Mora Vasaloppet skiers find happy trails

While activities surrounding this year's Vasaloppet may have been subdued, the enthusiasm of ski racers and volunteers was unrestrained. Overall the event upheld a spirit of sportsmanship, camaraderie and perseverance.

SAME, BUT DIFFERENT

The Vasaloppet USA board made many adjustments to this year's races to drastically reduce crowds and spread skiers apart. Rather than the Vasaloppet's four main races (the Vasa, Dala, Classic and Bell Ringer)

occurring on Saturday, the races were spread out over two days: The Vasa and Dala on Saturday, Feb. 20; the Classic and Bell Ringer on Sunday, Feb. 21.

Mass starts downtown turned into constant trickles of skiers, and satellite events like awards ceremonies, dinners, entertainment and the warming/celebration tent were eliminated.

The absence of mass starts and the addition of socially distant skier "corrals" was different and held an unfamiliar vibe. However, activity on the ski trails felt very familiar—and friendly. Hot blueberry soup and other drinks served by happy volunteers

were a welcome sight to many.

WINNING STREAK

One thing that certainly didn't change was the winning streak of Matt Liebsch. This was his 12th consecutive win of the Vasaloppet's longest race and the most consecutive race wins in Vasaloppet USA history.

At 37 years old, Liebsch finished the Vasa 47K freestyle race in 1:54:09.5.

That win did not come easy. In some years, Liebsch could be seen almost sauntering across the finish line, with the second place finisher far behind. This year, the top three male finishers were on each others' heels the entire race, ending in a

sprint down the final stretch through downtown Mora.

World Cup skier Ian Torchia of Rochester finished one tenth of a second behind Liebsch, followed by Olympic skier Brian Gregg, of Minneapolis. Gregg competed at the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia.

The race could have been different. There were several misfortunes along the way (a broken ski pole, a tumble) that could have been used as opportunities for the others to break away and widen their leads. But that's not very sportsmanlike, said the trio.

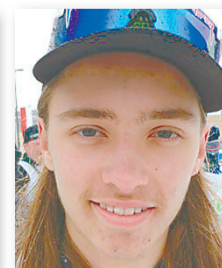

City maintains power through pole replacement project

The temperature was about 10 degrees Fahrenheit as work crews drilled holes in the mucky wetland areas of Mora Lake along Highway 65. The holes are being drilled in order to replace electric transmission poles that supply Mora's power. This work is easier for crews to accomplish in the winter when the lake is frozen.

Deteriorating electric poles along Highway 65 near Mora Lake are being replaced this week, with only slight disruptions in traffic as workers erect poles and move lines.

Mora City Administrator and Public Utilities General Manager, Lindy Crawford, said the work should not disrupt electric service to the Mora community. The project should be completed the first week of March.

Two types of lines are being effected by the project: A transmission line and a distribution line. Mora receives its electricity from the Southern Minnesota Municipal Power Agency through a single transmission line that runs along Highway 65. SMMPA owns this transmission line and the poles and is responsible for their maintenance. Power is then distributed throughout the community on distribution lines owned by the city of Mora.

The poles carrying both the transmission and distribution line are in need of replacement. Crawford said that to expedite work on the transmission line, the city decided to move their distribution line off the poles and run it underground. She said running distribution lines underground can protect the lines from damage from squirrels or falling trees in storms and also hides the lines making the view more aesthetically pleasing.

THE DETAILS

Infrastructure of two types of electric lines are being worked on along Hwy. 65 near Mora Lake:

1. Transmission Line
The transmission line is responsible for supplying most of Mora's electricity.

The line and poles are owned by SMMPA. The poles are being replaced and paid for by SMMPA. Cost: \$375,000

2. Distribution Line
A distribution line owned by the city/Mora Municipal Utilities is responsible for distributing power throughout the community.

MMU relocated this distribution line from the poles and converted it to underground. Cost: \$156,000

Crawford said that overall, the project should make Mora's power supply more resilient, and was grateful for the city's own power generating capabilities.

"With only one transmission line serving Mora, having local generation run by MMU is critical to maintaining reliable electric service," she explained.

"When the transmission poles are being replaced, there will be a couple of times that power on the line will have to be turned off. At those times the local MMU generators will be serving power to the community.

"Also, replacing the deteriorating transmission poles on a preplanned basis will avoid potential power outages that could have occurred if the poles failed and having them replaced will allow SMMPA and MMU to continue to provide reliable service to the community."

The project was timed to take place when Mora Lake was frozen, making it easier to access the poles. While weather has not delayed the project, Crawford said pandemic-related delays in acquiring materials did affect when MMU could bury their distribution line.

Suicide Prevention Training for Ag Communities

University of Minnesota Extension, in partnership with NAMI Minnesota will be offering a monthly suicide prevention program for agricultural and rural communities.

QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) is a 90-minute, evidence-based training that teaches the three steps anyone can take to help prevent suicide. Just like CPR,

QPR is an emergency response to someone in crisis and can save lives. QPR is the most widely taught gatekeeper training program in the United States, and more than one million adults have been trained.

It has been one year since the first Minnesotan was diagnosed with COVID-19. We've all been going through life on hard mode ever since.

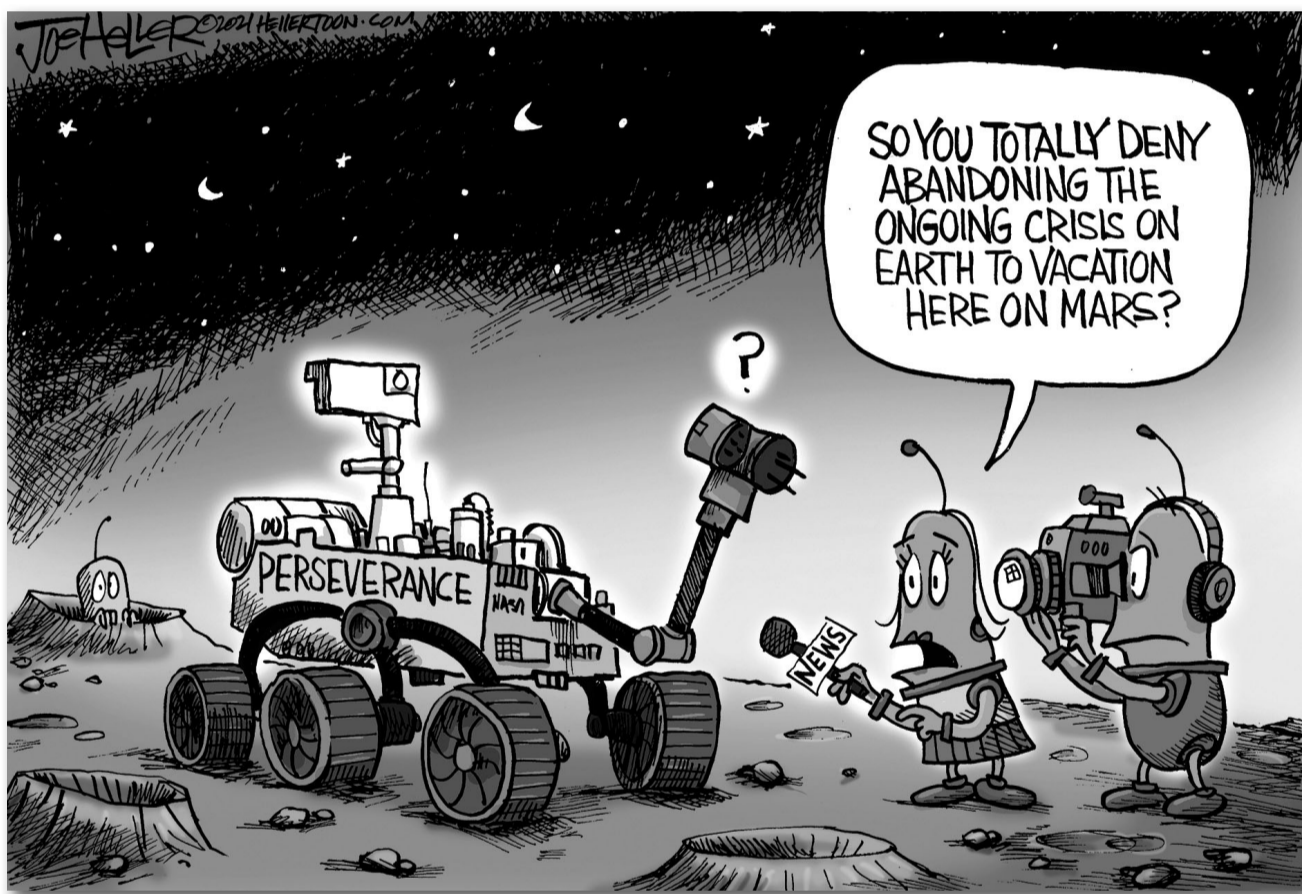

125 YEARS AGO (1896)

The pleasant spring weather of this week makes those whose work confines them indoors envious of the out of door laborer.

Andrew and Ole Skoglund of Brunswick were in the village Saturday on business concerning the telephone line between Mora and that place. The office at this end will be located at Hans Peterson's store.

D. R. Eaton arrived in Mora Monday from Nova Scotia and took charge of his store. A large stock of new goods both in groceries and dry goods has been ordered. Mr. Eaton will move his family to Mora as soon as satisfactory apartments can be secured.

There is need of a highway between Hinckley and Brook Park and our town authorities should confer with the board at Brook Park as to best location and most feasible route, and push the work along. How can we expect settlers to locate near us if there are no roads by which to get somewhere near their land.

The Conger House runs a free bus for its patrons to and from all passenger trains. Will call for or deliver passengers to any or all parts of the village for the sum of ten cents. Leave orders at the hotel.

100 YEARS AGO (1921)

The Firemen's Ball, given at the American theatre under the auspices of the Mora Fire Department, last Tuesday night, proved to be a marked success being one of the leading events of the season.

A large crowd was in attendance in spite of the bad roads. A sum of 32.25 remained over and above all expenses.

Music was furnished by the 5-piece Mora Orchestra, and supper was served at the Ideal Confectionery. Everyone in attendance reported a fine time.

The Mora high school basketball team met the Princeton high school team on the local floor Monday evening and were victorious again, they having defeated Princeton before this year. The score was 27--17. The game

was distinguished throughout by fast playing on both sides. Serline for Mora made a total of 17 points alone, making nine free throws, out of ten, and three field baskets. Fennessey made four field baskets and McClelland 1, bringing Mora's total up to 27.

For Princeton, Nygren scored 1 field basket and three free throws; Gengalle-gan is credited with 2 field baskets and Marks 4 field goals, bringing their total up to 17.

75 YEARS AGO (1946)

The Mora school board has issued a ten page pamphlet in which the need for an enlargement of the present school building is discussed. The pamphlet is being distributed to the taxpayers of the district.

The front ground floor of the addition would contain an enlarged auditorium with showers and dressing rooms. The addition would be set back from the front of the existing building to afford light for that structure.

The American Legion Auxiliary entertained forty-nine mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of veterans of World Wars I and II at their guest meeting, which was held Wednesday evening, Feb. 20, at the library. Five gold star

mothers attended the meeting, namely, Mrs. Andrew Skoglund, World War I, and Mrs. Hannah McCallum, Mrs. Bert Tinker, Mrs. Glenn Goldsmith and Mrs. Mallory, World War II.

Mrs. Blaine Barker, district president, and Mrs. M. I. Burnsten, district secretary, both of Cambridge, were present. Mrs. Barker gave an interesting review of the Auxiliary program for 1946. Plans were made to make utility bags for the boys at the Fort Snelling hospital and bibs and wash clothes for disabled veterans at the St. Cloud hospital. The Tenth district has agreed to keep the cookie jar at Fort Snelling hospital filled for the month of June. The local unit will co-operate this project. The local unit has already ordered poppies for the annual sale on the Saturday before Memorial day. Poppies for sale in Minnesota are made by our own disabled veterans in the Minnesota poppy work room.

50 YEARS AGO (1971)

Despite the big storm of last Friday and rather foul weather, Mora Lions served over 600 persons at the high school cafeteria last Friday night--the occasion being the annual pancake and sausage supper.

Forty-five Lions donned aprons and chef hats for the dinner which started at 5:00 p.m. and ended three hours later. It was a busy gang Friday with much advance preparation and then the actual cooking of the meal. The supply of sausage ran a little low at one time, but the Globe Market came through, so no one went away hungry.

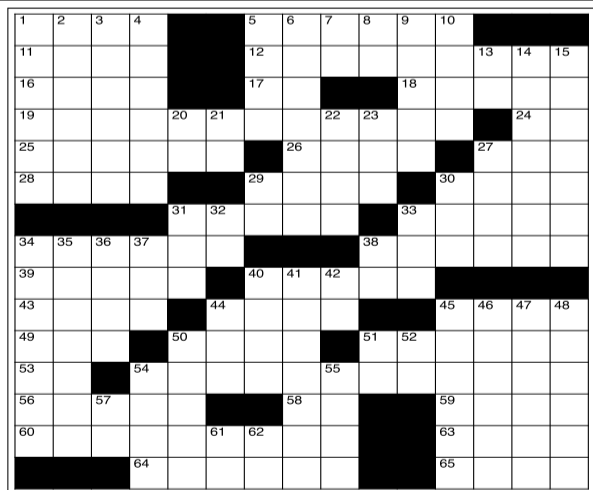

New tools arm Mora first responders for grain bin accidents

Mora firefighters have a new tool with the potential to save lives, thanks to a donation from the Kanabec/Isanti Farm Bureau, Barnick Agency and Olen Farms.

Area farmers Chad Barnick and Bill Olen presented the Mora Area Fire Department with a grain bin rescue kit, giving them specialized tools to respond to a unique farm danger.

Grain bins can be dangerous because grain can act like quick sand — a person who steps or falls into the grain can become trapped and are unable to free themselves, or can become completely engulfed and suffocate.

Grain entrapment, or grain engulfment is particularly difficult for the rescuers who also risk entrapment.

In 2010, Minnesota was second only to Illinois in the number of deaths and nonfatal grain entrapment incidents, according to Purdue University.

The safety kit given to the MAFD was the Great Wall of Rescue and auger.

The Great Wall of Rescue works by inserting panels in a circle around the entrapped person, creating a barrier around the victim. A special auger is used to remove grain from inside the tube, while the barrier prevents more grain from filling in. Eventually, enough grain is removed to free the victim.

The Kanabec/Isanti Farm Bureau began their search for grain bin rescue tools after discussions about farm safety with the MAFD in 2019. The groups researched different options and underwent training by the Central Lakes

College before choosing the Great Wall of Rescue.

Grain Bin Safety Week is Feb. 21-27, and draws awareness to just one of the dangers that face farmers in their

work. According to the Minnesota Department of Agriculture, a farmer is 800 percent more likely to die while working than people in other jobs. The leading cause of death is tractor roll-

overs. Other health and safety hazards on the farm include grain bins and silos, manure pits, toxic gases, chemicals and pesticides, livestock handling, skid loaders and others.

Suspect killed, K9 wounded in officer-involved shooting

A high-speed police chase that started in Blaine and ended just south of Braham concluded with shots being fired by both the suspect and law enforcement, resulting in an Anoka K-9 officer being wounded and one of the two suspects being declared dead at the scene. Another officer, from an unknown agency, was hospitalized due to injuries associated with the initial incident in Blaine.

According to a press release from the Isanti County Sheriff's Office, at 12:58 p.m. on Sunday, Feb. 21, officers with the Blaine Police Department responded to a theft call at the cluster of stores located on Baltimore Street NE. Upon arrival, the suspects allegedly stole one vehicle and then carjacked another at gun point after the first vehicle was

disabled by law enforcement.

The suspects drove onto Highway 65, and at that point, a high-speed pursuit commenced. This pursuit continued north on Highway 65 through Anoka and Isanti County, with speeds eclipsing 100 miles-per-hour before the suspects' vehicle was disabled in the median of the Highway 65/Highway 107 intersection, whereupon the suspects fled on foot and shots were fired, striking an Anoka Police Department K-9 named Bravo.

Officers first on the scene responded by firing their weapon(s), striking and killing one of the suspects. The other suspect was apprehended without further incident.

As of Monday evening, Feb. 22, the Anoka Police Department reported a bullet had nicked Bravo's trachea and went through his shoulder, however doctors determined intubation during surgery

might cause further damage, so they decided not to perform surgery and let the wounds heal on their own, and he had been released from the University of Minnesota Veterinary Medical Center and was recovering at home.

According to a Facebook post by Bravo's handler, Officer Jake Sorteberg, Bravo also has a spinal fracture and soft tissue wounds in the shoulder. Sorteberg said Bravo was already able to eat some food. It is unknown, however, if he would be able to recover enough to resume his duties.

According to the Isanti County Sheriff's Office press release, the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension is conducting an investigation into the shooting, with the Isanti County Sheriff's Office co-investigating the shooting portion with the BCA since the officer-involved

shooting took place in Isanti County and none of Isanti County's officers were physically involved. Isanti County Sheriff Caulk said while Isanti County was called to assist in the pursuit, none of his officers were able to reach the scene until after the suspects were taken into custody.

According to Isanti County Attorney Jeff Edblad, once the BCA's investigation is completed, it will be up to his office to determine if any charges will be made against any of the officers.

Agencies involved include the Blaine, Anoka, Coon Rapids, Spring Lake Park, Braham, and Isanti Police Departments; Anoka and Isanti County Sheriff's Office; Minnesota State Patrol; along with the Braham Fire Department.

Prevent ice dams and save energy

Ice dams are an unpleasant part of winter for many Minnesota homeowners.

The Minnesota Department of Commerce offers tips for how to deal with ice dams now and how to prevent them in the future, which can also save you money on your heating bills.

One way to prevent ice dams is by removing snow from your roof. While you can try to do it yourself with a snow rake, it may be best to hire a professional snow remover, especially if it takes getting on the roof or using a ladder. Put safety first.

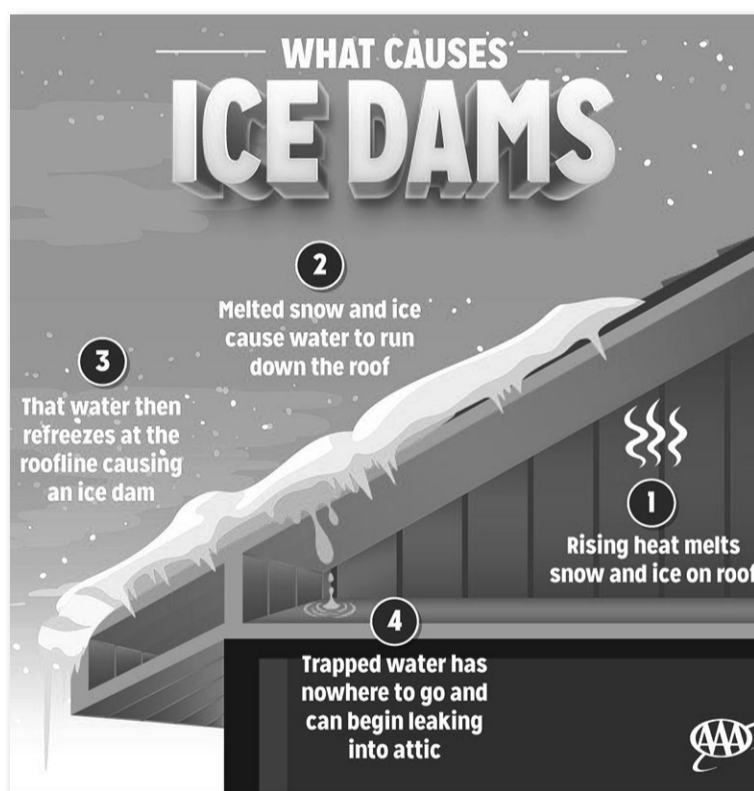
If you have an ice dam that is already causing water damage to your interior ceilings and walls, hire a professional ice dam removal service that uses steamers.

A FEW THINGS YOU SHOULD NOT DO

Do not install heating cables. They will shorten the life of your roof and add to your energy costs.

Do not remove ice with chippers, chemicals or heat. These can damage shingles, gutters and other building components.

Do not add roof vents, including powered vents. They will not eliminate ice dams and often make the problem worse.

PREVENTING FUTURE ICE DAMS

Ice dams are not caused by roofing, ventilation or gutter problems, as often believed. The real problem is a home that is leaking warm air.

Due to inadequate air sealing, heat from the home's interior gets into the attic and melts the underside of the snow on the roof. The melted snow water flows down the roof surface until reaching a cold spot, such as the eaves or

soffit, where it forms a frozen dam.

Over time, especially with a snow-covered roof in sub-freezing temperatures, more ice can build up. Eventually, water starts seeping into the home.

Because the primary cause of ice dams is warm air leaking from the attic, the best prevention is to seal leaks with caulking or expanding spray foam, with attic insula-

tion installed to a minimum of R-50 as space allows.

SAVE ENERGY AND PREVENT ICE DAMS

An advanced home energy assessment, or audit, is an important step to preventing ice dams and making your home more energy efficient. The assessment will use equipment such as an infrared camera to find attic air leaks and how to seal them.

A home energy audit can be arranged through your local utility, a nonprofit energy group or an HVAC professional.

Once problem areas are detected, get bids from at least two licensed contractors to have the work done.

For more information on preventing ice dams, sealing air leaks and adding insulation, check out the Commerce Department's Home Energy Guide.

At one point, Gregg accidentally stepped on Torchia's pole, breaking off the basket.

Mora ski coach Chip Gerdin was ready along the trail with an armful of poles for skiers in trouble. As Gerdin swapped poles with Torchia, the other races eased their pace so Torchia could catch up.

"These guys waited up for me," said Torchia.

Liebsch corrected him, "I don't know if it was waiting - we got a break."

Gregg said it's just a part of good sportsmanship. "There's respect in the race. You don't want to attack."

LIFELONG LOVE

By starting at a young age, and through the support of parents, many of the Vasaloppet's skiers say they have a lifelong love of skiing and a special fondness for Mora.

Josie Nelson, first female finisher of the 41K Classic race, is known among race organizers as perhaps one of the most thankful and joyful-spirited of skiers.

"I just about started crying, because I was thinking back to 1995 when my high school coach brought us up here," recalled Nelson.

"I just think about all the coaches that invest in the kids, and I love it. I remember my mom cheering out in the cold for me, the Kranskullas and King Vasa—I just think the people make this race so special."

Her best tip for first time skiers: "Keep at it. It's something you can improve at your whole life. I think it's something everyone can enjoy and it's just the best sport there is."

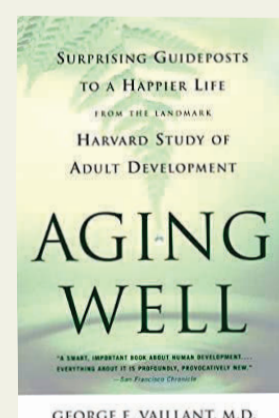

CONSERVATION OPERATIONS Feb. 16, 2021

The following Minnesota Department of Natural Resources conservation officer weekly reports explain the activities performed by Division of Enforcement personnel in protecting Minnesota's natural resources through effective law enforcement and education. Provided by the MN DNR on Feb. 16, 2021.

Milaca: Conservation Officer Nathan Benkofske reports checking anglers, area lakes and patrolling snowmobile trails. Enforcement action was taken for extra lines, angling without a license and possessing an overlimit of crappies. Safety class awards were also distributed to local volunteer instructors.

Pine City: Conservation Officer Ben Karon spent time checking anglers this past week. He also patrolled for snowmobile activity. Time was also spent working on Mille Lacs Lake. Success overall was low. DWI training was completed.

Hinckley: Conservation Officer Bret Grundmeier found a limited amount of outdoor activity with temperatures down to 30 below zero throughout the past week. A call was taken about a deer that went through the ice and was unable to climb back out. Prior to officers arriving, the reporting party was able to rescue the deer by utilizing a canoe, roof rake and rope. Credit goes out to the husband and wife who used the canoe to get close to the edge of the ice and then used a roof rake to dangle a rope around the deer. The deer was pulled to shore and ran off.

Mora: Conservation Officer Mike Krauel spent the past week checking anglers and patrolling for snowmobile activity. Krauel also started documenting shelters for the upcoming shelter removal deadline and worked on equipment maintenance.

Cambridge: Conservation Officer Angela Londgren assisted with youth snowmobile safety classes, checked anglers and snowmobilers and took calls about injured animals. Please remember to pick up your trash when you are leaving the lake. There have been several complaints of large amounts of trash being left behind.

Crêpes are sweet or savory treats

Crêpe is the French word for “pancake.” Crêpes are delicate, batter-based and savory or sweet creations that can be eaten at various times of the day. Crêpes may be enjoyed at breakfast filled with fresh berries, or as a dessert bursting with a luscious cream.

While French crêpes are widely known, various cultures have their own variation of this super-thin pancake, including the Bavarian region of Germany. Palatschinken and Pfannkuchen are German/Austrian crêpe varieties. German and Austrian crêpes are slightly thicker than French ones, but not nearly as thick as American pancakes. Enjoy this recipe for “Palatschinken (Crêpes),” courtesy of Little Vienna, an online recipe blog.

PALATSCHINKEN (CRÊPES)

Yields 5

Ingredients:

2 large eggs
1 cup milk
1 cup all purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon fine salt
1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract (optional, omit for savory fillings)
Butter, ghee or neutral tasting oil for coating the pan
Apricot jam for the filling
Confectioner's sugar for dusting

Directions:

Whisk the eggs using a hand whisk in a medium bowl until lightly beaten. Add salt, vanilla extract (if used) and about 1/3 cup (80 ml) of the milk (just eyeball) and stir until combined.

Add flour and whisk until you get a smooth batter. The batter should be thick and tough so you can

barely whisk it. Add a little of the remaining milk if it is too hard to stir. Lumps have no chance in thick batters.

Gradually add in the remaining milk while whisking.

Heat an 8-inch (or larger) nonstick pan over medium heat. Add 1/2 teaspoon butter (or oil) and spread it carefully with a spatula to coat the bottom of the pan evenly. This is important; otherwise, the butter will disturb you when swirling the pan for distributing the batter.

Pour 1/3 cup batter (for an 8-inch pan, more for larger pans) into the center of the pan and swirl to spread evenly. Once the bottom side is golden in color, flip it with a spatula and cook the other side

for about 15 seconds. Invert onto a plate — the browned side should touch the plate, you should see the pale side. This way the nice-looking side will be outside when you roll it.

Repeat with the remaining batter, adding 1/2 teaspoon of butter/oil for every crêpe. If the batter thickens over time, add a little milk. You can keep the ready ones warm on a plate in the oven at low temperature.

Spread each Palatschinken with Apricot jam (or other filling) and roll it from one side to the other. Dust the Palatschinken with confectioner's sugar and serve with a fork and spoon (the spoon serves as a knife).

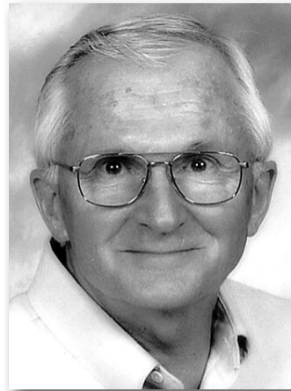


Larry R. Sharratt

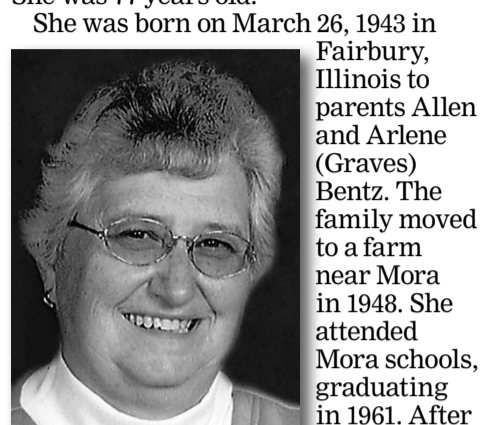

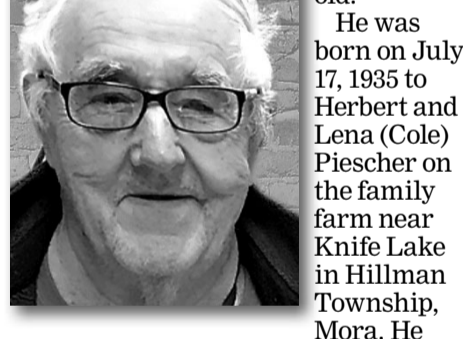

§50.24 DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS (B) (1) If any bill is not paid by the due date listed on the bill, a second bill will be mailed by first class mail and shall state that if payment is not made within ten (10) days of the mailing of the second bill, water or electric service to the premises may be shut off for nonpayment.

§50.24 DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS (B) (5) If a customer fails to pay and fails to request a hearing under this part, service may be shut off at the time specified in the notice.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall become effective upon its passage and publication.
