Rifle Range Opened For Public Use

Commissioner Bernard T. Holland, Department of Parks, Playgrounds and Public Buildings, announces new plans for the use of the Como Park indoor small arms rifle range. These plans have been worked out in cooperation with the St. Paul Rifle and Pistol Shooters Club, Inc.

The time for the use of the range has been divided into two sessions from October 7 to December 14 when the range will be open for public use on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays.

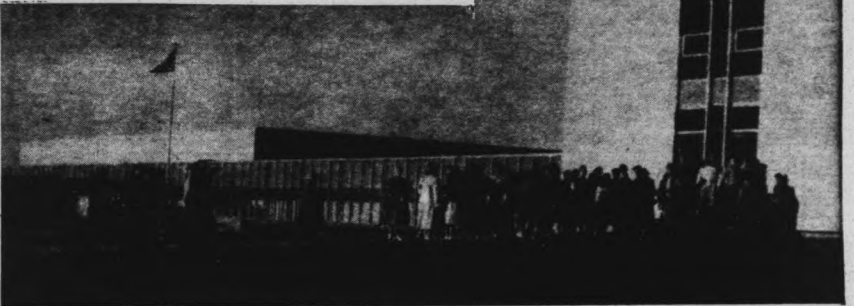
Groups interested in safety in the use of firearms for hunting are invited to apply at the Playground Bureau, 557 City Hall. The range officer appointed is John A. Colombo, 875 Sherburne Avenue, CA. 5-2338.

Groups using the range in the evenings will be limited to boys and girls over 14 years of age, and adults; Saturdays — boys and girls 12 to 13 years of age.

The regulations require that each group will have to be in charge of an instructor certified by the National Rifle Association or the Minnesota Firearms Safety Director. The groups will be limited in size, each group consisting of eight students in charge of one instructor. Each group will be required to have its own insurance, liability and accident, covering all members of the group.

"Lucky kids! We had nothing like this in school!"

That must be the almost universal reaction of all who enter the beautiful new Highland Park Junior High School building at Snelling and Montreal avenues and stroll through its airy, clean-cut rooms and corridors.

Built upon a gentle hill overlooking the rolling green expanses of the Highland Park golf course, the school must be one of the nation's best, of which Highland—and all of St. Paul—can be justly proud.

Approved by the voters in a bond issue election in 1953, the school was built at a cost of \$1,888,568.40.

It was equipped for an additional \$125,000, or a total of approximately \$2,000,000.

Designed to accommodate 1,000 students, in its first year of operation it has a total of 738 seventh, eighth and ninth graders, mainly from six "feeder" schools—Edgumbe, Highland Park, Horace Mann, Homercroft, Mattocks and Riverside.

Further information can be obtained by calling any of the participating colleges.

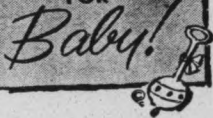

Anti-Defamation League Calendars Presented To School Teachers

One thousand special calendar books were distributed to teachers and school administrators in St. Paul, it was announced by Dr. Harold Barrie, 1297 S. Cleveland, Treasurer of the Minnesota-Dakota Regional Advisory Board of the Anti-Defamation League.

They were presented as a gift to Dr. Richard G. Hansen, Assistant Superintendent of Elementary Schools.

The calendar books contain a complete listing of all major legal holidays and the religious holidays of the three faiths. Teachers can plan their progress so as not to conflict with occasions when students may be absent. The books also include a listing of a wide variety of educational materials divided along grade levels in the field of human relations, including films, filmstrips, recordings, books, plays and graphics available to teachers through the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith. A teacher who, for example, wants to plan a Brotherhood Week program can consult the calendar and obtain suggestions on materials she can use.

B'nai B'rith is the oldest and largest Jewish service organization in the world. Distribution of the calendar books was part of a state-wide project.

Buying a home?

Ask Questions Before Signing on Dotted Line

(From the Minn. State Bar Assn.)
When you sign an agreement to purchase a home, the most important facts pertaining to the purchase are in that first or preliminary agreement, the Minnesota State Bar association explains.

It is wise to consider carefully the following questions before signing any papers. Does the agreement clearly define the property that you are buying? Does it include all that you think you are buying? Is any personal property to be included? Do you understand from the agreement what kind of a title you will be given? Does the seller agree to convey to you by a warranty deed, a limited warranty deed or by a quit claim deed? What evidence of title is to be furnished?

Is the property subject to a mortgage, easements restrictions or contracts? What does the purchase agreement provide as to those matters?

Closing Date

What is provided as to the date of closing and the date possession is to be given?

Does the agreement specify the time within which the seller must accept the terms of the agreement and sign it?

Under what circumstances is the earnest money to be returned to you? What is to be done with the earnest money if the improvement of the land is destroyed by fire before the closing date?

If the agreement provides that you are to obtain a mortgage loan, does it specify the amount, interest rate, maturity date and monthly payments required? If you are unable to obtain a mortgage, is the earnest money to be returned to you?

Is the amount to be paid for the property definitely stated?

If the seller is married, his or her spouse should also sign the purchase agreement.

Remember — that purchase agreement or earnest money contract is most important when you are buying your home.

Macalester has purchased and remodeled a building at 129 Macalester street for the headquarters of the bureau. It has facilities for small conferences with businessmen and representatives of other colleges and universities, and for small classes of seminar size.

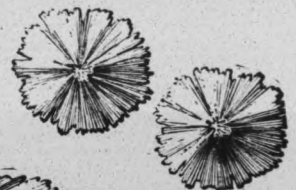

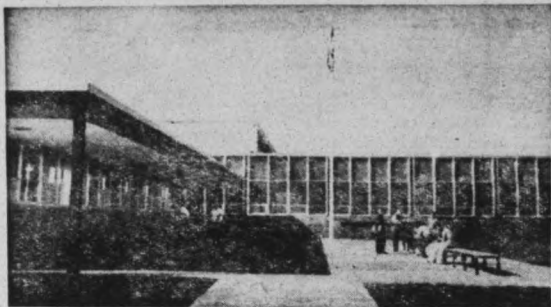

Imagine yourself a boy or girl in a school with these features:
Ultra-modern classrooms with the latest in furnishings, lighting, and so on. (The three-story portion at the north end of the building is the "Academic Wing" with classrooms for the reading-writing-arithmetic type of subjects.)
Workshops with a multitude of power tools for metal, electrical and wood working: punch presses, table saws, jointers, lathes and many more. Plus a printing press, photographic darkroom, and all necessary equipment for blueprint work and mechanical drawing.

Homemaking rooms with spacious cutting tables for laying out patterns and materials, a sewing machine for each student, built into the table, fitting rooms, pressing equipment. In the foods department, sparkling new stoves and everything else necessary to plan, cook and serve meals.

Arts and crafts rooms where your creativity can find an outlet in making things of paper, plastic, soap, wood, stone or wire.

Speech rooms where you can study and improve the use of your speaking voice.

Music areas with separate studios for vocal groups and for instrumental work. Acoustic-treated small rooms are available where you can go to "blow your own horn" in private or practice in small groups.

The music program of the new school includes formation of a junior band and a senior band, and possibly a semi-swing group of ten or a dozen pieces. In addition to playing for school functions, these groups will be available to provide music for the community.

An auditorium with a seating capacity of 702 people and a stage nearly the size of a basketball floor with decorator-designed curtains and backdrops. The acoustics are such that a person speaking in a normal voice on the stage can be easily heard anywhere in the auditorium without benefit of a "mike".

Lighting can be controlled in many ways with spotlights, direct lights, indirect lights and so on—the most dramatic being light that comes from behind "cloud baffles" seemingly drifting in the ceiling like clouds hiding the sun in a midsummer's sky.

Other features include gymnasium, audio visual room, library, cafeteria, kitchen and offices, the keynote throughout the school being lightness, open-ness and easy maintenance.

How do the teachers like it? "I have to pinch myself," smiled Miss Grace Jacobs, home economics teacher. "I've never even had more than one iron and ironing board before. Students had to line up to use them. 'Here,' she sighed, "we have five. It's wonderful."

"These kids don't know how lucky they are," someone said. "Yes," they know it," Principal R. A. Dolen said with a smile. "Their enthusiasm is running over. They love it."

One paragraph from a brochure about the school puts meaning into the slick tile and glass, brick and furnishings. It says:

"We will aim to provide educational, experiences and activities which develop and train the mental, emotional, physical, social and moral powers of young adolescents. Our function is to provide opportunities for each pupil to achieve a way of life which is satisfactory to him as a person, and which is in harmony with the democratic ideals of the society of which he is a member."

Writing originated as a means of keeping track of such business transactions as the transfer of cattle at the ancient markets in Mesopotamia according to a display of 5000 year old clay tablets at the Science Museum.

Your Dental Health

(Following is the twenty-first in a series of articles on "Your Dental Health" being presented by The Highland Villager in cooperation with the American Dental Association. Today, artificial dentures).

If necessary you can have your upper teeth removed during your lunch hour and walk back to work with an artificial denture in your mouth.

The immediate denture has eliminated the embarrassing period of toothlessness following extraction.

Not only is a psychological advantage gained, but a physical advantage as well.

Dentists say it retains the tissue in a more normal condition. It cuts down much of the tendency of the gums to bleed. The chewing muscles go to work faster, thus preserving the facial contours.

Of course one does not walk into a dental office on the spur of the moment and make the new-teeth-for-old exchange.

The dentist will remove the back teeth several weeks before the new denture is to be inserted leaving the front ones for appearance. When the back gums heal over, impressions are made. Records are also made of the relation of the upper jaw to the lower one.

Immediate dentures have to be relined and reconstructed as gum resorption occurs in succeeding weeks.

During all this time the patient is able to eat and carry on in business or social life.

Artificial teeth can be made to reproduce characteristics of the old teeth which may have had corners broken off, spaces between the teeth and even a few stains. This is done so expertly, even the patient's family doesn't suspect.

As for gums, synthetic resins have been developed that closely resemble the natural tissues. This material is a boon in restoring confidence to persons with short upper lips who might be particularly self-conscious about their appearance.

Learning to eat with dentures is like learning to drive a car. Some learn rapidly and in no time are competent in eating apples or corn on the cob. Others have difficulty getting the hang of it. The right mental attitude is important, dental authorities agree.

Most authorities also agree that artificial dentures should be worn constantly, even while sleeping. They should be cleaned after every meal and before retiring to eliminate denture breath.

Backseat Drivers Are a Big Help

"Don't get angry at a backseat driver," advise the local agents for Allstate insurance company. "A passenger can be an asset to a driver by acting as a 'co-pilot' to point out dangers not easily seen from behind the wheel."

Quoting from a feature article appearing in the current issue of Home & Highway Magazine, the Allstate agents state driver and passenger should work as a team, not as sparring partners. The driver should be in charge, of course, but should assign certain duties to the passenger. On cross-country trips, for example, the passenger can do all the map reading and take responsibility for following the route signs, leaving the driver to concentrate on his driving.

Sometimes you can earn your status as a co-pilot by helping the driver in and out of a parking squeeze. From your seat on the right side of the car, you can check the right fender for him. When changing lanes, you can help protect the driver from blind spots on the right.

The backseat driver can give positive aid to the driver by keeping an eye open in situations where it's difficult for the driver to divide his attention.

Be Specific

With you in the car, the driver shouldn't have to dawdle along at dangerously slow speeds while he cranes his neck around looking for a street address or a name. If the driver turns left at a busy intersection, he'll be busy watching the cars close to him. You can keep an eagle eye open for some reckless vehicle barreling down on him from a distance.

Be specific about the dangers you see, the Allstate agents advise. If you just yell, "Look out," you only startle the driver without giving him any idea of what he has to avoid. And if you are directing him in an unfamiliar location, give him adequate warning well in advance of a turn that must be made.

One of the important things for a backseat driver to keep in mind is to keep calm and use a pleasant tone of voice. Nerving or otherwise annoying the driver by distracting him with needless advice or warnings destroys the very real aid a backseat driver can offer.
