take-home messages that they shared at a Soil Health Field Day on their farm last September sponsored by the Kanabec County Soil and Water Conservation District.

According to Deanne Pomije, Kanabec Soil and Water Conservation District Manager who spoke at the meeting, soil health is defined as the capacity of soil to function.

When soil is functioning well it results in greater water

Flooded roads demand caution

Question: With spring being here and the melting snow, can you talk about what a person should do when coming across water on roads?
Answer: Flooding can occur when streams and rivers flow over their banks, when dams or levees break, when there is runoff from deep snow or any time there is heavy rainfall. Floodwaters can be found on roads, bridges and low areas. Flash floods can come rapidly and unexpectedly. They can occur within a few minutes or hours of

excessive rainfall.

- Do not drive through flooded areas. If you see a flooded roadway ahead, turn around and find another route to get to your destination.

- Be cautious, especially at night, when the visibility is limited.

- Remember, six inches of water will reach the bottom of most passenger cars, causing loss of control or possible stalling.

- Two feet of moving water can carry away most vehicles including sport utility vehicles and pickup trucks.

- Even if the water appears shallow enough to cross, do not attempt to cross a flooded road. Water can hide dips, or worse, floodwaters can damage roadways by washing away the underlying road surface.

- If there is no other route, proceed to higher ground and wait for the waters to subside. Right and dead

Before anyone had even imagined a thing called a “germ” there was a theory that illness and disease was caused by “miasma” or “bad air.”

Miasma was believed to be a poisonous vapor filled with smells of decomposition.

As far as theories go, it wasn't a bad one given the information available during the middle ages. If you are surrounded by water that stinks like human feces — then yes, you might get cholera. If you were surrounded by hot, foggy, rotten bogs — then it seemed you could get malaria. If you were surrounded by the smells of rotting food and rats — then maybe you got the plague.

Today we know that cholera and the black plague are caused by bacteria (malaria is caused by a parasite) but at the time disease was simply associated with unhygienic smells. If you lived and visited places without bad smells, you were less likely to get sick.

Then we began to learn about what germs were.

One of my favorite examples of how germ theory developed starts in an Austrian hospital in the mid 1800s. The doctors prided themselves in knowledge. To gain that knowledge, they spent a lot of time performing autopsies and stroking each others' egos.

Any pregnant woman would be honored to be cared for by one of these doctors. Except the women who gave birth aided by doctors were dying. A lot. The women who gave birth aided by midwives (who were not allowed to perform autopsies) did not.

The problem was the doctors were performing autopsies and were then called to deliver a baby. They didn't wash their hands in between the two tasks. Things like medical instruments, bedding, etc. weren't washed either and the women died of bacterial infections in what became known as “The Doctor's Plague.”

A man named Ignaz Semmelweis was in charge of the maternity clinic and thought this pattern seemed odd.

Though he couldn't prove it, he thought there was something on the doctors' hands causing infection. He asked his doctors to soak their hands in chlorinated lime water and the clinic's mortality rate dropped from 18% to 2.2%.

Even though he was right, the medical community rejected his ideas and doctors mocked him. They didn't want to wash their hands because it was insulting and they didn't think it worked. Semmelweis became depressed, angry, turned to alcohol and eventually had a nervous breakdown.

Embarrassed by his behavior, his colleagues put him into an asylum where he was beaten by the guards. His hand was wounded, which got horribly infected, and he died 14 days after arriving. Only a handful of people attended his burial.

A new person took charge of the maternity clinic and mortality rates immediately jumped up to 6%.

A couple years later scientists like Louis Pasteur (pasteurized milk anyone?) were able to confirm the theory that certain germs caused disease.

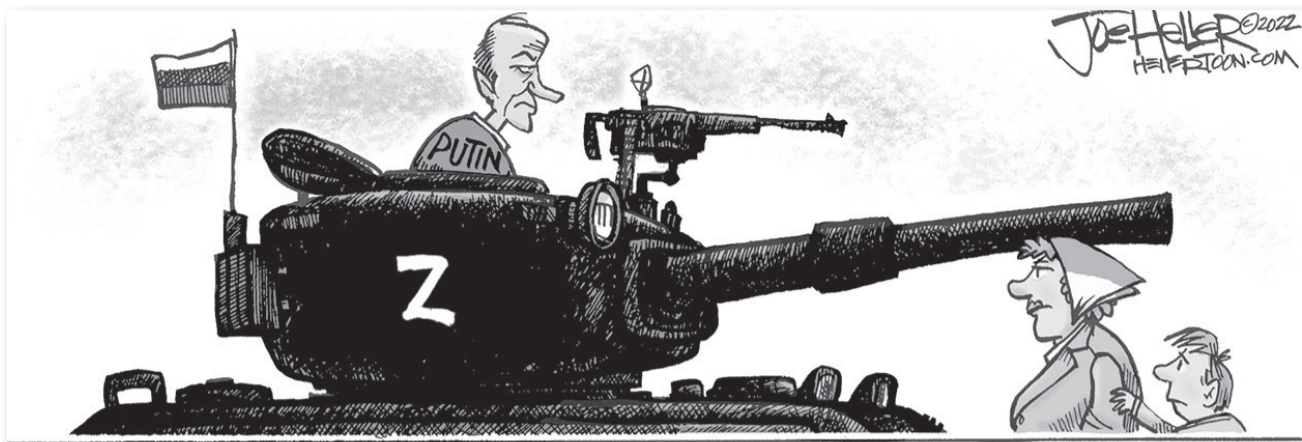
Poor Ignaz Semmelweis.

I'm not sure what the moral of his story is. Maybe it's that being right doesn't matter as much as being likable. Maybe it's that as much as we think we know, we may be wrong. Or maybe the lesson is more simple: Be humble and wash your hands.

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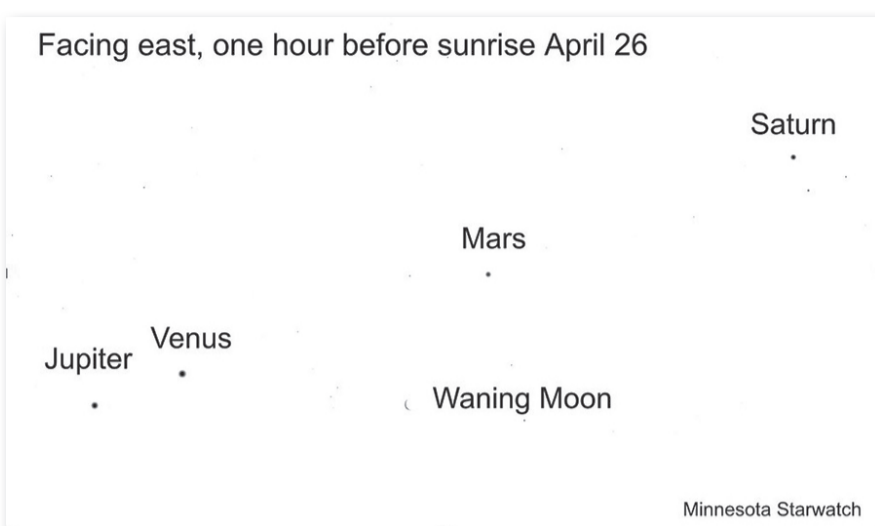
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Planets shine best in predawn hours

As April opens, the stage is set for some serious planetary action in the morning sky. On April Fools' Day, Venus, Saturn and Mars sit close to each other above the eastern horizon, almost equally spaced and in that order from left to right. But don't be fooled; Saturn is rapidly gaining altitude, and on the 5th it passes less than a moon width above Mars. As the month goes on, the three planets spread farther and farther apart while staying in a line. On the 25th, Mars will be exactly midway between Saturn and Venus.

Around the 21st, Jupiter appears to the lower left of Venus; the gap between them narrows rapidly. Try looking on the 25th or 26th, when a waning moon appears with the planets, or on the 30th or May 1, when Jupiter passes above Venus. But whichever day(s) you choose, it's best to get out just as day starts to break, to ensure all the expected objects have risen but none have yet been swallowed by the sun's

foreglow. In the evening sky, the spring constellation Leo, the lion, is high in the southeast to south at nightfall. Leo's brightest star, Regulus, anchors a backward question mark of stars called the Sickle, which outlines the lion's head. East of the Sickle shines a triangle of stars marking the hindquarters and tail. Look between Regulus and Pollux, the brighter Gemini twin, for the Beehive star cluster. It's slightly closer to Pollux, and you may need a star map or binoculars. The Beehive is also called Praesepe, Latin

for "manger." Framing the cluster are two stars called Aselli, or asses, that feed at the manger. April's full moon crosses the sky the night of the 16th. It follows Spica, the brightest star in Virgo, the maiden. Virgo is large and rather dim, but you may notice Corvus, the crow, an irregularly shaped four-sided figure just west of Spica. **DEANE MORRISON** is a writer and editor with the University of Minnesota Office of University Relations. New sunfish regulations in effect on 52 lakes

Sunfish anglers need to closely check the 2022 Minnesota Fishing Regulations booklet and signs at water accesses for new sunfish limits in effect on 52 lakes and connected waters starting March 1. The new regulations lower limits on specific waters as part of a Minnesota Department of Natural Resources initiative to protect and improve sunfish sizes. These changes are in response to angler-driven concerns over the declining sizes of sunfish in Minnesota. "This is the final batch of new sunfish regulations that will be part of the Quality Sunfish Initiative. We're pleased to be at our overall goal of 200 to 250 lakes with these special regulations," said Dave Weitzel, Grand Rapids area fisheries supervisor. "We've had an impressive amount of public sup-

port all along for these regulations. Anglers spoke up that they want large sunfish in our lakes." The new regulations modify daily limits on the affected waterbodies. Anglers can keep only the prescribed number of fish per day but can return the next day for another limit if they don't exceed the statewide inland water possession limit of 20 sunfish per angler. Beginning in 2022, nearly all lakes with special regulations for sunfish will use the same reduced daily limit approach where the statewide possession limit still applies. There are a few exceptions so anglers should read the regulations book carefully. These regulations are designed with sunfish biology in mind. Sunfish spawn in large nesting colonies during the spring and early summer. Parental male sunfish build and defend nests. Females select a male, lay eggs, and leave

the eggs for the male to protect. The largest sunfish often get the best spawning sites. These nest-building male sunfish play an important role in regulating the population's size structure. When anglers keep the largest sunfish, the remaining small males don't need to compete with large males to spawn. With the large males gone, the small males devote less energy to growing, mature and spawn at smaller sizes, and fail to grow to the size preferred by anglers. Minnesota fishing regulations use sunfish as the generic name for bluegill, pumpkinseed, green sunfish, orange-spotted sunfish, longear, warmouth and their hybrids. More about the Quality Sunfish Initiative is available on the DNR website (mndnr.gov/fish/sunfish).

All money raised through the coffee station (and the used book cart) goes back into the library to help fund events and supplies that help grow literacy in our community. What's with all the bugs?

If you've noticed an increase of the boxelder bug variety, you're not alone.

Todd Leyse, owner of Adams Pest Control and East Central Exterminators, said that it's pretty bad this year. Normally there are just a few in the house, but now people are reporting dozens or hundreds inside the house, he said.

"Our phones are very busy and people are talking about it on social media, complaining that this is the worst year they've ever seen," said Leyse. He noted that this is one of the worst years he's seen as well, other than in 1998 when El Nino caused a widespread drought.

He said the excessive creepy crawlies are caused by the hot, dry summer last year and having an extra generation or two of reproduction during the summer and fall.

"The ones that we see this time of year have overwintered in peoples' homes and have entered last fall," said Leyse. "Just like in nature, they will look for a place to overwinter under mulch or tree bark, so houses make a good place to stay warm in the winter."

Leyse said that when temperatures reach about 50 degrees, they will go outside and stay outside; they don't come and go from the house. He suggests vacuuming them up, and if it's really bad, an exterminator can be called.

"If people can hold on a while longer, they might not have to do anything because they'll leave," he said. "If the temps stay in the 40s, it could linger on for weeks."

The best preventive is a well-timed application by a professional in the fall, noted Leyse. "This will prevent them from getting into the house and being a problem in the spring," he said. He added that some people cut down boxelder trees with the false notion that only boxelder trees host boxelder bugs. He said that other trees such as silver maples and ash trees do as well, so he doesn't recommend cutting trees down.

Mora HS staff and students save 100s

against the township regarding Hornet Street in an attempt to compel the township to maintain the last 1/4 mile length of the road. The township initially won the suit, but later the judge reversed his decision in favor of the Crismans. The town board decided to appeal the decision with the Minnesota Court of Appeals where it is currently pending.

The resolution they presented on March 8 directs the township to

- dismiss the appeal
- accept the gift of the turn-around on the Crisman property
- spend no additional tax money on Hornet Street other than routine maintenance to the turn-around

The resolution was passed by the electors in a 27-10 vote.

On Tuesday, March 15, the town board met during its regular meeting and declared it will not accept or take any action described in the resolution.

In a letter dated March 15, Attorney Troy Gilchrist provided his legal opinion to the town board regarding the legal effect of the resolution, saying, "The resolution has no legal effect and is not binding on the Town Board."

"Town residents have more direct authority over their local government than do their counterparts in cities, but that authority is not unlimited ...

"While [state statute] does provide a list of elector powers (though mostly powers shared with the town board), the statute does not provide the electors the power to control the items in the resolution."

Gilchrist wrote, "the resolution is at best advisory."

In summary, the attorney advised the town board that "... the Town Board has the authority to defend the Town in a suit and electors cannot countermand the Town Board's decision to pursue an appeal. As such, the Town Board is not bound by the resolution, and it has no effect on the appeal."

SOIL: No-till prioritizes ground's microorganisms

infiltration with less runoff, better cycling of nutrients for growing plants, less erosion, flooding, soil compaction and sedimentation.

The reason why no-till and cover crop practices are important is because in one teaspoon of soil there are more macro and microorganisms than there are people on the earth. Plant nutrient uptake is controlled by these microorganisms.

Microorganisms need plant roots to release sugars that are traded for microbes and nutrients that support plant growth. Also, dead plant material including leaves, stems and roots release carbon into the soil in their waste products as they die and decompose. In this way, carbon that was once in the air is transferred into the soil organic matter.

Tilling, adding fertilizers and pesticides disturbs the soil organisms and is like an earthquake to the world of microorganisms. So, it is important to maintain this symbiotic relationship in the soil for plants to achieve their full potential, optimum yield and farmer profitability.

Pomije said that soil health can be improved by four soil health principles and practices that help to improve soil function and structure. They include disturbing the soil less, growing a diversity of crops (through crop rotation and with a diverse mix of cover crops), maintaining living roots in the soil as much as possible (with crops and cover crops), and keeping the soil covered with residue all the time.

Olens who have used no-till planting and cover crops are able to disturb the soil less and keep it covered longer by planting corn into soybean or oats stubble with a planter with row cleaners and poly tooth closing wheels.

They also purchased a no-till soybean drill for planting soybeans into corn stubble after which they roll the field to compress the corn stalks and pack rocks. They also seed oats into bean stubble.

When asked what motivated them to get into no-till, Luke said, "I wanted to improve soil health and avoid plowing rocky fields."

They plant a diversity of crops with a corn, soybean and oats rotation and are experimenting with cover crops.

Following combining oats, they let it regrow to maintain cover for another winter. Last August they did try planting cereal rye after combining their oats which they plan to harvest next July or August. This is the first time they have tried a

winter rye or wheat crop.

This system saves them two or three trips over the field in the spring including plowing, disking and sometimes using a finishing tool. Now they use one pass, and they are done.

They have not seen more weed pressure with no-till. However, they do have to use a pre-emergent and possibly a post-emergent herbicide for weed control.

"You do need to scout your fields for weeds early and spray as needed," said Luke.

Bill said that none of their soil is black over the winter. "No-till helps to prevent wind and water erosion," he added.

"The soil may not warm up as fast, but it does warm up. Sandy soils are more adaptable to no-till being that we are this far north."

Luke said that they use conventional tillage on heavier soils because it does not dry out as rapidly as sandy and gravelly soils.

They have not seen a drop in crop yields. It may drop a bit at first but will come back better in time. Soils are more mellow and never get hard in the mid-season. A percolation test on fields with no-till for one year took 106 minutes for the water to sink in. However, on fields that had been no-tilled for four and five years the water infiltrated in 27 and 36 minutes, respectively. "It takes a few years to see the benefits," added Bill.

"We see more earth worms in July. Last year with the drought the stubble shaded the soil and retained moisture and the crops stayed greener. Granted, yields were half of what they had been the year before," said Bill.

Luke added, "Crop yields were on par with everyone else's."

They used to use 3,000 gallons of fuel for spring field work and last year used 900. It has also saved on the fertilizer bill. They used to replace shovels on their cultivator every year in the past. Now it's every three years or as needed.

Bill shared a final thought about doing no-till when he said, "A farmer has to find what works for their farm, in their comfort zone and to make a profit."

Luke added, "No-till is not as common here as it is further south because it is not as easy to do it this far north. Yields may not be as high but taking care of the ground is more important than high yields."

Kanabec soil and water advocates bring proposal to legislators in St. Paul

Local conservation leaders advocated for a new state funding initiative for Soil and Water Conservation Districts at a recent legislative briefing and meetings at the State Capitol March 9-10 in St. Paul.

Kevin Belkholm and Jon Sanford, from Kanabec Soil and Water Conservation District, joined a group of other officials from the state's Soil and Water Conservation Districts who met in St. Paul to gather support for conservation district funding from the state. SWCDs are seeking \$22 million per year in local government SWCD aid through the Department of Revenue. The funding would get SWCDs state-

wide closer to filling critical conservation needs and increasing the pace of progress toward clean water and healthy soil goals.

"SWCDs are a primary source of conservation information, support and program management for landowners and other local units of government," said Deanna Pomije, of Mora. The SWCD aid proposal being considered by legislators this session is absolutely critical to the future of conservation districts in the state, noted Pomije. The legislation has received bipartisan support and is also included in Governor Tim Walz's supplemental budget.

"We have to work hard to make sure the state's commitment to sharing in the funding needs of SWCDs doesn't fall by the wayside. Soil and water conservation

districts play an integral role in enhancing Minnesotan's quality of life through conservation on private lands, which yields environmental, wildlife and aesthetic benefits to the public," Pomije said.

During the visit to St. Paul, Belkholm and Sanford met with local legislators, Andrew Mathews and Jason Rarick.

The event was sponsored by the Minnesota Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

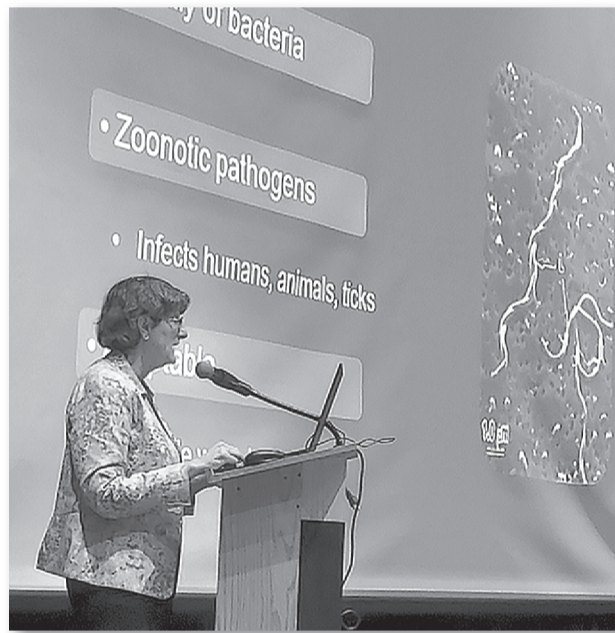
Dr. says prevention efforts best way to avoid ill effects of Lyme Disease

Lyme Disease is a complex and significant illness that is a growing risk to people in Pine County, much of Minnesota and Wisconsin. Prevention is the best way to avoid it. That was what Dr. Elizabeth Maloney told 100 people who attended the 18th Annual Pine County Master Gardener Horticulture Day at Pine City High School on Saturday, March 19.

Maloney who is a consultant to government agencies and private organizations said that Lyme Disease is caused by a bacteria that is transmitted through a bite from a black-legged deer tick to humans and animals. She added that it is important to identify if one has been bitten by a deer tick or a dog tick. Deer ticks are tiny, have a black area behind the head and red-brown body. If a person has one, the tick needs to be pulled out vertically with a tweezers and saved for proper identification.

Lyme Disease can create a variety of symptoms that can be confused with other illnesses. Early symptoms include fever, chills, malaise, headache, fatigue, stiff neck, joint/muscle pain, numbness or tingling, sore throat.

Signs include: a rash, swollen glands, red-colored throat. Different patients have different symptoms. Maloney said that certain antibiotics may reduce the risk of Lyme Disease if taken within 48 hours of a bite. Contact your doctor immediately after a bite to discuss this strategy. She said to ask your doctor to review the paper, "The Management of Ixodes scapularis Bites in the Upper Midwest," published in the April 2011 edition of the Wisconsin Medical Journal.

Maloney emphasized

that prevention focusing on pets, people and property is the best way to avoid Lyme Disease. She advised avoiding possible tick infested habitat including wooded areas, brush and long grass, golf course roughs, unmowed play fields and leaf litter. She cautioned against sitting on a fallen log and advised staying in the center of trails.

Clothing for maximal skin coverage will create a barrier to ticks. That includes tucking pants into socks, wearing a hat, tying up a ponytail

and treating clothing with Permethrin, but NOT the skin. She said that ticks can be killed in clothing by putting clothes into a clothes dryer on high heat until they are completely dry. Dry clothing requires 15 minutes while damp and wet clothing should be tumbled until completely dry, which could take 60 minutes.

Maloney also emphasized doing a thorough tick check of your body and of your pets after being in a potential tick infested habitat. She added that in your yard, deer prefer ornamental species over native species and to avoid thick dense plants which protect mice.

Other topics that were covered at the Horticulture Day included: Cool Weather Crops from the Kitchen Garden, Planting Trees and Shrubs for a Changing Climate, Japanese Beetles, Spring Blooming Bulbs and Flowers for Pollinators. More information on these topics is available from the Pine County Extension office at the courthouse in Pine City.

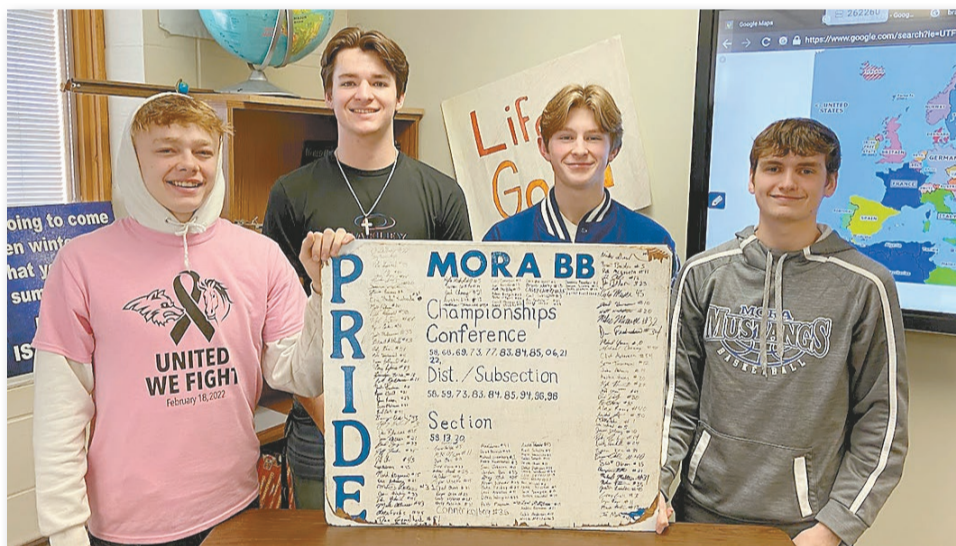

Mora matched up with Albany on Tuesday, March 15, making it the third matchup this season. Mora won the first two games by a total of five points, which included collecting the Granite Ridge traveling trophy after the first matchup in Mora, and crowning themselves as the Granite Ridge Conference Champions after the second game in Albany.

Albany had four players reach double digits and outshot Mora via field goal percentage 36% to 44%. Mora's biggest demise was making seven field goals out of 20 attempts.

Albany then lost to the eventual 6AA champion Annandale Cardinals on Friday, March 18, by a score of 54-40 for a trip to state. Annandale went on to win the state championship, beating No. 1 Caledonia 62-55 and Minneapolis North 60-49 for the gold.

Despite Mora's realistic hopes of bringing home a state championship, the boys still put together a memorable season and have a lot to be proud of. "It was incredible how this team developed as the season progressed," said head coach Curt Grachek. "They individually improved, which for some of them - was just getting out of their own way; just play the game. They improved as a team by flowing together on the court and communicating freely. The most exciting moment this season had to be the last second basket

by Honstrom at Albany. It was a game winner, a conference championship, and we get to hold onto the traveling trophy until next year."

Despite graduating four starters from the 2021 class, Mora finished the season 25-4, which is a new school record. The previous record was 24 wins in the 2012-2013 season.

Mora had six players receive all-conference honors; Max Sampson, Gage Braiedy and Garret Honstrom received All-Conference honors, and Dallas Fix, James Oslin and Jonah Smart received honorable mention honors. They won the Kimball Holiday Tournament. They control the Granite Ridge traveling trophy. They won the Granite Ridge Conference, and Garret Honstrom was voted by conference coaches as the Granite Ridge Conference Player-of-the-Year.

He holds a meeting with all the players and allows the seniors to speak to the underclassmen. "Signing out" means the seniors have the privilege of signing the Pride Board at the end

of their senior season. Every senior since 1996 has signed this board. There are 137 players on the Pride Board.

"The board is a little chipped and frayed on the edges," said Grachek. "But that is because it travels with the team to every game."

"The Pride Board is a culmination of a player's career. Every player on there touched it, signed it and gave advice to future players," said assistant coach Jamie Wright.

The Pride Board is present at the pregame meetings and at halftime. The players are asked to touch the board to remind them that they are part of a much bigger team than the one that is suited up that night. They are reminded that they are also playing for the pride of the program.

"It shows how being a Mustang basketball player is much bigger than themselves," said JV coach Pete Balmer.

"They are playing for the players who are on that Pride Board and they are playing for the players who will follow them onto the Pride Board," said Grachek. "They are reminded that their opportunity to play Mustang basketball is very short but that they will always be a member of the Mustang basketball family."

Volunteer rainfall monitors needed

The State Climatology Office is looking for volunteer rainfall monitors for the Community Collaborative Rain, Hail and Snow Network (CoCoRaHS). The network includes more than 20,000 volunteers nationwide who measure precipitation in their backyards using a standard 4 inch diameter rain gauge and submit reports online.

Climatologist Pete Boulay said the data from backyard rain gauges are helpful and important in many ways.

"These volunteers help to verify high rain totals after big events, monitor drought and flooding, make our precipitation maps more accurate and provide needed guidance on Minnesota's changing climate," Boulay said. "This is also a great educational activity for families with kids and a rewarding hobby for anyone interested in weather or climate."

Volunteers are particularly needed outside the immediate Twin Cities metro area. Volunteers receive training on how to observe weather trends and submit their precipitation and weather event reports. All training material is available online. They must purchase or provide a standard 4 inch diameter rain gauge (available at discount through CoCoRaHS) and have internet access to submit reports.

"We're hoping Minnesotans will again come through in 2022, to keep the Cup in Minnesota and, more importantly of course, to improve our state's precipitation recording," Boulay said.

The District 2 vacancy was created when Commissioner Gene Anderson died Dec. 8, 2021.

Nine candidates filed for the position, creating the need to hold a special primary before a special election.

The top two vote winners in the primary will be put on the ballot for a special election on Aug. 9, 2022.

Each candidate was invited to respond to the *Kanabec County Times* questionnaire and given the same word limit.

3. By bringing jobs into the county and having affordable housing.

4. I believe that these funds would best be put to use in two ways:

1. Advance broadband infrastructure
2. Better preparation for public health emergencies in the future



Alison Holland

1. I work closely with University of Minnesota Extension economic development, environment, farming, parenting, and youth development experts. As a digital learning designer, I help them share their expertise with the people of Minnesota, and they teach me something new every day.

I've previously worked with local economic development collaboratives, schools, and public health. I've chaired Mora's Park Board and the Central Regional Sustainable Development Partnerships board.

Before all of that, the daughter of entrepreneurs, I grew up working in our small business.

I am a lifelong learner. I graduated from Mora High School and have a doctorate in Education. I completed an Education Policy Fellowship and am learning Spanish in my free time. I love to learn, collaborate and help others with the knowledge and connections I've developed.

2. I'm committed to securing a positive future for the community for many generations to come. I would prioritize spending where it's needed to invest in our community's health and safety, protect our environment and maintain built infrastructure while also working to make sure we're not spending where we don't need to.

By collaborating regularly and planning major projects as a community, our schools, healthcare system, cities, county, businesses and organizations can ensure all residents are well-served without hiking taxes and fees from all directions.

We also need to prioritize becoming a more welcoming community. As our population ages, our future depends on new people choosing to build their lives here. They will fill jobs, pay taxes and be our neighbors. People should feel welcome and well-supported, knowing where and how to access needed services, resources and information.

It is also essential to modern education, health care and nearly every business. A public-private partnership will likely be needed to achieve this goal.

Protecting our environment would be my second priority for the funds. Extreme weather and invasive species will continue to threaten our ability to enjoy the lakes, rivers and forests we love.

1. There are several attributes that qualifies me to be a Kanabec County Commissioner. First and foremost is a care about the future of the community for generations to come. My experience in making decisions and guiding others to fulfill goals will be beneficial to the commissioner position.

I am a lifelong dedicated member of the community, spent 20 years on the Mora Planning Commission, previous board member and president of Spring Brook Golf course, been a business owner for 27 years, active member of Grace Lutheran Church for 50 years, been an active member of the Mora Jaycees by holding past positions of president, district director and a Jaycee Senator and a Son's of the American Legion member.

2. As Kanabec County Commissioners, we need to continue to review and assess the needs of the county. In February 2022, the Board of Commissioners spent time and resources to identify the positives and negatives of our county. Now that we have identified these areas, we need to work hard to achieve what we can with the resources we have available to us.

Some of these identified areas include working with townships on zoning for the betterment of the whole county.

Another one of the many areas the comprehensive plan reviewed is the need for broadband internet. This is important for the equality for all students and for both residential and commercial growth.

We are in dire need of this growth in the county to maintain and flourish the tax base. We must find a way to attract new families to fill our new school and attract new businesses to our county.

3. In order for our county to continue to offer services we must focus on maintaining, ideally increasing, the desire for people to make Kanabec County their home. Some focal points might be broadband, local employment, schools, housing and other infrastructure. As we move forward we need to prioritize what will provide the best return for supporting local economic development. To accomplish this goal we need to reverse the trend forecasted by the state demographer which projects a decline in our population of substantial proportion between now and 2050.

4. Our county is like many of the counties in Minnesota. There is a lack of housing, high number of people needing food and/or housing assistance, homelessness, employers needing employees to properly staff their businesses and the safety of our constituents by law enforcement. These are all priorities. I believe an influx of dollars can do some good; but more than that, we need a solid plan. We need to work hard and be fiscally responsible in order to achieve the most positive possible outcome benefiting our county today and in the future.

1. Being a resident of Kanabec County for over 30 years, I've had the opportunity to work with local farmers, community businesses and local government. From tending Holsteins at a dairy farm, to working with big named corporations found around the country, I've never lost my appreciation for the community I am proud to be a part of.

While my qualifications are minimal in regards to a politically seated position, I chose to offer my time serving the people of Kanabec County. Not to be a politician. This is not about notoriety or status to me. I am doing this because of what I have witnessed happen to our republic over the last few years. Nothing is of greater importance than to become active at every level of position, and to choose candidates who represent the people and America first.

2. If chosen to represent the Mora District 2 my goals would be to bring as much transparency as possible to the members of this community (you) regarding spending, taxation, potential new businesses looking to build here, proposed ordinances and any other issue that could impact our daily lives. Coordinating with local tradesmen to work toward apprenticeship programs, and working with local family owned businesses to grow our local economy.

3. Being proactive does not mean bringing in large box chain businesses. The county could focus more on promoting local farms, butchers, handymen, restaurants, local insurance providers and accountants. The way I look at it, if a business has a local family name attached, let's see what we can do to guarantee their stability.

4. I'll start out by saying that anyone that controls government funded/tax payer money needs to work with our local newspapers and be fully transparent where every penny of that money is spent. Which companies if any these funds are going to, and if proper quoting or vetting of the proposed spending is done.

Outside of that, I would push for as much funding as necessary to assist anyone who has either had been threatened with termination of employment, was terminated and lost income, was adversely effected by the vaccination, had their children masked eight hours a day for months or was not given any therapeutic options, but were given Remdesivir as COVID treatment. I would also allot some of these funds file a FOIA against any hospital or doctor that was given bonuses or additional money for positive COVID cases, prescriptions of Remdesivir, putting patients on ventilators or COVID deaths. If that FOIA shows maladministration, other funds would be to assist class action lawsuits.

I know that these statements are unlike the other candidates. And that's the main reason I've chosen to offer my time to represent you.

Local action has a national impact. And I know for many of us it is difficult to even recognize our republic at this point. Land of the free, home of the brave. Where one of us goes, let all follow.

1. My career experience, all within the city of Mora, has been in the banking sector, school district business office, City of Mora deputy clerk, HR and payroll mean I have a wide and varied professional perspective to bring to the board. I'm also a MN Certified Municipal Clerk. I have local government experience.

As a current city employee I hope that, similar to the previous District 2 commissioner, my unique position could allow me to be a positive liaison between the city and county.

2. One of my top goals is getting more daycares in the county. Organizations have and continue to lose staff because of the lack of daycare, creating a worker shortage and a domino effect to overall operations which could negatively impact our communities. An initiative was started, but we have yet to see substantial results from this effort.

My priorities are to represent District 2 residents' best interests while practicing wise stewardship of the funds the board is responsible for and to do the best I can to support all county staff because it's been a hard couple of years for everyone, everywhere.

3. The county board was proactive when they hired a county economic development director (EDD). While the EDD is part of the EDA Board, the EDD's sole focus and full-time job is creating economic development.

I'd recommend the EDD meet with each township board and city council on an annual basis, getting contact information out there and explaining how tax dollars spent on this specific position are benefiting each township and city, and asking how the EDD could best help each tax paying precinct.

It's in the best interest of the county for the EDD to be highly visible in Quamba, Ogilvie, Grasston and Mora, for the EDD to work with city EDD's for the betterment of the county; to be the first person a potential business meets, offering eligible TIFF and tax abatement options, various DEED opportunities as they are available, providing resources and seeing a project through. For example, the city and county EDDs did a great job on the leg work of getting the Mora Industrial Park "shovel ready." Now let's get businesses in there. I'd like to see those vacant properties filled, bringing more jobs and tax revenue.

4. Without specifics, addressing negative economic impacts is important because it affects everyone. Many organizations struggled to stay afloat. Addressing those issues could keep our community going and in doing so residents would still have access to services locally, avoiding travel to get their needs met.

In light of the recent pandemic, having four of my kids attending school virtually, in addition to working from home, the broadband initiative is important also. Families and students with no access to teachers and lessons struggled. Virtual learning when working 100% caused a slight student setback, but students without the internet were really short changed, and they deserved better.

Vote for me and let me try to attain better for our residents.

Reminder on how to identify snow geese and swans

The light goose conservation order is underway and geese will be arriving as we get to spring.

Are you comfortable identifying lesser snow geese?

The most commonly confused waterfowl with light geese are swans.

Swans are protected in

Minnesota, so it's important to know the difference on the wing. Trumpeter and tundra swans are both far larger than lesser snow geese. These geese have distinctive black tipped wings and pink bills. By comparison, trumpeter and tundra swans have pure white wings without black markings and black bills.

Sandhill cranes return

Sandhill cranes begin returning to Minnesota in late March and early April to breed. Adults have a dis-

tinctive bowing courtship ritual. Two eggs are laid in a nest built of grasses and other plants either on the ground or in a small mound in shallow water.

Sharp-tailed grouse ready to dance

Have you seen the spectacular dance moves of the sharp-tailed grouse? Check it out!

In spring, male sharp-tailed grouse return to their dancing grounds, called leks, to put on an elaborate courtship display. Leks are flat areas with short vegetation, allowing optimal viewing. Male birds return year after year — up to 25 to 30 in some places — to show off their dancing prowess to attract females.

Once found throughout much of Minnesota, the “sharp-tail” population is now restricted to the northwest and east-central parts of the state.

These birds require a minimum of 1 to 3 square miles of open brushy grassland areas, called brushlands, to thrive. The loss of open landscapes due to lack of vegetation disturbance is the main threat to

sharp-tail survival.

In Minnesota, DNR managers work to disturb areas that were historically kept open by fire. Prescribed fire and brush mowing are common tools used to manage these habitats. Continued habitat work, conducted on thousands of acres of public land, is critical to the survival of not only the sharp-tail, but all wildlife species that depend on these habitats to thrive.

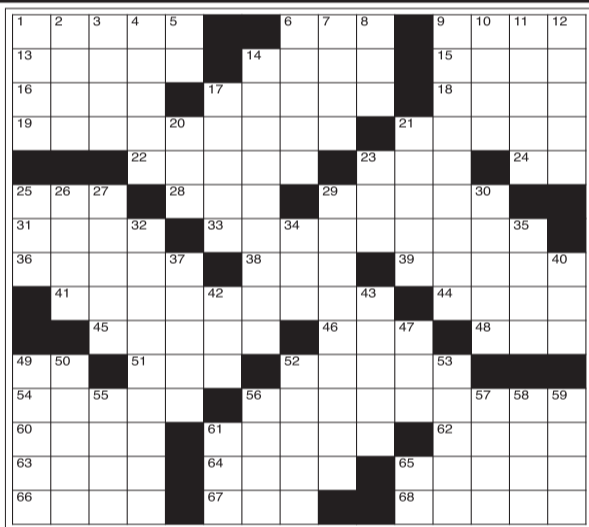
Be safe on spring ice

There's no way around it: spending time on the ice can be risky this time of year.

Spring ice — or “white ice” — is only half as strong as new, clear ice and conditions can change extremely rapidly. If you're heading out during these waning days of the ice fishing season, always have a means of self-rescue. That means wearing a life jacket or buoyant gear, carrying ice picks and a rope, and having a whistle.

No one expects to fall through the ice, but planning for it can be the difference between tragedy and making it home at the end of the day.
