Project Stairs Seeks Director For Indian Program

Minneapolis American Indian parents are seeking a director to head Project Stairs, an educational program for Indian children in grades three through six.

"The program is planned to help them stay in school until they have completed their education," said Mrs. Diana Rojas, 1500 James Av. N., one of the Indian mothers who is planning the program.

"We are seeking a director who has knowledge of the inner city Indian problems and who can organize and direct the program," she said.

The director, who will be paid \$13,000 per year, must be of American Indian descent, between ages 25 and 40, a resident of Minneapolis for at least one year and must be a high school graduate or the equivalent.

Through the Stairs project, Twin Cities area college and university students and some high school students work with Indian youngsters on an individual, volunteer basis. The program is funded by the Indian Center. Funding and personnel for the program are provided by the center, the University of Minnesota, the Minneapolis Public Schools, the State Department of Education and the Office of Economic Oppor-

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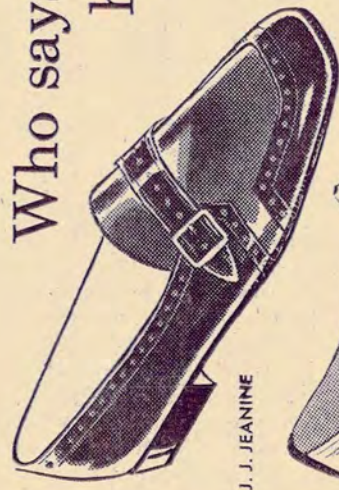


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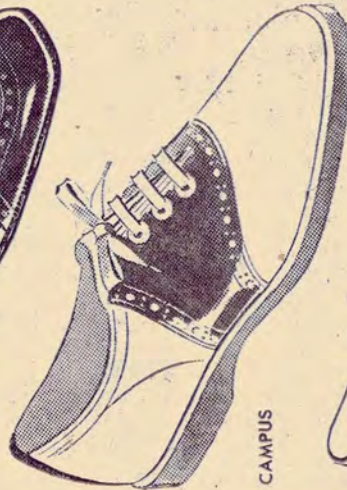
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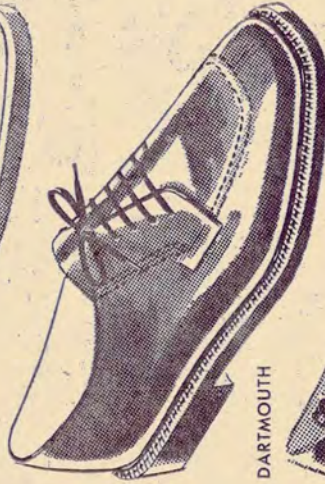
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Mpls. Fine Arts Members Drive

Manpower Training Courses Announced

Federal approval for vocational training of 275 unemployed and under-employed Minnesotans under the Manpower Development and Training Act (MDTA) has been received by the State Department of Employment Security, Commissioner George J. Vavoulis reported.

\$813,900 in Federal funds have been authorized to train 75 persons in MDTA classes and to send another 200 individuals to area vocational-technical or private schools for appropriate training in occupations where worker shortages are known to exist.

All training opportunities are tuition-free and are open to unemployed or underemployed residents of any part of Minnesota who need additional training to obtain satisfactory employment. Trainees may be eligible to receive transportation and subsistence allowances in addition to the free training.

In the MDTA classes, a total of 35 persons will be trained as combination welders at Minneapolis and Albert Lea, 20 as

medical secretaries at Rochester and 20 as graphic arts reproduction technicians at Staples.

Classes in Minneapolis will start on September 3, under the direction of the State Department of Education. For further information contact the center at 1058 University Avenue, St. Paul, 645-0461, or 1629 Hennepin Avenue, Minneapolis, 339-7061.

Mpls. Schools Get Talking Typewriters

Twenty-one "Talking Typewriters" soon will be teaching hundreds of Minneapolis public school children to read.

These new computer-based learning systems will be the heart of two Basic Skill Centers soon to open for Minneapolis children. The first Center, at 1306 Plymouth Avenue in North Minneapolis. The second Center will be located at 2506 Park Avenue in South Minneapolis.

Students participating in the new reading program will be selected on the basis of potential and need by the director of the Basic Skill Center and the home school principal. Students will be drawn from Greeley and Hall Elementary Schools, and Phillips and Franklin Junior High Schools.

In formally announcing the adoption of the Talking Typewriter learning system by the Minneapolis School Board, Supt. John B. Davis Jr., said the Talking Typewriter and its specially designed program material frequently has taught people to read when conventional methods have failed.

"We look to the Basic Skill Centers as another approach to help students with learning problems," Davis explained, "but we have an infinite variety of students and educators should have an infinite variety of approaches to their needs."

The Talking Typewriter teaches students to read by talking to them and responding in other ways similar to real-life teachers, Dr. Davis explained.

In addition to talking to the learner, the Talking Typewriter tells stories, illustrates these stories with pictures, and asks the learner to type what he is learning. Because the Talking Typewriter will not accept an incorrect response—the keyboard locks when the wrong key is punched — the learner is stimulated to keep trying without experiencing the familiar feeling

of defeat. The result is a continuous success which builds self-confidence in the learner.

For those who have experienced previous defeat in learning to read, the Talking Typewriter represents "an exciting fresh start," Davis said. The learner sets his own pace, and because he uses the Talking Typewriter alone in a booth, he is not afraid to learn by trying.

An integral part of the Talking Typewriter centers is the related classrooms where the learner, under the direct supervision of a teacher, receives a reinforcement of what he has learned on the Talking Typewriter. In addition to reviewing with his teacher his work on the Talking Typewriter, the student also learns writing in long-hand — using the knowledge of reading and spelling he has gained on the Talking Typewriter.

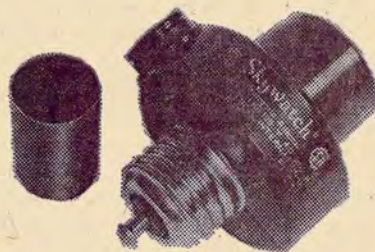
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Fulbright Grants Open at U of M

Competition is officially open for 1969-70 U. S. Fulbright full grants and travel grants, and foreign graduate grants for academic study or research abroad, and for professional training in the creative and performing arts.

Grants are open to more than 950 American graduate students for study in any of 50 countries. Candidates must be U. S. citizens at the time of application, have a bachelor's degree or its equivalent before the beginning date of the grant and, in most cases, be proficient in the language of the host country. Selections will be made on the basis of academic and/or professional record, the feasibility of the applicant's proposed study plan, language preparation and personal qualifications. Preference is given to applicants between the ages of 20 and 35.

Creative and performing artists will not be required to have a bachelor's degree but they must have four years of professional study or equivalent experience. Applicants in social work must have at least two years of professional experience after the master of social work degree. Applicants in the field of medicine must have an M. D. at the time of application.

Full awards provide tuition, maintenance for one academic year in one country, round-trip transportation, health and accident insurance and an incidental allowance. A limited number of Fulbright travel grants is available to supplement maintenance and tuition scholarships granted to American students by foreign governments, universities and private donors.

University of Minnesota students may obtain application forms and information from the campus Fulbright adviser, Graduate Fellowship office, 307 Johnston hall. The deadline for filing applications through the Fulbright adviser on this campus is October 15, 1968.

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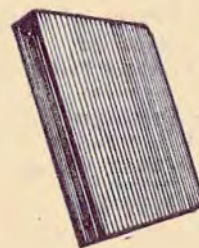
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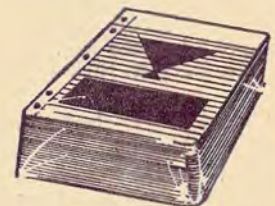

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St. Thomas Gets Full Accreditation

The College of St. Thomas has been granted full accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, it was announced this week by The Rt. Rev. Terrence Murphy, College president.

The graduate and undergraduate programs offered by the College had been in a provisional accreditation status since application was made to the agency in 1963.

In the interim, the Council has conducted its examination of the programs offered by the College, and by lifting the provisional approval it granted full accreditation to programs in secondary teaching at the baccalaureate degree level, secondary teaching at the master's degree level, and the programs for secondary principals and guidance counselors in the elementary and secondary areas. The Council commended the College for the progress which was evident.

St. Thomas has some 2,200 graduates in the teaching profession. Since 1950 it has had a graduate program in education in which over 700 masters degrees have been awarded. Last year 143 M.A. degrees in education were granted. Over 150 are scheduled for M.A. degrees this year. The present summer school enrollment at St. Thomas is 700 with over 500 enrolled in the graduate education program, making it one of the largest in the Upper Midwest.

Director of the education department and programs at St. Thomas is Dr. James A. Byrne who came to the College in 1959. Fourteen full-time and nine part-time faculty members are on his staff.

Mod System

The administrative team who created the Hi Par JHS Flex modular curriculum system now in operation at Highland Park Junior High School in St. Paul will lead a University of Minnesota practicum for school administrators on the specifics of creating a modular scheduling system for a given school.

He is an Assistant Professor of Family Studies and Child Development in the General College of the University of Minnesota. In addition, he holds the rank of Associate Professor in Sociology at Saint Cloud State College where he teaches a course in family life education to public and parochial school teachers.

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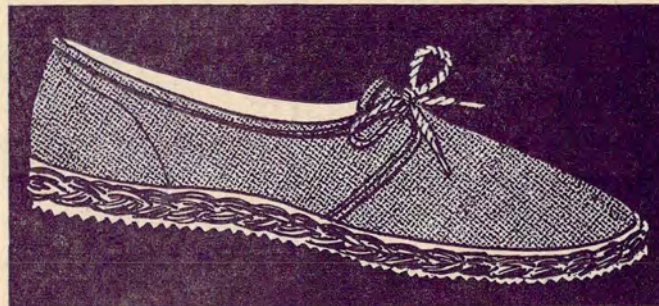
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Guaranty Bank Promotions and Appointments

Womens ORT At State Fair

Members of the St. Paul Evening Chapter of Women's American ORT are busy these days getting ready for their booth at the Minnesota State Fair. It will be a bazaar-type booth and will feature handcraft items such as aprons, gifts and boutiques made by the members. The booth will be located on the Main Floor of the Grandstand Bldg.

All proceeds from the booth will go to ORT's E.P.I.C. (Earning Power Improvement Courses) Project, which is a four-point program; 1) Pre-apprenticeship training to those youngsters still in school in the age group of 12 to 15 years; 2) Apprenticeship training which is a classic form of accelerated vocational training for students primarily in the age group of 16 to 35 years; 3) Adult courses provide accelerated training for those who wish to better their skills in incomes. These courses reach out for those who must work during the day and therefore attend classes often held in evenings. Adult courses enable them to rise quickly out of the unskilled into the semi-skilled category; and 4) Special courses are usually one- and two-year courses. This reaches out to a great mass of people who because of time or aptitude could not attend a high school or a junior college and who can be converted in training to skilled workers on the primary level. ORT is a gigantic international network of education.

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Inner-city School Workshop

Educators from southern and northern cities presented views of current problems in urban schools to participants of an inner city school workshop at the College of St. Thomas.

Visiting consultants were Dr. Floyd Parsons, superintendent of schools, Little Rock, Ark., and Hershel Fort, director of program development for the Detroit public schools.

In describing 'the urban dilemma in education, "Fort pointed out the utter failure of colleges and universities to furnish leadership in the crises in which all city school systems find themselves today.

"What are colleges doing to train administrators?" Fort asked. They, like many others, are engaged in too much talking and not enough doing, he replied.

Religious colleges have been remiss in furnishing leadership and in training teachers to meet the current problems, he charged.

New ideas, new plans and new methods of administration are needed today, Fort added.

Dr. Parsons pointed out that, from the southern point of view, six implications in the educational systems are evident. They are:

1. American public schools have never been faced with anything like the problem today of

assimilating minority races into the school.

2. A new need is recognized by school administrations to re-evaluate educational programs and patterns.

3. A new artificiality is implied in civil rights movements and legislation as far as the schools are concerned.

4. A new race prejudice has been created by the civil rights movement and legislation.

5. The only place where the proportion of Negro teachers to Negro pupils has been maintained is in segregated schools, where the Negro teacher is given a certain protection.

6. Schools in the South have found that things can be done which formerly were unheard of.

Dr. Parsons said that, in the case of the Little Rock schools, progress has been made and is being made toward complete integration of the races.

Dr. Robert J. Brown, director of programs in administration, education department, College of St. Thomas, was in charge of the workshop. Local consultants from the Minneapolis-St. Paul area participated in the 10-day program. Attendance was limited to 30 and preference was given to those now in administrative posts in inner-city schools or working with minority or poverty groups.

107th STATE FAIR TO OPEN AUGUST 24th

The Minnesota State Fair will open for its 107th run Saturday, August 24, and continue through Labor Day, September 2. The first Fair, held 113 years ago near St. Anthony Falls in Minneapolis, attracted some 2,000 visitors and offered a like number of dollars to exhibitors.

During the past 13 years, the 10-day agricultural exposition, world's largest, regularly has broken the million mark in attendance. And the 1968 Fair will offer more than \$308,000 to 10,000 competitors in 17 departments.

Since the first Fair in 1855, six have been canceled: the financial panic stopped it in 1858; the Civil War and Sioux Uprising caused cancellations in 1861 and 1862; the 1893 Fair was called off to finance a large Minnesota exhibit at Chicago's Columbian Exposition, and the defense transportation emergency of 1945 and polio epidemic in 1946 prevented the Fair from opening its gates for two consecutive years.

The Fair has been situated at its present Falcon Heights location on the north edge of St. Paul since 1885, when the Minnesota State Agricultural Society accepted Ramsey County's 200-acre Poor Farm as a permanent site. Since then, it has expanded to more than 300 acres which, along with its physical plant, is currently valued in excess of \$55 million.

During its annual 10-day run, it becomes Minnesota's third largest "city" with an average daily "population" of 35,000 in 1967. It contains 10 miles of paved streets, 25 miles of side-

walks and a utility system sufficient to serve a city the size of St. Cloud.

The big exposition has parking facilities for 23,500 cars on or adjacent to the grounds. It is easily accessible through six outside gates on three sides. No passes have been issued for the outside gates since the "everybody pays" policy was adopted in 1933.

Quick bus service to the Minnesota State Fairgrounds during its 10-day run Saturday, Aug. 24, through Labor Day, Sept. 2, is planned by Twin City Lines.

The master plan will move passengers at intervals ranging from three to 15 minutes from both Twin Cities downtown areas, depending upon the weather and time of day.

St. Paul area residents may ride on either Route 4, which follows Snelling Avenue north from Highland Park to the Fairgrounds, or on Route 5, which proceeds from West St. Paul along Wabasha Street and Como Avenue to the bus terminal alongside the Fair's Hippodrome.

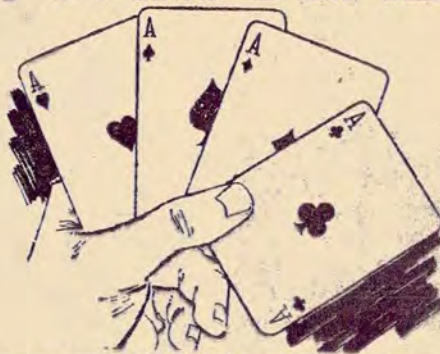
The date of examination for Fire Fighters in St. Paul is October 26th. Applicants must be high school graduates, at least 5 ft. 8 in. tall (bare feet).

Veterans over 30 years of age may apply; however, they must be under 35 at the time of appointment. Birth certificates and diplomas should be presented when filing applications. Applicants must pass a qualifying medical examination.

Applications for this examination must be filed in the Civil Service Bureau not later than Friday, October 18.

This examination will begin promptly at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, October 26, and will be held at the Mechanic Arts High School, Central Avenue and Robert St. (Use rear entrance on Aurora Avenue.)

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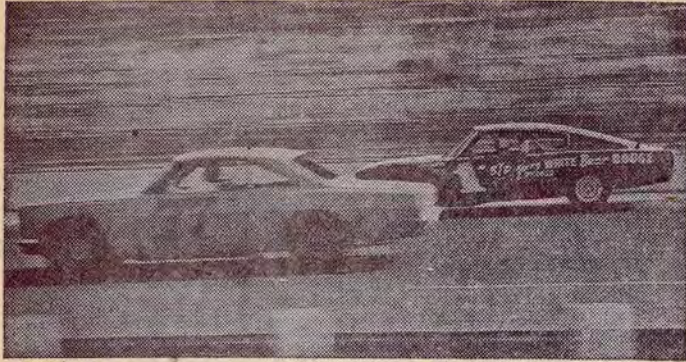

Red Cross Urges Swim On Top

Not everyone knows about the dangers of hyperventilation, but a teenager in Minnesota does. He found out the hard way.

During a hot summer day, the boy went to a neighborhood pool to cool off. The water was cool, blue and inviting, so he took many deep breaths—too many and too deep—pushed off, and tried to swim the length of the pool underwater. Minutes later, he was pulled out, unconscious and not breathing. Mouth-to-mouth resuscitation saved him.

What happened to this boy could happen to anyone who attempts to stay underwater too long.

"The problem with hyperventilation is this," explained Judge Otis Godfrey, Director of Saint Paul Red Cross Safety Services. "It increases breath-holding time by blowing off carbon dioxide, thus lowering the amount of carbon dioxide

in the blood. Then, if a swimmer attempts to swim under water for distance, a considerable length of time may elapse before the carbon dioxide level, reduced by overbreathing, will provide a strong stimulus to breathe. The danger is that the oxygen level may drop to the point where he 'blacks out' before he feels the urge to take a breath. Unless help is at hand to get him to the surface, drowning will result."

The same physiological consequences can occur when children compete to see who can stay under water longest.

"The Red Cross urges parents to warn their children about hyperventilation," said Judge Godfrey, "and to educate them in all aspects of water safety through free courses in swimming for children and adults." For more information contact the Saint Paul Chapter of the American Red Cross, 224-4981.

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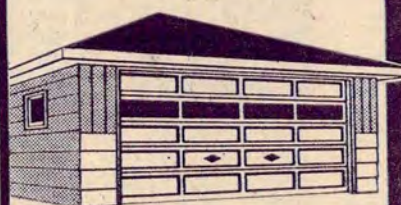
