

11th Highland Art Fair hits the Village with expanded entertainment schedule

Many of the Midwest's leading artists and craftpersons will be among the nearly 300 exhibitors who will display and sell their creations during the 11th annual Highland Village Art Fair.

Scheduled to run from Friday through Sunday, September 22-24, the annual admission-free event will center around the corner of Ford Parkway and Cleveland Avenue, and fan out for blocks in all four directions. Art fair hours will run from morning to nightfall on all three days.

Besides the many professional and semi-professional artists who over the years have helped make the Highland Village Art Fair St. Paul's largest outdoor art show and sale, numerous amateur artists, working in much different media, will also play a part in this vear's festivities

Among them will be the Chimera Youth Theatre Company from the Edyth Bush Theatre, which will present a free performance of its popular touring production, The Wise People of Gotham. An original show for children of all ages, the play will be presented at 3:30 p.m. on Friday, September 22 on a portable stage, secured for the occasion courtesy of the St. Paul Department of Parks and Recreation and set up on what used to be the Hove's parking lot.

Dozens of students from Highland Park Senior and Junior High Schools will also lend their various talents to the cause. The Highland Park Theatre of the Deaf, under the direction of Chris Thiers, and the Highland Park Senior High School Band, under the direction of Stan Bulka, will perform in a specially

designated area in tront of Mid America State Bank of Highland Park at the corner of Fork Parkway and Ken-

In addition, disco dancing lessons and a disco contest, conducted by Highland Senior High grad Tim Shaughnessy, will be held on the site. For performance dates and times, please refer to the Mid America Bank ad in the Go & Do section of this issue.

Inner City Education offers college courses for adults

Twenty-seven college level courses representing a wide variety of academic interests will be offered beginning this week at numerous neighborhood locations in St. Paul.

Sponsored by the Inner City Education program, a cooperative effort on the part of Inver Hills Community College and the Oneida Education Center, the courses are designed for adults who wish to return to school on a parttime basis for purposes of job advancement, a career change or personal development. College credit is offered through Inver Hills.

The classes, most of which will meet in the evening, will generally emphasize practical information applicable to job and other day-to-day situations. Registration is currently being accepted for courses in business, career development, dance, English, human services, math, physical education, psychology and Spanish. Also available are topical studies including Introduction to Energy and The History of St. Paul.

Among the many area schools and organizations which have offered to host the class sessions are Homecroft School, the St. Paul Jewish Community Center, the Adult Community Education Center, Oneida Education Center, St. Clair playground and the Minnesota Opera Company.

Course fees are reasonable (\$12 per credit) and tuition assistance is available. A college counselor is also available at Oneida to assist anyone seeking academic guidance or career planning help.

Breck student finds 'liberated' China well on its way to full industrialization



Ed. note: Twenty-five students from Breck and Minneapolis Central high schools spent 12 days in the People's Republic of China this past summer under the sponsorship of the U.S.-China People's Friendship Association. To get just as much out of the trip as they would, the 25 put just as much into it as they could in the brief time they had after being selected from among a much larger group of local hopefuls. Part of that preparation included two months of weekly meetings and crash courses in Chinese language, history, culture and current events.

Two Highland area students, both from Breck, were among those chosen to make the trip: Beth Kaplan (14), daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Kaplan of 1280 Hillcrest Ave.; and Lizann Schloff (16), daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Ivan Schloff of 2247 Edgcumbe Road.

It took little prodding for Lizann to commit her still vivid memories to paper. and believing our readers would find facinating a local high school girl's thoughts on China and the one-fourth of the world's population

probably least understood, we've printed here a slightly condensed version of her written account.

Our first stop after leaving Los Angeles was Hong Kong, where we spent a day before boarding a train for the passage into Canton, China. Canton and Hong Kong, though only 90 miles apart, seem like two different worlds. Unlike the crowded streets of British Hong Kong, very few cars are seen on Canton's wide, tree-lined avenues where the main mode of transportation is the bicycle. In Canton, revolutionary posters are hung in place of billboards and neon signs and neatly cultivated rice fields begin right at the city's edge, leaving little physical separation between Canton and its surrounding countryside.


During the 12-day trip, we also traveled to the cities of Nanchang and Shanghai, visiting schools, factories, hospitals and a commune. We spent time in private homes, attended cultural and sporting events and even witnessed an operation performed under acupuncture anethesia.

We were fortunate enough to spend two days in Lushan, a mountain village which had recently been opened to foreign visitors. Since the majority of China's 850 million people live in the countryside, our visit to Lushan enabled us to see how most Chinese citizens live. It was definitely the highlight of my trip.

Although we saw many interesting places, it was the people that made this trip to China so fascinating. Since crime is practically non-existent, we were able to walk without fear down the city streets and mingle with the people. Despite my limited Chinese vocabulary. I was able to communicate with the help of our interpreters and several Central students. The Chinese seemed genuinely interested in learning more about me and my country.

I was impressed on learning that there are no "old folks homes" in China. Every able-bodied man and woman works, regardless of age. The older people live with their children and grandchildren where they are treated with great respect. As Americans grow older, we often develop depression and metal illness due to feelings of worthlessness and incapabilities. Chinese senior citizens, on the other hand, are allowed to maintain a sense of importance and dignity.

Many social and educational improvements have been made since Mao Tsetung and the Chinese Communist Party took control of mainland China in 1949. Today over 90 percent of China's population is literate, compared to less than ten percent prior to the "liberation." China has apparently eliminated the social problems of drug addiction. prostitution, inflation and unemployment. However, though the Chinese claim to be making advances in industrial and agricultural production, most of the fields we saw were plowed by hand or with water buffalo; we saw very few trac-

The Chinese hope to be totally industrialized by 1985 and the people admit that they have a long way to go before achieving this goal. When we asked some Chinese students about their personal goals, all replied they they would like to do anything to help their country and build socialism. With that attitude, China's hopes for industrialization by 1985 is certainly not an impossible dream!

It frightens me though, this extreme dedication to the country, for it almost seems like the government runs the people's lives. After questioning the people through our interpreters, I was told that all citizens

have a say in the government. They assured me that there is room for social criticism during the frequent street committee meetings. However, there was no way I could tell how far they could actually go in their criticism of the system.

My main objective in going to China was to learn as much as possible about the Chinese way of life through first-hand experiences. Having achieved that objective, I'm now spending time learning more about this fascinating and important country, with the hope that some day I will be able to return.



Board of Education sets policy for school-sponsored field trips

The St. Paul Board of Education recently approved a new field trip policy for the city's public schools. The move comes several months after a handicapped 11-year-old St. Paul boy was found drowned after straying from a group of students visiting Crosby Park on a field trip.

Willie Seals, who was disabled and partially blind, disappeared May 16 while on a science learning center field trip with 45 other students and four adults. His body was found later in the Mississippi River near Lilydale Marine, about a mile below the

The school district had guidelines for field trips. but the board had never established an offical policy. The new policy clearly specifies the number of teachers required for a set number of students on a trip.

The new policy calls for a minimum ratio of one adult to 10 students at the elementary level, one adult to 14 students at the junior high level, one adult to 17 students at the senior high level, and no less than one adult to 10 students with special needs.

In addition, parents or

special needs will now have the opportunity to accompany their children on field trips.

Activities planned near water will require additional supervision, and those activities that involve students being on or in the water require the presence of a certified water safety instructor.

Teachers planning field trips are required to distribute an authorization slip to the parents of participants. The slip must have information concerning the what, when, where and why of the trip, and information on any potential hazards. Parents have the right to approve or deny their child's participation on the trip, and are also asked to note any special health problems or handicaps.

No student will be allowed to take a field trip without written authorization from a parent. The slip must be returned to the school at least two days in advance of the trip and students who fail to return the authorization notice will remain in school.

Those in charge of the field trip are also required to establish a buddy system guardians of students with among the students.



Hope the weather stays nice for our upcoming local fairs, not this coming weekend, but on the 22nd, 23rd and 24th. This will be the eleventh consecutive year for the Highland Village Benefit Art Fair, sponsored for your ogling and buying pleasure once again by the Highland Business Association. Add to that "listening" pleasure, too. because this Art Fair will bring you more free entertainment than heretofore.

Highland Park Senior High will once again bring its band, under the direction of Stan Bulka; there will be performances by the Theatre of the Deaf; and Disco pro Tim Shaughnessy, Highland alumnus, will be on hand to demonstrate and lead participation in this dancing art. This all occurs, as in other years, in the area fronting on Mid America State Bank, on Ford Parkway near Kenneth.

But there's more. This year there'll be a portable stage on the one-time Hove's parking lot featuring presentations by the Chimera Youth Theatre and possible other performing art shows, not known to us by press time. So, you see, there'll be plenty to hear and see... besides all the art in all four direction from the Ford Parkway & Cleveland inter-

Speaking of the weather as we did a bit earlier, brings to mind an interesting, if perhaps not totally realistic thought. Should it rain incessantly during those days, would it be at all possible to use our two temporarily unoccupied "domed" exhibition halls? I'm speaking, of course, about the still empty Red Owl and Hove's store

In the meantime, I join you in hoping that some efforts will be made to spruce up parts of the Highland commercial area before Art Fair time is upon us. As late as this past Sunday, there were weeds (or should they be called shrubs by now) on the Hove's site that ranged up to and well beyond my average height. A lot of other business places could stand a little manicure or beautifying effort, too. As I walked by, I found the area south of Cecil's and north of the Highland Animal Hospital to be in a "Fine" mess. And maybe some of those building fronts with "for rent" signs on them could be made to look less seedy and more inviting...even for potential tenants. How about a real fall clean-up in the next week or so, fellows and girls. Of course, we'll have to do some more of it, after the Art Fair is history...but that's litter-ally the price of crowds and concentrated activity. Who would want it otherwise?

And while the Highland Village Art Fair tries to draw them in from the whole metro area and even outside the state, the Nativity "County" Fair isn't restricting attendance to any one county, either. If you love the fair atmosphere (and who doesn't) don't stray too far from home that weekend. Nativity's Fair also takes place September 22-23-24, starting with a disco dance for the young, and those who think young on Friday night. 

Sharonah shines as young Helen Keller in Mac's production of 'Miracle Worker'

All eyes will be on eightyear-old Sharonah Jacobus' eyes when Macalester College opens its community production of The Miracle Worker at 8:00 p.m. this Thursday, September 14 in the college's Janet Wallace Fine Arts Theatre.

Sharonah, the daughter of Dan and Denise Jacobus of 1794 Sargent Ave., has the starring role in William Gibson's dramatization of the childhood education of the blind and deaf Helen Keller.

Sharonah's won't be the only local talent on stage, however. In fact, all 19 of the play's characters are portrayed by area students, children and community theatre actors, most of whom live in the Macalester neighborhood.

But the audience's attention will undoubtedly focus on the third grader from Webster Magnet Elementary School who was chosen to tackle the demanding role of the young, undisciplined Keller.

Portraying a deaf and blind girl is definitely not an easy acting assignment. The

fact that the young Keller was sullen and unruly makes it even more difficult. To help Sharonah get the "feel" of her character. director Douglas Hatfield, dramatic arts professor at Macalester, had the young actress go through her scenes in the first few rehearsals blindfolded. And Jean Cullen, 1564 Selby Ave., who plays Keller's tutor, Annie Sullivan, was commissioned as an offstage tutor to teach Sharonah sign language.

It was probably Sharonah's previous experience with creative dance and gymnastics at the Jewish Community Center that helped her land the part. That, and a little help from a friend.

After a neighbor had read an audition announcement in the July 26 issue of the Villager, she asked the outgoing eight-year-old if she would like to accompany her to the tryout. Sharonah said yes, and so did the director, who selected her from among 25 other young aspirants. The neighbor didn't get a part, but then, that's show biz.

If the auditions were a breeze for the long-tressed Sharonah, the play itself whips her like a hurricane. Keller's educational breakthrough was characterized by stormy fits of stubbornness and arrogance. Physical restraint and corporal discipline dominate virtually all of Sharonah's scenes.

As Keller, she must flail away at her well-intentioned tutor, tumble over props and brace herself for retaliatory slaps-all while pretending she doesn't see the target of her own blows, the chair in her path or the back of the hand coming her

According to her mother, Sharonah handles the emotional and physical requirements of the role with surprising ease.

"I don't really understand how she was able to take the long rehearsals, night after night," Mrs. Jacobus said. "Especially considering the physical and emotional demands placed on her. But, somehow, she did. Like most little girls, she took it all in stride. She would come home after all that pretending, turn on the stereo, and unwind by dancing.'

Sharonah will get plenty of practice dancing in the next couple of weeks. The Miracle Worker will continue its run at Macalester College at 8:00 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays, September 15-16 and 22-23. For tickets and reservations, call 647-



baby grand, pianos. By repairing, reconditioning and rebuilding old pianos, Mike believes he can pro-

duce a higher quality piano than most new ones on the market today.

"I don't want to downgrade new pianos," said Mike, "because there are some wonderful ones made -if you don't mind paying \$3,500. But I feel pianos made 50 to 100 years ago were constructed better. The older pianos were taller, which meant longer strings. They were made better because labor and materials were cheaper, so more could be put into

them. "An example of this is in the wood used for the piano sounding board. Modern piano makers use sitka spruce, whereas older pianos had sounding boards made of white spruce, which is much more resonant."

Barton says that rebuilding can add 50 years to a used grand piano. Reconditioning will add at least 20 years to a used upright.

new tune: recycling old pianos In recent years Ameri- "And an older piano adds to the character of a home," Barton said.

The pianos in the Barton Keyboard showroom, ones built as early as 1868, certainly do have an aura of tradition about them.

The 29-year-old Barton has been playing the piano for 19 years and graduated as a music theory major from Chicago Musical College of Roosevelt University. He got his start in the used piano business five years ago at a tuning and rebuilding company in Chicago. A member of the Piano Technicians Guild, Barton also tunes pianos people already own. 



### 'Smoldering Conflict' of power line issue aired over KSJN

A searching look at the deep commitment of the opposing sides in the Minnesota power line controversy is the focus of a new documentary by area Peabody award-winning producer Greg Barron. Among them were company officials, heads of security, workmen, farmers and protesters. From these accounts, and a broad collection of sounds gathered, Barron produced this special report.

# Talking out of school

This week's Talking Out of School Traveling Trophy, the "Out of Sight-Out of Mind Award," goes to Mr. Ken Berg, Deputy Superintendent of Schools, for his recent remarks concerning the school district's \$4,000,000 surplus which had accumulated at the end of the last school year.

In effect, the administration had misled the public concerning its financial condition, citing lack of finances as a reason to turn down a multitude of programs and personnel requests last year. Now Berg has insulted our intelligence by claiming that "None of the balances we've generated have been at the expense of people being laid off."

Now, we will be the first to admit that we are not experts in school district accounting and budgeting practices. However, we find Berg's statement a little hard to believe.

In fact, one of our readers, an ex-teacher aide,(she's an "ex" because there was no money to pay her) wanted to know if Berg was really serious about his statement. After all, she had lost her job — or didn't they remember?

So we did some checking. We found that the school district's budget for techer aides during the 1976-1977 school year was \$594,000, in the 1977-1978 school year was \$294,000, and is \$325,000 for 1978-1979. Unless there is some financial magic operating here that we're unaware of, it's hard to imagine how anyone can cut the teacher aide budget by 50 percent and not lay people off.

As we have said, we are not experts in this area. But after seeing this one example of cost cutting, we wonder about the accuracy of the district's memory regarding the cutting of personnel to "balance the budget."

And so, Mr. Berg, to you and other members of the school administration who may need a memory aid, we present you with your award — an autographed 8 x 10 glossy group photo of all those ex-school district employees forgotten by the administration.

# Minnesota's political past exposed in election year series at Capitol

"Minnesota: Political Maverick," a four-lecture series covering the major forces in the state's political past, will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesdays beginning September 19 in Room 15 of the State Capitol.



# State decries highway robbery, sets amnesty to retrieve signs

In a move to get highway signs off of people's walls and back on the roads where they serve perhaps a less aesthetic, but more vital purpose, Governor Rudy Perpich has declared September 15-30 as 'Highway Sign Immunity Weeks," when persons may turn in their ill-gotten signs without penalty.

During the 16-day amnesty period, persons may return road signs with no questions asked and avoid prosecution under a new law which makes possession of the signs illegal and punishable by a fine of up to

According to Ed Novak, commissioner of Public Safety, the law applies to anyone who has any sort of highway sign or marker, whether the person stole it, found it or received it from someone else.

Besides the possession penalty, sign theft or vandalism also carries a maximum fine of \$500 or a jail sentence of up to 90 days, or both.

According to Novak, defaced or missing signs present a serious danger for drivers.

because they give motorists necessary information about the road and road conditions," Novak said. "When signs are stolen, what some term 'harmless pranks' often result in serious injury or death.

Novak cited the example of two fatalities in a recent accident that occured in Rice County at an intersection where a stop sign had been stolen the previous

Persons with illegally-harbored signs may turn them in at all county, city and Minnesota Department of Transportation maintenance shops. The nearest shop is located at Fort Snelling, Highways 55 and Crosstown in Minneapolis.

# Victims paid under Minnesota law for loss caused by crime


If you are the innocent victim of a crime, a legal dependent of a deceased crime victim or the person responsible for the victim's finances, you could qualify for reparations under a Minnesota law designed to help pay for medical expenses, lost wages and funeral costs in case of

The Minnesota Crime Victims Reparations Board awarded more than \$56,000 during July and August to 47 innocent victims of assult, arson and shootings. However, no reparations are made for property damage or loss.

Reparations are paid from state general revenue funds. The first \$100 of the claim and expenses covered by insurance are deducted from the reparations. The maximum amount a crime victim may receive is \$25,000.

To qualify, the crime must be reported to local law enforcement agencies within five days and then to the Crime Victims Reparations Board within a year.

To request information on filing forms, crime victims may call the Reparations Board at 296-7080.
