Ramsey Clark to speak at CST on 'Integrity in Government' Apr. 11

Ramsey Clark, former U.S. Attorney General under President Lyndon Johnson, will present a lecture on Tuesday, April 11 at the College of St. Thomas.

Now a lawyer in private practice in New York, Clark will discuss "Integrity in Government" at 1:00 p.m. in the auditorium of O'-Shaughnessy Educational Center. The public is invited to attend without charge.

A native of Texas, Clark attended the University of Texas and University of Chicago Law School. He practiced law in Dallas from 1951 to 1960 prior to his nomination as an Assistant Attorney General during the Kennedy administration. As Attorney General (1967-69), he headed the Department of Justice, directing its work in civil rights, civil liberties, and antitrust enforcement investigations.

Since retiring from government service, Clark has represented the Alaska Fe-Federation of Natives, winning for his clients the largest settlement of native land claims in history. He also represented the Rev. Philip Berrigan in the Harrisburg trial, and argued the first Freedom of Information Act case along with various First Amendment and other civil rights ac-

A prestigious writer. Clark's books include Crime in America and The Role of the Supreme Court, which he co-authored with Sam Ervin.



University Libraries receive Altman's Steinbeck collection

A comprehensive collection of books and other material by and about Nobel-Prize-winning American author John Steinbeck has been given to the University of Minnesota by local book collector Milton H. Altman. 1921 Pinehurst Ave.

Appraised by a New York rare book dealer at \$39,095, the collection consists of more than 600 books, several hundred periodicals, a large quantity of clippings, pamphlets, photographs and some letters and manuscripts.

All first editions and many later editions of Steinbeck's novels, collections of short stories, plays and nonfiction works are in the Altman collection, along with Steinbeck's contributions published in other books and periodicals. The collection also includes a great deal of biographical

and critical material about the author.

Austin McLean, Chief of Special Collections for the University Libraries, said the gift is the most important literary collection donated to the University in many years and will be an important resource for Steinbeck scholars.

'This ranks as one of the finest Steinbeck collections ever to be assembled." McLean said. "Each volume has been kept in near mint condition."

Steinbeck received the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1962. His works include The Pastures of Heaven, Tortilla Flat, In Dubious Battle, Of Mice and Men, The Red Pony, The Grapes of Wrath, Cannery Row and many short stories.

The Altman collection is located in the Special Collections and Rare Books division in Wilson Library.





No real solutions seen for law school parking problem

When a school building which has been vacant for two years suddenly begins filling up with over 1000 students five nights a week, it's bound to have an impact on the surrounding neighborhood.

It did and still does.

Ever since William Mitchell College of Law moved up the avenue from its former location at 2100 Summit to the former location of Our Lady of Peach High School, parking's been a problem for area residents. But even a partial solution-expanding the school's parking lot-met with mixed community re-

"When we increased our lot from 45 spaces to 114, some of the neighbors complained about the loss of greenery," said Marvin Green, Associate Dean. 'There are others who would have us take out all existing green space and replace it with blacktop for parking lots.'

The present parking lot, located between the school and the former OLP convent, is fairly unobtrusive. If more parking space were to be made available on William Mitchell property, it would involve the large expanse of lawn on the northwest corner of Summit and Victoria.

Another partial solution to the problem has come from nearby churches, who have agreed to provide an additional 200 parking spaces in their lots during the evening hours when classes are in session.


The parking problem exists only during the evening hours because William Mitchell offers classes only between 4:30 and 10:20 p.m. However, it irks many neighbors who, after a day of work, come home to find the closest available parking spot is a block or more away.

"But let's face it," said Green, "It's human nature to park 100 feet from where you're going if you can, rather than use a parking

Green also discounts the frequent suggestions that William Mitchell students use mass transportation to

"I'll bet 90 percent of the people who suggest it don't use it themselves," he said. "Besides, most of our students are on tight schedules in which time between work and school is at

Local 12-year-old boy turns over 60-million-year-old egg to museum

A 60-million-year-old egg, believed to be that of a crocodilian, was presented to The Science Museum of Minnesota last week by a local sixth-grader who found it while looking for a rock "to scare a deer.

The fossil egg, the first in the museum's total collection of some 1.2 million specimens, was found in Wyoming in November, 1976, by Chris Czech, 12, of 1089 Juno Ave. After exhaustive analysis, SMM Curator of Paleontology Bruce Erickson established that the boy's find is about 60 million years old and that it may contain evidence of the embryo.

"I was walking in a kind of drainage ditch and tossing rocks into the bushes trying to help my dad flush out a deer while he was hunting," said Chris, a stu-dent of Adams School. "I spotted something that seemed whiter than the other rocks and it was shaped like an egg so I didn't throw it.

Instead, Chris showed it to his dad, Dennis Czech, 41, an employee in the shipping department at Univac Corporation and an avid hunter.

"I told my dad what I thought it was," said Chris, "and he put it in his jacket

The specimen was brought to the Science Museum some time later. Analysis of the egg continued for 16 months, according to Erickson.

"We wanted to be as certain as possible that we knew what Chris had found because, obviously, something so fragile as an egg does not generally survive to become a fossil.'

Erickson, whose research on the egg was published just last week, said the egg had to have been buried either by the mother or by accident. Only the shell remains intact, the rest of the egg having undergone a complete replacement of its interior structure. Wednesday, March 29, 1978

Head of the SMM paleontology department for the past 12 years, Erickson said he is aware of similar fossil eggs in a museum in Germany. He said in order for the egg to have survived for 60 million years it had to have been buried in a swamp or lakeshore. There also had to have been "a fairly rapid sealing over by sediments" to preserve the

If the museum's new acquisition is a crocodilian egg, Erickson said it is the earliest evidence yet that the reproductive behavior of those pre-historic reptiles closely resembled current crocodilians.

Meanwhile, the discovery of the egg appears likely to

shape Chris Czech's career choice. He now says he wants to be a paleontologist or an archaeologist, having spent many hours at The Science Museum with Erickson.

He does all those interesting things with dinosaur bones and crocodiles and alligators," said Chris, "and I want to do that too."

Chris, who describes himself as a pretty good student who gets "mostly A's except once in awhile in English," had visited the museum several times before his memorable discovery in Wyoming.

'Now when I go to the Museum, they even know who I am," he said.





From the Legislature

by Dick Cohen **District 63B**

As this is being written, the 1978 session of the Minnesota Legislature is almost over. By the time this is printed, we will have adjourned. Consequently, it is difficult to write in this column about particular issues. I'll save a legislative wrap-up for the next column.

What I would like to address is the question of why or how I make up my mind to vote on a particular issue. Such a question lies at the foundation of representative democracy and at the heart of the legislative process. Many people ask if I or any other elected officials vote the way we want, or whether we attempt to represent our district. Obviously I have attempted to represent my district to the best of my ability, but with over 1500 recorded roll calls, it is difficult to gauge popular feeling on every issue.

Sir Edmund Burke, writing in the late 18th century, spoke of his membership in the British Parliament as a trust given to him by the people of his district to make the best possible judgments. Andrew Jackson, on the other hand, had a more populist approach and felt that his actions were predicated on his readings of public opinion.

In making my individual decisions, there are a number of factors which I rely on. Obviously constituent mail and telephone calls are very important, since they give me direct contact with constituents on a particular issue. However, such contact is usually limited, and it is difficult to tell how widespread such feeling is. The most contact I have had on any one issue is the mandatory deposit legislation for throwaway cans. I have received about 125 letters on this subject with almost all voicing support. On a recent bill dealing with chiropractic medicine, I received about 25 telephone calls. These are the two issues which I have had the most direct input, and obviously the numbers are a very small fraction of District 63B's 11,000 households.

Many of you filled out my legislative questionnaire which was dropped in November and December. I got a response of a little under ten percent, and the replies appeared to be a good cross section of the district. Unfortunately, extensive public opinion surveys are simply too expensive at a legislative level to be attempted, and often a legislator has to rely on his sense of what his district is and how it feels.

One assumption made in a representative democracy is that it is part of the job of a legislator to study and analyze an issue and make a decision which is the best possible one for the state, and obviously those considerations are impor-

When I have voted on legislation, I have tried to follow a guide of what my constituents would think about a particular bill, given my work and study of an issue. Obviously, this is not an always perfect way, but as I have tried to point out, there is no sure way to determine how a district feels on every issue.



TRAVELING TROPHY

Well class, the report cards are now in on "The Saint Paul Board of Education Voters Test" taken Tuesday, March 14, 1978.

One thousand nineteen voters in Ward 11 would have failed the test entirely, had they not been given credit for being conscientious enough to vote in the first place. These 1019 Ward 11 voters cast their ballots for Robert Christensen.

Like all good citizens, these people had been taught to evaluate the candidates' credentials, capabilities and aspirations for a position on the St. Paul School Board before casting their ballots for the most qualified person. Prior to the primary elections, Robert Christensen had not answered a single request for information about himself or his ideas. As a result, voters had no idea what he intended to do or whether he was capable of doing it. For voting for him anyway, 1019 people in Ward 11 received a "D" on the Voters Test.

Ten times as many people did not vote at all. They received an "F."

There were three candidates worthy of consideration for a position on the Board of Education in the March 14 election. Most of the thoughtful voters cast their ballots for Catherine Piccolo—a total of 1201 in Ward 11. Wayne Wittman and Douglas Ward, both with the necessary qualifications, received a little over 1000 votes between them in Ward 11. Those who voted for these three individuals received "A's" and "B's."

The wastebasket in the corner of Ward 11 has been reserved for all those voters who received "D's" and "F's." Collectively, they have been awarded this week's Talking Out of School Traveling Trophy—a giant-sized papiermache dunce cap, constructed from one year's worth of "Misch-Masch" clippings.

These voters are encouraged to apply themselves to their civic studies in the future. They will be given an opportunity to redeem themselves by becoming familiar with the candidates and the issues before voting in the city election on April 25.

WHAT'S GOOD?

Don Sonsalla, principal of Highland Park Junior High School, that's what's good, say the parents of sixth graders heading for Highland next fall.

While we know good things are often happening at Highland, this weeks "What's Good?" concerns the orientation program recently developed by Sonsalla and a team of teachers—six from Highland Junior and two from Highland Elementary—for incoming students.

A tentative schedule of upcoming program events looks like this:

April 3-7 The sixth graders, by classes, will visit Highland Junior, with a seventh grader acting as host or hostess. Incoming students will receive a tour of the building, get an opportunity to attend three different classes, and eat lunch before returning to their home school. The highlight of the tour, according to Sonsalla, will be provided in an assembly setting "with the cheerleaders cheering, the band playing, and the principal giving a rousing speech." (We refuse to make any editorial comment on the latter.)

April 10-14 Counselors and seventh graders from Highland Junior will in turn visit the elementary schools to answer questions and register the new students.

May 10-17 Each Highland Junior faculty member will visit six parents of incoming students to acquaint them with the school and answer their questions.

We believe that this kind of extra effort on the part of our school personnel will help restore confidence in our school system and help reverse the current trend which sees more and more students leaving the public schools.

Talking Out of School salutes Don Sonalla and all members of the faculty of Highland Junior and the elementary schools taking part in this program.

P.S. to the Highland area resident who asked about the Evaluation Committee mentioned in last issue's column: The committee has been in existence for about three years, though with over 150 different school district committees currently operating, we can understand why someone might not be aware of this one. Of its 25 members, 23 are employed by the school district and two come from the community. Talking Out of School has attended all Evaluation Committee meetings over the past three years.

Report from the House

by Ray Faricy District 63A

Well, it's over! It was a session that had it ups and downs, but the finish was, in my estimation, a good one. The Schools Aids bill which was passed provided approximately \$1 million of additoinal relief to the City of St. Paul, and the Tax Bill, when considered in conjunction with the bill that was passed last year, has provided substantial relief to many people within the district.

As you will recall, the emphasis in the 1977 tax bill was property tax relief, and I think as you are filing your forms you will see that you are being helped considerably in this respect. At this session, the approach was directed toward the income tax itself and other taxes. In particular, the sales tax was eliminated on fuel oil, coal, wood, steam, propane gas and LP gas used for residential purposes. Also, the sales tax was taken off of natural gas and electricity in all-electric homes for the billing months of November. December, January, February, March and April.

In the 1977 tax bill, the personal credit for individuals on the tax form was increased by \$9.00, effective for the tax year of 1978. At this session, we increased that an additional \$10.00 so that the personal tax credit on the 1978 tax return will be \$40.00 per person and the personal credit for senior citizens, blind persons and deaf persons will be \$60.00.

A new approach was taken concerning the spouse that stays at home and takes care of the children-a new tax credit of \$50.00 if either the tax-payer or his spouse devotes time to maintaining a household and caring for a child under the age of 13 rather than being employed. The combined federal adjusted gross income of the tax-payer and spouse must be less than \$25,000 in order to qualify for

There has been a reduction in the income tax rates which are applicable to levels of taxable incomes in excess of \$25,000. Also, the employers' excise tax, commonly known as the payroll tax, has been eliminated. That repeal is effective for wages paid after June 30, 1978.

The first \$7,200 of pension income from private pension plans is not exempt, treating it thus the same way public pensions are now being treated. The \$7,200 exemption is reduced by social security, railroad retirement benefits, and the amount by which the individual's federal adjusted gross income exceeds \$13,000.

There has been adopted a \$140.00 tax credit for income rank or below. In addition, there were other provisions which would affect low income wage earners. All in all, I believe that the Legislature in the last two years has done a good job of addressing many of the problems that we are

On another subject, I would urge you to look closely at the proposal which would repeal our ordinance dealing with Gay Rights. I certainly can appreciate the emotion which is attached to the situation, but I find that this provision has been on the books now for many years without any problems having occurred. I hope that each of you would seriously consider whether or not this provision, if repealed, would work injustices on some people in our society. I think many of you have already seen Archbishop Roach's statement concerning this issue. I would hope that you would give this serious consideration.

The many calls and letters over the past months have been greatly appreciated. I hope that you would continue to keep in contact. Lastly, I would like to again express my deep appreciation to Mr. Mischke and The Highland Villager for allowing me to communicate with you.







'78 Catholic Appeal reaches 90 percent of \$2.7 million goal
