OFFERS ESCAPE FROM MODERN PROBLEMS

ith all the turmoil in the world today, wouldn't it be nice to escape to a simpler place in a more laid-back time?

Mayberry perhaps?

While Mayberry is a fictional town providing the setting for "The Andy Griffith Show," many believe Griffith largely patterned it after his birthplace of Mount Airy including incorporating local names and places.

Whether or not the modern-day Mount Airy is really an embodiment of 1960s Mayberry, at least that tends to be the case during the annual Mayberry Days celebrated in the small North Carolina town

Organizers seem to go all out in supplying the atmosphere for what Executive Director Tanya Jones of the Surry Arts Council considers "the ideal, iconic small town," a term of other used by major newspapers and other media outlets in describing Mayberry.

The official of the arts group, which has staged Mayberry Days since it started in 1990, points out that folks who go on vacation are engaging in escapism to some degree.

This might include seeking some unhurried spot to enjoy a little peace and serenity – especially with the tense situation in the nation and world.

"I think now, more than ever, a small town gives you the chance to find that," Jones said. "I think Mayberry Days, in general, is positive."

This can be accomplished with something as simple as the checkers tournament held during the annual tribute to all things Mayberry.

Mayberry Days also includes other games and appearances by individuals who appeared on "The Andy Griffith Show," musical performances, special shows and programs, a popular parade through downtown and more.

It is scheduled this year from Sept. 22-28.

SPECIAL MILESTONE

Along with being proud that 2025 represents Mayberry Days' 36th year, which even continued through the COVID-19 pandemic, Jones says the upcoming celebration is special in light of another milestone.

This is the 65th anniversary of "The Andy Griffith Show," which first appeared on the CBS network for a lengthy run and still is shown widely in syndication and on streaming services.

While most of the actors and actresses from the home-spun comedy series are deceased, members of the survivor ranks show up for Mayberry Days.

With some confirmations still outstanding, the list this year is expected to include Keith Thibodeaux and Dennis Rush, who played pals of the Opie character; Margaret Teele, who portrayed Agnes Jean Parker, a blond member of a crime family Barney encounters while in Raleigh; Rodney Dillard of the bluegrass-playing Darling family; and possibly Margaret Kerry, who was the mother of a family about to be evicted during one episode.

Clint Howard (Leon, the boy always wielding peanut butter and jelly sandwiches), Ron's brother, could be a late celebrity guest attendee.

"Clint knows he's always welcome and always lets me know at the last minute," Jones said concerning a busy schedule maintained by Howard

Family members of a key cast member are scheduled to attend and headline shows, including Karen Knotts, a regular guest who is Don Knotts' daughter, and Bill Knotts, the Barney Fife actor's nephew.

"Bill Knotts is new," Jones mentioned.

Family members of Harvey Bullock, who wrote episodes of the show, also are to be here.

In addition, The Bellamy Brothers will be giving a concert, and although the band has no connection to Mayberry, members want to be part of the annual event.

Actor Daniel Roebuck, a co-star on Griffith's "Matlock" series, will be another special guest.

Also planned are comedy shows, other musical performances, lecturers, tribute artists and more.

STILL GOING STRONG

Jones, the Surry Arts Council official, also addressed the notion that the Mayberry phenomenon and the public's fascination with events such as Mayberry Days are waning as time passes.

"For me, I've been listening to this since the late 1980s," she said, when the Griffith show was "only" 29 years old.

Then there were other factors supposedly spelling the Mayberry's mystique's demise: it will cease to be popular when Andy dies (which occurred in 2012), and the idea that the show's fans themselves are aging and gradually passing.

Jones said none of those theories are legitimate, as evidenced by the continuing popularity of "The Andy Griffith Show."

"The show has been on 65 years non-stop – need you say more?" she emphasized. "Even during COVID there was a revival of watching the show."

This persistence surrounding Mayberry is apparent in Mount Airy even when Mayberry Days is not held.

Jones said one example of this involves the fact that more than 500 people visited the Andy Griffith Museum on Rockford Street during one recent Saturday, representing all age groups.

"The numbers at the museum are not changing at all," the Surry Arts Council official said of such heavy visitation.

"And I think that tells the story about Mayberry Days."

A CAREER AS THE MAYBERRY DEPUTY

Browning returning to Mayberry for book fair

nyone who visited Mount Airy's Mayberry Days prior to 2017 — or a host of other fairs, festivals and similar events throughout the Southeast — may know the Mayberry Deputy.

No, not THE Mayberry Deputy -- Barney Fife -- but the next best, and most recognizable, version of the deputy, a character developed and portrayed by David Browning.

Of course everyone, including Browning, acknowledges there's only one Barney Fife, played by the incomparable Don Knotts. He made the sometimes neurotic, often-times bumbling, but always lovable character a household name during "The Andy Griffith Show's" eight-year run, so much so that Barney is still considered an American icon six decades later.

Browning, who lives in the Bristol, Tennessee area, was well aware of the show, and Barney Fife, while he was making his own way in the entertainment business.

"I was an actor in the Tri-cities, from the time I got out of high school," he said of the Tennessee region of Bristol, Kingsports, and Johnson City. He worked in productions at area colleges, got some local and regional television commercial work, and eventually volunteered at Theatre Bristol, which he said is the longest-running community theater in the region.

Soon, he was hired as artistic director, the group's first paid employee.

He was working there, as well as pursuing other acting opportunities when bluegrass music promoter Tim White told Browning he was doing a show that featured the Dillards, a band which portrayed The Darlings on "The Andy Griffith Show."

"He asked me if I could throw together a Barney Fife-looking costume and emcee the show."

Browning had no idea that decision would change his life.

At the show Rodney Dillard "really encouraged me" to develop the character. Soon, Browning was working at Big Stone Gap, Virginia, where the "Trail of the Lonesome Pine" production is held every year.

There, working before audiences before and after the show, and with other productions, Browning said he "really began to develop the character."

That led to engagements at civic clubs and other organizers, where he would be the lead entertainer as The Mayberry Deputy.

Jim Clark, known as co-founder of the famous Andy Griffith Show

Rerun Watchers Club, encouraged Browning to expand his act, and gave him another piece of life-altering advice.

"Jim called me and told me about the festival," Browning said of learning about Mayberry Days. "You really ought to go down and participate. So I did. I went down on the street, mingled with people on the street on Saturday, had a good time, then got back in my car and drove home."

The following week, he got a phone call from someone at the Surry Arts Council.

"Where did you go? We heard abut you, we couldn't find you," he quoted the caller as saying. "Tanya wants to book you for next year."

The caller was referring to Tanya Jones, executive director of the Surry Arts Council and founder of Mayberry Days.

For 27 years afterward, he worked Mayberry Days, often as an emcee of various shows, a comedy act, or any number of other roles he could take on as The Mayberry Deputy.

The same Jim Clark encouraged Browning to do a Mayberry-themed event in Nashville.

"My job was to come in and mingle in the crowd as the Mayberry Deputy," between the major stage acts.

One of those acts featured none other than the man himself — Don Knotts.

At the conclusion of the show, Browning said one of the stage workers approached him with a message — Don Knotts wanted to see him in Knotts' dressing room.

"I didn't know what was going to happen," Browning said, admitting a major case of nerves, and a little trepidation, when he approached. "I didn't know if he was going to be upset with me, or what I was doing."

Turns out, just the opposite.

"He really encouraged me," Browning said. "He told me he enjoyed my act...he asked me if I would be his opening act when he



came back East for a show."

"Mayberry Days was really a catapult to get other bookings," he said of the Mount Airy festival. "Then I met Don the next year, he encouraged me to do this. I began opening for him in 1994, at a show at Milligan University in Elizabethton (Tennessee). By '94, I was keenly

aware I could take it and do it full time."

He quickly made the leap to full-time deputying. While he still did other acting work, or would take shows that weren't as Mayberry Deputy-centric, that was the character most people wanted to see. "There were some years I had in the neighborhood of 200 bookings. All over the US at festivals, law enforcement events, county fairs, civic clubs."

He said each show was different, and he relied on improvisational skills to alter the presentation based on the audience. For a banquet, for instance, "I was there by the time the doors opened, I mingled, mingled, mingled with the people while they were talking, having drinks before the dinner...by the time I was introduced they were ready to roll."

Finally, after nearly three decades on the road, he began cutting back on outdoor events — his last Mayberry Days was 2017 — and by 2022 he had done his last show.

This July, he'll be making his return to Mayberry, but this time not as the Mayberry Deputy. Instead, he'll be himself — David Browning, the author. Browning is part of the first-ever Mayberry Book Festival, slated for July 19, from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. to be held at the Mount Airy Museum of Regional History. He'll be one of 30 authors on hand for the event, which is a fundraiser for the Perry Family Scholarship. A

wide variety of authors will be there, from novelists and poets to history writers and those selling memoirs.

Browning falls into that latter category, with his book, "We Have Security Tonight: My Life As The Mayberry Deputy."

"It's just really a retrospective on my own life, before the deputy, and the years traveling as the deputy," he said. There are plenty of stories in the book, "and a lot of pictures in my book, people will be interested in that."

Among those are photos of golf legend Arnold Palmer, who Browning said was a big Andy Griffith Show fan, and singer Charlie Daniels, who "Was a huge Mayberry fan."

The book tells of his travels with the Dillards doing their Mayberry-themed shows, and it "Talks about my early life, nine children in my family, how I found the theater, and how I found The Deputy."

Browning credits Tom Perry, who owns and operates Laural Hill Publishing and is the founder of The Mayberry Book Festival, with being a major influence on his decision to write the book and for helping him put it together.

How sweet it is

Ice cream, Andy Griffith, and the art of nostalgia

he late afternoon sun streamed through the windows of Opie's Candy Store on Main Street at 135 North Main Street in downtown Mount Airy recently as three generations of a visiting family settled into mismatched chairs around a small table. The grandfather pointed to the television mounted in the corner, where Sheriff Andy Taylor is teaching his son Opie a lesson about honesty, while the parents enjoyed a scoop of ice cream and the children pressed their faces against glass jars filled with penny candy.

Episodes of The Andy Griffith Show are playing continuously throughout the day, providing more than just background entertainment. The familiar scenes spark conversations between folks enjoying a sweet treat and perhaps taking a break inside the air conditioning during a traipse down the main drag of Mount Airy's fictional sister: Mayberry. There is a timeless quality to the lessons from the show just as with penny candies that have the ability to transport one to a bygone era.

SWEET CHANGES

Luke Morrison manages Opie's for owner Neil Edlin, splitting his time between the candy shop and Gates Pharmacy. He was found on a recent afternoon smiling while organizing and arranging display items as customers floated in and then back out onto Main Street. When he's not at the pharmacy, he can be found helping customers navigate more than 300 varieties of candy that line the shop's walls in vintage Montana glass jars.

"We've had people walk in the front door, close their eyes and say this is pure joy," Morrison says. "Like I'm flooded with memories of my grandfather right now. It's such a cool experience."

The transformation Edlin implemented after purchasing the business in March 2024 reflects a broader evolution in how downtown Mount Airy serves both residents and tourists. Where the previous iteration focused heavily on antique sales alongside candy, the current version prioritizes creating spaces where families can gather, rest and connect.

"There's not a ton of places to come inside and have a seat and rest because it's some hills," Morrison explains, gesturing toward Main Street's gently sloping terrain.

"Having the air conditioning and some ice cream in the summer and these tables — it's great to be able to sit inside and not have to have an ice cream out in the sun," he explained, painting a messy picture in the process.

The shop's seating area, carved from space previously occupied by antique furniture and merchandise racks, hosts an ongoing parade of multigenerational groups. Parents introduce children to Charleston Chews while grandparents recall their own childhood candy preferences. Teenagers discover flavors like Michigan Pothole — dark

chocolate ice cream with black tar fudge — while their elders stick to butter pecan. Rush Hour, a coffee ice cream with espresso chocolate chips, has become a popular flavor, while Carolina Peach appeals to regional preferences. You want a fruity ice cream? Check. Something rich and chocolatey? They have it. Peanut butter fudge you say? Consider it done. Big ole' waffle cone? Your wish is their command.

Morrison said they extended the store's hours — until 8 p.m. on weekends, compared to the previous 5 p.m. closing time — representing a strategic shift that benefits the broader downtown ecosystem. Diners from Mi Casa he said can wander over for dessert. Families finishing early dinners at other establishments have somewhere to continue their evening and enjoy more time in the downtown which is something local business leaders appreciate.

THROUGH THE YEARS

The multigenerational appeal creates family traditions that span decades. Tamara Smith-Williams describes her family's ritual: "When our niece, her husband, and their children come to visit from Wilmington, we go to Opie's. Last time our little great nephew got his own bag. But, his 40-something dad must have his own bag too. I think Dad has more fun than his little son. Dad always got his own bag even before the kids were born."

Morrison estimates the shop serves customers from every U.S. state, drawn by Mount Airy's connection to "The Andy Griffith Show" and the town's broader Mayberry experience. But local residents comprise an equally important customer base, particularly since the shop extended its hours to accommodate after-dinner crowds seeking dessert.

"A lot of the downtown restaurants don't offer dessert," Morrison notes. "So a lot of people like to take a stroll after they eat just to digest, and this is a great spot where you can come in and you're not limited to just ice cream either."

The candy selection itself serves as a bridge between past and present. Pop Rocks remain among the best sellers, creating intergenerational moments as adults introduce the crackling candy to

children. Caramel creams, rock candy, and candy cigarettes trigger memory floods for older customers while introducing younger ones to treats their grandparents enjoyed.

"What that creates is these situations where a dad or uncle can say, 'Hey, I remember these,'" Morrison explains. "And a lot of people have come into these places as kids with their grandparents."

Savannah Hiatt shares one such treasured tradition: "One of my favorite memories is walking uptown with my little boy to Opie's Candy Store. It's become a special tradition for us, and I love seeing his face light up when we visit. The welcoming and kind workers make it a truly special place."

Customer John Piner captures the quintessential Opie's experience in his memory of "eating the delicious ice cream that Emily scooped for us while we watched 'The Andy Griffith Show' on your television." These moments of simple pleasure, repeated countless times across different families and generations, form the foundation of the shop's enduring appeal.

COMMUNITY ANCHOR

Morrison said there is a feeling of community in downtown Mount Airy and sometimes building community relationships matters more than transactions.

"We try to be welcoming and kind to everybody that comes in here," Morrison says. "If you get that feeling when you come into a place — I'm accepted here, I'm not treated as a number, I'm acknowledged when I come in — people remember that."

The shop's location next to Snappy Lunch, Mount Airy's iconic restaurant featured in numerous travel publications, creates natural foot traffic patterns. Families often scout dessert options while waiting in Snappy's line, then return after their meal. The proximity exemplifies how downtown Mount Airy's businesses support each other through complementary offerings.

Ashly Lancaster, president and CEO of the Greater Mount Airy Chamber of Commerce, speaks to the shop's long-standing commitment. "Opie's will celebrate 20 years with the chamber in September. They are one of our long-standing members whom we can

always count on."

The shop has a small staff including Emily, a 22-year-old who has worked at Opie's for five years across three different ownership changes, and McKinley, a high school senior who grew up on Main Street when her parents operated their own business. Both were happy that day to dole out samples of the many different ice creams

on tiny plastic spoons so the shoppers could make the best decision for their tastebuds.

Even local business leaders aren't immune to the shop's appeal. Lancaster admits, "You will often find me down there on a weekday afternoon stocking up on Bulls-Eyes, the danger of being within walking distance of all of those sweet treats."

SWEET HISTORY

The story of Opie's begins with Freddie and Carolyn Quesinberry, who returned to their Mount Airy hometown in 2004 after retirement. They chose a century-old building that had housed a shoe repair business for decades. After hours of restoring the 100-year-old building and researching old candies, they transformed it into a candy store that opened in March 2005.

The Quesinberrys built their business around authenticity — real candy varieties that had sustained corner stores and five-and-dimes for generations, displayed in traditional Montana glass jars with red lids that still line the shop's walls today. Carolyn was

remembered for her big smile and contagious personality, establishing customer service standards that subsequent owners work to maintain.

Following Carolyn's death in 2015, Freddie continued operating until around 2021, when Mark Schwartz, an Ohio tourist passing through on his way to Myrtle Beach, fell in love with Mount Airy and bought the business.

Neil Edlin's acquisition in March 2024 marked the beginning of the current chapter. The transition happened organically when Morrison casually asked Schwartz during a family visit, "Would you ever be interested in selling?"

"He just kind of looked at the ceiling, thought about it for a second and said, 'I hadn't thought about it, but yeah, let's talk,'" Morrison recounted.

LOOKING FORWARD

The physical transformation under new ownership honored the shop's candy-focused heritage while adapting to contemporary customer expectations. The removal of antique inventory created space for seating areas where families can linger over ice cream and conversation. The Montana glass jars with red lids, no longer manufactured, remained in place as both functional containers and nostalgic touchstones.

Preserving historical elements remained important throughout the renovation. "We have a lot of people who have been coming for many, many years and have pictures of their kids when they're 2 years old — their kids are 20 now and they still come back," Morrison says.
