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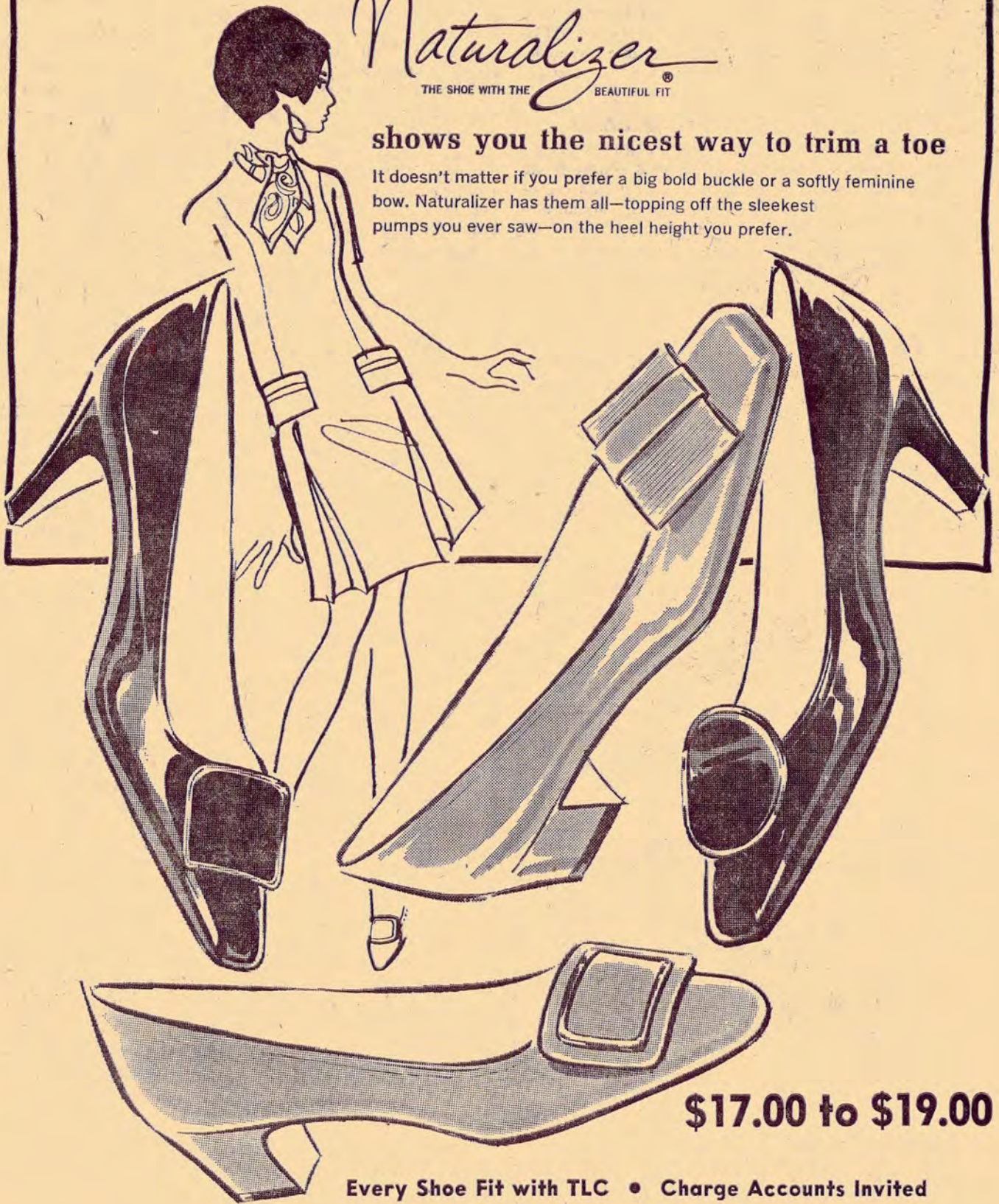

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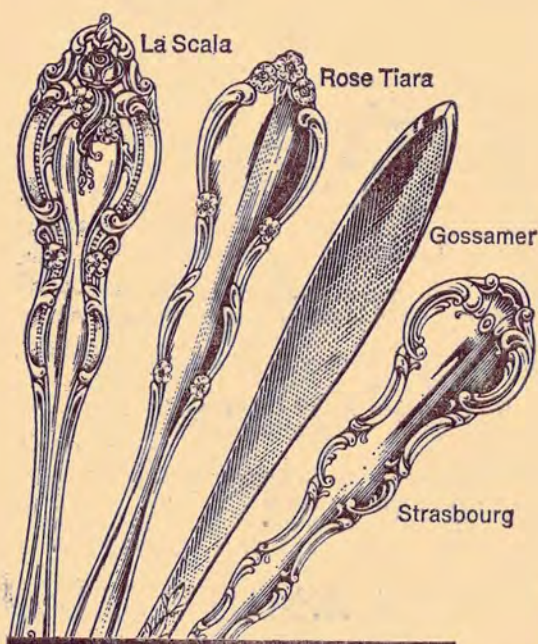

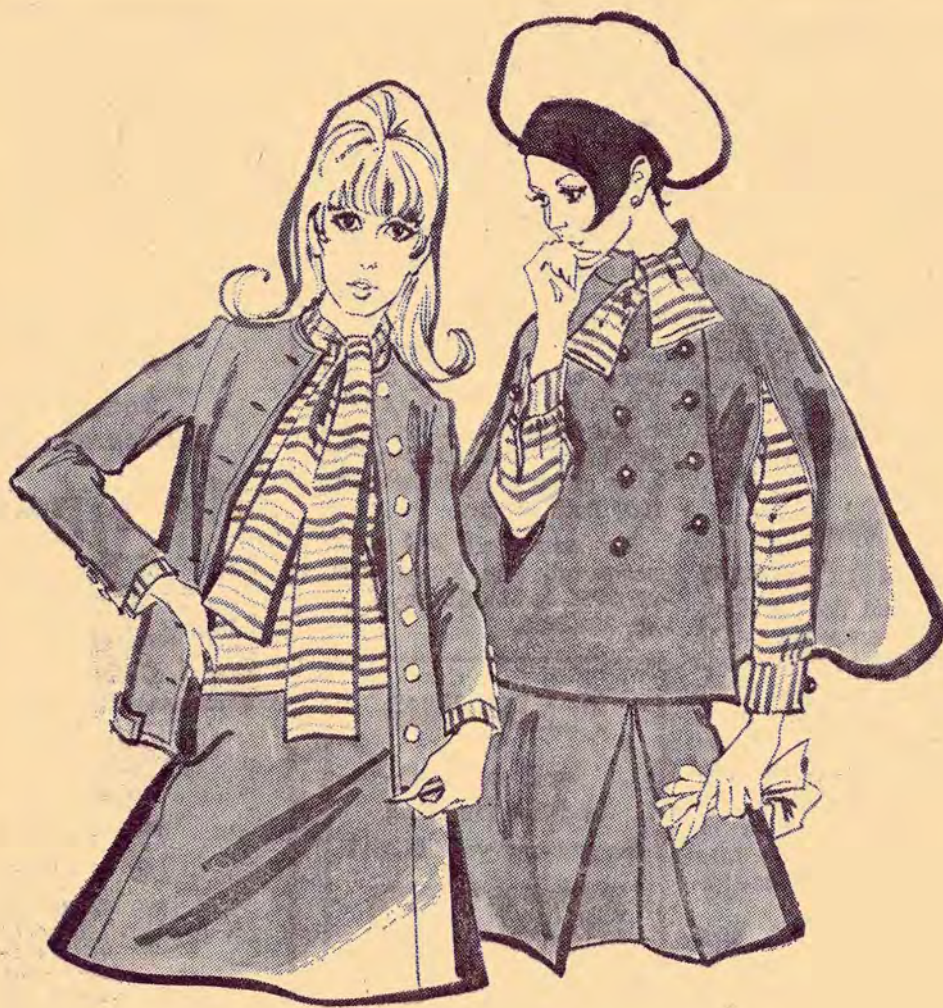
Gibbs Farm Winter Hours End March 15

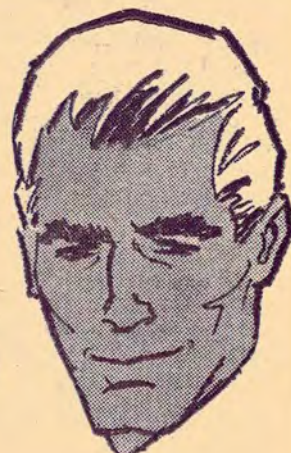
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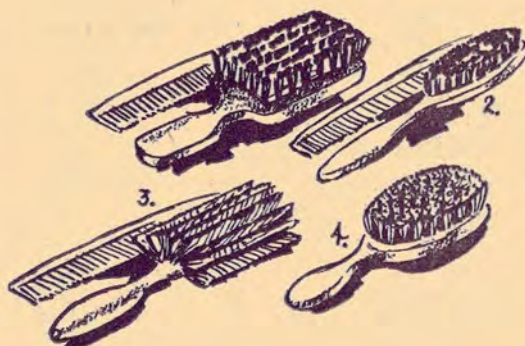
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Girl Scout Service Unit

Cardinal Cody To Speak Here



His Eminence John Cardinal Cody, Archbishop of Chicago, will visit the College of St. Thomas campus today, the feast of the College's patron, St. Thomas Aquinas.

St. Thomas Day events will begin at 4 p.m. with a procession of clergy, faculty and students from Ireland Hall to the Chapel. Cardinal Cody will be the principal celebrant of a celebrated low Mass in the Chapel at 4:10 p.m.

Following the Mass, a dinner in honor of Cardinal Cody will be served in Murray Hall, after which a short program will be held and an honorary degree conferred upon the Cardinal by the College.

Student groups participating in the procession, Mass and dinner will be the All College Council, Delta Epsilon Sigma, and the junior and senior classes. Students from Illinois will be invited to the special events.

Cardinal Cody will deliver the sixth lecture in the Vatican II Continued series at 8:15 that evening in the Armory. His talk will be entitled "Vatican II and Human Rights."

As Archbishop of New Orleans 1964-65, Cardinal Cody was a strong proponent of the first integrated parochial schools in the South.

Appointed Archbishop of Chicago in 1965 and elevated to the College of Cardinals in 1967, he directs the largest Catholic archdiocese in America.

The Cody lecture is one of a series of eight lectures co-sponsored by the College of St. Thomas and The College of St. Thursday, March 7, 1968

Catherine under a grant from the Elizabeth C. Quinlan Foundation.

The purpose of the series is to bring to students, alumni and friends of the colleges the best thinking on current issues confronting the Church. The series is a continuation of one begun last year involving church and lay leaders who discuss points raised by the Second Vatican Council. The program normally involves the main address followed by a question-answer period. The last speaker was Senator Eugene McCarthy who spoke to an audience of 2000 on Feb. 19.

Two other speakers remain on the current schedule after the Cardinal Cody address. They are: The Most Rev. Paul J. Hallinan, Archbishop of Atlanta, Ga., speaking Monday, April 8 on "The Parish: Today and Tomorrow"; and Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, General Secretary, World Council of Churches, speaking Thursday, April 25 on the "Important Ecumenical Trends today."

Cretin Receives Chalice Of Bishop Cretin

Recently, His Excellency Archbishop Leo Binz of the Archdiocese of St. Paul presented the chalice of the Most Reverend Joseph Cretin the first Bishop of St. Paul to the Christian Brothers and student body of Cretin High School. The chalice was presented to the superintendent and principal, Brother Theodore Drahman; the assistant principal, Mr. James Tocko; and the student council president, Mr. Harold Tschida in the school chapel.

Used by Bishop Cretin as his personal chalice, it is presently on display in the school and will be used for offering the Mass on special school occasions. The outside of the cup and stem depict the elements of Christ's passion and death which were common in the spirituality of France from where Bishop Cretin first came as a missionary to the mid-west. Bishop Cretin first arrived in St. Paul in 1851 to assume charge of the Diocese. His immediate concern was the education of youth. The school he opened in 1851 was the precursor of the present Cretin High School now conducted by the Brothers of the Christian Schools.

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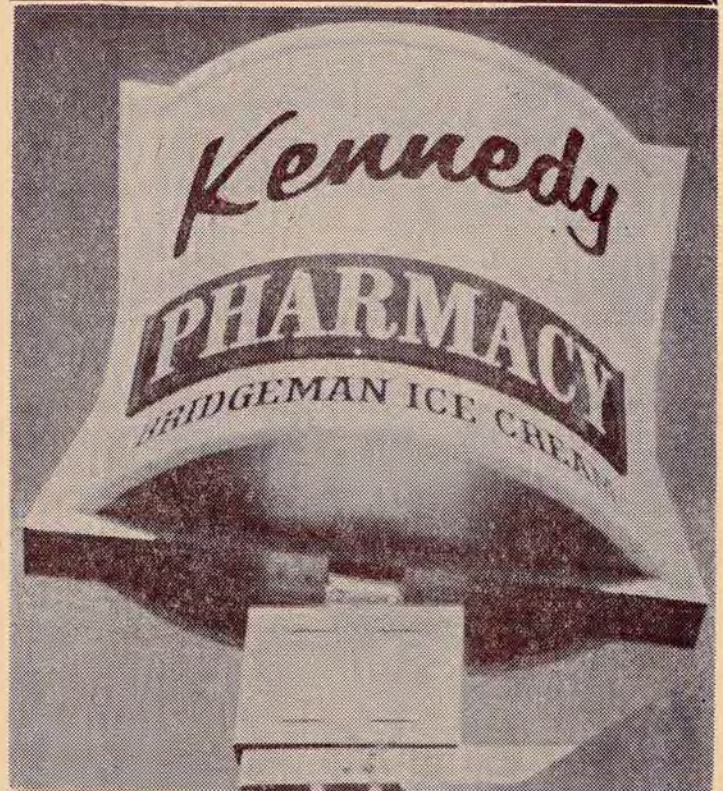
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Urban Studies Planned for Lay Churchmen

A church-supported center for training Twin Cities area laymen in social and political concerns is accepting registrations for a four-month course which will start late in March.

Seminars will be held on certain evenings and Saturdays during the March 29 to July 27 course offered by the Center for Urban Encounter, 2200 University Avenue, St. Paul.

Faculty members include James Hetland, chairman of the Metropolitan Council; Lillian Anthony, director of the Minneapolis Civil Rights Department; Bishop James Shannon of the Catholic Archdiocese of St. Paul - Minneapolis; Roger G. Kennedy, vice-president of the Northwestern National Bank of St. Paul; Marcus Bell, staff member of The Way in Minneapolis; the Rev. David W. Preus, chairman of the Minneapolis school board; Cyril Paul, folk-singer who teaches in Roseville; Larry Harris, coordinator for the Minneapolis Urban Coalition; and State Rep. Joe O'Neill of St. Paul.

Topics treated include "How the Twins Got This Way," "Power Distribution in the Twins," "The Ministry of the Laity in the Secular," "Toward a Theology of Social Change," "The Urban Revolution: a Shift in Values," and "Black Power and White Churches."

The adult trainees also choose volunteer tasks in which they are involved weekly during the four-month course. Agencies through which they work include county welfare departments, poverty and civil rights programs, school tutoring programs, and the Metropolitan Council.

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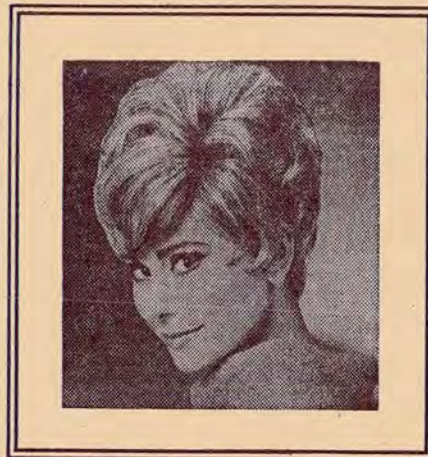
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17th Annual Christianity Conference

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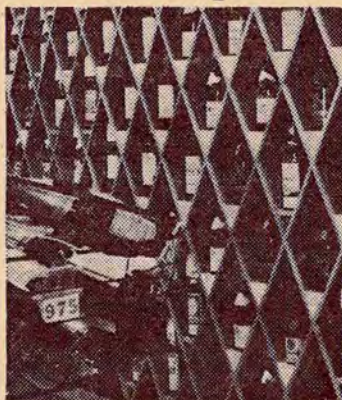

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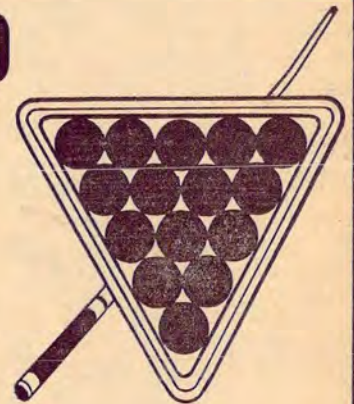

Social Security Laws Improved To Include More People in Medicare

The social security amendments of 1967 have made many changes and improvements in the medicare program, according to Mr. Ralph H. Gower, social security District Manager in St. Paul.

One important change, Mr. Gower stated, is that more people will be eligible for hospital insurance benefits. Under the old law, people who reached 65 in 1968, and were not entitled to monthly social security or railroad retirement benefits, could not get hospital insurance benefits unless they had 6 calendar quarters of coverage or about 1½ years of work under social security. Now, under the new law, this requirement has been reduced to 3 calendar quarters, or about 9 months work.

The amount of work needed to qualify for hospital insurance benefits after 1968 increases by 3 quarters each year. Eventually, for those reaching 65 in future years, the amount of work required for hospital insurance protection will be the same as that required for monthly cash benefits.

However, if you qualify for monthly benefits as a dependent or survivor of an insured worker, you will not need any work under social security.

Play it safe. If you're nearing 65, get in touch with your social security office and get the facts.

Mr. Gower further explained that persons who plan to continue working when they reach 65 should also apply within the three months prior to the month in which they have their 65th birthday. By applying for social security, they will be covered by hospital insurance and can make their decision on vol-

untary medical insurance coverage. Later on, when they retire or have reduced earnings which will permit payment of benefits, monthly checks can be started without delay.

The St. Paul social security office is located at 316 Robert St. Hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. In addition, the office remains open Thursday evening until 7:30 p.m.

TUESDAY'S MAYOR(S):

Those of you who care to stick it out in the city and fight together to keep your urban habitat a reasonably tolerable place in which to pursue your destiny will undoubtedly go to the polls next Tuesday and cast an intelligent vote. Those of you who are so bored with yourselves and your life in the city that you would not vote at all, or toy with your vote, deserve to be the first victims of air-pollution.

In the course of fifteen years St. Paul has gone from a solvent city to a broke city. We now spend nearly as much money matching federal handouts as we used to spend running our city. Our population has remained fairly even. In that period of time we have had all the questions, all the answers, all the hoopala, the cries for leaders hip, the pledges, the cries of graft, of overspending, of inefficiency—all the bromides in the lexicon of the politicians.

We have no serious problem in St. Paul regarding the racial issue, because we have no ghetto—no hopelessness among our Negro citizens. We could use a little more love, a lot less hypocrisy, a ton more of equal employment opportunity, and a workable liaison. But, we have no problem, unless we've gone daffy in our efforts to have "everything" the other big cities have! The racial problem in America is in the heart, not a black heart, but a white one, and when the white heart finds its conscience, then there'll be no racial problem.

What we do have in St. Paul is a featherweight mind about what we want to do with our strength; industrious people, educational excellence, a healthy economy, workable geography, good housing, a basically spiritual society, strong and good ethnic ties—in other words—a good mix of great human and material resources.

This strength has always been with us, and it is the tragedy of our city's history that so few men in our city government have ever tapped it for all it was worth. Instead, we have been led into believing that we are a slightly backward Boston kind of a town run by cigar-in-the face ward healers, backroom Charlies and block-vote hustlers.

St. Paul's image of itself is at an all time low, simply because it is broke. There is no easy solution to that problem. Can we only point, as one of our candidates for Mayor is pointing, and can we only add up the figures as one of the candidates for Mayor is adding up the figures, and can we only incite fear and doubt, as one of the candidates for Mayor has done, and cast aspersions on the integrity of the present Administration, as one of the candidates for Mayor has done? This kind of flogging is not what St. Paul needs—it has had it before, just as viciously, with as much invective, chapter and verse—but not on a television screen and not by a woman!

The Byrne administration is led by an honest man—a man of ideals, and a man of intelligence. It is, however, too much of a one party, one principal, one goal, one objective government to provide the flexible response necessary for all of the people of St. Paul. That it is hopelessly encumbered in a financial dilemma, is not nearly as important as the fact that being a DFL clubhouse, we can only expect a very liberal answer to our financial problem from the Byrne administration. The Byrne administration clearly deserves the vote of people who are liberal in their thinking about the problems facing our city and country today.

William R. Carter Jr. is a man of no political experience but a lot of government administration experience. He has never caused with the DFL or GOP, and his natural inclination during the primary has been to speak positively for the people of St. Paul without entering the Byrne Butler dogfight. He indicates a willingness to throw away the book and start all over. On that basis, I think he deserves to be one of the two candidates nominated.
