Snowy mountain claims boy

Avalanche sends hikers tumbling down windswept Mount Jumbo

A freak avalanche on the east side of Mount Jumbo swept an East Missoula boy to his death Saturday afternoon while he hiked with three of his friends on the steep hillside.

Two of the other three youths were buried in snow, but were rescued by the fourth youth, Matt Tripp, 14, of East Missoula. The survivors were unharmed.

Missoula County Coroner Jerry Crego identified the dead boy as 13-year-old Pershing Clarence "Percy" Phillips III. He was a student at Rattlesnake School. His parents are Pershing and Linda Phillips.

The avalanche started with a crashing sound, said Milan Tripp, 13, a classmate of Percy Phillips, and brother of Matt. The other youth buried in the snow slide was Jerry Sims, 12, also of East Missoula.

"We were just rolling inside of it. When it stopped, only my knees to my feet were sticking out, and Percy, only his ankles were sticking out, and Jerry was completely buried in an upright position," said Milan Tripp.

"I didn't know which position I was facing or if I was laying upside down until I started kicking my feet, 'cause they were free. Then I knew I was laying side-

ways, but I was wedged so tight I couldn't get my arms out, and I just started yelling as loud as I could. I just tried to get out, and Matt dug me out," Milan Tripp said.

When Matt heard the crack of snow break far above him he ran as fast as he could along the mountainside. He saw the others being swept down into a ravine, and he too, was caught by snow, but was not buried. After he struggled back to the others, he heard his brother's cries. He immediately dug his brother out. Matt saw where Sims was buried, and while Milan tried to help Phillips, Matt dug Sims out.

It was hard digging. The snow was so crusty that it had to be pounded and broken with fists, the boys said. When Sims was free, Matt told his younger brother to go down the mountainside for help. Matt lent some of his outerwear to Jerry Sims to help him keep warm, and continued to try to help the Phillips boy, but to no avail.

Missoula Deputy Sheriff Jerry Ball, who directed the search and rescue efforts on the mountain, said Phillips was crushed by heavy snow and was unable to breathe. The victim was presumed to be dead after he was carried on a litter down the steep ravine about 4
