Robotics team learns the meaning of cooperation

Not quite like a competition, not quite like cooperation —instead, the Mora robotics team found that their experience at the FIRST Robotics Competition March 3 and 4 was a blend of both: a cooperation.

"It was wild," said Christian Stassen, the team's lead driver and machinist. Stassen said things at the competition didn't go quite as planned for their robot (like a dead motor), and they quickly needed to change their strategy. The other competing teams were quick to offer any assistance they could. "Everyone was nice," Stassen said. This was the 10th year of Mora

Robotics, but very few of the team had experienced it before. Only two players of a dozen on the team had been in robotics before. The team also had all new coaches, Duke Pancake and Joe Hoy.

The entire team, coaches included, learned a lot from the experience and intend to bring what they learned with them into the next season.

"I was so proud of how the team rose to the challenge when we went there," said Pancake.

At first, Vitali Chromey was hesitant about joining the robotics team.

"I thought it would just be people that know how to code," he said. Well, Chromey didn't know anything about computer coding or manufacturing parts. But he soon found he could help

in other ways.

Chromey became the team's safety manager. The team also needs business managers, marketing and media persons and mechanics.

There are many roles to fill on the team and for many those skills can carry over into future careers.

Cally Hoy, a mom of one of the team members, said robotics helped her child find the right place to expand their skills.

"We had tried every sport the school offered and couldn't find the right fit. This was the fit," she said.

Next year the Mora robotics team hopes to build on what they learned, and continue to have fun in the years ahead.

Housing market conditions create rise in property values

Assessors advise taxpayers not to panic when they receive their property valuations

Many property owners may be shocked when they receive their Notice of Valuations in the coming days, to see the value of their property has risen considerably.

This is largely due to changes in the housing market; the Kanabec County Assessor's Office is reminding property owners that an increase in property value does not necessarily mean an equal increase

in property taxes owed.

PROPERTY VALUATIONS & CLASSIFICATION

In the coming days Kanabec County property owners will be receiving their Notice of Valuation & Classification for the 2022 assessment/pay 2023 tax year. As has been the practice, this notice is included in the same envelope as the payable 2022 property tax statement. In light of the current market conditions the Kanabec County Assessor's Office is attempting to take a proactive approach to ensure taxpayers are aware of what to expect when reviewing the notices.

The state of Minnesota requires the Assessor's Office to value properties at their market value as of Jan. 2 each

year. Market value equates to what a property should sell for on the open market.

The overall valuation of a property is based upon multiple things: land values, improvement values, new construction and/or renovations, correction of inaccurate/incomplete property information uncovered during quintile inspections, changes made for equalization purposes, construction costs, property depreciation, and local market activity.

One important factor to note is that a property's market value can change year to year due to market conditions even if no physical changes have been made to the property.

Additionally, there is no limit to the amount of value a

property can change.

The classification of a property is based upon the use of the property. Typical classifications include Residential, Agricultural, Rural Vacant Land, Commercial and Apartment. Occupancy will also determine the homestead status of a property once the use is determined. Each classification is taxed at a different percentage of market value which is set by the State Legislature.

INCREASE IN VALUE

The real estate market greatly influences the assessed value of all types of property. Over the past year the real estate market in Kanabec County (similar to the majority of the state) has seen significant gains, greater than experi-

enced in recent history.

Aggressive residential and land markets have resulted in average increases around 18-25% depending upon property location and other factors, based upon time adjusted real estate sales. The current sales study (qualified sales from Oct. 1, 2020 through Sept. 20, 2021) of residential properties resulted in a countywide median between 72-73% and the agricultural/rural vacant land median between 66-67%.

Some factors contributing to these increases include historically low interest rates, the supply of homes available for sale were at record low levels, and the demand for homes increased.

CONSERVATION OPERATIONS March 14, 2022

The following Minnesota Department of Natural Resources conservation officer weekly reports explain the activities performed by Division of Enforcement personnel. Provided by the MN DNR on March 14, 2022.

Milaca: Conservation Officer Ryan Hanna patrolled the area for ice shelters. There has been good compliance with the removal deadline. Lets keep it up and also remove all the trash on the lakes.

Onamia: Conservation Officer Dan Starr worked late-season ice anglers and found some pike being caught. One individual was cited for having two tip-ups out on the lake while he was back in the cabin. A call came in from a local butcher shop owner who had a cow get loose and was on the run. The panicked owner was asking about legalities of hunting the wild beef as compared to wild game. Starr explained the laws that applied and suggested he pursue a shooting preserve permit if the current mishap becomes more frequent.

Hinckley: Conservation Officer Bret Grundmeier noticed an increase in car-killed deer throughout the area along with high numbers of bald eagles feeding on the carcasses. The increase in eagles hanging out along roads resulted in a few eagles also getting hit by cars. Drivers should keep in mind that an eagle that has just eaten its fill is often slow to move out of the way. Snow and slush on area lakes kept ice fishing activity very low throughout most of the Hinckley area.

Horns-a must have for all vehicles

Question: The horn of my vehicle no longer works. Do I need to have one?

Answer: Yes, every motor vehicle when operated upon a highway must be equipped with a horn in good working order and capable of emitting sound audible under normal conditions from a distance of not less than 200 feet. However, the horn or other warning device must not emit an unreasonably loud or harsh sound or a whistle. The driver of a motor vehicle shall, when reasonably necessary to insure safe operation, give audible warning with the horn, but shall not otherwise use the horn when upon a highway.

Open government is good government

Election season is under way, and this year promises to be especially busy with redistricting producing many new faces seeking office.

Candidates are hitting the campaign trail outlining their priorities. With every press release and speech is certain to be a pledge to be transparent with constituents.

The timing is perfect to send the message that “open government is good government” – the theme of Sunshine Week, March 13-19. At its foundation, Sunshine Week underscores the importance of the free flow of information for an open, effective and accountable government.

Editors and reporters routinely are in the trenches seeking everyday information that appointed and elected officials want to keep confidential – or, at minimum, want to release on their terms. We’ve become all too accustomed to the stonewalling of information on

state and national levels. The practice unfortunately is increasingly common in local government, too.

Witness these two examples from the past year of officials trying to set their own rules.

The St. Louis County School Board continued to meet in person despite cautionary measures taken by many bodies during the pandemic. At the same time, it restricted the public to remote monitoring. The Ely Timberjay cried foul and sought an advisory opinion from a state agency, which ruled the board in violation of the Open Meeting Law.

A citizen questioned several actions of the West Lakeland Township Board with respect to the Open Meeting Law. The issues included the board’s failure to keep a separate journal of its votes and its failure to give three days’ notice of a change in meeting location. The state agency ruled the actions out of bounds.

The advisory opinions were handed down through the Data Practices Office of the Minnesota Department of Administration.

News organizations are usually the first to object when access to proceedings and information is denied or made more difficult.

Citizens need to understand that state laws governing access to open meetings and government records preserve the rights of all Minnesotans. Citizens have equal opportunity to challenge actions.

Most troubling are the regular attempts to block access to government information or to conduct public business behind closed doors. I witnessed it all too often when I sat behind the editor’s desk.

Landfill siting may be controversial, but constituents will be more accepting of the process if a county board identifies potential locations from the start.

The departure of a controversial department head may not be official until formally accepted, but a city council will do itself a favor by announcing the resignation as soon as it is submitted.

The closing of an elementary school may not be on a school board’s agenda for a few weeks, but the administration will win higher marks if it informs residents of its intentions when first put

on the table.

The above examples, plus many more, underscore why the press remains vigorous in pursuing access to and publication of a variety of records. It’s the proverbial “if you give an inch, they’ll take a mile.” If the news media agree to one concession, all too often an individual or agency will try to stretch the rules. Soon laws are enacted with additional restrictions on what once was routinely public information – information that’s important to readers.

Tracking down public information takes perseverance and hard work, but our communities are the beneficiaries. The efforts of editors and reporters likely irk more than a few elected and appointed officials. The press nevertheless stands firm that readers are best served by a full menu of public information rather than a selective serving.

Enhance game night with outstanding apps

BEST CRAB CAKES EVER

Makes 6

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup unsalted butter, plus 1 tablespoon
- 2 celery ribs, minced
- 1/2 yellow onion, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper, preferably toasted, plus more as needed
- 1 teaspoon plus 1 tablespoon Old Bay Seasoning
- 1 tablespoon hot sauce
- 2 pounds smoked jumbo lump crabmeat
- 6 tablespoons heavy whipping cream
- 3 large eggs
- 26 Ritz crackers, crushed
- Vegetable oil, for pan-frying
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 2 lemons, cut into wedges for garnish

Directions:

Heat a stick of butter in a small pot over low heat until the solids separate. Skim off the white foam that rises to the top with a little ladle and pour the clear butter aside to cool.
In another small pot, melt the remaining 1 tablespoon of butter

and add the minced celery and onion as well as the 1/2 teaspoon of black pepper and the 1 teaspoon of Old Bay Seasoning. Cover and sweat this over medium-low heat for about 10 minutes or until the vegetables are nice and soft. It's going to smell amazing, but don't start eating now! Remove the veggies from the heat and let them cool down. Transfer the veggies plus the clarified butter and the hot sauce into a large mixing bowl. Add the crab and heavy whipping cream and mix gently. The worst thing you could do here is overmix the crab and break up the fat lumps you just paid a premium for.

Cover and place this mixture in the freezer for 30 minutes or so. Remove and form the mix into 5-ounce balls (the size of a snowball) in your hands. Again, be gentle; you aren't packing these snowballs for war. You should be able to get six good ones out of the mix. Cover in plastic wrap and then return to the freezer for at least 4 hours or up to overnight. You need to get these nice and cold since you aren't using any filler/binder in these crab cakes.



While the mix is chilling, whip your eggs in a small mixing bowl with a crack of freshly ground black pepper. Add the crushed Ritz crackers to another bowl with the remaining 1 tablespoon of Old Bay Seasoning and parsley. Go ahead and preheat the oven to 350 F for later. Remove the frozen crab cakes from the freezer and dunk them in the egg and then into the seasoned

Ritz crumble mix. Cover completely. Repeat with all the crab cakes and set aside. Get about 1/8 inch of your vegetable oil ripping hot in a cast iron pan over coals on the grill. I like to cook these crab cakes outside in order to keep the oil smell from taking over the kitchen. There's nothing better than a cast iron skillet over hot coals. If you must, place over your gas stove at home. Get it hot. I like to drip water droplets in to see when the oil is hot enough. The droplets will sizzle and pop, and that's how you know it's ready.

Carefully drop the crab cakes in the pan and press down on them lightly just to slightly flatten them so they appear a little more cake-like and lay nicely on your plate. Fry for 4 to 5 minutes on each side until you have made a perfect golden crust (don't burn the outside). Then, put the entire cast iron skillet in the oven for 20 minutes. If desired, you can use a fish spatula or slotted spoon to transfer the cakes to a baking sheet — and leave the oil smell outside. After 20 minutes, remove from the oven and plate up.

ROAD: Vote by Hillman residents adds new layer to the Hornet Street maintenance debacle

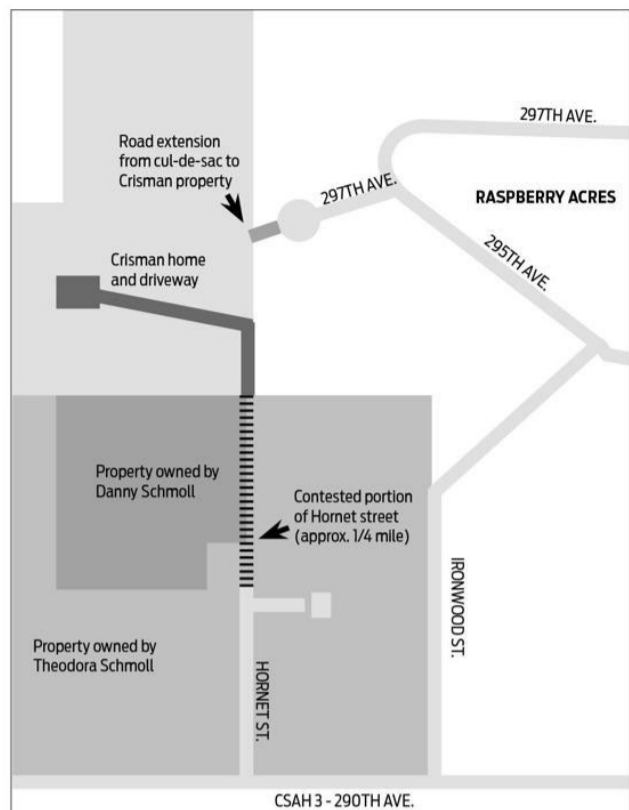
with the last 1/4 mile stretch of Hornet Street leading to the Crisman family home. The issue has led to many fitful town hall meetings, heated disagreements between neighbors and a lawsuit.

The fight first arose after the Crisman family moved into their home at the end of Hornet Street—a dead end gravel road. The property had not been occupied for a long time and the township stopped performing regular road maintenance such as grading and plowing down the full length of the road.

In 2017, the Crismans moved in with their three young daughters. The Crismans requested the township to start plowing the full length of the road. The town denied their request, citing that since that portion of the road had not been maintained in over 25 years that they would need a vote by the township residents to resume maintenance.

In January 2020 the Crismans filed a lawsuit against Hillman Township. At first, the judge ruled in favor of the township.

Throughout the court proceedings, deeper research showed the road had not been maintained in at least 40 years. The township was advised a Minnesota law means that if no maintenance was done on the road for



40 years or more, then the right-of-way is forfeited back to the property owners. In August 2021, the town board passed a resolution declaring the township's right-of-way interest in the northern half of the road is void—thus abandoning that portion of Hornet Street.

Then, in an amended ruling signed Nov. 9, 2021, Tenth District Court Chief Judge, Stoney L. Hiljus, ruled that Hillman Township could not choose to maintain only a portion of the road. The ruling essentially said that since the township maintained the first half of the road, that they must maintain the

second half as well.

In January the township filed an appeal with the Minnesota Court of Appeals.

Meanwhile, the board constructed a new access to the Crisman property by extending a road that had previously ended in a cul-de-sac in the Raspberry Acres subdivision. The town board also offered to cover the expenses for the Crismans to build a new driveway that connects to it.

The Crismans rejected the offer, citing that it was unnecessary if the town would simply maintain the full length of Hornet Street.

A NEW VOTE

During the town annual meeting, the meeting is not directed by the town board, but by a chosen moderator; during the meeting votes are taken by all present township residents. Two nominations were made for moderator: Rick Martens and Andy Jauhola. Jauhola was chosen as moderator in a 14-12 vote.

Citing the power of township electors during the annual town meeting (Minnesota statutes 365.10) the Crismans submitted a resolution to the town which asked for three things:

1. To dismiss the appeal of their lawsuit and follow the existing Kanabec County Court Order dated Nov. 9.
2. Accept a previously constructed turnaround on the Crisman property as a gift from the Crismans
3. Spend no additional tax money on Hornet Street other than routine maintenance to the turnaround

Hillman town board treasurer Dale Voge told those present at the meeting that motions or votes of the residents during town meetings are not binding, and that this vote would not block the court appeal that is already in motion.

After further discussion the resolution passed 27-10.

Osprey Wilds land permanently protected

It's a 54-year-old gift that keeps on giving. Osprey Wilds Environmental Learning Center, located on Grindstone Lake in Sandstone, started its life as a 535-acre gift from Marguerite Schwyzer in 1968. On Jan. 25, 2022, Osprey Wilds and the Minnesota Land Trust completed a conservation easement that now protects 460 acres of that land in perpetuity.

Acquired with funding from the Lessard Outdoor Heritage Funds, this easement preserves shoreline, forests, prairies, wetlands and wildlife habitats, providing a stable venue for Osprey Wilds' visitors to discover nature and forge lasting commitments to the land.

"Minnesota's nature centers are essential institutions that give our youth the opportunity to experience the wonders of the outdoors and develop a life-long conservation ethic," explains Kris Larson, executive director of the Minnesota Land Trust. "We are so thrilled that organizations like Osprey Wilds have the foresight to protect their land base and ensure that this legacy will continue for generations."

With over 4,000 feet of shoreline on the deep, cool waters of Grindstone Lake—a DNR-recognized "lake of biological significance"—this easement now formally protects unique and at-risk Minnesota habitats for species like the mudpuppy and, according to Osprey Wilds executive director Bryan Wood, "serves as a buffer to climate change."

Thriving old-growth forests beyond the shoreline hold the potential to shelter vulnerable and threatened native species like the red-shouldered hawk and the northern long-eared bat. The property's northern mixed cattail marshes present an exciting opportunity to preserve and restore an increasingly rare community of native Minnesota plants.

The conservation benefits extend beyond the Osprey Wilds easement itself: as a tributary to the Grindstone, Kettle and St. Croix Rivers, keeping Grindstone Lake and its surrounding woods and wetlands clean will help keep these other vital waterways healthy as well. It's a win for all—the species who rely on these habitats will have safe places to live, and Minnesotans will have beautiful, restorative landscapes to enjoy.

This legacy's significance is clear to Wood, "Once in a great while, you have the opportunity to do something that reaches far beyond the evanescence of your own life, where your actions leave an impact for generations to come. The chance to permanently protect Osprey Wilds' property with a conservation easement through the Minnesota Land Trust is one of those rare occasions."

The Minnesota Land Trust is a non-profit organization whose mission is to protect and restore Minnesota's most vital natural lands in order to provide wildlife habitat, clean water, outdoor experiences and scenic beauty for generations to come.

A conservation easement is a voluntary, legal agreement between a landowner and a land trust or other qualified agency that permanently limits certain uses of land in order to protect its conservation values. Landowners continue to own and enjoy the land, pay property taxes, and control land access. Once created, the conservation easement is binding on all future owners of the property. TAXES

Just because a property's market value increases it does not necessarily mean property taxes will go up the same percentage. Value and classification are just one part of the formula in calculating what taxes will ultimately be. Whether property values go up or down, each local unit of government will levy for what is needed, not more and no less. Rising values do not raise tax revenue for the jurisdictions, the tax burden (levy) is simply redistributed.

The County Assessor's Office

does not determine property taxes, their job is to reflect the current condition of the real estate market.

APPEALS

Mass appraisal is based upon many sales resulting in a 'most likely' price for each property. While reviewing your Notice of Valuation & Classification please take a moment to consider the recent market trends and whether your notice accurately reflects what your property should be able to capture on the open market.

If you have questions please contact The Kanabec County Assessor's Office, many times once a value is reviewed and changes

are explained a property owner is satisfied.

After discussing, if you still feel aggrieved, be sure to review the backside of your notice to better understand the appeal process.

Additionally, the appeal meeting information is located on the bottom of the front page. If your jurisdiction holds a Local Board of Appeal & Equalization (LBAE) meeting you must first appeal at that level to be able to appeal at the County Board level.

The Kanabec County Assessor's Office expects to be extremely busy once notices go out and will address calls as timely as possible.

“After the halfway point of the race I was sent into no man’s land but only lost one spot,” said Lennox.

Lennox finished the race strong in eighth place, 46 seconds behind the leader and earning his third All-American honor.

As for other goals in Lennox’s ski racing career he said, “Moving forward I have one major goal on my radar and that is becoming an All-American NCAA athlete while attending Northern Michigan University.”

Passion for the sport of skiing is what keeps Lennox competing, he said, “The most important thing is that no matter if you’re at the top of your game or going through a low time, that you maintain a love and passion for what you are doing, and use that passion to propel yourself forward, not because you’re the best or because your friend plays, but because you enjoy it and want to be the best that you can be.”

Lennox also is very appreciative of the community support from Mora and beyond—including his coach for the Junior Nationals trip and Mora High School alumni, Max Anderson.

Max Anderson applied and was selected as one of the Midwest division’s 11 coaches that supported a total of 58 athletes.

This season brought Max back to the Midwest where he helped with the Mora High School team during the season and he was able to help coach both Lennox, and his sister Tayah Anderson for the Midwest division at the Junior National Championship.

“This year was extra special being able to have one of the first athletes I coached, Cooper Lennox, and my sister Tayah qualify for the team. Watching Cooper become a three-time All-American was downright impressive,” said Anderson.

“It says a lot about what type of program the Mora community has built. For me, the foundation was laid by Tom Giese and Chip Gerdin’s desire to make every day about the kids knowing that results would come. I can’t wait to see where it goes from here.”

Robert A. Clasen

March 6, 1958 — March 5, 2022

Robert (Bob) Alan Clasen died on Saturday, March 5, 2022, just weeks after being diagnosed with stage IV pancreatic cancer. He was 63 years old.

He was born in St. Paul on March 6, 1958, to Don and Arlene Clasen. They lived in Columbia Heights for most of his school years, later moving to a hobby farm in Pine City. He graduated from Pine City High School in 1976 and enlisted in the Navy. He began his basic training in January, 1977 in Great Lakes, Illinois. Afterward, he was stationed at Bethesda Hospital in Maryland, and later in California. While serving his country, he also spent time on a ship in the Mediterranean Sea, visiting ports

such as France, Italy, Turkey and Spain.

He was awarded the Navy and Marine Corps Heroism Medal and the citation reads as follows:

"The President of the United States of America takes pleasure in presenting the Navy and Marine Corps Medal to Hospitalman Robert Alan Clasen, United States Navy, for heroism while attached to Company A, First Battalion, 8th Marines on the evening of 20 March 1978 in Carboneras, Spain. Observing the crash of a CH-53 helicopter, Hospitalman Clasen, with complete disregard for his own safety and fully aware of the personal danger involved, unhesitatingly moved forward and forced his way into the wreckage despite repeated warnings that the aircraft could explode at any moment. Discovering several critically injured passengers who were unable to move, he quickly freed them from the wreckage and assisted in the evacuation from the helicopter. Hospitalman Clasen remained inside the wreckage, with no chance for his own escape, until he was certain that all casualties had been removed. Only then did he exit to assist in triage and the further evacuation of the injured to MEDEVAC helicopters. Hospitalman Clasen's prompt and courageous actions in the face of great risk helped save several lives; thereby reflecting great credit upon himself and upholding the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

After his honorable discharge in 1984, he lived in the Twin Cities area, working construction cleanup and other outdoor services, and later moved back to Pine City. It was then that he met and was united in marriage to Mary Walberg on June 11, 1999. Together they lived in Big Lake, Princeton and Mora and finally found their perfect spot east of Hinckley to spend their retirement. His wife really appreciated his gift for cooking and taking care of the outdoor chores. He was a kind and respectful person, with a subtle wit. His wife and family loved him dearly and he will certainly be missed.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Don and Arlene Clasen; father-in-law and mother-in-law, Vimar and Carolyn Wicklund; step-daughter, Sally Walberg; step-granddaughter, Brooklyn Marie Quam; great-niece, Alivia Lautt.

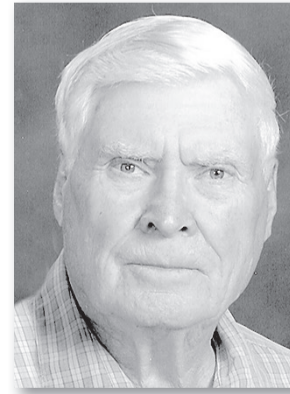
