'HIGHLAND FLING' STARTS

3-day Fling For Shoppers Heralded By Scotch Bagpipers At Noon Today

Heralded by the weird and melodic sound of Scotch bagpipes, thirty-eight members of the Highland Civic association today started their three-day Highland Fling business promotion.

The Highland Fling features good old fashioned Scotch thrift along with the gaiety and sparkling entertainment of Scotch dancing and bagpipe playing.

The Highland Fling started at noon today heralded by a three-man bagpipe unit under the direction of Richard Blair, instructor and director of the Macalester college pipe band.

Bagpipers, accompanied by pretty Joan Hanson, a specialist in Scotch Highland dances, will perform tonight throughout the general shopping area. The group will tour participating Highland stores on Saturday and also take part in an evening dance.

The Kozatzke Dancers, well-known St. Paul Cossack dancers who performed at the state fair and on national television shows, will stage a special free half-hour performance of Russian dances starting at 7:00 p. m. on Saturday on the south side of Ford parkway, between Cleveland and Kenneth.

A free outdoor pavement square dance will start immediately after the Kozatzke performance.

The entire membership of the "Paws and Taws" square dance club will participate in the event and help guide dancers not too familiar with square dancing. Al Johnson, assisted by other well known Twin City square dance callers, will lead the square dance.

An orchestra will provide music for dancing between square dance numbers.

A 21 inch color TV set is featured as first prize and a girl's or boy's bicycle as second prize in a free drawing contest being conducted by association members. The drawing will close Sept. 13.

R. E. Stevenson, Highland Civic association promotion chairman, described the Highland Fling today as the "biggest store or firm participation event ever staged by the association.

"We feel that the public enjoys participating in events such as the Highland Fling," Stevenson said, "and we appreciate the time, effort and money contributed by our 38-member business group to make such an event possible."



Nine Telecourses For Credit Offered By Private Colleges

The Minnesota Private College Hour, a joint presentation of the state's fourteen private colleges seen each week night over KTCA-TV, will offer nine courses for credit beginning September 15. The announcements came today from Abbot Baldwin Dworschak, president of the Minnesota Private College Council. All of the courses, with one exception, offer two semester credits to the registrant.

Spanish for Conversation is a three credit beginning course to be given by Augsburg College in Minneapolis. The telecourse, to be taught by Mrs. Mimi Kingsley, will be supplemented by a weekly ninety minute class instruction period at the college.

Other TV courses to be taught during the first academic semester are:

The History of Modern Philosophy offered by St. John's University in Collegeville. Reverend Ernest Kilzer, O.S.B. will discuss currents of philosophic thought in the fifteenth century, the development of philosophy from Descartes to Darwin and the influence of evolution in modern and contemporary systems of thought.

Human Geography by Dr. Hildegard B. Johnson. Offered by Macalester College in St. Paul, this introductory course will deal with basic geographic concepts and techniques.

The Area Study of Middle East presented by Hamline University, College of St. Catherine, College of St. Thomas and Macalester College. The course will be a comprehensive study of the countries of the Middle East historically and analytically, with particular emphasis on the impact of western civilization on the Middle East and on the significance of this area in contemporary world politics and civilization.

Television courses to be offered the second semester beginning in February are Heredity, Modern Europe Literature, Marriage and Family Living, Music Literature and part two of the Area Study of Middle East.

Applicants for registration must be high school graduates. Interested person may write the office of the Minnesota Private College Hour, 2395 University Avenue, St. Paul 14 for full registration information.



Member Of Parliament Speaks On Nuclear Tests

Harold Davies, British Labor Party member of Parliament, will address a public meeting at 8 p.m. tomorrow, at the FDR Memorial Hall, 724 4th Ave. S., Minneapolis. His topic will be "World Peace and the Nuclear Arms Race."

Mr. Davies, who has been a member of the Foreign Affairs and Economic Committee in Parliament since 1945, is a member of the Foreign Affairs Committee and the Financial House of Commons. He has been a leader of the group of the Labor Party members which has opposed further testing of nuclear weapons. His pamphlet "Death Stands at Attention" is an exposition of his views on this issue.

The Minneapolis meeting is part of a six weeks tour which will take Mr. Davies to a dozen American cities. At Los Angeles and at San Diego State College he spoke with Dr. Linus Pauling, distinguished Nobel prize winner and a leader of the world movement of scientists to ban further nuclear tests.

Team Will Study U.S.S.R. Social Security System

Five officials of the Social Security Administration will make a first-hand study of social security systems in the Soviet Union, the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare announced today. They will be in the U.S.S.R. for approximately one month.

Arrangements for the study were worked out by State Department officials and Soviet authorities. Sometime later a similar team from the U.S.S.R. will make a first-hand study of social security in the United States.

The United States mission is headed by Charles I. Schottland, Commissioner of Social Security of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. Other members of the mission are Victor Christgau, Director, Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance; Robert J. Myers, Chief Actuary, Social Security Administration; Corinne H. Wolfe, Chief, Division of Technical Training, Bureau of Public Assistance; and Arthur E. Hess, Assistant Director, Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance.

The study of the American team will include the social welfare programs of the Soviet Union. The team will study old-age pensions, disability pensions, vocational rehabilitation, provisions for the care of children of working mothers, sanatoria and rest homes, care of the aged, care of children away from their own homes, youth organizations and related programs. Special services in new urban areas and community development programs will also be studied.

Mr. Schottland is a member of the Bureau (executive committee) of the International Social Security Association. At a meeting of that body in Rome last November, the Russian delegate initiated discussions which led to arrange-

ments for the exchange. Mr. Schottland was appointed Commissioner of Social Security by President Eisenhower in 1954. Previously he served as Director of California's State Department of Social Welfare. He is president-elect of the National Conference on Social Welfare.

The publications on the Soviet Union's social security and social welfare programs available in English are general in nature, Mr. Schottland said. The United States team hopes to bring back, through first-hand observation, more specific information about the welfare programs.

He is a graduate of the Yeshiva Seminar of Czechoslovakia. After teaching in Czechoslovakia he came to Montreal, Canada, in 1950, where he taught from 1950 to 1955. Since then he has been in charge of the McKeesport Talmud Torah

Jewish Center. He is a licensed teacher being licensed by the American Association for Jewish Education.

Mrs. Henry Apt was born in Czechoslovakia, graduated from the Teachers College in Czechoslovakia and taught in the public schools in that country. Since 1955 Mrs. Apt has been teaching in the Talmud of McKeesport.

Mr. Samuel Pultusker, born in Warsaw, Poland, is a graduate of Tachkemoni School Teachers College and a Yeshiva. With the outbreak of World War II in Poland, Mr. Pultusker, who was teaching in the Jewish underground and saw service against the Nazis. Since 1949 Mr. Pultusker has taught in the Rabbinical Academy in Brooklyn and later in the Talmud Torah of Poughkeepsie. He also taught Hebrew and Jewish history at a New York military academy.





Two-Day Garden Forum Opens At Como Today

The Garden Club of Ramsey County will be host to the Annual Garden Forum of the Minnesota State Horticultural Society today and tomorrow at the Como Park Pavilion. The two-day session will open at 9 a.m. today with registration of visitors, which will entitle them to attend all the sessions planned. The finest talent is being used in this Forum, which is comprised mostly of local people. While registrations are being completed, and before the Forum is officially opened, T. A. Weir of the Department of Horticulture will demonstrate how to prune trees and shrubs.

Convention chairman will open the morning session at 9:45 a. m. Mr. G. Victor Lowrie, president of the Minnesota State Horticultural Society will keynote the Garden Forum. He will be followed by Dr. R. A. Phillips of the Department of Horticulture.

Luncheon for both days will be served from the northwest's only "Complete Kitchen on Wheels" buffet style, at the Pavilion at noon. Tickets for the luncheon must be purchased at the time registration is made in the early morning.

The session has been planned to include everything in landscaping from garden soil up to a completely planted home yard. This will include instructions Thursday in lawn planning, establishment and maintenance; the best of trees and shrubs; planting and care of evergreens; fruits, dual-purposes, and vegetables. Friday's session will complete the cycle with information on annuals for color, and Minnesota's perennials.

The Leadership Conference which begins at 8:30 Friday before the regular day's activities, is on Garden Club organization and Garden Show problems. Each of those will be moderated by Mrs. W. G. Sindt, and Mrs. E. J. Koempel of the Garden Club of Ramsey County. These are open to anyone who wishes to attend.

Department of Horticulture personnel who will give talks or moderate sessions are, besides those mentioned above, Dr. L. C.

Snyder, head of the department: W. H. Alderman, Professor Emerson Division, and Eldred Hunt, Secretary. Other local individuals on the program are Dr. J. R. Watson, Chief Agronomist, Toro Research and Development Center, Toro Manufacturing Company, Minneapolis; Mrs. K. W. Fisher, and Joseph G. Ricko, Garden Club of Ramsey County, both former presidents, Mr. Bruce Johnstone, Northrup-King Company, Minneapolis; Merrill Stelling, White Bear Lake Men's Garden Club, and Roger Conklin, Ramsey County Agricultural Agent.

The Forum planners have not omitted the fun angle, and the break at 11 a. m. Friday to see Sparky, the Seal at the Como Park Zoo is a "must" item for those who attend. Guided tours on Friday will include the Como Park Conservatory, Home Greenhouses, University of Minnesota Rose, Chrysanthemum and Dahlia Gardens, and many private gardens of average size where excellent garden practice has resulted in beautiful landscape effects, lush lawns and colorful beds and borders.

The banquet at the Prom Ballroom Thursday evening at 6:30 will be emceed by W. G. Sindt, past president of the Garden Club of Ramsey County. Tickets for the banquet will be available at the Como Park Pavilion, and must be purchased by 1 p. m. today.

Do you enjoy a fast-paced discussion with intelligent people? Have you frequently put off reading the great classics of literature — books you've always felt you should read? Do you think the world today can benefit from the knowledge of ancient civilization?

If your answer to these questions is yes, a Great Books group may be precisely the stimulating activity you are looking for—and the Great Books groups are looking for you:

Hosiery In Hues

Fall colors will be ablaze on every fashionable limb this year! For, no costume is quite complete this season without the right shade in colored hosiery peeping from beneath the new, higher skirts.

Registration is now open at all branches of the Public Library for St. Paul's Great Books groups, according to Mrs. Douglas Lood, adult education Services at the Library. The groups will start meeting the last weeks in September and the first week in October. New first year groups are being formed at the Ford Parkway Branch Library as well as at the Main Library. An active second year group will also be reorganizing at the Ford Library.

Many thousands of adults have found that learning to think for themselves by studying Great Books can be fun, as well as stimulating. Groups of from 15 to 25 people sit down together to discuss books written by such authors as Plato, Shakespeare, books old as the Bible, new as Freud. They find that the books deal with basic problems as current and important today as when they were written: the problems of justice, happiness, immortality, government, and the nature of man.

The regular reading assignments give participants an opportunity to do the reading they've always planned to do, then exchange ideas with fellow-citizens at the great Books round-table. Sessions are not taught; the Great Books are the teachers. Members do the reading, then are asked questions by co-leaders, volunteers who have been trained in the Socratic art of asking questions. Leaders do not supply the answers, the participants do. This technique makes it absolutely necessary for everyone to think for himself.

"This opportunity for a free liberal education is open to all adults in the community," stated Mrs. Lood. "There is no tuition, and there are no educational requirements." Participants may supply their own books, borrow them from a friend or the Library, or purchase inexpensive paper-bound editions from the non-profit Great Books Foundation.

Language Laboratory Will Utilize Tape Recorders

One of the finest foreign language laboratories in the nation will be opened at Macalester College in September. The laboratory was installed this summer in former classroom space in the south wing of the Macalester little theatre classroom building.

Director of the new laboratory is Harry Bratnaber, Jr., recently appointed to the Macalester faculty as assistant professor of French. Prof. Bratnaber comes to Macalester well qualified for the directorship of the lab. He is a graduate of the famous Middlebury college of language in Vermont.

In an all-out effort to make its language teaching techniques uppermost in the nation, Macalester has resorted to the science of electronics. The emphasis will be on the spoken language in conjunction with the grammar learned in the classroom.

After taking some language courses designed for the laboratory, the student of normal linguistic ability will not have to say, "I studied French in college for two years, but I speak it poorly. No one can understand me."

Also, after using the lab a few times, the average Macie will not feel that he or she is just meeting the college two-year language requirement.

Teachers of languages at Macalester will utilize the facilities of the language lab by sending their students there to hear tapes based on material they are studying in class.

The teacher's master tape can be played on any one of the four master channels so that the students will hear it through the headphones in the booths. A different language can be played on each of the four channels simultaneously.

For more individual study, a student can reserve a booth ahead of time and listen to his lesson tape at his own speed. In this manner he will be able to pause while a point sinks in, or move ahead to new material faster if he finds one portion quite simple, or play back one part which he finds unusually difficult.

The student will hear his own pronunciation when he records his own voice on the tapes and compares it to that of his instructor. The master tape cannot be erased by the student but he can correct, erase, or re-record what he says on his tape.

When a student speaks into his mike, he always hears what he is saying through his own earphones. This gives him a chance to hear himself as others hear him in the language.

An additional interesting feature will be the showing of foreign language films in the laboratory room. The student will hear the sound track in his earphones.

Each of the 25 booths in the laboratory is five feet in height and lined with acoustical tile. Equipment for a booth includes tape mechanism and amplifier, a set of high-quality crystal headphones, a mike, and a panel of control switches.




