Jewish Community Center Rent Mount Zion Rooms For Expanded Program

Because the Jewish Community Center needs additional facilities available in the afternoons and early evenings, it has arranged to rent Mount Zion Temple meeting rooms for one afternoon and one evening a week to provide a new and expanded program for children and young teenagers.

Beginning on Tuesday afternoons in mid November, the Center will offer children in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades, a variety of cultural activity classes. While the exact programs will depend on responses of parents who were mailed questionnaires this week, such activities as creative dramatics, interpretive dancing, jewelry making, and hobby craft, puppetry, art, and individual or group piano lessons will be provided.

Extending its program for 6 and 7 year olds, the Jewish Community Center now has nine activity groups for boys and girls ages 6 and 7, meeting once a week in four schools and homes.

The four schools in which groups are now operating include: Horace Mann, Homecroft, Groveland, and Highland.

Each group consists of 12-15 boys or girls who meet from 3:30 to 5:00 p. m. Each group has two experienced leaders who help the children with crafts, games, outings, sports, and story telling. Both Jewish and general program material is included.

Aside from openings in two groups, registration for all groups is now closed; but parents who are still interested should contact Miss Susan Muenzer at the Center so that childrens names can be placed on a waiting list.

Carlos Montoya, World-Famed Flamenco Guitarist, Featured on U Artists Course Program Monday

Carlos Montoya, regarded by many as the world's greatest Flamenco guitarist, will be presented in recital in Northrop Memorial Auditorium at the University of Minnesota on Monday, November 9, at 8:30 p. m. The appearance here will be the opening concert on the University Artists Course—Celebrity Series.

A native of Madrid, Montoya followed in the footsteps of an uncle who in his time was one of the most popular Flamenco guitarists of Spain. By the time young Montoya was fourteen, he was already embarked on a career that would earn him tributes from concert audiences throughout the world.

Herbert J. Muller, Author, Professor to Speak to Unitarians

Dr. Herbert J. Muller, author, lecturer and scholar, has accepted the invitation of First Unitarian Society of Minneapolis to deliver the annual Dietrich Memorial Lecture. His lecture, "The State of Western Civilization," will be given in the auditorium of First Unitarian Society, Saturday evening, November 14 at 8 p. m. The lecture is free.

Dr. Muller is author of the recent best-seller, *The Loom of History*. Among his other books are *The Uses of the Past*, *The Spirit of Tragedy*, and *Science and Criticism*. He is professor of English and Government at the University of Indiana. A new book, *Issues of Freedom*, will be published next year.

Ebony Fashion Fair, All-Negro Style Show At Auditorium Dec. 2

One of the nation's most ambitious all-negro productions—the Ebony Fashion Fair—will make its only Twin City appearance it was announced today.

The revue, featuring 14 professional negro models, will be staged in the theatre section of the St. Paul auditorium on Wednesday evening, December 2, at 8 p. m., according to Mrs. U. G. Coram and Mrs. William L. West, co-chairmen.

The sparkling show, with \$100,000 worth of the latest women's and men's creations from the fashion centers of England, France, Italy and the U. S., is being sponsored by two St. Paul churches, Pilgrim Baptist and St. Phillips Episcopal.

Proceeds are earmarked for youth work in the Rice-Lexington community, on a non-sectarian basis.

Now in its second year of production, the Ebony Fashion Fair played 28 cities during the 1958 tour, drawing praises from critics as one of the smartest fashion shows ever to tour the country. The show was extended this year, with 51 scheduled appearances in 31 states.

The 14 models (including two male models) are this year exhibiting twice as many creations, all "originals" from the shops of top designers in London, Paris, Florence and Rome.

Spotlighting the theme, "The Big Wide Wonderful World of Fashion," the two-hour revue includes eight colorful scenes in two acts, based on fashion wear for all occasions.

Unlike the classic guitar, of which the greatest exponent is Andres Segovia, the art of the Flamenco guitarist is deeply rooted in the culture of the Spanish gypsy. Until the day of Montoya, little of this music was available in published form. Even today, most of this sometimes brooding, sometimes heady, music is passed down from generation to generation in the same fashion that other folk arts are handed down and preserved.

The career of Montoya has led from small cafes in Spain to the major concert halls of Paris, London, Berlin, Brussels, New York—even to the Far East and South America. Today he is widely known to a vast part of the population through television and radio appearances, and especially through recordings which have developed for him a strong group of devotees.

Montoya's appearance here will not be his first in Northrop. He performed here twelve years ago as a part of a program called "Rhythms of Spain." In his forthcoming appearance, however, he will be presented as a recitalist, performing a program of the special kind of music that has become so closely identified with his performance.

Tickets for the recital appearance by Carlos Montoya are available now at the University Artists Course Ticket Office, 105 Northrop Memorial Auditorium, the Downtown Ticket Office in Minneapolis and at Field-Schlicks in St. Paul.

Season tickets for the University Artists Course—Celebrity Series are also available at the University Artists Course Ticket Office. In addition to the Montoya concert, Celebrity Series patrons will also see and hear the noted Soviet violinist, David Oistrakh, the Chicago Opera Ballet, and the Boston Opera company's production of Jacques Offenbach's operetta-fantasy, "Voyage to the Moon."

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St. Thomas "Management Center" to Be Linked With U of Chicago Industrial Relations Center

The College of St. Thomas Management Center is becoming associated with the University of Chicago Industrial Relations Center, it was announced at St. Thomas by the Very Rev. James P. Shannon, president.

"St. Thomas is thereby extending its Management Center functions," Father Shannon said, "and will give to this region five new services as a part of the University of Chicago's National Education-Industry program." These will be in addition to the courses which the Center will continue to offer in the business and industrial fields.

St. Thomas, because of its work in the management education field, becomes one of 16 colleges and universities affiliated with the University of Chicago in this program and the only one in this Upper Midwest area. In charge of the new operation will be John H. Farley, director of the St. Thomas Management Center.

As a result of this affiliation the St. Thomas Management Center will now be able to provide personnel inventories and new programs in the business and industrial fields, administer complete testing services, offer consulting service and the use of the well-known Industrial Relations library at the University of Chicago.

Anyone is eligible to participate in any of the services. However, annual company memberships in the Center are available which reduces the costs of the services. First programs in the new area will be offered later this year.

St. Thomas will use its own staff members and those of the University of Chicago to conduct the inventories in such areas as sales, employee attitudes, dealer-manufacturer relationships, leadership appraisal, and attitudes of the professional worker.

New programs will be offered eventually in the following: Basic economics; managerial economics; organization and management; cost reduction and productivity improvement; leadership; conference and meeting methods and skills; group and individual communication; retirement planning and preparation; and administrative practices and skills.

Regular staff members from the St. Thomas Management Center and those from the Industrial Relations Center in Chicago will conduct the programs.

In the field of testing, the regular battery of personnel tests will be available as well as tailor made ones to suit such individual needs.

Full consulting services of the Industrial Relations Center at Chicago as well as the St. Thomas Regional Center are available. The library and reference center at Chicago will send books and bibliographies on a two-week loan basis as a part of the service.

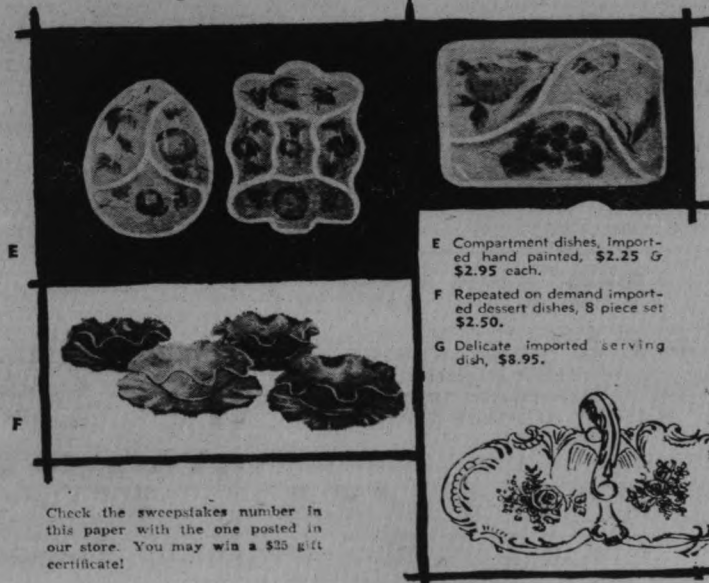

Red Owl President Cites Hopkins Base As Significant Event

"The courage to build our Red Owl Hopkins warehouse in 1947 was a most significant event for us," said Alf. L. Bergerud, president of the Red Owl Stores. "Until this time Red Owl had operated as a relatively small business. Our stores were approximately 1/2 the size of our present stores and offered only about 1/4 the variety of merchandise offered to-day. We had to move with the post war times and grow and expand, or stagnate."

"Prior to our move to Hopkins," Bergerud continued, "suburban living and industry expansion had not yet become as prevalent as today. The success of our modernized warehousing operations and our first supermarket which also opened in 1947, gave us the confidence to continue metropolitan expansion. We began building other Red Owl supermarkets throughout our trade area. Now we have 26 food stores with another 7 in the process of construction in this metropolitan area."

Are You Not Exaggerating the Problem of Fitting Shoes?

Sometimes I think that I may be over-enthusiastic about the subject but I have a defense against such thinking.

Newspapers frequently carry stories of cab drivers who pinch-hit creditably for doctors at the birth of a baby. "Mother and Child are doing fine."

Do we exaggerate the role of the doctor in maternity cases? There probably are many instances when the doctor has little to do but can you visualize the chaos if doctors turned all maternity cases over to cab drivers or lawyers or teachers or students.

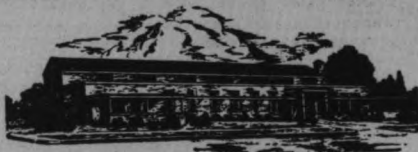

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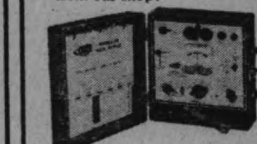
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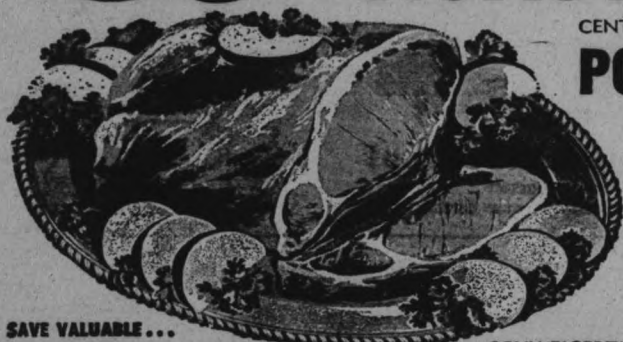
