S. Walter Sears, President of Mono-Trade Company, is serving as general chairman by unanimous vote of the group, because of the excellent leadership provided on the fund for the new sanctuary a few years back, according to Dr. George A. Butter, pastor.

Dr. Alexander Stewart, a representative of the Department of Finance and Field Service of the Board of Mission of the Methodist Church is giving general direction to the canvass all this week.

Work on the extensive remodeling job has already been started and plans are to move in by November or December. On September 22, around 100 volunteer visitors will be calling at the homes of approximately 375 families of the church to explain the remodeling program and to receive pledges.

The High Holy Days

The most solemn period in the Jewish religious calendar began Wednesday evening, September 25. Religious services throughout the nation and the world on that evening inaugurate the Rosh Hashanah Festival, first of the High Holy Days—the name given to this ten-day period.

Rosh Hashanah means literally "head of the year," and the holy day is referred to as the Jewish New Year. The ten-day span, "Days of Penitence," ends on October 4th with Yom Kippur, literally "day of atonement." According to legend, this Rosh Hashanah marks the 5718th year since the Creation.

The High Holy Days are devoted to religious self-examination, and efforts at spiritual inventory. In home and synagogue, with prayer and meditation, Jews measure their lives against the yardstick of God's ethical and moral commandments. Congregational prayers stress the Jewish belief in man's capacity for spiritual betterment, and petition God's help in leading a life of justice, mercy and good deeds. Typical of the prayers which express this basic Jewish concept is this passage from the Union Prayerbook: "O that the year now begun may be for me a new year indeed; new in consecration of purpose and in renewal of earnestness and sincerity; steadfast in rejecting all that is unworthy of me and my heritage. Grant me strength of will to live as Thou wouldst have me live."

Rosh Hashanah occurs, oddly enough, not on the first day of the calendar year, but rather in the seventh month of the Jewish calendar. Thus is emphasized the idea of a spiritual, rather than a secular new year, a time to examine the spiritual record of the past and to resolve to do better in the year to come. The sounding of the ram's horn, or Shofar, is a summons to the conscience to awaken and to heed the call to duty, to struggle against the forces of evil in our hearts and in the world. Many Jews fast on Yom Kippur Day as a means of expressing a contrite heart, and to give to the day special meaning and atmosphere. But tradition insists that atonement be accompanied by deed and action, to set wrong to right and to improve the lot of all mankind.

Petitions of forgiveness (the most famous of which is the Kol Nidre Prayer); prayers of thanksgiving; hymns of aspiration; supplications for the betterment of society, and for peace and harmony amongst all men—these constitute the liturgy of the High Holy Days. And a central theme of this holiest of Jewish holidays requests: "O Lord, our God, let Thy presence be manifest to us in all Thy works, that reverence for Thee may fill the hearts of all Thy creatures. May all the children of men come before Thee in humility and unite to do Thy will with perfect heart. May all acknowledge that Thine are power, dominion and majesty, and that Thy name is exalted above all."

Council of Churches Training Course Starts Monday in Highland

The St. Paul Council of Churches' annual leadership training schools will open in three of the neighborhood areas on September 23 and in a fourth on September 30, it was announced today by Mrs. T. S. Mondale, chairman of the Council's leadership education committee. "The schools have been held continuously for 39 years," she said, "and are expected this year to serve again about 300 church school teachers in the Greater St. Paul area."

A total of 23 classes have been set up in the four schools to assist the army of volunteer church workers who staff the church schools of the 50,000-member constituency of the St. Paul Council of Churches. In the past years some individual churches have enlisted as many as 35 of their workers in these training sessions.

Classes are held on Monday nights only, from 7:30 to 9:30, and all adjourn with a final session on October 28.

The location of the school in the Macalester-Highland Park Area is Macalester Presbyterian Church, Macalester and Lincoln. It opens Monday. Dean is The Reverend Charles Dierenfeld.

Courses include Jesus and His Teachings, The Use of the Bible with Children, Teaching Nursery, Teaching Juniors, Teaching Kindergarten Children and Teaching Adults.

The courses offered in the St. Paul Council of Churches' leadership training schools conform to the standards and content of the curriculum outlined and approved by the co-operating denominations acting through the Division of Christian Education of the National Council of Churches.

To partially offset the expense of offering these schools, a registration fee of \$1 per person will be charged.

Advance registration is encouraged, as it will expedite the starting of the classes on the opening night.

Registration will also be accepted at the opening of the classes. Those planning to register in this way should come early on the opening night.
