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Ramos retains the passion

Kicker from Miami is alive and kicking in 7th year, on 3rd team

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Nico Ramos lined up for a field goal with snow swirling around in the second round of the playoffs at Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

The early December weather was far from the typical scene Ramos was used to in Miami. Now in his seventh year of college, he's had his share of kicks in the cold or elements over the years, so he wasn't too fazed.

The Montana senior sent the ball through the uprights like he has numerous times for the Grizzlies. His make started UM on the right foot during what will be his final playoff run in a career full of unique circumstances and personal triumph.

"That first field goal in the whiteout blizzard (on Dec. 2) was pretty special actually," Montana coach Bobby Hauck said of Ramos' 43-yard make for a 3-0 lead.

Hauck and the Griz are fortunate they have Ramos, who received a waiver to play yet another season of football. He has stepped up over the past month and a half since he was called upon to take over the job kicking field goals and extra points. He's 9 of 11 on the former and 25 of 27 on the latter.

Ramos had been beaten out by freshman kicker Grant Glasgow entering the season despite being a returning starter who made 11 of 14 field goals last year. He was suddenly facing the prospect of spending his final year of college on the bench.

Ramos had a choice to make: pout or persevere. He has already been in it for the long haul, an odyssey spanning both coasts of the country since 2017, so another obstacle to overcome, another

hurdle to handle wasn't going to defeat him.

"You come in thinking that you were going to play, but not everything works out as planned," he said. "You just have to keep your head up and keep practicing and keep preparing as if I was going to play at some point."

Ramos kept honing his craft in case he got the chance to retake the field. He credits the friendly competition between him and Glasgow with making each other better even as he was relegated to the bench.

He spent the first seven games as the backup, attempting just one extra point in a blowout victory at Utah Tech in the second game of the year. He has given Montana quite the kick since he emerged from the shadow of the sideline on Oct. 28 against Northern Colorado when Glasgow went down.

He made his first nine field goals this year — 16 in a row dating back to 2022 — but did miss two 42-yarders last week, so he has another dose of adversity to tackle this week in the FCS semifinals. The No. 2 Griz are hosting No. 8

North Dakota State at 2:30 p.m. Saturday in Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

"He's done a nice job given the opportunity," Hauck said. "I suppose he personifies what we believe in our program, which is you prepare yourself, you get ready to go and when you're given an opportunity, you succeed."

Happy at home

Ramos knew he wanted to return to UM this year. He just didn't know if it would be possible.

He had to submit a waiver re-

quest to the NCAA for an additional year of eligibility. He worked with Jean Gee, Montana's senior associate athletic director for student affairs and compliance.

Ramos wrote a letter detailing his college history and why he deserved an extra year to play. They submitted the application around mid-December and the NCAA granted the waiver in time for Ramos to return for winter conditioning at the start of the

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Panfiloff is Swiss Army knife

Transfer O-lineman plays guard, tackle on left, right sides

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Cannon Panfiloff has been having a blast playing all across the offensive line for the Montana Grizzlies during his first season in Missoula.

He has played both the guard and tackle spots and has lined up on both sides of the center while appearing in 12 of 13 games. He started at left tackle last week after he started at left guard the prior two games as UM has needed to replace multiple starters in recent weeks.

Panfiloff joined the Griz this past winter as a redshirt sophomore standing at 6-foot-6 and 285 pounds. He had spent the previous three seasons at Utah Tech (formerly Dixie State), playing in 18 games. He'll have two more seasons of eligibility left after this one concludes.

He's originally from Ogden, Utah, and played at Layton High School and Roy High School. His father, Greg, played football at Weber State and baseball at then-Dixie State.

Panfiloff sat down with 406mtsports to talk about his first season in Missoula prior to No. 2 Montana's FCS semifinal game against No. 8 North Dakota State at 2:30 p.m. Saturday in Washington-Grizzly Stadium. This interview has been edited for clarity and brevity.

Q: I understand you're a big Metallica fan. Same here. Do you have a favorite song or is it more of a Mount Rushmore of top songs?

A: I've seen them live twice. If they ever make it out to Missoula, I'll definitely be there. I just got that Spotify Wrapped and they were my No. 1 band most listened to. I got a couple songs because I just can't

go one. "For Whom The Bell Tolls" has got to be one. That's a great one. "Harvester of Sorrow." That's one of my favorites too. "Creeping Death." "Creeping Dive" live. That one's just so intense, so awesome. And then "Disposable Heroes." Probably not as popular as some of the others, but that's a good one, I like that one.

Q: Great choices. Also cool is the name Cannon. How did your parents end up choosing that?

A: That's my legal first name. I don't know who exactly came up with the name. Mom said she did. Dad said he did. I'll let them both have it. The reason my dad gives me is he wanted me to be a pitcher and have a cannon arm. My dad was a really good pitcher. Obviously, didn't follow in those steps, but I'm glad to be where I am. I was a better football player.

Q: Coming from Utah, has Missoula been similar to

where you grew up? Have you been able to adapt well?

A: I'm like 30 minutes north of Salt Lake, so the snow, mountains, I have all that back home. Man, I love Missoula. There's not a better town. The people here, I think that's one of the biggest takeaways I've had is everyone is so friendly, so welcoming. Just really good to be here.

Q: How did you initially end up at Utah Tech (then-Dixie State) coming out of high school?

A: I had a preferred walk-on to BYU. I had a partial to Idaho State. I was actually committed to BYU for about a week. I was going to go the walk-on route, try and prove myself. Dixie actually came in like three days before the late signing day in February. I had known about Dixie State before. My dad went there, played baseball there. It's always a school I kind of wanted to go to just because the

area down there is really nice, it'd be fun to live there. At the time, my senior year of high school, I was debating even playing. Parts of me didn't want to, parts of me did. Playing my senior year at Roy High really helped me love the game a lot more, and so I did want to play.

Q: How did your time go at Utah Tech?

A: I made some great friends that I still talk to. Ups and downs. I went down there the COVID year, so the fall of 2020, and we didn't even play, barely even practiced. Didn't even get a real intro to college because stuff was getting canceled. Then that spring we played. It was good. I started as a true freshman. Actually played here, started here in the fall that year. I remember coming in, seeing this, and I was like, man, that would be fun to play in front of one day. Last year, ended up redshirting. Things weren't really

going my way down there. It was rough. I wasn't getting as many reps my sophomore year so I asked to redshirt and get an extra year. All I could do was keep grinding, keep working and eventually it's all going to work out.

Q: How did the recruiting go in the transfer portal and what sold you on Montana?

A: It was kind of scary. The first couple weeks you're not really getting a whole lot of offers, at least I didn't. I had a couple Division II schools reach out. Eastern Washington reached out to me early. Montana was one of the later ones. I entered in early to mid December and it just took a while. I didn't know if I was going to have a home, but I was willing to take the risk. I was asking friends. My high school coach had some good connections. Twitter is where you get a lot of recruiting done so I was going around, looking at rosters, following coaches, hoping they'd follow me back. Incarnate Word offered me and then more started rolling in. That's when Montana reached out to me and they brought me out on a visit and offered me. It was pretty much between here and Weber because I wanted to be home, be around my family. But came on the visit here and I just loved everything. I was like, I can't pass up this opportunity.

Q: Having lined up at both guard and tackle here, did you have experience playing all those positions before?

A: At my previous university I did play both right tackle and left tackle. I played guard a little bit, like in spring ball. I've been fine switching back. It's more just you got to flip the play in your head. Guard, I'd never really played a lot. They recruited me here as a tackle. When I got here in the spring, I played strictly guard. I think that really helped because I was able to learn all that. In summer, when we'd go through plays, they'd have me switch off tackle and guard, so

Idaho stars enter transfer portal

Vandals lose QB, RB, DB after season ends with quarterfinals loss

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It's been a tough few days for the Idaho football team.

On Saturday night, the Vandals suffered a 30-22 home loss to UAlbany in the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. On Monday, three of Idaho's best players entered the transfer portal.

Those three players are quarterback Gevani McCoy, running back Anthony Woods and defensive back Marcus Harris. McCoy and Woods both have two seasons of college eligibility remaining, while Harris has one.

McCoy was the Big Sky Conference's 2023 first-team QB, one season after he earned a third-team selection and the Jerry Rice Award (which goes to the FCS freshman of the year). The red-shirt sophomore from the Los Angeles area completed 64.7% of his passes for 2,910 yards (the most of any Big Sky player), 15 touchdowns and eight interceptions this season.

Woods also received a 2023 All-Big Sky first-team honor and was a second-teamer in 2022. The sophomore from Palmdale, California (which is about 60 miles north of LA) led the conference with 1,155 rushing yards and 16 rushing TDs on 5.6 yards per carry this season.

Harris was also a first-team all-conference player in 2023 and a second-teamer in 2022. The Portland, Oregon, native redshirted at FBS Oregon State in 2019 and transferred to Idaho a year later. He finished this season with 51 tackles, 5.5 tackles for loss, three interceptions and 10 pass break-

ups.

McCoy, Woods and Harris nearly led Idaho to the FCS semifinals. The fourth-seeded Vandals didn't trail Saturday's game until 4 minutes, 38 seconds left in the fourth quarter, two quarters after they built a nine-point lead over

fifth-seeded UAlbany.

Idaho finished its season with a 9-4 record. One of the teams it lost to, Montana, is the lone Big Sky team in the semis. The second-seeded Grizzlies will host unseeded North Dakota State on Saturday, and UAlbany will play

at top-seeded South Dakota State on Friday.

Other Big Sky players make transfer decisions

Idaho has hardly been the only Big Sky team to lose key players.

Seven Montana State players announced their entrances into the portal last week, and one of them has already committed elsewhere (linebacker Jace Fitzgerald to Montana Western).

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HOW WE SEE THE BIG SKY

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Longtime Montana football fans will probably never forget North Dakota State's last visit to Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

It marked Bob Stitt's debut as head coach of the Grizzlies. The date was August 29, 2015, and it turned out to be Stitt's biggest win in three seasons at the helm.

Montana had a new quarterback in 6-foot-7 junior Brady Gustafson, who took over for graduated Jordan Johnson. The Pride of Billings outplayed Wentz — at least in the passing department — with 434 yards to 198 for Wentz.

The biggest moment belonged to Montana running back Joey Counts, who sat out the previous season and most of fall camp in 2015 with a foot injury. He scored from inches away on fourth-and-goal with 2 seconds left and soon after his team celebrated a shocking 38-35 win.

"I can't believe it," Counts told the Missoulian. "There's a lot of heart and perseverance on this team and it was calm; everybody knew what they had to do. We all figured they were gonna pinch down pretty hard. I just saw some light and I took it."

The high-rolling Stitt went for it six times on fourth down that Saturday, converting four.

"We were going to be aggressive and when we failed on fourth down, our de-

The sky had a distinctive red-brown hue that day. Area forest fires raged and the thick, stinky smoke made it tough to see the iconic M from inside the stadium.

Carson Wentz, a familiar name to NFL fans, played quarterback for the Bison. Chris Klieman, who currently coaches Kanas State, was skipper for North Dakota State.

Wentz had just led the Bison to a then-unprecedented fourth straight FCS championship. They went on to win the title again to cap their 2015 campaign.

But for one late-summer day in 2015, the Grizzlies captivated a national television audience and a then-record crowd.

fense came up big and didn't give any big plays up," Stitt said. "Everybody's got to stay calm and the defense has to go out and bail us out once in a while."

Klieman saluted Montana's receiver corps — which included Missoula Sentinel grad and converted NCAA Division I baseball player Ben Roberts — and electrifying Ellis Henderson, who had 133 receiving yards on seven catches.

"I know this," Klieman said. "That's as good a set of wide receivers that we're probably gonna face this year. ... Those kids made plays."

One of the unsung heroes for Montana was defensive coordinator Ty Gregorak, who went on to hold the same position for Montana State and currently serves as a TV commentator for Bobcat games. Unlike Stitt, Gregorak had a dozen years of experience coaching on the NCAA Division I level under his belt and his unit came up big in the second half, holding the Bison to seven points.

This Saturday's game between Montana and visiting North Dakota State promises to be another instant classic. Since beating the Bison on that summer

day in 2015, Montana has lost two in a row to NDSU in the playoffs.

The Grizzlies have the homefield advantage this time and it's a big one. The Bison have an intangible edge since they've owned Montana and Montana State in recent years.

It may go down to the wire, just like that epic game in August of 2015. It is, without a doubt, the biggest game at Washington-Grizzly Stadium since 2009, which marked the last time the Grizzlies played for a spot in the FCS finals at home.

Hold on to your hats, sports fans.

SATURDAY SEMIFINAL

No. 8 North Dakota State (11-3) at No. 2 Montana (12-1) (2:30 p.m., ESPN2):

The Bison have won five in a row, including a memorable overtime game at Montana State two weeks ago. Yes, that's the same Montana State team that Montana demolished last month, 37-7. North Dakota State has proven it can win playoff games on the road and deal with a hostile environment. But Montana's crowd and the noise it creates are unique. Picking a

winner in this game is tough and it may just come down to mistakes, including false start penalties caused by fan noise. Montana's homefield advantage gives it the edge. **Speltz:** Montana 27, North Dakota State 24. **Gogola:** Griz 31, Bison 28.

FRIDAY SEMIFINAL

No. 9 Albany (11-3) at No. 1 South Dakota State (13-0) (5 p.m., ESPN2): This will be fun to watch. I think that helped me learn. Now it's not as hard just because I feel like I'm able to do the techniques from both sides. Spring was tough still learning the playbook. Now I feel like I got the plays down, I can just flip those in my head.

Q: What are the biggest differences between playing guard and tackle, left and right side?

A: It's tougher moving from guard to tackle because they're both different positions. With tackle, it's just switching sides, you just got to switch up the footwork a little bit. They both have different aspects that are hard. But it's harder switching from tackle to guard, guard to tackle than left or right I would say. I feel like with guard, you tend to have heavy, bigger guys in the middle, like defensive tackles compared to defensive ends. So, that can be one aspect that's hard is trying to move those guys rather than a D-end that might be a little lighter.

Q: You had been rotating in all year, but what did it mean to you to get your first start against Montana State?

A: I won't lie, I was probably the most nervous I've been, definitely. That's the first game I switched positions too, so that was my first time playing guard since summer. When we went into fall camp, I was strictly tackle, rotating left and right. Hadn't played guard since summer and actually hit someone at the position since spring ball. I was switching to guard, it was for the Big Sky title and one of the biggest rivalries in college football. The whole week, I was just try-

ing to watch as much film as I can because I know their two interior guys are pretty strong. I was really nervous, I won't lie. I tried to hide it a little bit. I was confident but definitely nervous just because of the stakes of the game. I was definitely excited. I was like, eventually my time will come to start and they're going to call on me and they're going to need me and I'm like, here it is, I got to do my best and it was really fun. That game was really special.

Q: Now that you've been here a while, have you felt like you made the right choice coming to Montana?

A: It's meant everything. It's been so fun playing here. The crowd, the noise, the fans, they're the best. It's fun playing in front of this crowd. I remember playing here my freshman year at my old school and was just wowed by the atmosphere. I was like, that's

somewhere you want to play. But not just that. The coaches, the team, I feel so close with everyone on the team, man. We really are all brothers, especially within the O-line pod, the DOLA pod, the locker pods, we're so close, we're all best friends. But I feel like everyone on the team, we're all friends, we're playing for one another. The coaches, they're tough on us sometimes, but that's what it takes. I appreciate all of them. It's meant everything to play here. I wouldn't change anything in the world. This is the place that I think I was meant to play and this is the place that I definitely want to stay here and be here for the rest of my career.

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semester in January.

“It was just a little bit of uncertainty not knowing if I had played my last game or not,” he said of the waiting process. “It was kind of a weird time. We were on break but I didn’t know if I would be coming back to Montana or if that would be it. Obviously, I was excited to come back.”

The NCAA gives athletes five years to complete four seasons of their sport. It’s become more common for players to now stay six years because of the COVID waiver given to those on rosters during the 2020-21 school year when seasons were impacted by the pandemic.

A seventh-year senior like Ramos is even more rare. He’s not your super senior like those in their sixth year. Maybe super-duper senior? Senior citizen? Well, his current freshman teammates were in seventh grade when he entered college in 2017.

That year, the transfer portal was not yet created. Playing a single snap could burn a player’s redshirt. Name, Image and Likeness deals were not a reality. National Signing Day was still viewed as the first week of February instead of the third week of December. All that has changed.

Ramos is one of two Griz to be playing a seventh year this season. The other is left tackle Chris Walker, who also received a medical waiver like Ramos. Last year, transfer quarterback Lucas Johnson was in his seventh season.

“I did approach last year almost like it was my last season,” Ramos said of 2022. “You never really know, so I had tried to take advantage of every practice, every game and just enjoy it.”

Ramos is back because he refused to give up the thing he loved. That thing — kicking footballs — hasn’t gotten old to him.

He also returned because the coaching staff welcomed him back. He asked if he could come back and if there would be a roster spot for him.

He’s still alive and kicking, pursuing his dreams. He’s been doing his best to make up for lost time

while at Montana for a second season.

“Early in my career, I had a few injuries and I feel like I just had more in me,” he said of wanting to return. “I had a couple seasons lost just because of injury. I feel like if I had the chance to do it, which I wanted to, I would take advantage

of that. That’s why I’m here right now.”

A long road

Ramos was tracking the Pac-12 when he joined the California Golden Bears in 2021.

The first week, something caught his eye: Montana 13, Wash-

ington 7. The Grizzlies went to Seattle and knocked off the Huskies, just the sixth FCS team to ever beat a ranked FBS foe.

Ramos didn’t earn the starting job at Cal and didn’t play at all that year. When he entered the transfer portal, he used Twitter to reach out to the Griz. He got the fresh start,

the new beginning he was looking for after seeing the field for one season through five years in college.

“This place is definitely special,” he said. “There’s no other atmosphere in college football like this. It’s just exciting. To play in big games in like the game against the Cats and the playoffs, it’s special.”

Ramos had started college at Princeton, redshirting in 2017 as a true freshman. He also didn’t play in 2019 because he had his season cut short by injury before it even began.

In between, he set the school record with 56 extra points in 2018 during the Tigers’ first perfect season since 1964. That time at Princeton in New Jersey gave him some experience performing in the cold for when he got to Montana.

The 2020 season was canceled by the pandemic, keeping him sidelined. He then transferred to Cal after graduating from Princeton, an Ivy League school that doesn’t allow graduate students to compete in athletics.

“I would have never guessed it would have gone the way it did,” he said of his time in college. “Never. But I am happy with how it all turned out for sure.”

Ramos has found those opportunities to both play and get an education. He graduated with a bachelor’s degree in public policy from Princeton. Then he got a certificate in business administration at Cal.

At UM, he’s working on finishing his Master of Business Administration. He earned Academic All-Big Sky honors in 2022.

He’s not sure what he’ll do after football finally ends, but he’s thinking he’ll end up back in Miami. That’s where he grew up playing soccer before starting to kick footballs in seventh grade, which took him on a journey that has shown his resiliency.

“Don’t give up on yourself,” he said of his advice to younger players. “Things don’t always go as planned and you just got to keep going, keep your head up and don’t quit.”

“I’ve just really tried to enjoy it and taken it day by day. This is where I want to be, this is what I want to be doing. I’m just happy to be here.”

A couple other all-conference second teamers also entered the portal: Northern Arizona wide receiver Coleman Owen and Cal Poly all-conference second-team DB Donovan Saunders.

Former UC Davis all-conference second-team LB Teddye Buchanan has committed to nearby Cal, while ex-Weber State all-conference honorable mention punter Jack Burgess is transferring to Texas Tech.

EWU moves on from DC

Jeff Copp will not return as Eastern Washington's defensive coordinator next season, EWU announced Friday.

Copp spent the previous two seasons as the Eagles' DC. He joined EWU's staff as a defensive line coach in 2020 after four seasons in an assistant role at Florida International.

Copp, who played D-end at Boise State, began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Arizona State in 2001.
