Midwest Sisterhoods Convention Opens Sunday in Twin Cities

The Midwest Federation of Temple Sisterhoods will hold its second biennial convention in the Twin Cities starting Sunday evening and continuing through Monday and Tuesday. The forty-three Reform Sisterhoods of Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota and North Dakota will send delegates representing over 14,000 Sisterhood members.

"Social Action" is the theme of the convention. All sessions will accent the positive in religion, education, culture and community service.

THE SISTERHOODS of Duluth, Fargo and Minneapolis will be hostesses at the informal reception for the visitors on Sunday evening at the Nicollet Hotel. Mt. Zion Temple Sisterhood will be hostess to the delegates at a social hour preceding the banquet in Margolis Hall Monday evening. Albert Vorspan, director of the Commission on Social Action of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, will address the group. Mr. Vorspan is a native of St. Paul, and is co-author with Rabbi Eugene J. Lipman of "Justice and Judaism," a guide to Jewish ethics.

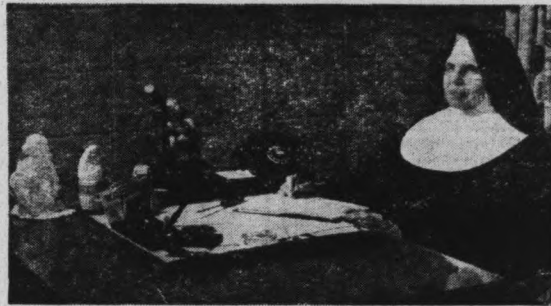

Sister Anna Marie, O.S.J. will be honored by the Highland Park Knights of Columbus Council No. 4470 at a breakfast following corporate communion at the 8:30 Mass at Church of St. Gregory The Great, 1640 Montreal Ave., on Palm Sunday, March 30.

Sister Anna Marie established Christ Child School in St. Paul in 1948. At that time no Catholic education was provided for brain injured children.

In 1950 property was obtained at 2078 Summit Avenue and the new school quarters opened for classes October 5, 1955, to all brain injured children regardless of color, religion or race.

JUNE 6, 1958 will complete 10 years of Christ Child School's existence and operation during which time a number of children have been rehabilitated and proven their ability to learn the rudiments of the three R's, achieve employment in sheltered workshops, and in several instances achieve self-sustaining salaries under supervision.

The curriculum of Christ Child School follows somewhat of a normal school pattern in religion and the three R's but always at the child's rate of progress. Daily speech therapy and self expression are rewarding but require tedious and prolonged effort on the part of the teachers.

SISTER ANNA MARIE in her wheel chair directs activities in eight classrooms and a speech therapy and self expression room. Sheltered workshops for vocational training are sought for the children of Christ Child School when they complete their sixteenth year.

Along with members of Highland Park Council 4470 will be members of the Ravoux General Assembly, Fourth Degree, K. of C. with about 175 expected to attend. Stanley R. Manske, treasurer, Highland Council, is general chairman.

seven regions in the state which hold similar science fairs. Winners of blue ribbons in regional fairs are permitted to exhibit and compete for further honors at the annual meeting of the Minnesota Junior Academy of Science Fair on May 2 at Bemidji.

THE TWIN CITY fair has grown each year. In 1956 at Macalester there were 216 science and math exhibits entered. Last year at Hamline there were 336 exhibits and some 5000 visitors. The St. Thomas armory is being readied to accommodate 550 exhibits if necessary.

Only individual exhibits may be entered by students in senior high schools. Students in junior high schools may enter group exhibits or individual ones. All exhibits are example of work developed by students under the direction of teachers or other interested sponsors. They are designed to show a scientific principle, a laboratory procedure, or an industrial development.

The science fairs were instituted to stimulate student interest, motivate discoveries, provide means to exhibit, recognize talented youths, and to encourage further work in the fields in college and industry.

ALL EXHIBITS are judged on the basis of creative ability, scientific thought, thoroughness, clarity and dramatic value, and technical skill.

Grades 7 and 8 may enter in the field of general science and math. Grade 9 students may enter in the biological, physical, mathematical or other sciences. Grades 10, 11, and 12 may be in the fields of biology, chemistry, math, physics, or other sciences such as astronomy conservation, research science or social science. Application should be made through local science teachers.

Demonstrations using animals must be made with the approval of the fair committee. Full safety regulations must be met.

VISITORS may view the exhibits from 9 a. m. until 2:30 p. m. Judging will continue during that time.

Chairman for the Twin Cities Regional Science Fair committee is Dr. Paul J. Germann, chairman of the biology department at St. Thomas.

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College Career Festival Set for Next Week At St. Thomas Armory

Dates for the fourth annual Career Festival were announced this week at the College of St. Thomas. Ray G. Mock, general chairman, set March 25, 26 and 27 for the Festival designed to offer vocational guidance to the young people of this area. This year's Festival hours in the St. Thomas armory will be from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. Tuesday and Thursday, and until 9 p. m. on Wednesday.

Career Festival is again sponsored by the College of St. Thomas with the cooperation of Augsburg College, Bethel College, the College of St. Catherine, Hamline University and Macalester College.

Over 60 thousand high school and college students and other visitors have attended the first three Career Festivals. One hundred exhibitors representing all the major employment fields will staff booths and use films, literature, and conferences to answer career questions. Personnel representatives from business, industry, government, and the professions will staff the booths.

Career Festival has three purposes: (1) To offer a general approach to the major employment fields to those with few or no career ideas. Tickets may be obtained by the members of the senior class or at the door.

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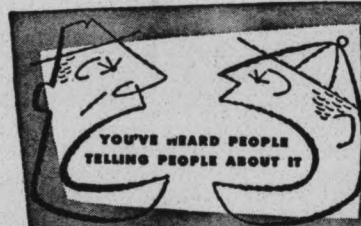

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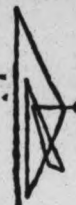
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Jewish Family Life Discussion Series

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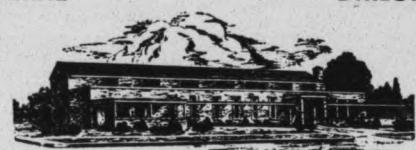
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Highland Woman Observes 100th Birthday March 4

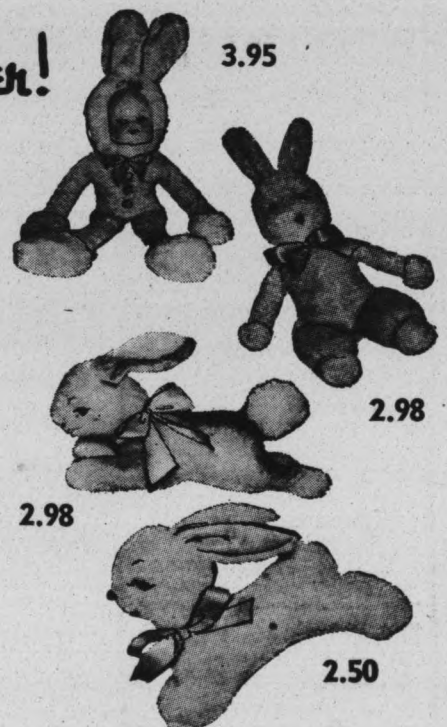
