation. An armed security guard, later id'd as reportedly shot a subject who was attempting to rob the bank.

Investigator Tim Smith and I arrived on scene at 5:27pm. Shortly after arrival, Capt. Snyder briefed us. Det. Mark Hull then gave Inv. Smith and me a scene walk-through. Det. Hull stated that was sitting in a chair on the east side of the bank, nearest the furthest east teller station. A woman was conducting her banking at this teller window, when a subject, later id'd as Luis M. Narvaez, entered the bank and approached this window. Narvaez pushed a bag under the teller window and told the teller to put money in it. Det. Hull stated that while Narvaez was attempting to rob the bank, paperoached Narvaez and shot him one time. Narvaez succumbed to his injuries and died on scene.

The main scene was mainly in the front lobby area of the bank. Just inside the front door was a fired cartridge casing, along with the body of Narvaez, which was closer to the teller counter. The black bag that Narvaez put in the teller window was still in the window. Just to the left of that teller window was a folding knife and a Glock magazine in a magazine holder. These items reportedly were removed from person and placed on the counter by responding officers. Glock 19 firearm was placed on the lobby floor when officers arrived. These items, coat, backpack and beverages, were on or near a chair he was sitting in prior to the shooting.

At 6:12pm, Inv. Smith began video recording of the scene. Inv. Hornung later uploaded the video to the Arbitrator system. Once video was complete, I completed overall, medium and close up photographs of the scene with and without evidence placards. Inv. Smith completed a field sketch and took scene measurements. Please see Inv. Smith's report for further information along with his scaled diagram.

ME Investigator Ashley Page and Dr. Tranchida responded to the scene for the body of Narvaez. A wallet was located in a back pocket of Narvaez's jeans, identifying him by a Minnesota ID as Luis M. Narvaez. A key fob with a key were found in Narvaez's pocket and his glasses were removed by EMS and placed on the teller counter. Det. Hull took possession of the wallet, glasses and keys.

8:19pm, I did pour a small amount of the liquid from the Monster Energy can into a glass vial. A second can of Monster Energy drink was found to be empty. I also photographed 's vehicle, a blue Chrysler 200, parked in the bank lot prior to Det. Ware searching it.

At the above listed times, I collected the identified evidence. I did remove the magazine from the Glock and noted it was loaded with 14 rounds. There was one round in the chamber, which I removed. I put on a new pair of nitrile exam gloves prior to the handling, and/or processing of each item of evidence.

I then transported the collected items to the FSU lab where I secured them in my locked FSU evidence locker. On 03.02.18, I retrieved the above items from my secure locker. I completed photographs of the items, to include all of the ammunition that was in the Glock magazines. The magazine removed from the gun had 14 Hornady 9mm Luger rounds in it, with one removed from the chamber, for a total of 15. The second magazine in the magazine holder was loaded with 15 Hornady 9mm Luger rounds.

I then secured and sealed the items with the above mentioned property tag numbers and transported the collected items to the City of Madison Police Department-Central District Station Property Room/Intake, locker 10.

Initial Information

On 03/01/18 at approximately 6:05 PM, I spoke with Det P Ortega-Mendoza via phone. Det Ortega-Mendoza requested I respond to the area Garnet Ln and Diamond Dr to meet with officers in contact with a resident of an address, later identified verbally to be Maureen K Engelberger. I responded to that location. Upon arrival, I met with PO M Magsamen who provided me information she learned from Engelberger. For further information, please refer to PO Magsamen's report.

On 03/01/18 at approximately 6:50 PM, I knocked on the door of the state of the whole where PO Magsamen told me Engelberger resided. There was no answer at the door. I called Engelberger via phone at approximately 6:56 PM and Engelberger told me she would return to to speak with me.

During my interview with Engelberger, I did record Engelberger's statement using my department issued smartphone with Winscribe application. I later uploaded the recorded audio interview to the City of Madison Police Department server. This report is a summary of my interview only and not a verbatim transcription. For further information, please refer to the audio recording.

Interview with Engelberger

On 03/01/18 at approximately 7:05 PM, Engelberger arrived home and I initiated an audio recording. It should be noted, I also audio recorded my attempt to contact Engelberger at her door when she was not home. I asked Engelberger if I could speak with her at the dining room table and she agreed.

Engelberger told me she had worked with Det M Hull and Det C Johnson in the past regarding bank robberies. Engelberger said she had not repositioned the cameras on her house. Engelberger told me the suspect or suspects in the prior bank robberies have routinely parked near her home and she was able to capture video of the suspect or suspects with her Nest wireless camera system.

Engelberger told me she had been at her home since approximately 9:30 AM and was awaiting a phone call on 03/01/18. Engelberger told me she has her home listed on Air B&B and so she does not need the area to be known as unsafe. Engelberger told me that she looked out of her front window and saw squad cars on Diamond Dr. Engelberger told me that she then looked out of the patio door, to the north, and saw lights at Chase bank. Engelberger said she did not know what was going on but that she had left her car in her driveway with the garage door open. Engelberger told me she moved the car inside the garage and closed the garage door.

At that point, Engelberger said she observed police outside of her residence and approached them. Engelberger also told me she saw a dark sedan with a "spoiler" parked on Diamond Dr and asked the police officers if they were investigating the dark sedan. Engelberger told me she believed the dark sedan was possibly the "getaway" car. Engelberger said the dark sedan had a license plate made up of three character and then four characters. Engelberger provided information to officers about the prior robbers parking in the area of Diamond Dr and said she told PO Magsamen about her Nest cameras. Engelberger said PO Magsamen told her the call came in at approximately 4:50 PM.

Engelberger told me she reviewed the camera from her residence that had a field of view that included Diamond Dr. Engelberger said, that on 03/01/18 at approximately 4:47 PM, she saw the dark sedan "pull up" and was "attempting to brake." Engelberger said that less than one minute later a subject wearing black baggy pants and a black jacket was walking along Diamond Dr to the east. Engelberger told me she provided the video to PO Magsamen.

Engelberger described having additional contact with officers and that she was going to an exercise class that started at 6:30 PM. Engelberger told me she observed on the news media that a person had been shot and that she knew it was fatal because of the actions of an ambulance on scene. Engelberger told me she did not hear any gunshots.

Video Retrieval

I ended the recorded interview with Engelberger and asked her if I could collect additional video evidence. Engelberger told me that I could and that the camera system preserved information for ten days. Engelberger brought me to her computer and I found that Engelberger had two cameras, one that had a field of view including Diamond Dr and one that had a field of view to the north of the believed a reasonable timeframe for video collection was approximately 4:30 PM to 5:30 PM on 03/01/18.

I was able to locate the approximate timeframe of 4:30 PM to 5:30 PM on 03/01/18 for both cameras. The files were downloaded to Engelberger's "Downloads" folder. I then copied and pasted the two digital video files onto a black SanDisk USB 4GB flash drive, which I considered to be a temporary storage device. I completed a Video Retrieval Report which I attached to this report. I left Engelberger's residence after obtaining the digital video files at approximately 8:00 PM.

Burn Video Evidence

On 03/01/18, I burned the evidentiary data files from the temporary storage device to optical media using the utility built-in to Microsoft Windows 7. I also created a working copy in addition to the evidentiary item, which I provided to Det Hull. The temporary storage device was formatted. I considered the temporary storage device, which I know to utilize flash memory, to be an unreliable storage media due to flash memory being susceptible to static electricity or static shock. I am aware that static electricity can render flash memory devices unusable due to prior employment training and experience. I am also aware that the manufacturer named Kingston notes on the company's website that static electricity can damage flash storage devices.

INITIAL INFORMATION

On 3/1/2018 I was on duty as a uniform police officer working a special assignment at the South Transfer Point on the south side of Madison. This assignment ran from 2:30pm to 6:30pm.

At approximately 5:45pm I was monitoring a channel that was dealing with a potential bank robbery which resulted in a possible homicide. I heard MPD Lt Erik Fuhremann request the assistance of a K9 at this location. I was advised the location of this incident was that of the Chase Bank located at 4513 Milwaukee St.

I advised dispatch that I was currently the only K9 on duty at the particular time and could respond if was requested. A short time later, I was advised by Lt Fuhremann that I was indeed wanted at the Chase Bank location.

ARRIVAL ON SCENE

I arrived at the Chase Bank at approximately 6:15pm. There I made contact with Lt Fuhremann in an area behind the bank specifically in front of the address of 4426 Diamond Dr. In speaking with Lt Fuhremann he advised that while canvassing the area a neighbor had pointed a vehicle bearing WI registration ABM4805 that was parked in front of the above-mentioned address facing in a westbound direction. Lt Fuhremann stated that the neighbor had told him that this vehicle appeared to be suspicious in nature and that she has not seen this vehicle in this particular area for a while. Lt Fuhremann believed that there was a possibility that this may have been a potential vehicle used by the suspect in the armed robbery and therefore was requesting K9 Krahnie attempt to track from the vehicle to see where a track may lead. With this information I responded back to my squad and retrieved K9 Krahnie.

Officer Donnell and K-9 Krahnie's Patrol Training and Experience

I have been a police officer since December of 1992. In January 2005, I was assigned to MPD's K-9 Unit. I worked and trained with K-9 Johnny from February 2005 through 2013. In February 2013, I was assigned and began training K-9 Krahnie. Functions K-9 Krahnie has been trained in include building searches, area searches, article/evidence searches, tracking, apprehensions, obedience and handler protection.

On June 6, 2017, K-9 Krahnie and I certified with North American Police Working Dog Association in all the above mentioned functions. K-9 Krahnie and I continue to train on a daily basis in one or more of these functions. We also attend MPD K-9 Unit trainings twice a month under the supervision of unit trainer, Sergeant Chris Boyd, where we are routinely tested on our reliability in these functions. K-9 Krahnie has consistently demonstrated reliability in these areas both in training and street deployments.

Since becoming a K-9 handler, I have received training from renowned and certified trainers from around the country. Some of these trainers include Brad Smith, Jeff Barrett, Jeff Meyers, Kevin Kocher, Janet Dooley, Kevin Weber, Ron Gunton, Jack Robicheaux, Kevin Shadahl, Franko Angelini. We have attended trainings related to Tactical SWAT maneuvers, Tactical Tracking, Scent Discrimination Tracking, Obedience, Tactical Obedience, Tactical Area Search, Search and Rescue, and Tactical Building Clears to name a few. During these trainings, K-9 Krahnie has consistently demonstrated proficiency and her reliability in all of these

TRACK

At approximately 6:29pm I responded with K9 Krahnie to the above-mentioned vehicle. In observing the vehicle I noted that the driver's window was partially rolled down and it was determined that I would attempt to acquire a scent from this window to present to Krahnie for a track. K9 Krahnie was presented this window and then K9 Krahnie was given the command to track. K9 Krahnie immediately began tracking in an eastbound direction away from this vehicle. K9 Krahnie responded up to the north side of Diamond Drive's sidewalk and continued in an eastbound direction. We proceeded in this direction until we reached approximately the center point of a green space that separates the Chase Bank parking lot and Diamond Dr. At this point K9 Krahnie made a slight turn to the north and proceeded up to a set of shrubs that is in the center portion of this green space. K9 Krahnie continued in an eastbound direction until we reached the far end of the shrubs at which time K9 Krahnie made a turn to the north and proceeded northbound into the Chase Bank parking lot. We continued northbound through the Chase Bank parking lot through the drive-up window area and proceeded to the front portion of the building. K9 Krahnie then made a turn to the west and proceeded directly to the front door of the Chase Bank and then sat down and began barking at the door. We have done several training tracks which leads to doors where the individual was not present. K9 Krahnie, during these training exercises always sits down at the door and begins barking at the door indicating that the scent had responded in this particular door. Based on K9 Krahnie's sit and bark at the front door of the Chase Bank it was my belief that the scent in which K9 Krahnie had been following had ended at this particular location. The time noted for the end of this track was at 6:30pm.

After the termination of the track officers and command staff on scene were notified of the ending of the track. At this time K9 Krahnie and I then returned to service. Attached to this report will be a map of the track in which K9 Krahnie had followed during this investigation.

SUMMARY

On 3/1/18 I responded to an attempted bank robbery in progress that resulted in the death of the attempted robber at the Chase Bank located at 4513 Milwaukee St, city of Madison. While on scene I helped secure evidence and maintain standing and I was tasked with keeping the crime scene log after PO Michele Walker was released from the scene.

INITIAL INFORMATION

On 3/1/18 I was on routine patrol as 3F6 working from 2 to 10p. I was dressed in full MPD police uniform, operating marked squad N1836. At approximately 4:50p I was dispatched to the Chase Bank located at 4513 Milwaukee St in the city of Madison reference an armed robbery in progress. I immediately responded in emergency mode and while en route to the call, dispatch advised responding units, who had switched to tactical channel 7, that witnesses were reporting that someone on scene had been "shot." Once I arrived on scene I tactically approached the bank with PO Liston. I assisted scene supervisor Sgt Kane and other responding officers in clearing the Chase Bank building's outer back (south side) perimeter, as well as the large basement area. In order to clear the basement I worked with PO L Myles and PO K Henderson.

SECURING OF EVIDENCE

Once I had helped responding officers secure the scene, I was asked to guard a silver shell casing that was lying on the floor of the main area of the Chase Bank building approximately two feet south of the main entrance. I guarded the casing in the position where it had presumably originally fallen until MPD special investigators Tim Smith and Colleen Michelson arrived on scene and collected it as evidence. While guarding the bullet casing and maintaining standing inside the bank, I spoke with Deputy Mark Bock and Sgt Kyle McNally from the DCSO. They remained on scene until they were released by MPD Sgt Kane. Deputy Bock and Sgt McNally explained that they had both been in the immediate vicinity of Chase Bank when the armed robbery call was dispatched and they responded to the bank and arrived on scene as the first responding officers. Deputy Bock informed me he observed the robbery suspect lying wounded on the ground and had begun

Bock watched over the gun lying on the bank floor until MPD personnel arrived while Sgt McNally guarded the casing on the ground until I took over observation of the casing from the latter. Prior to the deputy leaving the scene I asked them what occurred when they arrived on scene. Sgt McNally informed me he and Deputy Bock had run in the front door and a white man in a "black suit" had "waved them in" the bank where they observed the robbery suspect, identified by witnesses and bank personnel, lying on the ground wounded. I thanked Deputy Bock and Sgt McNally for their assistance and they left the scene.

While I was standing beside the shell casing, PO G Rodriguez came through the front door of the bank and handed me a gold key on a plastic ring that was labeled "bathroom key." PO Rodriguez informed me the bank security guard had given this to her prior to his being transported to the east district police station for questioning and he wanted bank staff to have the key. I gave the key to PO Liston who told me he would ensure this reached bank staff members who were still being interviewed on scene.

- Det Brad Ware responded almost immediately to the scene as lead detective and he left the bank at 9:36p.
- Det Mark Hull responded to the scene almost immediately following the initial dispatch and he remained on scene until 8:27p.
- PO Tanner Gerstner arrived approximately two minutes after the original dispatch and remained on scene until 9:36p at which time the bank scene was released.
- SI Tim Smith arrived on scene following the decease of the bank robbery suspect (please see PO Walker's report for the time of his entry onto the scene) and he left at 9:21p.
- SI Colleen Michelson arrived on scene along with SI Tim Smith. Please see PO Walker's report for their entry time. She left the scene at 9:21p.
- PO J Weaver from town of Madison PD arrived on scene after being requested to respond with a "fast ID" to attempt to identify the deceased. Please see PO Walker's report for the time he entered the scene. He left at 7:02p. I was unable to have PO Weaver sign the crime scene log as I was not given a copy of the spreadsheet until after he left.
- Chief medical examiner Vincent Tranchida (#9101) entered the scene at 6:30p and left at 7:49p.
- Medical legal investigator Ashley Page entered the scene at 6:30p and left at 7:50p.
- Director of operations for the Dane County medical examiners office Barry Irmen entered the scene at 6:30 and left at 6:35p.
- All Faiths funeral director Ryan Lenzendorf entered the scene at 7:40, secured the body of the deceased, and left with the deceased at 7:45p.
- Chase Bank employee was as was on scene when the incident occurred and left the scene at 8:03p.
- Chase Bank manager Brian Thurman arrived on scene shortly after the incident. Please see Det Ware's report regarding Thurman's arrival on scene. Thurman left the scene at 8:03p.

I was able to secure the signatures of all people entering and exiting the crime scene except for PO Weaver from the Town of Madison PD. I was unable to secure his signature because he entered and left the scene prior to me being provided with a crime scene log spreadsheet.

While I kept the scene log I phoned the crime response program for the Dane County victim witness unit and spoke with Julie Foley and then with Robin (LNU). I provided Robin with the names of all of the bank employees and customers I had been provided by Det Ware and PO Liston following their interviews with these individuals. Robin from the victim witness unit promised she and her colleagues would make contact with these witnesses to provide outreach and support at some point this evening. I informed Det Ware while still on scene that I had contacted Victim Witness regarding after-care for these individuals. While on scene I consulted periodically with Sgt Kane who was supervising the scene, as well as Det Ware. At 9:36p Det Ware, PO Gerstner and I left the bank once it had been secured by employee

In front of the teller area were to DCSO deputies who were assisting PO T Gerstner in rendering aide to a subject who was down on the ground. Please see PO Gerstner's report on his contact and duties.

I could see PO's Liston and Magsamen were contacting employees and witnesses and PO's Deibel, Miles, and Henderson were conducting a protective sweep of the bank.

MFD arrived on scene and started life saving efforts. The two Sheriff's deputies agreed to stand by evidence (casing, weapon) until officers were free to maintain chain of custody. The deputies were to do a report under our case number.

As I was watching MFD, I contacted the OIC and asked her (Sgt Ryan) to start making notifications.

PO Walker was placed at the door to start an entry log, please see her report on this log.

PO's Deibel and Henderson took over chain of custody for the deputies and PO Miles assisted with traffic control.

PO's Saffold, Miles, and Brennan assisted in shutting down Milwaukee St traffic and diverting it to off streets.

PO Deibel took over entry log duties from PO Walker, again, see their reports for that hand-off of duties.

Dets Hull and Ware assisted inside Chase while Det Green assisted outside the bank. The armed security guard was briefly talked to on scene and then voluntarily taken to East PD for a more extensive interview.

Lt Skenandore arrived on scene and assisted in the administrative duties.

Please see the crime scene log on which officers were expected to complete reports.

Once the scene was cleared, I returned to the East district and checked in with Lt Schiferl at the CP.

Not long after that, I also heard Dispatch indicate that shots were fired and at least one person was down. A few minutes later, Lt. Patton requested my assistance to go to the east police district and make contact with Lt. Schiferl to begin this investigation. A short time later. I arrived at the east police district detective room and made contact with Lt Schifferl, Lt Schifferl briefed me as to the events that had transpired in the last few minutes and indicated that a person who had discharged a firearm was in route to the east police district with officers. Lt Schiferl indicated that at least one person was injured at the scene and indicated that witnesses were being interviewed by officers and detectives. Given the lack of resources throughout the city and the minutes that had gone by with the person who discharged the firearm waiting for police contact, we decided that I would interview the "shooter". That person was identified via Wisconsin photo DL as When I first made contact with in the soft interview room of the east police district with two Madison uniformed officers. Since this interview needed to be videotaped given the severity of the offense, he was then transferred to an interview room equipped with audio and video recording systems. Det Glenn Davis sat in the interview as well. I contacted and Det. Davis and I introduced each other to Daehling as Madison Police detectives. We to come with us to the interview room, and we entered the room at approximately 6:09pm. Once in the room, he identified himself, and I learned from him that he has been residing at since September of 2017. the security job through a friend of his who asked him if he wanted to work as a security person. He stated that once he told his friend that he was interested in the job, he received a telephone call from Randall and Randall explained to him what the job entailed. I asked to tell me about the application process and he told me that after the phone call with Randall, he was given the hours and possible location. He stated that he completed an application containing his social security number and biographical information that he received from Randall and faxed it back to Randall. indicated that he provided his own weapon, which according to him was a .9mm "Glock 19", which according to the chamber.	
stated that he was not sure if Randall conducted a criminal background on him, but he believed he did. He also indicated that it was likely or perhaps that a criminal background was not done, given that he was a conceal carry weapon permit holder. I asked him if he possessed any other firearms for work purposes and he stated that he had a Springfield .9mm, which holds 19 rounds in the magazine and 1 round in the chamber. stated that he has been a CCW permit holder, since January or February of 2016 and indicated that when he applied, he provided his DD214 and went through a DOJ background investigation. stated that he then fired one shot as he pointed to the back of the male suspect. Indicated that the male suspect fell onto his back at an angle, explaining that as he hit the ground, his head was toward the front doors. Stated that at this point, the male and female customers had taken a few steps back and had moved toward the chairs that he was sitting by earlier. Stated that he then made verbal contact with the employees and told them to take cover and to stay behind the windows. Stated that he instructed the female customer to go to the other side of the lobby where the cubicles were located; however, that female replied by stating that she didn't feel comfortable going all the way there, since he, meaning was still pointing his gun in that direction. Went onto explain that he was covering the male suspect with his handgun, therefore his gun was pointing in the general direction of the cubicles. stated that once he was taken into custody by the police officers, the police officer allowed him to call his father to let him know that he was going to be okay, since he knew something would be on the news and he didn't want his father to worry. He stated that when he called his father, he did not answered the phone, so he sent him a message. He stated that his father called back and officers allowed him to speak with him and to tell him that he was okay. On Friday, March 02, 2018 at 4:50 PM, I assisted with responding to an Armed Robbery that occurred at 4513 Milwaukee St, the Chase Bank, in the city of Madison. I assisted in the command post and eventually assisted Dane County Medical Examiner with a notification regarding the death of Luis Narvaez given to his mother, Lorrain Narvaez

ASSISTANCE IN THE COMMAND POST

Upon hearing there was a bank robber that was shot by a security officer that just occurred at the Chase Bank on Milwaukee St, I was directed to assist in the command post, which was being set up at the East District Station.

I assisted incident command with starting a background Work Up on the security guard that shot the suspected robber. I partially completed the CIS Work Up Checklist before being given a new task. Prior to leaving the command post I gave the CIS Work Up Checklist to Sgt Dave Meinert.

INTERVIEW OF LORRAIN NARVAEZ

I was directed by Det Brad Ware to go to Market Market Madison, to assist a Medical Examiner (ME) with a death notification to Lorrain Narvaez concerning her deceased son, Luis Narvaez. Ashley Page was the responding ME. Det Richard Friday joined me during this contact.

Upon our arrival to the residence, I knocked on the front door. I was greeted by a female voice from within that asked us who we were. I identified myself as Det Vang from the Madison Police Department. The door opened and I was greeted by Lorraine Narvaez who identified herself verbally to me (I later confirmed her identity with a photo from the MPD database.) She asked what this was regarding. ME Page requested permission for all of us to enter so that she could deliver some unfortunate news. Lorraine Narvaez allowed us into her apartment.

When inside the apartment ME Page told Lorraine Narvaez that her son, Luis Narvaez, was deceased; and that he was shot during the course of a suspected bank robbery where he was suspect. Lorraine Narvaez's immediate reaction was to tell us to leave. ME Page offered to provide support for Lorraine Narvaez, but despite this request, Lorraine Narvaez told us to leave. She further explained that she needed to make some phone calls to tell family about what happened, and that she wanted Police and Medical Examiner to leave.

Lorraine Narvaez said that Luis Narvaez did not live with her and that she had not been in contact with him recently. Looking around the residence I did not see any evidence that Luis Narvaez lived there. I did not see anything of evidentiary value within the residence. I asked Lorraine Narvaez if we could return in an hour, after she made her phone calls. Lorraine Narvaez was agreeable to this and said police could return at 10:00 PM. Det Friday, ME Page, and I then left the residence for one hour.

I returned to Lorraine Narvaez's residence at 10:00 PM, with Det Friday and ME Page. Upon our arrival Lorraine Narvaez answered the door and invited us inside. We sat in the living room area while ME Page spoke to Lorraine Narvaez about what she could expect to happen in the coming days. After ME Page was

done speaking, I continued to question Lorraine Narvaez about her son.

Lorraine Narvaez told me that Luis Narvaez was her son. She placed a piece of paper down on the table and said "this is his address." Written on the paper was the address Milwaukee, WI. She said Luis Narvaez's father had the same name, except that father's middle initial was "E". Lorraine Narvaez said Luis Narvaez had a 2-3 year old son but would not disclose his name. She said his son lived in Minnesota with his ex-wife "Carolina." She advised that Carolina had full custody of Luis Narvaez's son.

I asked Lorraine Narvaez to tell me when was the last time that she'd spoken to or seen Luis Narvaez. Lorraine Narvaez said she did not keep good contact with her son. She said she last had contact with Luis Narvaez through text message back on January 15, 2018. She said she last saw Luis Narvaez about one week prior to the text message. She said that she was unaware of Luis Narvaez having any issues with alcohol or drugs recently. She said she did not know if he smoked cigarettes or marijuana. She said she did not believe he was suicidal and did not believe he had any issues regarding mental health.

Lorraine Narvaez said she did not know who Luis Narvaez hung out with. She understood that he lived with a girlfriend in Milwaukee but did not know her name or have her phone number. She said she suspected it sounded something like "Yada." She said that his girlfriend had two children of her own and that they seemed to be doing well together.

I asked Lorraine Narvaez to tell me if she had any other information to provide at this time and she told me, no. I asked her to tell me if she had any questions for me, to which she replied, no. I gave Lorraine Narvaez my business card and asked that she call me if had any further questions or wanted to make any further statements. I then ended contact with Lorraine Narvaez. At approximately 10:30 PM, I called Margaret Appleton-Hanson using the contact phone number provided by Luis Larvae. A female voice answered, identifying herself as Margaret Appleton-Hanson. She said she was aware Luis Larvae had been shot and was now decease. She said she would be willing to speak to me and answer any questions.

Margaret Appleton-Hanson said Luis Larvae was her nephew. She said that only in the past two years had she been in better contact and relationship with him. She said he lived in South Milwaukee with his girlfriend named Yadira. She said that he appeared to be happy lately and seemed to be doing fine. She explained that Luis Larvae was a tattoo artist and also worked for a moving company. She said she did not believe he had any issues with alcohol or drugs.

I then asked about the last time she spoke to Luis Larvae. Margaret Appleton-Hanson told me that she last saw Luis Larvae on yesterday's date, 2/28/18. She said Luis Larvae came over to her place to use her computer. She said he was using "Facetime" to have a video chat with his son in Minnesota. She said that he went upstairs to where the computer was, and although she was not with him during this conversation, it appeared as if he was doing just what he said he was going to do. She remember hearing him being happy about his 3 year old son being potty trained and preparing to go to 3K school. After he was done with the video chat he left. Margaret Appleton-Hanson did not think anything was wrong or out of order with Luis Larvae.

When asked, Margaret Appleton-Hanson did not have any more to say about her last contact with Luis Larvae. 

On 03/02/2018, I was acting in my official capacity as an Investigator for the City of Madison Police Department Forensic Services Unit (FSU). I was requested by FSU Lt. Tony Fiore to attend the autopsy of Luis Marty Narvaez (DOB (Line)), who was the suspect of an armed robbery of the Chase Bank located at 4513 Milwaukee Street on 03/01/2018 and was subsequently shot by an armed security guard of the bank.

At approximately 8:35am, Det. Gary Pihlaja, Investigator Dan Roman, and I arrived at the Dane County Morgue. The autopsy was conducted by Dr. Vincent Tranchida and Morgue Technician Brigid Vickerman. Medicolegal Investigator Ashley Page and Det. Jerry Johnson were also present for the duration.

Dr. Tranchida cut the seal on the body bag at 8:49am. Inv. Roman documented the autopsy with photographs, and I collected all items of evidence. It should be noted that during evidence collection, protective clothing and protective gloves were worn. Inv. Roman and I left the Dane County Morgue at approximately 1:45pm.

Chase Bank Video

On 3/2/18 at approximately 12:36 PM, I received an email from Luis M. Corona, a Chase Bank security manager. Corona's email contained a link to securely download the requested video files. I called and spoke to Corona, who identified himself verbally by phone. Corona told me works with Stephen Giertych, who previously sent me stills of the robbery video on 3/1/18 at approximately 9:52 PM. Corona said he worked with Giertych to prepare and send me the video, as Giertych's computer was having difficulty with sending the files.

I downloaded the two video files from Corona, as well as the stills from Giertych, to CD. I property tagged this CD in the East District Property Room on 3/2/18 at approximately 7:34 PM. I property tagged this item under evidence tag # 404481 and secured it in evidence locker #13.

After viewing the video, I made an additional video request for all the lobby and teller cameras that would have captured the incident. Corona sent me another email with a secure link to access the video on 3/4/18. On 3/6/18, I accessed this link and downloaded all additional video files to a DVD. To this DVD, I also added the stills from Giertych and the first two video files from Corona, as to keep all video evidence from Chase Bank together.

I property tagged this DVD in the East District Property Room on 3/6/18 at approximately 7:18 PM. I property tagged the Chase Video (Complete) under evidence tag #404792 and secured it in evidence locker 40. I attached the Chase video email receipts from Corona and Giertych to this report.

Video Summary

I reviewed the Chase Bank video. I documented my observations of the video in a separate, video summary report with stills. I attached that summary to this report. In reviewing the video, I had to install the included codecs and use the included player to see the video with a date and time stamp. However, I was also able to view the video files (.avi format) using VLC player, but this video did not have a date and time stamp visible when using this player.

INTERVIEW OF YADIRA REVEROL AT EPD ON 3/2/2018

Narrative:

On 3/2/2018 at approximately 10am, Detective Deb Plantz and I were notified that Yadira Reverol, hereafter Yadira, was in the lobby of EPD, wanting to talk to police. I had previous knowledge that Yadira was the girlfriend of, Luis Narvaez, the suspect in the bank robbery at Chase Bank. Detective Plantz and I met Yadira in the lobby. Yadira stated she wanted to talk to us about what happened with Narvaez and about her vehicle. We expressed our condolences for her loss. I explained to Yadira that we would like to speak to her regarding Narvaez and then speak to her regarding the procedures related to her vehicle. Yadira voluntarily came with us inside EPD and into the soft interview room. Yadira explained that she brought the title to the vehicle to show proof that she owned it. Yadira presented the title to me. Based on my prior knowledge of the vehicle, I confirmed the vehicle shown on the title was the same vehicle towed to secure impound following the bank robbery. The title showed Yadira as the only registered owner of the vehicle. I photocopied the title and gave the original back to Yadira.

Yadira advised she came to Madison from Milwaukee today. She stated she was driven to Madison by Narvaez's father, Luis Narvaez Sr, who was currently sitting in his vehicle in the EPD parking lot. Luis Narvaez Sr was interviewed by Detective Sergeant Dan Nale and Detective Kathy Peterson.

History of Yadira and Narvaez Background and Relationship

Yadira informed me she has been living together with Narvaez since November of 2017, and originally met him in October of 2017. She stated at the time they met, Narvaez lived across the hall from her. She stated they both currently reside at this same address in South Milwaukee. Yadira stated when they originally started dating, Narvaez disclosed to Yadira his personal criminal history. Yadira stated Narvaez disclosed to her that he committed a bank robbery with another person when he was younger, however that person "snitched" on him and he ended up going to prison for nine years. Yadira stated she understood Narvaez to be in his teens or 20s at the time of this robbery, and that there was only one bank robbery he talked about. She did not know which bank he had robbed back then, but she believed it to be in Madison.

Yadira stated Narvaez had been staying, or visiting with his mother in Madison when they had first met. She stated that he would drive back and forth from Madison to Milwaukee. Yadira stated about the time they first met and started talking, he began to stay in Milwaukee on a more regular basis. Yadira stated Narvaez also had a tattooing job in Madison at this time.

Yadira stated she has two kids; a 15-year-old and a 6-year-old who live in the house with her. Yadira stated she understood that Narvaez has a son, approximately 3 or 4 years old, who lives with Narvaez's ex-wife in Minnesota. During the interview, Yadira explained she had never met this ex-wife, nor had she met Narvaez's mother. Yadira stated not long ago they were making plans for Narvaez to take Yadira to meet his mother. Yadira stated that she believes Narvaez's ex-wife's name is Carrie Diaz and she lives in Crookston, Minnesota. Yadira stated she does not know the name of Narvaez's mother. Yadira stated that she believes Narvaez has siblings, but she has never met them.

Yadira stated that she works two part-time jobs; one at the Journal Sentinel in Milwaukee as a mailer, where

she works one day a week. She stated she also works at Goodwill as a "pricer" and works 3 to 4 times a week at that store. Yadira stated that Narvaez works as a mover for "Thor's Movers." Yadira stated that she also knows that Narvaez sometimes does tattoo work in Madison to collect extra money.

Yadira stated she remembers Narvaez going to Madison on two occasions. Once was to go to his mother's house to get belongings to move in with her, and the other was for a tattooing job.

Events Leading Up to the Robbery

Yadira stated lately Narvaez was becoming "financially frustrated" because he wanted more money for them to move out of state and to go see his son. Yadira stated she had family out of state that she missed, and Narvaez knew this. Yadira stated she also had her hours cut at her job and this also contributed to his financial stress. Yadira stated Narvaez began asking her what she thought about if he would "go do what he used to do when he was younger". Yadira advised she understood this to mean that he was going to rob banks and believed this because she knew he did this in his past. Yadira stated Narvaez asked if he should do it, to which she told him 'no'. Yadira stated she told Narvaez that she would be getting her tax return soon and they will be fine. Yadira stated recently he thought he had stopped the idea of robbing the bank and when he would talk about it, he was just kidding. Yadira stated on the day prior to the robbery, he asked if he could use Yadira's car to go to Madison for a job. Yadira stated, thinking that he had dropped the idea of robbing the bank, she allowed him to use her vehicle. Yadira explained that Narvaez's vehicle was a 2006 Dodge Durango, navy in color, with a green rear driver's side door. She stated that the Durango is a "beater" and has bad tires and bad brakes. Yadira stated the weather called for rain or snow the following day and so he wanted to take her car to Madison because it ran better. Yadira stated she thought he was coming to Madison to work with tattooing. Yadira stated that day she worked at Goodwill from 8am to 3pm and began to worry when Narvaez was not returning her messages and did not return home. Yadira stated this caused her to worry so she conduct an internet search of "Madison Wisconsin robberies" and that's when she saw news that a bank robbery occurred with someone being killed. She stated, "I freaked out" when she saw the news. She stated she spoke with his Aunt Margaret later, who had confirmed that it was Narvaez who was killed. Yadira stated, "Never in my wildest dreams did I think he would do this. I thought he was joking."

Yadira stated that during the times when Narvaez was talking about doing a job in Madison, she had told him that she was going to pick up extra shifts at work and that they would be fine.

Yadira stated Narvaez treated her and her kids well and that she knew he loved them. She stated he kept telling them not to worry and that everything would be okay. Yadira stated that their expenses were smaller and Narvaez would buy cigarettes every few days, buy a beer every night. She stated they would not spend much going out and they would sit in their rooms, play Angry Birds on their phones together, watch movies, and spend time with their kids. Yadira stated when he had to work, sometimes he would be home late, but he would let her know where he was. Yadira stated she purchased a notebook for him so that he could keep track of his work notes and moving jobs. She stated he would also use napkins to write information down about the jobs also. She stated he would leave those napkins on the table at home. When I asked her about still having the napkins, she stated she believes she has thrown some of those napkins out. She stated those napkins would show addresses and names of clients on them. She stated that she was not sure if he was using the notebook to keep track of his appointments.

Yadira stated she could not remember any time that Narvaez had not come home with extravagant gifts for her during the time they were together. She stated she remembered on her birthday recently he gave her roses and took her to Sybaris. She stated she didn't think anything of these items it because he was working and she though he could afford it.

Yadira then began talking again about him bringing up robbing a bank. She stated he would say, "Hey baby, what do you think if I do a job." She stated that he said, "I can rob this bank that was robbed before". She stated she asked him not to talk like that. She stated she asked him to try to get a full-time job. She stated she knew he was applying for jobs, but because he was a felon, he was having a difficult time getting one.

Yadira stated that a week or two prior the robbery, Narvaez and she drove to Madison as they were thinking about moving to Madison. She stated she remembers that they drove in the Middleton area and also up near the Capitol. Yadira stated it was the very next day that he started talking about robbing a bank. She stated on Wednesday of this week "he was on this itch that he didn't want to let go of." Yadira explained that this meant he frequently talked about a bank robbery and said to her, "Baby what if I did a job?" Yadira stated that he advised her that they could then go to Mississippi to see her family and that he would then be able to see his son. Yadira stated last week he continued to talk about the robbery, so she finally told him to do what he wanted, but to not bring anything to her home and she did not want to know anything about it.

Yadira stated that the last time she knew Narvaez went to see his son was before last Christmas when he drove his truck up to Minnesota. Yadira stated that he split up with Carrie Diaz in 2016 or 2017. She stated that Narvaez did not want the divorce and he loved his wife.

Yadira stated that she met Narvaez's dad in September when they had gone over to his residence. She stated that she knew that his father had been in jail, was on parole, and there was a falling out between the two of them. Yadira stated that his dad informed her that he was in a gang, but Narvaez was not in a gang. She stated that Narvaez was always with her kids and her, if he wasn't working. Yadira stated that Narvaez stayed away from his mom and dad because he decided that they wanted nothing but positive in their lives. She stated that he does not have a close relationship with either parent.

Day of the Robbery

She stated on the day of the robbery, when she went to work, he was awake but still lying in bed. Yadira stated she sent him a message stating that she made him a sandwich and provided him with cream soda in a brown bottle and a gray and black water in a bottle to take with him. Yadira stated after she sent him a text message about the sandwich and soda, he replied back for her to be careful with the Durango because of the bad brakes, to which she replied, "Okay." She stated later in the day, she called and texted him but got no response, which she found to be unusual. She stated the last time she texted him and received an answer was between 7 and 9 am. She stated she was upset because he was not responding and she did not hear from him. She stated because of this, last night she deleted those text messages, some pictures, and his contact last night.

Yadira stated last night Margaret, his aunt, who lives across the hall from her, came over and told her that the

person killed in the bank robbery was Narvaez. Yadira stated that she believed that Margaret was called by Narvaez's mother, who passed on the information after learning about it from the police. Yadira stated that Margaret informed her Narvaez's mom either didn't answer the door for the police, or closed the door on the police when they contacted her. Yadira stated she tried to call the police after-hours, but the number she dialed indicated they were closed.

Yadira stated that she tried to contact Narvaez's ex-wife, Carrie Diaz, to let her know about what had happened. She stated that she used Facebook to find information about her and eventually send her a Facebook message. Yadira stated Diaz replied to her message and asked Yadira why she did not stop him.

Narvaez Belongings

Yadira stated Narvaez has a small corner where he keeps his belongings in their apartment. She stated he has shoes, clothes, and a suitcase in a little corner of her closet in her house. She stated there are no guns in the house and she has never seen him with one. She stated Narvaez has told her that he can't be around guns. She stated she has not seen any masks or gloves or items she would think was associated with the robbery, in this apartment. Yadira then described a pair of gray gloves that Narvaez uses for moving, however those are on a shelf in her residence at this moment. She stated Narvaez has two black winter hats and one brown winter hat and a few baseball caps. I asked Yadira if she has ever seen him have a face mask before, of any kind, and she indicated she did not.

Yadira stated Narvaez has a cell phone and it is always with him. She stated it is a black Samsung with a black case and has a phone number of She stated she does not know the passcode for the phone and that it may be a pattern code.

Yadira stated Narvaez is not on any medication other than Tums for heartburn. She stated She stated Narvaez does not have any medical or mental health needs, however he has been depressed in the past about the divorce and his son going with his mother.

Yadira stated he has a co-worker named "Joe" that he would work with on moving jobs. She stated she has no doubt that he was involved in the moving jobs because he would come home and talk to her about certain aspects of the job, like if there was a piano or a gun safe that needed to be moved. She stated the financial concerns started when the winter came and the moving job was very slow. She stated the moving jobs picked up last month. She stated sometimes he would even have two jobs in one day and they would be about four hours each. She stated that he would bring home approximately \$200 from a job and take out money for himself for gas, cigarettes, and beer, and give Yadira the rest.

Consent to Search Vehicle

I asked Yadira if she would consent to a search of her vehicle. Yadira did not hesitate. I presented a completed Madison Police Department Consent to Search Vehicle from to her. I showed her the form and read it to her. Yadira signed it, indicating her consent. The signing was witnessed by Detective Deb Plantz. I then provided a photocopy of that consent form to Yadira, per her request. I copied the consent form and property tagged the original as indicated in the header of this report. That copy, along with a copy of the

On the morning of 3/2/18, Detective P Green and I interviewed Narvaez's girlfriend, Yadira Reverol, at EPD. During the course of the interview, Reverol told us that she had last heard from Narvaez via text message or FB Messenger between 7-9am on 3/1/18, but she had since deleted those messages from her phone because she was "mad" at Narvaez.

While Reverol was waiting in the lot of EPD following the interview, she came back in and asking to speak with us again. I re contacted her in the lobby of EPD, and she told me that she had found a text message from Narvaez to her the morning of 3/1/18. She showed me the message, and told me I could take a photograph of it. The photo of the message is attached with this report.

The message was sent on 3/1/18 at 6:47am. At the top of the screen of her phone for these string of text messages, I observed the name Luis and the phone number of back to him on 3/1/18 at 8:07pm appears in a yellow box.

The text message prior to Narvaez's 3/1/18 message is dated 10/15/17.

Interview with Luis E. Narvaez Sr.

On 3/2/18 I was asked to interview Luis E. Narvaez at the East Police District. I was advised that Narvaez was the father of Luis M. Narvaez, who had been shot at the Chase Bank the previous night and was now deceased. Narvaez had arrived at the East Police District with a female identifying herself as Luis Narvaez Jr.'s girlfriend. Detective Sergeant D. Nale assisted with the interview, which was audibly and visually recorded. We started speaking with Narvaez at approximately 10:45am. He had been identified by PO Ott with a WI Id Card.

We extended our condolences to Narvaez and told him we wanted to talk about his relationship with his son. He told us several times that he didn't have much of a relationship with his son, and that "he lived his life and I lived mine". He said that he saw him occasionally, but didn't know where he had been living. He said he thought he may have stayed with his girlfriend, but he had just met her several months ago and wasn't sure. He also said that he thought Narvaez sometimes travelled to Madison to see his mother, but he also wasn't sure how often or where he might stay while in Madison. He stated that he (Narvaez Sr.) had been in prison for 15 years and had one year left on parole. He said he himself had been abandoned and had had a rough life but had paid his debt to society.

He identified his wife and Narvaez's mother as Lorraine Marie, but didn't know where she lived in Madison and said he hadn't spoken to her since 2003. He said they were separated but were still married. When asked about other children that would have been siblings to Narvaez Jr., he said that he had three children but didn't know exactly where they lived. He said that he had a daughter named Lorraine Darcel that lived somewhere in Chicago, and a daughter that lived with Lorraine Marie in Madison, but he didn't know her name, and a son Luis who was 35. He said that his wife had put ideas in the kids' heads about him and wouldn't let him talk to them

Narvaez stated that he knew that his son had been working for a moving company, and that he worked on a computer and put in bids for jobs. He thought he had been working there for the past 4-5 months. He said he had gone to work with him once but didn't know the name of the company. He said that Narvaez also had been married and divorced last year from a woman whose name he didn't know, and that he had a 5 year old child living in Crookston, MN.

He stated that he was very shocked to hear that Narvaez had tried to rob a bank, and said that he had never known him to do something like this before. He said he has never known his son to own or carry a gun, and that he had never talked about having a gun with him or having a permit. He also said that he was unaware if Narvaez had any issues with drugs or alcohol, the said that he was happy his son had been working. He said that he wasn't aware of Narvaez having any financial problems, and said that he was happy his son had been working. When asked if he had any information about whether Narvaez was involved in a gang, he said he suspected that he used to be, although his son had denied that. He said that the way he used to interact with friends when he was younger, around 2003, such as shaking hands, etc, made him suspect Narvaez was gang involved. He made the comment that he was never there for him and he thought he had gotten into the wrong

crowd. He also commented that his birthday was on and his son's birthday was and they had never spent a birthday together.

He told us that he found out about what had happened from Narvaez's girlfriend, who came over to his house last night. He couldn't remember her name as we were talking, and again stated he didn't know where she lived but thought it was near Oak Creek. She told him that Narvaez had been shot while robbing a bank, and that he had had her car while in Madison. She asked Narvaez Sr. to drive her to Madison today to retrieve her car, because she needed it to transport her children. Narvaez said that prior to arriving at the police station today he had not spoken with anyone from the police or medical examiner's office.

Narvaez said that the last time he saw his son was this past Wednesday, when Narvaez had stopped by his house and they said "hi and bye" and he looked happy. He said that Narvaez never said anything about his plans. He repeated several times that he and his son didn't talk much, and he didn't really have any information about where he was staying or what he was doing. He said he was shocked his son did this, and again stated that he thought his son was doing good. He said that if he did stuff like this he didn't know about it.

Narvaez asked several times about what happened, and whether his son had a gun or not. He also asked several times if his son had been shot in the back. We advised Narvaez that we did not have that information and that the investigation was still ongoing. Narvaez was very understanding but did get emotional several times during our interview.

Det. Sgt Nale and I talked with Narvaez about the role of the Medical Examiner's Office and provided him with their number. We advised that they were conducting an autopsy and they could speak with him further after that was concluded. Narvaez spoke with me about being on parole and that he was concerned because he had left Milwaukee County to come to Madison. I assured him that I would be happy to speak with his parole officer to explain the circumstances and provided him with my business card. We also provided him with the business card of Det. Hull for any further questions regarding the case.

We gave Narvaez a soda and escorted him to the lobby area of East PD at the conclusion of our interview, thanked him for his time and advised that he could wait there until the other interview was finished. I told him that we would attempt to update him on the status of the case as best we could. Narvaez thanked us for speaking with him.

Narrative:

On 3/2/18 I received a laboratory request from Detective Ortega-Mendoza regarding a homicide investigation. I was acting in my official capacity as an Investigator with the City of Madison Police Department Computer Forensic Shared Resources Partnership (CFSRP). Detective Ortega-Mendoza requested I examine the above listed cell phone and document available data. Detective Ortega-Mendoza provided me with a signed consent form authorizing the search of the device's contents.

Detective Ortega-Mendoza brought the phone to the SRP office where I began the examination process. I began the examination at approximately 9:25am on 3/2/18. I removed the phone from its evidence packaging. I noted that the phone was powered off. I took overall photographs of the phone. I surrounded the phone in radio frequency shielding material and powered it on. I placed the phone into airplane mode at approximately 9:30am on 3/2/18 in order to prevent it from connecting with the cellular network.

File System and Logical Extractions:

I determined that I would use the Cellebrite UFED 4PC system to conduct file system and logical extractions from the phone. The file system extraction is a download of the accessible files in the cell phone's logical memory. This download can then be analyzed by the UFED Physical Analyzer application to identify data stored within the logical memory. I subsequently conducted a logical extraction in an effort to obtain additional data. I noted that the logical extraction did not appear to contain data from the device's calendar application. I used the UFED Physical Analyzer application to examine the information that was extracted by the Cellebrite UFED 4PC.

Extraction Results:

I merged the results of the file system and logical extractions in UFED Physical Analyzer. I then used UFED Physical Analyzer to create a merged Cellebrite report.

Dates and Times: The dates and times listed in the UFED Physical Analyzer File System and Logical report are documented in local time. At the time of this report Madison, Wisconsin is in Central Standard Time (CST) which is six hours behind Universal Coordinated Time (i.e. UTC-6). Calls or texts that occur during Central

Daylight Time (CDT) are five hours behind Universal Coordinated Time (i.e. UTC-5). I did manually check a number of call history times on the phone to confirm that the date and time stamps on the cell phone correctly corresponded to the dates and times listed in the UFED report.

On 3/2/18 at 9:31am I verified the date and time on the phone by comparing it to the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) website clock.

Manual Examination:

I noted that Cellebrite UFED Physical Analyzer did not appear to parse data from a number of applications including Mail, #GroupMe, and Snapchat. On 3/2/18 Detective Plantz responded to the CFSRP laboratory and manually examined the contents of the device. I documented one specific item with photography per Detective Plantz's request.

Disposition:

I provided a copy of the extracted data documentation to Detective Hull. I also archived the data to the CFSRP server. A digital copy of all extracted data documentation is available upon request. I returned the phone to its evidence packaging and provided it to Detective Plantz at approximately 2:45pm on 3/2/18. NFA.

On 03/02/18, Lt. Schiferl advised that I had to assist Inv. Shaul with Shaul, and he explained that the equipment that they use to process the cell phones does not always copy all of the information from the phone, and a detective was needed to further look into the phone. I responded down to the CCB, and Inv. Shaul gave me a list of applications which were on the phone that did not get downloaded in his analysis of the phone.

One of those applications was Snapchat. Inv. Shaul showed me how to review various areas within the Snapchat application on this phone. The app showed that someone was using Snapchat on this phone on the afternoon of 03/01/18. There are communications on Snapchat starting at approximately 3:11 PM and ending at 4:46 PM:

4:34 PM Sent Snapchat text to of "ok."

I then reviewed his email application, and didn't really find anything of much note.

On 02/26/18 there was an email in which he canceled a \$211.11 order through bulkammo.com for 1000 rounds of 9mm ammo.

In his inbox, there were several payment emails from Bobbi Randall, Inc. There were several emails regarding guard jobs from a Jess Randall at the email of

In October of 2017, he was receiving emails from resume.com, and based on other emails on the phone as well he appeared to be working on putting his resume together.

On 10/09/17, there is an email from WI DOC for a CCW payment that was made.

On 03/01/18 at approximately 4:04 PM, he sent an email to <u>live.me@cmcm.com</u> asking them to terminate his account, which was under <u>live.me@cmcm.com</u> be a social media site which you can use to post live videos.

There was an application where some photos were stored on this phone. I did see a photo of what appeared to be a semi-auto, possibly a 9mm, with stars on the exterior of the handgun. The gun was photographed in someone's lap and had a caption on it. I believe this photograph was a photo from something that was posted on Instagram. There might have been an Instagram emblem or something on the photograph, and there was some writing on the photo about having a gun and being a badass. I asked Inv. Shaul to photograph the actual image from the phone.

I didn't see anything else of note in this phone. The phone was turned over to me by Inv. Shaul at

NARRATIVE

On 03/01/18, Madison Police Department (MPD) officers responded to a bank robbery/death investigation at the Chase Bank at 4513 Milwaukee St. in the City of Madison, County of Dane, State of Wisconsin. See previous reports.

CONTACT YADIRA REVEROL

On the morning of 03/02/18, I learned that the live-in girlfriend of the deceased came to the East District Station. Det. P. Green conducted an interview with Reverol. Please see his report for full details. Det. Green advised me that Reverol provided consent to search her vehicle, which was used in the bank robbery. Det. Green informed me that Reverol had requested some of her property, more specifically a children's car seat, a jacket, and a small cardboard box containing labels for Reverol's work. Based on her cooperation, I agreed to retrieve these items from the Dodge sedan, which was located at the MPD Vehicle Impound Facility (VIF).

At approximately 12:16 pm, Det. Green and I responded to the MPD VIF. I located the black four door Dodge Stratus which displayed Wisconsin license plate ABM 4805. A Wisconsin Department of Transportation records check showed Reverol as the registered owner. I observed a children's car seat unattached in the backseat. At 12:17 pm, I broke the evidence tape on the rear driver side door, entered the vehicle, and removed the car seat. I closed the door and re-sealed the read driver side door.

I did observe a jacket on the front driver seat. It appeared to be a men's jacket. I had Det. Green confirm with Reverol (through Det. Plantz) that the jacket belonged to the deceased, Luis M. Narvaez. I had Det. Plantz advise Reverol that I would not be releasing the jacket until it could be determined to have not been worn during any other crimes. Reverol advised Det. Plantz that there was a small cardboard box in the center console. This box, according to Reverol, contained some sort of labels for her job at Goodwill. I broke the evidence tape on the front passenger side door, entered the vehicle, and removed the small box from the center console. I took photos with the East District camera. See attached compact disc.

I responded back to the East District Station where I provided Reverol (ID'd verbally) with the two items. I

informed Reverol that I would like her consent to search the residence she shared with Narvaez in Milwaukee. I clearly told Reverol that this was her choice, and she could say no to allowing me to search her residence. Reverol agreed to allow Det. Ware and myself to search her apartment. We agreed to meet her at a south Milwaukee at 4:00 pm.

Det. Ware and I responded to the Nicholson Ave. address, arriving at approximately 4:15 pm. Reverol allowed us into her home. I found that Reverol, her two children, and Narvaez lived in a two story townhouse. The first floor consisted of a small living room, closet, and galley kitchen/dining area. I asked Reverol if she was still ok with allowing us to search her house for evidence related to this incident and possible other incidents. She said yes, advising that Narvaez did not have much property in her apartment, and she would point us to where his property was located. Det. Ware and I began our search at approximately 4:18 pm.

We began upstairs, which included a small bathroom, a children's bedroom, and the bedroom shared by Narvaez and Reverol. Reverol pointed out where Narvaez had property in the closet. Reverol also pointed out a shelving unit next to the bed, which she said contained property belonging to Narvaez. Det. Ware located a deck of Deadpool playing cards on the top of the shelving unit. I did not seize this item but found it interesting due to our bank robber from December 2017 who wore a Deadpool and Punisher mask over his face. I had still images from those robberies to assist in looking for matching clothing. We did not find any matching clothing in the upstairs.

Prior to going back downstairs, I showed Reverol still images of the Deadpool robberies. I asked if she recognized any of the clothing. Reverol looked at each images closely and stated she did not recall Narvaez having similar clothing. I asked specifically about the Deadpool mask and the Punisher mask. She advised that she had never seen Narvaez in those masks, and her children did not have those masks. I asked if Narvaez was into superheros or comics. She told me that Narvaez did like Magneto, who I know to be part of the X-Men comics. I asked her about the Deadpool cards. According to Reverol, her six year old son, gave those to Narvaez for Christmas this past year. I asked Reverol if the subject in the images matched the body type of Narvaez. Reverol made a sweeping motion by her stomach and said that Narvaez had a "big belly." She did not think the suspect in the images had a big enough belly to be Narvaez.

We went downstairs, and Reverol pointed to a stack of shoes sitting by the front door. Reverol stated that this was only property Narvaez had downstairs. I compared the shoes to the robbery images and did not believe any matched. Det. Ware and I continued our search and did not locate anything of evidentiary value.

I asked Reverol if she has spoken with Narvaez's mother since the incident. Reverol said no, adding that the mother does not want her to come to the funeral. Reverol informed us that Narvaez moved in with her in October or November and prior to that Narvaez was living with his mother in Madison. Reverol stated that Narvaez probably still had property at his mother's house. I asked if Narvaez had a job. Reverol stated that she thought he was working. More specifically, she believed Narvaez was doing tattoos for a shop in Madison.

I knew from talking with Det. Green that Reverol disclosed that Narvaez talked to her about starting to do bank robberies again. Reverol told me that one day he told her, "What do you think if I did a job." Reverol said Narvaez mentioned doing jobs like he did when he was younger. Reverol knew that Narvaez robbed banks in the past, and she tried to talk him out of it. Reverol admitted that they were struggling with money, and this caused Narvaez stress. Reverol stated that Narvaez was "stubborn" about doing robberies.

Reverol stated that she and Narvaez got into psychics and readings. Reverol stated that since the incident she went to her psychic and talked to Narvaez's spirit. According to Reverol, Narvaez spirit told her he was set up. I asked if Narvaez would have had anyone helping him do robberies. Narvaez did not think so, adding that Narvaez did not mention friends by name, instead calling them "my guy(s)." We concluded our contact with Reverol around 4:45 pm. I sent Reverol a text later asking if Narvaez had any diagnosis. She stated that Narvaez told her he

In my previous report, I mentioned collecting and property tagging a wallet collected from Narvaez's body. Prior to securing that items, I took photos of the wallet contents with the East District camera. I placed those photos, photos of my property retrieval from the Dodge, and Narvaez Facebook screen shots onto a compact disc. I property tagged that disc under #404756 and secured the disc in East District locker #40. See attached. NFA.

On 03/01/18, Madison Police Department (MPD) officers responded to a bank robbery/death investigation at the Chase Bank at 4513 Milwaukee St. in the City of Madison, County of Dane, State of Wisconsin. See previous reports.

RELEASE BLACK DODGE STRATUS

Early in this investigation, a black Dodge Stratus was located in close proximity to the Chase Bank. It was determined that the robbery suspect, Luis M. Narvaez, drove this vehicle to the bank robbery. The Dodge Stratus, registered to Yadira Reverol, was towed the MPD Vehicle Impound Facility. Reverol, who was identified as Narvaez' girlfriend, provided a statement and consent to search her vehicle. That search was completed by Det. M. Blake.

I remained in contact with Reverol who repeatedly requested that her vehicle be released. Reverol stated that she had no other form of transportation and needed the vehicle to take her children to school and also to get to work. I received approval from the Dane County District Attorney's Office to release the Stratus to Reverol. On 03/06/18, I sent a request to the MPD property room to release the Stratus. On 03/08/18, I learned that the Stratus had been towed to Schmidt's Towing. I left a message on Reverol's phone advising that her vehicle was ready for pick up.

ADDITIONAL REVEROL STATEMENT

On 03/02/18, I conducted a search at Reverol's Milwaukee address. I completed a report of that contact. In that report, I forgot to include on statement made by Reverol. While searching a pile of shoes by the front door, Reverol offered that Narvaez had another pair of shoes, which she described as navy blue Converse sneakers. Reverol did not know where the shoes were and wondered whether they would be at Narvaez's mother's house. I found this important as the suspect in the 12/04/17 bank robbery at the Chase at 4513 Milwaukee St. wore dark colored Chuck Taylor Converse sneakers. NFA.

Narrative:

On 3/8/18 I received a laboratory request from Detective Hull regarding a homicide investigation. I was acting in my official capacity as an Investigator with the City of Madison Police Department Computer Forensic Shared Resources Partnership (CFSRP). Detective Hull requested I examine the above listed cell phone and document available data. Detective Hull advised that the phone's owner, Luis Narvaez, was deceased.

I retrieved the phone from the Madison Police Department Property Room. I transported the phone to the SRP office where I began the examination process. I began the examination at approximately 2:54pm on 3/8/18. I removed the phone from its evidence packaging. I noted that the phone was powered off. I took overall photographs of the phone. I noted that the back of the phone appeared to have been colored on by marker or ink. I was able to remove a portion of this ink in order to see the device's information.

I surrounded the phone in radio frequency shielding material and powered it on. I noted the phone was protected by an unknown passcode that is at least 4 digits in length. At the time of this writing, the passcode is unknown. I was unable to place the phone in airplane mode or power the phone off without the passcode. I noted that there was not a SIM card inserted in the phone and it appeared the phone was not connected to the cellular network as a result. I noted the phone displayed a message, "No SIM card-Emergency calls only."

File System Extraction:

I determined that I would use the Cellebrite UFED 4PC system to conduct a file system extraction from the phone. I noted that the only available file system extraction bypassing the user passcode was a partial file system extraction. This partial file system extraction was ultimately successful and appeared to be comprised mainly of media.

I used Cellebrite UFED 4PC to attempt to remove the device's lock, but was unsuccessful. I also attempted additional physical extractions of the device that indicated that they could potentially bypass the user lock. These extractions were also unsuccessful. Should the correct passcode be determined, additional extraction attempts can be made.

Dates and Times: The dates and times listed in the UFED Physical Analyzer Partial File System report are documented in local time. At the time of this report Madison, Wisconsin is in Central Standard Time (CDT) which is five hours behind Universal Coordinated Time (i.e. UTC-5). Calls or texts that occur during Central Standard Time (CST) are six hours behind Universal Coordinated Time (i.e. UTC-6).

Charles Daehling identified Randall as his boss through what Daehling identified as Optimal Protection Services. On 3/8/18 at approximately 3:35 PM, I called and spoke to Jess L. Randall. Also present for this phone interview was Detective Mark Hull. Randall identified himself verbally as the owner of his company, Bobbi Randall Incorporated. Randall said he is located at 2875 W. Highway 91 in Blair, Nebraska (Fax: 402-426-8801). Randall told me that his company receives contracts in different ways, including through companies like Pinkerton and Integrity. Randall said it is his choice if he accepts the job contract, which he called "10-99's." Randall said if he accepts the contract, he disseminates the contract through "leads" in different areas. Randall said the leads then send out the contracts to "individual contractors," such as Randall said the independent contracts are then organized by Randall under the company Strategos International in Grandview, Missouri. I later found the address for Strategos International to be 12911 US Highway 71, Grandview, MO, 64030.

Randall informed me the independent contractors do not receive any formal training from his company or Strategos. Randall said he directs the contractors to dress in "professional attire" but are not provided or instructed to wear uniforms. Randall said the Chase Bank contract for 4513 Milwaukee Street included one armed guard and Randall believed it called for the firearm to be concealed. Randall said he would provide me this information at a later date but said he initially received this request from Matt Dookins (ph) at Pinkerton Security. Randall said upon accepting the contract, would not have been provided the details of the past robberies at that branch. Randall said the started this contract at Chase three weeks ago, but did not have the exact date.

Randall said his company did not provide or any of the contractors with any training and said this is the responsibility of the contractor. Randall said his company did not provide with any standard operating procedures for robberies. Randall said he only uses contractors with prior law enforcement or military experience. Randall said he could not think of any contractors that he has employed or contracted with that were not former military or law enforcement.

Randall said he started working with the property in June 2017, after he was referred by another independent contractor, (ph). Randall said first worked for the property and since, has taken several contracts. Randall said has not had any complaints and described as professional, respectful, and polite.

I spoke with Special Agent S. Hoffman with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to ask if the FBI could attempt an extraction. Agent Hoffman advised that the FBI CART unit would attempt a data extraction. On 03/14/18 at 2:45 pm, I responded to the MPD property room where I retrieved the cell phone (#404674). I responded to the Madison office of the FBI where I met Agent Hoffman. I turned the cell phone over to Agent Hoffman at approximately 3:16 pm. At the time of the report, I do not have the results of the second extraction. NFA.

I asked Romero-Ortega to tell me about Narvaez's employment at Tattoo Addiction. Romero-Ortega was quick to distance himself from Narvaez. Romero-Ortega stated that Narvaez was not a paid employee at Tattoo Addiction. Romero-Ortega described Narvaez as an apprentice, meaning that Narvaez would come in occasionally and do drawings of possible tattoos. I asked if Narvaez ever did any tattoo at the shop, and Romero-Ortega said no. I asked if Narvaez was ever paid for any work at Tattoo Addiction, and Romero-Ortega said no. I asked if Romero-Ortega had any time cards, appointment books, or other records that would show when Narvaez was at the shop. Romero-Ortega said no. It became very apparent to me that Romero-Ortega did not wish to speak with me, particularly when he told me that he knew it was his right to not speak to me. That being said Romero-Ortega continued to talk.

I asked when he last saw Narvaez. Romero-Ortega stated he thought it was 2 or 3 weeks prior to his death. Romero-Ortega remained non-committal on this particular point adding it could have been longer than that or shorter. I asked how often Narvaez would come to the shop, once a month, twice a month, or three times a month. Romero-Ortega again said he was not sure. It could be more it could be less. SAMSUNG S6 REVIEW

On 03/08/18, Inv. B. Shaul with the MPD Forensic Services Unit conducted a data execration from a Samsung S6 located in the suspect vehicle. According to Inv. Shaul, a partial data extraction was conducted due to the phone be passcode protected. The phone number associated with the Samsung S6 was not included in the partial data extraction. At this point, the only information I had was Luis Narvaez had a Samsung cell phone, which matched the cell phone in our possession. I then turned over the cell phone to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) for another attempt at a full data extraction. I learned from Special Agent S. Hoffman that the FBI did not have success with a data extraction on the Samsung S6.

I then reviewed the DVD containing Inv. Shaul's limited data extraction, which mainly included photos from the Samsung S6. Upon viewing the numerous photos, I observed that the vast majority of the photos were of a female. Some of those photos included other females, a male, and children. I only located a couple of photos (same photo) of Narvaez with this female. I saw a banner across the middle of the photo that said "cousins." The fact that only a couple of images on the photo contained Narvaez led me to question whether or not this was actually Narvaez's cell phone.

I made phone contact with Narvaez's girlfriend, Yadira Reverol. I asked what type of phone Narvaez had, and she said a Samsung S8. I asked if he had an S6, and she said not her knowledge. I asked her what sorts of pictures Narvaez would have on his phone, and she said pictures of her and Narvaez, family, and his son. When viewing pictures on the S6 I did not see any photos of Narvaez and Reverol. I sent Reverol the picture of Narvaez and the unknown female. Reverol would only tell me that this was a relative of Narvaez and would not provide any other information. I asked where Narvaez's cell phone was located, and she claimed that she did not know.

On 04/17/18, I spoke with Narvaez's mother, Lorraine Narvaez. She confirmed that she purchased Narvaez's cell phone and paid for the bill. Lorraine stated that Narvaez had a Samsung S8, and she also
