Bob graduated from Robbinsdale high school in 1946 and served in the Korean War with the 1st Cavalry Division in 1951. He was injured in the stomach when concussion from an artillery shell knocked him off a ledge. He didn't realize how fortunate the mishap was until later in a hospital in Japan when he learned from a wounded officer that out of the 275 men in his company only 54 were alive.

Bob has been with Warners for 13 years. He started as a stockman in the wholesale division, then became assistant manager of the Robbinsdale store and became manager of the Highland store in 1958.

Chief of police William Froetz, Highland policeman Wally Friberger, officers of the league and past Little League presidents were introduced and seated in the reviewing stand.

In the second game pitching again told the story as Donald Weber struck out 15 batters and allowed only two hits in leading his Rob Roy mates to a 3-0 shutout over the Hootmoots. The third game was a tight pitching duel that finally saw the Chiefs defeating the Scots 1-0. John Olson was the winning pitcher.

Homecroft Recreation Ass'n Announces Summer Program For Tots and Teens

The Homecroft Neighborhood Recreation Association has announced their summer program to run through August 7. The program will again be under the direction of Mr. William Funk. The playground building will be open from 9 a. m. - 5 p. m. daily, Monday through Friday. Twenty-two mothers have volunteered their services and will help supervise activities for children from 5 years and up.

The tot program will include craft classes, sandbox contests, playground games, story hours, and supervised use of playground equipment. Special events, to be announced later, will include doll buggy parades, pet parades, and a dress-up parade. Sixty eight boys and girls over ten years of age have signed to assist the parents in the supervision of this program.

A special program for girls has been set up to include 7-8 year olds' craft classes on Tuesdays, 10 year olds on Mondays, and all girls on Wednesdays. Tennis instruction will be given and organized softball games will be held on various days throughout the week.

The program for boys will include crafts for all age groups and baseball which is set-up to include all ages.

Two special classes have been added this year to enrich the program. A dancing class will be held in the Homecroft school gymnasium every Monday from 9-12 a. m. Tap, baton, and ball-room dancing will be taught. The class will be open to boys and girls of all ages. The cost per lesson will be twenty-five cents (25c).

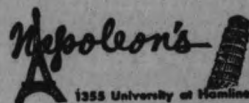

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St. Lawrence Seaway Dedication on WCCO-TV

A two-hour telecast of the formal dedication of the St. Lawrence Seaway, with Queen Elizabeth and President Eisenhower participating in the ceremonies, will be presented by WCCO Television - CBS (Channel 4) from 9-11 a. m. on Friday, June 26th.

The ceremonies will be of particular interest and importance to residents of Minnesota and Wisconsin, marking the realization of a centuries-old dream of a waterway capable of bringing ocean-going vessels 2,200 miles inland to Duluth and Superior.

The event also symbolizes a new era in Canadian-American relations, signified by the joint appearance of Queen Elizabeth and President Eisenhower. The common boundary of their two nations is the longest unguarded frontier in the world.

Red Cross Swimming Course Offered at Highland Park Pool

Highland park pool will be one of seven facilities where the Red Cross will teach water safety for a 10-week period this summer.

Starting Friday, June 19, the pool will be turned over to the organization through special arrangements made with the cooperation of Bernard Holland, commissioner of parks and playgrounds. Lessons will be given every Friday from 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. until August 21.

Under a new instruction system, called the station method, there will be three beginners classes in the mornings at 10:15, 11 and 11:45 and three in the afternoon at 1:30, 2:15 and 3 p. m. Classes will last for 30 minutes.

Children will progress through five stations as their skills indicate and beginners, who are found to have necessary knowledge, will pass through other stations as they are able. A report card system will be used to indicate to parents how their children are progressing.

In addition to beginning swimming, advanced swimming will be taught at 9:30 and 3:45 p. m.; life saving at 9:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. Swimming classes for adults will be available at each facility.

Registration will be at the regular scheduled class time on the first Friday, tomorrow. Children are asked to bring their suits and towels to this session.

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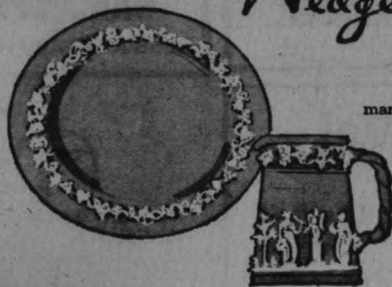

Science Museum Begins Registration For Summer Field-trip Programs

Registrations now are being taken for the St. Paul Science museum's two summer workshop-field trip programs for boys and girls that will begin June 22. The programs, which range from geology to bird life, attracted more than 600 youngsters last summer.

The junior science workshop will continue eight weeks, through Aug. 14, and is for fifth and sixth grade students. Each student will attend one morning demonstration program in the museum weekly and will have the opportunity to go on three afternoon field trips throughout the summer.

Subjects of the workshops will include rocks and minerals, fossil animals and plants, pond life and fish, mammals, Minnesota Indian life of the past, reptiles and amphibians, and insects.

There is no charge for the course, except for bus fare which is \$1.50 for three field trips.

The second program is an advanced summer science workshop for junior high school age boys and girls. There will be two four-week sessions, the first from June 22 to July 17 and the second from July 17 to Aug. 14. Each student will spend one half day in the museum and one full day in the field weekly.

Each participant in the second program can select one special area of study during each session. They include, in the first session: geology and fossil study, life in or near the water, plants that live together, and bird life. Study areas in the second session are mammals, reptiles and amphibians, butterflies and moths and bird life.

Only charge is for bus fare which is 50 cents a trip or \$4 the entire summer.

Trained and experienced field biologists will conduct the museum demonstrations and field trips for both the junior and advanced programs. Those wishing to register for either the junior or advanced workshops can call the museum, CA. 4-3889. In the case of elementary school children, the museum asks that a parent register for them.

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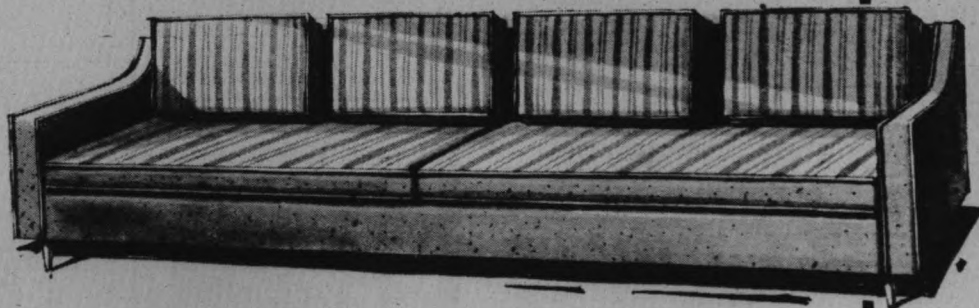

Seal Society Opens Two Camps; Plans Broad Expansion Program

Announcement of the opening of the two Minnesota Easter Seal camps, Camp Courage and the Easter Seal Speech Camp, was coupled today with announcement of plans for a broad camp expansion program. The announcement was made by Rustan O. Thayer of Minneapolis, president of the Easter Seal Society (Minnesota Society for Crippled Children and Adults).

"Another record year is expected at both camps," Thayer said, "with an estimated 450 crippled children and adults to be served at Camp Courage near Annadale and Maple Lake and 126 speech-handicapped youngsters at the Easter Seal Speech Camp near Stillwater."

Thayer said the first of three three-week sessions at the speech camp will begin Sunday, June 14. The first of five two-week sessions at Camp Courage will start Sunday, June 21.

"Of real interest to all of us in Minnesota who are interested in helping the handicapped is the new five-year development program approved by the Easter Seal Society's board of directors," Thayer said.

"Immediate expansion of Camp Courage already under way includes the erection of an additional staff house, the gift of a St. Paul friend; establishment of a fragrance garden for crippled and blind children by the Minnetonka Garden Club, and the small animal zoo to be provided by several Lions Clubs from this area. In addition, plans call for the addition of a second unit at Camp Courage, to provide space for 250-300 new campers each summer."

Thayer said this unit, to be financed by special gifts from individuals and groups, is expected to be completed by 1961.

He said it will provide additional facilities for speech-handicapped and crippled children.

He said this expansion has been made possible by the purchase of three tracts of land adjacent to Camp Courage totaling 54 acres. These include a 30-acre wooded tract, the gift of Mrs.

William McKnight of St. Paul, seven acres of farm land given by a Minneapolis donor, and a 17-acre island purchased from the Federal government, the gift of Senator Hubert Humphrey. The State Association of Moose Lodges, of which Senator Humphrey is a member, will develop the island site for primitive camping experiences for handicapped youngsters.

Thayer also announced creation of a Camp Courage Endowment Fund with a goal of \$500,000. He said the board of directors chose this means to underwrite the expanding camping program of the Easter Seal Society and to assure continuity and further expansion. He announced that the first gift to the endowment fund in the form of 39 shares Archer-Daniels-Midland stock by an anonymous contributor has already been received.

Science Workshop at The College of St. Catherine

The fourth phase of the Physical Science Workshop, at The College of St. Catherine, will begin on June 22 and continue through July 31. The workshop is aimed at a physical science program aimed at bettering the teaching of science in elementary schools.

The science workshop will be limited to fifty public and parochial in-service teachers of grades four through eight. These teachers are selected from schools of Minneapolis, St. Paul and Suburban areas.

The Physical Workshop was developed as a four-part program underwritten by a \$39,900 grant received from the Louis W. and Maud Hill Family Foundation.

Sister Antonius, CSJ, chairman of the division of natural sciences at St. Catherine's is workshop co-ordinator. Sister Antonius is a former president of the College and administrator of St. Joseph Hospital.

In addition to Sister Antonius, who is to teach chemistry, the staff will include Mrs. Robert Eisberg, Physics; William Schrankler, Science Activities; Sister Marquita, Laboratory In-

structor; Sister Marie James, Astronomy; and Mr. Robert Reifford, Geology.

Members of the advisory board for the physical science program are Rev. Roger J. Connole, representing the Archdiocesan Bureau of Education; Don Carlson, State Department of Education; William Schrankler, St. Paul Public Schools; and Sister Rosalie CSJ, academic dean of The College of St. Catherine.

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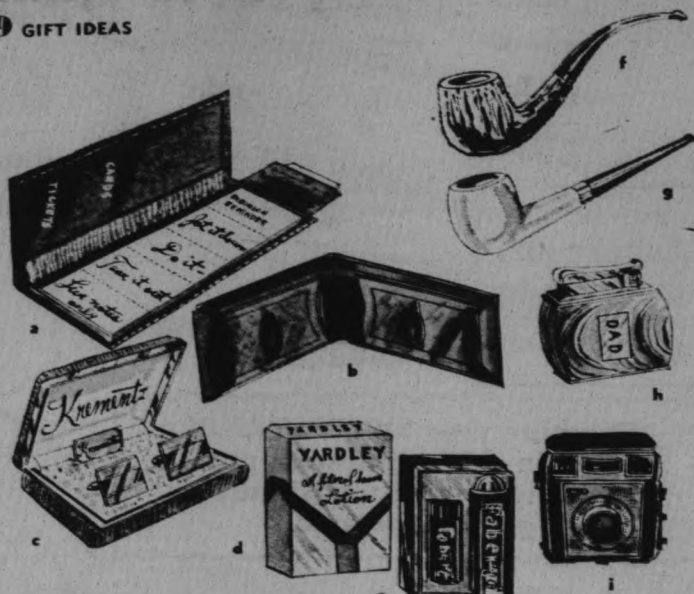
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
