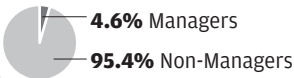


# Wage changes for Wisconsin's most common occupations

When 2006-16 average annual wages for the most common occupations in the state are adjusted to 2016 dollars, wages for many of the state's low-skill occupations haven't kept pace with inflation.
