JUNE 6, 1958 will complete 10 years of Christ Child School's existence and operation during which time a number of children ha ve been rehabilitated and proven their ability to learn the rudiments of the three R's, achieve employment in sheltered workshops, and in several instances achieve self-sustaining salaries under supervision.

Grades 7 and 8 may enter in the field of general science and math. Grade 9 students may enter in the field of general science and math. Grade 9 students may enter in the biological, physical, mathematical or other sciences. Grades 10, 11, and 12 may be in the fields of biology, chemistry, math, physics, or other sciences such as astronomy conservation, research science or social science. Application s hould be made through local science teachers.

Demonstrations using animals must be made with the approval of the fair committee. Full safety regulations must be met.

VISITORS may view the exhibits from 9 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. Judging will continue during that time.




