## New 'Ramsey County History' Issue Tells Story of Early Fort Snelling

The story of the colorful group of men who served at Ft. Snelling during the years before the Civil War is told in the new issue of *Ramsey County History* published by the Ramsey County Historical Society.

The travail of at least one man who served at the fort during these years, Private Gustavus Otto, an immigrant from Bavaria, is graphically described in a letter to his wife, as he writes: "The guard house is always full. Thank God I have not come into the guard house, and as far as I know our captain loves me very much."

Among these officers and men was the only president of the United States to live in Minnesota for any time at all. He was Zachary Taylor, commandant at the fort between 1828 and 1829. Taylor, a Southerner, apparently did not think highly of Minnesota, writing that "this is the most miserable and uninteresting country."

The role of the fort which during the 1840's served as a training ground for men who later became officers during the Mexican War and served on both sides during the Civil War also is described.

In another story, excerpts from a journal kept by Colonel Josiah Snelling, commandant from 1820 to 1827—the longest period of service of any fort commander—paints a vivid picture of life at a Frontier military post. Former Governor Elmer

L. Andersen, president of the Minnesota Historical Society, who owns the journal, permitted the Ramsey County Historical Society to use entries from it, said Virginia Brainard Kunz, executive secretary of the Society and editor of *Ramsey County History*.

The magazine also includes an account of the creation of the old road to Lake Como, a biographical sketch of Dr. John H. Murphy, pioneer St. Paul physician, and an affectionate reminiscence of life on the Gibbs farm during the 1870's.

Copies of the new issue of the magazine have been mailed to all members of the Society, Mrs. Kunz said, and also are on sale at Society headquarters, 2097 W. Larpenteur Ave. Falcon Heights. Membership in the Society carries with it a subscription to the magazine which has received a certificate of commendation for excellence from the American Association for State and Local History.



## Scouts Can Earn Merit Badge In Water Skiing

Boy Scouts and Explorers can now earn the water skiing merit badge — the newest merit badge available to Scouts.

Recently approved by the National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America, the new merit badge recognizes that water skiing is one of America's most popular sports. "The Water Skiing merit badge makes a definite contribution to Scouting's physical fitness program," explained Earl W. Nystrom, President of Ryan Equipment Co., advancement chairman for the Indianhead Council.

Requirements for the water skiing merit badge, established by the Boys Scouts of America and the American Water Ski Assn., include at least 6 hours of practice, knowledge of skiing safety, water-skiing signals, unassisted deep-water and dock starts, skiin gon one ski, crossing boat wakes, and jumping off the wake by lifting both skis clear of the water.

Second Class Scouts are eligible to attempt to meet the requirements for the water skiing merit badge after they have passed the First Class swimming qualifications and can demonstrate their ability to swim 150 yards.

Professional guidance to the Scouts working on the merit badge will be provided by water skiing merit badge counselors. 

**Historical Society News**

Children from the Ramsey County area will again have an opportunity to attend a real, old-fashioned, one-room rural school this summer.

The Ramsey County Historical Society, which maintains the Gibbs Farm Museum, this year will hold "classes" for three sessions of four days each in the little restored schoolhouse on the museum property at 2097 W. Larpenteur Avenue, Falcon Heights.

Dates of the sessions are July 8 through 11, July 22 through 25, and August 5 through 8. Registrations still are open for all three sessions, said Virginia Brainard Kunz, executive secretary of the society. They may be made by telephoning the Ramsey County Historical Society at 646-0624. There is no charge.

Children who are eligible for the program are those who will be entering the second through the ninth grades next fall. Twenty children will be accepted for each day's session.

"This is such a popular program that we ask children to register for one day only, so that we can admit as many youngsters as possible," Mrs. Kunz said.

"School" will begin at 9:30 a.m. and end at 2 p.m. each day. Children are asked to bring their own lunches and to wear old-fashioned costumes, if they wish. A beverage will be served to them at noon.

The program, based upon the teaching in rural schools of 70 years ago, will be the same each day. Purpose of the program is

to help children "experience" history by actually sitting in the old wooden desks, using slate boards and slate pencils.

## Neighborhood Youth Corps Offers Record Number of Summer Jobs

Enough jobs with the Neighborhood Youth Corps have been founded for the summer of 1969 to employ "almost every low-income high school age youth in St. Paul," according to Lyle K. Swanson, director of the In-School Neighborhood Youth Corps Project for the St. Paul Public Schools.

Of 700 jobs authorized, a new high for St. Paul, about 400 have been filled so far, according to Swanson. Enrollment and job placement will continue through the coming week, with most youths beginning work June 16.

Enrollment in the Neighborhood Youth Corps provides guidance as well as work. Four full-time counselors and five full-time area supervisors—regular staff members of the St. Paul Public Schools—will hold guidance sessions (for both groups and individuals), conduct motivational tours, and supervise job placement and experience.

NYC objectives are to provide low-income St. Paul high school students with improved economic status through part-time work, develop job readiness skills and greater self awareness, improve attitudes toward school, and develop appropriate post-high school plans.

Referrals for NYC participation are made to the St. Paul Public Schools by almost all community service agencies in St. Paul. Pay rates are \$1.30 per hour for 26 hours weekly during the ten-week summer period. No job skills are required to enroll; no applicants are screened out unless their family incomes are above upper limits allowed by national NYC guidelines.

All NYC jobs are with tax-supported or non-profit organizations and agencies. The largest single employer is the St. Paul Parks and Playgrounds Department which, this summer, will hire 50 youths to work on flood clean-up in addition to their more common positions of recreation aides, maintenance aides, zoo aides, and tour-guide aides. Other employers include the St. Paul Public Schools, parochial schools, hospitals, the State Department of Education, private non-profit agencies, and other agencies of city, state, and federal government. NYC Director Lyle Swanson is encouraging agencies to develop additional work-sites.

A special career guidance project titled "Project Motivation" is planned as a joint venture this summer between the St. Paul Employers' Council for Equal Opportunity.

Members of local business and industry will provide special small-group tours for NYC enrollees in which NYC counselors meet with enrollees for tour orientation, accompany them on the tour, and then meet in reaction sessions. Each tour includes lunch and visits to two major employers in St. Paul.

The 700 positions funded for the summer compare with 234 job positions operated by the St. Paul Public Schools during the 1968-69 academic year. Budget for the summer program—funded under the Economic Opportunity Act—is \$282,070.




