

Districts the GOP hopes to flip

The Republican Party of Wisconsin has pointed to three districts in both the Assembly and Senate - that are currently held by Democratic lawmakers - as possible flip districts in the 2020 election. If the party holds all existing seats and adds three in both chambers, Republicans would hold a supermajority that would allow them to override vetoes by Democratic Gov.

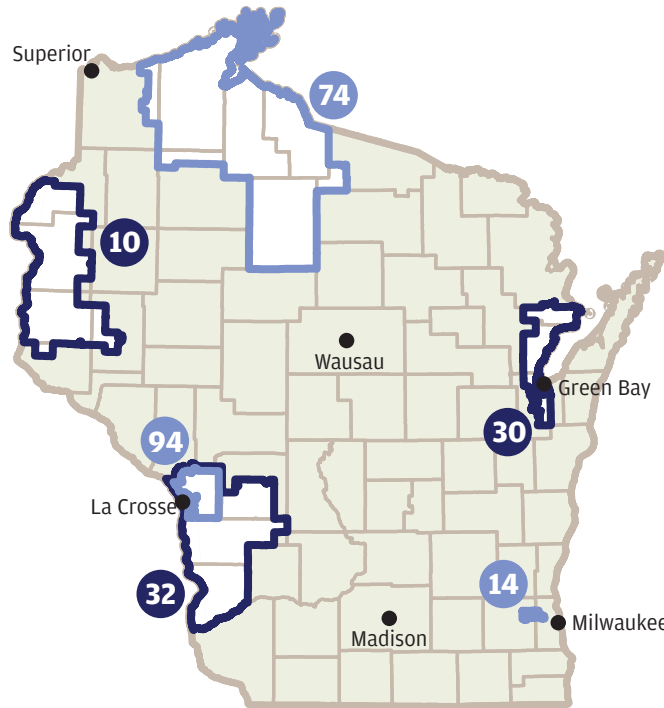
SENATE DISTRICT 10

2018 RESULT

2020 PREVIEW

Incumbent Sen. Patty Schachtner, D-Somerset, will face either current state Rep. Rob Stafsholt, R-New Richmond, or Cherie Link, a Somerset retail store owner, after a winner is decided in the August primary. Schachtner was elected by a little more than 2,000 votes in a 2018 special election and Stafsholt has served four years in the Assembly.

2020 PREVIEW

Incumbent Rep. Beth Meyers, D-Bayfield, is slated to face Republican James Bolen, of Cable. Meyers was first elected to the Assembly in 2014 and is currently the minority caucus secretary. Bolen is a resort manager and Bayfield County Economic Development Corp. board member. He served as executive director for the Cable Area Chamber of Commerce for about 15 years.

2020 PREVIEW

Incumbent Sen. Dave Hansen, D-Green Bay, will not seek another term. Former north region of Aurora Healthcare president Sandra Ewald of Green Bay, and Hansen's nephew and De Pere City Council member Jonathon Hansen of D-De Pere, face each other in the August Democratic primary. Eric Wimberger, a Green Bay lawyer, is running again as a Republican.

SENATE DISTRICT 32

2020 PREVIEW

Former Senate Minority Leader Jennifer Shilling is not seeking another term this fall. Three Democrats, nurse Jayne Swiggum of Gays Mills, Paul Michael Weber of La Crosse, and former state Agriculture Secretary Brad Pfaff of Onalaska, face each other in the August primary. La Crosse Republican Dan Kapanke, was elected to the Senate seat twice before losing to Shilling in a 2011 recall election in which she received 55% of the vote. In a 2016 rematch, Shilling won by only 61 votes.

2020 PREVIEW

Incumbent Rep. Robyn Vining, D-Wauwatosa, will face one of three Republican challengers - Bonnie Lee, a Wauwatosa director of outreach ministries at Northwest Baptist Church; Steven Shevey, a Brookfield resident who ran unsuccessfully as a third-party candidate in 2018; and Linda Boucher, an Elmbrook School Board member from Brookfield who ran unsuccessfully in the 2018 Republican primary.

2020 PREVIEW

Incumbent Rep. Steve Doyle, D-Onalaska faces Republican Kevin Hoyer, of West Salem. Doyle won a 2011 special election and is currently minority caucus vice-chairman. Hoyer is a farmer and La Crosse County Board supervisor.
