Prairie restoration pays off for Quamba farmers

How did a desire to hunt a few ground birds turn into an organic farm that produces honey, maple syrup, fruits, vegetables and an award-winning hard cider now sold throughout the Midwest?

It was the wildflowers. Debbie and Jim Morrison already had a home and careers in the metro area. Outdoors people at heart, in 1997 they purchased a 170 acre parcel of land near Quamba that included woodlands, wetlands and some hayfields.

Interested in hunting the land, the couple began re-

searching how they could use their land to support more game.

"We recognized there was a lot of habitat lost," said Debbie. "We both like hunting and fishing and all that. We could see how lakes were becoming impaired. We're both bird freaks, too, and bird populations were declining ... We could see what was happening and had this land. We thought, let's use it to

help little critters survive."

With the help of the University of Minnesota Extension office, the Morrises restored the hayfields into native prairie by burning then planting new grasses and wildflowers.

As the new plantings took hold, Debbie noticed the benefits immediately.

"I thought, 'wow, look at all these beautiful flowers. If I were a honey bee, I would want to live here.' That's how I got into beekeeping."

What follows was a domino effect of trying new things and saying "yes" to profitable opportunities.

After missed season, spring sports are back

After missing out on their entire 2020 spring season, high school athletes are glad to be back in competitions while coaches hope they can keep coronavirus disruptions at bay.

New COVID-19 cases and exposures meant coronavirus-related quarantines caused havoc for winter sports teams in the late season. Some teams dropped out, others elected not to play against certain schools for fear of exposure and a Mora Nordic skier even missed competing at the state meet.

The spring coaches are doing what they can to convey the importance of staying healthy and its impact on the team but are stopping short of encouraging vaccinations.

COVID-19 vaccines were not available to youth during the winter sports season; that has since changed.

In Minnesota, all persons age 16 and older are now eligible for vaccinations. In the Kanabec County area, wait lists for vaccination are short, making the shot accessible.

Mora baseball Head Coach Jayson Pautzke said coaching staff has informed players of the importance to the team of keeping players healthy, and have mentioned vaccination as an option, "but, I'm not going to push that on anyone—it's their personal choice."

Overall, Pautzke was hopeful

spring sports would be less affected by coronavirus because they are played outside.

Mora Public Schools Athletic Director Kris Osterdyk said she felt it was a little too soon for sports teams to see impacts of vaccination efforts; fall activities will likely have greater impacts as more people have had the opportunity to be vaccinated.

Following guidelines about mask wearing and social distancing until that time is the tricky bit.

Cambridge: Conservation Officer Angela Londgren took complaints of nuisance and injured animals, and assisted with wetland and public waters violations. Bear sightings are common this time of year. A reminder to remove bird feeders and other food sources if bears are seen on your property. If you don't, they will likely continue to return.





Tenth Judicial District hosting free virtual clinics on April 30

The Tenth Judicial District is hosting free virtual clinics on Friday, April 30 to provide free legal advice in the areas of family law, civil/probate law and expungement. There will also be a criminal expungement presentation by Zoom at 10:30 a.m.

Volunteer attorneys will be available for free one-on-one consultations either by Zoom or by phone from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Each appointment will be approximately 30 minutes. Appointments are required. To schedule an appointment or attend the criminal expungement presentation, contact the Tenth District Self-Help Center at (763) 760-6699.

Individuals who do not have access to technology to participate in the virtual clinics may check with their local law libraries, as tablets may be available for their use.

The virtual clinics event is being conducted in partnership with the Anoka County Law Library, the Washington County Law Library, the Wright County Law Library, Central MN Legal Services, Judicare of Anoka County, Legal Aid Service of Northeastern Minnesota, the Anoka County Bar Association, the Washington County Bar Association and Estate and Elder Law Services.

The event is scheduled to coincide with Law Day, a national day set aside to celebrate the rule of law. Law Day underscores how law and the legal process have contributed to the freedoms that all Americans share. Law Day was first established in 1958 through a proclamation by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. Congress passed a joint resolution designating May 1 as Law Day, U.S.A., in 1961.

90 Site Camp Ground Health & Safety Big Issues

This past week, approximately 100 Fish Lake property owners banded together at the Arthur Township Planning Commission meeting to express their outrage. The planning commission considered, and then denied a business plan proposed by Eric Canfield, a developer from Maple Grove, Mn. Included in the plan was a 90 site RV park to be built at the intersection of MN Hwy. 65 and the Fish Lake Road. The plan did not meet local ordinances and would have caused a dramatic increase in health and safety issues for the neighborhood.

Proposed roads were substandard, and would not have been built to Kanabec County specs. They would have been "minimum maintenance" roads which are difficult to maintain. No thought was given to: emergency vehicle access, road dedication and maintenance.

Safety was a big concern. The MN Hwy. 65 intersection with the Fish Lake Road is already dangerous, and another 90 camp sites would make it one of the most dangerous places in Kanabec County. A DOT traffic light would be needed. Turn lanes and by-pass lanes are needed on both Hwy. 65 and the Fish Lake Road. Fish Lake residents know that our road is used by children, bikers, joggers, walkers and off-road vehicles now. What would adding 100+ people, family cars, pickups, family pets, more 4 wheelers, add to the confusion? Neighbors said, NO Way!! The Planning commission agreed.

Community Health? It's a rural site. No city water and sewer. Lots of complications. How many wells would be needed? How many country septic systems? What would these wells and septic systems do the existing eco-system? No room for sanitary systems and required "alternate sites." The Canfield property is home to nesting water fowl and up-land game of all kinds. A portion of the property is a wetlands area. Cattails!

Who would make sure campers were following the rules? This was a recipe for neighborhood disaster. On the other hand, I get it. Canfield owns this property, and he wants to make some money from it. Why not build a house or two on the property? The community needs housing. Anyone who thought this was a good idea, please check your information. The Arthur Town Board is meeting to further discuss this matter at 5 p.m. on Monday, April 26. Raise your voice. Come, help maintain our "small town" quality of life. See you there.

Residents of Pine and Kanabec counties may email or call Welia Health to be added to their waiting list.

- Email: COVID@welia.org and include full name, date of birth, preferred contact information (phone or email) and county of residence. Also state whether you are or have been a Welia Health patient in the past three years.
- Call: Kanabec County residents call 320-679-6417. Pine County residents call 320-591-1690. Leave a message stating full name, date of birth and preferred contact information (phone or email).

VACCINE FOR VETERANS

Arthur says no to RV park

To the editor,

This past week, over 100 Fish Lake property owners banded together at the Arthur Township Planning Commission meeting to express their outrage. The planning commission considered, and then denied a business plan proposed by Eric Canfield, a developer from Maple Grove. Included in the plan was a 90 site RV park to be built at the intersection of MN Hwy 65 and the Fish Lake Road. The plan did not meet local ordinances and would have caused a dramatic increase in health and safety issues for the neighborhood.

From the beginning, the developer appeared to gloss over the safety concerns, and talked about how his family came from Kanabec County. This was all nice, but no one was fooled.

Proposed roads in the camp site were substandard, and would not have been built to Kanabec County specs. They would have been little more than "minimum maintenance" roads which were difficult to maintain. There was no consideration for emergency vehicles, and future road dedication and maintenance would have been a mess.

Safety was a big concern. The MN Hwy 65 intersection with the Fish Lake Road is already dangerous, and another 90 camp sites would make it one of the most dangerous places in Kanabec County.

Fish Lake residents are well aware that our road is used by children, bikers, joggers, walkers and off-road vehicles now. What would adding 100+ people, family cars, pickups, family pets, more four wheelers, add to the confusion? Neighbors said, "No way!!" The planning commission agreed. Thank you.

Since the proposed site is rural, there is no city water and sewer available. This complicates the proposed plan even further. How many wells would be needed? How many country septic systems would need to be built. What would these wells and septic systems do to the existing eco-system? There is no room for sanitary systems and the required "alternate sites." The Canfield property is home to nesting water fowl and up-land game of all kinds. A portion of the property is a wetlands area. Cattails.

Who would make sure campers were following the rules? This was a recipe for neighborhood disaster. On the other hand, I get it. Canfield owns this property, and he wants to make some money from it. Just not this. Why not build a house or two on the property? Mora desper-

ately needs some houses.

It is refreshing to see that local elected/ appointed officials still listen to the people. Politics is not all bad. Only in America. Right?

APPLY: Federal funds boost food, shelter programs

Kanabec County's emergency food and shelter programs are getting a cash boost.

Kanabec County has been awarded Federal Funds made available through the Department of Homeland Security/Federal Emergency Management Agency under the Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program for Phase 36.

Kanabec County has been chosen to receive \$8,616 or Phase 38 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county.

A local board will determine how the funds awarded to Kanabec County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds made available under this phase of the program.

Under terms of the grant from the national board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, have a voluntary board.

Previous recipients have been: New Pathways, A Place For You, Soup For The Soul and Catholic Charities Senior Dining participating.

Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying must contact Kathy Wills, local board chair, Family Pathways, 6413 Oak St, North Branch. Call 651-674-8040 for an application. The deadline for applications to be received is 4 p.m., Friday, April 30.



SAPSUCKER: Native plants catalyst for thriving farm

"It was all unintentional, but when we started finding economic opportunities for things we enjoyed, we pursued it."

As Debbie started beekeeping; soon one hive grew into as many as 20. Today, Debbie's bees produce approximately 1,000 pounds of honey each year that is sold for \$7 per pound.

If Debbie got to have honey bees, then Jim wanted his own apple orchard. The orchard was planted within the prairie itself.

"The native prairie was actually taller than the little trees were, but the short story is: it worked. Now in the orchard we have a biological balance," said Debbie.

The honeybees improve pollination of the apples and other produce, while the huge variety of insects living among the native plants keep each other in check. Morrissions have never had a pest problem in the orchard.

The orchard produced a glut of apples and apple juice, which evolved into the cider brewing business. Meanwhile they tapped maple trees in the woods for syrup. Debbie's kitchen gardens expanded into a farm capable of providing bushels of produce as Community Supported Agriculture shares. New products and opportunities kept coming: chickens, eggs, mushrooms, ginger and now they even operate a taproom that hosts food trucks, live music, art classes and more.

"We call ourselves 'accidental farmers.' Everything we've done there has never been planned. When we moved up here, if someone would have told us you're going to be an organic farmer, you're going to quit your job and run a cidery, I would have told them they

were funny," said Debbie.

Two decades after establishing their native prairie and building their home, Morrison's Sapsucker Farms was named Minnesota Cider Producer of the Year in the 2020 New York International Cider Competition.

Debbie says their new life as successful organic farmers is due to the native prairie restoration

"Our whole operation started with prairie flowers," she said, and she is dedicated to maintaining the prairie not only for her farm, but for the benefits she sees it has for the earth and her community.

Three child placements blow county budget

Care for three children with high intensity needs may cost the county \$462,444 this year — more than the county’s entire child placement costs in 2020.

Kanabec County Family Services Director Chuck Hurd informed the County Board of Commissioners to be prepared for these high expenses, exceeding their budget of \$525,000.

The cost of out-of-home placements for children can be unpre-

dictable depending on their needs.

As an example, placing a child with foster parents has relatively low and predictable expense. The shelter, food and care given by the foster family for a single child costs the county approximately \$800 per month.

Placing a child with high needs costs considerably more. High needs could be violent or self-destructive behavior; medical needs like medications and doctor appointments; and psychological needs like therapy or other interventions. High needs children may

not be able to live in a foster home and are placed in a group facility.

A similar situation happened in 2018, when a single child greatly increased the county’s planned expenses. Recent placement costs have been:

- 2020 placement costs \$393,401 (\$525,000 budgeted)
- 2019 placement costs \$494,776 (\$525,000 budgeted)
- 2018 placement costs \$756,418 (\$450,000 budgeted)

Family services currently has 19 children in their care in out-of-home placements.




Richard L. Hoffman

VASALOPPET USA

The 39-foot Bell Tower is built to serve as a landmark for Vasaloppet skiers beginning with the 1980 race. Situated on a hill above Lake Mora, its 200 lb. bell, formerly from the Brunswick school, tolls both welcome and encouragement to skiers. Under Bob Lanoue's carpentry expertise the tower's construction was completely done by volunteers with material costs totaling \$5,227. The Bell Tower is patterned after the church bell tower found in Mora, Sweden.

1980

Kranskulla succession of having two years training before becoming the lead Kranskulla is adopted.

Vasaloppet receives its first paid employee. Joyce Richards becomes the office manager through federal CETA funding.

Mora businesses and professionals contributed \$11,000 towards purchase of track setting and grooming equipment.

A double track is laid out – one for the 58km, the other for the 32km so both courses could finish downtown.

The 32km race officially is named the Dalaloppet.

Mrs. Walter Mondale (Joan) and actor Eddie Albert greet the audience of King Vasa Day.

First time the registrations are over a thousand—1,100 skiers.

The after-race lunch is now being held at the high school cafeteria. The high school also hosts complimentary showers and the awards ceremony.

The first 16mm film is made for the Vasaloppet. This 18-20 minute film costs \$2,991.

News from Yesteryear

Last week in publishing the justice court news the name of Andrew Skoglund appeared among the drunk and disorderly. Who this Andrew Skoglund is we do not know but for fear some of our readers might think the genial postmaster Brunswick was celebrating we inform them differently.

100 YEARS AGO (1921)

While working about his home in the township of Ann Lake one day recently, E. Abbey picked up a white arrow head, of which he is very proud. A number of these arrow heads have been found by curio seekers in years gone by, but they are generally of a dark

color. These peculiar shaped pieces of quartz were no doubt used by the mound builders or Indians of years ago. They were no doubt used to kill game when the bow and arrow was the principal weapon used.

75 YEARS AGO (1946)

The Mora Hatchery, owned and operated by Otto Ziegler, is at the height of the spring hatching season. A normal season's run is about 11 weeks with two hatchings a week, each hatching averaging about 6,500 chicks. A normal season's output runs from 160,000 to 180,000 chicks.

Mr. Ziegler has been interested in the hatchery since 1938 when he became the partner of Len Safford. When the latter died he acquired a full interest. Since then he has greatly increased the capacity of the plant by adding new and improved equipment. The hatchery output has increased 16 times since 1938.

50 YEARS AGO (1971)

The sheriff and his deputies have a rather busy week. Saturday night about 11 o'clock three young men from Isanti drove into the Kenneth Mathison driveway,

about three miles northwest of town, and got stuck. They went up to the Mathison house, helped themselves to his big truck, and proceeded to pull the car out.

The car continued up the driveway to the house; one man drove the truck out to the road, turned it around and started back in. He ran off the driveway and got stuck in the ditch. Meanwhile, his two companions in the car had reached the yard and were busy gathering up tools, etc.
