Survey Discloses Job Oportunities

Young people who want to be in demand in the labor market should consider becoming business programmers, draftsmen, nurses or nurses aides, machinists, electronics assemblers, auto mechanics or salesmen, Commissioner George J. Vavoulis of the Minnesota Department of Employment Security said.

These occupations are among those now experiencing severe manpower shortages according to a study made by the Department of Employment Security for the Vocational and Technical division of the Minnesota Department of

The DES survey lists a total of 50 specific occupations in which there are a significant number of continuing job vacancies.

In addition, most of the occu-pations are in the "rapid" and "moderate" growth rate categories according to national employment expectations as projected to 1975.

Robert P. Van Tries, acting State Vocational, Education Director, said the report is being used by the Department of Education to help evaluate the curricula in the 26 area vocational technical achoels throughout the state and to assist high school students who are exploring possible careers. oring possible careers.

"We have distributed copies of the study to all eleven of our state vocational education supervisors and to the 26 area vocational school directors who, in turn, are making the information available to the high school counselors in their areas," Van Tries-said.

He also noted that the Department of Education had expanded the original survey, which was based only on the metropolitan area, so that it would reflect the statewide employment situation in the occupations listed in the sur-

vey.

"The report was useful in 'another way, too," Van Tries said.
"It indicated to us that, generally

training efforts are in the areas of

However, he also noted that the vocational schools still aren't able to supply enough trained people to meet the demands.

"We can't expand people haven't got and right now we have more jobs than trainees," he said.

Commissioner Vavoulis said the occupational shortage survey is indicative of the Department of Employment Security's new approach to job research.

"We need to know what changes technological and industrial advancements are going to bring about in terms of new job opportunities," Vavoulis said. "I expect, to, that we must anticipate that some of the occupations for which we are training people today will

we are training people today will become less important or even ob-solete with the passage of time," "Now that the State Employ-ment Service has become so in-volved in various job-training pro-grams, we need to know much more about present and future job markets than we did when the Service's primary function was trying to find jobs for persons re-ceiving unemployment compensa-tion checks."

"This need for more extensive

information results to a large de-gree from a shortage of skilled workers and our Department's in-volvement in an increasing numvoivement in an increasing number of manpower programs, including, among others, the Manpower Development and Training program, Job Corps, and — most recently — the training and job placement of people on the welfare rolls."





SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Mr. Ralph Gower, district manager of social security in St. Paul, reports, "Many older people are asking these days: Now that I've been given another chance to sign up for the doctor bill insurance part of medicare, will somebody tell me whether this is a good buy?"

Gower explained that those persons who were 65 or older in 1965 could enroll for the voluntary medical insurance part of the program in any of the last three months of 1965 or the first five months of 1966. Those who reached 65 after 1965 have the three months before the month they were 65, that month, and the three months thereafter to get this protection for themselves.

Now, as provided by law, those who originally turned it down have an opportunity to reconsider their earlier decision. Then, if they decide to sign up, they may do so at any time in the last three months of 1967 and the first three months of 1968.

Medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical services not covered under the hospital insurance part of medicare. Services of doctors are covered no matter where received — in their offices, the home, or in a hospital. Up to 100 home health visits a year by nurses and other health workers are also covered, as are laboratory tests and various other



This horse, survivor from prehistoric Japan, stands hopefully tethered to a temporary hitching post in the Center's Oriental gallery, where he is a focal point in the Education Tour program and a delight to children and adults alike.

Haniwa are low-fired clay sculptures from Japan's Tomb period, which ended around the 6th century A.D. 
