

Area street paving projects due to begin this summer

Three local street paving projects that were delayed last year will soon be under way, according to the St. Paul Public Works Departprovements will affect a 13 block area around Sheridan and Wheeler Streets.

The streets are Field and Sheridan Avenues, from Edgecumbe to Davern; Wordsworth and Munster Avenues, from Edgcumbe to West Seventh; Wheeler St., from Field to West Seventh; and Davern, from St. Paul Ave. to West Seventh.

The streets will be paved to 32 feet wide, except for Sheridan and Davern. which will be 36 feet wide. with parking on one side only. Other improvements will include new sun-colored sodium vapor lighting, integral curbs and gutters and trees.



Pulitzer Prize winners in journalism to speak at World Press Institute at Mac

Eleven 1978 Pulitzer Prize winners in journalism will visit Macalester College on Wednesday and Thursday, May 10 and 11, for the annual World Press Institute Forum.

The only time the Pulitzer winners in journalism will be brought together at the same time in one place during this year, the 1978 Forum will include talks by the Pulitzer winners, a special keynote address, a dinner and a reunion of the 1968 World Press Institute Fellows.

On Wednesday, May 10 at 7:00 p.m. in the Weyerhaeuser Chapel at Macalester, the Pulitzer winners will tell the stories behind the stories that won their prizes. On Thursday, May 11 at 11:00 a.m. in the chapel, Leonard Marks, a member of the World Press Freedom Committee, will give the Forum's keynote address on the topic "Press Freedom in Third World Countries." A question and answer period will follow both events, which are open to the public free of charge.

The World Press Freedom Committee is a group of national and international media organizations dedicated to responsible and objective media.

The World Press Institute, which is celebrating its 17th anniversary this year, is headquartered at Macalester College. 

Once again this column comes to you from the not too unpleasant confines of the old homestead...while the rest of the staff covers for me at the office. But, one of these days, I'll be back. In the meantime, what I have to offer may not add much to the depth and breadth of your knowledge, but you can be sure I'll try to give it to you straight.

Which somehow reminds me that, by the time you read this, the most unusual election in recent St. Paul history will probably be over, with the results perhaps already known to you. And regardless of the turn-out and how it all turns out, life will go on . . . believe me.

Election turn-outs are always a great old guessing game. The city hall "pros" were way off in the primary, with a prediction of 44,000...actually only 22,000 showed. The current prediction could be close...or it could be way off, too, in either direction. People can be beautifully unpredictable on that score, computers notwithstanding.

In the meantime, we can look forward to the most competitive fall election the State of Minnesota has seen in many a year...at least at the top levels. Even the September primary could produce some fireworks here and there, especially since the two Bobs have decided to challenge the endorsement system. DFLer Bob Short, as you know, is challenging Congressman Don Fraser for HHH's senate seat, and our own local IR hopeful, Bob Johnson, is set to challenge Congressman Al Quie for the governorship. Neither one of them, I would surmise, plans to campaign with peanuts for money.

Ordinarily, battling a major party's endorsed candidate is a tough row to hoe. But of one thing you can be sure...Bob Johnson has the background in the field of taxes to give our state business climate problems a thorough airing. And that's a job that really needs to be done...as even the labor unions are beginning to agree.

Some of those problems are hitting pretty close to home...like Webb Publishing Company, over on Shepard Road. Perhaps you read in the daily press the other day what Bob Haugan, Webb's president, had to say on the subject at the firm's annual stockholder's meeting. Assuming anything like the status quo, any further expansion of the firm's facilities will automatically go out-ofstate. That's not exactly good news for people who would like to live and work in this neighborhood.

We should appreciate the fact that the people at Webb are leveling with us now, while there's still time to turn things around. Some other firms have just up and made the decision that economic realities seemed to call for... without any long-range warning. 3M, for one, admits that a number of its recent out-of-state locations could just as well have been built here...under more favorable economic circumstances.

There have been some skeptics who say this is all a campaign on the part of business leaders. Well, if it is a campaign, it's one that should have started long ago. I can recall quite a series of business development ads that appeared in the Wall Street Journal quite a number of years ago. The central theme was "Profit is not a dirty word in Ohio." Well, maybe we should do what's necessary to convince business and industry that it's not a dirty word in Minnesota now. Profits create added investment, more venture capital and in the process MORE JOBS...maybe for your kids and mine.

And doesn't it seem incredible to you that all the brainpower we're paying for in Washington can't come up with a solution to inflation...a solution we can live with. Oh, I think there are enough people who know what to do, including my favorite call-it-as-you-see-it economist Milton Friedman (sorry, Walter Heller). It's just that the answers require too much in the way of political guts...or maybe more accurately, political suicide.

Look what happened when President Carter dared to suggest holding cost-of-living increases for government employees to 5.5% next fall, instead of a scheduled 6% or more. "Silly symbolism," the head of the public employees union called it, to pick on them in that way. I thought it was silly symbolism, too, but not for the same reason. Who has done better than federal employees in recent years under our "made in Washington" inflationary spiral?

What if Carter had said we'll PASS on all those raises next October? Well, that might have been a little rough, since half of the year has already gone by. But what if he had suggested 4% this October, and 2% for 1979, and that the federal budget would also be reigned in accordingly? That would have been a terrific signal to the whole country that he really meant business...that it wasn't merely a sop, another WIN button program.

With that kind of meaningful, moral leadership, even jawboning might have become a wee bit effective. The AFL-CIO, of course, would scream bloody murder... they'd want to get theirs, come hell or high water. So would other unions. Then would come congressional pressure...in an election year they'd all get off the wagon, leaving Carter to fend for himself. Business would be willing enough to comply, but only if the unions did likewise. After all, most price increases come on the heels of labor settlements and hourly increases.

Now, I'm not saying that some businesses don't try hard to pad the increases for a little more profit . . . if they aren't beset by competitive factors. But most firms have a helluva time passing all added costs along to customers. They have to keep looking for other factors of efficiency to hold prices down, like eliminating jobs, for instance.

So what am I saying? Just this. Present-day politics have so overwhelmed economic reality, that the skills of our learned economists have been rendered virtually useless. And that's really a sad state of affairs in what is supposed to be a free enterprise economy. Maybe the business executive who said we were a nation of economic illiterates was right. Maybe economic teaching needs to start in kindergarten. After a generation, maybe, political sense and economic sense could once again coincide. But what's going to happen in the meantime? Anybody out there got an

Back to the state scene for a moment. Independent-Republicans must have heaved a sigh of relief Saturday when Dave Durenberger made himself available for the Humphrey senate seat. It rounds out the top part of the ticket, and makes it almost as strong as it might have been if Al Quie had gone for the senate instead. But who can blame Quie. I'd want to get back to Minnesota, too, after 20 years in Washington. We still have to balance our budgets out here in the Hinterlands, to point up just one difference.

So even though we had a lot of rain the past weekend, I'm still not in favor of a DOMED stadium in these parts. I can see it in Houston, I can see it in New Orleans, and I can see it in Seattle. After all, a baseball season includes some 75 to 80 sessions, and you just couldn't play the game or draw a crowd for it very often in those locations. given their horrendous summer heat and humidity and Seattle's frequent rains. But how often is the climate a problem here? Maybe for two or three Viking games and maybe six to eight baseball games each season...certainly not enough to justify the atrocious construction and energy costs which would be involved. But if Minneapolis feels it would be such a ten-strike for related development, maybe its leaders ought to do a selling job on having it become a Minneapolis-only investment, then conduct a referendum on it among its voting citizenry. Do you think it would wash? Ha!

'Nuf said! Here are several parting pilfered punchlines, since I shorted you last time. First this: "The secret of happiness is to count your blessings while others are adding up their troubles." Then this: "If at first you don't succeed try a little ardor." And, finally, a bonus p-p-p...from an Arabian source, way before anybody heard of Dutch Elm disease: "Do not cut down the tree that gives you shade."



Low-interest loans and grants now available for home rehab

St. Paul homeowners who want to take advantage of the spring construction season to make home repairs, are encouraged to apply for a low-interest loan or grant through one of several Home Rehabilitation programs administered by the City of St. Paul and the State Housing Finance Agency.

THE STREET STREET, STR

More than \$1,305,000 is available through the various programs with interest rates ranging from one to eight percent. Loans of up to \$17,400 are available, with terms of up to 20 years. Low-income homeowners may qualify for a grant of up to \$5,000, which does not have to be repaid if they continue to live in the house for a designated period of time.

Eligible repair items include cracked or broken foundations, broken or missing doors and windows, inadequate insulation, leaking roofs or flooded basements, exposed wiring, plugged plumbing fixtures, and many other interior and

exterior items. Free technical assistance is also available to aid homeowners in determining eligible repair items, estimating cost of repairs, filling out an application, and monitoring the contractors' work.

Loan or grant applicants must be owners or contractfor-deed purchasers of the property.

Eligibility for the loans and grants is determined by a combination of income and family size and ranges from a maximum adjusted income of \$14,500 for a one person family to \$19,000 for a family of 10 or more.

Loans available through the state program have the lowest interest rate, but must be applied for before May 10. Other loan programs will continue as long as money is available.

Let us spray: Inchworm infestation on the way

by Roger Fuller

When those nasty little inchworms begin falling out of the trees and onto our heads this spring, we're just going to have to learn to live with them. According to St. Paul City Forester Thomas Karl, the Parks Department has no intention of spraying

the trees this year.

Karl said he did not recommend the spring spraying because it is neither cheap nor effective.

"If we sprayed the trees from the ground, it would cost \$16,000," he said. "If we did it from helicopters, it would run about \$70,000."

Spraying is not an effective method of combating the inchworms because it only prolongs their life cy-

cle, according to Karl.
"If we let them live through their natural life cycle without interfering, they'll die down in a few years," he said.

Until last spring, the Park Department had sprayed every year because of pressure from area residents who complained about the worms. The situation came to a head last year when the worms came early and the spray came late.

Given those conditions, the department decided not to spray because the leaves were already eaten by the time the city was ready to treat them.

According to Karl, inchworms have a natural life cycle of from four to five years. Each year they become more numerous until

leaves to feed upon and

they die. "When we spray we might get 70 percent of them," Karl said. "But the other 30 percent survive because there is plenty of food left. The worms then have a good chance of laying eggs which will hatch next spring."

There are two species of inchworms, otherwise known as cankerworms. One hatches from eggs laid in the fall, the other from eggs laid in the spring. The eggs of both species hatch within a couple of days of one another.

The inchworm period is brief-a couple of weeks at the most. The worms have no permanently harmful effect on the trees, and within a few weeks after their disappearance, the leaves which have been eaten away are replaced by new

The inchworms affect several areas of St. Paul, but for some reason the Highland, Groveland and Macalester areas have traditionally been hit hardest.

The Parks Department plans to use the left-over spray from last year to treat the trees in parks such as Como and Highland. "It makes sense to spray them when the area affected is of manageable size." Karl said.

In the meantime, we can all wait for the worms to grow more and more plentiful as they eat themselves out of their trees.

The article also mentions that it is the law in at least 27 states that all new houses and apartments have smoke alarms.



I don't think that is justifiable in a democracy, especially since the USA is the leader in promoting the preservation of human rights throughout the world. In a democracy, no group has any right to deny anyone their individual liberties.





TRAVELING TROPHY

This week's Talking Out of School Traveling Trophy, the "Pass the Yen Award" (given the international monetary situation, we thought it might soon be worth more than the buck), goes to Donald Guigsberg, principal at Battle Creed Junior High School.

The award is presented in recognition of the attitude Guigsberg recently displayed when reacting to charges of discipline problems at Battle Creek.

The problem, according to Mary Jo Pignato, the mother of a Battle Creek student, is that "there is too much fighting among the students, uncontrolled student smoking, the sale of drugs, and a double standard in discipline."

When confronted by these and similar charges from parents at a recent school meeting, Guigsberg responded, There are some lunatics and hoodlums in our schools, but I have no control over that.

"Despite all the problems, there are many magnificent things going on here," he said. "We're not half as bad as our image.

We believe it's up to the principal to be a leader and set the tone for the rest of the school. We've seen the returns come in when a principal takes charge in helping to create a better educational climate for students and staff.

And so, Mr. Guigsberg, we present to you this week's Traveling Trophy-one standard-sized rubber yen. Along with all your responsibilities, it's guaranteed to come bouncing right back to you.

WHAT'S GOOD?

Mel Therrien, French teacher at Highland Junior and Senior High, that's what's good, according to parents of students in his classes.

In talking with Therrien, we learned that part of his teaching philosophy is to instill in his students an appreciation for world togetherness and a desire to be a part of that world. Many of the projects he undertakes in this effort go far above and beyond what we normally expect of our teachers. In fact, we almost accused him of being a glutton for punishment when we discovered he had just returned from a three-week tour of England and France with a group of 19 Highland students.

Therrien estimates he put in over 100 hours in preparation for the trip, which included six Saturday planning meetings with parents and students.

The obvious value to those who went on the trip was an opportunity to experience the people and cultures of other lands. However, the most important thing the students brought back from Europe was an expanded sense of the world, a cosmopolitanism which taught them that St. Paul, Minnesota, was not the primary focus of attention for everyone, that there are other people and cultures, and other points of view.

This year's was the third trip Therrien has taken with his students. From the reaction of both students and parents, we hope he will continue to provide these kinds of experiences for future Highland students.
