NOMENCLATURE

A reminder to please ask for what you want when you buy film. Some folks are still confusing Kodachrome with Kodacolor. Understandably a person is upset when he puts down a roll of Kodachrome and says: "One print of each, please." Or a cartridge of Kodacolor and says: "Please develop these into slides." They no doubt know what they WANT, but they used the wrong film. Forget the first part of each trade name, "Koda" and concentrate on the last part. True, both are color films. But any film which ends in "chrome" is a transparency film, processed into slides for projecting on a screen or looking at in a viewer.

Films ending in "color" indicate a color negative film which produces prints.

If you should forget the above, ask us at Highland Drug Center for either color print film or color slide film in the appropriate size and we'll come up with what you want.

The natural tendency on receiving something other than what you thought you were getting is to refuse to pay for it. Well, let's look closer into this matter, which has two sides. The processor hardly can be blamed when he properly processes film sent to him. Since the chrome and color formulae are incompatible, they dare not do ought but process each in its own solutions. And wouldn't it be something if someone in the lab had the presumption to decide that THIS party didn't want slides from the slide film that he sent in?

Your dealer cannot be so presumptuous, either. We send in what you give US, and as the middle man we don't feel we are responsible if you used the wrong kind of film. So — it behooves the user to ask for what he wants when he buys his FILM.

BATTERIES

Had the batteries in your flashgun or camera checked lately? Bring them in to Highland Drug Center and we will be glad to test them. If you don't anticipate taking flash pictures for a while, take the batteries out. If they should be dead or nearly so it's a lot easier to clean up a leaky mess outside the camera or flash unit than inside it. And while you are at it, make sure the contacts are clean. Alkaline batteries, while long lasting, exude a vapor that forms on battery ends and contacts and causes an insulating effect, thus causing flash failure. And yet the battery power may be way up there but it can't get through the insulating effect. Takes less than two minutes to clean battery ends and contacts, and you won't miss a shot.

Minnesota Heart Ass'n Seeks Young Scientists

John L. Juergens, M.D., Rochester, President of the Minnesota Heart Association, announced today that applications are now available for two months of study at either the Mayo Graduate School of Medicine or the University of Minnesota, through the MHA high school summer fellowship program.

For the 11th year, the Minnesota Heart Association is offering to Minnesota high school juniors and seniors who have demonstrated a high interest and aptitude in science an opportunity to apply for a summer in a research laboratory.

Twenty students will be chosen and assigned projects with heart researchers. In addition, they will be awarded a \$400.00 stipend. Students selected from outside of the Twin Cities or Rochester areas will be given an additional \$200.00 for room and board.

Dr. Juergens said, "The Minnesota Heart Association realizes if the present trend continues, the lack of qualified researchers will soon become the greatest danger to continued advances in heart research. The Minnesota Heart Association sponsors the high school summer fellowship program to allow outstanding students to experience the thrill and challenge of medical research in the hope that the young scientists will decide to devote their lives to helping in the fight against heart disease."

Those interested in applying should consult their high school counselor or write the Minnesota Heart Association, 1821 University Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota 55104.

Deadline for applications is April 1, 1968 and notification of the scholarship awards will be made by April 30, 1968.

The summer fellowship program is made possible through contributions to the Heart Fund Drive which is conducted during Heart Month in February.

New Highland Park State Bank



Officers and employees of the Highland Park State Bank in St. Paul are planning a shift in operations to their quarters during April, 1968, as work on the new \$220,000 building progressed to the first floor level. In making this statement, R. E. Stevenson, Executive vice-president, pointed out that in addition to the expanded interior facilities, a new service, motorized banking will be available to their patrons. This will be provided by drive-up windows, and coin and night depositories on the east side of the bank.

The new structure, on the SW corner of Kenneth Street and Ford Parkway in the Highland Center, has been designed by

Dykens-Handford, Inc., Architects. It is a classic contemporary concept and will be 61x87 feet, one story building constructed of re-inforced concrete and concrete block. Some of the exterior features will be tinted strip windows delineated with black panels on the east side, full glass treatment at the front and white columns of aggregate on all sides will point up the classic approach.

A door of larger than usual dimensions on the south, will permit sizeable items to be brought inside for the unique window showcase facing Ford Parkway. This will be a public service in the first floor lobby to display products produced in Highland Park and St. Paul.

Eight tellers with expansion space for 3 additional tellers, a private office, an area for officers and secretarial personnel and a closing room, will also be located on the first floor level. A wide staircase, centered in the main lobby, will be constructed of oak treads without solid risers. The treads, fully

carpeted, will be cantilevered from a central tubular spine. This staircase will be the main access to the lower lobby.

Plans for this space include bookkeeping rooms, employees lounge and dining room, safe deposit vault, public telephones and rest rooms and a combination customer's director room. A customer's service window to the bookkeeping rooms will be located at the foot of the stairs.

Ron Bacigalupo's COLUMN

(Taken from notes on a speech to the downtown Kiwanis, recently.)

"Assuming then, that our city needs a savior, that the usual cries of graft, inefficiency and nepotism in City Hall are, in fact, understatements, and that the taxpayer is, indeed, overburdened, I, Ron Bacigalupo, am officially—and, with great suspicion concerning my ultimate fate—filing for the office of mayor in the city of St. Paul." (Roaring approval from the multitude of relatives, friends and creditors gathered in the hall as the candidate begins the heart of his basic ten minute speech.)

Balloons are released, red, white and blue, saying 'B-4-Bacigalupo and a hundred pretty girls swarm the hall tossing confetti and dancing and hugging elderly gentlemen in the aisles. The speaker returns to his text, a gavel pounds, the frenzied outburst is quieted, all wait, breathless, for the next word.)

"Thank you, for what can only be described humbly as the most spontaneous outburst of true political conviction in our City's history. And, I'd like to leave you with this . . . as soon as my opponent finishes taking speech lessons from the marble Indian, we'll no doubt hear something from City Hall. But all of us gathered here tonight, in solemn dedication, know better than to believe a word of it, and in that knowledge, and with our firm purpose thus resolved, we know the full meaning of that great prophet who proclaimed for all mankind, that, indeed, 'the future lies ahead.' Citizens, and yes, I also call you people—nothing, as the Chamber of Commerce so succinctly reminds us, that we have ever done in the past, will ever be good enough again!"

Actually, it's a picture of Dean Meredith before he knew the meaning of the word, "pressure." Whoever runs should find wide open spaces in the middle of the road. Byrne and Butler are waiting as anxiously as you and I so they can choose between scalpels and sledgehammers. They should be about their business because Charlie Ardvark might knock either one of them out of the primary according to early vote samples. That is if old Charlie boy gets down and files! The incumbents on the Council, with the exception of Tedesco are digging in deeper than the Marines at the DMZ. Dalgish's promised investigation of the welfare department has failed to materialize, and Bud Holland's reportedly boiling over all that air-pollution publicity he's not getting from the local Gazette. Two for sure, and maybe three of these tiresome creatures won't have to worry about such things after April.

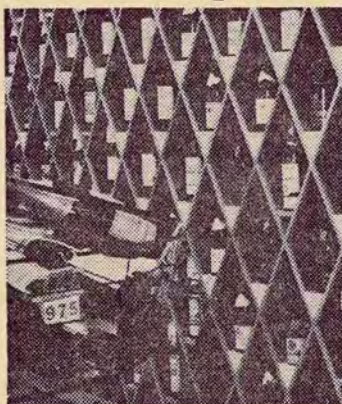
