Student-athletes across five counties convene at First Baptist Church in Mount Airy for the 2024 Best of Preps Banquet.

ore than 130 high schoolers, coaches, relatives and friends gathered in Mount Airy on May 21 to celebrate some of the best prep athletic performances of the year from a five-county region covered by APG Publishing's local community newspapers.

The annual Best of Preps gathering — put on by The Mount Airy News, Stokes News, Yadkin Ripple, Elkin Tribune, and The Carroll News in Virginia — recognizes the highest athletic achievements and performances of the past school year. Selected by sports writers from those papers, with input from area coaches and athletic directors, the Best of Preps highlights the best athletes in virtually all high school sports played in the five-county coverage area of those papers.

Mike Muse, Director of Player Relations and Community Service for Wake Forest men's basketball program, gave a stirring speech about GRACE - an acronym he preaches within the Demon Deacons' hoops program. Muse, who also served as Director of Basketball Operations at Wake under the late head coach Skip Prosser, as well as an assistant coach for Dino Gaudio, said GRACE stands for Gratitude, Respect, Accountability, Commitment and Enthusiasm.

"I want to remind you a bit tonight about who you are, where you came from and what is really important is you going forward because you are the best of the best. It's also important to remember of who much is given, much is expected," Muse said. "Grace is the path to our civility and our compassion, and you have to have civility and compassion to continue to be successful, to continue to be the leaders that you are on and off the court, on and off the field, in the classroom and in the community."

Muse said the G stands for Gratitude. None of the award-winning athletes in that room got where they are by themselves. Muse said along the way coaches, parents, teammates, teachers and people in the community helped each honored athlete in different shapes and forms.

"Make sure your are grateful for the people in your life that have made an impact to get you here. And when you leave tonight, take just a moment to thank those people who are important and special in your life," Muse said. "That phone call might mean the difference to them and you never know what kind of impact you might have back on them, so be full of gratitude. Be thankful. Have a readiness to show appreciation and to return the kindness that people have shown to you. Pay it forward. You got here. Give it back. Somebody is watching you."

The R in Grace stands for Respect,

Muse said, which means recognizing the work of a person or a thing. Respect is important and includes how you carry yourself and how you treat people. Muse told a story of a high school baseball coach who instilled respect into him after he struck out and slammed his bat to the ground and threw his helmet.

"The next day of practice he made me pick up my helmet, pick up my bat and I had to go up and down the football field times 25 times, throwing my helmet and chasing it, picking it up again until I was finished. Coach said, 'What did that helmet ever do to you?' You respect that equipment as part of respecting the game. Respect the people around you. Today in society it is going more and more by the wayside. Respect your parents. Don't treat them like something they are not. Honor your elders. That is important."

Badgett

PREMIER STUDENT-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY SHE WON:

Sadie Badgett was an accomplished three-sport athlete that earned All-

Conference honors every season. She was an impact player all four years of high school, and as a senior she helped all three teams to success they hadn't seen in uears.

Badgett did a little of everything for North Surry's volleyball team as an outside hitter. She posted 296 kills, 253 digs, 42 aces and 40 blocks. The Greyhounds won 17 games to tie the program's most wins in six seasons. Sadie was named

to both the All-Conference and All-Tournament teams, and helped North Surry to its first playoff victory in six uears.



Fast-forward to the spring and Badgett is competing in just her second-ever season of high school soccer. North Surry won just three games last season, but catapulted to 12 this year. It was just the program's second season winning double-digit games in at least 15 years. Sadie was second on the team with 14 goals and third with four assists.

The Greyhound senior made her biggest impact on the basketball

court where she helped North Surry to a 21-6 record, which was the second-most by the program in a decade. Badgett led North Surry in all

five major statistical categories by averaging 16 points, 5.3 rebounds, 3.2 assists, 4.1 steals and 1.2 blocks. She also scored her 1.000th career point this season. She was recognized as Foothills 2A Conference Player of the Year. a member of the N.C. Basketball Coaches Association's First-Team All-District, a Triad All-Star. and from this past basketball season, including will compete in the N.C. East-West All-Star Game.

MALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY HE WON:

Fisher Leftwich is a three-sport athlete that experienced both

individual success and team success across the board. He earned all-conference honors in all three sports – football, basketball and track – and helped two of those teams win conference championships.

Most recently, Leftwich was named Foothills 2A Conference Male Athlete of the Year for outdoor track. He won three individual conference championships in the 100-meter dash, long jump, and ran anchor in the 4x100meter relay. His 100 meters time of 10.97 seconds set a new school record, and the old record was set by Fisher two

weeks earlier. He also closed in on the long jump school record owned by multi-time state champion Jared Hiatt.

In football, Leftwich was the leading receiver on a North Surry team that won its first conference championship since 2017. He caught 44 passes for 658 yards and eight touchdowns. This included a combined 15 receptions across the team's conference championship victory and first-round playoff game. Leftwich also played

defensive back and led his team with nine pass break ups.

Fisher had a breakout year in basketball in which he also earned All-Conference honors. He and teammate Kam McKnight were the only two players that competed in more than two varsitu games the previous year, but the pair upheld North Surry's tradition of excellence by leading them to a third-straight conference championship and conference tournament Surry finished with an overall record of

Fisher averaged 14.4 points, 5.2 rebounds, 3.2 assists, 1.8 steals and 1.4 blocks while shooting 47% from the field. Fisher closed the season with his best performance of the year when he posted a stat line of 34 points, 11 rebounds, three assists, five steals and one block.

FEMALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY SHE WON:

The back-to-back Class 3 girls' basketball player of the year in Virginia, Carroll County's Alyssa Ervin is also a back-to-back winner of the Best of Preps' Female Athlete of the Year Award.

After helping lead Carroll County to back-to-back state championships in 2022 and 2023, Ervin averaged 33.5 points per game her senior season, the second-highest single-season scoring average in Virginia state history. Counting the VHSCA state player of the year award her sophomore season, Ervin has been named state player of the year three state seasons in girls' basketball. Carroll County's all-time leading scorer with 2,111 career points, Ervin also led Carroll in rebounding (7.9 per

game), steals (112) and blocks (31).

Basketball is only the start of Ervin's dynamic athletic prowess. This past fall she was also named Three Rivers District Player of the Year in volleyball after leading Carroll to a 16-8 record and the Region 3D playoffs. For the year, Ervin contributed 115.5 blocks (an average of 4.81 per night), 287 kills, 76 digs and 18 aces to also earn first-team all-region honors.

As a senior, Ervin also decided to take up track and field. By April 10 she had already helped set a new school record in the girls' 4x100 relay and had automatically qualified for the state meet in the high jump after clearing five feet.

Ervin will enroll at Elon University this fall on a full basketball scholarship.

WHY SHE WON:

In addition to being a three-sport athlete, Molly Swaim made an impact off the court/field as an outstanding member of her school and her community.

A standout on the basketball court for the Rams, Swaim led the Northwest 1A Conference in points per game with 14.6. She only finished with fewer than 10 points twice, and scored

a season-high 34 in a crucial win over Alleghanu. Swaim also led Starmount in rebounds [4.6]. assists (1.8) and steals (2.0).

In softball, Molly batted .423 with 33 hits and 32 runs scored. This included eight home runs and 15 doubles.

She was also an All-Conference selection in volleyball.

Swaim is just as involved off the field with her community as she is in athletics. She has volunteered at multiple events with her basketball team, including reading at area elementary schools,

churches and youth camps and clinics. Additionally, she helped shop and wrap gifts for a local familu in need, participated in Collide Church Blessing at Christmas time, and helped run multiple camps and clinics at both Starmount High and Forbush Elementaru.

Her coaches say Molly is always the first one to volunteer to do something for the community, school or athletic programs.

WHY HE WON:

lan Gallimore was the definition of a well-rounded student-athlete during his time at Mount Airy High School. He was a four-sport athlete that made his biggest impact on the football and haseball fields.

He was a two-way player on Mount Airy's 16-0 State Championship football team. He served as a dualthreat quarterback on an offense that finished No. 4 in state history for both yards rushing and total touchdowns. Ian didn't throw a single interception all season. He was also a captain on a lockdown defense that recorded nine shutouts and held opponents to fewer than six points per game. Gallimore finished No. 32 in the state with 141

tackles, and was voted Defensive MVP of the state championship game.

lan was also a starter on another historic team in the spring. He helped Mount Airy to a 26-3 season in which the team finished 1A West Regional Runner-up. This year's team broke a 93-year-old record for wins in a season, and tied a school record for consecutive wins.

Gallimore is a leader in the classroom as well. He's an Academic All-American with a 4.49 GPA, is Senior Class President, was inducted into both the National Honors Society and National Technical Honors Society, and is a member of organizations such as Young Life and

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MALE COMEBACK ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY HE WON:

South Stokes' Brady Clark missed his ninth grade year of playing soccer and basketball due to two ACL tears. He rebounded with an impressive sophomore year in both sports. He earned Northwest 1A All-Conference Honorable Mention in soccer from the defensive side of the ball but scored a goal and eight assists with limited time on the offense.

Brady was All-Conference in basketball helping his team to a 29-2 record, winning the Northwest 1A Conference and Tournament Championships, the Franks Spencer Holiday Classic Championship, and 1A West Regional Runner-ups. He averaged 10.5 points per game with 3.4 rebounds, 3.1 assists, 1.4 steals, and shot 41 percent from the 3-point line.

Clark is the recipient of the state-wide 2024 North Carolina Point Guard College (PGC) Heart of a Champion award. He earned a 5-day, 4-night PGC summer course that includes all meals and accommodation that is valued at \$1.295.

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FEMALE COMEBACK ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY SHE WON:

Ragan Hall was a multi-sport athlete her freshman year, but her spring softball season came to an abrupt halt when she suffered a broken ankle. Her injury required surgery, which kept her on the shelf during the summer, but she still attended team events and supported her teammates.

Despite Ragan's untimely injury, she remained positive and battled back to compete in three sports her sophomore year.

Hall participated in golf during the fall and earned All-Conference Honors. Even though she wasn't cleared to start jogging until October, Hall put the work in to be ready to go by basketball season. She saw the floor for each of Surry Central's first six games – during which the team went 5-1. Ragan then missed a month of action after undergoing a second surgery. She once again fought back to get into shape, and managed to play in a dozen games before the end of the season.

Hall returned to the softball field in the spring and played in almost every game. She even led her team and the entire conference in batting average.



FOOTBALL ATHLETE OF THE YEAR (DEFENSE)

WHY HE WON:

Deric Dandy helped lead Mount Airy to its second-consecutive 1A State Championship.

The senior spearheaded a lockdown


Granite Bears defense that that recorded nine shutouts, which tied a school record, and only allowed 5.6 points per game.

Dandy led the state with 49 tackles for a loss despite missing two games. He also only played the first half of most regular season games. He posted at least two tackles for a loss in all 16 of Mount Airy's victories, and this included three games – all in the playoffs – with five TFLs.

Dandy also finished the season with 12 sacks, which tied for No. 27 in the state among all classification, and 111 total tackles. He had a season-high 12 tackles in Mount Airy's 1A West Regional Championship victory at Robbinsville.

Dandy and the Granite Bears' defense shut down a powerful Tarboro offense in the teams' second-straight championship meeting. Tarboro, a team that averaged more than 44 points per game entering states, didn't score a touchdown for the first time in more than two years.

The Vikings only recorded 11 yards of total offense in the second half as the Bears recorded six tackles for a loss. Tarboro was held to 48 yards rushing after averaging more than 314

through its first 13 games.

Following the season, Dandy was selected for the Shrine Bowl of the Carolinas.

Deric finished his high school career with 311 total tackles, 31.5 sacks and 102 tackles for a loss.

He will continue his football career at Virginia Tech.

FOOTBALL ATHLETE OF THE YEAR (OFFENSE)

WHY HE WON:

Tyler Mason, a running back, led an explosive Mount Airy offense to its second-consecutive 1A State Championship.


The senior finished the season with 2,313 yards rushing, which ranked No. 3 in school history and No. 12 in the state this season. He led North Carolina and finished fourth in the entire country by averaging 13 yards per carry **(minimum 170)** carries). He was the leading rusher on a team that finished fourth in state history for yards rushing with 5,873.

Mason's 39 rushing touchdowns, 40 total touchdowns and 240 points scored all rank No. 2 in school history; he holds all three of those school records from his performance in the 2022 season.

Mason recorded 12 games of at least 100 yards rushing this season, including two games over 200 and a season-high 262 in a playoff game against Murphy.

Mason was named Most Valuable

Player of the 1A State Championship game for the second-consecutive year. He recorded 133 yards rushing and scored one touchdown, while Tarboro's entire team finished the game with 67 total yards and no

touchdowns.

Mason graduates with Mount Airy's career records for: yards rushing with 6,022, rushing touchdowns with 111, total touchdowns with 120, and points scored with 724.

He will continue his football career at Virginia Tech.

WHY HE WON:

West Stokes' Zeb Mathis earned Mid-State 2A Conference Runner of the Year in cross country with a school record of 16:32.83 during the conference meet. The junior finished third in the Midwest 2A Regionals at Fisher River Park, and sixth at the North Carolina High School Athletic Association 2A State meet that took place at the Ivey M. Redmon Sports Complex in Kernersville, N.C. He earned All-Region and All-State honors by finishing top 10 in both races.

Mathis helped led the Wildcats to their third consecutive conference championship, second as a team at the Midwest Regionals, and seventh at the 2A state meet.

WHY SHE WON:

West Stokes' Ruley Bowles earned her second Mid-State 2A Conference Runner of the Year award in cross country with a time of 20:25 during the conference meet at Dalton McMichael High School. The sophomore finished fourth at 2A Midwest Regionals at Fisher River Park, and was 17th during the North Carolina High School Athletic Association 2A State meet that took place at the Ivey M. Redmon Sports Complex in Kernersville, N.C. She earned All-Region with her top 10 finish at regionals.

Bowles helped led the Lady Wildcats to their seventh consecutive conference championship, third as a team at the Midwest Regionals, and 11th at the 2A state meet.

MEN'S SOCCER ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY HE WON:

Luke Creed received statewide recognition when he was voted onto the N.C. Soccer Coaches Association's 2A All-State team. He is the first Surry Central soccer player to receive All-State honors since 2019 and the fourth since 2010.

Creed made his mark as a forward for the Golden Eagles. The junior contributed to more than half of Surry Central's 80 goals this year by scoring 37 and assisting on another six.

Luke's 37 goals ranked No. 12 in the state among all classifications, and his 80 total points ranked No. 18. He had eight hat tricks on the year.

Creed scored in 14 of Surry Central's matches this season. Central was 11-2-1 in matches Creed scored, and 1-5-1 when he didn't.

In addition to his All-State selection, Creed was voted Foothills 2A Conference Offensive Player of the Year and was named to the NCSCA All-Region Team.

MEN'S SWIMMING ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY HE WON:

Jackson Graves won hardware at the conference, regional and state levels this season.

The North Surry senior was named Foothills 2A Conference

Male Swimmer of the Year. At the conference championship meet, Graves won gold in the 100yard butterfly with a time of 56.62 seconds and won the 100yard backstroke at 57.56. He also finished conference runner-up in the 200 freestule relay with teammates Liam Hazelwood, Ridge Reeves and Kameron Mauldin.

medal in the

Muse promised the athletes on hand that if they show respect to their coaches and athletic directors, those people will in turn "run through a wall for you and do anything they can."

"Too many people don't respect people anymore, so do that. The presence of respect means that you can accept somebodu even when they are different from you or they think different from you, and that is important. Everybody likes to hide social media and then disrespect people with no name. Be respectful every day," Muse said. "Take care of yourself. Take care of others. Be respectful of your teammates, of the equipment you are provided, of the fields you play on. When you leave the locker room of an opposing team, leave it cleaner than when you found it. When you walk into a person's classroom, be respectful of that teacher and know they worked hard on those lesson plans to give it back to you."

The A is for being accountable, Muse said, meaning be completely responsible for what you do and having a satisfactory answer for the reason you did it.

"When you say you are going to do something, do it. Be accountable. Don't wait for the coach to tell you to do it," Muse said. "And when you do it, do it to the best of uour abilities...We reallu preach this in our program. We want our players to be accountable for their teammates. Too often today you look and you see somebody doing something that you don't agree with, that goes against team rules that doesn't fit into where the goals of the team are, and you don't say anything. If you are the best of the best, which you are, then you are a leader. You stand up and you hold that teammate accountable. You get them out of trouble. You grab your arm around them and you get them headed in the right direction. That is part of being a good person, a successful person, and the best of the best. And you do it in a positive way."

C is for committed, Muse said, a word that has quickly gone by the wayside in college athletics with the advent of the transfer portal and NIL. Muse said you can't have one foot in the door and one foot out and still be committed.

"If you are looking at the next job or the next scholarship or the next play or where you can get more money...Skip Prosser told me this. You work with both feet in the door, you work the job you've got. You do it with your head down and you do it with everything you've got. You be committed to me and to this program and I promise you what will happen is you will get where you want to go," Muse said. "And you won't even have to toot your own horn because people will recognize you were committed and you did what you said you were going to do, and you were accountable as well."

And finally, Muse said do everything with enthusiasm, the last part of GRACE.

"If you can't show up every day and have some passion, and if you can't show up everuday and love what you do, then guit doing what you are doing and find something that you do love. You are going to be more successful, you are going to put yourself into everything and you are going to enjoy everything you got, so do it with some enthusiasm," Muse said. "Have compassion. Get up everuday and love what you do. Go do it to the best of your abilities. Have fun while you are doing it. Enjoy it. These awards tonight are part of your journey and I hope you enjoy it, but this isn't the end. For a lot of you it is a springboard to something else. So whatever it is that you do, whether it is college or another year of high school or you are going to work, do it with some enthusiasm."

After his remarks, members of the staffs of the five papers presented the athletes with awards, ranging from the top male and female athletes in each sport, to the overall top athletes, cheerleaders, coaches, comeback players, and others.

WHY HE WON:

The senior earned Mid-State 2A Player of the Year, North Carolina Basketball Coaches Association First Team All-District 11, third team All-State, All-County, and played in the East/West All-Star Game.

He averaged 26.7 points per game, 4.5 rebounds, 3.1 assists, 2.9 steals, and shot 39 percent from the 3-point line. He broke school records in single-game scoring with 47 points against state champion Reidsville, most career points with 1,943, single-season record of 796 points, career steals with 191, single-season steals with 88, and single-season free throw record of 11 made attempts.

Edmonds helped the Wildcats to a 22-8 record and to the third round of the state 2A playoffs. He will continue his basketball career next season at Converse University.




The men's wrestling team also won a conference title and posted a 23-2 record. Four wrestlers on the guys side won medals at the state meet,

WHY HE WON:

Gavin Maines did a little bit of everything for a Forbush team that won 25 games in 2024.

Maines, a left-handed pitcher, finished the year a perfect 9-0 on the mound. One of Maines' nine victories was a perfect game against Austintown-Fitch (Ohio) in a tournament at Myrtle Beach. The senior had 14 strikeouts and only had to throw 77 pitches in the 5-0 victory.

The perfect game was just one of many pitching highlights for Maines. According to MaxPreps, the Forbush senior tied for the most no-hitters in the nation with three. He also finished 24th in the nation with a 0.12 earned run average, and tied for 65th in the nation with 121 strikeouts.

At the plate, Maines recorded 38 hits and tied for 20th in the state with 39 runs scored. He also had 33 RBIs, 10 doubles, two triples and one home run. Maines finished the year with a .487 batting average, a .585 onbase percentage and a .705 slugging percentage.

Maines was named Foothills 2A Conference Player of the Year after leading Forbush to both the conference regular season and conference tournament championships. The Falcons outscored league opponents 150-19. Forbush earned the No. 4 seed in the 2A West and reached the Sweet 16 of the playoffs.

Maines will continue his baseball career at Western Carolina University.

WHY HE WON:

Andrew Meadows turned granite into gold during his first year at Mount Airy High School.

One year after finishing fifth in the 2A 16O-pound division, Meadows made a move to Mount Airy and captured the 1A 165-pound State Championship. The sophomore's title victory is the 12th in the Granite Bears' wrestling program since 2015. He finished the season with a 47-1 record.

In 48 matches this season, Meadows won: 36 via fall, six via forfeit and five via decision; three of his five decision victories were major decisions. Meadows pinned his opponent in five of his seven postseason matches across the conference, regional and state tournaments.

He suffered his only loss of the season to a wrestler from Pennsylvania in the championship match of the RJ

Reynolds Holiday Tournament. In addition to finishing runner-up at RJR, Meadows won in-season tournaments like the Craig White Invitational and Danny Linker Memorial Tournament.

Meadows began his postseason run to a state title by winning the Northwest 1A Conference 165-pound Championship. He was also named Most Outstanding Wrestler of the tournament.

Meadows went on to win the 165-pound title at the 1A West Regional tournament, where he won all four of his matches via fall. This included a 76-second win in the regional championship. Only one of his matches went into the second period.

Meadows defeated his first two

opponents at the 1A State Tournament via first-period fall, then won the state title by pinning Uwharrie Charter's Alek Millikan. Millikan led 4-2 entering the final period. Meadows scored a takedown to tie things up late in the period, then picked up the fall with just 23 seconds remaining.

Outside of school competition, Meadows earned All-American Honors

by finishing third in the Disney
Nationals and third in the Interstate

Hearl, a senior, was a four-time state qualifier for the Granite Bears. The N.C. High School Athletic Association held a women's wrestling invitational during Hearl's first three years, and she culminated her junior season by finishing state runner-up in the 100-pound weight class.

The 2023-24 school year was the first time North Carolina had a separate sanctioned NCHSAA Women's Wrestling State Championship Tournament, and Hearl

was determined to be part of it. She dominated opposing wrestlers during the regular season and only dropped two matches; both losses came in the Beast of the East National Tournament, She led the Bears to a 15-1 season to win the Northwest 1A Conference Team Championship, and was named both conference wrestler of the year and most outstanding wrestler of the conference tournament in the process. Jamie captured her 100th career win in the

conference championship match.

Hearl began postseason action by winning the 107-pound Midwest Regional Championship. She won all four of her matches via fall, and outscored tournament opponents 16-0 to be named the event's most outstanding wrestler.

At states, Hearl defeated her first two opponents via first-period fall. She faced a 24-1 wrestler in the semifinals that won the Mideast Regional Championship, but Hearl once again pinned her opponent in the opening period. Hearl finished state runner-up after dropping the championship match via 11-8 decision.

Outside of school wrestling, Hearl competed in tournaments across the country. She earned All-American Honors at events such as the Beast of the East Tournament in Delaware, Ohio Tournament of Champions and National High School Coaches Association (NHSCA) Nationals in Virginia.

Hearl was also named an NHSCA Academic All-American.

She will continue her wrestling career at Emmanuel University.

WOMEN'S OUTDOOR TRACK ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY SHE WON:

Aniya Edwards is quickly becoming one of the most accomplished track and field athletes Surry County has ever seen.

"Outstanding" may be the only word that can do Edwards' junior year justice, and that's the exact phrasing the N.C. High School Athletic Association (NCHSAA) used. She was recently named Most Outstanding Performer of the 1A Outdoor Track & Field State Championship after capturing three gold medals and one bronze. According to the NCHSAA record book, which dates 1986-present, Edwards is the first female from Elkin to win the MOP award.

Edwards' state titles came in the 100-meter dash, 200-meter dash and 400-meter dash. According to the NCHSAA record book, Edwards is the third female competitor in Surry County history to win three outdoor track state titles in the same year, joining: Surry Central's Sara White in both 1992 and 1993, and Surry Central's Jill Lawrence in 1994. White and Lawrence both won a title as part of a relay team, while Edwards won three individual titles.

She didn't just win though – she dominated. Aniya won the 400 meters with a time of 56.16 seconds. She won the event by more than three seconds, while the No. 2 through No. 10 finishers all finished within three seconds of each other. Edwards' time met the U.S. MileSplit Second Team Standard and set a new record for the 1A State Meet. She also holds the 1A

Midwest Regional record in the event.

Edwards won the 200 meters with a time of 24.50 seconds, which was .57 seconds ahead of the state runner-up. Edwards' time was .25 seconds behind a state record and met the U.S. MileSplit First Team Standard.

Edwards won the 100 meters for her third and final gold medal performance. The junior won the event with a time of 12.02, which met the U.S. MileSplit First Team Standard.

Edwards also ran on a 4x400-meter relay team that won a bronze medal.

In addition to her state and regional records, Edwards holds the Northwest

1A Conference outdoor records in the 100, 200 and 400 meters.

Aniya's three golds and one silver in outdoor track brought her junior year medal count up to seven. She won the indoor track 1A/2A Championships for the 55 meters and 500 meters in February, and both of her times met the U.S. MileSplit First Team Standard. Edwards also finished 1A/2A State Runner-up in the indoor 4x400-meter relay.

Edwards also holds conference records in indoor track for the 55, 300 and 500 meters.

Jennings posted a 37-5 individual record as a senior – 13-1 in doubles and 24-4 in singles. His only singles and doubles losses of the regular season came against Page.

Jennings went the singles route in the individual postseason. The senior won the Northwest 1A Conference Singles Championship, and was also honored as NW1A Conference Player of the Year. He went on to finish fourth at the 1A West Regional Championship, then dropped his opening match of the state tournament to the eventual champion.

Elkin finished the season 19-1 in dual team competition, and the team's only loss came against 4A Page High School. The Elks won 141 individual matches while surrendering 24, and only 14 of those losses were against fellow 1A teams.

Elkin had an overall record of 67-7 during Jennings' four years with the program. The Elks won the 1A State Championship in both 2023 and 2024, and finished 1A West Regional Runner-up in 2022.

Elkin finished 14-0 in 2021, but the season didn't feature dual team playoffs due to COVID.

Marion was the No. 1 seed on a Mount Airy squad that won its third-straight 1A Dual Team State Championship. She was 25-0 in singles competition and was voted both Northwest 1A Conference Player of the Year and MVP of the 1A Dual Team State Championship.

In Mount Airy's 25 dual team wins this season, the Bears won 190 individual matches while only losing eight. Only one team — 4A R.J. Reynolds — took more than one individual match from Mount Airy, and that was in the season opener. Beginning with a Sept. 19 match against South Stokes, Mount Airy closed the season by winning 100 of 101 individual matches — including a streak of 89-straight.

Mount Airy is 68-1 in dual team matches during Marion's tenure as a Granite Bear.

In the individual postseason, Marion finished State Runner-up in doubles with partner Ella Brant. Marion and Brantwere 24-3 as a team, and both girls were recognized on the N.C. High School Coaches Association's 1A All-State Team.

WOMEN'S INDOOR TRACK ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

WHY SHE WON:

Ella Riggs won three track & field state medals this year to bring her high school total up to seven.

Riggs captured her first indoor track state championship and second state title overall in February. The North Surry junior won the 1A/2A Shot Put Title with a mark of 36-08.50 feet, which topped the state runner-up by seven inches and the third place finisher by more than two feet. She is just the fourth North Surry athlete to win an indoor track state championship.

Riggs went on to win two medals at the 2A Outdoor Track State Meet in May. She was shot put state runnerup with a mark of 38-00.25 feet, just 2.5 inches behind the state champion, and won a bronze medal in discus throw with a mark of 120-09. She met the MileSplit U.S. Second Team Standard in both events.

The 2023-24 school year wasn't the first in which Riggs won three state medals.

As a sophomore, Riggs finished 1A/2A State Runner-up in shot put at the indoor championship. She posted a mark of 35-00.50 feet. She went on to win the 2A Outdoor Shot Put State Championship that spring with a mark of 40-05, then finished state runner-up in discus throw at the same meet with a mark of 109-11.

Before her run of state titles, Ella opener her high school track career by winning an indoor bronze medal for shot put as a freshman.

WHY SHE WON:

Carroll County's Ashlyn Newman assaulted the Carroll County record book in 2024, setting new school records for goals in a game (six, twice), goals in a season (39), and goals in a career (86).

Newman became just the second Cavalier in school history to record 50 career goals in Carroll County's second match of the season. It would serve as an omen for the rest of the year as she went on to accumulate 39 goals and five assists as the team finished with a 13-4 record and third in Region 3D.

Newman broke the school's all-time goals record on April 20 with her 72nd career goal against Alleghany, a game in which she tied two more of her own school records for most goals in a game (six) and points in a game (12).

Newman graduated first out of her class of 232 students with a weighted GPA of 4.7. She has also already graduated with an Associates Degree in Applied Science from Wytheville Community College with a 4.0 GPA.

Newman will enroll at Liberty University in the fall with plans of joining the ministry after college.

WHY SHE WON:

Sophie Welborn put a bow on her accomplished high school swimming career by earning three medals at the 1A/2A State Championship Meet.

Welborn's performance at the state meet was highlighted by a state runner-up finish in the 50-yard freestyle. She posted a time of 23.97 seconds, which was just .57 seconds behind the state champion, and had the highest finish of any 1A competitor.

Welborn earned two more podium finishes as a part of relay teams. She teamed with Sarika Hatcher, Morgan Wiles and Elissa Dickerson to finish third in the 200-yard freestyle relay with a time of 1:44.97. She then teamed with Hatcher, Wiles and Paloma Oliveri to take fourth in the 400-yard freestyle relay with a time

of 3:53.34.

Welborn and teammates Hatcher, Wiles and Mya Brown finished just off the podium in the 200-yard medley relay with a time of 1:58.10.

Elkin finished fifth overall in the state competition, which was the highest of any 1A team. Elkin also had the highest finish of any 1A team in all four of Welborn's events.

Welborn graduates with more than a dozen state medals, including seven state championships as a part of relay teams.

Sophie won two regional championships and had two regional runner-up finishes this season.
She was also named Northwest 1A
Conference Female Swimmer of the Year — an honor she also won in 2022.

She will continue her swimming career at Catawba College.



Bella Hutchens walked into East Surry's volleyball program during the shortened 2020-21 season, in which the team only played 11 matches but finished 9-2. That season was just a teaser of the next three seasons of domination.

Beginning with her sophomore season, Hutchens helped lead East Surry to three-straight conference regular season championship, three-straight conference tournament championships, three-straight Elite Eight appearances in the 2A State Playoffs and an overall record of 75-9. During that three-year span, East Surry went 36-0 against conference

opponents and Hutchens was named Foothills 2A Conference Player of the Year in two of those seasons.

As a senior, Hutchens racked up 432 kills, which ranked No. 12 in North Carolina among all classifications. She was one of only two players in the state to record at least 430 kills with a .387 hitting percentage. She had a kill percentage of 51.9%.


Hutchens also recorded 59 aces, 53 blocks and 222 digs.
