Enrollment booms in courses for over-50 set

MOLLI manager: Program growing at 'amazing rate'

No more classes, no more books, no more teacher's dirty looks: Going back to school at the age of 50 (or older) is all about the joy and wonder of learning.

What began as a community lecture series has since morphed into the state's only Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at the University of Montana, home to the popular MOLLI program.

Enrollment in the noncredit academic courses reserved for those 50 years of age and older has boomed in recent years, becoming the envy of the larger, grade-giving university.

"We're growing at an amazing rate," said MOLLI program manager Eileen Flannigan. "Our success is due to the involvement of the community and how vested our members are in the program and our offerings."

Last fall, the MOLLI program reached a new milestone,

Independent groups raise profile of race

Outside spending figures to turn quiet campaign into high-profile contest

HELENA - A national Republican group began running a TV ad in Montana on Tuesday as part of an independent expenditure campaign in support of Lawrence VanDyke, a nonpartisan candidate for the state Supreme Court, and against his opponent, Justice Mike Wheat.

The Republican State Leadership Committee Judicial Fairness Montana PAC has booked nearly \$110,000 in advertising time on Montana television stations through Election Day, Nov. 4, according to a media buy list obtained by the Missoulian State Bureau.

The ad refers to the Montana Supreme Court granting a new trial for a convicted killer, but doesn't cite the case, and says: "Tired of stories like these?

Native American service solutions need to come from ground up, Tester says at summit

NINEPIPES LODGE - In May, U.S. Sen. Jon Tester, chairman of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs, heard testimony on poor health care services delivered to Native Americans in Montana and Wyoming.

In Montana, their average life span is two decades shorter than non-Indians.

On Tuesday morning, Tester addressed the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes Health Care Summit - labeled "unique and historic" by one of its organizers – that brought together a wide range of tribes, hospitals, medical providers, insurance companies, and government agencies and officials.

Tester deflected credit for the summit to the CSKT Health Department officials who organized

UM shares \$50M NASA grant to study life in universe

Along with the Goddard Space Flight Center and a select group of research schools, the University of Montana learned this week it will share in a \$50 million grant from NASA.

UM President Royce Engstrom made the announcement Tuesday, saying UM was one of seven institutions across the country selected by NASA to research the origin, evolution and distribution of life in the universe

"NASA picked only seven teams from around the entire country to carry out this astrobiology research," Engstrom said. "Our researchers will look at how life evolved from the simplest molecules to the wonderfully complex systems

North Reserve Street casino robbed overnight; suspect at large

Missoula police are searching for a man who allegedly robbed a Missoula casino at gunpoint, firing his weapon inside the business before fleeing early Tuesday.

The unidentified suspect entered Montana Lil's on North Reserve Street at 1:13 a.m. wearing black clothing and sunglasses.

"He had what witnesses described as a silver semiautomatic handgun and demanded money from the clerk," Missoula Police Department spokesman Travis Welsh said.

After receiving an undisclosed amount of cash from the clerk, the suspect allegedly pointed his gun toward the ceiling and fired it before running from the casino and toward the KOA campground on Tina Avenue.

Welsh said several officers responded and set up a perimeter around the

9th Circuit rules **gay marriage legal**in Idaho, Nevada

LAS VEGAS - A federal appeals court declared gay marriage legal in Idaho and Nevada on Tuesday, setting the stage for couples to marry in Las Vegas, the self-proclaimed wedding capital of the world.

The order, issued Tuesday evening, also means that samesex couples in Idaho can start getting married immediately.

Logan Seven, 54, a limousine driver for Chapelle de l'amour wedding chapel in downtown Las Vegas, said he always wanted to get married on a beach, barefoot and in a white tuxedo.

"Trying to find the right man is the hard part," he said Tuesday after his boss told him about the gay marriage ruling.

The Chicago native said he was surprised when he moved to Las Vegas and learned that the town that touts itself as a marriage capital didn't allow gay marriages. "It's a no-brainer," Seven said. "Love is love."

The Federal Rules of Appellate Procedure typically provide the seven-day waiting period to give the losing side of a court battle a chance to appeal. But the justices lifted the waiting period for Idaho, and officials in the Clark County clerk's office say the marriage license bureau in Las Vegas will begin accepting license applications at 2 p.m. Wednesday from same-sex couples.

"This is a super sweet victory," said Sue Latta, who along with Traci Ehlers sued Idaho last year to compel the state to recognize their 2008 marriage in California. Three other couples also joined the lawsuit to invalidate Idaho's same-sex marriage ban.

"Taxes are easier, real estate is easier, parenting is easier, endof-life planning is easier," Latta

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that gay couples' equal protection rights were violated by the bans in both states. But in Nevada a U.S. District Court judge still must issue a formal injunction overturning the state's gay marriage ban.

Nevada Gov. Brian Sandoval and state Attorney General Catherine Cortez Masto issued a joint statement saying it could be two weeks before a final order is issued by a U.S. District Court judge in Nevada. They said county clerks and district attorneys should be making plans to handle marriage licenses.

Judge Stephen Reinhardt wrote for a unanimous threejudge panel that laws that treat people differently based on sexual orientation are unconstitutional unless there is a compelling government interest. He wrote that neither Idaho nor Nevada offered any legitimate reasons to discriminate against gay couples.

State ACLU official: Idaho ban nearly identical to Montana's

HELENA - A decision by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to strike down Idaho's ban on gay marriage likely means Montana's voterapproved ban also will be declared unconstitutional, according to an official with the Montana ACLU.

Montana's ban is nearly identical to Idaho's, and Montana's federal appeals also are heard by the 9th Circuit, Montana ACLU legal director Jim Taylor said.

"They really went through every argument Idaho made and destroyed it," Taylor said. "It's clear that this is a law that's going to apply in this (Montana's) case."

The ACLU and four gay couples challenged Montana's ban in May. The lawsuit filed in federal court in Great Falls alleges the state's constitutional ban denies same-sex couples the freedom and dignity afforded to other Montanans, and robs them of the legal protections and benefits that come with marriage.

"We are absolutely delighted that wedding bells will finally be ringing for same-sex couples in Nevada," said Tara Borelli, the lawyer who argued the Nevada case for Lambda Legal.

Monte Neil Stewart, the Idaho-based attorney who argued the case for Nevada on behalf of the Coalition for the Protection of Marriage, declined to say whether he'll challenge the order for the prompt start to same-sex marriages.

State and federal court judges have been striking down bans at a rapid rate since a landmark U.S. Supreme Court ruling last year.

On Monday, the nation's top court unexpectedly rejected appeals from five states seeking to preserve their bans. The decision cleared the way for a dramatic expansion of gay marriage in the United States and might have signaled that it's only a matter of time before same-sex couples can marry in all 50 states.

The appeals court panel did not rule on a similar case in Hawaii, which legalized gay marriage in December. Hawaii's governor had asked the court to toss out a lawsuit challenging the state's ban and an appeal to the 9th Circuit filed before Hawaii lawmakers legalized same-sex

All three judges on the panel were appointed by Democratic presidents. President Bill Clinton appointed Judges Marsha Berzon and Ronald Gould. President Jimmy Carter appointed Reinhardt.

The court also has jurisdiction in three other states that still have marriage bans in place: Alaska, Arizona and Montana. Lawsuits challenging bans in those states are still pending in lower courts and have not reached the 9th Circuit.

Ebola evades European defenses

Spanish nursing assistant infected; dog to be killed

MADRID - Health officials in Spain rushed to contain the Ebola virus Tuesday after it got past Europe's defenses, quarantining four people at a Madrid hospital where a nursing assistant got infected and persuading a court that the woman's dog must die.

The first case of Ebola transmitted outside Africa, where a months-long outbreak has killed more than 3,400 people, is raising questions about how prepared wealthier countries really are. Health workers complained Tuesday that they lack the training and equipment to handle the virus, and the all-important tourism industry was showing its anxiety.

Medical officials in the United States, meanwhile, are retraining hospital staff and fine-tuning infection control procedures after the mishandling of a critically ill Liberian man in Texas, who might have exposed many others to the virus after being sent away by a hospital.

In Africa, the U.S. military was preparing to open a 25-bed mobile hospital catering to health care workers with Ebola, before building a total of 17 promised 100-bed Ebola Treatment Units in Liberia. The virus has taken an especially devastating toll on health care workers, sickening or killing more than 370 in the hardest-hit countries of Liberia, Guinea and Sierra Leone, where doctors and nurses were already in short supply. And as the disease

moved from a seemingly distant continent to the doorsteps of the world's largest economies, government leaders faced growing pressure to ramp up responses. Spanish opposition parties called for the resignation of Health Minister Ana Mato, and the European Union demanded answers to what went wrong.

Obama administration spokesman Josh Earnest said Tuesday that more passenger screening measures would be announced "in the next couple of days," even though the White House remains "confident in the screening measures that are currently in place."

The nursing assistant in Madrid was part of a special team caring for a Spanish priest who died of Ebola last month after being evacuated from Sierra Leone. The nursing assistant wore a hazmat suit both times she entered his room, officials said, and no records point to any accidental exposure to the virus, which spreads through direct contact with the bodily fluids of a sickened person.

The woman, who had been on vacation in the Madrid area after treating the priest, was diagnosed with Ebola on Monday after coming down with a fever, and was said to be stable Tuesday. Her husband also was isolated as a precaution. Another quarantined nurse tested negative, but a man who traveled in Nigeria remained in isolation.

Madrid's regional government even got a court order to euthanize and incinerate the couple's

mixed-breed dog, Excalibur, against their objections, without even testing the animal. A government statement said "available scientific information" doesn't guarantee that infected dogs can't transmit the virus to humans.

Some reports in medical journals suggest that dogs can be infected with Ebola without showing symptoms, but whether they can spread the disease to people is unclear.

Ebola's source in nature hasn't been pinpointed. The leading suspect is a certain type of fruit bat, but the World Health Organization lists chimpanzees, gorillas, monkeys, forest antelope and porcupines as possibly playing a role in spread of the disease. Even pigs may amplify infection because of bats on farms in Africa.

AFFORDABLE CARE ACT

Waivers available, but complicated

WASHINGTON -Millions of Americans may qualify for waivers from the most unpopular part of President Barack Obama's health care overhaul. But getting that exemption could be an ordeal.

Community groups are concerned about a convoluted process for waivers from the law's tax penalty on people who remain uninsured. Not everyone is complaining, however: Tax preparation companies are flagging it as a business opportunity.

The law's requirement that Americans carry health insurance remains contentious. Waivers were designed to ease the impact.

But while some

exemptions seem simple, others will require math calculations.

Some involve sending in the application - by mail and supporting documents, such as copies of medical bills, police reports, obituaries, utility shut-off notices - even news articles. Consumers will have to dig up the documentation - it's not like filing the W-2s they get from employers.

Two federal agencies have roles, each with its own waivers and time schedules. Some people will apply directly to the Internal Revenue Service when they file their 2014 tax returns next year. They'll use a new Form 8965.

Others can start now and seek an exemption through HealthCare.gov. If said Elizabeth Colvin of

it's approved, they'll get a number to put on their IRS form later on.

It will all come to a head this tax-filing season.

Hailed by Democrats as the fulfillment of historical aspirations for covering all Americans, the Affordable Care Act has turned out to have multiple issues. The debut of online insurance markets last fall became an embarrassment for the White House. It took two months to get the website working reasonably well.

Waivers are part of the law's complex relationship with the tax system, an area of potential complications just starting to emerge.

"The process for claiming an exemption is confusing, even for people who do this every day,"

Foundation Communities, an Austin, Texas, nonprofit that provides services for low-income people.

"If you are a do-ityourself person who is going to try it on pen and paper, all I can say is, 'God be with you," " said Mark Ciaramitaro, vice president of health care services at tax giant H&R Block.

At Intuit, maker of TurboTax, software engineers and tax lawyers teamed up to create "Exemption Check," a free online tool for people to see if they qualify. Charges apply later if the taxpayer files through TurboTax.

"I would say that it is complex," said Sacha Adam, Intuit's team leader. "That is where we get excited."

NEW YORK CITY

Family plans lawsuit over chokehold death

NEW YORK (AP) - The family of a man who died after being placed in a police chokehold has filed a notice of claim to sue the city, its police department and six officers for \$75 million.

Eric Garner's family filed the notice, the first legal step toward suing over the 43-year-old's death, on Monday. A spokesman for city

is under review. The city's Law Department said it will review the claim thoroughly. The New York

Comptroller Scott Stringer

said Tuesday that the claim

Police Department did not

immediately comment.

Garner, who was unarmed, was stopped by police on Staten Island on July 17 on suspicion of selling loose, untaxed cigarettes.

A video shot by an onlooker shows Garner telling the officers to leave him alone and refusing to be handcuffed.

An officer responded by putting Garner in a chokehold, which is banned under police policy. Garner, who had asthma, is heard gasping, "I can't breathe." He was pronounced dead later at a hospital.

The city medical examiner found that the police chokehold contributed to Garner's death.

Air tanker crashes while fighting Calif. fire

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK, Calif. - An air tanker fighting a wildfire near Yosemite National Park in Northern California crashed Tuesday, but there was no immediate word on the condition of the pilot, who was the only person aboard, officials said.

The plane went down at about 4:30 p.m. within a mile of the park's west entrance, Yosemite spokesman Scott Gediman said. Rescue crews were

working their way through difficult terrain to reach the plane.

The airplane, manufactured in 2001, is an S-2T air tanker, which is flown by a single pilot and has no other crew members. The tanker uses twin turbine engines and is capable of carrying 1,200 gallons of fire retardant, said another CalFire spokesman, Daniel Berlant.

A California Highway Patrol spokesman, Officer Steven Lewis, said CHP Sgt. Chris Michael witnessed

the crash as he was helping to close state Route 140 where it enters the park.

"All the tourists and residents were being turned away," Lewis said, when Michael reported that he had just witnessed "a bomber collide into the river canyon, the canyon wall, and watched it explode in flames and reported there was plane debris landing in the highway."

There were no reports of any injuries on the ground as a result of debris.

The missing pilot is an employee of DynCorp., which provides the pilots for all CalFire fixed-wing aircraft and the maintenance for the department's planes and helicopters, Upton said.

The fire had broken out about 90 minutes earlier Tuesday near Route 140, which leads into the heart of the park. It had grown to about 130 acres by Tuesday evening and forced the evacuation of several dozen homes near the community of Foresta.

Energy Dept. predicts lower heating bills this winter

NEW YORK - Heating bills should be lower this winter because the deep freeze that chilled much of the nation last year is unlikely to return.

Last year, persistently low temperatures across the Midwest, South and East forced people to crank up the heat. The high demand jacked up the price of some fuels, especially propane. Heating bills soared. This year, milder

temperatures should reduce homeowners' fuel use, according to the Energy Department's annual prediction of winter heating costs. The price of propane and heating oil should be lower, helping those customers save even more.

"Temperatures are forecast to be warmer than last winter and that means less demand for heat," said Adam Sieminski, administrator of the Energy Department's Energy Information

Administration, in a statement.


Lower energy costs give the economy a boost. This winter, some customers could see savings of nearly \$800 on their heating bills, according to the EIA. Gasoline prices are expected to soon drop below \$3 per gallon on average in up to 30 states. Consumers will have more money to spend on other things, and consumer spending is 70 percent of the nation's economy.

But it's probably not wise to spend those hoped-for savings just yet. Some of the conditions that helped bring record-cold temperatures to the middle of the country still exist, according to Matt Rodgers of Commodity Weather Group, which forecasts weather and heating demand for energy companies.

The warm water in the North Pacific that helped push polar air south into the U.S. still remains, he says. There is also more moisture in the jet stream thanks to

warmer water in the tropical Pacific that could generate more East Coast and Southeast snow.

Freight train derails, catches fire

WADENA, Saskatchewan (AP)
– A Canadian National Railway
Company freight train carrying
flammable goods derailed in

central Saskatchewan on Tuesday and caught fire.

The Saskatchewan government said the derailment happened near the small community of Clair. About 50 people were evacuated.

Provincial officials said

hazardous materials crews were en route. CN spokesman Jim Feeny said the fire is coming from petroleum distillate, which spilled from two of the derailed cars. Petroleum distillates are often made into diesel, kerosene, heating oil and jet fuel.

"The cars of concern contain petroleum distillate. They spilled and that is the source of the fire," Feeny said.

Feeny said the crew is not injured. He said the train was made up of three locomotives pulling 100 cars and that 26 of them derailed Tuesday morning. He said 60 of the cars were empty and forty were carrying goods including six carrying dangerous goods. Besides the two carrying petroleum distillate two were carrying hydrochloric acid and two were carrying caustic soda.

Hong Kong protests thin as two sides agree to talk

HONG KONG – Crowds of protesters who filled Hong Kong's streets with demands for more democracy thinned dramatically Tuesday after student leaders and the government agreed to hold talks in the increasingly frustrated city.

The government and students leaders announced they will begin talks on political reform on Friday. But while a government representative said negotiations were off to "a good start," the students expressed anger and disappointment at officials' unwillingness to address their real demands.

Just a few days after tens of thousands of demonstrators thronged the city's streets, only a couple thousand protesters were scattered across the three main protest areas on Tuesday night. But the sixlane highway that cuts through the heart of Hong Kong's business district remained blocked by demonstrators, once again snarling traffic and angering many commuters.

Michael Leung, 14, wearing his school uniform and doing homework on the highway, said he had come to the protest zone on three days after school.

"You see now the number of people is decreasing because there has been no big action from the government and the police," he said. "But I think if the government or police want to clear this area, then the people will come out again."

Many uncertainties remain about how the standoff will be resolved. Lau Kong-wah, the territory's undersecretary of constitutional affairs, said the government's first meeting with students on Friday will discuss the details of political reform in a public forum.

But Lester Shum, a Hong Kong Federation of Students leader, said the group was disappointed that the government proposed to focus the talks on legal technicalities – a tactic that he said was used to dodge their demand for free elections.

"It shows the government has no sincerity to face Hong Kong's political problems and the dissatisfaction of the many Hong Kong people who protested on the streets," he said.

"We will continue the occupation protests," he added. "We believe the occupation movement has put very big pressure on the government."

The dueling questions now are how long the demonstrators are willing to continue their protests – and how long until the government removes them.



Mexico federal police take over city after attacks

IGUALA, Mexico - On the day 43 students disappeared in this southern Mexican town, the mayor's wife was giving a speech to local dignitaries on family social services.

In another town, it could have been a normal scene. But tough-looking civilians guarded Maria de los Angeles Pineda Villa, a woman with alleged family ties to organized crime. A police force that state and federal officials accuse of being infiltrated by drug gangs patrolled the streets.

Into this combustible mix came the students from a radical rural teacher's college that had defied drug cartel extortion in the past. Wellknown for blocking highways and other protests, they arrived with plans to solicit donations

from passers-by.

Many never made it back home after the Sept. 26 police attack that killed six and injured at least 25. Officials are conducting DNA tests to determine if some of the students are among 28 charred bodies found last weekend in freshly covered mass graves.

Iguala Mayor Jose Luis Abarca is now a fugitive. and state officials have arrested 22 city officers. His wife's whereabouts are unknown. The possible massacre has focused attention on the extent to which local police forces such as Iguala's are permeated by organized crime.

Pineda, the mayor's wife, is from a family with known ties to the Beltran Leyva cartel. Prosecutors had identified her late brother, Alberto Pineda, as a main lieutenant in the

cartel. He and another brother, Marco Pineda, both on former President Felipe Calderon's mostwanted list, were killed by rivals in 2009.

Another brother,

Salomon Pineda, was released from prison last

year and is believed to be running the Guerreros Unidos cartel in Iguala, an offshoot of the Beltran Leyva group, according to

"Everyone knew about their presumed connections to organized crime," Alejandro Encinas, a senator from the mayor's Democratic Revolution Party, told the Associated Press. "Nobody did anything, not the federal government, not the state government, not the party leadership."

President Enrique Pena Nieto ordered a special federal police force to take over Iguala as his top security officials rushed to contain a smear on the image of stability and falling crime rates that they've projected to the outside world.

Jose Miguel Insulza, secretary general of the Organization of American States, said Tuesday that he is deeply concerned about the disappearances and murders, which he said, "have brought grief

not only to the Mexican people but to all the

countries of the Americas." The chief prosecutor for Guerrero state, Inaky Blanco, said suspects have testified that as many as 30 members of the local police force were members of the Guerreros Unidos drug gang.

The students were ending their fundraising and meeting up to return home about the same time Pineda was giving an annual state-of-the agency address. State officials say local police went on the attack, shooting at the buses students had hijacked for their return, as well as innocent bystanders in other vehicles. At least six people were killed and more than 25 wounded.



North Korea, at U.N., mentions its labor camps

UNITED NATIONS - A North Korean official publicly acknowledged to the international community the existence of his country's "reform through labor" camps Tuesday, a mention that appeared to come in response to a highly critical U.N. human rights report earlier this year.

Diplomats for the reclusive, impoverished

country also told reporters that a top North Korea official has visited the headquarters of the European Union and expressed interest in dialogue, with discussions on human rights expected next year.

North Korea's deputy U.N. ambassador Ri Tong Il said the secretary of his country's ruling Workers' Party had visited the EU, and that "we are expecting end of this year to open

political dialogue between the two sides." The human rights dialogue would follow.

In Brussels, an EU official confirmed a recent North Korea meeting with the EU's top human rights official, Stavros Lambrinidis, but said any dialogue currently planned

is limited to rights issues.

rights issues, said at a briefing with reporters that his country has no prison camps and, in practice, "no prison, things like that."

But he briefly discussed the "reform through labor" camps. "Both in law and practice, we do have reform through labor detention camps - no, detention centers - where people are improved through their mentality and look on their wrongdoings," he said.

Such "re-education"

labor camps are for common offenders and some political prisoners, but most political prisoners are held in a harsher system of political prison camps.

The North Korean officials took several questions but did not respond to one about the health of leader Kim Jong Un, who has made no public appearances since Sept. 3 and skipped a highprofile recent event he usually attends.

Pope and prelates get crash course in joys of sex intimacy

VATICAN CITY - Pope Francis, cardinals and bishops from around the world have gotten an unexpected lecture on the joys of sex, from a Catholic couple brought in to talk about what makes a marriage last.

Ron and Mavis Pirola, parents of four from Sydney, Australia, told a Vatican gathering of some 200 prelates that sexual attraction brought them together 57 years ago and that sex has helped keep them married for 55 years.

"The little things we did for each other, the telephone calls and love notes, the way we planned our day around each other and the things we shared were outward expressions of our longing to be intimate with each other,"

the couple said in a joint statement to the closed meeting late Monday.

"Gradually we came to see that the only feature that distinguishes our sacramental relationship from that of any other good Christ-centered relationship is sexual intimacy, and that marriage is a sexual sacrament with its fullest expression in sexual intercourse."

The audience of celibate men was a bit taken aback.

"That's not what we bishops talk about mostly, quite honestly," a sheepish **British Cardinal Vincent** Nichols told reporters Tuesday. "But to hear that as the opening contribution did, I think, open an area ... and it was a recognition that that is central to the well-being

of marriage often."

Francis called the twoweek meeting of bishops to try to figure out how to make church teaching on a host of Catholic family issues - marriage, divorce, homosexuality and yes, sex more relevant to today's Catholics. The debate will continue in October 2015, and culminate when Francis issues a final document with recommendations offered by the synod.

Several of the bishops complained that the Vatican's own teachings on sexual matters are often impenetrable to ordinary people. The Vatican's main document on sex, the 1968 encyclical Humanae Vitae, lays out the church's opposition to artificial contraception with complicated moral theological arguments and

41 footnotes.

The Pirolas told the gathering that they occasionally read church documents on family matters, "but they seemed to be from another planet, with difficult language and not terribly relevant to our own experiences."

The Rev. Tom Rosica, a Vatican spokesman, said several bishops argued that the church had to find a "new language" to both explain its teaching and invite people in.

"Language such as 'living in sin,' 'intrinsically disordered' or 'contraceptive mentality' are not necessarily words that invite people to draw closer to Christ and the church," he said, citing one intervention.

Many observers have credited Francis with drawing people closer to

the church precisely because of the simplicity of his language, compared to the dense theological treatises often laid out by his predecessor, Emeritus Pope Benedict XVI, who as a cardinal was responsible for penning many of the Vatican's major

documents on hot-button issues, including homosexuality.

Strong earthquake shakes southwest

BEIJING (AP) - A strong, shallow earthquake shook southwestern China overnight, killing at least one person, damaging buildings and prompting thousands to camp outside as aftershocks continued to strike the area, officials said Wednesday.

The earthquake with a magnitude of at least 6.0 hit the Weiyuan city area of Yunnan province at 9:49 p.m. when most residents would have been in their homes. At least 324 people

also were injured, eight of them seriously, the Yunnan provincial government said.

"The whole building was shaking terribly with a loud cracking sound. Plates fell off in the kitchen," the official state Xinhua News Agency quoted Weiyuan resident Li Anqin as saying.

"We all ran out and the streets now are packed with people," Li said.

The U.S. Geological Survey said the earthquake measured magnitude 6.0 at a depth of 6.3 miles. Its shallow focus was likely to cause greater damage, but there were no immediate reports of

serious destruction.

SOUTH KOREA

Samsung expects lowest profit in years

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) – Samsung Electronics Co. said Tuesday its thirdquarter operating profit is estimated to have fallen to the lowest level in more than three years, as Galaxy handsets sales slow.

Samsung estimated that the median forecast of its July-September operating income at \$3.8 billion, lower than the median of analysts' estimate according to FactSet, a financial data

provider. That is a 60 percent plunge from record-highs a year earlier.

The Korean company's earnings preview highlights the rapid decline of its mobile business as lower sales of its top-end Galaxy smartphones hurt sales at its component businesses, such as advanced display called OLED, and heavy marketing costs undermine profits.

registering 784 students for classes while membership grew to 637 people. This year, registration topped 930 students and membership swelled to 737.

"It's grown every term since I've been here," said Beth Burman-Frazee. marketing director for UM's School of Extended and Lifelong Learning. "I think Missoula is a place where lifelong learning and the pursuit of knowledge is important to community members."

The program's roots lead to Ann Boone, the first

chair of the MOLLI Council. As history tells it, Boone packed her bags in 1966 and left New England for Missoula, where the energy of living in a college town tantalized her intellectual curiosity.

Boone and friend Kitte Robins brought the idea of a community lecture series to the UM Alumni Association. The move set the wheels in motion, helping bridge the academic world on campus with the larger community.

Residents were hungry for continued learning, never mind their college days were in the rearview

"The idea started in

2005 with two appetizer courses, and by the winter of 2006 there were five courses offered," said Flannigan. "It has been growing exponentially and we continue to branch out with new course offerings."

This year's classes cover the Civil War, the fall of the Soviet Union, the Silk Road and North Korea, among many others, including "The Bakken Petroleum Field: Energy and Problems."

Former UM professor Ian Lange is co-teaching the Bakken class with Taresa Spade, a social worker who focuses on rural policy and social issues in the oil patch. As

for Lange, he earned his doctorate in isotope geochemistry at the University of Washington and still enjoys teaching adult learners.

"Teaching the courses is fun and adult learning is a big part of the future of higher education," said Lange. "You've got a great student body - people who aren't just interested in getting an 'A' and moving on to the next class."

Lange has taught several MOLLI courses in the past, including one on volcanoes. His students this semester will include Sharon Burman, who recently moved to Missoula from Fort Collins, Colorado.

When Burman landed in the Garden City this summer, new friends recommended the MOLLI program. Burman, mother of marketing director Burman-Frazee, wasn't sure what the program was, though her research would lead her to enroll, not in one

class, but two.

"I've never considered this before, but it's been well advertised and highly recommended," said Burman. "I still have nightmares of going to class and having to take an exam. It's fun to go for the pure joy of learning - no demands, no grades and no tests."

Burman's exuberance led her to enroll in Lange's class on the Bakken and another from the humanities menu - "150 Years of Echoes: The Civil War and its Climactic Year of 1864."

"It was difficult to choose, but I had to settle on one," said Burman. "I'm already intrigued by the subject matter. The professors are wonderful and I've met a few new people, which was part of the goal."

Then elect Lawrence VanDvke to the Montana State Supreme Court. Lawrence VanDyke is not a politician. He is an avid sportsman from Bozeman. Lawrence VanDyke will defend our constitutional rights, protect our property rights and enforce strict punishment for violent criminals. Lawrence VanDyke: no politics, no agenda, all Montana."

The group also released a similar radio spot. It's also distributing a mailer that says that VanDyke "will fight to protect Montana's way of life," and calls Wheat an "activist" justice who is "out of touch with Montana."

Wheat could not be immediately reached for comment.

Jill Bader, spokeswoman for the Republican State Leadership Committee, declined to say how much the group intends to spend here, saying, "We don't give away our playbook."

The Republican group is one of three groups that are running third-party independent expenditure campaigns in the Supreme Court race. One other group is running a pro-VanDyke

and anti-Wheat independent spending campaign, while another group has launched a pro-Wheat, anti-VanDyke

By law, these groups cannot coordinate with the candidates.

This outside spending figures to turn what was expected to be a quiet, lowbudget Montana Supreme Court race into a highprofile contest. As of Sept. 5. VanDvke had raised about \$78,000 to Wheat's \$59,000.

After the U.S. Supreme Court's 2010 Citizens **United decision**

"unleashed unlimited independent spending in elections," special interest groups spent a total \$15.4 million in TV ads and other electioneering in high court races in the states in 2011-12, according to a study by the Brennan Center for Justice, Justice at Stake and the Helena-based National Institute on Money in State Politics.

"National groups better known for their efforts to influence presidential and congressional elections turned their sights on judicial contests in several states," the study said.

The two other independent expenditure groups already have been distributing mailers in the Supreme Court race.

Montanans for a Fair Judiciary is a group running an independent expenditure campaign in support of VanDyke and

against Wheat. It is a cross-section of businesses and individuals that want "a more stable and business-friendly Supreme Court," said its chairman, Jake Eaton of Billings, a Republican consultant. The group is running statewide radio ads and sending fliers statewide.

The third group, Montanans for Liberty and Justice, is the lone organization running an independent expenditure campaign in support of Wheat and against VanDyke.

It is a coalition of groups representing trial lawyers, women, conservationists, hunters and anglers and human rights advocates, said Al Smith, executive director of the Montana Trial Lawyers Association. It has booked \$95,000 in statewide TV ads.

The three groups will have to report their spending to the state political practices commissioner on Oct. 23.

The Republican State

Leadership Committee Judicial Fairness Initiative Montana PAC registered with the Montana political practices commissioner's office on Oct. 1. The group is based in Washington, D.C., and listed Barry Usher of Billings, who lost a primary race for the state Senate in June, as its

treasurer. This committee has been active for a dozen years in down-ballot races below the level of governor, such as for attorney general, secretary of state and Legislature. In 2012, it made independent expenditures in support of Republican Tim Fox, who defeated Democrat Pam Bucy in Montana's attorney general

In April, the Republican group launched its Judicial Fairness Initiative. It has been reported the group may spend about \$5 million nationally on the effort.

The Republican State Leadership Committee reported raising \$25.7 million and spending \$21.5 million as of Aug. 4, according to the Center for Responsive Politics, a nonpartisan nonprofit Washington group. That money covers the group's

expenses for all of the political races, not just the high court races.

Its top donors are: Reynolds American (the tobacco company), \$1.1 million; Blue Cross/Blue Shield, \$958,500; U.S. Chamber of Commerce. \$616,000; U.S. Chamber of Commerce and related entities, \$496,000; and




Bader said the Republican State Leadership Committee has more than 100,000 donors in all 50 states. All are publicly disclosed to the Internal Revenue Service, she said.

it, and said he looked forward to hearing the ideas that come out of the meeting.

"Top-down solutions don't work," Tester said later. "It's got to come from the ground up, and the number of folks in there who have never been in the same room together is amazing. Their job descriptions are as wide as they are varied."

The Montana Democrat encouraged them all to focus on challenges to health care in Indian Country at all levels, and ways the problems can be overcome.

Much of the testimony in May focused on problems with the Indian Health Service's regional office in Billings, but "we will not be successful if you look to the federal government, and the federal government alone," Tester told the 50-plus people attending the summit.

Topics were likely to include service delivery, transportation for critical care, prescription drug abuse, billing and reimbursement issues and problems created when a U.S. Supreme Court decision made Medicaid expansion in the Affordable Care Act optional for states.

The summit's location on the Flathead Reservation was not a coincidence.

Here, the CSKT Tribal Health Department is halfway through an ambitious multimilliondollar program to replace or update old and often cramped tribal clinics across the reservation.

Just a dozen years ago, providing health care for tribal members on this reservation mostly meant purchasing it from the private sector.

"That's not illogical, provided you have unlimited resources," **CSKT Health Department** director Kevin Howlett has said.

But health care is also a business, and the tribes were sending revenue out the door that they could be bringing in, Howlett decided. The building and remodeling projects have been paid for upfront by revenues brought in for treating patients on Medicare, Medicaid or with private insurance.

By offering its membership many health care services that were once purchased elsewhere, CSKT Tribal Health has gone from three employees to 160, and major clinic projects have been completed or nearly completed in Polson and St. Ignatius.

Anna Whiting-Sorrell works for Howlett and CSKT now, but spent 16 months as director of the Indian Health Service's Billings office, which is responsible for delivering health care to 80,000 Indians in Montana and Wyoming.

But she hasn't given up, and statistics that show that Native American men live an average of 19 years less, and Native American women live an average of 20 years less, than non-Indians in Montana drive

"That's a whole generation," Whiting-Sorrell said.

DISTRACTED DRIVING

Studies show dangers of talking to your car

WASHINGTON (AP) -Just because you can talk to your car doesn't mean you should. Two new studies have found that voice-activated smartphones and dashboard infotainment systems may be making the distracted-driving problem worse instead of better.

The systems let drivers do things like tune the radio, send a text message. or make a phone call while keeping their eyes on the road and their hands on the wheel, but many of these systems are so error-prone or complex that they require more concentration from drivers rather than less, according to studies

released Tuesday by the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety and the

University of Utah. One study examined infotainment systems in some of the most common auto brands on the road: Chevrolet, Chrysler, Ford, Hyundai and Mercedes. The second study tested the Apple iPhone's Siri voice system to navigate, send texts, make Facebook and Twitter posts, and use the calendar without handling or looking at the phone.

we call cells and organisms and ecosystems."

Engstrom broke the news before hundreds of local high school students and gave credit to Frank Rosenzweig, a UM professor who specializes in evolutionary genetics. Rosenzweig was off campus on Tuesday and unavailable for comment.

"Dr. Rosenzweig and his team of students and researchers are in some pretty good company," Engstrom said. "This is about as big a frontier as you can think about - the entire universe."

Funding details weren't immediately available, though NASA said each research team will receive an average of \$8 million. The list of recipients includes the universities of Montana. California and Colorado,

along with the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, California.

The Ames Research Center, the Goddard Space Flight Center and the SETI Institute were also named as recipients. SETI, the Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence, may also include another UM researcher.

NASA said the \$50 million grant is aimed at researching life in the universe, from the origins of

water on our planet to the livability of distant, icy worlds. The timing is significant with the Opportunity rover on Mars, the Kepler mission searching for habitable planets and Mars 2020 on the horizon.

"The intellectual scope of astrobiology is vast," said Mary Voytek, director of the astrobiology program at NASA headquarters. "The new teams cover the breadth of astrobiology, and by

coming together they will make the connections between disciplines and organizations that stimulate fundamental scientific advances."

The research at UM will look specifically at how life transitioned from small units that conduct simple chemical reactions to complex systems ranging from single cells to entire ecosystems, NASA said.

The latest grant marks an ongoing streak at UM in the

research realm. Last year, the university received a number of high-profile grants, including those from the National Football League and General Electric to study brain injuries.

Other grants went to the school's burgeoning work on the cyber front, while a record-setting \$45 million grant arrived from the Army Corps of Engineers to conduct ecological and anthropological studies on land managed by the Corps.

Turkey: Syrian town poised to fall

MURSITPINAR, Turkey -Islamic State fighters were poised to capture a strategic Syrian town on the Turkish border, Turkey's president warned Tuesday, even as Kurdish forces battled to expel the extremists from their footholds on the outskirts.

The outgunned Kurdish fighters struggling to defend Kobani got a small boost from a series of U.S.-led airstrikes against the militants that sent huge columns of black smoke into the sky. Limited coalition strikes have done little to blunt the Islamic State group's threeweek offensive, and its fighters have relentlessly shelled the town in preparation for a final assault.

Warning that the aerial campaign alone was not enough to halt the Islamic State group's advance, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan called for greater cooperation with the Syrian opposition, which is fighting both the extremists and forces loyal to Syrian President Bashar Assad.

"Kobani is about to fall," Erdogan told Syrian refugees in the Turkish town of Gaziantep, near the border. "We asked for three things: One, for a no-fly zone to be created; Two, for a secure zone parallel to the region to be declared; and for the moderate opposition in Syria and Iraq to be trained and equipped."

Erdogan's comments did not signal a shift in Turkey's position: He has said repeatedly that Ankara wants to see a more comprehensive strategy for Syria before it commits to military involvement in the U.S.-led coalition.

Turkish tanks and other ground forces have been stationed along the border within a few hundred yards of the fighting in Kobani, also known as Ayn Arab, but have not intervened. And while Turkey said just days ago that it wouldn't let Kobani fall, there's no indication the government is prepared to make a major move to save it.

Since mid-September, the militant onslaught has forced some 200,000 people to flee Kobani and surrounding villages, and activists say more than 400 people have been killed in the fighting. It has also brought the violence of Syria's civil war to Turkey's doorstep.

Protests were reported in cities across Turkey on Tuesday, after Islamic State fighters backed by tanks and artillery engaged in heavy street battles with the town's Kurdish defenders.

In Washington, State Department spokeswoman Jen Psaki said that U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry has spoken with Turkey Prime Minister Ahmet Davutoglu twice since Monday to discuss the situation in Kobani and Turkey's broader role in the coalition.

The United States and five Arab allies launched an aerial campaign against the Islamic State in Syria on Sept. 23 with the aim of rolling back and ultimately crushing the extremist group. The U.S. has been bombing Islamic State targets in neighboring Iraq since August.

give the Islamic State group, which already rules a huge stretch of territory spanning the Syria-Iraq border, a direct link between its positions in the Syrian province of Aleppo and its stronghold of Raqqa, to the east. It would also give the group full control of a large stretch of the Turkish-Syrian border.

Syrian Kurds scoffed at the rhetoric coming out of Ankara. They say that not only are the Turks not helping, that they are actively hindering the defense of Kobani by preventing Kurdish militiamen in Turkey from crossing the border into the town to help in the fight.

"We are besieged by Turkey, it is not something new," said Ismet Sheikh Hassan, the Kurdish defense chief for the Kobani region.

Relations between Turkey and Syria's Kurds have long been strained, in large part because Ankara believes the Kurdish Democratic Union, or PYD - the leading Syrian Kurdish political party - is affiliated with the Kurdish PKK movement that has waged a long and bloody insurgency in southeast Turkey.

Despite Erdogan's dire assessment of the battle for Kobani, the front lines were largely stable despite heavy clashes Tuesday.

Kurdish forces managed to push back Islamic State militants from some neighborhoods on the eastern edges of town, hours after the extremists stormed into the areas, according to the Britainbased Syrian Observatory for

Human Rights. Still, two black jihadi flags fluttered from a building and a small hill on the eastern outskirts.

Fighting also raged at the southwestern entrance to town, where the militants have seized control of a few buildings, including a hospital, said Observatory director Rami Abdurrahman.

From the Turkish side of the border, plumes of smoke from Islamic State shelling could be seen rising above the rooftops Tuesday, while long bursts of heavy gunfire frequently erupted followed by brief lulls.

The beleaguered Kurdish militiamen defending Kobani received some support overnight and Tuesday from the American-led coalition, which carried out six airstrikes against

HAMILTON - Calvin R. Garrett was packing heat Saturday when he decided to intervene in a family squabble.

It was a mistake that landed the 30-year-old Florence man in jail after he allegedly shot a man in the shoulder during a fight.

According to a charging affidavit, Garrett received a phone call from a woman that evening asking him to go to her home, pick up her kids and bring them to the place where she was

She told Garrett that she just had a fight with her husband and had left the house where the couple's three children remained.

Shortly after that initial phone call, Garrett called the woman back and asked what he was getting himself into.

Garrett then went to the home of Christopher and Alisa McCutcheon near Corvallis. When he arrived, Garrett told Christopher McCutcheon he was there to pick up the kids.

The two began to argue. At one point, McCutcheon and Travis Harris started walking down the driveway to get away from the altercation. Another

STOLEN CHECKBOOKS Fugitive wanted on multiple offenses

Polson police warn of past drug use, suicidal behavior

POLSON - Polson police are asking the public to be on the lookout for a 49-year-old man in possession of stolen checkbooks and involved in check washing, identity theft and burglary.

Asa Alan Lehrke is a white male, 6 feet and 200 pounds with dark blond hair, blue eyes and names tattooed on both sides of his neck and a large tattoo on his left forearm.

Detective Michelle Scott said Lehrke has a history of drug use and suicidal behavior, and has ties in Lake, Missoula, Flathead and Sanders counties, as well as the state of Washington.

A \$100,000 arrest warrant has been issued for him. He is also an absconder from the Montana Department of Corrections.

Lehrke was spied by a Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribal officer in recent weeks who attempted to detain him on a warrant, but Lehrke abandoned his vehicle and led the officer on a foot pursuit on Polson's west side. The wanted man disappeared inside a large apartment complex.

After obtaining a search warrant, police seized Lehrke's vehicle and found several stolen checkbooks, Social Security cards, photo IDs, burglary tools, drugs and drug paraphernalia, many pieces of jewelry and a freshly stolen all-terrain vehicle in the back.

Scott said a Crimestoppers reward may be available for information leading to an arrest, and tipsters can remain anonymous.



Ninemile Ranger District warns public of plans for prescribed burns

The Lolo National Forest's Ninemile Ranger District will conduct prescribed burning Wednesday and Thursday if weather and fuel conditions allow.

The burning locations are in the South Fork of Fish Creek drainage, located 24 miles up the Fish Creek drainage south Mountain. There are approximately 800 acres remaining in the two South Fork Fish Units, which will be implemented through collaborative efforts of the Ninemile Ranger District and the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation. These burns will be completed by aerial ignition. The burn

of Interstate 90 near White objectives are focused on reducing ladder and hazardous fuels in the understory, and enhancing wildlife habitat for big game species. This burn may be visible to residents of the area and from Interstate 90 and U.S. Highway 12.

> A separate prescribed burn may also occur in the

Corral Creek drainage, south of Interstate 90, west of Frenchtown and east of Alberton along Forest Roads 453 and 2146. This burn would be completed by hand ignition and is part of the Petty Rock Timber Sale, focusing on reducing hazardous fuels and enhancing habitat for big

game species.

All burning will be weather and fuel condition dependent. If ignition takes place, public access could be limited; be aware of fire crews and vehicles. Prescribed fire signs will be posted along the southside road east of Petty Creek, the main Fish Creek road and forest trails where burning is taking place.

Possible affected trails are Nos. 316, 317, and 318.

The prescribed burn will be ignited only if operational safety, fuel moistures, weather conditions and air quality parameters are met.

According to court documents, Kaestner exited the downtown apartment about 6 p.m. and stumbled into the street. Apparently, Kaestner was visibly intoxicated and called to his ex-girlfriend, who was standing nearby, to help him up. When the victim walked over, Kaestner reportedly told her he loved her and wanted her

"She told him that she did not want anything to

do with him anymore," the affidavit stated. "That statement made Kaestner angry and he started to yell at her and call her names."

The woman backed up and stood by her new boyfriend, who put his arm around her, which seemed to upset Kaestner.

"Kaestner reached into his pocket and pulled out a knife, opened the knife, held it up in their direction and threatened to kill her as he began walking toward them," the affidavit stated.

The new boyfriend stood in front of the woman, protecting her from Kaestner, who

apparently threatened to kill him, too. Kaestner allegedly succeeded in stabbing the man in the right thumb during the altercation that ensued.

In conversations with police, both victims relayed a similar version of events and expressed fear for their lives. Kaestner made his



She herself built the log cabin and blacksmith shop still located on her homesite on Minesinger Trail, furnishing both to period. For many years, she worked with the Polson elementary schools to schedule student tours to the cabin and shop, forever making an effort that the children would know and cherish their heritage. She took the ultimate step of putting her foothills property into the Montana Land Reliance, further ensuring the value and beauty of her part of the Mission Mountains for generations to come.

Jessie was an active board member of the Polson Flathead Historical Museum, intimately involved in the organization and presentation of the museum's extensive collection. She put in many hours preserving and restoring old tools so they would more properly reflect their place in Polson history. She also served on the board of the Flathead Reservation Area Historical Society, at one time taping verbal recollections of longtime residents of the valley who were World War II and Korean War veterans. She traveled to meet with these individuals, talking with them and recording their early memories of life on the Flathead Reservation. Both the Montana Historical Society in Helena and the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., have accepted this series for their respective collections. She was known and respected by staffs of both the Museum of the Americas in Polson and Ninepipes Museum of Early

Montana in St. Ignatius. With a longtime interest in

and knowledge of the Hudson Bay Co. and its impact on the valley, Jesse was a part of the grassroots effort to preserve and restore Fort Connah to its original site. Fort Connah was a Hudson Bay Co. trading post, established in 1846 and active to 1871. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. For years, Jessie sponsored tours of her log cabin and its antique furnishings as a fundraiser for the Fort Connah effort, enlisting friends and family to dress to period and re-enact the daily life of a homestead family.

Jessie researched and wrote an in-depth history of the Mountain View School for a locally published book, "In the Shadow of the Missions." a collaborative effort of valley residents about families that settled the valley. Proceeds from the sale of this publication supported the Lake County Country School Historians, and her contribution is now a permanent part of the Lake County Country School exhibit.

Jessie's loom weaving and hand quilting have long been valued in the local community. What is not as well known is her respected talent in the ancient art of finger weaving. Again, it was her love of history that sparked her to become proficient in weaving the colorful sashes worn by the vovageurs of the Hudson Bay Co. era - the same sashes seen in portraits by Charlie Russell. On one of her many road trips to Canada and the Northwest Territories, Jessie noticed and was drawn to the colorful L'Assumption sashes worn by early boatmen, woodsmen, trappers and explorers hired by the fur companies. She expressed an interest in learning how to make these unique sashes and eventually became accomplished in the lost art. Later, Jesse was invited to both the Charlie Russell Museum in Great Falls and the State Historical Museum in Helena to authenticate those sashes of Charlie Russell. which were finger woven from those woven on a loom. Jessie's reputation for historical authenticity and quality is well recognized in Canada and the United States. In January 2009, she was honored for her finger weaving by the Montana Arts Council as a member of the Montana Circle of American Masters in the Visual Folk and Traditional Arts.

Jessie was preceded in death by her husband, Ralph; and her son, Patrick.

She is survived by son, Michael and his wife Cindy of Seattle; son, Randy and his wife Liz of Missoula: and daughterin-law, Caroline Clemans of Polson. She is also survived by eight grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

A celebration of life will be held next summer.

Northside residents deserve proper cleanup

he Northside neighborhood has endured decades of discussion and very little progress on cleaning up the pollution at the White Pine Sash Superfund site. But the wait will have been worth it if it means the area will finally be fully cleaned and ready to welcome new development.

The Montana Department of Environmental Quality is still working through 665-or-so pages of public comment it received earlier this year as it prepares a Record of Decision, which it expects to complete by the end of next month. Having now heard the very valid concerns of many Northside residents, as well as Missoula officials, the agency must require that any ensuing cleanup meet the highest possible standards - and that means requiring a cleanup that meets the standards for residential use. on the site is completely clean

The DEQ's proposed cleanup plan issued this past spring assumed that the 43-acre site would now and forevermore be used for only commercial and industrial purposes. That was an unfortunate, short-sighted assumption that neighbors to the site and Missoula City Council members have since corrected.

Indeed, the City Council made sure to point out to the agency, in a unanimous resolution in late March, that 486 housing units were allowed on land zoned commercial or industrial over the five-year period ending in 2013. The resolution, sponsored by Councilors Bryan Von Lossberg and Jason Wiener, specifically requests that the DEQ order a cleanup that meets standards for residential use in order to ensure that any potential housing built

and safe for those future residents.

This week, DEO officials met with City Council members, Missoula County Commission chairwoman Jean Curtiss and the North Missoula Community Development Corp. to talk about the latest developments for the White Pine Sash site, which is located just west of Scott Street. The property is contaminated with pollutants – the pesticide pentachlorophenol, for one, and dioxins and other chemicals that a window company once used to treat wood. The pollution was revealed in 1993, when several underground storage tanks were taken out.

Now, Huttig Building Products is on the hook for any cleanup and is arguing that commercial or light industrial standards are sufficient. Not surprisingly, a cleanup to those standards would be less intensive - and less costly -

than the higher standards required for residential use. The DEQ estimates it could cost less than \$8 million to remediate the site to the lower standards, while meeting the higher residential standards could cost as much as \$21 million.

Regardless of the cost to Huttig, the property's various owners would like to see the cleanup completed as quickly as possible. These owners include Scott Street Partners, which has plans to bring commercial or industrial development to its 19 acres. Current plans do not include residential development.

Nevertheless, the concern for Missoulians is not whether there are immediate plans to build housing on the property, but whether there will ever be any plans to do so.

Northside neighbors are not protesting development, and are not advocating for residential over commercial or other use.

What they are fighting for is a clean and healthy neighborhood. Not just a neighborhood that is safe to work in, but a neighborhood that is safe to live

"Developers have come and gone and there's just been years of questions about this site, and the good news is, we're here, we're in the middle of a process that is getting us to a Record of Decision," DEQ director Tracy Stone-Manning said Monday. "I need to say upfront that we're not going to be able to answer a lot of questions today because we're still in the process of reviewing all the public comments. Let's all hold onto what the good news is, which is that this site is going to be cleaned up."

That is good news indeed. Even better news would be that the cleanup, when it takes place, will meet to residential standards.

AFFLECK'S MUSLIM PROBLEM

Liberal celebrity battle emblematic of wider denial

he latest episode of Bill Maher's HBO show "Real Time" performed what was, in effect, an in-studio social experiment.

It sought to establish, in a controlled setting, the answer to this pressing question: How long could Maher and atheist author

Sam Harris talk frankly about the illiberalism of much of the Muslim world before actor and

director Ben Affleck, also a guest on the show, accused them of racism? The result is

in: Not very. In fact, almost as soon as Maher

and Harris began to discuss how liberals are betraving their own convictions if they don't stand up against social backwardness in the Muslim world, Affleck grew visibly agitated. He could barely contain himself when Harris opined, "We have been sold this meme of Islamophobia, where every criticism of the doctrine of Islam gets conflated with bigotry toward Muslims as

That's when Affleck interrupted, and soon enough, he was calling Maher and Harris out for their grossness, ugliness and, yes, racism. How does it feel, guys?

You might be wondering, "Why should I care what the new Batman thinks?" The



heated exchange was so notable because all three are men of the left in good standing. As a walking embodiment of liberal piety, Affleck is emblematic of liberalism's see-no-evil discomfort with frank truths about the Muslim world.

The prelude to the intraliberal fight was the prior week's show, when Maher pointed out the absurdity of liberals getting exercised over, say, actor Jonah Hill using an anti-gay vulgarism, but ignoring that gays can be

stoned in Muslim countries. "To count yourself as a liberal," Maher declared, "you have to stand up for liberal principles" meaning across the board.

Maher had zeroed in on one of the more perverse aspects of contemporary politics, which is that self-consciously tolerant liberals often look the other way when confronted with the intolerance of the Muslim world.

For them, saying discouraging things about Islam feels too judgmental. It requires insisting

on the superiority of certain Western standards. It means jettisoning the comforting fictions of multiculturalism. It entails resisting the reflex to consider any criticism of the Third World as presumptive racism.

As militant atheists, Maher and Harris feel free of these constraints; criticizing religion is part of what they do for a living. As a garden-variety liberal, Affleck is subject to all of them and reacted as if two

Klansman had wandered onto the set with him.

When Maher and Harris pointed out how widespread retrograde attitudes are in the Muslim world, Affleck said they were "stereotyping." But the data doesn't stereotype. Especially in less-developed countries, it is appalling.

The percentage of Muslims in Middle Eastern and South Asia countries who say honor killings are never justified is shockingly low (31 percent in Egypt, 45 percent in Pakistan). Support for the stoning of adulterers is more than 40 percent in Bangladesh and 80 percent in Afghanistan. The death penalty for leaving Islam is almost, although not quite, as popular as

Affleck simply couldn't handle the truth. He kept on insisting it is just a few bad apples who think this way. At one point, he tried to wave Maher and Harris off with a condemnation of the Iraq War, positing an implicit moral equivalence between an overly idealistic war of liberation and the stoning of apostates.

Affleck obviously isn't a public official or a public intellectual. But he represents a dominant tendency within liberalism. Imagine a State Department staffed by lessglamorous Afflecks. Imagine a president of the United States who shares his instincts. This is the Obama administration. It's why, in part, it has always been so reluctant to speak of Islamic terrorism and extremism. It's why the president says the Islamic state is not Islamic.

The nation is truly in peril if Maher, of all people, is more clear-eyed than those running our government.

Strive for court of blind justice, not special interest influence

ormer Montana Supreme Court Justice Jim Nelson warns readers to be wary of money spent in judicial elections due to the potential it has to corrupt judges ("Will Montana judges be for sale?" Missoulian, Sept. 25).

Well, he should know. Nelson was the benefactor of nearly \$325,000 spent by a special interest, "dark money" group in his last race in 2004. That group, the Montana Trial Lawyers Association, collected huge contributions from attorneys with cases pending in Nelson's court and for whom he subsequently ruled in their favor.

Jim Nelson's 2004 election is the most egregious example of "pay to play" since the days of the Copper Kings. And now he lectures us on judges being for sale?

This is nothing new. For years the Montana Trial Lawyers Association has lavished campaign cash on judges. They even employed their lobbying might to kill legislation that would have made it illegal for judges to sit in cases in which one of the attorneys was a campaign contributor.

There's a long history of the trial lawyers being the biggest players in Montana Supreme Court races. That shouldn't be a shocker – they have a lot of money personally at stake in the outcomes. And when examining whom the trial lawyers have thrown their support behind, it's almost exclusively former Democratic politicians.

It looks like they have their candidate in 2014 as well. Candidate Mike Wheat is a former trial lawyer, former Democratic legislator, former Democratic candidate for attorney general, and was appointed to the Montana Supreme Court by a Democratic governor. Trial lawyers have been lining up in droves to contribute to Wheat's campaign. It's notable that many of these campaign contributors

have cases before the court in which Justice Wheat will rule in the future.

I guess it's no wonder that Jim Nelson failed to mention this glaring conflict of interest for Wheat since he was guilty of it himself

By making a feint towards the moral high ground, Nelson was hoping no one would mention the massive amount of money spent on his behalf by dark money groups. He then has the gall to attempt to paint the involvement of groups other than trial lawyers in judicial elections as having a corrupting effect.

We should strive for a judiciary that's a place for blind justice, and where financial contributions don't play a role in legal outcome. But Nelson is in no position to make the claims that he did, and should be embarrassed as this piece does nothing more than perpetuate the political partisanship within our judicial elections that he's denouncing.

A place to start is by electing judges that don't have obvious political allegiance – someone who doesn't have the political baggage that Wheat carries. It would be better to elect judges who have focused their careers on the law, not politics.

And if Nelson were really concerned about maintaining the integrity of our judiciary, then he shouldn't be focused on how judges are elected, but rather how they judge once they're on the bench. Our justices need to apply the law as intended by the people or by our democratically elected representatives in the legislature, and not by their own ideology or the ideology of those who donated to their campaign.

UM, military need to rethink Missoula training

I was walking with a friend to the University of Montana campus from the Northside, not expecting to encounter a situation that at once gave me chills and made my blood boil.

In the field just south of the dog park there were about 10 soldiers or soldiers-in-training in full camouflage fatigues complete with helmets. I assume they were doing some kind of training exercise.

Now I completely understand that there is Reserve Officer Training Corps offered through the university. I would hardly think twice of seeing soldiers in the middle of training exercises, but I hope the particular situation I saw this afternoon never happens again.

As we approached campus, I first noticed the camouflage. One man standing had what appeared to be an assault rifle slung over his back. This immediately made me uneasy because while I have visited countries abroad where it is an everyday occurrence to see military police with assault weapons, it is rare to see one here. Then as I observed the rest of the group, which was situated in a half-circle, lying on their bellies with their assault rifles, hands appearing to be on the triggers, they were focusing them in this halfcircle of directions. Again, I would not be disturbed by this scene still, if it were not for one sincerely troubling factor: two or three of these soldiers had their weapons trained on the bike path.

It is an utterly chilling sensation to walk in front of a deadly weapon held in an offensive position, without warning or justification. I am deeply disturbed by the lack of foresight that allowed rifles to be pointed at civilians. What are these men training for like this? Another Kent State? The ROTC program has to be schooled in common decency.

While walking along the pedestrian trail just north of the University of Montana's Adam's Center, I noticed several men with assault rifles pointed directly at me.

A veteran myself, my heart rate skyrocketed when I saw their weapons pointed in my direction. Laying prone in the field to our east, these charming rifles were held by young men

donned in camouflage, kevlar helmets and Load-Bearing Vests. As pedestrians and bicyclists alike traversed the trail, several of these boys laid with their weapons trained toward them.

Because I spent the better part of a decade in the Army, I recognized their M-16s to be the "rubber ducky" variety of that assault rifle: a to-scale rubber model of the M-16-A1, which was phased out shortly after the Vietnam War. But there were no indicators for anyone to register that these were not real

Authentic or not, these boys had their rifles trained toward unknowing civilians and I find this to be an absolute disgrace. This kind of reckless behavior can trigger post-traumatic stress disorder episodes in veterans, and even naive ROTC cadets who don't have nightmares of their own yet should be more sensitive to this reality.

Apparently it isn't OK to smoke a cigarette on the UM campus, but it is perfectly acceptable to point a firearm at pedestrians. If these men think that people admire them because they look like the macho actors depicted in Hollywood action films, I would like to direct their attention toward Ferguson, Missouri, for a reality check on how the public are beginning to feel about the militarization of our police forces, and the rejection of anything resembling Marshal Law.

There are plenty of places they can stick their rifles that do not involve a peaceful college campus.

BROKEN LEG AND CRATER NOTCH AREAS

Don't allow Stoltze logging project in trail corridors

F.H. Stoltze wants to cut some 55 loads of logs from state lands where the Broken Leg and Crater Notch trails provide non-motorized access to the Swan Range near Jewel Basin. The Department of Natural Resources and Conservation is accepting public comment until Oct. 20 on whether or not to grant Stoltze a salvage-logging permit there.

The DNRC in 2006 agreed to protect the recreational and aesthetic values of these trails by moving its Foothills Timber Sale clearcuts downhill and out of site of the trails. So we are

surprised to see this logging proposal focus precisely on these trail corridors.

We can understand Stoltze wanting to grab some state trees while it is logging dead and dying trees on its own neighboring quarter-section of land. But that convenience is strongly outweighed by the fact these public Forest Service trails lie on DNRC easements in precisely the area targeted for logging.

We are urging DNRC to not allow this logging in the trail corridors and to retain the big old trees as essential habitat for wildlife that depend on dead snags for food and nesting. This is especially important given Stoltze is removing these wildlife trees from its land next door.

No matter how careful the job, using feller-bunchers and grapple skidders to remove trees on these steep hillsides will damage the character of these trail experiences for decades to come. We appreciate DNRC accepting public comments until Oct. 20, but let's retain the public trees for wildlife and people as Stoltze logs its private neighboring lands.

Ebola virus: Respect, not fear

he outbreak of Ebola virus disease in western Africa has become one of the most important epidemics in history. As two health care workers who have just returned from Kenema, the largest and busiest Ebola treatment center in Sierra Leone, we feel we have a perspective that will assist others in how best to approach this disease.

Ebola is not a uniformly fatal disease. We spent two and one-half weeks in a hospital with an average daily census of 90 patients, and provided hands-on care for approximately 300 Ebola-infected individuals. And even with the basic medical care we were able to provide, the fatality rate was approximately 40 percent. Put another way, we saved 60 percent of patients who came into our ward, with only intravenous fluids and basic medical care such as fever control and antibiotics. Those who recover are immune for life from this disease, and many of our survivors came back and assisted us in caring for their brethren.

Another important point is that this is a disease whose mode of transmission is well understood, and diligent applications of basic barrier precautions (facial masks, doubled gloves, fluid-resistant gowns) can prevent transmission. During our time there we worked as a team and watched each other's backs. The hospital there had only rudimentary isolation procedures in place, far short of what any Western hospital could provide.

In reality, any U.S. hospital is well equipped to safely care for a patient with Ebola. In any modern hospital there is no risk to the public, and the risk to the workforce is completely manageable and not dissimilar from the risks we already take every day dealing with other infectious diseases that receive less publicity lately, such as tuberculosis and

We went to Africa largely for humanitarian reasons, but also in order to gain personal experience with this disease. Since the Rocky Mountain Labs opened its Integrated Research Facility in 2008, Providence St. Patrick Hospital has served as its referral medical center. This means we would provide care for anyone who suffers an occupational injury while manipulating many high-hazard infectious diseases, such as Ebola.

Our hospital received funding from the National Institutes of Health to build an isolation ward with state-of-the-art technology. We have designed and implemented a training program and workshop for our health care workers, which is conducted regularly and supplemented with live drills. This training program is the model for all of the hospitals in the U.S. and Canada who provide support to research facilities such as Rocky Mountain Labs.

Health care workers have participated in our workshops from the Galveston National Laboratory in Texas; the National **Emerging Infectious Diseases Laboratory** in Boston; Ft. Detrick, Maryland, home to U.S. Army Medical Research Institute for Infectious Diseases, the National Institutes of Health Clinical Center in Bethesda, Maryland; and Winnipeg, Manitoba's National Microbiology Lab. We have the best-trained nurses anywhere in the Western Hemisphere.

Fortunately and due to the extreme professionalism of the researchers at Rocky Mountain Labs, there has not been the need to activate our Care and Isolation Unit. However, we may be called upon to expand our mission to include caring for others who, in the line of their duties in this unprecedented outbreak, have become infected. If we are called upon, it is less because of the isolation ward and more because of the training we have implemented. Again, any U.S. hospital is well equipped to care for patients. The major difference is that we have been preparing for such an event for years.

Accepting a patient with Ebola is not something to be feared. We are proud to be a part of one of the best-prepared and most highly trained workforce anywhere. We are a center of excellence in the management of infectious diseases. Were we to accept a patient here with this disease, we would provide the best possible care.



Health care stocks have smoked the rest of the market this year.

Pharmaceutical companies, insurers and others have jumped 13.7 percent. That's the best performance of the 10 sectors that make up the Standard & Poor's 500 index, and is nearly triple the index's gain.

A wave of deals in the industry has been a big reason for the rise. Allergan, the maker of Botox,

is up 67.6 percent in large part because rival Valeant Pharmaceuticals has made several attempts to buy it, for example.

Another key: The sector offers healthy revenue growth, something that's been in short supply during this slow economic recovery. Revenue is forecast to rise 9.7 percent for the health care sector this



man and one of the children started walking toward the house.

The affidavit said Garrett didn't leave the scene.

Instead, he got in his truck and drove toward the man and the 13-year-old boy. When he got out of his truck, he had a gun in his hand, the affidavit said.

He asked the two where McCutcheon had gone and then jumped back in his truck and drove down the driveway.

When Garrett confronted McCutcheon and Harris with the pistol in his hand, a fight ensued.

As McCutcheon attempted to get the gun out of Garrett's hand, the pistol fired. The bullet struck McCutcheon in the shoulder.

At that point, Harris jumped on Garrett's back and attacked him. He eventually was able to get the gun out Garrett's hand.

Harris disarmed the gun and threw it into a field, where officers located it later. It was unloaded except for the fired casing in the chamber.

When the fight ended, all three men went back to the McCutcheon home, where Harris retrieved the crowbar he used to break out two windows in Garrett's truck.

Garrett got in his truck and left after that. McCutcheon was driven into town for medical treatment.

When sheriff's officers found Garrett at his home, he was wearing a bloodied and torn T-shirt and jeans. He had blood on his ear and a scratch on his neck. He was covered in dirt.

Garrett told the officers he'd received a phone call

from Alisa McCutcheon to go get the kids. When he arrived, everyone was playing basketball.

Garrett said he got into an argument with McCutcheon. As he was driving down the driveway, he encountered the two men again.

Originally, Garrett said he had his handgun in the waistband of his pants. He claimed he didn't pull it out until the men advanced on him. And he said he didn't point it at anyone, but when the men began to wrestle, it fired and the bullet hit McCutcheon.

At some point, Garrett

told officers he blacked out. When he came to, Garrett said he tried to apologize to McCutcheon.

Garrett appeared before Ravalli County Justice of the Peace Jim Bailey on Monday on two felony counts of assault with a weapon and felony criminal endangerment.

Bailey set bail at \$50,000.





Break out of your dinner rut

n Sunday nights this summer, I would often stare at a blank sheet of paper as I tried to plan a week's worth of meals.

I would try to think up something new to cook for dinner. Often the menu would look like this: hot dogs, pasta, tacos. And the same the next week. And the next.

I was in the depths of a dinner rut. Luckily, "Dinner: The Playbook," a new book by Jenny Rosenstrach, came across my desk. Rosenstrach, author of the popular food blog Dinner: A Love Story, once committed to cooking 30 days' worth of new recipes to break out of her dinner doldrums. (Hers: cutlets, burgers, pizza.)

Her new book is devoted to breaking out of

I couldn't commit, like Rosenstrach, to a month of planning, shopping and cooking new recipes. But I gave myself a reasonable goal: one to two new recipes a week. Soon enough, I was finally leafing through those recipes I had ripped out of magazines looking for weeknight winners. I was dog-earing pages in cookbooks that I hadn't looked at in

New dishes were appearing on our dinner table: rigatoni with turkey and mushroom Bolognese, roasted chicken thighs with potatoes and carrots, sauteed zucchini with Za'atar and crispy chickpeas.

To help others shake up their dinner routine, I sought advice from Rosenstrach and two other experts with new cookbooks. Jack Bishop, editorial director of America's Test Kitchen, shared tips from its latest cookbook, "The Make-Ahead Cook: 8 Smart Strategies for Dinner Tonight." New York Times writer Mark Bittman offered suggestions based on his new cookbook, "How to Cook Everything Fast: A Better Way to Cook Great Food."

GET THE FAMILY INVOLVED

Rosenstrach said she and her husband loved to cook. So when they found themselves deep in a dinner rut, they felt they had to do something drastic: commit to a month's worth of new recipes.

But, she said, start where you can. If you have seven solid regular recipes, expand from there. If you can't do a month, try a week. (Check out posts Rosenstrach did when she helped a New York-area family with a week's worth of dinners for Motherlode blog.)

A key is getting the entire family involved. Rosenstrach said. She and her husband presented the challenge to their daughters as a family adventure. They all pored through cookbooks and magazines choosing recipes. Everyone was asked to give feedback - good or bad - on whether a dish worked. Everyone had to commit to trying new foods. Rosenstrach even heard from some families who undertook a similar challenge and rewarded themselves by choosing one night to dine out.

Another key to making a change, Rosenstrach said: Just do it. Dinner has to happen. If you wait for all the stars to align to

Chicken bundled in a pretty package

A stuffed chicken breast or other meat is an elegant way to change up the dinner menu. And it need not take a great deal of time. Simply prepare a filling, pound the chicken to create more surface area, spread on the filling, roll and secure.

A bit of kitchen string does the job neatly and quickly; just bundle up as if tying ribbon around a birthday present. A few toothpicks also do the job, but might make the chicken pieces a bit difficult to turn in the skillet to brown all sides.

This version takes advantage of seasonal figs, but you could use dried. Soak them for 10 or 15 minutes in hot water or warmed port or other sweet wine if they seem a bit hard.

To serve, slice the bundles crosswise, revealing the pretty filling and drizzle with the pan sauce. The weeknight meal will seem like a special occasion.

try a new recipe or week's worth or a month's worth,

it won't happen. Just start. "Once you start making it happen regularly, you get addicted to it," she said.

THINK AHEAD

Bishop works at the Massachusetts-based America's Test Kitchen, which produces Cook's Illustrated and Cook's Country magazines, television shows on PBS and numerous cookbooks. He has one rule for avoiding dinner ruts: Plan ahead.

"Late decision-making rarely results in good things," Bishop said. "For most people, the ruts occur because they don't think about dinner until 5 p.m."

Spend 10 minutes before bedtime to pull something out of the freezer, assemble a marinade for meat or vegetables or to set out ingredients on the counter. Or sit down and write up a list of meals for the week.

"Thirty minutes on Sunday is time that is really well spent," Bishop said.

The test kitchen's new book, "The Make-Ahead Cook," offers strategies and recipes that put that time to the home cook's advantage. Marinades and spice rubs allow home cooks to let flavor to penetrate the food. Soups and stews often taste better the next day. Even making a kale salad and letting it sit overnight dressed with olive oil and vinegar tenderizes the greens. "This is where it actually makes the dish better if it is made in advance," he said.

Bishop said making dishes ahead means tweaking cooking techniques. Instead of fully cooking a stew, for instance, cook it partially and cool it down by adding some chilled broth or water before putting it in the refrigerator or freezer. That way, you will avoid overcooking the dish when you reheat it.

REAL-TIME COOKING

Bittman, The New York Times' food columnist and cookbook author, is a bit of pulled into 2 pieces at a contrarian: He doesn't believe in dinner ruts.

"If you are cooking the same thing three times a week and you are OK with that, that's not a rut," he said. "I wouldn't let anyone else define it for

However, Bittman said, a good cookbook can help inspire a home cook to expand horizons. While he admits to being prejudiced, his new book, "How to Make Everything Fast," with more than 2,000 recipes, shows cooks how to get in the kitchen and start cooking.

Bittman's book dismisses the idea that the restaurant-style preparation called mise en place, where a cook prepares all of the ingredients ahead of time, has any place in the home kitchen. Instead, the book's recipes take advantage of downtime during the cooking process to tell cooks when to chop onion, peel shrimp or prepare other ingredients. Bittman said this new recipe style reflects how real cooks operate in the kitchen.

"The advantage is you can plunge right in," Bittman said. "You can put a pan on the stove and you just go."

Pot Roast in Foil

This recipe is designed to provide leftover meat and pan juices to make Rigatoni With Beef Ragu. From "The Make-Ahead Cook: 8 Smart Strategies for Dinner Tonight," by the Editors of America's Test Kitchen, (2014).

3 tablespoons cornstarch

4 teaspoons onion powder

1 tablespoon minced fresh thyme or 1 teaspoon dried thyme

2 teaspoons packed brown sugar

2 teaspoons salt 1 teaspoon pepper

1 teaspoon garlic powder

1 teaspoon instant espresso powder 1/2 teaspoon celery

1 (4-pound) boneless beef chuck-eye roast,

natural seam and trimmed of large pieces of fat

2 onions, quartered 1 pound small red potatoes, unpeeled, quartered

4 carrots, peeled and cut into 1 1/2-inch pieces

2 bay leaves 2 tablespoons soy sauce

Adjust oven rack to lower-middle position and heat oven to 300 degrees. Combine cornstarch, onion powder, thyme, brown sugar, salt, pepper, garlic powder, espresso powder and celery seeds in a bowl.

Season both chunks of roast evenly with spice rub. Tie roasts crosswise with kitchen twine at 1inch intervals and pat dry with paper towels.

Crisscross two 30-by-18-inch sheets of heavyduty aluminum foil inside a large roasting pan. Place onions, potatoes, carrots and bay leaves in center of foil and drizzle with soy sauce. Set meat on top of vegetables. Fold opposite corners of foil toward each other and crimp edges tightly to seal. Place roasting pan in oven.

Cook roasts until meat is completely tender and fork slips easily in and out of meat, about 4 1/2 hours.

Remove meat from foil pouch and transfer to a carving board. Tent meat loosely with foil and let rest for 20 minutes. Discard onions and bay leaves. Using slotted spoon, place potatoes and carrots on serving platter. Strain contents of roasting pan through fine-mesh strainer into fat separator. Let liquid settle for 5 minutes, then pour 1 cup defatted pan juices into storage container. Set aside.

Remove kitchen twine from meat and set aside 1 pound trimmed roast. Slice remaining meat thin against the grain and transfer to platter with vegetables. Pour remaining defatted pan juices over meat and serve.

2 tablespoons extravirgin olive oil

6 garlic cloves, minced 4 teaspoons tomato paste

3/4 teaspoons minced fresh oregano or 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano

1 (28-ounce) can crushed tomatoes

1 cup chicken broth 1 cup pot roast pan juices

Salt and pepper 1 pound cooked pot roast, shredded, about 4 cups

1/2 cup heavy cream 1 pound rigatoni 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

Grated Parmesan cheese

Cook oil, garlic, tomato paste and oregano in large saucepan over medium heat until fragrant, about 1 minute. Stir in tomatoes, broth, pot roast pan juices and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Bring to a simmer and cook until sauce has thickened and flavors have melded, about 15 minutes. Stir in shredded beef and cream and cook until heated through, about 2 minutes. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

Bring 4 quarts water to boil in a large pot. Add pasta and 1 tablespoon salt and cook, stirring often, until al dente. Reserve 1/2 cup cooking water, then drain pasta and return to pot.

Add sauce and parsley to pasta and toss to combine. Before serving, adjust consistency with reserved cooking water as needed. Serve with Parmesan.

Shrimp and Tomato Paella

Recipe Tester's Note: If you don't want to splurge on saffron, omit it or add a teaspoon or two of turmeric to the broth for golden-colored rice. From "How to Cook Everything Fast," by Mark Bittman

(Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2014).

3 1/2 cups shrimp or vegetable stock or water, plus more if needed

Pinch of saffron 3 tablespoons olive oil 1 medium onion Salt and pepper 1 pound peeled shrimp 3 large ripe tomatoes, about 11/2 pounds

2 cups short- or medium-grain white rice, preferably paella or Arborio rice

Several sprigs fresh parsley for garnish

Heat oven to 450 degrees. Put 3 1/2 cups stock or water and a pinch of saffron in a small saucepan over medium heat.

Put 3 tablespoons olive oil in a large ovenproof skillet over medium-high heat. Meanwhile, trim, peel and chop onion.

Add onion to skillet, sprinkle with salt and pepper, and cook, stirring occasionally until it softens, 3 to 5 minutes. While onion is cooking, cut shrimp into 1/2-inch chunks. Core tomatoes and cut into wedges.

When onion is soft, stir in 2 cups rice and cook, stirring occasionally, until it's glossy, a minute or 2. Add warmed stock and stir in shrimp.

Lay tomato wedges on top of rice and put skillet in oven. Cook for 15 minutes. After 15 minutes, check

to see if rice is dry and just tender. If not, return to oven for another 5 minutes. If rice looks too dry but still not quite

done, add small splash of stock or water. When rice is ready, turn off heat and let pan sit in oven for 5 minutes.

Remove skillet from oven, sprinkle with parsley

and serve hot or warm. ■ Makes 4 servings.

Maple Candy Pork Chops

Author Jenny Rosenstrach suggests serving this dish with sweet potato fries and a marinated beet salad. From "Dinner: The Playbook," by Jenny Rosenstrach (Ballantine Books, 2014).

4 boneless center-cut pork chops

1/3 cup maple syrup 3 tablespoons canola oil 1/4 cup low-sodium soy


1/4 cup rice wine

1 garlic clove, halved, or a shake or two of powdered

Place pork chops in a resealable plastic bag. Add maple syrup, canola oil, soy sauce, rice wine vinegar and garlic. Seal and marinate 60 minutes to overnight.

When ready to cook, heat oven to 450 degrees. Remove chops from marinade and pat dry with paper towels, scraping off any garlic that clings to the meat. Place chops on a foil-lined rimmed baking sheet and bake, flipping once halfway through, from 15 to 20 minutes, until firm in the center but not rock hard.

Montana's crisp days bring crisp delights – apples

utumn means apples. And you can expect to find an abundance of them at the Missoula Farmers Market, known for its excellent selection of freshly picked ones brought from orchards every week, through the market season's last day. Saturday, Oct. 25.

We are lucky to have a number of wonderful local orchards producing bushels of every apple variety for a community of discerning buyers. One such operation is the Corvallis Hills Orchard, owned and tended by Art and his wife Nancy Callan for 32 years. The Callans have been bringing apples to the market since 1985, never missing a year. They have a personal commitment, a "hands on" operation, as they describe

The couple does all the

orchard work themselves. They report that from 100 apple trees planted the first year, they grafted and developed 30 varieties of apples produced by 1,200 dwarf orchard trees - after just 8 years.

"Our goal was to produce variety in our orchard, but we leaned toward growing those kinds of apples that could carry us all the way through the end of the Missoula Farmers Market season. It's kind of like an apple ripening relay starting in early August and running through the last market Saturday of October," the Callans said.

The Callans say the Vista Bella variety is the first to ripen for them. They are ready to sell at the market beginning in August. Then each type is brought to market as it is harvested. So as western Montana weather turns crisp, apple connoisseurs can expect to

find these – and in this order but in part, to their high of appearance – at the Missoula Farmers Market: Discovery, State Fair, Jersey Mac, Ginger Gold, Akane, Jonamac, Gala, Honeycrisp, McIntosh, Liberty, Sweet 16, Empire and a sprinkling of others.

It is easy to keep apples

by storing them in a cool place, like the refrigerator or the cellar. Displaying them in a fruit bowl where they are handy promotes healthy eating habits in your family. Eat one a day for breakfast or dessert (instead of sweets) and you'll notice a difference in how you feel. Apples can be added to smoothies, used for sweet or savory sauces, dried and then reconstituted, even at a much later time. Drying fresh apples preserves many of their healthy properties, as well as their unique

flavors. Apples have amazing health benefits due largely,

pectin fiber content. Eating a fresh apple will help clean vour teeth, boost immunity, lower your risk for type 2 diabetes, help with detoxification (including lead removal), help fight aging, Parkinson's and Alzheimer's diseases. The chemistry of apples has been shown to reduce the body's likelihood of developing cancer – particularly pancreatic cancer, reduce the risk of coronary disease and cholesterol. Apples can naturally help to restore the body's digestion and elimination processes and that should impact success with weight loss, reduction of hemorrhoids, constipation (eaten with

flexible - you can sweeten it to taste depending on your apple choice.

We think the most important difference is the Ceylon cinnamon with a clean "citrusy" flavor, free of "bite" associated with the cassias cinnamons that also have a higher coumarin content. We get Softstick Cevlon cinnamon from Penzey's Spices (penzeys.com) and grind it in a coffee grinder. Spice freshly ground takes any recipe into the realm of

Jonamac Apple Pie Recipe

gourmet eating.

By Art and Nancy Callan of Corvallis Hills Orchard

Pie crust (10-inch double-crust pie):

3 cups sifted flour 11/4 cups shortening 1 teaspoon salt 1 egg

4 tablespoons cold water 1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar

Mix flour and salt

together, then cut in shortening finely with pastry blender. Beat 1 egg, add cold water and vinegar to it. and combine gently with flour mixture. Roll out top and bottom crusts.

Filling:

4 pounds Jonamac apples 1 tablespoon fresh lemon

2 tablespoons flour 1 teaspoons ground Ceylon cinnamon 1/4 cup sugar

Core apples and slice thinly (peeling is optional) and mix with lemon juice. Combine dry ingredients and toss with apple slices. Fill pie crust and top. A little milk can be brushed on the top crust to help it brown. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes, or until done.

The human brain, remarkable though it is, does not always function at peak efficiency. Certain circumstances can have a numbing effect on it, and for many, one of those circumstances arises when playing a

grand slam. Perhaps North was unduly optimistic when he bid seven notrump on

today's hand, but his optimism would have paid off had South contributed his fair share to the play. West led the queen of hearts, and

it did not take South long to accomplish his own destruction. He won the heart with the king and cashed the ace of clubs, on which West showed out. There was now nothing South could do but concede down

tainly unlucky - but, even so, South should have made the grand slam. Instead of plunging ahead as he did at trick two, he should have paused to consider the only possible danger to the contract - namely, that the clubs might be divided 4-0.

come to the conclusion that the contract could not be made if West had the J-10-6-3, but that it could be made if East had the J-10-6-3.

Accordingly, he would have led a low club to the queen at trick two and, after West showed out, returned a low club at trick three. East's J-10-6 would eventually have succumbed to the A-K-9, and South would have made the grand slam, scoring five clubs, two hearts, three diamonds and three spades in all.

This would have given him 2,220 points (or 2,420 at rubber-bridge scoring) instead of a loss of 100, and would have made the effort to stay focused at times like this well worth-

Conduct policy on NFL owners' agenda

NEW YORK (AP) - NFL owners will meet Wednesday to discuss the league's personal conduct policy, vote on the sale of the Buffalo Bills and look at further international play.

These are critical meetings for the owners, with Commissioner Roger Goodell under fire for his handling of the Ray Rice case, and with several highprofile player arrests involving domestic abuse. Although the owners have supported Goodell remaining in the job, they also have been embarrassed by loud criticism of the league's recent missteps.

Their discussions of social responsibility and the personal conduct policy initiatives will overshadow approval of the purchase of the Bills by Buffalo Sabres owner Terry and Kim Pegula. That transaction is considered certain, with three-quarters of the teams needing to vote in favor of the Pegulas.

Owners will be updated on the Los Angeles stadium situation; TV ratings, attendance and fan interest. They also will receive reports on the league's games in London - three this year for the first time, with two still to come. The NFL has an eye on adding more London games, perhaps as soon as next season.

Hornish to replace Ambrose at RPM

CHARLOTTE, N.C. -NASCAR driver and former IndyCar Series star Sam Hornish Jr. will move fulltime to the Sprint Cup Series with Richard Petty Motorsports. An official

announcement of Hornish's hire to replace Marcos Ambrose beginning in the 2015 season is expected Wednesday, multiple sources confirmed. Ambrose is returning to his native Australia.

This will be Hornish's second fulltime stint in the Cup series. He struggled in his first go-around, which was with Team Penske. In three-plus seasons, Hornish had eight top-10 finishes in 108 starts. In recent seasons he has found success running in the Nationwide Series, where he finished second in points last season and fourth in 2012.

Hornish, 35, has been running a partial schedule in the Nationwide Series this season with Joe Gibbs Racing. In eight starts, he has one win, four top-five and four top-10 finishes. He's also won two poles.

An RPM spokesperson was not immediately available for comment.

Bianchi stable with brain injury

TOKYO (AP) - Formula One driver Jules Bianchi remains in critical but stable condition, the Frenchman's family said Tuesday as FIA launched an investigation into his accident at the Japanese Grand Prix.

The 25-year-old Bianchi had emergency surgery for a severe head injury on Sunday after his car hit a crane that was sent to recover another vehicle.

In a statement distributed in conjunction with the Mie Medical Center, Bianchi's family said the driver "has suffered a diffuse axonal injury and is in a critical but stable condition."

Bianchi crashed on the 44th lap in Sunday's rainshortened race at the Suzuka circuit. His car went off at Turn 7, where Sauber driver Adrian Sutil had crashed two laps earlier.

FIA, the governing body of the sport, is investigating the incident.

He was the third high

school football player in

the country to die in the

same week. Friends and teachers have called Cutinella an inspiration to his fellow classmates.

Many members of opposing teams attended a wake for Cutinella on Sunday and Monday.

Also last week, an assistant football coach at the high school resigned amid allegations that he possessed steroids. Labbe said at the time that the allegations against the former defensive coordinator were the focus of a separate investigation and were not related to the cancellation of last week's game.

The shooting guard spot falls to junior McCalle Feller, the former walk-on from Lewistown who started UM's two WNIT games and averaged 5.8 points last season.

The leading candidate for the small forward spot is Kayleigh Valley, a 5-11 sophomore out of Spokane who played in all 34 games and averaged 4.4 points as a true freshman. Junior guard Hannah Doran, who played in 24 games last season, is also a candidate.

Of the three players who saw sparse action last season, two return: sophomore forward Molly Klinker and 6-2 sophomore post player Mekayla Isaak out of Bend, Oregon.

Missoula Sentinel product DJ Reinhart gave up basketball after a change of major to journalism, her coach said. The guard played in 12 games and scored 17 points as a redshirt freshman in 2013-14.

That leaves true

freshman Sierra Anderson, a 5-6 point guard out of Mill Creek, Washington, who has impressed Selvig during the limited offseason workouts.

"The backup point is looking real good there," he said. "Really good. I couldn't be happier with what she's doing."

That being said, Rubel will likely bring the ball up for what will be a busy senior season: She's doing her student teaching this fall. Her class commitments and those of others have the Lady Griz practicing at 6:30 a.m. most days.

Rubel led the Lady Griz in shooting (.463), threepoint shooting percentage (.439) and scoring (14.1 points a game) last season. Her 108 assists were second to Hill's 155; she also averaged five rebounds a game.

"She's played a lot of point guard in her career," Selvig said. "She's good enough we need the ball in her hands anyway."

Hill and Sullivan combined to average another two dozen points for the Lady Griz. Rickman checked in at 6.3 points a game, good for fourth on the team. The team will need offense, and Gilham, who led the Big Sky in 3point percentage as a true freshman in 2012-13. would help.

The latest procedure on the Bozeman product's knee was to clear cartilage.

"She's a heck of a talent if she can come back playing," Selvig said. "I'd almost forgotten how good she was. I think she'll be

back. Also, maybe, she's due for some good luck."

So is Vining, as are the Lady Griz at a team. Carly Selvig, a force at the defensive end, is notably ahead of schedule from her surgery to repair two torn ligaments.

That makes three potential starters on the mend with a tough season ahead. If all three were back before UM heads to the three-day Cancun Challenge in Mexico that begins Nov. 27, the squad would be that much more prepared for a Big Sky Conference that includes defending champion North Dakota along with "newcomer" Idaho, which also made the NCAA tournament last year.

Northern Colorado, Southern Utah, Eastern Washington and Montana State are among the many contenders this season.

"We'll see what shakes out but I think we're going to be pretty good," Robin Selvig said. "I think everybody in the league's pretty good, though. That's the problem, seriously. It's a bugger."

NOTES: Another returnee Selvig is excited about is Tom Stage, the Lady Griz radio play by-play announcer. Stage, who suffered a stroke in early March, will be back full-time in 2014-15.

"I think it will verify we're a very good defense," Delaney said.

"Being an old oldtimer, I still believe defense win championships. Obviously you've got to score and get on the board. But I would hope our defense is going to hang in there and be solid against everybody down the stretch here."

The top offensive player in the conference, Eastern Washington quarterback Vernon Adams Ir., suffered a broken foot at Idaho State Saturday and reportedly will not be back for 3-6 weeks. Delanev reached out to former Montana State OB DeNarius McGhee when he suffered a serious injury last season and the coach feels just as bad for Adams.

"It's just a shame when a good football player gets hurt," he said. "You don't ever want to see good players who are doing very well get injured.

"He's reached 100 touchdown passes. He's the finest, probably, offensive player in the country right now and that's tough when one of them goes down. But they have good backups and (Adams) will be back toward the end of the season. You can bet he'll be playing when we go to Cheney, I'll guarantee you that."

That game is set for Nov. 8. The secondranked Eagles and Griz were picked to finish 1-2 in the league race in the Big Sky's preseason media poll.

Arkansas. So he's seen bigger crowds, especially when his Razorbacks went to Alabama. This was different.

Fall games in Fayatteville might draw dozens, and Pinkerton didn't bother to turn on the scoreboard for some. In Frenchtown the Grizzlies received a standing ovation before the game even started.

"For months coach Mel (assistant Melanie Meuchel) and Coach Pink talked about how a lot of people were going to be coming," said MaKenna McGill, a freshman outfielder from Claremore, Oklahoma. "To finally see what they were talking about was really cool. I don't think any of us expected that. We expected 30, 40 people."

Montana beat NIC 11-1 and Carroll College 6-4, and then this past Saturday - in front of smaller crowds, perhaps 400 - dispatched Columbia Basin and Williston State by identical 10-1 scores.

It happened with a mixture of good pitching, a little pop and a lot of speed - early on UM seems sort of the distaff version of Pinkerton's favorite baseball team, the Kansas City Royals.

Pinkerton, who guided Arkansas to the NCAA tournament in 2008-09, says his outfield trio of McGill, McKenzie Phillips of Riverside, California, and power-hitting Great Falls product Mercedes Bourgeau is faster than any he's coached.

"Madeline Merritt is the fourth outfielder, and she's quick too," he added.

"And all the way around the outfield I probably have the best arms I've had."

His first Montana team is so far boasting a lineup of nine freshmen and a sophomore – or eight freshman, a sophomore and a senior when Boise State transfer Kenzie Cole pitches.

The group committed five errors while Cole allowed two hits in an extra-inning, 2-1 loss to Dawson Community College in the first game, in Billings. Then the team calmed down.

Pinkerton makes it clear UM "has to step it up," for its first Big Sky Conference slate, which begins in March. They'll play games before that, of course, starting with New Mexico State and powerful Texas Tech on Feb. 4 in Las Cruces.

The plan is for the Grizzlies to be in their own digs for their home opener against Carroll on March 18. How many wins they'll have by then is a mystery, but it's pretty safe to say they won't be winning at an .875 clip. Pinkerton's first club at Tulsa went 13-42, for example.

Then again his second team, in 2002, went 48-16.

It's possible this young team, which includes junior transfer and Missoula product Kelsey Lucostic, will be dangerous sooner rather than later. Pinkerton likes the early poise of freshman pitcher Carli Riordan, and the speed and potential.

He and his players certainly have to like this flying start.

"It's history-making," McGill said of playing for the Grizzlies. "For all of us it's really cool, and it's motivation for all of us to play hard and set what Griz softball is all about."



The NLCS starts Saturday in St. Louis, with the Cardinals hosting San Francisco in a rematch of 2012 won by the Giants.

Trevor Rosenthal allowed two runners in the ninth before getting Carl

While the steady Cardinals advanced to their ninth NLCS in 15 years, the defeat was a huge disappointment for the NL West champion Dodgers, who finished the regular season with a \$256 million payroll that was \$40 million higher than any other team.

Los Angeles remains without a pennant since winning the 1988 World

"It's awful," catcher A.J. Ellis said. "It's devastating. It just kind of rehashes those old memories."

Manager Don Mattingly wasn't about to secondguess leaving Kershaw in the game, especially with a bullpen that's foundered. He wanted the lefty to get three more outs.

"It goes back to the same question: Is there anybody better, even on short rest, and even where he was at that point?" Mattingly said.

Kershaw started on three days' rest for the second time in his postseason career. He was dominant into the seventh, as he was in Game 1, but again started the inning with three straight hits.

The third hit Tuesday came when Adams, the burly bopper know as Big City, drove a curveball on Kershaw's 102nd pitch into the right-center bullpen to put St. Louis up 3-2.

"I had a pretty good idea that it was gone," Adams said.

The red-clad crowd roared and twirled white towels as Kershaw made a slow slog back to the Dodgers' dugout.

Kershaw allowed one homer to left-handed batters while going 21-3 with a 1.77 ERA in the regular season. He gave up two to the Cardinals, with Matt Carpenter connecting in the opener.

Ayre targeting the spoils of victory at NRA Finals Rodeo

During the week, Ben Ayre helps his father, Bill, create saddles in the family shop in Glendive.

Each hand-crafted saddle takes patience and an eye for detail.

The younger Ayre has an opportunity to hasten the process and collect three championship saddles this weekend in Butte.

The 24-year-old is chasing three titles - allaround cowboy, steer wrestling and tie-down roping – this week at the Northern Rodeo Association/Northern Women's Rodeo Association Finals at the Butte Civic Center.

Has he considered building his own championship saddle?

"Oh, I don't know about that," Ayre said with a chuckle.

The finals, which feature the top 10 in each event from the 2014 regular season, begin Thursday and continue Saturday with scheduled 7 p.m. performances.

"I am excited," Ayre said. "I think it's going to be fun."

Ayre is trying to become only the sixth Triple Crown (threeevent champion) in the history of the NRA. Along with leading the

all-around cowboy standings, he also leads tie-down roping and is second in steer wrestling. "I'm going to run

whatever I'm doing right then and not worry about the all-around," he said of his game plan. "I have to do well in my events and let it sort itself out."

Ayre has a lead of \$758 in the tightly bunched all-around standings over Philip Shields of Dillon, who is in contention for a Triple Crown. Shields, the only rough stock cowboy among the top nine, leads the saddle bronc standings and is fifth for bull riding.

Kevin Peterson, a former Nebraska college basketball player now living in Belgrade, is third in the all-around

standings, trailing Ayre by \$1,231. Peterson, the only three-event qualifier, is competing in steer wrestling, tie-down roping and team roping.

Ayre, Peterson and Orry Fruit, fourth in the all-around, were all teammates on the Montana State University rodeo team. Ayre leads Fruit by \$719 in tie-down roping and is second to Walt Anseth in steer wrestling by a scant \$179. Anseth won the NRA steer wrestling title in

Ayre competed primarily in tie-down roping and team roping for the Bobcats, adding steer wrestling after having knee surgery when his collegiate rodeo career was over.

"I hurt it my sophomore year," he said of his right knee. "I love to bulldog. Once I got the surgery done and was done with college rodeo, I started bulldogging

Ayre graduated from MSU with a degree in animal science.

He won tie-down roping titles at Poplar and East Helena during the summer and added the steer wrestling title at Scobey. He doubledipped, winning checks in two events, at Big Timber, Townsend, Twin Bridges and Boulder. At Boulder, Ayre was second in tiedown roping and second in team roping with his father. Bill Ayre won the NRA team roping yearend title in 1992.

"It was just the year I was hoping for," Ayre said. "It went real well, I was happy with that.

"I didn't really think about the all-around, maybe toward the end of the season. It kind of popped in my mind a little bit. It's just nice to be having a good year.

"I just want to go out nere and make some solid runs. I do that and I should be fine. I think I'm ready.

"I've never been in this position before. If I win something, that will make it all the better."

Giants top Nationals 3-2, return to NLCS

SAN FRANCISCO -The San Francisco Giants are on another October roll in their every-other-year pattern of postseason success.

Joe Panik scored the goahead run in the seventh inning on Aaron Barrett's bases-loaded wild pitch, and the Giants edged the Washington Nationals 3-2 Tuesday night to return to the NL Championship Series.

The wild-card Giants won 3-1 in the best-of-five Division Series by also scoring on a walk and a groundout. Hunter Pence turned in a defensive gem in right field that helped hold the Nationals at bay as San Francisco won for the 11th time in its last 12 postseason games.

"It's been a remarkable journey. I wouldn't trade it for the world," Pence said.

Santiago Casilla put the potential tying run aboard in the ninth on a two-out walk to Bryce Harper, then retired Wilson Ramos on a grounder to end it. Casilla was mobbed on the mound as fireworks shot off from the center-field scoreboard.

San Francisco travels to St. Louis for Game 1 on

Saturday. It's a rematch of the 2012 NLCS, when the Giants rallied from a 3-1 deficit to beat the Cardinals on the way to their second World Series championship in three

Harper splashed a tying home run into McCovey Cove in the seventh, but Washington's season ended with a third straight one-run defeat, including that excruciating 2-1 loss in 18 innings Saturday in Game 2.

The Nationals never got on track offensively, lacking the power that carried them to an NL East title and the best record in the league at 96-66.

NFL investigating Bills' laser pointer complaint

BUFFALO, N.Y. – The NFL is attempting to shed light on who allegedly shined a laser pointer at Buffalo Bills players at Detroit's Ford Field last weekend.

League spokesman Michael Signora said Tuesday the NFL is investigating the Bills' complaint and attempting to identify the person responsible. Quarterback Kyle Orton and holder Colton Schmidt said they had a laser directed at them during Buffalo's 17-14 win over the Lions on Sunday.

The league will share the results of its investigation with police, Signora said. All four North American major professional sports leagues bar the use of laser pointers at their facilities.

Fans caught using them can be ejected, are subject to being arrested and face the possibility of being banned from entering the facility for any future event.

Detroit police spokesman Sgt. Michael Woody said that in general. laser pointers and their use isn't illegal. Any criminal case, he said, would depend on how the pointer is used and whether it caused any damage.

Some Bills fans and others posting about the incident on social networks believe they identified the person responsible after sharing screen shots of tweets bragging about what happened. The Twitter account has been deactivated.

"Got Kyle Orton complained to the ref when I got him with the laser," one deleted tweet from the account @MarkoBeslach said, according to a cached version of the Twitter page hosted by Google. It was not immediately

clear whether the person who posted the tweet was involved in any way or used a real name. Public records searches did not immediately turn up records under the name Marko Beslach.

On Monday, fans began a campaign on Facebook to have the person linked to the account banned from attending NFL games. The campaign attracted nearly 2,000 likes as of Tuesday morning.

Schmidt said he had the laser pointed at him while holding on a 50-yard field goal attempt that Dan Carpenter banked off left upright in the third quarter. Carpenter responded to secure the win by hitting a 58-yard attempt with 4 seconds remaining.

DENVER - Matt Duchene gets approached all the time by curious NHL players who want the lowdown on his passionate coach.

They always ask the Colorado Avalanche forward the same thing, too: What's the story with Patrick Roy? Is he really that fiery? Is he difficult to play for?

"He's portrayed as this emotional, crazy (person)," Duchene said. "He couldn't be any more opposite."

At times, Roy is fiery. But he's also innovative and definitely in tune with his youthful team as he celebrates his 49th birthday this weekend.

The Avalanche tied a franchise record last season with 52 wins and returned to the postseason for the first time since 2010. And it wasn't with Roy barking orders in his first year behind the bench but by him simply telling them they were in this together.

They've bought in and now fully believe in the Hall of Fame goaltender nicknamed "Saint Patrick."

"He treats us with so much respect," Duchene said. "He practices what he preaches in terms of partnership. When he talks about that partnership, he's lived up to every word of that."

Want to make Roy grimace? Mention his coach of the year award. That was so last season and he's completely turned the page because there's another trophy he's got his eyes on, one that he hoisted four times in his playing career.

But what that postseason hiccup pointed out to Roy and teammate-turnedgeneral manager Joe Sakic, was that the team needed more veterans. So in came Brad Stuart, Daniel Briere and Jarome Iginla. Now this is Roy's kind of team - gritty, full of goal scorers, dependable defensemen and a goaltender in Semyon Varlamov who's one of the best in the league.

"We really like our lineup," Roy said.

So do the fans, who are filling the seats again. The city is buzzing about more than just the Broncos these days. Roy beams when he walks down the street or plays golf or sits at a restaurant and someone

says, "Go Avs."

"The fans just want to see that this team is going in the right direction," Roy

Iginla signed in Colorado for that very reason. Oh, and because of Roy.

As it turns out, Roy doesn't hold a grudge, either. About a dozen or so years ago, Iginla had the audacity to score on Roy. He can still see the look of fury on Roy's face.

"You felt like he didn't like you when you scored on him," Iginla said. "I liked that. He's extremely competitive. He's that way as a coach, too, right from day one. He's always thinking and always trying to be prepared and always trying get better."

Having gone against Roy in the postseason, Wild coach Mike Yeo can see the stamp he's put on the Avalanche.

"As much as anything else, it's a mentality," Yeo said. "It's an expectation that they're going to come to the rink and they're going to work. And they believe that they're going to win. I have a great deal of respect for him as far as the competitor that he was as a player, and, obviously, he's brought a lot of that as a coach, too."
