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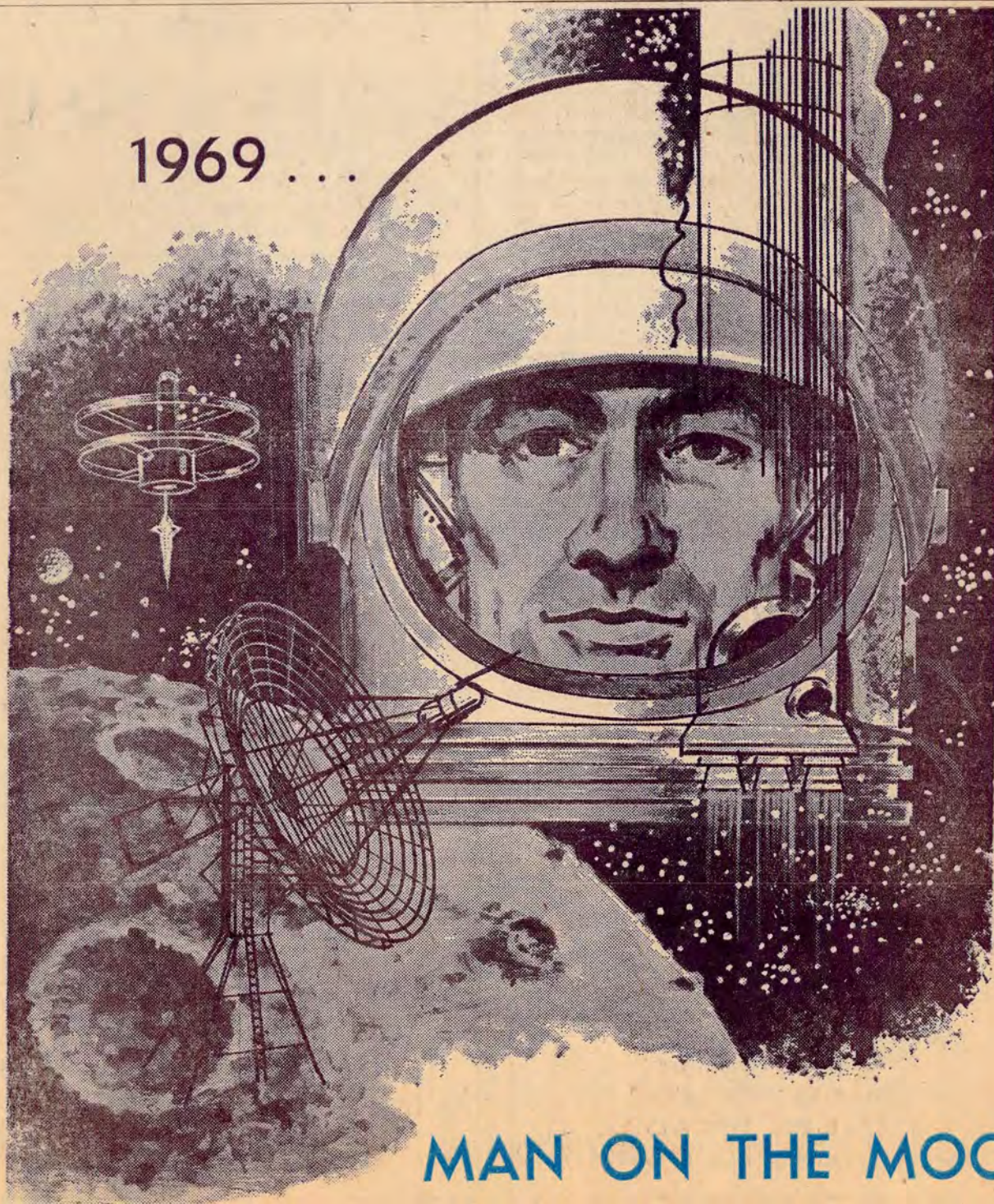

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Actors Find Main Street of Midwest As Bright as New York Broadway

Heartland Productions will present three plays next month in the Crawford Livingston Theatre in the St. Paul Arts and Science Center as a cooperative venture with the Council of Arts and Sciences.

The shows are "The Devil's Disciple," a drama of the American Revolution by George Bernard Shaw, which will be presented at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, January 17; "Scapin," a comedy by Moliere, to be presented at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, January 18 and "The Hostage," a rowdy Irish comedy by Brendan Behan, to be presented at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, January 18.

For the last four months the troupe, which makes its home at Southwest State College in Marshall and includes many veterans of the Tyrone Guthrie Theatre, has been touring the towns of southwestern Minnesota. The Company consists of 19 professional actors, directors and technical artists who say they prefer the Main Streets of the Midwest to Broadway because of the responsive audiences.

Rex Partington, producer for Heartland and a veteran of five years as production stage manager at the Guthrie, explains the prairie preference thusly: "In New York and many other places, the whole theater thing is transient, the audiences, actors, everyone. But we've found a real rapport with Midwest audiences. We miss the glamour sometimes, but the compensation comes in getting closer to the audience. And you can do that here. In small towns or big cities, they're as cosmopolitan as you'll find anywhere."

The troupe was organized last summer by Partington and the actor-director, Douglas Campbell.

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Moonflight Drama at Bush

"Night of the Auk," a drama about man's first Moon flight, will open 8:30 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 16 at the Edyth Bush Theatre of Hamline University, 690 S. Cleveland. The play will continue on a Friday and Saturday schedule through Feb. 8.

Written in free verse, "Night of the Auk" is an anti-war work which takes place in a rocket ship speeding back to earth after the first Moon landing and delves into the emotions and conflicts of its five passengers—three military and two civilian.

Oboler, who wrote the work three years prior to the launching of the first Sputnik, explores the question as to where man's race for power will end. He predicts doom unless man can abandon his deadly nuclear toys.

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History Of St. Paul Theatre

The story of the theater in St. Paul between 1820 to 1890 and how it survived both economic depressions and the depressing effect of the first "chorus girls" whose dancing left much to be desired, is traced by Dr. Frank M. Whiting, "captain" of the University of Minnesota's Showboat, in the new issue of Ramsey County History.

The semi-annual magazine is published by the Ramsey County Historical Society and was mailed this week to subscribers and to Society members who receive it with their memberships. The magazines also are on sale at the Society's Gibbs Farm Museum, 2097 W. Larpenteur Avenue, St. Paul.

Dr. Whiting, author of the widely-used textbook, An Introduction to the Theatre, has written a witty and lively account, according to Virginia Brainard Kunz, editor of Ramsey County History. These were the years when such stars as Sarah Bernhardt, Joseph Jefferson and Edwin Booth could be seen as easily in St. Paul as New York; when a double "Uncle Tom's Cabin" played in St. Paul with two Elizas, two little Evas, real bloodhounds and even a donkey which came to an untimely end; when "The Black Crook," America's first musical comedy, opened in St. Paul, and when "Living Art Statues," featuring females in a scandalous (for that time) state of undress all but did

in the cause of femininity on the stage.

Other articles in the magazine include a further account of the wanderings of Charley Pitts' skeleton; a story on the Bernheimer Block, first built in 1859 on Third Street (now Kellogg Boulevard) and the role the building played in the life of the growing city, and a description of Kohlman's famous hotel in Little Canada and how it helped usher in Ramsey County's era of resorts which attracted health-seekers from throughout the country.

Flu Postpones Manon Lescaut Opera

The St. Paul Opera Association has postponed its scheduled production of Puccini's opera, "Manon Lescaut," as a result of the current flu epidemic, George M. Schaefer, general manager of the theatrical company, announced today.

He said the opera will be rescheduled next spring.

"Manon Lescaut" was to have been performed January 9 and 11 in the St. Paul Auditorium theater.

Plans for the Association's next musical production, "Finian's Rainbow," will not be affected by the postponement. The musical will be presented the week of March 17.

Season tickets will be honored when "Manon Lescaut" is staged next spring, Schaefer explained.

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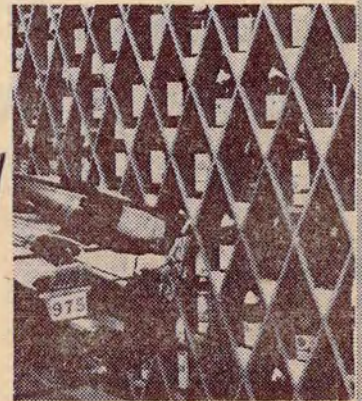
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West Summit Girl Scouts

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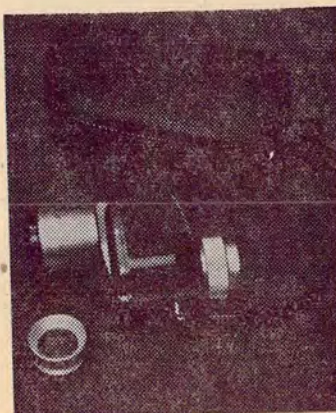
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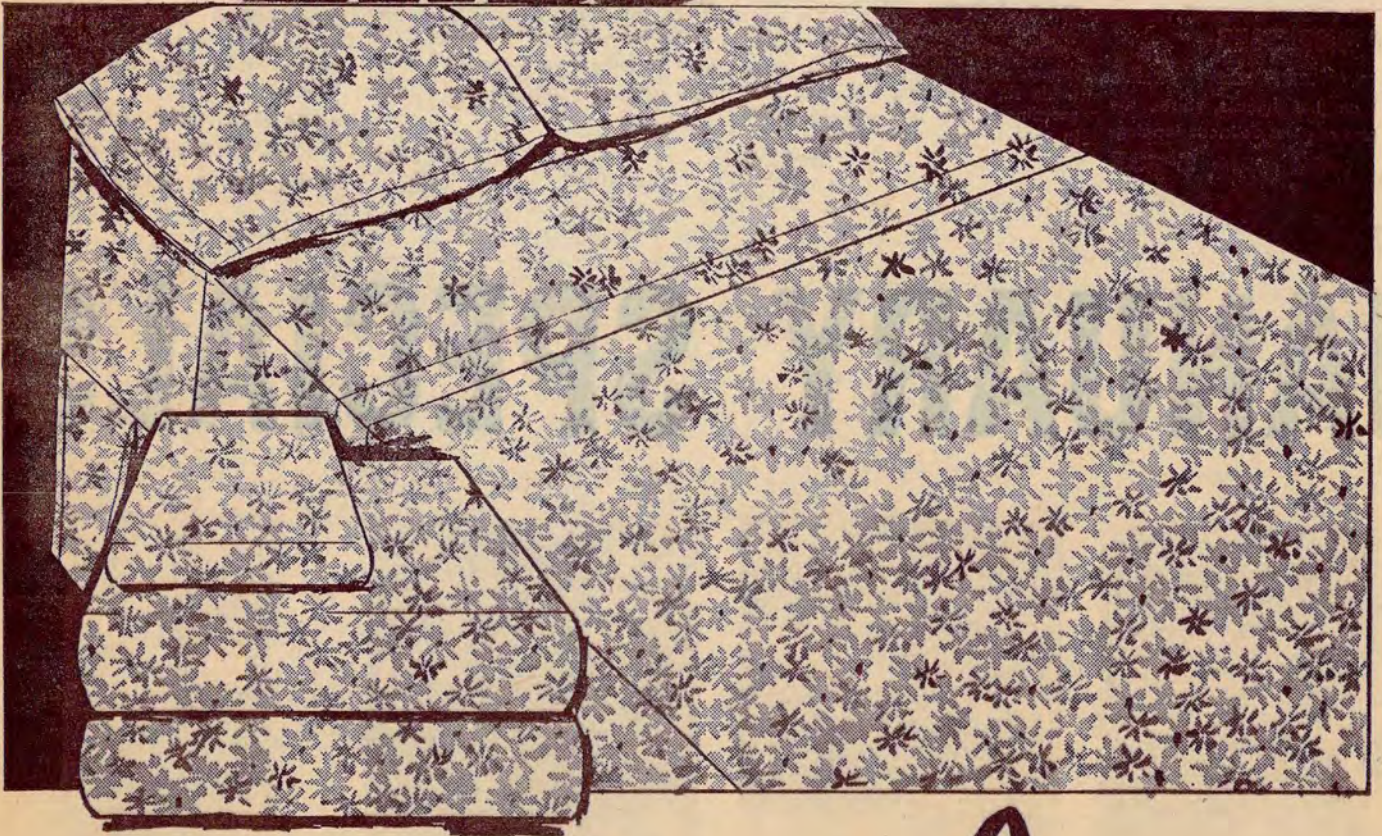

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\$20,000 In H.S. Scholarships At St. Thomas

Applications for some \$20,000 in Distinguished Scholarships are now open at the College of St. Thomas. Five full-tuition scholarships at \$1,350 a year and twenty half-tuition scholarships at \$675 a year will be awarded to winners among applicants who rank in the upper ten per cent of their high school classes anywhere in the nation.

The scholarships are renewable during the following three years at St. Thomas providing high grade point ratios are maintained and upon recommendation of the scholarships and student aid committee. Total value of the scholarships over the four years could therefore exceed \$80,000 for this year's winners.

Awards are based on the College Board scores, high school records, principals' recommendations and, where possible, campus interviews. Winners will be selected from fifty semi-finalists. Non-winners will automatically be considered for other awards sponsored by the College.

Applicants must submit applications for admission to St. Thomas and have their matriculation fees paid by Feb. 1, 1969.

Although need is not a factor in determining distinguished scholarship winners, the Parents' Confidential Statement to the College Scholarship Service is required for consideration for other St. Thomas awards.

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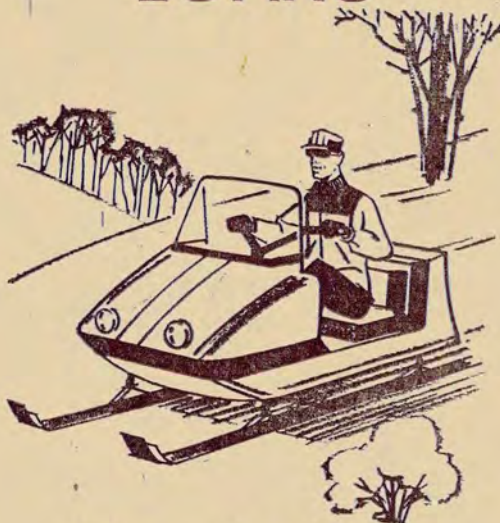

THE TWO CITIES . . .

As the Legislature opens it is increasingly important for Governor LeVander to put politics aside and help his two DFL Mayors out of their total chaos. It would be tempting enough to let them stand in their own quicksand. Naftalin has resigned his right to run, and many are speculating that if Byrne doesn't get the package he needs from the Legislature, he'll seek his fortunes elsewhere also. In Minneapolis this opts well for the GOP as they have an organization and a group of young firebrands headed by the articulate and immensely savvy Alderman, Dan Cohen, the favored candidate to oppose an equally distinguishing selection from a group of young liberals. In St. Paul—as in the past—the GOP would not necessarily benefit from Byrne's demise, as the independent-conservative coalition would undoubtedly have one of those lunches at the Minnesota Club and trot out some remote businessman whose title and personal appearances passed the political IQ's of the fat cats. St. Paulites seem impotent to change the sorry state of the politics of their city which can best be summed up, "If you don't use our soap, try our perfume!" Every two years the establishment rousts out of bed with the Democrats in time to find some poor soul to call "theirs" in time to get a bet down on how many votes he'll lose by. Consequently, there is rarely a dialogue worth pondering between two candidates running for Mayor, and there is an age barrier on electability. In Minneapolis, young turks from both parties have leveled the political establishments which kept them down, and in the process, have won the respect and confidence of the economic establishment. The benefit has accrued to the citizens regardless of their political beliefs, because as the new urban problems arise, the generation which has the most at stake is burning the midnight oil to solve them. St. Paul, by contrast, finds itself with a City Council so devoid of grey matter that problems cannot even be communicated, let alone solved. The Vavoulis years were the most progressive because he worked more effectively with people "outside" City Government. If the kind of brains and energy that exists outside, would be allowed in, we might begin to move ourselves and our City towards a brighter political horizon. St. Paul's DFLer's are stuck with big city labor union political machinery which drives any sensible young liberal elsewhere for his rewards. The GOP has labor problems of another sort, and a sharp young Republican would arm himself best for political life in the big city by being prepared to spend as much of his relative's money as they are likely to have in building an organization strong enough to undo what would undoubtedly be done behind his back by the existing organization. As St. Paul rolls on towards another City Election, the question still burns—will it be soap or perfume this time! Minneapolis no longer faces that problem thanks to a lot of men in their thirties and forties who decided that the only way to really get rid of the stink was with acid!
