Schools to Observe AEW Next Week With Special Meetings, Displays

"Our schools are only as good as we make them," he observed, "and this is an opportunity for the community to see just how good they are."

"Sputniks pinpointed the public's growing interest in education," said Mr. Hallen, "and coincidentally, also emphasized the importance of this year's AEW theme: An Educated People Moves Freedom Forward. We are glad for this growing interest. We need an aware and alert people to live in today's kind of world."

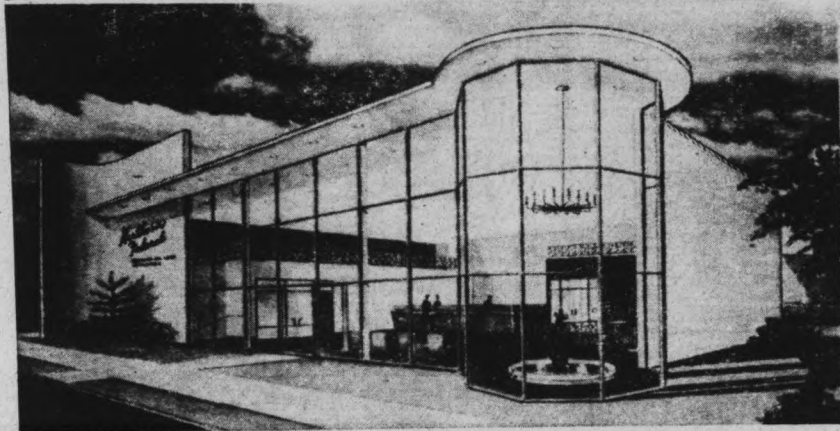
Still displays will be in Cook's, Highland Park State Bank, Highland Drug Center and Singer Sewing Center.

An Open Letter

To Villager Advertisers and Readers

With a full appreciation of the very vital role which the Highland Villager has played in the inception and growth of the Highland Recreational Association, as well as countless other organizations of the community, the members of the H.R.A. wish to appeal to all merchants who advertise in the Villager to keep this paper alive by your continued patronage.

The daily papers have recently launched a neighborhood section which will be issued weekly.

The Villager is delivered free of charge to 20,000 homes. Its publishers operate on a very narrow margin of profit, and the loss of even a few advertisers can very well cause a shift from the credit to the debit column of the ledger, thereby forcing suspension of all future operations. The daily, on the other hand, has raised subscription prices on their paper until they can now afford to offer advertising space at cut rates. This makes very tempting bait to the economy-minded business man, but how long will it last if the competition is forced out? Remember after we all had converted to gas heat a few years ago because of the low prices on natural gas how the gas company then raised its prices?

Speaking as publicity chairman for the H.R.A., I frankly do not know how this public service organization could function effectively without the loyal support which we have always received from the Villager. Youngsters watch its pages for notices of activities in our year-round program and flock by the hundreds to sign up. Entertainers for the coming Annual Variety Show were solicited through its pages, and the publicity the show receives in the Villager helps to make it a financial success.

The vigorous efforts of the H.R.A. to obtain a more equitable share of returns on our tax dollars in the form of improved playground activities and services has received a mighty assist from the Villager. Only through its pages do we learn that although residents of the eleventh ward pay approximately 30% of the total city taxes, we receive only about 2% of the funds allotted to parks and playgrounds. It will take a lot of work and public pressure by an informed populace to change this situation, and only a neighborhood paper which takes an active interest in the community can and will do the job. The daily papers concern themselves more with the problems of the city as a whole.

Too often the notices so important to the life of an organization get "lost in the shuffle" in the big papers, and only after a diligent search can you find your item, buried between it, chances are it has been "edited" almost beyond recognition. The ads, on page thirty-two or so. Even if you succeed in finding Much of your advertising may be "lost in the shuffle" too.

These are some of the reasons why we of the H.R.A. want the Villager to continue, and there can be little doubt that they are echoed by every other organization in the district, all of which have been benefited so much by its loyal service and support. We therefore respectfully request that all merchants in the area take this loyalty and service into consideration when planning their advertising, and be equally loyal to your own Highland Villager. Highland just wouldn't be the same without it.

Mac Tree Ring Study Given \$8,500 by Science Foundation

The National Science Foundation, Washington D. C., has granted Macalester college \$8,500 for the support of research entitled "Tree Growth and Climate" under the direction of Dr. Waldo S. Glock, chairman of the geology department, who joined the Macalester faculty staff in 1948.

While at Texas Technological college, Dr. Glock discovered that trees growing on the High Plains of Texas were forming more than one sharply defined ring, indistinguishable from a true annual ring, per year. His further study confirmed the discovery of multiplicity of annual tree rings under certain climatic conditions.

Upon coming to Macalester, Dr. Glock set up a tree ring laboratory. For his work he has received grants from the Smithsonian Institution, Macalester college, and friends in the Twin Cities. For his laboratory at Macalester, he was given two years ago a \$1000 grinding and polishing machine for studying tree rings, a gift of Dr. Nathan A. Bowers of Atherton, Calif.

"The Macalester laboratory possesses the beginning of a sound collection of cores and trunk sections of Minnesota and Wisconsin trees," Dr. Glock declared. "As soon as the means become available, we shall measure and analyze these specimens, for they contain much rainfall information, we feel sure."

Dr. Glock's immediate objective is to apply known principles founded upon strict botanical investigations to other regions beyond the Southwest, to measure their patterns, and to watch for and try to understand small but important changes of climate so vital to the welfare of man.

Southern Negro At St. Thomas On Four-Year Scholarship

Alvin M. Stafford, a Negro student from South Carolina, began studies recently as a freshman at the College of St. Thomas. He is the first recipient of the Edwin V. O'Hara Scholarship which will cover full tuition at St. Thomas for four years. The scholarship was instituted to commemorate the memory of the late Edwin O'Hara, archbishop of Kansas City and an alumnus of St. Thomas, who died in 1956.

The Very Rev. James P. Shannon, president of St. Thomas, in making the announcement stated that the scholarship was named for Archbishop O'Hara because he was regarded as an outstanding leader in the social apostolate. By terms of the scholarship the recipient will always be a Negro from the South. Father Shannon stated that the scholarship represents the efforts of the College of St. Thomas to make a constructive contribution toward easing the racial tension which now exists in the South.

"There are probably not many immediately helpful steps which we in the North can make toward the solution of this contemporary social problem," Father Shannon said, "but we hope that this scholarship will enable at least one qualified Negro boy to receive a Catholic liberal arts education which will qualify him to lead his people with dignity and wisdom and grace."

Stafford is one of thirteen children of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Stafford of Salters, S. C. He will major in history at St. Thomas. Stafford is a 1956 graduate of Tomlinson high school in Kingstree, S. C., a Negro school of 600 students. There he excelled in history and biology, was a member of the student council, and was the school artist. He has two brothers who have college degrees, a sister now a senior, and another brother just entering college.

During the past year Stafford has worked as an apple and tomato worker on farms in West Virginia and Florida, and as a dishwasher and short order cook in Atlantic City.
