

3 Concerts Featured At Northrop Hall





BIG TOP (CITY ELECTION) . . .

If you might wonder why Independent William Carter Jr. walked rather than dashed into the ring last Friday when he filed for Mayor, consider the more ludicrous aspects of our upcoming City Primary Election on March 12th.

The Incumbent Mayor, Tom Byrne, has no assurances of being re-nominated therefore making him less of a target for a third candidate than for Mrs. Butler who must cut him deep in order to stand a chance in the primary which traditionally is a bloc voting affair in St. Paul politics. The Lady in the White Hat is a candidate without a machine vote, an ominous predicament in a primary, so she must, and from all indications, is breaking her neck to get some attention. It is unfortunate for a city which is trying to become as progressive as it must to avoid economic disaster, that one of its more opportune projects—the Civic Center—must bite the lash of a woman bent on making television soap opera the chief industry of St. Paul's city council meetings. The Civic Center, intrinsically a non-issue in the City Election, has been blown out of focus simply because it is that time of year when the Council normally conducts as little business as possible. Meredith, one of the safer incumbents, seems more amused than concerned, as Byrne, knowing well that he is the real target, must play the cool hand. We get the impression that nearly everybody concerned with this election has a dreadful fear, bordering on apoplexy, that Mrs. B. has bombs stowed for all who would venture forth and deal with her logically and intelligently. In fact, her effectiveness more accurately measures the bunglesome political IQ of the present administration than it does anything else, and we can expect them to stay in exile. Meanwhile, it's being pitched as a Byrne-Butler primary—or perhaps more accurately, a Barnum and Bailey circus, with independent Carter convinced that the takers born every minute will split up the DFL act.

There's some real hay to be made for the challenging Council candidates who don't start acting like Councilmen before they get elected, to wit: burying their heads in the deep cool sand! Recent surveys conducted by all three Mayoralty groups show that Dalglish, Holland, Peterson and Carlson are all less than the sensations they were . . . and, with the same people who elected them last time. That means Weyandt, R. D. Dick Johnson, Levine, Barrett, Rosen, Frank Loss and Sprafka can move into striking range if they want to grab the initiative. Mitchell is as safe as the Marble Indian, Tedesco is the new Milt Rosen of the Council and Meredith comes through unscathed after two years of eating lunch with his deputy, Ralph Merrill.

Chester Bester, filing for Council and demanding reciprocity in turn for a job well done . . . the guy who said Frank Loss has a stiletto in the tip of his cane . . .
