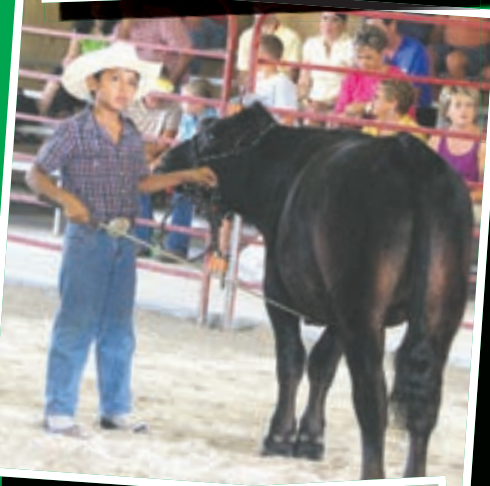

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Animals/weapons/dress code rules

NO animals or reptiles allowed on fairgrounds. The only exceptions are those being entered into a class on that day or dogs for the sight impaired. NO weapons permitted. No one shall enter the fairgrounds carrying a weapon of any kind. This prohibition includes persons licensed, by state law, to carry concealed deadly weapons, and all other persons who are not law enforcement officers required to carry weapons to fulfill their duties. Shirts and shoes are required at all times on the Meade County Fairgrounds.

Fair Rules & Regulations

The fair is planned and conducted according to Kentucky Department of Agriculture regulations for the use of state funds.

Everyone pays \$10 admission which includes all events, parking and Midway.

1. Gate admission will constitute entry fee for all contests not having an entry fee.
2. There shall be no entry fee for exhibits.
3. Adult classes open to all exhibitors.
4. All exhibits must be owned by the exhibitor.
5. All exhibits remain the property of the exhibitor.
6. Premiums not filled remain the property of the Meade County Fair, Inc.
7. No combinations allowed except Junior Agriculture groups.
8. All exhibitors must secure a release from superintendent before removing exhibits from departments.
9. Any exhibits judged unworthy of showing shall not be exhibited. (Decision rests with superintendent of department.)
10. Any article exhibited that is not included in the premium list shall not be awarded a premium.
11. The management shall use the utmost care to guard and protect exhibits, but will not be responsible should losses or damages occur.
12. No exhibitor shall be allowed more than two exhibits in any one ring.
13. Exhibitors shall at all times give the necessary personal attention to whatever they may have on exhibition and at the close of the fair take charge of the same.
14. Premium checks will be mailed after the fair, as soon as possible.
15. Any premium check not cashed within 90 days after issue will be forfeited to Meade County Fair, Inc.
16. Experienced judges shall be engaged to judge the exhibits.
17. The decision of the awarding judges shall be final.
18. Premium ribbons have no value as to payment of premiums since premiums shall be paid from the record of the superintendent.
19. Any exhibitors attempting to interfere with the judges during the adjudications shall be promptly excluded from competition.
20. Vegetables shall be judged on marketable quality and usability.
21. The Meade County Fair shall furnish space on the fairgrounds for all exhibits, including pens for swine, dairy and beef, horses and mules.
22. Exhibitors shall furnish all necessary halters for dairy, beef, horses and mules.
23. Exhibitors shall furnish container for all exhibits such as: field seed and grain, fruits and vegetables, plants and flowers, etc.
24. Feed and bedding must be furnished by exhibitor of livestock.
25. Entries in the 4-H Club and Future Farmers of America classes are eligible to enter the Open Class rings, **unless otherwise stated in departments.**
26. The Meade County Fair will furnish a space for exhibits, exhibitors and spectators, but will not be responsible in case of loss or injury to either. Any questions not covered by the above rules and regulations shall be answered by the fair committee.
27. No premiums shall be paid if any of the above are broken.
28. Second prize money will be paid if there is only one entry except in animal classes.
29. All premium money will be prorated on percentage basis provided net profit does not exceed premium list.
30. Persons found guilty by the Meade County Fair of misconduct will forfeit any premiums and be asked to remove exhibits from grounds.
31. No reservations will be made for stalls. The stalls will be furnished on a first-come, first-served basis.
32. All 4-H and FFA entries must have been produced in conjunction with an approved project.
33. All entries and exhibits will be accepted between 8 a.m. and 1 p.m., Monday, July 22, **unless otherwise stated in departments.**
34. All entries will be picked up Sunday, July 28, between 2 and 3:30 p.m. NO EXCEPTIONS.

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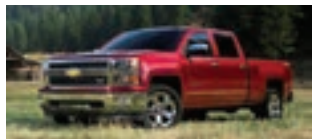

SUPER FARM STOCK

1. Super Farm Stock will run any gear. (3 mph max.)
2. Tires sizes 15.5 x 38 max, or 14.9 x 30, 16.9 x 28 (16" rim max), 18.4 x 38 7,000 lbs.-8,500 lbs. (16" rim max). Front tires must be at least 14" and AG tires (3 rib or multi-rib allowed).
3. Top cut tires allowed. – No front edge cut allowed.
4. Stock sheet metal and hoods. Stock wheel base.
5. 1959 and older.

MODIFIED STOCK

1. Modified stock will run any gear (4 mph max.)
2. Tire size will be 18.4 x 38. Cut tires allowed.
3. Stock sheet metal and hoods. Stock wheel base.
4. 1959 and older.

PRO STOCK

1. Pro stock will run any gear (6 mph max.)
2. Tire size will be 18.4 x 38. Cut tires allowed.
3. Stock sheet metal and hoods. Stock wheel base.
4. Dead man throttles, except hand clutch tractors (hand must be on the clutch while pulling) are recommended.

SUPER PRO STOCK

1. Super Pro Stock will run any gear (8 mph max.)
2. Tire size will be 18.4 x 38. Cut tires allowed.
3. Must run side shields 1/16" steel or 1/8" aluminum.
4. Stock sheet metal and hoods. Stock wheel base.
5. Dead man throttles, except hand clutch tractors (hand must be on the clutch while pulling) are recommended.
6. 1959 and older.

OPEN PRO STOCK

1. Open Pro Stock will run any gear (12 mph max.)
2. Tire size will be 18.4 x 38. Cut tires allowed.
3. Must run side shields 1/16" steel or 1/8" aluminum.
4. Stock sheet metal and hoods. Stock wheel base.
5. Dead man throttles, except hand clutch tractors (hand must be on the clutch while pulling) are recommended.
6. 1959 and older.

LOCAL COUNTY FARM STOCK CLASS

1. Must have kill switch and wheelie bars.

Rules

All Classes 3500# to 8500# Classes

This is not a rule change – only a clarification: **NO front-mount fuel tanks, chrome or aluminum ANYTHING allowed in Farm Stock.**

1. Drivers must be 14 years of age or older. Those under 18 years of age must have parental guardian permission.
2. Drivers must stay on the seat of the tractor at all times. Hands must be on the steering wheel, hand clutch, or throttle. Feet must stay on platform at all times during the pull.
3. Any tractor or puller found to be unsafe or illegal may be disqualified or barred from hooking. No alcoholic beverages will be permitted during pull.
4. Any tractor parts falling off (weights, fly wheel, covers, etc.) while hooked to the sled will be disqualified.
5. Wheelie bars are required. Materials used must be strong enough to support the weight of the tractor when a jack is placed under the pad. Each pad must be at minimum of 5" square. The pad must extend past the edge of the tire diameter by a minimum of 2". The distance between the wheelie bars must be at minimum 24" from the outside edge of each pad.
6. Any tractor can pull in a maximum of three classes (one hook per class). Promoter can add amount of hooks per pull.

7. Draw bars will have a maximum height of 20" and no less than 18" from center of axle to hook point. Must be stationary in all directions. The hitch hold must allow hook point to flow freely and be parallel with the ground.
8. Weights must not extend rearward beyond rear tires and cannot be more than 11 feet from the center of the rear axle to furthest point forward. Must be stock wheelbase – cannot be altered.
9. No radial tires. No steel wheels. Two-wheel drive only. No duals.
10. Tractors must be naturally aspirated. All tractors must have a working safety kill switch.
11. Gas, diesel or LP fuels only. No alcohol or nitrous oxide fuels may be used in tractors. Gas is allowed with a maximum of 750 specific gravity. All tractors are subject to random fuel checks. Tractors manufactured to use diesel fuel only cannot be converted to gas or LP.
12. Fan-guards on all tractors (side shield or fan shield). Mandatory.

Jay Miller named 2013 Meade County Fair Person of the Year

Every year, a Meade County Fair volunteer is named Fair Person of the Year. On Feb. 26, fair board president, David Pace announced Jay Miller as the recipient of the award during the fair board dinner at the Farm Bureau building.

"Every year we go through this and try to think who is somebody that stands out? Who is somebody that puts out a lot of effort and work?" Pace said. "Well, that's everybody. How do you pick one person that excels? Well, I want to say the person we've chosen this year has excelled extremely. But we thought this person had won this award before. For some reason, they slipped through the crack and never had won this award."

He jokingly added, "This person has to understand, once you've won this award...you're a lifer! Now I don't have to kneel down in the middle of a whole crowd and in front of his wife and beg to let him stay."

Pace continued, "This past fair was Jay's 30th fair

of working on the truck and tractor pull...30 years. When Ronnie and I took the truck and tractor pull over in 1982, he was one of the first people we asked to help us and he's been here ever since. This is a person who has done a lot and we've seen his children grow up here."

After accepting the award, Jay stepped to the podium and addressed the crowd. "Thank you... appreciate it," he said. "It's been good years, lot of good help. Probably a lot more people out here more deserving than I am to get this. But I appreciate it. Like to thank all the people that's helped me through all the years...the volunteers. That's what it takes for a good fair."

Jay began volunteering at the fair when he was 19 years old. He has served as superintendent of the truck and tractor pulls for a number of years. When asked about his role as superintendent, he said, "Everyone's holding the rope...my job is to keep them all pulling in the same direction."

He praised the work and dedication of the volunteers who assist him during the pulls. "There are some really good volunteers," he said. "I couldn't do it without them."

Jay is a native Meade Countian and a 1981 graduate of Meade County High School. His wife, Dawn, and he have four children - John, 16; Ethan, 14; Cole, 12; and Zoey, 7.

To the Millers, the fair is a family affair. Every member of the Miller family participates in the fair in some capacity.

Besides being the superintendent of the truck and tractor pulls, Jay and Dawn also sell fair admission tickets and work the Ekron food booth. Dawn is a teacher at Ekron Elementary School and all of their children have attended the school at one time or another. The boys park cars during Fair Week and also sell tickets.

After 30 years, Jay may be ready to hand the torch to someone else. "I've had box seats for years and I hardly ever get to sit in them," he said. "I love the fair. I grew up going to the fair. I'll still be doing things at the fair that my kids are involved in...I'll still be around."

DEFINITION OF CATEGORIES FOR STATE FAIR COMPETITION

Vocal: Shall consist of a performance by a vocalist or vocalists. An instrumental accompaniment by the performer or others is allowed, but must assume the pure character of an accompaniment. The test shall be whether the performance would stand alone if the accompaniment was removed. No voice, voices, record or tape with vocal utterance may be used for accompaniment. This includes recorded live voices and voices that are produced and recorded synthetically (i.e. synthesizers or digitally sampled).

Instrumental Solo or Band: Shall consist of a solo instrumental performance without vocal utterance or a band. In instrumental solo, the only accompaniment allowed is a live or taped acoustical piano. If the instrument is piano, no accompaniment is allowed. In the use of electronic keyboard, the contestant must create all sound live on stage.

Dance Solo and Ensemble Categories: Shall consist of a performance by a dancer or dancers. Accompanists are permitted on stage, but must not assume visual importance in the performance. Acrobatics or gymnastics will be judged in another category. Vocal performance will not be judged.

Acrobatic/Gymnastic Solo or Group: Shall consist of a solo or group performance. At least one-third of the performance must be acrobatics or gymnastics, but no more than two-thirds of the performance should be acrobatic or gymnastic movements. This should be a choreographed performance.

Variety: Shall consist of a performance by one or more persons. This category is intended to provide a proper showcase for those acts which are not listed in any other category, ex.: ventriloquist, juggler, comedian. (A vocalist or vocal group accompanying themselves would not normally meet this test.) Assignment to this category is at the discretion of the State Fair. Performers who fit the description of another category may not appear in the Variety category.

Song and Dance: Shall consist of a performance by one or more persons including both song and dance. At least one-third of the performance must be song and at least one-third must be a style of dance. Performers who fit the description of another category may not appear in the Song and Dance category.

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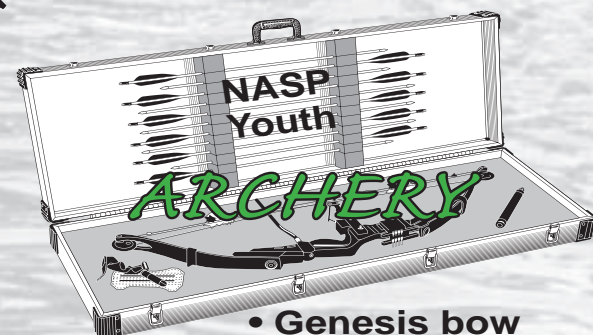

RULES

1. The deck consists of 40 cards – 5 through 14.
2. Nine cards are dealt to each player with the last four cards face down in nest. The dealer must offer a cut before dealing.
3. The highest bid is 100; lowest bid is 65. The dealer must take the bid at 65 if no other player bids.
4. The higher bidder must call his trump color before looking at the nest.
5. The bidder must hold all count cards (5, 10, 14) in his hand. If unable to discard without discarding a count card, the PENALTY is 100 points up for the opposing team and 100 points down for the bidder.
6. The bidder must turn his four discards down when he is ready to play unless discarding trumps which must be turned face up. PENALTY is automatic set: opponents get what they make.
7. In the event of a misdeal, (dealing too many cards to any one player and after any player has looked at his cards), the dealer must deal again. There is no redeal due to the value of the cards.
8. The player sitting to the left of the bidder makes the first lead.
9. In the event of a player renegeing (not following suit when he does have a card of the color led) if the play can be straightened out before the next play with no harm to either side, no penalty applies.
10. If either team reneges, the PENALTY is 100 points up for the opposing team and 100 points back for the team that renegeed.
11. All tricks should be stacked separately; therefore, if either team is accused of renegeing, the cards played to that point are set aside (no looking at this time). The hand is played out. The cards in question are taken off the stack one trick at a time and looked at by all players concerned. If a renege did occur, the penalty in # 10 applies.
12. Cheating in any form – bidding out of turn, signals, bottom dealing, talking (that's my trick, throw on, etc.) or anything to harm the opponents PENALTY is loss of game.
13. If both teams reach 300 or more in the same hand, the bidding team wins.
14. No looking at caught tricks after the first card of the next play is made.

15. No person other than the four players at the table may touch the cards.

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Kissel Entertainment

Turning frowns upside down – for over 70 years!

In the 1930s, Russell Kissel started an amusement park in Coney Island in Cincinnati, Ohio. Seventy years and four generations later, Kissel Entertainment still provides thrilling rides, good food and insurmountable fun to fairgoers in Alabama, Tennessee, Ohio, Georgia and Kentucky. In a nine-month period, the carnival presents approximately 50 events – 18 of those in the state of Kentucky.

Kissel Entertainment has been a major draw to the Meade County Fair for over 40 years. Russell and Tammy Kissel, Clanton, Ala., are the owners of the family-owned and operated carnival. They purchased the company in 2005 from Russell's parents, Mary and Fred Kissel.

During the winter of 2012, the

Kissels bought out the Cumberland Valley Shows, which used to have a contract with the Kentucky State Fair. With this addition, Kissel Entertainment now has 40 rides – including thrill rides, “Atmos Fear,” “Fire Ball,” “Gamma 7,” “Hurricane,” “Thunderbolt,” “Surge,” “Rock ‘O Plane,” and “Mardi Gras.” Kids’ rides include “Runaway Train,” “Dino,” “Rainbow Wheel,” motorcycles, a merry-go-round and much more; 25 Midway games; food concessions approved by the health department; a 51 foot Midway “Welcome” front gate; two cool-down misting stations; shaded rest areas; over 30 courtesy benches; easy to understand posted rules and regulations; unique Midway designs; a costumed mascot available for appearances; and a “safety first” policy.

Kissel Entertainment has over 100 uniformed, well-groomed and courteous staff members who must undergo rigorous scrutiny prior to employment.

“When Tammy and I bought the carnival out, we worked really hard in changing the perception the public has of carnivals and its employees,” Russell explained. “Meade County has a really good outlook about the carnival, but we wanted to do something even more. Anybody that travels with me has to do a background check, a drug screen and random drug tests. It’s not like the old days when it was vagrants and transients doing this kind of thing.” He said that one of the employees, George Rayson, 49, has been with Kissel Entertainment for 36 years.

Russell said that people have a misconceived idea that the carnival takes money out of the county. “This is really the furthest thing from the truth,” he said. “We spend money at local businesses...we have vehicles worked on... get fuel there. I have 120 something people that work for me and they have to eat and go shopping. So, I leave a

lot in town...if I have to buy something, I buy it locally.”

Russell and Tammy have three daughters – Savannah, 19; Paris, 18; and Madison, 15. Russell’s mother; his 80 plus-year-old grandmother, Marie Savaron; his niece and her child; his sister-in-law and brother-in-law, Shannon and Victor Joseph; and his daughters travel with the carnival. “I guess our claim to fame is that we are just really down to earth people and very family-oriented,” Russell said.

He added that he looks forward to coming back to Meade County every year. “We’ve met so many good people and friends in Meade County,” he said. “It is really just like a homecoming when we come back for that week. There’s just so many good people.”

- Safety check: Every vehicle at every event will be checked for a 2 1/2-pound minimum fire extinguisher, seat harness, fire wall/floorboard, fuel tank/cell, roll cage/bar, kill switch on all vehicles except street stock. All super stock, prostock and modified must be 4-WD. Modified and prostock must have 6-point roll cage. A fire suit for these classes will be required. **Every class participant must wear a helmet.**
- Pre-enter: you may pre-enter by telephone only in the event of an emergency.
- Two-minute (2) rule will be explained at each race. If you cannot make the pass, please notify an official immediately.
- Only one (1) money winner per class per vehicle. No driver double entry in any class.
- No double entry in any class for the vehicle. No bumping up a class or down a class.
- No tracking in any class except modified.
- All general and safety rules are in effect for all classes.**

MODIFIED

- Tires: Any size DOT tires. cut/uncut only. Vero-trax OK.
- Any carburetor system OK. Fuel injection OK. Nitrous OK. No nitro. No blowers. No rear engine set-up allowed.
- Any type frame/suspension/body/engine allowed. Driver must be enclosed on all sides.
- Drivershaft loops, u-joints covers, transmission shield or blanket required.
- Properly marked kill switch must be mounted on the rear of vehicle.

PROSTOCK

- Single carb. only. Absolutely no nitrous or alcohol mixtures. If vehicle is capable of running nitrous, then the bottle must be removed and line disconnected at solenoid. Motor placement: 6 inch maximum setback from center of front differential to the front of leading head. Engine swaps OK. No aluminum blocks.
- Any size DOT uncut tires only. 3- or 4-link suspension allowed. Coil over shocks allowed. Stock-type frame. Steel and/or fiberglass body allowed. All doors and sheet metal must be in place. Gutting allowed but must have bed sides. Full firewall must be in place. All vehicles in the class will retain the factory stock appearance. Must be truck or jeep. Wheel/tire will match up under fender as far as length is concerned. No chopping/sectioning/channeling/narrowing. Must have a hood. Up or downdraft headers OK. Drive shaft loops/transmission blanket or shield is required. Two per shaft.
- 4-point harness and helmet required.

SUPER STOCK

- Lateral bars allowed – nonadjustable – no 3- or 4-link. Front suspension – No more than 2 inch block. Rear suspension – Must consist of at least 3 leaf springs. No cut tires – must be DOT stamped.
- All vehicles in this class to be considered street legal. Lights must be operational. Wipers, fans, etc. will be in place but don't have to be operational. Bucket seats or full bench, full dash, glass and door channels required.
- Single carb only. No nitrous or alcohol mixtures.
- Engine swaps allowed. No aluminum blocks. OEM aluminum heads allowed. Proof of OEM availability is driver's responsibility to prove.
- No body modifications (minor trimming of fender openings – 3 inch max.). Nets are permitted in place of tailgate.
- Rear battery allowed. Fuel cell allowed. Both must be secured.
- Exhaust-headers OK – must point up, down or back.
- Roll bar/cage, helmet and seat belts/shoulder harness required.
- Fuel – pump gas only.

STREET STOCK

- Current proof of insurance and registration will be required and must be in the name of the driver or immediate family. **No exceptions and will be enforced.**
- No race trucks. No engine swaps. Everything will be factory available. Lift kits OK. Seat belts and helmets required.
- No open exhaust. Headers OK. Street legal exhaust, wheel/tires will be DOT only.
- Full body required/no modifications: everything will work. Bumpers, tailgates or net required. Open or soft tops must have rollover protection.
- Body, frame and drivertrain must be of the same make.

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Meade
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Meade County Fair history: then and now

Community fairs have been traced back to the time of the Romans, when merchants would travel far and wide to gather and sell goods from all over the world. Fairs during the Renaissance lasted up to 10 weeks, with days rolling into nights full of food and dance. When America was young, town fairs were centered around faith, congregations, and religious holidays. It seems funny to imagine it, but all of those events rolled into one create our own county fairs that we have currently.

It's hard to imagine the Meade County Fair being anything but large and full of excitement. Hundreds of thousands have been attending our fair for the last decade, coming from all over the state and country to see the sights that Meade County has to offer.

You'd never think it, but less than a century ago, the Meade County Fair was tiny. Few community members attended – as little as 500 – and it started as a school event. Children would star in a parade on Main Street, celebrating the start of the school year.

In 1939, the fair was held where present-day Big O Tires sits. It was sponsored by the Meade County Farm Bureau, and was held from Oct. 6-7. Farmers would bring in their livestock and tractors, showing off for

the citizens. It didn't take long for the fair to grow and the location moved from the top of Broadway to Ramsey Field.

The growing didn't stop there.

In the 1950s, the event had grown from one day to three, expanding with more attractions. It was decided that a permanent location for the fair was needed. The location on Hillcrest Drive was purchased and many people said, "No one would drive that far out of town to go to a fair, on a site that was grown up with no road to it!"

That, however, wasn't the case. The one, to three, to five, and now eight-day fair attracts more than 40,000 people...and continues to grow every year. It is recognized as one of the best fairs in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The truck and tractor pull brings in the most patrons, topping off with a whopping 12,000 people in attendance. The fair features include a carnival, agricultural exhibits, crafts, livestock shows, horse shows, food booths, children's activities, demolition derby and more.

In 2010, the Meade County Fair won Most Progressive Fair awarded by the Kentucky Association of Fairs and Horse Shows (KAFFS). The Most Progressive Fair awards are judged in four categories: livestock entries; horse entries; food, crop and youth entries. Each of the four categories are compared both as a number and percent increase or decrease from the previous year. Also considered are

promptness of reports and catalog ratings. County fairs compete for The Most Progressive Fair awards within their respected zones and divisions. An overall winner and runner-up are selected from the six winning counties using the same comparisons.

Even the rich and famous have come to fair. In the early 1960s, Porter Wagner brought a young lady known for her angelic voice and spunky attitude. Wagner said, "This little girl is going to make it big one of these days." And did she ever! That little girl was Dolly Parton.

When asked what the Meade County Fair meant to him, David Pace, president-elect of KAFFS, explained, "Community pride. Everyone works on the fair. It takes every person – volunteers, event participants, those who attend the fair – to have what we do."

Most of us who grew up in Meade County always grew anxious around fair time. Kids would mark their calendars, dreaming of funnel cake and the haunted funhouse. Young men spent countless hours tweaking their demo cars. Farmers all over the community prepared livestock for an entire year. Women baked countless pies and canned their hearts out weeks before until everything was to perfection. Truly, our county fair has become more than a weeklong fanfare; it is a celebrated pastime.

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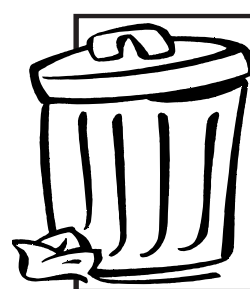

BIG CAR MODIFIED

- Any year sedan or wagon (No imperials)
- Helmet with eye protection and seatbelt must be worn at all times.
- Pits 5 mph max.
- Top 3 cars in feature are subject to re-inspection.
- Any controversies or protest must be brought up before drivers meeting.
- ANY QUESTIONS CALL FIRST, IF IT DOESN'T SAY YOU CAN DO IT, DON'T DO IT. Clarification of... some rules from phone calls may have to be determined the day of the derby, due to interpretation of rules by car builder.
- Judges decision is final.
- All glass, plastic, and interior must be removed before arriving at the derby.
- Motor swaps and interior must be removed before arriving at the derby.
- You may use 1, not both "A" you can have kickers from the front dash bar to the top side of frame behind A arms. 2x2 square tubing or 2" pipe only – no other material may be used. They must be within 2" of A arm; OR "B" a kicker permitted from dash bar to distributor protector. This may not weld or bolt to dist. protector. If using option A, you can leave your distributor protector on the motor, it just can't be connected to the dash bar in any way!
- You can run a 4 point around the driver which consists of a bar across the dash which cannot be within 5" of the firewall. A bar behind the seat and it must be within 12" of the drivers seat. And 2 door bars connecting the dash and seat bar. You can run a rollover bar that has to connect to the rear seat bar. The roll bar can be welded to the frame and bolted in 3 spots to the roof. The roll bar is the only bar that can be welded to the frame.
- You can have a rear window bar which can be 3 inches wide 1/2" thick and be welded to roof and where the trunk lid and speaker deck meet. If you have a slanted roll bar, you cannot run a rear window bar...
- Gas tank protector may be used. These protectors cannot be any wider than 24 inches at the widest point – no exceptions. The protector can go to the rear floor pan but not bolted or welded. If you have gone overboard, you will cut it out.
- Batteries must be moved to passenger floor board and covered.
- All outside body seams may be welded. If floors are rusty, you may patch with sheet metal only.
- Bumper shocks can be welded solid. You can run homemade bumper shocks no longer than 12 inches. You can weld top frame seam with a single 1/4 inch pass only. If car is rusted or pre-ran, you can fix these spots with six 4x4 1/4 inch thick plates – but we must be able to see where car was rusted or bent. No plates on fresh cars, no exceptions!
- Height limit is 22 inches to bottom of bumper max and no lower than 16 inches.
- You can run any year bumper and it can be reinforced. Bumper should be same width and length as stock bumpers. NO homemade sharp points, but can have slight factory angle.
- You may bolt or wire your hood in six places, hood must be 12x12 hole. Core support may be wired to front bumper, but no wire in front of the radiator. You may run two 2 inch wide 1/4 thick straps from core support to bumper. You can run a 36 inch piece of angel in center of radiator support on top. If radiator support needs repaired, you must use sheet metal. Hood must be open for inspection.
- You can weld the trunk with 3 inch 1/4 thick metal. You can run the 3 inch wide 1/4 thick straps from the trunk lid to rear bumper. If car is wedged or unable to see in trunk,

you may be asked to cut a hole in it for inspection reasons.

- You can remove the factory body bolts and replace the 1 inch all thread and 3 inch washers max 1 inch gap between body and frame. You can run all thread up through the hood and use as hood bolt. All washers must be in the frame and not hinder from seeing it in frame.
- You can run rearend protector that must be 6 inches of the rear-end. You can weld or chain coil springs in.
- You may bolt your fenders and quarter panels with up to six bolts. You may repair panels if ripped open, but you can only overlap your rip 1 inch with sheet metal. YOU MAY NOT RE-SKIN YOUR BODY PANELS. IF YOU HAVE GONE OVER, YOU WILL HAVE TO CUT IT!
- You can reinforce the A-frame and tie rods. You can weld A-frame solid to the frame.
- Suspension does not have to bounce. You can run solid suspension such as using all thread as shocks. You cannot convert coil sprung cars to leaf.
- All cars must have fan covered at all times.
- You can run a 22 inch long, 1/4 thick hump plate that has to contour to the frame above the rear-end and be welded to the outside of the frame.
- If your car has leaf springs, you cannot have hump plates.
- THIS YEAR, extra metal and skinning will be cut.

MINI CAR MODIFIED

- Any year, four or six cylinder car with 105.5 inch wheel base or less. Must be unibody and no AMC pacers./ 109" wheel base for front wheel drive cars.
 - Helmet with eye protection and seatbelt must be worn at all times.
 - Pits 5 mph max.
 - Top 3 cars in feature are subject to re-inspection.
 - Any controversies or protests must be brought up before drivers meeting.
 - ANY QUESTIONS CALL FIRST, IF IS DOESN'T SAY YOU CAN'T DO IT, DON'T DO IT!
- *Clarification on some rules from phone calls may have to be determined the day of the derby, due to interpretation of rules by car builder.
- Judges decision is final.
 - All glass, plastic, and interior, must be removed before arriving the derby.
 - Motor swaps are allowed. Motors can be welded or chained with two pieces of chain no longer than 10 inches per chain.
 - Distributor protectors are allowed with a kicker bar, but can't be welded or bolted to the protector. Firewall cannot be reinforced, but you can run a 3 inch wide by 1/2 thick lat window bar, but cannot be welded to the protector.
 - You can run a 4 point around the driver which consists of a bar across the dash which cannot be within 5" of the firewall. A bar behind the seat and it must be within 12" of driver seat. And 2 door bars connecting the dash and seat bar. You can run a rollover bar that has to connect to the rear seat bar. The roll bar can be welded to the frame and bolted in 3 spots to the roof. The roll bar is the only bar that can be welded to the frame.
 - All electric fuel pumps must shut off with key or have a separate switch that is clearly marked.
 - Gas tank protector may be used. These protectors cannot be wider than 24 inches at the widest point, no exceptions. The protector can go to the rear floor pan, but not bolted or welded. If you have gone overboard, you will cut it out.
 - Batteries must be moved to passenger floor board and covered.
 - All body seams may be welded. If floors are rusty you may patch with sheet metal only.
 - Bumper shocks can be welded solid. Bumper shocks must remain in factory location. If you move them, the shock cannot be longer than 12" – no exceptions. You can run homemade bumper shocks (2x2 tubing) but none longer than 12". If car is rusted or pre-ran, you can patch it back with a total of six 4x4 plates 1/4 think max. WE must be able to see the rust and NO plates on fresh cars unless rusted. If pre-ran, must use plates to fix bent spots.
 - Height limit is 22" to bottom of bumper max and no lower than 14 inches.
 - You can run any year reinforced bumper. Bumper should be same width and length as stock bumpers. NO homemade sharp points, it can have slight factory angle.
 - You may bolt or wire your hood in 6 places, hood must have 12x12 hole. Core support may be wired to front bumper, but no wire in front of the radiator. You may run two 2" wide 1/4 thick straps from core support to bumper. You can rub a 24" piece of angle in center of radiator support to top. If radiator support needs repaired, you must use sheet



- metal. Hood must be open for inspection.
20. You can weld the trunk with 3", 1/4 thick metal. You can run three 3", wide, 1/4 thick straps from the trunk lid to rear bumper. If car is wedged or unable to see in trunk, you may be asked to cut a hole in it for inspection reasons.
 21. You cannot weld the sway bar to engine cradle or frame. It must stay in factory location or removed you can weld to lower A-arm.
 22. You may reinforce struts and A-arms, but you cannot completely sleeve the strut. You can weld or chain coil springs in.
 23. You may bolt your fenders and quarter panels with up to 6 bolts. You may repair panels if ripped open, but you can only overlap rip 1" with sheet metal. **YOU MAY NOT RE-SKIN YOUR BODY PANELS. IF YOU HAVE GONE OVER, YOU WILL HAVE TO CUT IT.**
 24. Factory leaf sprung cars can build springs to 5 leafs per side max. Springs don't have to stagger.
 25. Suspension does not have to bounce. You can run solid suspension such as using all thread as shocks. you cannot convert coil sprung cars to leaf.
 26. All cars must have fan covered at all times.
 27. There will be no pinning of frame rails in any way.
 28. Watch schedule for front wheel drive class only.
 29. You can run a back window bar from the roll bar to the back bumper in one spot.
 30. You can run two kickers from front dash bar to the inside part of frame where the motor mounts are connected, or a dash bar to the head plate – **ONLY ONE.**

BIG CAR STOCK

1. Any 1980 or newer sedan or wagon.
2. Helmet with eye protection and seatbelt must be worn at all times.
3. 5 mph limit pit speed at all times.
4. Top 3 cars are subject to re-inspection.
5. Any controversies or protests must be brought up before drivers meeting.
6. **ANY QUESTIONS CALL FIRST, IF IS DOESN'T SAY YOU CAN'T DO IT, DON'T DO IT!**
7. All decisions are final.
8. All glass, plastic, and interior must be removed before arriving at the derby.
9. Motor swaps are allowed.
10. You can weld motor mounts to the frame and run an engine cradle.
11. You can weld a four bar cage not allowed to touch the floor or frame at any point. Back bar has to be within 12" of the front seat. Rollover bars are preferred.
12. Must have stock body bushings and bolt size.
13. No distributor protector or gas tank protector, you can have a gas tank holder that is no closer than 8 inches from backseat area.
14. Battery must be moved to passenger side floor board and covered.
15. Gas tank must be moved to back seat area and covered.
16. Welding of door seems, below the window weld 5 inches on 5 inches off. No solid welding of door strips, no welding above window.
17. Trunk lids, right and left side weld 5 inches on, 5 inches off. Front and back of trunk lid, may be wired in only 4 spots with 3 strands of wire on each.
18. Hood can be bolted or welded in 6 places, no angle iron on fenders and hood.
19. Bumpers can be any year and interchange. Bumpers can also be welded on. Bumper seams cannot be welded.
20. Bumper can only be 22" in front and no lower than 16" in the back.
21. Car suspension must have bounce, not just in tires.
22. You can change rearends, and you can run any rearend.
23. You can put 2 bolts in fenders with a 2" washer on the outside.
24. No welding on the frame. No plates on the frame anywhere. Only place being welded should be motor mounts and bumpers or specified.
25. Must run factory tie rods, but can weld the seam closed.
26. On pre-ran cars only, you can weld 1-3 inch by 5 inch plate 1/4 inch thick per frame rail, where it is bent or broken.
27. NO frame shaping, but you can hammer in spots that are blown out on pre-ran cars.
28. You can have 2 strands of wire from core support to the top of the front bumper (not in front of radiator); 2 strands of wire to the back bumper.
29. Tires round and black.
30. You must call me on any repair for pre-ran cars.
31. You can run no larger than a 3" spacer on core support for fan clearance and the spacer

cannot be welded to the frame.

32. You can run 3/4 inch all thread in front core support through the hood.
33. You can run a transmission protector, but the protector has to stay around the transmission. It cannot brace against the back of motor/heads or cross member.

LAWN MOWER DERBY RULES

SAFETY

1. Driver must have long-sleeved shirt, and pants.
2. Helmet must be worn at all times.
3. Must have some sort of eye protection on.

GENERAL RULES:

1. The garden or lawn mower must have a factory frame—no homemade frames. Max 19 hp. engine, belt-driven, air-cooled.
2. Must be a front engine mower, no rear engines allowed.
3. All mowers must have factory stock engines.
4. Reinforcing the frame is permitted.
5. Transaxles must be factory, reinforcing or spider gears is allowed.
6. Reinforcing around the engine is allowed, but **can't be outside of the hood.**
7. Hoods must remain factory, hoods can be screwed down or welded. If hood is fiberglass, you can make a hood from sheet metal, but it is not allowed to be any bigger than the fiberglass hood was.
8. Brakes must be in operation when pulling in for the heat race, must also have forward and reverse.
9. Gas tank must be fastened with the cap on. If it comes loose or gas leaks, you will be disqualified.
10. Some sort of leg guard is mandatory before entering arena, must go from rear fender to front footrest or frame.
11. **A rear bumper is allowed but can't extend more than four inches out from rear of mower, not the tires. In 2013 the bumper must be no bigger than 3 inches wide and cannot extend past the tire. Rear bumper must be at least 6 inches from the ground.**
12. Pulleys can be changed to increase speed.
13. Drivetrain modifications are allowed but must stay belt-driven.
14. Wheels must be of lawnmower type – no dual wheels, tractor tread and cut tires are allowed. Tires must be lawn mower type.
15. Mower decks must be removed before entrance to pit area, plus all headlights and any other plastics must be removed.
16. Battery can be used to start the mower, but then must be taken out before entering arena. If mower is pull start, you will not be allowed to use it once you enter arena. Absolutely no batteries for any reason can remain in mower. If your mower requires a battery, you cannot run it. Maximum 1/2 gallon of fuel.
17. The front of the frame under grill may be strengthened for hitting but must be a smooth finish. Front bumper cannot cover front tires, maximum 6 inches tall, must be 6 inches off the ground, 2 inches from front frame of mower, bumper must be flat, no points or sharp edges. No bracing at anytime may cover front tires – including leg guards.
18. If a driver rolls over, he or she is disqualified. If any part of your body touches the ground, you will be disqualified also.
19. In the event of a roll-over, the event will be stopped until the officials get the mower upright.
20. Number must be somewhere on each side of the mower. Number may be on helmet also.
21. No wheel weights on at anytime.
22. All of the rules as far as when you are in the arena will be explained at the drivers' meeting.
23. If mower doesn't pass inspection or participant refuses to fix something, there will be no refunds.
24. **OFFICIALS HAVE FINAL SAY, WE RESERVE THE RIGHT TO CHECK MOWER AFTER THE DERBY.**

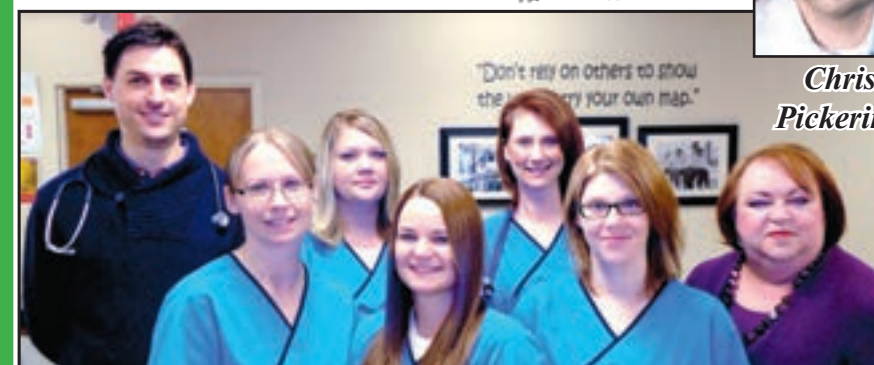

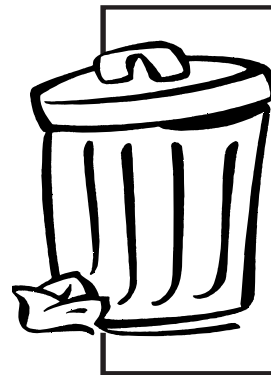

Be creative with your design. Required elements: at least 2 pockets; minimum size of 12 inches in height and 12 inches in width. Item must have at least one functional zipper; and creative stitchery or applied trim to personalize your bag. Optional elements: lining, other type closure as design dictates [button(s), hook and loop tape, or snap(s)]. If bag is not lined, it is suggested that the seam allowances be finished with a bound seam finish. This class is for ages 9-13. **In the documentation include:** your name, your county, the name of the unit, class entered, number of years you have been sewing, cost, and the printed design sheets (one for each pocket selected) from the program, and answers to the following questions:

1. How did you choose the size of your tote bag? Did you use any of the default settings in the program?
2. Did you have any trouble using the software or printing your pattern? Explain
3. Did you download the Wild Things! Program to your home computer or use the program at your county Extension office?
4. Did you make any changes to your pattern after it was printed? If so, tell what you changed.

Senior Division for 4-Hers age 14-18

Senior members may complete the projects in any order and may repeat a level more than one year. **Let's be Casual for ages 14-18.** (Ask your county 4-H agent for a copy)

L-11 Let's Be Casual Clothing Option: 1 or 2 piece complete outfit made from knit or woven fabric such as a dress, top and bottom, simple pajamas, or robe. This class is for ages 14-18.

L-12 Let's be Casual Non Clothing Option: 2 coordinating fashion accessories from the following: wallet, garment bag, purse, backpack or duffel bag. At least one piece must have a zipper. This class is for ages 14-18.

Dress it Up - for ages 14-18. (Ask your county 4-H agent for a copy)

L-13 Dress It Up 1 or 2 piece complete dressy outfit, such as a dress, suit, pantsuit, sport coat and slacks. Fabric choice may be woven, knit or a combination of the two. This class is for ages 14-18.

Match it Up - for ages 14-18. (Ask your county 4-H agent for a copy)

L-14 Match It Up - Clothing Option: Choose at least one item from each group to make a complete 3 or 4 piece coordinated outfit:

- Shorts, pants, or skirt
 - Top, blouse, shirt
 - Vest, jacket, sweater
- At least one piece is required to have regulation set in sleeves. Fabric choice may be woven, knit or a

combination of the two. An accessory item may be included as the fourth piece. This class is for ages 14-18.

L-15 Match It Up--Non Clothing Option: 3 or 4 piece coordinating luggage/travel accessories set. Each piece must have an applied border/trim, pocket and zipper. This class is for ages 14-18.

Creative Expressions - for ages 14-18. (Ask your county 4-H agent for a copy)

L-16 Creative Expression - Clothing Option: Construct a complete outfit for one of the following activities:

- Halloween, theater, or historic costume
- Uniform for medical, cheerleader, dancer, etc.
- Riding apparel

This class is for ages 14-18.

L-17 Creative Expression - Non-Clothing Option: Select one of the following and construct a:

- Fabric doll or animal with a wardrobe of two outfits
- Machine appliquéd specialty flag or decorative banner (minimum size 24 inches x 24 inches)

This class is for ages 14-18. **Leisure Time - for ages 14-18 with advanced skills.** (Ask your county 4-H agent for a copy)

L-18 Leisure Time - Clothing Option: 2 or 3 piece complete outfit. Choose from the following:

- Athletic wear such as leotard, cycling wear, warm-up suit, bathing suit and cover-up, tennis wear
- Pajamas and robe (must use specialty fabric such as terry cloth, flannel, fleece, nylon tricot)
- Raincoat and hat or rain suit

This class is for ages 14-18.

L-19 Leisure Time - Non-Clothing Option: Kite (minimum size 2ft x 3 ft) - This class is for ages 14-18.

Formal Affair - for youth ages 14-18 with advanced skills. (Ask your county 4-H agent for a copy)

L-20 Formal Affair - 1 or 2 piece complete outfit, such as a prom dress, bridesmaid dress, or tuxedo. Fabric choice may be woven, knit or a combination of the two. This class is for ages 14-18.

Tailor Made - for youth ages 14-18 with advanced skills. (Ask your county 4-H agent for a copy)

L-21 Tailor Made - Suit, jacket, or coat, made from 100% wool or at least 60% wool blend fabric. Traditional or speed tailoring techniques must be used to create structure in the areas of the neck, shoulder, and hemlines.

Do not include non-wool/wool blend coordinates. This class is for ages 14-18.

Upcycle - for youth ages 14-18 with advanced skills; See publication: http://www2.ca.uky.edu/4hguidefiles/sewing/Senior_Sewing_Upcycle_Project.pdf

L-22 Upcycle - item sewn from recycled/repurposed garments: Sew a garment or fashion accessory from previously worn garments. Recycled fabric is to be the major component of the item. Recycled garments may be cast-offs from the member's family/friends or purchased at a yard sale or similar low cost source.

Additional documentation is required. In documentation, include the following: your name, your county, the name

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of the unit, class entered, number of years you have been sewing; a "before" photo of all recycled items used; source of the recycled garment; how the design was created; and any design drawings that were used in the creation. "Deconstructed" T-shirts which do not include sewing skills do not fit this class. Items for the home do NOT fit this class. Items which do not include sewing as a major means of reconstruction are not eligible for this class. See publication: http://www2.ca.uky.edu/4hguidefiles/sewing/Senior_Sewing_Upcycle_Project.pdf
This class is for ages 14-18 with sewing skills.

DIVISION 2 – 4-H Needlework Department

1. Item(s) must be clean to be accepted for judging. Previous wearing/using is acceptable (and strongly encouraged!), but item must be clean.
2. An item will not "knowingly" be accepted for judging if it does not meet the category description. Any item not meeting the project requirements will be judged but will not be considered for class champion.
3. Items entered must be completed by the exhibitor within the current project year.
4. Additional documentation *may* be required. Refer to the specific project for details. A copy of the pattern used must accompany project if pattern is not from the Kentucky 4-H Needlework Notebook. Please label pattern with entrant's name and county and attach to exhibit. Patterns will be returned.
5. 4-H Needlework entries will be divided into the following levels and classes:

CROCHET

L-23 Item made of worsted yarn and single or double crochet stitches: Scarf, purse, belt, hat, pillow, two washcloths (made from worsted weight cotton yarn), or doll afghan using single or double crochet stitches with medium worsted weight yarn.

L-24 Item made with novelty yarn and single

and/or double crochet stitches: Scarf, purse, belt, hat, pillow, or doll afghan using single and/or double crochet stitches. Use novelty yarn (yarn other than worsted weight). May include increase/decrease stitches.

L-25 Larger item(s) made with single and/or double crochet stitches: Pair of slippers, vest, shawl, small afghan, or lap wrap using single and/or double crochet stitches. May use yarn other than worsted weight. May include increase/decrease stitches.

L-26 Item(s) made using intermediate skills/pattern crochet stitches: Hat, belt, scarf, pair of mittens, pillow, sweater, vest, shawl or baby blanket, doily (made from bedspread weight thread) or set of 5 different ornaments (made from bedspread weight thread using intermediate skills/stitches. Include one or more pattern stitches – shell, arch, diamond, bobble, snapdragon, popcorn, cross, puff, cluster, or seed/granite. Can include one or more colors in alternating rows (stripes).

L-27 Item or pair of items using advanced crochet skills: include one or more of the following advanced skills: afghan stitch, beadwork, camel crochet, filet crochet, Irish crochet, Cro-knit/hook, Cro-tat, hairpin lace, or broomstick lace; combining pattern stitches with crocheted buttons and/or buttonholes; creating plaids, geometric designs or checks; making novelty crochet articles; or creating your own design. Original designs must include a copy of directions, notes and diagrams used to create the item(s). Suggested items include: multi-colored hat, purse, collar (made with bedspread-weight cotton thread), sweater, jacket, or coat.

EMBROIDERY

All embroidery projects are to be a completed item (Examples: framed piece, pillow, wall hanging, pot holder, eyeglass holder, etc.) or can be created on a purchased item. (Example: pillowcase, clothing, tote bag, purse, bib, dish towel, etc.) Items may be made from purchased kits that meet the individual project guidelines.

L-28 Item with small amount of embroidery (equivalent to 4" x 4" area) from the following:

Embroidery item made with a single color of floss such as Redwork (red floss on white or unbleached plain woven fabric). Must include stem stitch and have minimum embroidered area of 4-x 4-inches. The stitches are created following a design stamped (printed or ironed on) or drawn on fabric. The stitcher covers the line or area with embroidery stitches.

Cross stitched design stamped on plain woven fabric and have a minimum embroidered area of 4 x 4 inches. The stitches are created following a design stamped (printed or ironed on) or drawn on fabric. The stitcher covers the line or area with cross stitches.

Cross stitched border using a design stamped on plain woven fabric that has a minimum embroidered area of 2 x 8 inches. The stitches are created following a design stamped (printed or ironed on) or drawn on fabric. The stitcher covers the line or area with cross stitches.

Cross stitched item using ¼-inch checked gingham fabric and have a minimum embroidered area of 4 x 4 inches. The design was stitched by following a chart or graph of the design, not stamped or drawn on the fabric.

L-29 Item with larger amount of free embroidery (equivalent to 5" x 7") from the following:

Embroidery item made with a single color of floss such as Redwork (red floss on white or unbleached plain woven fabric). Must include stem stitch and have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches. The stitches are created following a design stamped (printed or ironed on) or drawn on fabric. The stitcher covers the line or area with embroidery stitches.

Cross stitched design stamped on plain woven fabric and have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches. The stitches are created following a design stamped (printed or ironed on) or drawn on fabric. The stitcher covers the line or area with cross stitches.

Cross stitched border using a design stamped on plain

woven fabric that has a minimum embroidered area of 2 x 16 inches. The stitches are created following a design stamped (printed or ironed on) or drawn on fabric. The stitcher covers the line or area with cross stitches. Candlewick design on plain woven fabric. Must include colonial knots and have a minimum embroidered area of 7 x 7 inches.

Free embroidery on plain woven fabric or felt. Must include three or more of the following different stitches (stem/outline, lazy daisy, running, straight, French knot, satin, blanket, chain, back stitch). May use more than one color of floss. Must have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.

"Free embroidery" means the stitches are created following a design stamped (printed or ironed on) or drawn on fabric. The stitcher covers the line or area with embroidery stitches.

L-30 Item of charted embroidery using large cross or snowflake stitches from the following:

Cross stitch on ¼-inch gingham and have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches. Counted cross stitch on 11 count Aida cloth and have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches. Snowflake embroidery (chicken scratch) on ¼ inch or smaller checked gingham fabric. Must have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.

"Charted" means the design was stitched by following a chart or graph of the design, not stamped or drawn on the fabric.

L-31 Item of free embroidery using at least 6 stitches/3 colors or crewel/Persian yarn from the following:

Free embroidery design on plain woven fabric. Must include minimum of 6 different embroidery stitches with 3 or more colors of embroidery floss. Must have minimum embroidered area of 7 x 9 inches.

Crewel embroidery design on linen or cotton twill fabric using crewel or Persian yarn. Must have a minimum



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embroidered area of 6 x 8 inches. Crewel embroidery means the stitches are created using crewel yarn or Persian yarn rather than floss.

“Free embroidery” means the stitches are created following a design stamped (printed or ironed on) or drawn on fabric. The stitcher covers the line or area with embroidery stitches.

L-32 Item of charted embroidery using specialty cloth from the following:

Item of counted cross stitch on 14 count Aida cloth or other fabric using waste canvas. Must have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches.

Item of huck embroidery on huck toweling creating a minimum 2 inch wide border design. This type of embroidery design is worked around surface floats that are characteristic of this type of fabric.

Item of Swedish weaving on monk’s cloth creating a minimum of 6 inch wide border design. This type of embroidery design is worked around surface floats that are characteristic of this type of fabric.

“Charted” means the design was stitched by following a chart or graph of the design, not stamped or drawn on the fabric.

L-33 Item of embroidery using advanced skills from the following:

Item created or embellished with silk ribbon embroidery using 5 or more embroidery stitches with silk ribbon. Design may also include embroidery floss.

Item constructed of irregularly shaped fabric pieces embellished with a combination of ribbon work, specialty thread, embroidery stitches, and/or beadwork creating a finished crazy quilt design.

Item of counted cross stitch on 18 or 22 count even weave or Aida cloth. Must have a minimum embroidered area of 5 x 7 inches. The design is stitched by following a chart or graph of the design, not stamped or drawn on the fabric.

Item of English smocking, minimum smocked area 4 ½ x 6 ½ inches. Design must include at least 5 different smocking stitches.

KNITTING

The objective is for youth to learn the skills involved in hand knitting with needles. Therefore items made on a knitting loom or knitting machine are NOT to be entered and will not be judged.

L-34 Small/simple knitted item(s): Hat, pillow, purse, scarf, belt, doll afghan, or two washcloths using worsted weight yarn. Solid color or variegated yarn is acceptable. Washcloths should be made from worsted weight cotton yarn. Items are limited to those that include garter stitch, stockinette stitch, and/or ribbing stitch. Items made on a knitting machine or loom do not fit in this class.

L-35 Knitted scarf from novelty yarn: Knitted scarf created from any novelty/decorative yarn. Scarf must be at least 24” long. Items made on a knitting machine or loom does not fit in this class.

L-36 Larger/simple knitted item(s): Hat and scarf; a pair of mittens; a pair of slippers, a shawl; or an afghan (minimum size 36” x 36”). May use yarn other than worsted weight yarn. Two colors and one pattern stitch may be used in addition to garter stitch, stockinette stitch, and/or ribbing stitch. Items made on a knitting machine or loom do not fit in this class.

L-37 Knitted project focused on shape: Exhibit one item or a pair of items using pick up stitches, multiple color changes (stripes or duplicate stitch), and/or circular knitting. Item must include increase or decrease. May use yarns other than worsted weight yarn. Ideas such as: gloves, hat, mittens, socks, leggings, stuffed toy, skirt, sweater, or vest. Items made on a knitting machine or loom does not fit in this class.

L-38 Knitted project focused on texture and design: Exhibit one item or a pair of items using

charted designs or design your own. Chartist designs may include color changes such as Fairisle knitting or multiple pattern stitches such as Aran Isle knitting or lace knitting. Knitting with beads is also acceptable. Original designs must include a copy of directions, notes, and any diagrams used to create the item. Ideas such as: cell phone holder, amulet, pillow, afghan (minimum size 45-x 60-inches), holiday stocking (minimum 18-inches in length), purse, pair of socks, sweater. Items made on a knitting machine or loom do not fit in this class.

LACEWORK – TATTING

L-39 Tatting using No. 3 cotton thread: Tatted item or item embellished with tatted edging or tatted motifs using Size 3 tatting needle or shuttle and No. 3 cotton thread. Item should include rings with picots and double stitches only. Item to which the tatting is attached may be purchased, made by member or by someone else. Judging is based on tatting and quality of workmanship in attaching it to the item.

L-40 Tatting using No. 10 cotton thread: Tatted item or item embellished with tatted edging or tatted motifs using Size 5 tatting needle or shuttle and size 10 cotton thread. Item should include rings with picots and double stitches only. Item to which the tatting is attached may be purchased, made by member or by someone else. Judging is based on tatting and quality of workmanship in attaching it to the item.

L-41 Two thread tatting: Bookmark, jewelry, tatted embellishment on clothing or other item using size 5 needle or shuttle and 2 appropriate sized threads. Item must include chains and rings with picots and double stitches, may use one or two colors of thread. Item to which the tatting is attached may be purchased, made by member or by someone else. Judging is based on tatting and quality of workmanship in attaching it to the item.

L-42 Advanced tatting: Exhibit one of the following items:
Item of shuttle tatting using size 20 or 30 tatting thread. Options: Bookmark, jewelry, embellishment on clothing or other item. Item must include chains and rings with picots and double stitches, may use one or two colors of thread.

Item of needle tatting using size 7 needle and appropriate sized tatting thread. Options: Bookmark, jewelry, embellishment on clothing or other item. Item must include chains and rings with picots and double stitches, may use one or two colors of thread.

Item using either shuttle or needle tatting with the use of two threads and beads. Options: jewelry, advanced motif as embellishment on clothing or other item. Item to which the tatting is attached may be purchased, made by member or by someone else. Judging is based on tatting and quality of workmanship in attaching it to the item.

QUILTING

All projects are to be a completed item that includes a pieced top, batting, backing fabric, and a finished outer edge.

Quilting on long arm quilting machines or hooped embroidery machines is not an option for the Needlework-Quilting project. Quilting or tacking should be done by hand or with the use of a conventional sewing machine. Refer to 4-H Quilting publications.

L-43 Quilted Mat (12” x 12” finished size)

Exhibit a 2 x 2 “quilt” made with four six-inch squares. At least two of the 6-inch squares must be patchwork designs in which square and/or rectangle pieces are pieced together (do not include triangle pieces).

Piecing technique: stitch by hand or sewing machine
Quilting technique: machine tack or hand tie, stitch by hand or use a conventional sewing machine (Do NOT use a long arm quilting machine or hooped embroidery machine.)

L-44 Quilted Runner – machine tacked or hand tied (12” x 36” finished size)

Exhibit a 1 x 3 four-block runner “quilt.” Each four-block must include at least two 6-inch square patchwork blocks made with square and/or rectangle pieces (do not include triangle pieces).

Piecing technique: stitch by hand or sewing machine
Quilting technique: machine tack or hand tie.

L-45 Quilted Runner – quilted by hand or sewing machine (12” x 36” finished size)

Exhibit a 1 x 3 four-block runner “quilt.” Each four-block must include at least two 6-inch square patchwork blocks made with square and/or rectangle pieces (do not include triangle pieces).

Piecing technique: stitch by hand or sewing machine
Quilting technique: stitch by hand or use a conventional sewing machine (Do NOT use a long arm quilting machine or hooped embroidery machine.)

L-46 Hand Quilted Wall Hanging or Small Quilt (36” x 36”)

Exhibit a 4 or 9 block quilt or quilted wall hanging. Each block must measure 12 inches by 12 inches for the 4-block version or 9 inches by 9 inches for the 9-block version. Finished project must include appliqué and/or triangle pieces with sashing and/or borders. Finished quilt not to exceed 36 inches by 36 inches.

Piecing technique: stitch by hand or sewing machine
Quilting technique: stitch by hand using cross hatching, stitching in the ditch, or echo/outline quilting.

Edge finishing technique: Binding with mitered corners, hanging sleeve optional.

L-47 Machine Quilted Wall Hanging or Small Quilt (36” x 36”)

Exhibit a 4 or 9 block quilt or quilted wall hanging. Each block must measure 12 inches by 12 inches for the 4-block version or 9 inches by 9 inches for the 9-block version. Finished project must include appliqué and/or triangle pieces with sashing and/or borders. Finished quilt not to exceed 36 inches by 36 inches.

Piecing technique: stitched by hand or sewing machine
Quilting technique: stitch using a conventional sewing machine using cross hatching, stitching in the ditch, or echo/outline quilting. (Do NOT use a long arm quilting machine or hooped embroidery machine.)

Edge finishing technique: Binding with mitered corners, hanging sleeve optional.

L-48 Creative Quilt or Quilted Wall Hanging (at least 24” x 24” up to 48” x 48”)

Exhibit a creative quilt, minimum finished size 24 inches by 24 inches, maximum size 48 inches by 48 inches. Quilt top should include advanced piecing techniques joined by hand and/or machine that may include dimensional pieces, appliqué, foundation piecing, English paper piecing, miniature scale, and/or landscape design.

Piecing technique: stitch by hand or sewing machine
Quilting technique: Stitch by hand or conventional sewing machine using stippling or patterned/stenciled motifs. (Do NOT use a long arm quilting machine or hooped embroidery machine.)

Edge finishing technique: Binding with mitered corners, hanging sleeve optional.

DIVISION 3 – 4-H LEADERSHIP & COMMUNICATIONS PROJECT

1. Exhibits MUST correspond to:

- Any project or activity from the Leadership (4-H Step Up to Leadership and Unlock Your Leadership Potential) and/or Communications project books.
 - Only pages relevant to project are needed. Additional pages are allowed but will not be considered by the judges.
 - Inside, clearly indicate the pages that are to be judged. If the pages to be judged are not clearly marked then the last 2-4 pages of the book will be reviewed.
 - THIS IS NOT A GENERAL SCRAPBOOKING CATEGORY. The scrapbook format is a method of recording the Leadership and/or Communications experiences of youth who participate in these project areas. State Fair projects that do not demonstrate a clearly stated correspondence to a Leadership or Communications activity will not be considered for judging or will receive a white ribbon.
2. Exhibit must be in an 8 ½” x 11” or 12” x 12” notebook or scrapbook format. Format will allow a Leadership or Communication Portfolio to be developed and kept

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- over multiple years.
3. Refer to the class entry to determine the required number of pages.
 4. Photos should clearly address the theme or activity corresponding to the selected leadership project or communication project. Each photo should be explained with a 2-3 sentence journaling caption. One or two paragraphs of narrative explaining the project or activity should be included on the scrapbook pages. Clearly indicate pages to be judged. Additional pages beyond those required by the project will not be reviewed.
 5. The Leadership and/or Communications Project should contain the following:
 - a. 2 or more photos on each page;
 - b. Each photo should be explained with captions (see #4);
 - c. 1-2 paragraphs of narrative (see #4) on one of the pages;
 - d. No additional pages of narrative are needed
 6. Photos can be taken by the 4-Her or another person. The pictures should clearly address the Leadership or Communication project that is selected. Pictures may be cropped as desired.
 7. Pages will be scored on: Organization of project (easy to follow and relevant to a Leadership and/or Communications Project), neatness, narrative content, caption content, photo content, and overall effectiveness of the project.

- L-49 Junior Division:** Communication Scrapbook Display – two (2) page display of work completed by junior level member based on an activity, program or project from the 4-H Communications Curriculum.
- L-50 Senior Division:** Communication Scrapbook Display – four (4) page display of work completed by senior level member, based on an activity, program or project from the 4-H Communications Curriculum.

L-51 Senior Division: Resume – one page resume using Microsoft Word. See 4-H Communications project book “The Perfect Fit” and “Take Me As I Am” for resume tips and guidelines.

L-52 Junior Level 2 pages based on an activity, program or project from the 4-H Leadership Curriculum.

L-53 Senior Level 4 pages based on an activity, program or project from the 4-H Leadership Curriculum.

L-108 Unit IV – Other

1. **All items must have been made since the last State Fair.**

2. Exhibits will be disqualified if:

- a. Pictures or other hanging items do not have an attached hanger (wire hangers must be secure and attached to the frame for paintings and drawings only). **No wire hooks taped to back. All hangers must support the weight of item.** Pictures should be framed and ready for hanging.
- b. Pictures are not mounted on firm mat, not foam core and/or framed with attached hanger. **No poster**

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board allowed.
c. If subject matter is not "family friendly" in context
d. **Drawings and paintings must be framed. Plexiglas is preferred over glass.**
3. Small items, which are easily separated or destroyed, may be placed in small plastic bags.

SECTION A

L-109 Junior Jewelry Beadwork – One piece of jewelry created by youth (jewelry quality only). No kits or pony beads allowed. Glass, clay or wooden beads (painted or carved) permitted only.

L-110 Senior Jewelry Beadwork – One set (at least two items) of jewelry created by youth (jewelry quality only). No kits or pony beads allowed. No elastic material used to string beads. Glass, clay or wooden beads (painted or carved) permitted only. Examples: earring(s) and necklace; bracelet and necklace, etc.)

L-111 Junior Folk Art – One Item that has paint for a decorative or craft purpose other than canvas or paper. No clothing!

L-112 Senior Folk Art – same as above.

L-113 Junior Weaving – One pair of placemats, potholders (pair) or one small wall hanging item that is made through various weaving techniques using mixed media fibers, no plastic materials allowed. Baskets are not included. Wall hangings must be mounted and be ready for hanging.

L-114 Senior Weaving – One item (only one item is permitted for entry); rug, belt, stool with woven seat, or wall hanging item made through various weaving techniques using mixed media fibers, no plastic materials allowed. Baskets are not included. Wall hangings must be mounted and be ready for hanging.

L-115 Junior Nature Crafts – Item made from natural materials only. **No kits allowed.** If wall hanging or wreath, item must include wire or hooks and be ready for hanging.

L-116 Senior Nature Crafts – Wall wreath, or hand-carved native materials made from natural materials only. **No kits allowed.** Must include wire or hooks and be ready for hanging. (no other item allowed).

L-117 Junior Basket Making – Natural materials, any size, shape or design. Non-natural materials may be woven into design.

L-118 Senior Basket Making – same as above

L-119 Junior Leather Craft – Item made from leather. May or may not be tooled. Kits allowed.

L-120 Senior Leather Craft – same as above. No kits allowed.

The following rules apply to all ceramic classes:

1. Original design ceramics will be accepted in that class only. It will not be accepted in glazed or stained classes.

ALL ceramic entries must be fired.

L-121 Junior Original Design Ceramics – original item made from clay, using a process of casting, hand molding, or a potter's wheel.

L-122 Senior Original Design Ceramics – same as above.

L-123 Junior Ceramics – Item that is pre cast and has been fired.

L-124 Senior Ceramics – Item that is pre cast and has been fired.

L-125 Junior Scrapbooking – One scrapbook page including 2-4 pictures. Page must include captions or journaling. Page must be placed in a plastic page protector.

L-126 Senior Scrapbooking – One scrapbook page including 2-4 pictures and embellishments (ie. stickers, lettering, designs). Page must include captions or journaling. Page must be placed in a plastic page protector.

L-127 Junior Decoupage – Any item using the decoupage process. If appropriate, must use wire or hook to be ready for hanging.

L-128 Senior Decoupage – same as above.

L-129 Junior Paper Crafts – Item made from any source of paper including but not limited to: stamping, handmade notecard, brown sack lunch bag scrapbook, gift box, etc.

L-130 Senior Paper Crafts – same as above.

SECTION B

Exhibits will be disqualified if:

a. Pictures or other hanging items do not have a hanger. **Please include wire hangers that will support the weight of your item. Pictures should be framed and ready for hanging. Do not use tape to secure wire hanger.**

b. Pictures are not mounted on firm mat board and/or framed. No poster board allowed.

c. Subject matter is not "family friendly"

All drawings and paintings must be mounted on a sturdy background (mat board) and framed, ready to hang with secured hangers on the frame (wire hangers).

L-131 Junior Acrylic/Oil Painting – Items that are made through the process of painting on paper or canvas, using any acrylic or oil process. Paint-by-number will be disqualified. No kits, original work only.

L-132 Senior Acrylic/Oil Painting – same as above.

L-133 Junior Watercolor Painting – Items that are made through the process of painting on paper or canvas, using any watercolor process.

L-134 Senior Watercolor Painting – same as above

L-135 Junior Color Drawing – items made through the use of drawing lines using pen, pencil, pastel, charcoal, markers or chalk.

L-136 Senior Color Drawing – same as above.

L-137 Junior Black and White Drawing – items made through the use of drawing lines using pen, pencil, charcoal, markers or chalk. No additional colors added.

L-138 Senior Black and White Drawing – same as above.

DIVISION 5 4-H FOODS EXHIBITS

1. Entries are to be made using recipes specified in the class description. Recipes can be found in the Fantastic Foods project book series available at the county Extension office or at www.Kentucky4-H.org, click on "State Fair," then scroll down to 4-H State Fair Recipes.

2. Traditionally, many baked exhibits have been made up of 4 pieces. Beginning with the 2012 fairs, that number was reduced to three (3) pieces in order to reduce waste. Exhibits will not be disqualified if four (4) pieces are included.

3. Wrap baked products in a re-closeable zip-type bag to maintain freshness. Place the baked product on a disposable plate. The plate can be placed inside the bag or under the bag; the idea is to keep the product from being damaged. Use of plastic film or aluminum foil to wrap product is discouraged but will not cause the product to be disqualified. To prevent damage, wrapped cakes should be transported in a sturdy container such as a cardboard box. **Containers, pie pans, etc. will NOT be returned to the exhibitor.**

4. 4-H food entries will be divided into the following levels and classes:

Level A: Use recipes in *Six Easy Bites* Project Book or recipe specified below:

L-139 Three Colossal cookies (pg.34) (size of cookies: cookies may be ¼ cup portions as specified in the recipe or 1/8 cup portions which produce smaller cookies) (nuts may be left out)

L-140 Three brownies using recipe on p.22 (make each brownie a 2" square – no corner pieces)

L-141 Three chocolate chip muffins (pg. 36) (use recipe at www.Kentucky4-H.org under "State Fair Recipes.")

L-142 Three granola bars (pg.14) Size: 1" x 2"

L-143 Three cornmeal muffins (use recipe at www.Kentucky4-H.org under "State Fair Recipes")

Level B: Use recipes in *Tasty Tidbits* Project Book or recipe specified below:

L-144 One 8" round layer chocolate cake, made with oil, no icing (pg.32)

L-145 Three pretzels (may be rolled, twisted, or curved) (pg.34)

L-146 Three rolled baking powder biscuits (pg.38) (Do not use the Australian biscuit recipe.) (Use a 2" cutter)

L-147 Three scones – may substitute raisins for cranberries (use recipe at www.Kentucky4-H.org under "State Fair Recipes.")

L-148 Three whole wheat muffins or bran muffins (use recipe at www.Kentucky4-H.org under "State Fair Recipes")

Level C: Use recipes in *You're the Chef* Project Book or recipe specified below:

L-149 One-half loaf banana bread (pg.18)

L-150 One yeast bread product creatively shaped into an object such as a teddy bear, flower, animal, toy, etc. (use recipe at www.Kentucky4-H.org under "State Fair Recipes")

L-151 Three breadsticks (not twisted) (pg. 34)

L-152 Three whole wheat yeast rolls (use recipe at www.Kentucky4-H.org under "State Fair Recipes.")

Level D: Use recipes in *Foodworks* Project Book or recipe specified below:

L-153 One whole, double crust apple pie (pg.32) (Leave pie in the disposable pie pan and place all in a zip-type plastic bag.)

L-154 One-half apple cake (use recipe at www.Kentucky4-H.org, under "State Fair Recipes")

L-155 Prepare one dish which can be included in the menu for an event or occasion you plan to cater (pg. 46-47, Level D: *Foodworks* project book). Select a product which can be prepared in advance and does not require refrigeration. For the fair, prepare a sample of the product (2 servings is enough) and place it in a re-closeable, zip-type bag. Attach the recipe used, a description of the type of occasion being catered, and a menu of all foods to be served at the event. Write this information on 8.5" x 11" paper and attach it to the sample.

L-156 Two brownies using the original recipe and two brownies altered to make a healthier product (use the recipes at www.Kentucky4-H.org, under "State Fair Recipes") Make one batch of brownies using the original recipe. Make a second batch of brownies using

one of the altered recipes. Make brownies 2" squares. Label the bag of brownies made by the original recipe as "Original" and the bag of those made from the altered recipe as "Altered – Moderate Fat" or "Altered – Low Fat." Use the *Altered Brownie Comparison Report* (available at <http://www2.ca.uky.edu/4-h/family-consumer-science/food-nutrition> or ask county 4-H agent for a copy) to analyze the brownies. Place the two bags of brownies into a larger re-closeable bag, insert the comparison report and close the bag.

DIVISION 6 – 4-H FOOD PRESERVATION EXHIBITS

1. All food preservation entries must be prepared from raw produce. Re-canning of commercially processed foods is not permitted.

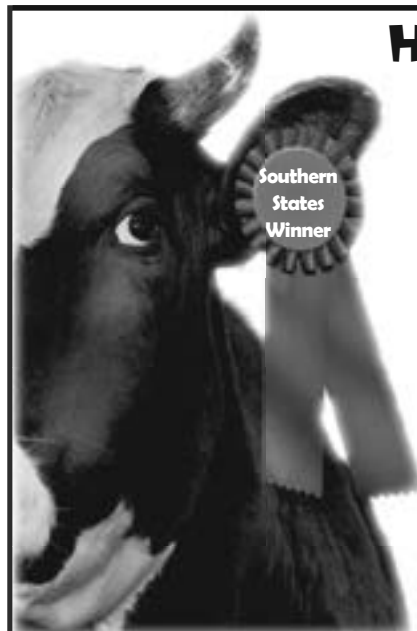
2. Use the recipe/instructions and appropriate canning method indicated in the 4-H project books and University of Kentucky "**Principles of Home Canning**" (<http://www.ca.uky.edu/agc/pubs/fcs3/fcs3325/fcs3325.pdf>) and "Judging Preserved Foods" (<http://www.ca.uky.edu/hes/fcs/factsheets/FN-SSB.108.PDF>). Jars not processed by the correct methods will not be judged. Open kettle processing is not acceptable for any product.

3. Food preservation jars must be clear, clean STANDARD jars specifically designed for home canning. If mayonnaise or similar non-standard jars are used, the product will not be judged or awarded a premium.

4. Labeling:

a. Jars: Use the official UK canning label found at www.Kentucky4-H.org under "State Fair." Fill out the label. Indicate on label the date the product was canned. Attach a label to the front of each jar with tape.

b. Packaged Items: Foods in the frozen food categories should be in moisture and vapor-resistant containers designed for freezing. Include date the package was prepared for freezing.



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Sat., 7 a.m.–12 p.m. CST

5. Two-piece screw bands and lids specifically designed for home canning should be left on containers until entered at the fair. Judges will remove screw bands and open the jar for judging purposes. Do NOT eat contents of containers upon return.

6. The decision of the judges is final.

7. 4-H Food Preservation entries will be divided into the following levels and classes:

Level A: Six Easy Bites Project Book

L-157 Package prepared for freezer – Prepare a package of baked Colossal Cookies, using appropriate freezing techniques (pg. 34-35 of Level A: **Six Easy Bites** project book) Cookies may be made smaller (in 1/8 cup portions rather than 1/4 cup portions) in order to fit containers readily available in stores. Include enough cookies to appropriately fill the container. Judging is based on packaging techniques, not quality of cookies. Publication FCS3-334 may be helpful: <http://www.ca.uky.edu/agc/pubs/fcs3/fcs3334/fcs3334.pdf>

Level B: Tasty Tidbits Project Book

L-158 Dried fruit (banana or apple) – Dry banana chips using appropriate drying technique on pg. 46 of **Level B: Tasty Tidbits** project book) or dry apples using instructions at www.kentucky4-H.org under "State Fair Recipes." Place 12 pieces in a container which is an example of a container suitable for long-term storage of dried fruit. Size of the container is not being judged. Publication HE 3-501 may be helpful: <http://www.ca.uky.edu/agc/pubs/fcs3/fcs3501/FCS3501.pdf>

Level C: You're the Chef Project Book

L-159 Pickle relish or zesty salsa – one pint jar of pickle relish (pg. 44) or zesty salsa (pg.40) canned according to the instructions in Level C: **You're the Chef** project book. Publications FCS3-327 (<http://www.ca.uky.edu/agc/pubs/fcs3/fcs3327/fcs3327.pdf>) and FCS3-330 (<http://www.ca.uky.edu/agc/pubs/fcs3/fcs3330/fcs3330.pdf>) may be helpful.

Level D: Foodworks Project Book

L-160 Jelly – One half-pint jar cooked jelly (any fruit) (pg. 41-43), canned according to the instructions in Level D: **Foodworks** project book. (Jams and preserves are not appropriate entries.) Write the type of fruit used on the canning label. Publications FCS3-331 (<http://www.ca.uky.edu/agc/pubs/fcs3/fcs3331/fcs3331.pdf>) and FN-SSB.110 (<http://www.ca.uky.edu/hes/fcs/factshts/FN-SSB.110.pdf>) may be helpful.

L-161 Green Beans – One pint jar of green beans, canned according to the instructions in Level D: **Foodworks** project book, pp. 38-40. Publication FCS3-328 (<http://www.ca.uky.edu/agc/pubs/fcs3/fcs3328/fcs3328.pdf>) may be helpful.

DIVISION 7 - 4-H HOME ENVIRONMENT

1. Several classes require documentation. Write the member's name, county, and class number on the front of the sheet, folder or notebook of documentation.

2. Wall hangings and pin-up boards must be ready to hang with appropriate hardware attached.

3. Refinished item refers to an item already in use which has been given a new finish using paint or some type of seal.

4. **4-H Home Furnishings entries may be made in the following classes:**

Unit I EXHIBITS from Exploring Your Home project book

L-162 Color Collage – (pp. 7-8, activity 3.) Mount collage on mat board or foam core board.

L-163 Textured Collage or Rubbing – (pp. 8-9, choose either Activity 1 or 2). Mount collage or rubbing on mat board or foam core board.

L-164 Transparent finish applied to small wood object. (pp. 13-14) Apply a clear finish such as tung oil, penetrating seal or polyurethane which does not include stain to a small wood object such as a bowl, tray, cutting board, board game or box. A transparent finish allows the wood grain to show through. Judging

emphasis will be on how well the object is prepared for the finish and how well the finish has been applied, not the construction of the wood object. The wood object may be made by the member, made by someone else, purchased or found. Items that are stained or finished with paint do not fit in this class.

L-165 Simple cloth item for the home created with no machine stitching. Examples: knotted pillow (no applied design); placemats; draped valance with accompanying photo showing end result; footstool with a seat made of woven fabric; fabric applied to an item such as a box, plate, or lampshade. Unacceptable: purses, tote bags, backpacks, duffle bags.

L-166 Simple cloth item for the home created using minimal sewing machine stitching. (Unit I, p. 10, 12 13) Examples include plain pillow (no applied design), fringed tablecloth, placemats and napkins, laundry bag, valance. Unacceptable: purses, tote bags, backpacks, duffle bags.

L-167 Wastebasket – (pp. 10-12)

L-168 Pin-up (bulletin) board (must be ready to hang with appropriate hardware attached)

Unit II EXHIBITS from Living with Others project book

L-169 Simple wood item **refinished** by the 4-H member (pp. 14-15) – Item should have straight lines with no elaborate carvings or turnings. (The idea is to learn how to apply a new finish such as paint, stain, varnish, polyurethane, etc. to a simple wooden furnishing that's already in use.) Documentation is to include a "before" photo with explanation of how the item was refinished must be securely attached. Examples: refinished footstool, children's furniture, small box, tray, picture frame, bookshelves, and plant stand.

L-170 Cloth item for the home created using a sewing machine (Unit II, p. 12-14) – Examples: hemmed tablecloth or table runner, wall hanging,

pillow, pillowcase, and flat-panel hemmed curtains. Unacceptable: purses, tote bags, backpacks, duffle bags.

L-171 Invitation and thank you letter/note – Design an invitation and thank you letter/note for a sleepover, birthday party or other occasion of your choice. (p. 6-7) Cards/letters may be created with computer software or handwritten. Decorations on the cards/letters may be member's original artwork, computer-generated art, purchased or found decorative items. The message written in the card or letter is more important than the decorations. Write your name and county on the back of each card/letter and place each card/letter in a plastic sheet protector. (For the fair, it is best to use a fictitious address and contact information on the invitation or thank you).

Unit III EXHIBITS from Where I Live project book.

L-172 Accessory for the home created by the 4-H member – This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the accessory and 2) a sheet or folder of documentation. Documentation is to include: a sketch or photo to show how the accessory is used in the home and a description of how the design and colors fit in with the other furnishings and color used in the home. Examples: stitchery or appliqué wall hanging, latch hook items, pillow with applied design (stitchery, appliqué or other media), rug, picture in appropriate frame and ready to hang.

L-173 Table setting – This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the table setting and 2) a color photo or diagram of the table setting showing how it should be arranged. Include centerpiece, plate, beverage container(s) and table linen appropriate to theme or event chosen by 4-H member (pp. 11-13). Flatware (knife, fork and spoon) **must** be included in the photo/diagram showing how all the items are arranged, but do NOT send flatware to the state fair. Individual items included in the table setting may be made by but are not required to be made by the 4-H'er. To insure that

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all pieces get returned to the member, write the name and county of the exhibitor on tape and place it on every part of the table setting in a location hidden to the public when exhibited at the fair.

L-174 Piece of furniture refinished (stripped, sanded, and painted or stained/sealed) by the 4-H member (pp. 16-20) – This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the furniture and 2) Documentation is to include a "before" photo with explanation of how the item was refinished must be securely attached. Examples: rocker, table, chair or chest.

L-175 Old or discarded item made useful in a new way as a home accessory (p. 20) – This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the accessory and 2) a sheet or folder of documentation. Documentation is to include a "before" photo; an explanation of how the item was made useful again in a new way; materials used, cost and time involved in project. Examples: old silverware flattened and made into wind chimes; scrap wood pieces made into wall art; old lace doily attached to a pillow or framed; old toolbox cleaned up and made into a TV stand.

Unit IV EXHIBITS from In My Home project book
An accessory for the home, made with member's original or adapted design – This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the accessory and 2) a sheet or folder of documentation. Documentation is to include an explanation of how the item was created/adapted and a description of how and where item is used in the home. Examples: latch hooked rug or wall hanging; pillow with stitchery design; wall hanging of natural dyed yarns, or drawing with mat and finished or refinished frame.

L-176 Heritage item refinished, restored, or made by the 4-H member – This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the item and 2) a sheet or folder of documentation. Documentation is to include information on the history or meaning of the item to the member, how the item was refinished, restored, or

made by the member, and how it is used in the home. Examples include antique or collectible furniture, memory box, scrapbook that reflects family history/home/house/farm/land of several generations), quilt with heritage design, wall hanging showing family tree.

L-177 Purchased article selected by 4-H member to solve a home decorating problem – This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the purchased article and 2) a folder of documentation. Documentation is to include a description of the problem to be solved, alternatives considered in the solution of the problem, how the plan was carried out, resources used (time, money) and member's evaluation of the results (satisfaction with purchased article, how article is used in the home), and photos illustrating the before and after effect. Examples include wall decoration, lamp, vase, storage item, desk accessories, bedspread, rug, table linens, pillow, and draperies.

L-178 A cloth article made by the 4-H'er showing a major home improvement – This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the cloth article and 2) a folder of documentation. Documentation is to include a written description, "before" and "after" pictures/showing how cloth article is used in home, other colors used in room, time and costs involved, and care required. Examples: bedspread, quilt, window treatment and boxed bench pad. **Unacceptable: purses, tote bags, backpacks, duffel bags.**

Self-Directed ADVANCED PROJECT – the intent of the following classes is to give members an opportunity to put everything they have learned in the home environment projects into practice.

L-179 Furniture Experience – Furniture which has been refinished, reupholstered, recovered, recycled, reused or remodeled – Exhibit is to be made up of two pieces: 1) the piece of furniture and 2) a folder describing the original condition of the furniture (include a picture if possible), work required in completing project, time

and cost involved, and how item is used in the home. **DO NOT INCLUDE NEWLY-CONSTRUCTED FURNITURE.**

L-180 Design Experience – Create a plan for or actually complete a design experience. The exhibit is to be made up of two pieces: 1) a home furnishing item which is representative of the design experience (item may be made by the member or purchased) and 2) a folder or notebook describing the plan. Examples of project ideas: a plan for redecorating a room; creation of an accessory item using an original design of 4-H member; notebook with pictures and descriptions of architectural styles used in Kentucky homes.

L-181 Heritage Experience – Complete a heritage project. The exhibit is to be made up of two pieces: 1) an item representative of the heritage experience and 2) a folder or notebook describing the overall experience, the significance of the project to your family. Examples of project ideas: Restoration of a family heirloom (could include caning, reseating, etc.) including who it belonged to and the significance to the family; study of furniture styles including pictures and history; study of old buildings in the community including photos and descriptions of the architectural significance, period of history, uses of the buildings; create an item after learning a heritage or craft skill...especially from an older family member or friend and describe how skill was learned, how interest was stimulated and how you will use item and skill.

L-182 Major Home Improvement Experience – Complete a major home improvement project. The exhibit is to be made up of a notebook which describes the project, tell whether project was an individual project or a group or family project, describe the do-it-yourself skills learned time and cost involved. Include before, during, and after photographs, if possible. Examples: improve storage areas in the house or garage; paint the house; wallpaper and decorate a room; remodel the

basement.

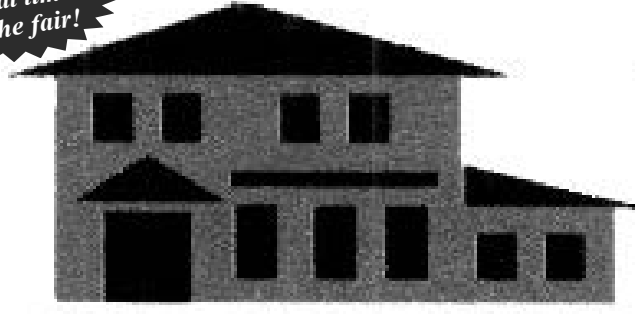
CHANGING SPACES:

L-183 Room Floor Plan. This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) a mounted printout of a room and 2) folder of the documentation described below. Use the Better Homes and Gardens web site www.bhg.com/decorating/arrange-a-room/ or similar software to draw a room (scale: 1 square = 1 foot). Include a door(s), window(s), and furniture. Print in color or black and white (Minimum size 8 1/2 x 11 inches. Maximum size 11 x 17 inches). Mount the printout on mat board or foam core board. Documentation should include answers to these questions: 1. Is the room you have drawn similar to a room in your house? What are its dimensions? How many square feet are in the room? 2. Did you have problems with the web site or software? If so, how did you solve them? 3. Tell about how you worked with the items in your room such as walls, windows, doors and furniture.

L-184 House Floor Plan. This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) mounted printout of house plan and 2) folder of the documentation described below. Use any software program to draw a house plan. Include bedroom(s), bath(s), living space, garage, door(s) and window(s). Print in color or black and white (Minimum size 8 1/2 x 11 inches. Maximum size 11 x 17 inches.). Mount the printout on mat board or foam core board. Documentation should include answers to these questions: 1. Does your floor plan resemble the house you live in? If not, did you look at other floor plans for inspiration? What type of roof does your house have? 2. Did you consider how a family member who is disabled (for instance, a wheelchair user) might get around in your home? 3. Describe any problems you had with the software and how you solved them. Tell how you worked with additional items required to create a floor plan.

L-185 Presentation Board – Color Scheme: This

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exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) a presentation board as described below and 2) a folder of the documentation described below. Create a presentation board which illustrates a color scheme for any room in the home. On mat board or foam board, mount color pictures or actual swatches of fabric, wall covering, paint, and flooring. (Color pictures may be downloaded and printed or cut from magazines to represent these items. The mounting board should be 15" or 16" X 20" inches. In the folder, describe the person who lives in the room and the decisions required in selecting the color scheme.

L-186 Presentation Board – Bedroom: This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) a presentation board as described below and 2) a folder of the documentation described below. Create a presentation board which includes a floor plan (with placement of furniture) and color scheme for a bedroom. Use the Better Homes and Gardens web site www.bhg.com/decorating/arrange-a-room/ or similar software to draw the room (scale: 1 square = 1 foot). Include a door(s), window(s), and furniture. Print in color or black and white. On mat or foam board, mount the floor plan and color pictures or actual swatches of fabric, wall covering, paint, and flooring. (Color pictures may be downloaded and printed or cut from magazines to represent these items.) The mounting board should be 15" or 16" X 20". In the folder, describe the person who lives in the room and the decisions required in selecting the color scheme, flooring, wall, and window treatments; describe the furniture and how the furniture was arranged to accommodate traffic flow; describe the floor, wall, and window treatments selected, etc.; and describe what you like most about the room.

L-187 Presentation Board – Great Room or Family Room: This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) a presentation board as described below and 2) a folder of the documentation described below. Create

a presentation board which includes a room floor plan (with placement of furniture) and color scheme for a great room/family room. Use the Better Homes and Gardens web site www.bhg.com/decorating/arrange-a-room/ or similar software to draw the room (scale: 1 square = 1 foot). Include a door(s), window(s), and furniture. Print in color or black and white. On mat or foam board, mount the floor plan and color pictures or actual swatches of fabric, wall covering, paint, and flooring. (Color pictures may be downloaded and printed or cut from magazines to represent these items.) The mounting board should be 15" or 16" x 20". In the folder, describe the family who uses the room and the decisions required in selecting the color scheme, flooring, wall, and window treatments; describe the furniture and how the furniture was arranged to accommodate traffic flow; describe the floor, wall, and window treatments selected, etc.; and describe what you like most about the room.

Division 8 – 4-H PHOTOGRAPHY

1. All pictures must be made since the last State Fair.
2. Photos may be either black and white or color unless otherwise stated.
3. Digital images may be submitted in all classes, unless otherwise stated.
4. All classes (including Horticulture) WITH ONE PHOTOGRAPH MUST BE MOUNTED ON WHITE 10" x 16" MAT BOARD – available at the Meade County Extension office (no poster board or foam core board accepted). Single photographs are limited to up to a maximum size of 8" x 12." Pictures cannot be framed or matted with colored mat board.
5. All classes (including Horticulture) WITH MULTIPLE PHOTOGRAPHS (More than 1 photograph) MUST BE MOUNTED ON WHITE 16" x 20" MAT BOARD – available at the Meade County Extension office (no poster board or foam core board accepted). Pictures cannot be framed or

matted with colored mat board.

6. Each picture must be mounted securely. Rubber cement or dry mounting tissue is recommended. Do not use photo mounting corners.
7. Pictures may be cropped (trimmed).
8. Absolutely nothing on front of mat board except photographs. Any other required materials are to be mounted on the back.
9. All photographic entries are required to have sticky-back Velcro ("hook" Velcro only) in each of the four corners on the back of the mat board for easier exhibiting. The "loop"/smooth Velcro is not necessary and leaving it off will minimize hanging preparation time by judges.
10. Photography will be judged on, but not limited to: Technical, impact, composition, creativity, presentation, sequence or collection and the ability of the picture to tell a story.

LEVEL 1

L-188 Single photograph; subject: a personal interest as the main focus of the picture

L-189 Sequence (a series of actions to "tell a story") of three photographs; of one subject: a personal interest as the main focus of the picture

L-190 Single photograph; subject: still life as the main focus of the picture or arrangement of inanimate objects. The picture may contain other elements, but the main aspect or feature of the picture should be the still life. (*Definition of inanimate: nonliving things; something that never was alive, like a rock, buttons, collection of toys, etc.*)

L-191 Single photograph; subject: animals as the main focus of the picture

L-192 Collection: Three different points of view of the same subject

L-193 My Community: Single photograph of an interesting building within your community

L-194 Five photographs of an event. Attach a

description of the event to back of board.

LEVEL 2 – Purpose of this level is to promote Life Skills in the area of Communication, Workplace Competencies and Foundation Skills through photography.

L-195 Five photographs showing movement

L-196 Single photograph; subject: person as the main focus of the picture (photographic portrait of an individual).

L-197 Single photograph; subject: landscape or seascape as the main focus of the picture [*Definition of a landscape: a picture representing a view of natural inland scenery (a portion of land which the eye can comprehend in a single view, including mountains, rivers, lakes, and whatever the land contains--trees, flowers, grasses, etc.) or seascape, ie. ocean.*]

L-198 Collection: Three to five photographs of the same subject

L-199 My Community: Single photograph (your choice of subject) within your community

L-200 My Community: Tell a story about your community with 3-5 photographs

L-201 My Community: Collage of photographs (unlimited number of photos) on the subject of "My Community." Size of each individual photograph shall be no smaller than a minimum 3.5" x 5" and no larger than a maximum 8" x 12"

L-202 Digital Collage: multiple images cropped, resized and combined into one digital image no larger than a maximum 8" x 12" print (recommend 180-360dpi)

L-203 Digital illustration – Single heavily edited no larger than a maximum 8" x 12" digital image. Image has been radically digitally edited or enhanced. Modifications may include: cropping, sharpening or blurring, brightness or contrast changes, addition to or the removal of parts of the image, changes in the color scheme of the image, the use of filters or effects.

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Attach to back of mat board:

1. A page describing editing technique(s) used.

2. A print of the ORIGINAL image.

HORTICULTURE PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBITIONS

Horticulture is the science, art, and technology concerned with cultivated plants. Horticultural plants are commonly divided into those that are edible, those that are used for culinary or medicinal purposes, and those that are used for ornamental or aesthetic purposes.

HORTICULTURAL PHOTOGRAPHY CLASSES

L-204 Single black and white. Horticultural subject or activity. (maximum size: 8" x 12")

L-205 Single color. Horticultural subject or activity. (maximum size: 8" x 12")

L-206 Sequence of 4 photographs. B&W or Color representing a horticultural event or activity that tells a visual story, chronologically, without the use of words.

L-207 Horticulture collection (B&W or color), consisting of 6 photographs.

DIVISION 9 – GEOLOGY

1. Display boxes must be no less than 16" no more than 20" vertically and no less than 22" no more than 24" horizontally.

2. All boxes must have Plexiglas cover that can be easily removed for judging.

3. EACH exhibit must be secured with a lock. Attach a key to box with your name and county firmly attached to key. Key will be returned to 4-H agent. Keep another key in case key is misplaced.

4. Hinges and Locks: Make flush or mount on sides or top of boxes so boxes will sit level.

5. Fabric: If fabric is used, use a fabric glue to adhere entire piece of fabric to box. Suggested fabrics are felt or velveteen.

6. Rocks: Should be firmly attached to the box, and should be numbered to correspond with the number on the Geology Identification Labels. (4DB-01SO)

7. Boxes will be displayed on their side, not flat. Therefore, larger specimens must be attached near the lower portion of the box.

8. Geology Identification Labels (4DB-01SO) available from the County Extension agent for 4-H are the only labels acceptable. Circle whether found or purchased or obtained otherwise and state where found or purchased. (If you circle found, you are indicating you personally found the specimen).

9. Exhibits will be disqualified for class champion if:

a. Box does not fit in the size stated in rule 1

b. Box contains too few or too many specimens

c. Box does not have a Plexiglas cover that can be opened

d. Label does not state whether rocks are found or purchased, and state where found or purchased.

e. Specimen is mounted jewelry

f. Specimen is mounted and polished

g. Specimen and label are not numbered

h. Specimens are not arranged in numerical order

i. Duplicate specimens are used to reach minimum number

10. The following score card will be used to judge geology exhibits:

a. Correct identification and labeling – 5 points for each specimen

b. Cards properly mounted and easily seen – 1 point for each specimen

c. Neatness, arrangements, background – 20 points for total exhibit

d. Method of collection – 1 point extra for each rock collected on site by 4-H'ers and identified as being collected on site.

11. 4-H'ers entering fifth year and up cannot enter the same exhibit that has been judged in any previous State Fair.

12. **Purchased items must be identified as such.**

Classes are:

L-208 Fossils – a collection of 15 fossils. (Up to a maximum of 20 will be accepted.) May be completed by any 4-H'er regardless of what year in geology project, but must include different fossils each year.

L-209 First Year Geology – consisting of 15 different specimens.

L-210 Second Year Geology – consisting of 25 different specimens (up to 12 may be from previous project year) (no more than 2 boxes)

L-211 Third Year Geology – consisting of 35 different specimens (up to 17 may be from previous project year) (no more than 2 boxes)

L-212 Fourth Year Geology – consisting of 50 different specimens (up to 25 may be from previous project year) (no more than 2 boxes)

L-213 Special collection for fifth year or more members – creative, advanced display of member's choosing which depicts a geological process, theme, story, or manufacturing process. Posters, notebooks and written narratives may be included.

DIVISION 10 – 4-H FORESTRY

1. Exhibitors are not to exceed the number of specimens listed for each class. If exhibit contains less than the correct number, it will be disqualified.

FIRST YEAR

L-214 Leaf Collections

Collection of 10 leaves representing 10 forest trees found in Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book, "4-H Forestry Project Unit I – Introducing Yourself to Trees" (4DF-01PA or most recent version) Activity #1 are to be followed.

L-215 Leaf Print Collection

Collect and print 10 leaves representing 10 forest trees found in Kentucky. Instructions in the forestry book, "4-H Forestry Project Unit I – Introducing Yourself to Trees" (4DF-01PA or most recent version) Activity #3 are to be followed.

SECOND YEAR

L-216 Leaf Collection – 2nd year

Collection of 20 leaves representing 20 forest trees and *different from ones done by same exhibitor in first year project* found in Kentucky. Mounting instructions in the forestry book, "4-H Forestry Project Unit I – Introducing Yourself to Trees" (4DF-01PA or most recent version) Activity #1 are to be followed.

L-217 Educational Exhibit

Develop a creative educational exhibit on some phase of forestry. The exhibit may utilize any visual technique. The total exhibit is not to exceed dimensions of 2' x 2', or four (4) square feet.

THIRD YEAR AND OVER

L-218 Educational Exhibit

Develop a creative educational exhibit on some phase of forestry. The exhibit may utilize any visual technique. The total is not to exceed dimensions of 3' x 3', or nine (9) square feet.

L-219 Stem, Leaf, Fruit display

Collect and mount 5 stems, leaves and fruit representing 5 forest trees found in Kentucky. **Follow closely the instructions in the forestry book, "4-H Forestry Project Unit I – Introducing Yourself to Trees" (4DF-01PA or most recent version) Activity #2** is to be followed, including the 2' x 3' *exact* size.

DIVISION 11 - 4-H HORTICULTURE & PLANT SCIENCE

1. Plants, photographs or other visual aids are necessary for most projects. The class will be governed by the following:

a. Exhibits will be judged on the quality of the primary (horticulture) project work.

b. All plants exhibited **MUST** have been grown by the 4-Hers for at least 6 months. Exceptions will be made with terrariums, dish gardens and annual and vegetable bucket gardens which may have been



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grown for a shorter period of time.
 c. Items improperly entered will be disqualified.
 d. Exhibits entered with pesticide residue will be disqualified and disposed of.
 e. Care will be provided for all plants. However, because of low light, air conditioning, etc., no guarantee can be made that the plants will be returned in their original condition. Plants are entered at the risk of the exhibitor.

f. Vegetable entries should be fresh.

Youth should NOT use garden soil in containers. Use well-drained, disease-free potting soil for all containers.

L-220 Environmental Awareness (such as but not limited to:): A one page description of project must accompany entry item (type or printed neatly) to be eligible for entry.

A. Tree planting on city property, roadways, parks, etc.
 B. Home landscaping
 C. Composting

L-221 Production and Marketing (such as but not limited to:):

A. Vegetable garden planted for home and/or market use.

B. The planting, production, or management of fruit plantings.

C. The planting, production, or management of trees, shrubs, greenhouse crops or garden perennials.

L-222 Experimental Horticulture (such as, but not limited to:): A one page description of project must accompany entry item (type or printed neatly) to be eligible for entry.

A. "Science Fair" type of exhibit involving experimental work with plants

B. Comparison of different varieties of vegetables or annual flowers

C. Comparison of mulching or other cultural practices

L-223 Horticultural Project Exhibits (such as, but

not limited to:): A one page description of project must accompany entry item (type or printed neatly) to be eligible for entry.

A. How to propagate plants

B. How to force spring bulbs

C. How to start seeds

D. How to graft cacti

E. How to dry herbs

Plant Display: Youth should NOT use garden soil in containers. Use well - drained, disease-free potting soil for all containers.

L-224 Terrariums

L-225 Dish gardens (desert or tropical)

L-226 Vegetable container gardens (grown in container – not dug out of the garden)

L-227 Annual container gardens – (non-vegetable)

L-228 House plants

L-229 Hanging baskets

L-230 Garden and/or Orchard Displays

The exhibitor may exhibit as many different fruits and/or vegetables from their garden as desired. Any size or type (minimum of five types) of produce may be displayed in the 2'x3' area provided for each exhibit. The exhibit must be in a display container (box or basket) which can be easily moved. Vegetables will not be returned to exhibitor.

They will be judged as follows:

Quality of produce 40%

Attractiveness of container 30%

Uniformity and true-to-typeness 10%

Number of different types 15%

Labeling 5%

4-H'ers may also exhibit plates of vegetables. A white paper plate for vegetables must be supplied by the exhibitor. These vegetables will not be returned to the exhibitor. Classes of vegetables will be limited to:

L-231 Tomato (5 per plate) Must be ripe (red or yellow color only)

L-232 Peppers, hot, bell, or sweet (5 per plate)

L-233 Cucumbers, slicing (5 per plate); pickling (5 per plate)

L-234 Beans, snap or lima (12 per plate)

L-235 Corn, sweet (in the husk with silks) (5 ears per plate)

L-236 Cantaloupe (1 whole), halved

They will be judged as follows:

Condition 25%

Quality 20%

Uniformity 20%

True-To Type 20%

Size 15%

Consult Exhibiting and Judging Vegetables (4BC-08PO) to learn the characteristics of these criteria.

The largest vegetable may not be the highest quality, nevertheless, it is unique. The largest entry in each of the following classes will receive a class champion ribbon.

L-237 Largest tomato (by weight) Must be ripe (red or yellow color only)

L-238 Largest cabbage (by weight)

L-239 Largest pumpkin (by weight)

L-240 Largest watermelon (by weight)

Division 12 – 4-H ELECTRIC

1. Exhibits must be made according to the instructions in the 4-H project book.

2. All exhibits requiring bulbs must have the correct size.

3. Use of molded plug-ins is discouraged.

4. No cord that has been bought in a store and later repaired may be entered.

5. Effective strain relief should be provided for all wire to terminal connections. Knots, clamps, connectors, or staples are acceptable when used appropriately.

6. 4-H electric exhibits will be divided into the following classes:

FUNDAMENTALS (DC Power, Units 1 & 2)

L-241 Battery powered series and parallel circuits

L-242 Electric games

L-243 Electromagnetic circuits

L-244 DC motor

WIRING (AC power, Unit 3)

L-245 Electric extension cord – (3 wire), heavy duty outdoor (GFCI outlet acceptable)

L-246 Wiring diagram for home and/or farmstead

L-247 Wiring display – actual wiring for a specific unit

LIGHTING (not covered in new material)

L-248 "Pop can" lamp kits

L-249 Table, desk, vanity, or floor lamps (any purpose – kits only)

L-250 Pin up lamp (kit or original design)

L-251 Table, desk, vanity, or floor lamps (any purpose – original design only)

ELECTRONICS

L-252 Solar electric cell applications

L-253 Basic electronic circuits with solid-state components (from kits).

L-254 Basic electronic circuits with solid-state components (original circuit design).

DIVISION 13 - 4-H WOOD SCIENCE

L-255 Level 1, made from a kit. Simple items which have pre-cut and pre-drilled parts and youth demonstrate knowledge of assembly, selection and use of fasteners (nails, screws and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes (Example: small birdhouse, non-hopper bird feeder).

L-256 Level 1, NOT from a kit. Simple constructed wood item showing knowledge of hand tools, wood selection, cutting, drilling, use of fasteners (nails, screws and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes, (such as, napkin holder, letter holder, simple picture frame, wire wiggly, towel holder, serving tray, jewelry box, small flag holder, 4-H bookends, airplane, hurricane lamp, trivet (potholder), etc.

L-257 Level 2, made from a kit. More elaborate items which require cutting, drilling and youth

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demonstrate knowledge of selection and skill in use of fasteners (nails, screws and/or glue), sanding techniques, and appropriate finishes (Example: pine wood car, large birdhouse).

L-258 Level 2, NOT from a kit. More elaborate items that demonstrate a mastered skills with hand tools, basic knowledge of power hand tools, fastening options, appropriate surface preparations, and finish applications, (such as puzzle, footstool, revolving tie rack, 4-H key holder, cutting board, book rack, serving dish shelf, sawhorse, hopper-type bird feeder, etc.)

L-259 Level 3, NOT from a kit. Items showing a more advanced knowledge of power tools, expertise in cutting, fitting, surface preparation, attention to fastening details, and finish application, (such as a multi-purpose box, corner shelf, book shelf or laminated wood projects, garden bench, planting box, nail and toolbox, shop tool rack and shelf, etc.) This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the item and 2) a folder containing photographic documentation of the steps taken in order to complete this exhibit.

L-260 Level 4, NO kits. Exhibits with a "furniture" quality finish, showing an understanding of all woodworking techniques learned in previous levels. Items showing a mastery of joint construction and use of special woods, and finishes. (Examples, checker boardroom divider, coffee table, end table, chest of drawers, gun rack or cabinet, etc.). This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the item and 2) a folder containing photographic documentation of the steps taken in order to complete this exhibit.

L-261 Level 4, NO kits. Exhibits that do not have a fine finish (painted finish allowable) because of practical use. Items demonstrate knowledge of all woodworking techniques learned in previous levels. Items showing a mastery of cutting, drilling, joint construction, use of special woods, and appropriate finishes. (Examples,

porch swing, chaise lounge, picnic table, lawn chair, large planters, etc.). This exhibit is to be made up of two parts: 1) the item and 2) a folder containing photographic documentation of the steps taken in order to complete this exhibit.

DIVISION 14 – ENTOMOLOGY

1. Specifications for exhibits:

- 9" x 13" folding cardboard insect-collection boxes available through UK College of Agriculture, Department of Entomology, should be used. Homemade or purchased wooden exhibit boxes may be used instead. They must be approximately 18" x 24" and not more than 3 1/2" thick with Plexiglas or glass covers and cellotex pinning bottoms (or plastazote or polyethylene pinning bottoms available from entomology supply stores such as Bioquip.com). Boxes must be easily opened (for instance; if a screw is used to secure Plexiglas tops, use a thumbscrew fastener instead of a fastener that requires a tool).
- Specimens are to be arranged so the box can be exhibited horizontally. 4-H'ers may attach wires to the back of wooden boxes to help make them easier to display.
- Identification labels available from your county Extension office must be used, or custom labels may be printed if they conform exactly to the font, font size, and font color of the official labels. Labels should be printed onto white cardstock. The exhibit identification card should be placed on the front of the box (each box). Instructions for pinning and labeling are included in your project literature.
- One half of the specimens may be from the previous year's collection or from anywhere in the United States; one half or more must be Kentucky insects collected since the last Kentucky State Fair.
- For the first through fifth year projects, a display

collection catalogue must be in an envelope attached to the back of the display box. Envelopes should be attached to permit their being opened easily to remove catalogue from them without moving the exhibit.

- Most specimens in the display cases should be pinned, and the use of vials is discouraged. If vials are used, they may account for no more than 2% of a collection. Vials must be securely wired or pinned to the pinning bottoms.
 - The inclusion of non-insect specimens (spiders, e.g.) is encouraged, but because this is primarily an insect collection, and because non-insects do not preserve well on insect pins, points will be deducted if there are more than one specimen from each non-insect class.
- Entomology exhibits are judged on the following categories: Orders, Species, Common Names, Labels, Condition of Specimens, Overall Appearance, Life Cycle Representation, Catalog of Specimens. Check with county 4-H agent for point distribution on score sheet.
 - Exhibits will be penalized if they do not:
 - Use insect pins for pinning insects.
 - Use the 4-H entomology identification labels.
 - Use display boxes that are not the official 9" x 13" cardboard boxes acquired through the Dept. of Entomology, or wooden boxes that are approximately 18" x 24" x 3 1/2."
 - Fulfill the requirements of the particular exhibit under which it is entered.
 - Have the insects arranged so the box can be exhibited horizontally.
 - Have the display collection catalogue in an envelope attached to the back of the display box through fifth year projects.
 - No extra credit will be given for specimens exhibited beyond the numbers listed in the current project books.

5. 4-H'ers entering fifth year cannot use the same exhibit that has been judged in any previous State Fair.

6. 4-H entomology exhibits will be divided into the following classes:

L-262 First year project (Up to three 9" x 13" official cardboard boxes, or up to two 18" x 24" wooden boxes, with minimum of 25 insects, maximum 50 insects, from at least four orders. Identification beyond order not necessary. All specimens must have date and locality label).

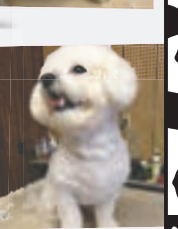
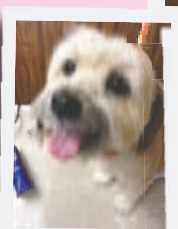
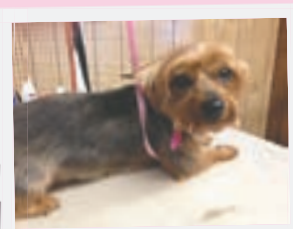
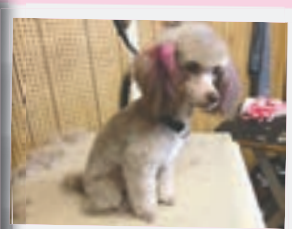
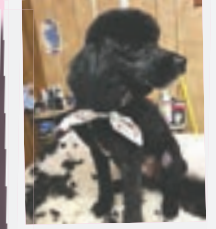
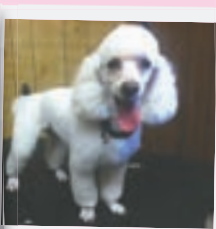
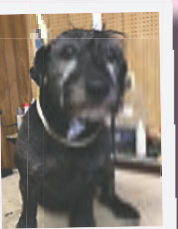
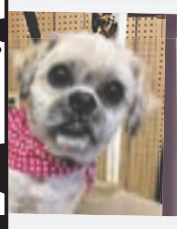
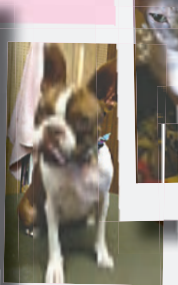
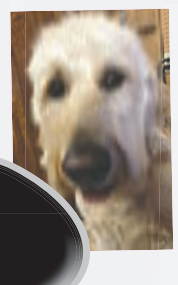
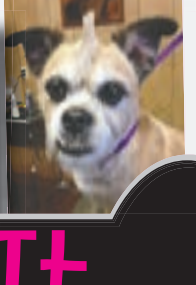
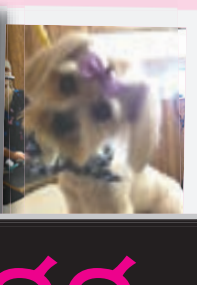
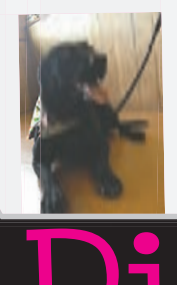
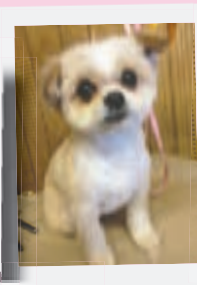
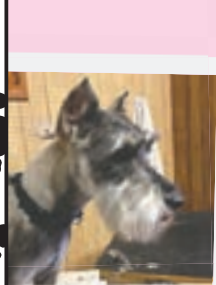
L-263 Second year project (Up to three 9" x 13" official cardboard boxes, or up to two 18" x 24" wooden boxes, with minimum of eight orders and not less than 50 insects, nor more than 100 insects.) Half of the insects should be identified with a common name.

L-264 Third year project (Three 9" x 13" official cardboard boxes, or two 18" x 24" wooden boxes, with a minimum of 10 orders and 100 insects, a maximum of 150 insects).

L-265 Fourth year project (Three 9" x 13" official cardboard boxes, or two 18" x 24" wooden boxes, with minimum of 12 orders and 150 insects, no maximum). An additional cardboard or wooden box with an example of insect damage, the stage of the insect causing the damage and any other stage of the insect that helps identify the problem. Include information in the display that tells how the insect is controlled. Life cycle of two insects may be displayed if desired.

L-266 Fifth year project (may be repeated for successive years of eligibility but must be a different exhibit. No exhibit that has been judged in any previous State Fair may be entered). Any type of display that pertains to experiences beyond those of previous projects. Special collections of native and/or exotic butterflies, beetles to some other insect order; a study in depth of one insect or small group of insects; a display of insect camouflage; a display of plastic embedded

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insects: a collection of insect larvae and nymphs are examples. Charts, photographs, models or any other visual aids may be used. 4-H'ers are encouraged to write a short (1 or 2 paragraphs) statement developing the theme of their fifth year display.

HONEY

Honey will show better in oval, flat-sided to square clear glass containers. 4-H'ers **must** use standard honey jars. **Except class 696, wide-mouth mason jars or wide-mouth honey jars may be used.** The jars and lids must be clean. Fill jars to within 1/2 inch of top. **Note: Two jars must be submitted for the following classes.**

L-267 Two one pound containers of white extracted honey

L-268 Two one pound containers of light amber extracted honey

L-269 Two one pound containers of amber extracted honey

L-270 Two one pound containers of dark amber extracted honey

L-271 Two wide mouth quart jars of chunk honey, any color.

DIVISION 15 4-H POSTERS

Posters must be created by a currently enrolled 4-H'er. Posters must be designed on a 14 in. x 22 in. poster board (1/2 of a regular poster board). Posters may be designed horizontally or vertically using an medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, oils, pencil or collage. Posters CANNOT be three-dimensional. **Copyrighted characters may not be used. Examples: Charlie Brown, Taz, Rugrats, etc.** 4-H is the subject for the poster. The poster may take the approach or focus on any area of 4-H. You can show what 4-H is, what you do in 4-H, or what 4-H offers to young people. National 4-H themes, (used for National 4-H Week) cannot be used. Example: "Making the Best Better." "4-H Freedom to Be."

L-272 Cloverbud (age 5-8)

L-273 Junior (age 9-13)

L-274 Senior (age 14-19)

ELECTRICAL POSTERS

L-275 Electrical safety or energy conservation posters

EDUCATIONAL 4-H DOG PROJECT POSTERS

1. Educational posters **MUST** relate to dogs. Poster must be judged at the county level before entry at the State Fair. **(County winner must have received at least a blue ribbon at the county level before entered at the state fair level.)**

2. Posters should encourage the participant's imagination in developing a slogan/theme that promotes a breed or project or educates the viewer about a dog project related activity. Examples of topics include but are not limited to: showing/grooming/caring for your dog, dog health, nutrition, and breed characteristics. Posters should be simple and focus on one message to tell the story of your dog poster theme. Resource information should be attached to the back of the poster.

3. Participants may use a variety of media, however no 3-dimensional posters will be allowed.

4. Posters must be no smaller than 20" x 30" and no larger than 24" x 30." Posters must be made using one of the following, matt board, or foam core board. **No poster board is allowed.** Posters submitted on poster board will be disqualified at entry.

5. **Copyrighted characters such as Snoopy, Charlie Brown, or other cartoon characters cannot be used.**

6. The back of the poster **MUST** include a listing of the resources of the information on the poster or the poster will be marked down in judging. Poster content should allow for display of the label 4LO-11SO in

the bottom right corner of poster, approximate size of a 3x5 card.

7. Posters will be judged on how well they present information and on their general appearance.

8. Class champion ribbons will be presented. All participants will receive ribbons and premiums.

10. There is no Cloverbud dog poster class.

DIVISION 16 - 4-H CROPS PROJECT

1. Grain samples must be of good quality and free from foreign matter. The Superintendent has the authority to refuse any and all entries due to excess chaff, rodent pellets, mold, musty, foreign materials, or anything that makes is unsuitable for display. Do not bring grains in glass containers. **Grain must be in one (1) gallon zip lock bags.** ID tags and yield/variety information must be attached to bag.

2. Bring 1/2 hay bale securely bound with cord or twine. **Place 1/2 hay bale in a large double strength garbage bag.**

3. Legume hay shall consist of 85% if the class designed legume. Grass hay shall be 85% of the class-designed grass. Mixed hay should contain only one eligible grass and one eligible legume. The legume component shall be at least 30 percent alfalfa and not more than 70% legume. Eligible legumes are alfalfa, red clover, and ladino clover. Eligible grasses are timothy, Bermuda grass, orchard grass, tall fescue and rye grass.

4. The field corn variety and yield information must be included.

5. Roots of soybeans must be washed.

6. Exhibitor is limited to 1 entry per class. Exhibitor is not limited to number of classes entered.

L-278 Alfalfa hay, 1/2 bale (no full bales accepted)

from the current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled.

L-279 Red clover hay, 1/2 bale (no full bales accepted) from the current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled.

GRASS HAY:

L-280 Timothy hay, 1/2 bale (no full bales accepted) from this current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled. **Place hay in a double strength plastic bag.**

L-281 Other grass hay, 1/2 bale (no full bales accepted) from the current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled. **Place hay in a double strength plastic bag.**

MIXED HAY:

L-282 Mixed hay, 1/2 bale (no full bales accepted) from the current year's project crop, neatly tied and labeled.

YELLOW CORN:

L-283 Yellow-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.

L-284 Yellow-ear, from the current year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.

L-285 Yellow-shelled, from the previous year's crop, 0.5 gallon in a container, and labeled to show variety and yield.

WHITE CORN:

L-286 White-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.

L-287 White-ear, from the current year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.

L-288 White-shelled, from the previous year's crop, 0.5 gallon in a container, and labeled to show variety and yield.

POPCORN:

L-289 White popcorn-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.

L-290 Red popcorn-ear, from the previous year's crop, 8 ears shucked, and labeled with variety and yield.

DIVISION 17 – 4-H TOBACCO EXHIBIT

1. Entries in 4-H tobacco are restricted to enrolled members of 4-H.

2. An exhibitor may enter in any one or all different classes. However, one exhibitor is limited to **ONE** entry per class (potted plant, green stick and stripped tobacco).

3. Each stick of green tobacco consists of 4 stalks per stick.

4. All entries in the green stick classes should be wilted for a better presentation, but must still be in **GREEN**

STAGE. Green tobacco will be judged on uniformity, general appearance and quality. The Superintendent has the right to disqualify any stick entered into the green stick category that has cured beyond the green stage.

5. All growing tobacco plants should be potted in a waterproof plastic bag and placed in an attractive container before arrival at the Fair. A five (5) gallon bucket is suggested.

Burley – Best Crop

L-299 Best crop, 4-H, 4 grades - Entries shall be on an individual basis and must be produced by the exhibitor. Only **one** entry per individual is permitted and an entry shall consist of four grades: Flying, Lugs, Leaf and Tips. Each grade shall consist of two hands of 20 leaves each.

L-300 Dark Tobacco 4-H Best Crop (2 hands – 20 leaves each grade) – Entries shall be on an individual basis and must be produced by the exhibitor. One entry per individual is permitted and an entry shall consist of four grades: Wrappers, Heavy Brown Leaf, Dark Leaf, and Thin Brown Leaf.

L-301 Dark – Growing Dark Tobacco Plant

L-302 Best potted growing plant of dark tobacco, any type

4-H Class Green Tobacco (by sticks):

DIVISION 18 – Kentucky 4-H Trends

1. All items must have been made since the last State Fair.

2. All photography classes with one photograph must be mounted on 10" x 16" **MAT BOARD** – available at the Meade County Extension office (no poster board or foam core board accepted). Single photographs are limited to up to a maximum size of 8" x 12."

3. Each picture must be mounted securely. Rubber

cement or dry mounting tissue is recommended. Do not use photo mounting corners.

4. All photographic entries are required to have sticky-back Velcro ("hook" Velcro only) in each of the four corners on the back of the mat board for easier exhibiting. The "loop"/smooth Velcro is not necessary and leaving it off will minimize hanging preparation time by judges.

5. All entries must follow the specifications and rules listed in their class in order to be named champion.

6. Junior division includes ages 9-13; Senior division includes ages 14-18.

Clover Photography

1. Exhibit is limited to a single photograph.

2. Subject of photograph must include 4-leaf clover. (Photographs of 3-leaf clovers will NOT be accepted).

3. 4-leaf clover may be real or created.

4. Photograph may be color or black and white.

5. Follow all mounting rules described in the Cloverville Photography division.

6. Maximum photograph size 8" X 12".

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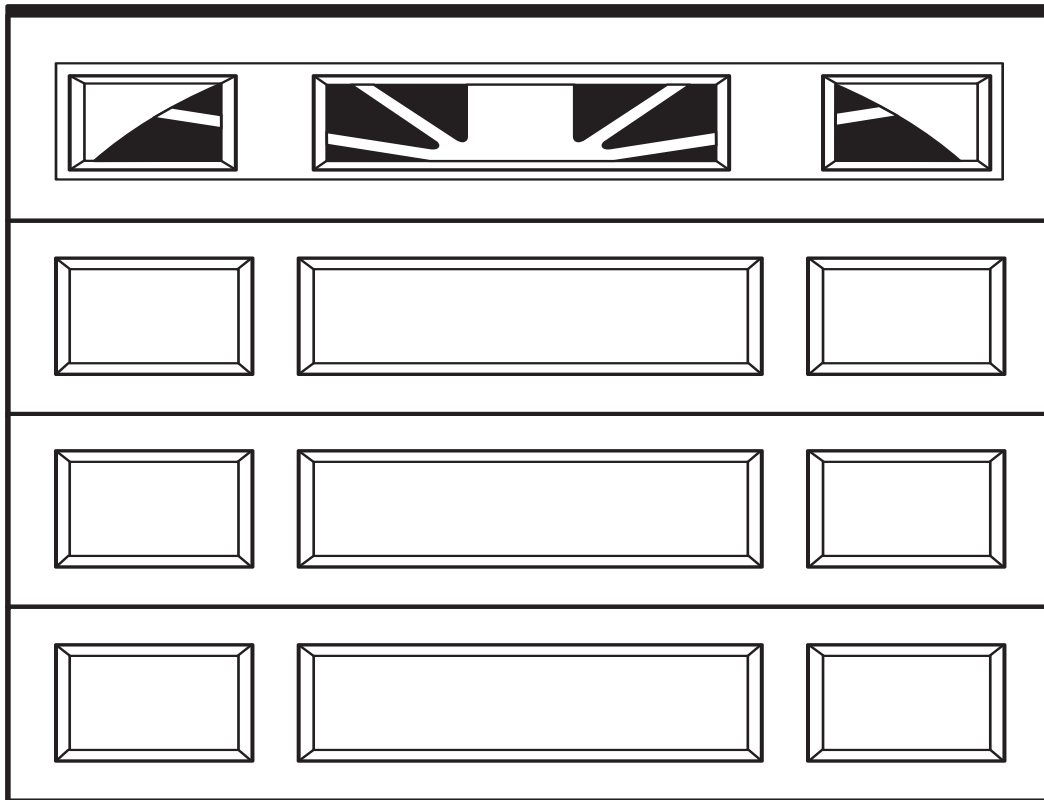
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
