## Oregon native enters 4th year as long snapper

Grayson Pibal was hooked on Montana from the start.

That began when the long snapper came to Missoula for a campus tour while in high school. He reached out to recruiting coordinator Justin Green to find out how he could be recruited and learned he had to attend a summer camp.

He gladly returned and caught

the eye of head coach Bobby Hauck. The offer eventually came for Pibal, who had already been lured in and now kicks off his senior season when the Griz host Central Washington at 6 p.m. Saturday.

"When I came here, I'm like this is where I want to be," he said. "There's a river going through the university. I can go over to that bridge and fish. Yeah, I think I want to go here."

That river is the Clark Fork River, which is just over a football field's length away from Washington-Grizzly Stadium. It's even closer to the Riverbowl, the outdoor field where the Griz put in their work to try to net a

national title.

Pibal has enjoyed a pair of passions — football and fishing — in the Garden City, where he has played more games in a Griz uniform than any other player on the roster. He's felt right at home on the field and the water as he heads into his sixth year as one of four Griz who reeled in All-Big Sky preseason honors.

"I've always been around a boat my whole life, so it's been pretty fun just to keep doing that out here too," he said.

When he's not working on guiding the football to a punter or holder, he's guiding fishing trips. He works as an independent contractor with a couple different lo-

cal outfitters, he said.

He'll lead those trips in the spring and summer, when the rigors of a college football season and a full load of classes are lessened. It can make for some long days, but they're also fun because he's doing what he loves.

"There's nothing better to do in the summer than that in my opinion," he said. "I'll go to the 6 o'clock morning lift and that'll take two hours. Then I'm running out the door to pick up clients, wolfing down a protein shake and sandwiches and hoping I smell good."

Pibal has taken people on the Missouri, Bitterroot, Blackfoot, Clark Fork and Rock Creek rivers,

he said. He's taught people from all walks of life, but it's especially rewarding molding newcomers who are fly fishing for the first time.

"I have a great time and get to tell people football stories and they absolutely love it," he said. "I've taken corporate CEOs, people with a lot more money than I could ever imagine. I've also taken just the two blue collar buddies."

"They're all fun. My favorite ones are probably taking the little kids. Those are always fun. They load up on cookies, snacks, juice boxes. And if they catch one fish, it's the time of their life."

# Meet the Grizzlies' new No. 37

## Billings' Oven to carry on legacy jersey tradition

Clay Oven left Dana J. Dykhouse Stadium in Brookings, South Dakota, after Montana's season-ending defeat last December as a redshirt freshman.

When he returns to Washington-Grizzly Stadium to kick off the new season on Saturday, he'll be returning as one of the newly anointed faces of the program. Oven, hailings from Billings, was chosen to carry on the Grizzlies' No. 37 legacy tradition by fellow Billings native Trevin Gradney in June.

A rising redshirt sophomore linebacker, Oven is one of the few familiar faces on a defense otherwise characterized by new talent. As Montana looks to turn its defense around, Oven will be one of the names in the mix for snaps.

*Oven sat down with 406 MT Sports after a recent practice ahead of Montana's season opener against Central Washington at 6 p.m. Saturday in Washington-Grizzly Stadium. This interview has been edited for clarity and brevity.*

**Q: You were named the co-defensive scout team player of the year as a redshirt in 2023. What was that year like for you and what do you think you took from the experience most?**

**A:** Just looking up to the older guys and seeing kind of how they do stuff, really getting the opportunity to kind of just put your head down and lift and work out. Learn from the guys that came before you, kind of just a workman's mentality. The ability to be fresh for every lift and really lock in mentally on what's going on really helped me a ton.

**Q: How different was 2024,**

**your first season on the active roster?**

**A:** Coach Hauck always preaches a workman's mentality, which I think you really have to buy into in order to succeed here. You kind of keep that same base layer, and then everything else is just a bonus. You get to keep stacking on experiences as you go.

**Q: What were the biggest adjustments from year one to year two?**

**A:** I think just that game speed,

you know, truly seeing guys of different colored jerseys. Being able to see how fast the pace is, being able to adapt to that and adjust on the fly.

**Q: Were there any moments early last season when you could feel the difference in speed or adrenaline level?**

**A:** That first game is kind of a shock to the system. Then, those big rivalry games, your blood is always going so you're feeling the pressure and the heat for sure.

You're able to kind of build on that.

**Q: You received the UM President's Award for maintaining the highest individual GPA in all of Grizzly athletics. What do you think has contributed to your success?**

**A:** I think, kind of going back to that workman's mentality, you know, you just put your head down and work. Those first couple years when you're not on the field as much, you get to learn from

the older guys and you're able to spend more time studying and all that stuff. I think that really kind of helped me.

**Q: What does your week-to-week schedule look like? How are you able to balance all of your commitments?**

**A:** Kind of just focus on school in the morning, then go get treatment and hit your lift. Then you can shower up and really go focus



# HOW WE SEE THE BIG SKY

The four nonconference home games Montana will play are a little like one of those sugary Peeps you sample a week after Easter.

They're mostly soft and marshmallowy with one rough edge.

I'm not trying to be critical and I know it's a challenge to attract nonleague FCS teams to Zootown. I just prefer exciting matchups where the outcome is in question. The kind the players remember long after they've left football behind.

This week's home opener for UM falls under the category of Why Not Pick On Someone Your Own Size? I just don't see the point of an FCS program as established as Montana playing any NCAA Division II team unless it's Ferris State. I guess the Grizzly coaching staff wants a warm-up game, which makes perfect sense to some and smells like low tide in late summer to others.

Fortunately, Montana's home game next week against 20th-ranked North Dakota was upgraded to must-see after the Fighting Hawks gave No. 17 (FBS) Kansas State a run for its money Saturday. North Dakota led by four points at halftime and four with a minute left before falling, 38-35.

Indiana State and Sacred Heart (no, not Loyola) are the other two nonconference home tilts for Montana. Not much pizzazz there.

Ah well, there's more than one way to play yourself into a preferred postseason draw. If UM wins all the games it's supposed to win over inferior foes — both conference and nonconference — it will probably cash in with a few home playoff dates.

But if you're like me and believe in the old adage that steel sharpens steel, you're probably not a big fan of the Grizzlies' nonconference schedule as a whole.

*Here's a look at this weekend's games (all are Saturday except EWU at Boise State, which is Friday night):*

**Central Washington (1-0) at No. 6 Montana (0-0), 6 p.m. TV: Scripps Sports.** I'll be watching to find out what the Grizzlies have up their sleeve at quarterback. Last year's platoon approach wasn't exactly a home run. Keali'i Ah Yat would seem to be the heir apparent after starting six games and seeing action in 11 last year. But is he consistent and durable enough to take the Grizzlies to the promised land? Or will this new guy, USC transfer Jake Jensen, take the state by storm? I'll be watching for subtle clues Saturday while taking it all with a grain of salt since UM is facing a Division II foe. **Speltz:** Grizzlies 30, Central Washington 13. **Gogola:** UM 49, CWU 3. **Flores:** Griz 45, CWU 7. **Cashion:** Montana 41, Central Washington 6.

**No. 2 South Dakota State (1-0) at No. 3 Montana State (0-1), 6 p.m. TV: Scripps Sports.** You could make the argument the Bobcats' humbling loss at Oregon has nothing to do with how tough they will be on the FCS level. I think it showed Montana State is a work in progress offensively and will have a tough time staying with the Jackrabbits — even in Bozeman. South Dakota State is going to show a lot of folks why it is ranked No. 2 in

the nation. **Speltz:** Jackrabbits 30, Bobcats 24. **Gogola:** Cats 28, Jacks 27. **Flores:** Cats 24, SDSU 20. **Cashion:** South Dakota State 28, Montana State 21.

**Eastern Washington (0-1) at Boise State (0-1), 7 p.m. TV: FS1.** Few expected Boise State to lose handily at South Florida last week (34-7). It's worth noting it was a 10-7 game at halftime. You better believe that humidity in Tampa is a true challenge on the football field for out-of-staters. Just ask Notre Dame, which seemed to run out of steam in the trenches late in the fourth quarter in Sunday's loss at Miami. The refreshed Broncos will bury the Eagles. **Speltz:** Broncos 38, Eagles 13. **Gogola:** Boise 35, Eags 10. **Flores:** Boise State 42, EWU 7. **Cashion:** Boise State 38, Eastern Washington 10.

**Idaho State (0-2) at New Mexico (0-1), 1 p.m. TV: ESPN+.** The Bengals put a scare into UNLV two weeks ago in Vegas, scoring 31 points. You wondered if maybe this could be a breakout season. Then they lost 46-24 at Southern Utah last week. Now you're wondering if it's the same old Bengals. **Speltz:** Lobos 37, Bengals 17. **Gogola:** Lobos 45, Bengals 20. **Flores:** New Mexico 55, ISU 21. **Cashion:** New Mexico 31, Idaho State 14.

**St. Thomas (1-0) at No. 10 Idaho (0-1), 2 p.m. TV: ESPN+.** Interestingly, St. Thomas is the first program to jump from NCAA Division III directly to FCS. It happened four years ago. Prior to that, the Tommies were a dominant force in the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. And one year prior to that league forming, they played in the 1949 Cigar Bowl where they tied Missouri Valley, a team from Marshall, Missouri. Anyway, the Tommies had a nice win over FCS Lindenwood to start the season, but they might struggle with the noise in the Kibbie Dome. **Speltz:** Vandals 35, Tommies 17. **Gogola:** Vandals 31, St. Thomas 10. **Flores:** Idaho 48, St. Thomas 10. **Cashion:** Idaho 28, St. Thomas 17.

**Utah Tech (0-1) at No. 19 Northern Arizona (0-1), 2 p.m. TV: ESPN+.** The Lumberjacks held their own for a while with 11th-ranked (FBS) Arizona State last weekend. They trailed by just 11 points with a minute left in the third quarter before eventually losing, 38-19. Utah Tech gave eighth-ranked UC Davis a run for its money before losing in St. George, 31-24. This is going to be a close one. I'll give the Jacks a slight edge since they're playing at 7,000 feet. **Speltz:** Lumberjacks 27, Trailblazers 24. **Gogola:** Jacks 35, Tech 21. **Flores:** NAU 34, Utah Tech 24. **Cashion:** Northern Ariona 21, Utah Tech 20.

**No. 18 Sacramento State (0-1) at Nevada (0-1), 3 p.m. TV: MW Network.** It's hard to draw any conclusions based on what these teams did last Saturday. The Hornets lost 20-3 at second-ranked South Dakota State — a respectable score but where's the offense? The Wolf Pack lost 46-11 at Penn State. Coach Jeff Choate's Nevada squad isn't exactly a juggernaut, but I'll go with the Wolf Pack to win at home. If the Pack loses, its fans are going to be mighty restless. **Speltz:** Wolf Pack 19, Hornets 14. **Gogola:** Nevada 27, Hornets 13. **Flores:** Nevada 28, Sac State 14. **Cashion:** Nevada 35, Sacramento State 21.

**Cal Poly (1-0) at Utah (1-0), 4 p.m. TV: ESPN+.** The Utes roughed up UCLA last week in Salt Lake with a 43-10 victory. Cal Poly recorded an impressive road win over San Diego, 41-17. This week will not be so productive for the Mustangs' offense. **Speltz:** Utes 48, Mustangs 12. **Gogola:** Utah 56, Cal Poly 0. **Flores:** Utah 63, Cal Poly 0. **Cashion:** Utah 57, Cal Poly 10.

**Portland State (0-2) at No. 20 North Dakota (0-1), 5 p.m. TV: ESPN+.** After putting a scare into Kansas State in Manhattan last week, the Fighting Hawks will get their first win Saturday. Expect big offensive numbers for the host team. **Speltz:** Fighting Hawks 55, Vi-

kings 10. **Gogola:** North Dakota 49, Viks 6. **Flores:** UND 52, PSU 10. **Cashion:** North Dakota 48, Portland State 3.

**Northern Colorado (1-0) at Colorado State (0-1), 5 p.m., TV: Altitude.** The Bears beat Division II Chadron State in Greeley last weekend, 17-3. Impressed? No? Me neither. Look for Colorado State to pick up its first win after pushing Washington last week in a 38-21 loss. **Speltz:** Rams 34, Bears 7. **Gogola:** Rams 42, Bears 0. **Flores:** CSU 49, UNC 3. **Cashion:** Colorado State 38, Northern Colorado 7.

**Weber State (0-1) at Arizona (1-0), 8 p.m., TV: ESPN+.** In this clash of Wildcats, it's important to remember Weber lost 45-10 at James Madison last week and dropped five of six to finish up last season. There's not much reason to believe the Pride of Ogden will push Arizona in Tucson. **Speltz:** Arizona 44, Weber State 17. **Gogola:** Zona 52, Weber 7. **Flores:** Arizona 56, Weber 7. **Cashion:** Arizona 48, Weber State 9.

**No. 8 UC Davis (1-0) at Washington (1-0), 9 p.m. TV: Big Ten Network.** This is arguably the second most interesting game of the week involving a Big Sky team (behind SDSU at MSU). It's a chance to see just how good the Aggies can be against a Big Ten foe. So far, Davis is a little hard to read. The Aggies should actually be 2-0, but their debut at Mercer was canceled due to lightning with Davis leading 23-17 and 7:46 remaining. Last week, the Aggies escaped with a 31-24 road win over Utah Tech. My hunch is the Huskies will have their hands full late Saturday night but will prevail. **Speltz:** Huskies 30, Aggies 23. **Gogola:** UW 34, Davis 20. **Flores:** UW 38, Davis 17. **Cashion:** Washington 24, UC Davis 21.

## Pibal

Pibal is a self-described “fishing nerd.” He grew up in Clackamas, Oregon, about 20 minutes southeast of Portland in an area that he described as similar to Missoula due to the instant access to a river.

He was on the water often growing up, whether it was swimming or being in drift boats and rowing boats. At an early age, he learned all about carp fishing and fly fishing, which he credited to his father, Andy Pibal.

“I remember being 5 years old rowing a drift boat and getting yelled at to do it right, and I’m like, ‘I don’t think I’m strong enough,’” he recalled with a laugh.

Pibal also got into sports at a young age, playing football and lacrosse among other activities. Football was his love because of the team camaraderie, but his dream of playing quarterback like his idol Brett Favre didn’t pan out.

When he didn’t make the eighth grade A team, he stuck it out at the insistence of his parents. He also got connected with Carter Kragero, a college-bound high school senior who showed him the ropes of long snapping.

“It was me and my dad every evening going out and snapping as often as we could — backyard, go down to the high school field,” he said. “My dad’s helped more than anyone could, just keeping me going and being like, ‘Yeah, you want to go hang out with your friends today, but you told me you want to play in college, so this is what we have to do to get there.’”

Pibal continued working on his newfound craft in high school, even winning a state title, and at Rubio Long Snapping Camps. He also went to college camps all around the Pacific Northwest trying to land a spot at the next level.

His father was the one driving him from Oregon to Washington to Montana. He was also the person who made sure the high schooler stuck to his word.

“He was a big part of it,” Pi-

bal said. “Even days where I was like, ‘I’m tired, I squatted today, I don’t want to go do it,’ he’s like, ‘Well, if you’re going to do this in college, you’re going to squat and you’re going to be sore going into practice.’”

Pibal was a big fish when the Griz landed him. He was graded as a five-star prospect and ranked as the No. 10 long snapper in the

country and No. 1 in the Northwest for his 2020 recruiting class by Rubio Long Snapping.

Hauck won’t take a specialist without seeing him in person, so Pibal came to a summer camp at UM. He impressed the coach with his timing, consistency and technique, setting the stage for becoming a four-year starter for the Griz.

“It’s always good to have a steady performer there,” Hauck said. “Oftentimes you don’t notice they’re out there until they have a mistake, and he hasn’t made too many. He’s been really consistent. From an on-field performance standpoint, that’s been great.”

Pibal enters this fall as the only Grizzlies player who has appeared in all 42 games since the start of the 2022 season. He had gotten to learn from All-American Matthew O’Donoghue for two years before taking over.

He also heads into the season without having had a bad snap over his past 293 attempts on field goals, extra points and punts. For the first time, he doesn’t have turnover at kicker and punter as Ty Morrison is back this year.

“He’s easily the best snapper I’ve ever been around,” Morrison said. “To be able to have the ball in the same place every single time no matter what it is, whether it’s punt, field goal, it’s always a good snap, always where you need it to be so I can really focus on myself and make sure that I get my operations right.”

Pibal could be the last of his kind under Hauck. Montana doesn’t have another dedicated long snapper on the team or in its next recruiting class so far as the coach is looking for position players who can also snap because someone who is only a long snapper takes up a valuable spot in the new era of roster limits.

Hauck has been pleased with Pibal’s growth as a blocker and tackler as well as how he keeps the special teams units organized in practice. Pibal has been grateful for getting to play all six years for the same head coach, particularly one who puts so much emphasis on special teams.

“This coaching staff is awesome,” he said. “Not many of them have left. We have a ton of special relationships with them and they all care about you. I’ve known them long enough where they can say funny things to me and it’s like, ‘Shoot, I was an idiot my freshman year. You got me.’”

Pibal had come to Montana in the fall of 2020 during COVID and credited the student-athlete academic center with keeping him on track while taking online classes. He has earned his bachelor’s degree in business administration and has been working on his Master of Business Administration.

Early on, he had become friends and then roommates with teammates Micah Ashton and Peyton Brammer, who he said got him into going to church. He also got into guiding fishing trips thanks to ex-teammate Michael Matthews and has thought about one day after college getting his outfitter license.

He’s not ready for his time at Montana to be done yet. Fortunately, he still has one final run to help the Griz land that white whale: a national championship.

“I’ve made some of my lifelong best friends out here,” he said. “That’s, I think, been the most impactful thing.”
