Community & volunteer activities




a meaningful place to call home. Butte vs. Everybody!

It is my dream one day to use my Masters of Social Work to create a mental health program that will help the youth in our community transition out of high like I did.

Occupation

I am the owner and operator of Raven 3-D printing and design, utilizing my education and practical experience from college. I run seven 3-D printers nearly full-time, as well as design products for myself and others (including industrial clients), provide full machine repairs, and teach printing skills.

I am also a substitute teacher in the Whitehall district.

Community & volunteer activities

I have volunteered for a lot of organizations, one of which is the Montana Youth Leadership Forum for disadvantaged young folks, where I was once a participant. Most of the credit goes to my late dad. Robbie Lochrie – a man who faced more hardships yet still carried the kind of generosity that would make him give the shirt off his back to a stranger. He taught me that kindness, empathy, gratitude, and paying it forward aren't just values, they're a way of life. His favorite saying, "Someone, somewhere is happy with less than you have," still guides me today. From him, I learned that the greatest wealth or legacy isn't money, but the friendships, laughter, and the good you leave behind.

Through his volunteer work as a firefighter my dad witnessed the tragic death of a newborn caused by a house fire. That moment transformed his service into prevention work, launching a youth fire safety education program as the department's mascot clown, Seymour Safety. Traveling around Montana and appearing at local events, schools, and fundraisers with the slogan "Stop, Drop, and Roll," his mission was to ensure no community suffered a preventable tragedy again. Seymour Safety made sure every newborn went home from the hospital with a smoke detector. He even traveled all the way to Washington, D.C., in a fire truck to accept a congressional award.






