Civic Ass'n to Sponsor Mother of Year Contest; Youngsters Write "Why"

Clarence Barr, president of the Highland Civic Association, announced today that members of the association will sponsor a 1959 Highland Park Mother of the Year contest.

Entries will be accepted from youngsters starting at six years of age up to 18-year old teenagers. The contest will be judged on originality and sincerity in answering, in 25 words or less, "I feel my Mother should be Highland Park Mother of the Year because..."

A boy's or girl's bicycle will be presented to the youth submitting the winning entry.

Ed Berg, vice president of the Highland Civic association, announced that the mother chosen will be honored at a special dinner for her family at Lee's Village Inn in Highland.

"The contest is open to residents of the general Highland Park shopping area," President Barr said, "and entries may be sent by post card or letter to the Highland Villager, 26 Inner Drive, St. Paul."

"Youngsters may submit as many entries as they wish," Mr. Barr said.

The contest will close on Saturday, May 16. The winning entry will be announced in the Highland Villager on Thursday, May 21st.

Mental Health Bell Ringing Night, Tuesday; Volunteers Will Visit All Highland Homes

Three Highland Village area chairmen of the 1959 Mental Health Bell Ringer campaign this week will be completing organizational plans for the one-night house to house campaign for funds to fight mental illness on Tuesday, Bell Ringer Night. The three chairmen are Mrs. George M. Thell, Jr., 998 Scheffer, Ward 5; Mrs. E. J. Fuller, 1008 Fairmount, Ward 7; Mr. and Mrs. Franklin Smith, 2123 Stanford Ave., Ward 11, north half; and Mrs. R. Simerson, 1704 Beechwood Ave., Ward 11, south half.

Working with the three chairmen are 58 captains who will direct the fund raising activities of the Highland Village volunteer Bell Ringers as part of the campaign for funds by 10,000 Bell Ringer volunteers in the Twin City Metropolitan Area.

Between 7 and 9 p.m. Tuesday, volunteers will visit every home in the community, soliciting contributions for the 1959 Mental Health fund campaign. Contributors become voting members of the Minnesota Association for Mental Health, a non-profit, volunteer organization, as well as of the National Association for Mental Health.

Mrs. R. K. Hance, 1510 Fulham St., St. Paul Metropolitan Area Bell Ringer, chairman of the 1959 campaign, said Bell Ringers derive their name from the symbol of the citizen's mental health crusade — a bell cast of melted down handcuffs, leg bands and other metal restraints formerly used as "treatment methods" in mental institutions. Now the Mental Health Bell symbolizes progress made in treatment of hospitalized mental patients.

Contributions are used to expand the statewide program of the MAMH in research into cause and treatment of mental illness, rehabilitation of discharged patients, improved treatment of those still hospitalized and ex-

pansion of community facilities for early detection.

Mrs. Hance reported that 11,000 Minnesotans are now hospitalized with mental illness and that an additional 300,000 state residents need psychiatric help.

St. Paul Public Schools Open Drive For Educational Television Fund

The St. Paul public schools will conduct a campaign seeking supplementary funds to help finance operation of the Twin City area educational television station, KTCA, Channel 2, for the remainder of its second year of programing, Superintendent Forrest E. Conner said today.

The fund drive, to be conducted through elementary and secondary school PTA's and students during the week of May 11, follows similar drives already completed in the Twin-City area suburban schools, Minneapolis public schools and Mankato and North Mankato systems.

"In conducting this drive, we are acting only as an agent for the station," Dr. Conner points out. "We, of the St. Paul schools, and others participating in the campaign feel that in so doing we are providing a service to our communities."

According to John C. Savage, KTCA chairman of the fund drive, the total cost of operating KTCA-TV this year will be \$226,500. Unlike commercial stations that receive income from advertising, support must come in part from those who provide programs and from communities generally using the facility. Approximately 75 per cent of the cost is paid by institutions presenting programs, such as the St. Paul and Minneapolis public schools, The University of Minnesota, Minnesota private colleges, and other civic and cultural groups. Until the station is on a full-time broadcasting schedule, the remaining 25 per cent must come from public contributions.

In a campaign conducted last fall, some \$34,000 was raised, Mr. Savage points out. This leaves a total of \$26,000 to be raised by public contributions in this current "clean-up" effort.

During the week-long drive, public school children will bring home literature about the station accompanied by contribution envelopes to be returned to school for delivery to KTCA-TV.

Minnesota's first educational television station, KTCA-TV — there are 36 throughout the nation — began operations in Sept. 1957, and already is ranked as one of the top four such stations in the country in terms of program quality and viewer interest. The St. Paul schools have played an important part in its success — several of their program series

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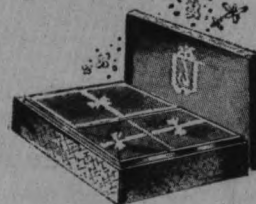
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
