## Local Scouts to Attend National Ranch

St. Paul Boy Scouts and Explorers are now making final preparations for a high-adventure trip to the mountains of Philmont Scout Ranch and Explorer Base in northeastern New Mexico.

The expedition, representing the Indianhead Council, Boy Scouts of America, will consist of 35 boys and 3 leaders. Local adult leaders are Donald C. Hodges, 5086 Eastwood Road, Moundsview, Minnesota 55112; David C. Johnson, 664 Callahan Place, St. Paul, Minnesota 55118; Dr. Thaddeus Chao, 783 Hokah Avenue, St. Paul, Minnesota 55118.

Leaving St. Paul on July 14 the group will travel to Philmont by charter bus. En route to the 214-square-mile ranch, the boys will visit Fort Carson Army Base at Colorado Springs; Lowry Air Force Base at Denver, Colorado; and Offutt Air Force Base at Omaha, Nebraska.

At the ranch, the expedition will meet their ranger who will lead and train them on the trails for the first 3 days of their 10 day wilderness trek.

On the Philmont trails the

Scouts will participate in various programs offered in many mountain camps by more than 400 trained staff members. These programs include earth science, gold panning, mining, rock climbing, archaeological study and digging, burro packing, and horseback riding.

Arriving home July 30 the boys will be counted among the 260,000 other Scouts who have met the rugged Philmont challenge. Each boy is proof that America's manpower begins with boypower.

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## MS Hope Chest Theme — It Takes More Than Faith

This has been a century of great medical advances. Smallpox, Malaria, yellow fever and typhus have been conquered. Infant deaths have been reduced by half every two decades. Poliomyelitis has been virtually eliminated. Death rates have been sharply reduced for influenza, tuberculosis and rheumatic fever.

The most important exhibition ever originated by a local museum, "THE PAST REDISCOVERED: French Painting 1800-1900", will be open to the public at The Minneapolis Institute of Arts, East 24th at 3rd Avenue, through September 7.

Paintings worth many millions of dollars have been loaned by museums and collectors all over the world . . . over 90 paintings from 8 different countries. They include, not only the familiar Impressionists but fine examples of Neo-Classicism, Romanticism, the Barbizon school, Post-Impressionists and the Nabis. 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## Veteran's News

The Veterans Administration today cautioned Minnesota veterans transferring to new jobs in new locations this summer to get releases in writing from the VA on their present GI home loans.

John R. Murphy, Manager, VA Center, St. Paul, said that private industry frequently follows the long-standing practice of the military services and government agencies of transferring personnel during the summer to avoid disrupting their children's schooling.

In the excitement of moving and concentration on the new job, he said, it is easy to forget that even though a veteran sells his present home he is still liable for his GI loan. This responsibility continues until the loan is paid in full or the VA releases him in writing from all future liability.

Murphy also pointed out that the veteran who sells his home because of a transfer to a new location will be entitled to restoration of the VA home loan guaranty in order to purchase a home in his new community if his old GI loan is paid off.

Veterans may obtain additional information on release from their loan liability and restoration of their loan entitlement from the VA Center at St. Paul or their local Veterans County Service Officer.

## KCTA-TV Channel 2 Awarded Grant

The Corporation for Public Broadcasting announced the awarding of grants totaling \$494,683 to 13 public television stations to develop a wide range of programs for local audiences and for national broadcast. KCTA-TV, Channel 2, received a grant of \$48,504 to make three hour-long programs telling the history of the revolutionary populist movements in the Upper Midwest and how they were transformed into political parties.

In commenting on the grant, Dr. John C. Schwarzwald, executive vice president and general manager of KCTA-TV and KTCI-TV, said, "This grant enables us to once again extend the educational resources of KCTA and KTCI not only throughout Minnesota, but through the entire country. The history of how popular movements are transformed into political entities is both relevant and significant in contemporary society."

The Corporation for Public Broadcasting is an independent, nonprofit corporation established under the Public Broadcasting Act of 1967 to help develop public radio and television broadcasting through program and station support and establishment of interconnection systems.

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## American Red Cross Present Water Safety Suggestions

Thousands of Minnesotans who take to the water for recreation are warned by the American Red Cross to "expect the unexpected" and not take their safety for granted.

"Basically, this means taking care to avoid the accidents which result in drownings that could have been prevented", Judge Otis Godfrey, St. Paul chairman of Red Cross Safety Programs, said.

"Because most drownings occur in unsupervised areas," he added, "our first caution to all swimmers, regardless of their ability, is not to swim alone or in areas where there is no life-guard."

"We urge non-swimmers to learn to swim and persons who can swim a little to learn to swim better."

Judge Godfrey gave these suggestions for helping oneself in a water emergency: first, don't panic; second, think; third save your strength.

### Cramps

The majority of cramps experienced in the water will be the kind that affect the fingers, toes, arms, or legs and are usually caused by fatigue or over-exertion. They are of little danger to a swimmer unless they cause him to panic. If the victim will change his stroke and relax, this alone will bring relief many times.

Stomach cramps are not common, but may occur. An abdominal cramp need not be fatal or even serious — as was formerly believed — if the swimmer does not panic but relaxes, stretches, and changes his body position. He should be able to keep afloat until the cramp is relieved.

### Currents

Do not buck or fight a current. Swim directly across it, even though this may bring you further downstream. It will enable you to reach safety without being exhausted.

### Helping Others

Many drownings occur within a few feet of safety, and it is often possible for the untrained swimmer or even the non-swimmer to effect a non-swimming rescue. Such persons should

avoid personal contact with the victim wherever possible and always should be certain to maintain firm contact with the shore. The rescuer's weight on the shore or the deck should be kept low or slanted backward, and if possible the rescuer should use some piece of equipment.

1. If the victim is within arm reach, lie flat on deck of pool or dock and extend one arm toward the victim. Take a firm grasp of deck or dock with the other arm, grab victim's wrist or arm, and draw victim slowly to safety.

2. If victim is beyond arm reach, extend arm reach by using such items as a shirt, towel, coat, branch or pole. Let the victim grasp one end of the extended article, then pull him slowly to safety. Do not let the victim pull you into trouble.

3. If the victim is beyond the reach of an extended article, throw a line, a ring buoy, spare tire, inner tube, or any buoyant object to him.

4. If the victim is too far for reaching with an extended throw, go to him in a boat and extend oar or paddle. Pull him slowly alongside the boat, so he can grasp the stern. Then propel the boat to safety.

A swimmer not trained in lifesaving should swim to a victim in trouble only as a last resort and when all suggested safer rescues are not possible. If it is necessary to risk swimming to a victim out of reach, the rescuer should take with him a towel, shirt, or some buoyant object to extend to the victim when the rescuer reaches him.

Miss Miller made her debut with the Metropolitan Opera in 1951.



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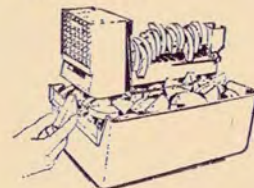
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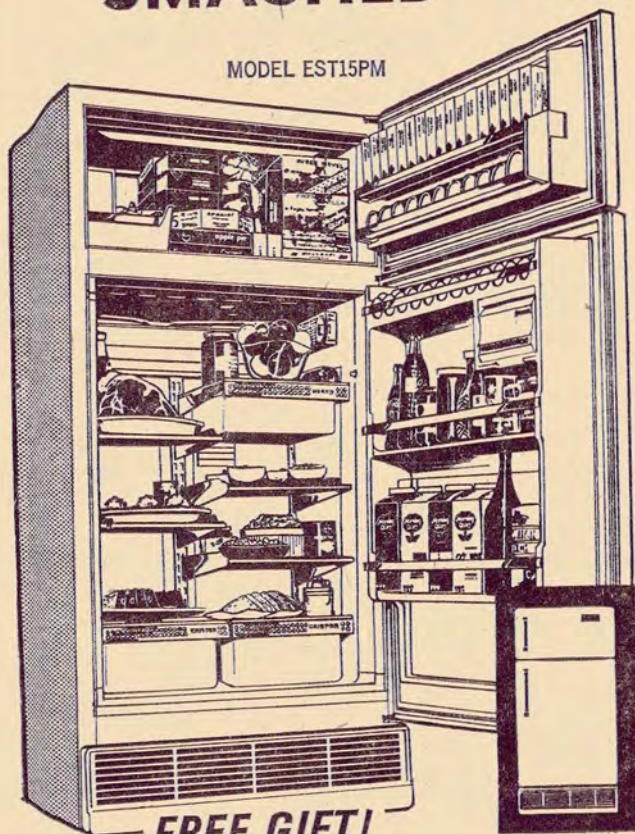
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## Twins "Camp-In" Catching On

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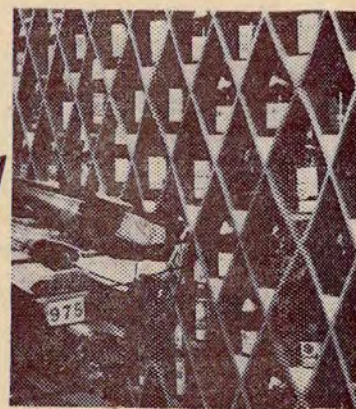

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## AQUA PARADES 30 YEARS OF TRADITION

It was nine days of fun and frolic for everyone. That was 30 years ago at the first Minneapolis Aquatennial.

In three decades Aquatennial has grown to be America's Greatest Summer Festival. Some of the events of the 1940 edition have been changed or eliminated, but Aquatennial's top-rated twin parades are still festival highlights.

The mystery and tropical atmosphere of the South Seas will flavor this year's pair of parades; the Grande Day steps off Saturday, July 19, and the Torchlight on Wednesday evening, July 23. Colorful and imaginative floats, complimenting the South Seas theme, scores of lovely queens, tuneful bands and precision marchers, celebrities, public officials, and comical clowns comprise the more than 140 units of the parades.

Preceding both parades will be hour long pre-parade shows at Parade Stadium. The Grande Day parade preview show gets under way at 1:30 p.m., July 19. Television celebrities Bridget Hanley, David Soul, and Karen Carlson from KMSP-TV's "Here Come the Brides," and Mike Farrell, star of KSTP's "Days of Our Lives," will add stellar quality to the pre-parade proceedings.

The top-notch New Stanton High School Band from Jacksonville, Florida, will participate in both the Grande Day pre-parade show and the two Aquatennial parades. The marching unit consists of 120 bandmen, 2 drum majors, and 13 majorettes dressed in red, white and blue military styled uniforms.

Arthur Godfrey will serve as Celebrity Grand Marshal for the Grande Day Parade. The CBS Radio personality will later receive the first revolving Aquatennial-Godfrey Air Trophy for outstanding activities in promotional and public acceptance of aviation. The presentation will be made at the Aquatennial Air Show at Airlake Industrial Park, Lakeville, July 19.

In addition to visiting dignitaries and television stars, the Grande Day boasts colorful and attractive parade floats.

The glittering Torchlight Parade on July 23 features many of the Grande Day units in addition to some of its own special Thursday, July 10, 1969

attractions. The nighttime counterpart moves out of Parade Stadium following the route of the Grande Day at 8:30 p.m. after the 7:30 p.m. pre-parade show.

The Valley High School "Marchmasters" Marching Band, West Des Moines, Iowa, will begin the show's evening entertainment with precision marching and rousing tunes. The unit is made up of 250 bandsmen including a row of herald trumpets and a band auxiliary nicknamed "Band-Aides" that march on the right and left side of the ranks when marching.

Another Torchlight pre-parade headliner will be the Sidney High School Band from Sidney, Neb. The band has achieved numerous distinctions. It marched in the 1957 Eisenhower Inaugural Parade in Washington, D.C., and the 1959 Rose Festival Parade in Portland, Ore.

Tickets for the parades and pre-parade shows are on sale at all Dayton's ticket offices. Tickets will also be sold the day of the parades at the Stadium.

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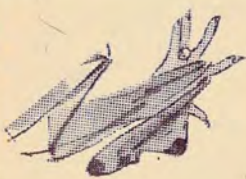


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## New Post Created at Cretin High School

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## CANCER PREVENTION AND THE SUN

Cancer prevention begins on the beach, in the ballpark and wherever people sun themselves for long periods without protection, the medical advisor of the Ramsey County Unit of the American Cancer Society said today.

"A large percentage of skin cancer can be prevented if people simply avoid excessive exposure to the sun," Stanley F. Bean, physician-volunteer with the ACS Unit, said. "But in 1969 some 110,000 people will develop skin cancer and there will be approximately 5,000 deaths."

Skin cancer is highly curable if detected and treated early. Any person who has a sore which does not heal, or experiences a change in the size or color of a wart, mole or birthmark, should consult his family

physician promptly.

Skin cancer accounts for 23 percent of cancer among men. Extra caution in the sun should be taken by construction workers, farmers and outdoorsmen. Fair-skinned, fair-haired and elderly people should be especially aware of the hazards of exposure to the sun.

Caution in the sun is really common sense in action. Sun-shine should be taken in small doses. Protective clothing and broad-brimmed hats are important safeguards.

The Ramsey County ACS Unit has a film, "Sense in the Sun," for showing to clubs, organizations and schools. A leaflet and a booklet on skin cancer are available. Interested groups should contact Mrs. A. Harold Frishberg, Unit Foundation chairman.



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## Apollo 11 Flight of "Snoopy" Maps Available at McDonald's

## Como Park Tortoises Won't Be Fed on Day Of Aquatennial Race

Como Park zookeeper Carlo Pyhaluoto says "Toby" and "Lady Godiva," the park's two king-sized tortoises from the Galapagos Islands, won't be fed on July 27, the day of the Minneapolis Aquatennial's 17th annual turtle derby.

Victor Tedesco, commissioner of St. Paul parks, has volunteered the tortoises for competition in the derby, to be held that day a 2:30 p.m. at the southwest corner of Lake Calhoun. Offsetting more than 300 entries from area lakes that measure six inches or less across, the tortoises will run a special race for "turtles weighing more than 200 pounds."

"The last time I put them on 216 pounds," Pyhaluoto said this week, "and they're bigger now. But if they're hungry, and they have the right kind of conditions, they can move mighty fast."

Despite the presence of the mammoth turtles, the main attraction of the derby, sponsored jointly by the Aquatennial and the Suburban Recreation Association, will be racing finalists from more than 30 communities in the metropolitan area. Children ages 14 and under will be competing for eight trophies awarded by the 100 Twin Drive In. Only turtle owners whose entries finished first, second, or third in preliminary races in the participating communities are eligible for the finals.

Two other races—the "Dignitaries Classic," for turtles named after well-known people, and a race for representatives of communities throughout the state—will also be held. The derby annually attracts more than 2,000 spectators.

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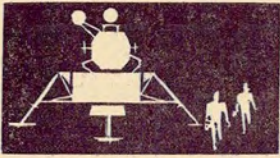
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
