Lee fulfills childhood dream

Philipsburg native works his way to starting safety role in senior campaign

Jaxon Lee got two doses of fortunate timing in his junior season.

The Montana safety intercepted a pass against Northern Colorado and ran it back for a touchdown along the home sideline and into the north end zone. He later recovered a fumble and rumbled through the snow against Delaware in the playoffs for another touchdown in the same corner of the same end zone.

Those have been Lee's lone college touchdowns, and each time he got to run right past his grandfather, Pete Smith, who was sitting in the first row of a section near that end zone on the east side of the stadium. Being on the Griz sideline, he went over and shared a special moment with his grandfather.

"Come back running to the sideline and I can grab his hand right there, it's huge," Lee said ahead of Montana's game against Weber State at 1 p.m. on Saturday at Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

"It means the world because he gets all teary-eyed and everything. That's our relationship. It's what we've always looked forward to, and it's really cool that it's happening."

Smith played a role in helping Lee, a senior from Philipsburg, get to where he is as a first-year starter for Montana. He instilled in him a love for the Griz as they'd attend home games along with Lee's uncle, Chris Smith.

They had sat in those same seats where Lee celebrated with his grandfather nearly two decades later. Lee would go to those games wearing the No. 34 jersey of his favorite player — Chase Reynolds, another small-town star from

nearby Drummond — and painting a black Grizzly paw print on his face.

Those experiences with his grandfather helped lay the foundation for his journey.

"He's the biggest impact," Lee said. "I was just with him all the time. He was always bringing me to games. He just loved it too. So, really made a good relationship out of the two of us."

Smith, who is Lee's grandfather on his mother's side, has Anaconda roots. That's where Lee's mother grew up before moving after meeting Lee's father, an Ohio native who fell in love with Montana on a post-college hunting trip.

Lee had grown up early on in Belgrade, so he had been right there in Montana State country surrounded by many Bobcats fans, including friends who were Cats supporters. Smith made sure Lee stuck with him as a Griz diehard.

When Lee spent time at his grandfather's house, they'd watch Griz highlights and replays of the 1995 and 2001 national championship wins. He then was a part of the run to the 2023 title game and his grandfather followed along.

"When my parents went out of town, it was, 'You're going by grandpa's,'" Lee recalled. "I'd be like, 'Oh, yeah, I'm going to go hang out with grandpa and we'll watch football.' Our whole relationship is kind of built around football."

Lee had been attending those games around the same time he got into playing football himself. He had looked up to Reynolds and Marc Mariani, another small-town Montanan, from Havre, who went on to be an All-American. He dreamed himself of one day playing on that same field.

Lee also came up through the small-town ranks, playing for the Drummond-Philipsburg co-op football team. He helped lead the Titans to back-to-back state championships in his sophomore and junior seasons in 2017 and

2018 as he started to put himself on the NCAA Division I recruiting map.

Getting to play at Wa-Griz had been a goal since attending those games with his grandfather.

"I'd always tell him I've always wanted to play here, this is always my lifelong dream," Lee recalled. "My uncle Charlie, he'd be there too screaming at the refs. I'm 6 years old, I'm starting to cuss out the refs too. We're hanging over the rails, just so much fun."

Montana wasn't the first on the recruiting trail for Lee. That came from in-state rival Montana State in June following his junior season. The Bobcats were pushing hard after him and he thought he might end up in Bozeman.

He let then-UM offensive coordinator Timm Rosenbach know that the Cats had offered him. The Griz responded with a campus invite, extended an offer after Lee talked with running backs coach Justin Green and he committed by the end of that month.

Lee called his grandfather to tell him about his commitment but didn't make it immediately clear where he would be going.

"He's gonna be so bummed if he has to put on a Cat jersey," Lee recalled, "so when I called him one day and I told him, 'Grandpa, I just committed,' and he goes, 'Oh, I can do it,' and I was like, 'No, I just committed to the Grizzlies.'

"He was so ecstatic. He was just so pumped for me. It's what we've always talked about, so it was a really big deal for us."

Lee didn't get to play much defense early on during his first three years with the Griz.

Kaho adding linebacker depth

Senior joined Griz in winter after 4 years at San Diego State

Vai Kaho has made an early impact with the Montana football team.

The senior linebacker led the team in tackles through the first three games of the season. That came even as he has been playing in a new defense after he had transferred to UM in the off-season for his final year of college eligibility.

Kaho is now up to 29 tackles and three tackles for loss, both of which rank second on the team through five games. He also has one sack, which was the game-

sealing stop on fourth down to beat Missouri State in the season opener. All three of those stats are single-season career highs for him.

The native of Reno, Nevada, had spent the previous four seasons at San Diego State, an FBS team in the Mountain West Conference. He played in 41 games and started six times, five of which came in 2023 as he had a then-career-high 23 tackles. He totaled 37 tackles, three TFLs and 0.5 sacks at SDSU.

Kaho sat down with 406 MT Sports prior to Montana's game against Weber State at 1 p.m. on Saturday in Washington-Grizzly Stadium. This interview has been edited for clarity and brevity.

Q: Obviously you transferred in from San Diego State, but how did

you originally end up at SDSU?

A: "Out of the offers I had out of high school, that was a school that I felt could give me the most of what I was looking for, which is just a great team and winning, winning culture at the time. That's kind of how I ended up there. It was a good fit for me."

Q: How did your time playing there end up going for you?

A: "It went well. I'd say I definitely had to learn a lot. I had a lot of growing pains there. But it was a good thing for me. Met a lot of my lifelong friends there."

Q: What were those growing pains?

A: "It was really just getting used to the playbook. We do a lot of similar things here. But it was just really getting used to the coaching style too."

Q: Why did you decide to go into the transfer portal for your final year?

A: "My coaches who had recruited me, they kind of resigned and they left from there. My last year of eligibility is this year, so I just didn't want to have a year figuring it out for my last year. I just wanted to put some good stuff on tape and come to a team that wins."

Q: How did the recruiting with Montana go and why did you choose them?

A: "They had a great run last year. I was watching it as I was getting recruited and they were just winning. That's something that's important to me, and

I just wanted to contribute to that. I saw they were winning a lot of games. And then coming here, man, the culture is definitely a big shock, man. I love the guys here. Everybody's for the team, man, so that's what I'd say kind of hooked me."

Q: How did playing in a 3-3-5 defense at SDSU help you transition to UM?

A: "It is pretty similar. They ran a 3-3-5 there too, so it was a lot of similar scheme, just different vocabulary, but I just had to learn and my teammates and my coaches helped me slow the game down definitely. So, it's been a good transition."

Q: You've already put

up some single-season career highs, so how do you feel the season has been going for you?

A: "Blessed. I give all the glory to God, man. I wouldn't be here without him. I'm just thankful that I kept being persistent in what I did. It's just a credit to my coaches, a credit to my teammates putting me in the right position to make the plays and it's just out there for me to make them."

One aspect of college football you'll never hear much about is physical conditioning.

The assumption is all athletes competing in college — whether it be in football, basketball, tennis or whatever — are in terrific shape. But some teams and athletes are in better shape than others.

Take, for example, Montana's most recent home football game against then-24th-ranked Western Carolina. The Catamounts are a talented group and they showed just how good they can be by racing to a 17-0 lead over the Grizzlies at elevation at jam-packed Washington-Grizzly Stadium.

Then something happened as the second quarter progressed. Western Carolina's defense became visibly tired.

Some of that may have been a lack of depth and some may have been playing against an explosive offense at 3,100 feet. But there's no doubt conditioning played at least a small role in what happened when UM outscored WCU 32-8 over the last 31 minutes on the way to an 11-point win.

The Grizzlies take a great deal of pride in their offseason conditioning program. It's anyone's guess how much that conditioning pays off during the season, but it's worth

noting Montana was 2-0 in overtime games last season and 6-0 in games decided by eight points or less. And this season, the Grizzlies are 2-1 in games decided by eight points or less.

Whether fitness level plays a role Saturday in Missoula — it may not be much of a factor since Weber State plays home games at 4,300 feet — Montana's game against the Wildcats could be a good one. Weber is 1-2 in road games and lost at home to McNeese last Saturday, 28-26. But the Wildcats are 1-0 in Big Sky play and have beaten UM in two of their

last three meetings.

Here's a look Saturday's Big Sky Conference games:

Weber State (1-0, 2-3) at Montana (1-0, 4-1), 1 p.m. TV: Scripps Sports.

The Grizzlies have won their last 14 games at Washington-Grizzly Stadium. They showed in last Saturday's 52-49 win at Eastern Washington there's still a lot of work to be done on the defensive end, but the offense was impressive with Logan Fife at quarterback. Weber was bested by a former Grizzly quarterback last week, McNeese's Clifton McDowell, and my hunch is the Wildcats' defense will be overwhelmed again this week by the current Montana QB — whether it be Fife or Keali'i Ah Yat — in front of an impressive crowd at Washington-Grizzly Stadium. **Speltz:** Montana 34, Weber State 24. **Gogola:** Montana 45, Weber State 21. **Flores:** Griz 34, Weber 24.

Northern Colorado (0-1, 0-5) at Montana State (1-0, 5-0), 2 p.m.

TV: Scripps Sports and ESPN+. This is the easiest pick of the week, mostly because the Bears are really struggling. Last week they lost on their home turf to Cal Poly, 28-7. They have been outscored 166-60 this season. Montana State was not particularly impressive in its win at Idaho State, 37-17, but the Bobcats have some injury issues on their offensive line and that has made their dominant ground game a little less intimidating. The Aggies had a monster win over then-fourth-ranked Idaho last weekend, 28-26. It marked the first victory in Davis program history over a top-5 ranked opponent. The Aggies are that sleeper few expect to win the conference title, partially because Montana State and Montana loom so large. Davis had a close call at Southern Utah three weeks ago, winning 24-21, and that left me wondering if the Aggies were even playoff material. They have played better since then and own the second-longest win streak (four games) in the conference behind Montana State (five games). He suited up in all 15 games on defense as a junior at UM and started once. He's started all five games so far this season. Even when the times were tough over the years, his grandfather offered his support more than anything.

"He just tells me to keep my

chin up, keep being me and I'm his favorite player even if I'm never seeing the field," Lee said. "That's kind of how grandpa is. He knows that my dream was to play for the Grizzlies and he'll be there 100% of the way."

Smith is there again this year cheering on his grandson. Lee still looks up to spot him in those same seats.

Whether he's scoring defensive touchdowns or making any sort of play for their mutual favorite team, he's doing so with his biggest fan right there.

"It means the world," he said. "I'm so glad that he's been able to stick around this long. Grandparents get old, and I'm in college, and I'm so thankful to have my grandparents still. It's just awesome that he gets to be there with me. It'd be really different if he wasn't."

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
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
