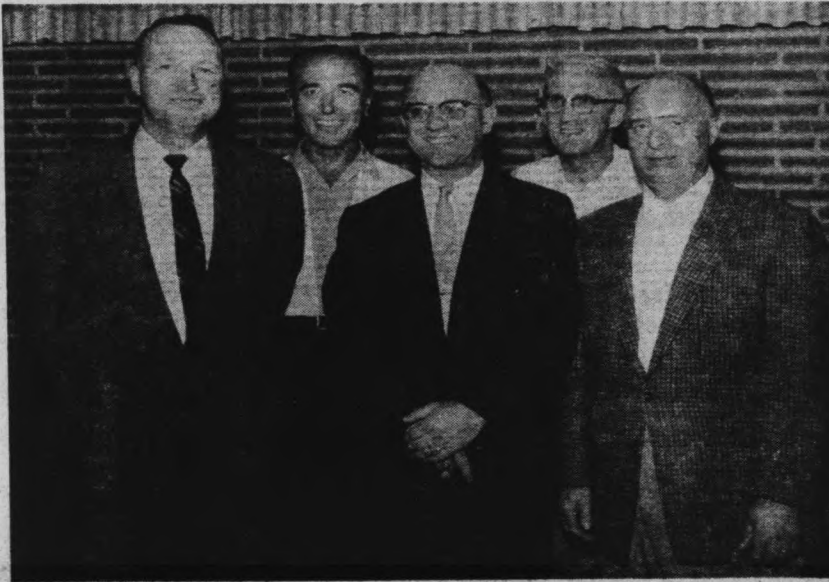

New Fire Station Opened in Highland

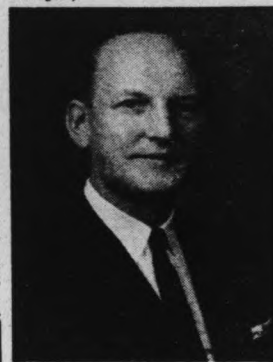

R. E. Stevenson, chairman of the Highland Civic Association promotion committee, reports that more than 30 Highland merchants will participate in the three-day fling.

"Participating firms will offer outstanding merchandise values," Mr. Stevenson said. "We feel our annual Highland Fling will be the biggest Highland business promotions in recent years. We are confident that the public will enjoy participating in our event."

Edgar Williams, president of the Highland Civic Association, called a special association meeting last week to complete plans for the promotion.

Richard Blair, instructor and director of the Macalester college pipe band, will lead the bagpipe unit. Mr. Blair was formerly the director of the United States Air Forces band in Washington, D. C. for four years. He has been at Macalester for the past year and a half.

John Wilson, drum instructor at Macalester, will also take part in the pipe unit. Mr. Wilson, a Scotsman, previously was with a civic band in Toronto, Canada, and played in Canadian regiments.

John Ford, pipe sergeant of the Macalester band, is the third member of the pipe trio.

Joan Hanson, a senior at Macalester, will perform dances throughout Thursday and Saturday during the promotion. Miss Hanson has taught Highland dances at Macalester for the past two years.

The free outdoor square dance will start at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday and will be held on the South side of Ford Parkway between Cleveland and Kenneth. An orchestra will provide dancing music between square dance numbers and the bag pipe unit will stage a special performance. The dance will end at 10:00 p.m.

ANNOUNCEMENT

Water Safety and the State Law

This Legal Column is prepared as a public service under the supervision of the Minnesota State Bar Association and the local district Bar Associations. Every effort is made to have each fact accurate in its interpretation of the law.

Good driving on the water involves all the elements of good driving on the road, and more. Safe driving on the water is a highly cooperative project. You must depend on other pilots as they depend on you. The necessity for safe piloting is becoming more intense because of the tremendous mushrooming of the boat business and boating.

According to a bulletin from the Minnesota State Bar association, arrest and conviction may be your lot if you operate your motor boat in a careless, negligent or reckless manner. Whereas practically the same "rules of the road" apply for the highway as well as the waterway, our State has made special statutory provisions for regulation of boating traffic.

If you are operating a water craft of any kind your actions are either correct or incorrect according to the law. Provision is made, however, for emergency situations so that good judgment in those cases where an alternative is possible may become the law.

Our State law also gives cities, towns, and villages authority to make safety regulations concerning power boats and equipment and may provide local fines for violations. There is no question about it — to operate a water craft you should know the law and regulate your actions accordingly, the Bar Association explains.

Some municipalities in Minnesota have enacted ordinances regulating activity on water within their jurisdiction. These laws are designated to increase boating pleasure, reduce danger and make "rules of the road" familiar to everyone. Boaters, for instance, are not necessarily limited in speed, but must not operate a craft in a careless or reckless manner. Certain areas of the lake are restricted where boating might endanger swimmers or other persons. Skiing or aquaplaning is allowed when more than 50 feet away from occupied craft but never in a swimming area or other congested areas. You should learn and know the special marks for danger areas, skin diving activities and dredging operations. Every boat when underway must show at least one light visible all around the horizon for 2 miles between sunset and sunrise.

Rights of way on the water are quite clear cut. Priority is established in the following order:

1. Swimmers.
 2. Anchored craft.
 3. Boat under sail.
 4. Row boat, canoe or other craft propelled by hand.
 5. Motor craft under power with tow.
 6. Motor craft under power.
- The boat on your right has the right of way.
The boat being overtaken has

the right of way, but must hold its course.

Two boats approaching each other from opposite directions pass port side to port side (on the left side just as automobiles do).

Certain channel markings have been established and used in danger areas which you should definitely know for your locality.

Recommended reading for your own safety and for the protection of others are pamphlets on the laws regulating lake traffic and the use of boats, published by the Minnesota Boating Association and the Minnetonka Yacht Club. Another pamphlet, also recommended, is distributed by the Department of Conservation, State of Minnesota.

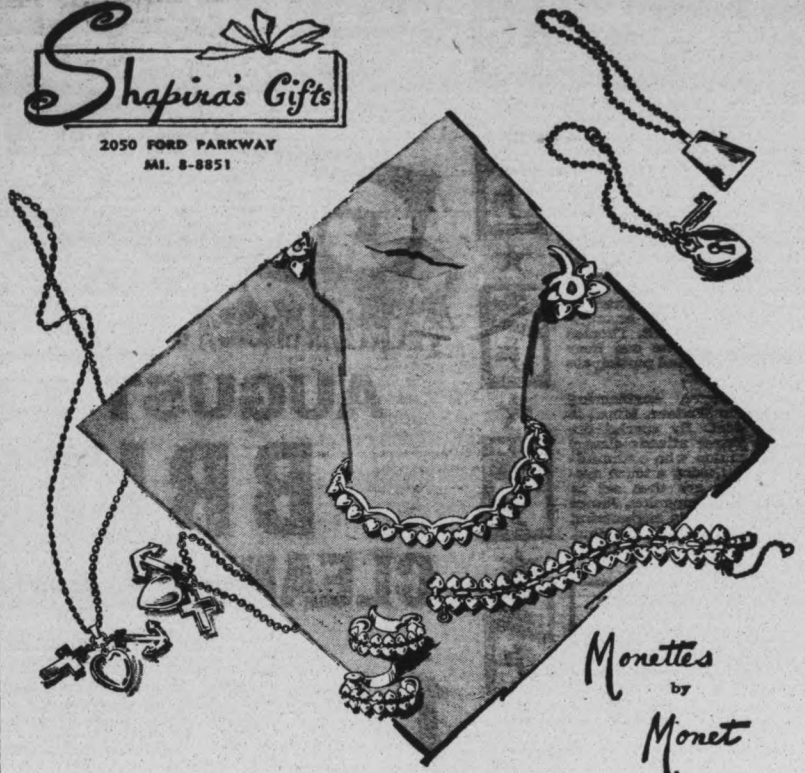

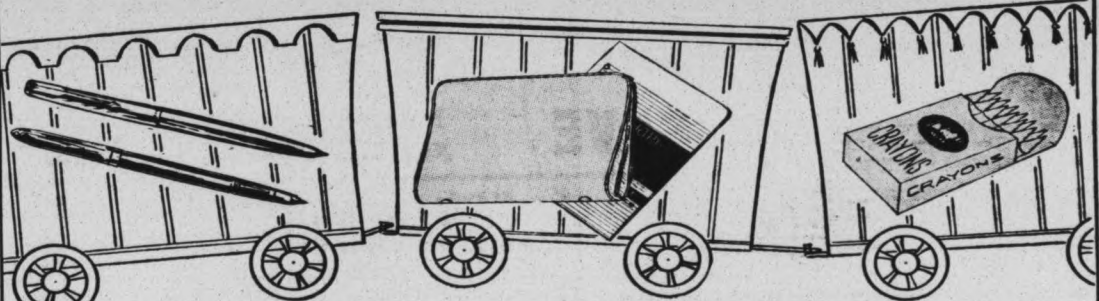

St. Thomas Announces Honor Students

Eleven St. Thomas College students maintained straight "A" averages for the spring semester of 1958, it was announced this week by the dean's office at the school. St. Thomas has an enrollment of 1400.

One hundred and five other students maintained averages in excess of 3.25 (B-plus).

Among the "A" average students were two with unusual handicaps. Edmund P. Barry, a junior accounting major who resides at 904 Burr St., St. Paul, has never been in a high school or college classroom. Because of a spinal injury he has attended school by telephonic arrangement. Classrooms at St. Thomas are "bugged" and he can hear classroom lectures and participate in class discussions.

John J. Boyer, engineering freshman from Wadena, Minn., is blind and deaf. By special arrangement Boyer attends classes with a companion who communicates with him using a touch system. His notes are then set in braille. Boyer's companion, James Smrkovski, freshman engineering student from Grand Meadow, Minn., is among the group maintaining "B-plus" averages.

University Artist's Course Announces "Masterpiece" Series

Dates for the seven concerts on the fortieth anniversary University Artists Course "Masterpiece" series have been announced by James S. Lombard, director of concerts and lectures at the University of Minnesota.

Opening the series will be Roberta Peters, coloratura soprano of the Metropolitan Opera Company, who has appeared once before in Northrup Auditorium on the Artists Course, and many times with the Metropolitan Opera Company. Most recently she sang the role of Sophie in the Metropolitan production of "Der Rosenkavalier" when the company was here last spring. The date of Miss Peter's recital is Thursday, October 9.

The Danish National Orchestra will be presented for University Artists Course patrons on Tuesday, October 28. The orchestra, which is regarded as one of the finest organizations of Northern Europe, will be making its second tour of the United States, but will come to Minnesota for the first time this fall.

Jan Peerce, one of Miss Peter's fellow company members, will be presented on the Artists Course for the first time this season. Peerce, too, has sung in the Twin Cities many times before with the Metropolitan. Most recently he sang at a "Music Under the Stars" presentation at the Metropolitan Stadium in Bloomington two seasons ago, and scored an enormous success. The tenor is known for a great virtuosity, being able to switch from a semi-classical tune to a Bach aria with ease. Peerce will sing his University Artists Course debut on Tuesday, November 25.

Two great pianists who are welcome and familiar figures on the recital platform in this area have been engaged by Lombard this season. Alexander Brailowsky, who holds the distinction of having made more University Artists Course appearances here than any other artist will present his eighth recital under University Artists Course sponsorship on Wednesday, January 28.

Artur Schnabel, regarded by many to be the finest piano virtuoso before the public today, will be presented in recital on Wednesday, February 18. A veteran of many years on the concert platform, Schnabel made his first University Artists Course appearance in 1946.

A young Soviet violinist, Igor Besrodni, will appear in Northrup Auditorium while on his first tour of the United States. A winner of several international competitions for young violinists, Besrodni has appeared with great success in many of the major musical capitals of Europe. Besrodni will appear in Northrup on Tuesday, March 3.

Closing the fortieth anniversary season of the course will be a performance by the National Ballet of Canada with a performance on Wednesday, March 11. This youthful, vital company thrilled

Cambridge, Dec. 21, 1860

Dear Sir,

I am very much obliged to you for your kindness, and beg you to make my acknowledgments and compliments to Mr. Whitney the artist.

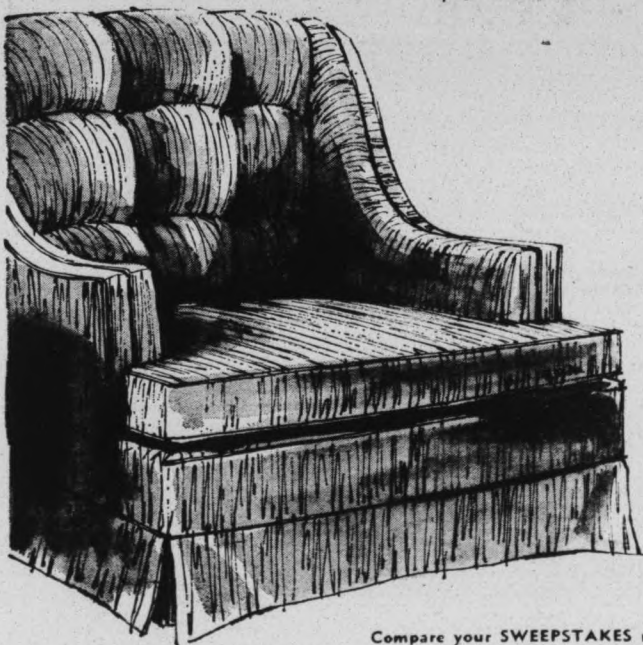





Authentic Wigwam Added To St. Paul Museum

The St. Paul Science museum, which has almost everything imaginable from a mummy in the basement to a live snapping turtle in an upstairs bathtub, has added an authentic Chippewa Indian wigwam to its exhibits. The wigwam is probably the only one ever built in the city, museum officials say, as this was Sioux territory.

To insure authenticity of the structure, the museum arranged to have Mrs. Mary Bigwind, 73-year-old member of the Mille Lacs reservation, superintend its construction. She was aided by Mr. and Mrs. Ole Sam, also members of the Chippewa reservation.

Mrs. Bigwind lived in a similar home until she was 35 and is one of the few persons remaining who knows how to build a wigwam.

It is built with ironwood poles for framework and covered with birchbark sheets and cattail reed mats. Everything is tied together with the inner bark of basswood trees. In order that museum visitors can see how the Indians of northern Minnesota lived until a few decades ago, it will be furnished with Chippewa utensils and other belongings.

Macalester Announces Visiting Lecturers

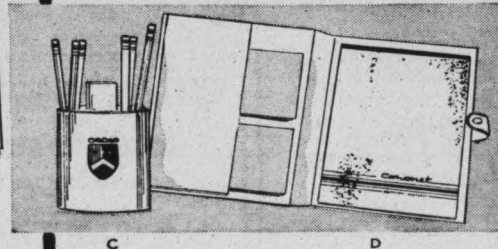
