Drew announces candidacy for Dist. 63-B House seat

John G. Drew, 2134 Highland Parkway, announced today his intentions of seeking GOP endorsement for election to the Minnesota State House of Representatives from District 63-B this coming fall.

Drew, 37, is a life-long Highland area resident, having attended Groveland Elementary, Central High, and the University of Minnesota. He and his wife, the former Mary Dobis, are the parents of two children, Stephanie and Kevin.

Drew presently serves on the District 15 Planning Committee, the Ramsey County Social Service Committee, and the 63-B Independent-Republican Organization. He is also an active member of House of Hope Presbyterian Church, the Highland-Groveland-Macalester Community Association, the Lincoln Republican Club of St. Paul, the Homecroft Community Association, and American Legion Post 566.

In announcing his candidacy, Drew said, "My involvement in the Highland Park area has made me keenly aware that government today is not responding to the needs of the people it purports to serve.

"Without responsible and responsive representation on the state level, we cannot make our voices heard," he said. "I have made the commitment to run a vigorous, hard-hitting campaign on the issues as well as the dismal voting record our present representative has compiled in the last session of the Legislature."

(Ed. note: District 63-B is bounded on the east by Lexington, on the south and west by the Mississippi, and on the north by St. Clair, Finn and James Ave. Dick Cohen is the district's current representative in the House.)

District 14 and 15 merger given go-ahead


A plan to merge St. Paul Planning Districts 14 and 15 to form a single Southwest Area District Council was approved at a recent public meeting, but not without objections from members of the Randolph Heights Neighborhood Association.

Purpose of the meeting, which was held on March 30 in St. Joseph's Hall at the College of St. Catherine, was to prepare a framework for consolidation of the two districts for future recognition by the St. Paul City Council.

The Highland-Groveland-Macalester Community Association served as convener for the meeting, after having worked for over a year on the organizational structure of a proposed combined district council.

Howard Guthmann, president of Hi-Gro-Mac, made the official presentation to merge the two districts. "If we combine 14 and 15, it'll be a natural," he said. "A single Southwest Area District Council will have more clout."

Gene Conway, president of the Randolph Heights Neighborhood Association,

questioned whether a large community organization such as the proposed district council could be responsive to the needs of the numerous smaller neighborhoods it would try to represent.

Under the plan for the combined district council, the Randolph Heights area would be represented by at least four of 21 seats on the

district council, not counting the possibility of at-large representation. Randolph Heights is currently represented by four of ten seats in District 14.

When the work currently underway to merge the two districts is complete, the recommendations will be presented to the St. Paul City Council for approval or rejection. Should the new district council be granted official recognition, an election will be held to choose its 29 board members—21 from the various sub-districts that make up the area, four at-large representatives from District 14, and four from District 15.

The original district planning process was initiated in 1975 when the St. Paul City Council divided the city into 17 separate planning areas and urged the residents within each area to organize themselves into planning committees.

The process was set in motion when those planning committees, comprised of interested area residents, began work on master plans for their particular sections of the city. Later, after district councils formed and secured city council recognition, area residents were encouraged to take stands on issues which concerned their neighborhoods, and submit recommendations for projects to be funded with community development funds.

According to Guthmann, the Hi-Gro-Mac Community Association favored the merger at this time because it saw the two homogenous units would operate more

effectively if they worked together.

Karen Christofferson, city citizen participation coordinator, lent some support to Hi-Gro-Mac's claim by indicating that council organization is a more relevant factor than size.

"There isn't much difference if you're combined, one way or the other," she said. "The more tightly organized you are, the more clout you have."

Just how much clout the Randolph Heights neighborhood will have under the combined district council concerns some of the members of the Randolph Heights Association.


One member of the organization said he preferred that 14 and 15 remain separate, fearing that his neighborhood might be ignored within the structure of the larger Southwest Area District Council. He did not favor the Randolph Heights neighborhood splitting off and creating its own district council, however, because of its relatively small population.

During the ensuing discussion, an impasse developed between the representatives of Randolph Heights who did not favor the merger and those who did. When a poll was taken of the residents from District 14 who live in the six sub-districts west of the Randolph Heights area, all indicated they supported the merger.

Christofferson then suggested a compromise whereby the two districts would be combined, with the provision that the four sub-districts which comprise Randolph Heights remain free to withdraw from the Southwest Area District Council after a year's time.

When the motion was submitted to a voice vote, the only audible nay came from the president of the Randolph Heights Neighborhood Association. After the meeting, Conway explained he was in a difficult position because he had to represent Randolph Heights as its association president, yet owed an obligation to Hi-Gro-Mac as one of its board members.

The St. Paul City Council will hold a public meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, May 2 in the main dining room of St. Joseph's Hall at the College of St. Catherine to fully explain the proposed merger to the area residents affected.

Mail registration opens April 17 for St. Kate's summer sessions





Recruits now being sought for 1978-79 Bucket Brigade

Volunteers are currently being recruited for the 1978-79 Bucket Brigade, a tutorial program in St. Paul public and parochial schools designed to help children with learning problems in grades K-3.

Initiated by the St. Paul Junior League three years ago, the Bucket Brigade gets its name from the containers which carry the multi-sensory teaching aids trained volunteers bring to the 53 school presently involved in the program. These volunteers assist youngsters twice a week on a one-to-one basis.

The idea, according to Jane O'Neill, Bucket Brigade coordinator at Highland Catholic School, is to help young children who are just beginning to fall behind in the classroom—before more serious problems develop. Those eligible for the program are designated by their teachers and principals for work in specific skill areas. More than merely academic, the goal of the program is also to aid in the development of the child's self image.

One distinctive feature of the Bucket Brigade program is the careful attention to volunteer training. Besides numerous training sessions, all volunteers attend monthly support meetings with their school coordinators. It is this support system that allows for the high level of communication maintained throughout the program.

Let's see now... where was I before I was so rudely interrupted? But nothing that transpired this past fortnight in any way interfered with my ability and desire to read, think or keep abreast of developments on the local, state and national scene. I just have to be impressed with the way Mike took on the herculean task of doubling in brass, the way Dennis picked up so much of the additional slack, how a new John Ruddy stepped into the breach and shared so many of the evening and weekend vigils with Mike, and how Jan and Liz both put in a lot of extra time to bring this issue to you without a hitch. When the old man gets back, we're all going to work a little less! It takes something like this to make you do sooner that which you've been planning to do all along. But it's really satisfying to realize that, while they still need your long-run help in a small organization such as the Villager happens to be, the staff has the savvy, tenacity and the skills necessary to carry on in your absence and come through with flying colors.

It shouldn't be hard for Len Jambor to relate to the foregoing remarks. In one of life's little ironies, Len stopped in twice, a weekend ago, for a few pleasant words and a little admonition like "God is trying to tell you something." Less than 48 hours later who comes in to occupy a bed on the same ward? Yup, that very same impresario of real estate. Len's doing fine, though... at least he wrangled a pass from the hospital Sunday, before going back for more tests this week. You know Len.

But let's get on to what's been going on around and about us in the meantime. Among the more predictable was the closing of Shoppers Paradise on the old Hove's site. Don't believe I ever ran into anybody who felt that type of grocery concept could ever succeed in this service-oriented area... or that you could do much business on a cash only, no checks accepted basis. Maybe we'll still get that first-rate variety store operation, whose owners would dearly love to move into that site.

Stu Pihlstrom, I understand, has sold his Highland Car Wash to Tom Mahan, who resides with his family in suburban Burnsville. Stu had been a fixture at that location for 18 years, but feels now that he ought to concentrate his attention on his prime Bloomington location (92nd and Lyndale), which I'm told is the largest of its type in the Upper Midwest. Good luck to Stu and also to the Mahan who'll be keeping our cars clean in the future.

Of course, I had to miss the March 30 meeting convened by Hi-Gro-Mac to get the city recognition process underway for the proposed new "Southwest Area District Council." If all hands approve, a new organization by that name would be formed to represent the combined areas of Districts 14 and 15 and would draw heavily from the experienced hands who have worked so diligently to put the district plans together. Hi-Gro-Mac would retreat into dormancy... be put in mothballs, as it were. The combination seems to be a natural as far as I'm concerned... after all, Randolph Avenue represents a rather artificial and arbitrary border in many respects. Just one example... for as long as I can remember, there's been a Highland-Groveland Recreation Association, a terrifically successful operation for youthful sports activity—and it covers all but a small area of both districts.

I'm aware of only one exception... Edgcombe playground, which has a strong sports program of its own. According to my best information, they have been invited to join with HGRA in the past, but so far have preferred to go it alone... and certainly we're not in any way critical of

that decision. But it does indicate a certain independence of spirit.

That same independence of spirit may account for the fact that the only reservations to this combined district concept seem to come from the Randolph Heights Neighborhood Association, an organization that came to the fore when confronted with the threat of an unwanted commercial intrusion into a nice residential area with a playground (Edgcombe) that literally cried for expansion. Happily the Byerly bid was thwarted and a combination of high-rise apartments, townhouses, expanded parkland and open space is in the offing. Randolph Heights and the Summit-Hill organization carried the ball in that successful effort. But I'm sure they haven't forgotten how supportive the Hi-Gro-Mac organization and individual board members were back in those crucial hot summer sessions in City Hall. People west of Snelling and south of Randolph also stood to gain if the "right" decisions were made. No neighborhood is an island, one could say... if he doesn't mind a little paraphrasing.

What I'm trying to say, I guess, is that I don't feel Randolph Heights need fear being "swallowed up" by an umbrella-type Southwest Area District Council. There's obviously a need for a watchful eye on a smaller neighborhood level, too. And with all that's still popping out in that area, it might be wise to make sure RHNA doesn't become dormant... at least not during the next few years.

Of course, I can't allow myself to wind down without some commentary on the upcoming city election. One thing I don't hear much anymore... the suggestion we go to four-year terms. Haven't we got something like that right now? The one thing Mayor Latimer and some of our councilmen have to fear is getting rusty in their campaigning procedures, if they don't get some significant opposition one of these years. Only if Rosalie Butler wins will there even be a semblance of a minority voice. And I wouldn't wager a farthing on her chances right now. Running as an independent is no picnic... don't know how strong a campaign organization she's actually developed, but it won't begin to compare with what she's facing in the McMahon efforts.

Levine, Hunt and Tedesco have no opposition at all. And since the Independent-Republicans seem to be concentrating their money where they have a chance, council candidates Leo Burger (A), Woody Thompson (E) and Albert Brisson, Sr. (D) don't have a ghost of a show. Ron Maddox and Joanne Showalter should be home free, with no need for election night jitters. Independent Bob Moder was apparently spurred into running by neighborhood concerns such as he and his counterparts were experiencing in their resistance to the old Bethel College campus as a Job Corps site. He could make Dave Hozza listen to the returns for at least a while that evening.

There's nothing dull about the school board races, though. You might consider going to the polls for that reason alone... if the other races aren't enough to get you off your duff on April 25th. Dan Bostrom and Kathy Vellenga are challenging incumbents Emery Barrette, Jim Griffin and Eleanor Weber. Forget Lennard Wm. Magnuson, strictly a ringer, who's only in there trading on a name—with no apparent other qualifications. Look for Catherine Piccolo to give appointee Wayne Wittman a good run, too, for the two-year term.

One of these days I hope to see a complete breakdown in the party endorsement process as it pertains to the school board... it just doesn't belong. Methinks we're seeing the first signs of that this time around, but we'll know more after the election.

Since I'm supposed to take it easy, I'm just not going to get into subjects like taxes or inflation. Might increase my pulse rate beyond easy control, when I talk about things that seem out of control. But I want to wind it up today with a little nostalgic reflection.

It was Don Riley's Sunday column that caused it all—his conversation with Johnny Kundla about the halcyon days of the Minneapolis Lakers back in the late 40's and early 50's. Many people seem to forget that major league sports in these parts antedated the Twins' and Vikings' arrival here back in 1961. Yup, there was major league basketball here before there was even a Highland Villager.

Riley's article caused me to reminisce about my own first experiences with basketball on the big college and big-time pro level. I can recall coming down from Sauk Centre to see Johnny Kundla and Gordy Addington play against and beat a fine Illinois team with its outstanding tall and husky All Big Ten center, Pick Dehner. Know how big he was? 6'3". Kundla, as I recall, played forward at 6'2". Addington at 5'8". When's the last time you saw a Big Ten forward or even guard play that close to the floor—and on a championship team at that?

All that came back to mind, along with the many times I had seen the Lakers play while they were on top of the heap. Would pro basketball ever be the same in these precincts? I don't know, but I kinda doubt it.

I'd give you a parting punchline but my notes are all at the office. And you know what the Doc said. So now I lay me down to nap... and leave the rest to the faithful staff.

Election day message from an area student

Freedom's fare: 'Vigilance against the rule of complacency'

Apathy is not innate; it is learned. Many times it takes the honest innocence of the young to jolt society into casting off the chains of complacency. A stimulating message by one area student is particularly challenging in this pre-election period.

Mary Jane LaVigne, 18, a senior at Breck High School, won first place in January in the State of Minnesota Voice of Democracy essay contest sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. She is the daughter of James and Margaret LaVigne, 1386 Fairmount Avenue.

Her essay, reprinted here as it appeared in the February 14 Congressional Record, reflects a noble vision of responsibility and presents a challenge for us all.

On the banks of the Tigris River in Mesopotamia was found a small human skull. Though it was over 400 thousand years old, its age, to me, was not its most distinguishing feature. But rather, the fact that the spinal cord was attached at its base. It was this attachment which identified it as the first human, for it was the first being which stood upright, opened its eyes, and was aware of the world around it.

It is from this being that my responsibility to America originates, for it is my responsibility as an American to stand on two feet, to open my eyes and above all to use my mind. The American ideal is not one of Godlike despots and unthinking serfs, but rather of human beings in the most glorious sense of the word, of humans whose hands and legs took them across a continent. We should not fool ourselves into thinking their motives to be those of history and glory, for they were not. They were, rather, the simple desire of men and women to grow, to build, to think and to live in Freedom.

We have now subdued the frontier and today the family's trek across the continent is carried out in a camper and station wagon rather than covered wagon and oxen. But, we must not lose sight of the larger purpose, the continuing struggle to live in freedom.

Give up a vote for convenience, give up a belief for compromise, and it will not be long before those privileges will be gathered into

the hands of those who would rule, not serve. In our comfort, we must not stop caring, we must not close our eyes, we must not stop thinking. My responsibility is to care, to open my eyes, and to think. We, unlike former generations, have no great struggle, no threatening power, no land to tame. Yet, our struggle is perhaps the most difficult and the most important. Our struggle is against apathy, against comfort and against the ease with which we could say, "it runs alright, it will continue while I rest."

We do not vote, it doesn't seem to matter; we do not attend meetings, we probably would not be heard; we do not interfere, we might get sued; we do not express our ideas, they might conflict, and that would be uncomfortable. And it seems as though life continues with less conflict, with less uneasiness, with less thought.

When Thomas Jefferson said, "I have sworn upon the altar of God eternal hostility against any form of tyranny over the mind of men," he imagined that tyranny would come from an outside force, but it has not. The moment we allow complacency to rule, we betray the event of that being 400 thousand years ago, and the struggles and deaths of 200 years of American men and women, for we close our eyes, we fail to stand on our two feet and we refuse to think. My responsibility is a vigilance against the rule of complacency.

Mary Jane presented her essay in the national contest March 3-8 in Washington, D.C., where she placed in the top ten out of 53 contestants. Her "capital" experience was preceded by a lucrative journey through the VFW's local competitions. In the first contest at Breck in November, Mary Jane won \$25.00; in winning the district in December she earned \$175.00; and by gain-

ing top honors in the state finals, she received \$750.00. According to John O'Neill, VFW department adjutant, approximately 3,700 young Minnesotans entered the recent competition.

Mary Jane speaks and writes with political maturity. But then, not every 18-year old is as involved in the democratic process. She is active in the local Republican party, and is currently a volunteer in Rudy Boschwitz' senatorial campaign. She is a member of Breck's debate team and attended the Summer Debate Institute at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. She plans to enroll in the Georgetown School of Foreign Service next fall to pursue a degree in International Relations.

Her essay, in her own words, was not a sudden inspiration, but rather a culmination of many years of being aware of what was going on around her. "In actual writing time, it took me three hours," she said, "but I like to believe it took 18 years. Everything you experience is a part of you. My essay is an expression of all I've learned and done so far in my life. I sincerely believe in everything I wrote."

Although the competition is over, the rewards of her accomplishments continue. In June, Mary Jane will travel to Owensboro, Kentucky for the American Academy of Achievements' "Meeting of the Greats." As part of her first place prize in the state competition, she will join 300 high school seniors in meeting several of the nation's top business and government leaders.

When quizzed about her back-home political aspirations, Mary Jane, with a little smile and a lot of political savvy, refused to commit herself. My guess—look for her in '86.

The St. Paul League of Women Voters recently asked all candidates for election to the St. Paul Board of Education to respond to nine questions concerning school policies. Excerpts from responses to two of those questions are reprinted below:

Should junior and senior high programs be developed to coordinate with the diversified elementary programs? Explain your views on continuity between the three levels.

Answers from candidates for a four-year term (three to be elected):

Emery Barrette

Yes. In fact, one of the school board's objectives is "to develop continuity in basic skills programs in elementary through junior high by June, 1978." Expansion of these concepts in junior and senior high is both needed and desired.

Daniel Bostrom

To have an effective program in kindergarten through 12th grade, the efforts of elementary, junior high and senior high schools must be coordinated. I would propose that a study be undertaken to consider placing the responsibility of elementary and secondary curriculum under one person. This assistant superintendent would then coordinate all education (K-12), thus assuring a continuous flow of communication at each level.

James Griffin

Yes. We must continually monitor these programs to see that we do everything in our power to coordinate our junior and senior high programs with our diversified elementary programs.

Lennard Maguson

No response.

Kathleen Vellenga

Of course there should be continuity between the levels or we could deprive the student of a program just as he/she would be reaching the time of full development of skills and interests. As the innovative programs now being developed and/or implemented progress, it will be essential that the students involved be able to carry on a continuous program.

Eleanor Weber

Yes, they must be coordinated. Material learned at one level is the basis for the next—especially in reading, language arts, mathematics, science and world languages. Coordination gives the student the best chance for continuous success at his/her own pace, for acquiring a firm foundation for future learning, and for stretching school dollars.

Answers from candidates for a two-year term (one to be elected):

Catherine Piccolo

Elementary, junior high, and senior high programs must be coordinated. Advanced courses in the secondary levels should build upon the learning in the elementary grades. Continuity is necessary to ensure that learning at each successive level of a progressive course covers portions of the subject not previously taught.

Wayne Wittman

Coordination is needed in order to insure that a student at a higher educational level has the needed prerequisite training to effectively participate in the higher course.

What do you feel should be done about schools with small enrollments?

Candidates for a four-year term:

Emery Barrette

Small school enrollment is not necessarily bad. In fact, the school district has found new space for program expansion as well as for programs recently housed in leased facilities. I personally feel junior high enrollments, in most cases, have been too high. The school board must weigh the community benefits of keeping a school open with the benefits of closing the school.

Daniel Bostrom

Before a school is closed, an Environmental Impact study of the area served by the school should be made. If research shows that a school can no longer be operated at an acceptable cost per student, the facts must be presented to the community served, along with viable alternatives.

James Griffin

It will be necessary to close some small schools. However, we will make every attempt to keep as many schools open as is economically feasible.

Lennard Magnuson

No response.

Kathleen Vellenga

One of the greatest assets we have in St. Paul is our neighborhoods and often the center of that neighborhood is the school. Therefore, as enrollment goes down and costs go up, closing small schools becomes a very difficult and crucial question. When a school's enrollment dwindles below 200, it may no longer be financially feasible to operate this building. Decisions made regarding school closings must be made with the greatest possible contribution from those affected.

Eleanor Weber

Enrollment projections indicate that by 1981 there will be at least 8,000 fewer students in St. Paul public schools. All schools, large and small, must be studied to develop a district-wide long range plan for effective school use. Criteria for evaluation of the schools should include: importance to the community, providing a quality program to meet individual needs, cost to operate, condition of building, transportation costs, and the building's role in the district's desegregation plan.

Candidates for a two-year term:

Catherine Piccolo

I believe that junior high schools with small enrollments of about 500 students can function effectively and should be left alone. I do not foresee any difficulties with the current plans for senior high schools. Elementary schools with small enrollments can be consolidated only if the neighborhood and community councils have been consulted and have had an opportunity to participate in the decision-making process.

Wayne Wittman

Enrollment in a school is only one factor in educational planning. Our concern should be the best educational program for a youngster at an equitable cost. Factors of transportation, population shifts, and possible consolidations are factors that should be considered. School closings or consolidations should be done with much lead time, conscious thought and community input.

Aid for unpaid electric, fuel bills available through May 1

Ramsey Action programs, Inc., (RAP) has received an initial grant of \$182,000 from the Community Services Administration to assist Ramsey County residents with unpaid fuel and electricity bills.

The money will be distributed to low-income residents who are still suffering financial hardships resulting from rising energy costs, the extended cold weather of recent months, and bills dating back to December 31, 1977.

Ramsey County residents who can furnish proof of income and evidence of unpaid home heating or electrical bills can be helped with sums up to \$250 each. The money will be paid directly to the fuel supplier

or to NSP, depending upon the type of fuel the consumer issues. This assistance is only available until May 1, under the current federal authorization.

Senior citizens with past due bills are a priority of the special grant money. Additionally, special attention will be given to those who face life and health threatening situations and to those who applied for crisis intervention funds last year and were unable to receive assistance. Eligibility for the program is based on family size and gross income.

Ramsey County residents who think they might qualify for assistance should call RAP's Energy Office at 227-7717.

Mac receives NEH grant

The National Endowment for the Humanities has awarded a \$50,000 grant to Macalester College to inaugurate a long-range effort to improve reading in the humanities.

The project, to be known as "The Life of the Mind," is one of 29 pilot projects funded this year by the NEH. It will enable Macalester to support a cluster of special seminars in the humanities as a part of its Freshman Seminar program.

In the seminars, small numbers of students will work closely with faculty members to develop techniques for interpreting paintings, musical and dramatic works, architecture, poetry, novels and philosophical or religious writings. This approach emphasizes the study of the relationships between various fields of knowledge and the development of the skills needed to work in them.

An important component of the project will be a four-week summer institute for the nine faculty members who are scheduled to conduct the seminars. The faculty, assisted by visiting nationally known consultants, will discuss new ways of teaching interdisciplinary courses. Recent developments in the fields of psycholinguistics and reading will be combined with more traditional approaches to the study of artifacts of human creation.

The St. Paul Planning Commission and Parking Commission have announced that a public meeting will be held to review the downtown parking plan. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 19 in the 2nd floor conference room at 421 Wabasha.

The purpose of the meeting is to provide St. Paul residents with an opportunity to discuss the proposal with Planning and Parking Commission members.

Key recommendations in the draft plan are: (1) development of an effective short term parking system to serve shoppers, patrons and visitors; and (2) development of a fringe parking system to serve all-day employee parkers.

Free service now available to displaced homemakers

Working Opportunities for Women (WOW) was recently selected by the Department of Economic Security as the Metropolitan Center for Displaced Homemakers. WOW is a non-profit organization offering a comprehensive career planning program for women. Through its displaced homemaker project, it will offer its services free to unemployed persons who have spent a substantial number of their adult years as homemakers and suddenly—through death, divorce or other loss of family income—must find paid employment to support themselves and their dependents.

Naomi Bell is a 53-year-old displaced homemaker who has recently gone through the WOW program. "My husband just sat up and died on me three years ago," she said. Naomi did not have a job when her husband died, but she did have three children.

"I had worked, but I wasn't certain I wanted to go back to the same kind of work," she said. Naomi, who is presently employed at Humboldt Junior High School as an Educational Assistant working with physically handicapped children, is one of thousands of displaced homemakers in the metropolitan area. Often displaced homemakers have never received a salary and are ineligible for welfare, social security, unemployment, and health and retirement benefits.

With the rising rate of divorce and separation, and the longer life expectancy of women, an increasingly large percentage of American women are or will become displaced homemakers at some point in their lives.

Jackie Holm is also a middle-aged woman whose husband died last August. Jackie had spent 25 years of her life caring for her boys, her husband and her home. Now her youngest son has moved and is on his own.

Like many other women, she found herself needing and wanting a job, but having no paid work experience over the last 25 years.

"When I came to WOW," said Jackie, "I didn't know where I was coming from. Now I'm learning about the availability of certain jobs, exploring jobs I didn't know anything about, learning about interviewing for employment, writing a resume, and personal communication."

WOW helps women explore their vocational interests; expand their job options; identify their work needs, motivations and marketable skills; learn about training options and sources of financial aid; and develop the self-confidence to take risks and make informed decisions regarding employment.

A unique feature of the WOW program is an interview in which displaced homemakers choose

careers which interest them, then discuss the job possibilities with people currently working in those fields.


WOW counselors set up the interviews and prepare the participants by helping them develop effective interviewing techniques and define what it is they need to know about the job, its compensations and its difficulties, what training is necessary and what possibilities it offers for advancement.

Career counselors at WOW provide a supportive environment for identifying skills which displaced homemakers have acquired during years of service in the home or in volunteer work.

For example, displaced homemakers have often provided health and child care, managed finances, purchased goods and services, organized the home, done decorating and maintenance work. Some have held office, served on boards or advisory groups of community agencies, organized funding drives, written newsletters, or managed community educational or public relations efforts.

Women going through the WOW program find that serious career planning takes a lot of time and effort. "If I could give advice to other women who are left alone, I would tell them not to be in a rush for just any job," said Naomi Bell. "Take time and think about yourself and look around. Think about what it is that you want for yourself."

WOW offers free services to displaced homemakers at two sites: in the YWCA Women's Center, 65 East Kellogg Blvd. in St. Paul; and at the Sabathani Community Center, 3801 1st Ave. So. in Minneapolis. Further information about the programs offered at either site can be obtained by calling 227-8401.





Team B-4 POLICE REPORT

With spring in the air and summer on the way, bicycles are now coming out of the basements and garages. With them, also, have come bicycle thefts. Most bicycles stolen these days are multi-speed models valued at over \$100.

To protect your bicycle from theft this season, use a case-hardened chain and a sturdy padlock. The chain should be at least 3/8 of an inch thick and covered with plastic or an inner tube to prevent scratching the bike.

Always chain both the rear wheel and the frame to a stationary object in a conspicuous place. If you simply chain one wheel to the other, it can be easily tossed into a car or truck and the chain cut later.

Never leave your bicycle unchained and unattended, even for a short time. Your bicycle should be stored indoors or in a garage. And remember to lock your bicycle even when the garage is locked.

If you have children, here's a point to caution them on: If they lend their bicycles to a stranger who asks just to "try it out," they may never see their bicycles again.

Be sure to write your serial number, make, model, and your state registration numbers down, and put them in a safe place. In case of a theft, you will have them handy for the police. You can register your bicycle with the state registration program at any bicycle shop for a small fee.

Also, put your Minnesota Operation Identification Number on your bicycle. This number makes it hard to unload—and easy for police to trace—stolen property.

The play's the thing for Actors Theatre pair

"All the world's a stage, and all the men and women merely players."

So enter Nancy Bagshaw and Barbara Granning. Two young women. Two different personalities. One common interest — acting with St. Paul's newest professional Equity company, Actors Theatre of St. Paul.

"I'm a hometown girl who's lucky enough to have a hometown like the Twin Cities," said a smiling Barbara Granning.

Nancy Bagshaw also claims the Twin Cities as a home, though she's originally from Chester, Pennsylvania. "But my husband and his family are from the Highland Village area so the Twin Cities is very much my home," she said.

Why, with all the more stable, less pressured professions available, did these two choose the stage? For Barbara, a native of Robbinsdale, acting came very naturally, and very early — with her first show in her junior year of high school. Bitten by the stage bug, she pursued an undergraduate degree in theatre from St. Cloud State. She was later offered a Bush fellowship from the University of Minnesota, affording her her first chance to act with an Equity company at the Guthrie.

It was after seeing her work at the Guthrie that Michael Miner, artistic director for Actors Theatre, asked her to join the new fledged Actors Theatre company.

Nancy laughed when asked how her career as an actress began. "When I was growing up I was never one of those starry-eyed kids

who said, 'Someday I'm going to be an actress,' she said. I grew up with all sorts of ambitions, even thought seriously of being a surgeon."

But while acting in college, Nancy received continuous encouragement from the theater staff and decided acting deserved some dabbling.

When Nancy later moved to New York, she started her own advertising research company and pursued the stage in her spare time. Her company handled such marketing campaigns as the one for Johnson's "No More Tangles" as well as a number of products for Proctor and Gamble.

"Sure I loved what I was doing," said Nancy, "but suddenly I had no time left for acting."

Nancy soon merged her company with another hoping to give herself more time for acting. Shortly thereafter, she received an offer from Dudley Riggs, flew to the Twin Cities to investigate the job, fell in love with the area and moved here.

From the Legislature

The 1978 session of the Minnesota legislature came to an end with a marathon night session followed by emotional tributes to departing Speaker Martin Sabo and Minority Leader Henry Savelkoul. During the ten-week session a number of important pieces of legislation were passed. What follows is a summary of that legislation.

Taxes: A \$104 million dollar tax package passed with unanimous consent. Although the tax reduction does not go far enough, it is the first attempt by the legislature in 30 years to deal with the income tax problem. All citizens receive some form of tax break, with homemakers with children getting an additional break. In addition the sales tax on home heating fuel was abolished and the employers' excise tax was repealed.

Taxation of Pensions: Modifications were made in the taxation of public pensions although the formerly tax-free status was not completely reinstated. However, private pensions were put on an equal level with public pensions, and for the first time in the history of Minnesota, private pensions will be tax exempt to the level of \$7200.

I-35: The I-35E freeway controversy was finally resolved when the House-Senate conference committee agreed on a compromise package which will allow completion with a section of the freeway to be designed as a parkway. The entire freeway could be completed as early as 1981, thereby alleviating the traffic flow problem on such streets as Lexington, Snelling, Fairview and Cretin.

Sentencing: The legislature passed the sentencing guidelines reformation passed by the House last spring. This sentencing reform will set up a commission to promulgate guidelines in an effort to reduce sentencing disparities and keep hard-core offenders in prison. The legislation is considered to be the most far-reaching reform passed by any state in the country.

Abortion and Family Planning: The use of public funds for welfare abortions was severely restricted, and a family planning measure was passed.

Energy: A comprehensive energy package was put into law which sets insulation standards for the state as well as providing for the use of alternative energy sources.

School Aids: A supplemental school aid bill was passed which will provide help especially to the core cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis. St. Paul officials expect that the aid will be particularly helpful in attempting to get a grasp on the declining enrollment problem.

Obviously not all critical issues were resolved, but it appears that out of the confusion of the end of the session, some significant legislation needed by Minnesota was passed. I was disappointed that my sunset and zero-based budgeting legislation did not pass this year to control government size, but it is obvious that support is growing for such a concept and will hopefully be successful next year. In addition the legislature should further reduce income tax rates next year and continue its efforts to stabilize and lower property taxes.
