HHH Begins Professorship Feb. 23

Hubert H. Humphrey will begin his professorship at Macalester College by delivering the keynote address for the College's annual Political Emphasis Week on Sunday, Feb. 23, at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium.

His speech will deal with the urban crisis, theme of the five-day student-directed symposium. Other speakers scheduled during Political Emphasis Week Feb. 22-26 include former CORE director James Farmer, urban planner Jack Meltzer and Sen. Fred Harris, D-Okla., chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

During Macalester's spring term, which runs from February through May, Humphrey will also address a series of five Public Affairs Seminars open to the public, will lecture to at least one meeting of each of the 13 courses in the Political Science Department and will meet with students and faculty for luncheons and informal discussions. He will also teach at the University of Minnesota.

The former vice-president will be scheduled at Macalester three full days every two weeks and wants to make "maximum use of his time at the College to meet with students and faculty," said Dorothy Dodge, chairman of the Political Science Department. Humphrey will have an office and seminar suite in Macalester's Old Main, where he taught 25 years ago before he began his political career as mayor of Minneapolis.

The first of the five seminars in Public Affairs will begin Friday, Feb. 28, at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium, when the topic will be "Urban Affairs." Others will be held at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, March 11 and 25 and April 8 and 22. Humphrey has invited prominent guest speakers to share each seminar platform

and their names and topics will be announced after confirmations have been received.

Humphrey already is scheduled for 20 lectures to Macalester students in World Politics, American National Government, State and Local Government, American Political Thought, Evolution of Federal Policy — Health and Welfare, Soviet Bloc Governments, Simulation, International Law and Organization, Contemporary Theory of International Politics, Political Philosophy, International Communications and Comparative Politics.

In addition, a special performance for the children of St. Catherine's alumnae will be given at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, Feb. 15.

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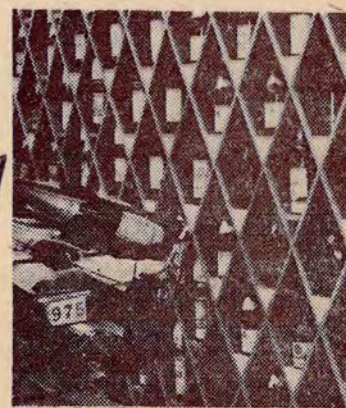

It was originally planned as a metro zoo, but when the legislature and the local governments found out that the fellows pushing it only wanted to buy the plaque with their names on it, the strategy shifted and now each and every cigarette smoking citizen in Minnesota can claim it as a tribute—a live memorial, if you will—to his habit. A special tax on ciggies is the last resort (hopefully) of the fathers of the zoo to fund and maintain their obsession. 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"Green Beret" Speaker At. St. Paul Hotel

Alan Davidson, a former Sergeant in the legendary "Green Berets" who served with the U.S. Special Forces in Vietnam, will speak on "Victory Depends on You!" at the St. Paul Hotel on Friday, February 7th at 8:15 p.m. His speech is sponsored by the St. Paul Area TRAIN Committee.

After working with the Vietnamese people, living with them, aiding them, and fighting by their sides, Davidson came to understand the incredible obstacles confronting South Vietnam and the American soldiers who went there to help them.

His training was extensive: guerrilla warfare, jungle survival, demolitions, parachuting, counter-insurgency, and intensive preparation as a medic. "I was prepared," he says, "to perform an appendectomy in the morning, hold dental call in the afternoon, and grab my rifle at night."

In 1963 he was sent, along with eleven other Green Berets, into the middle of War Zone D—a maze of jungles and swamps that was then dominated by Vietcong terrorists. This small, isolated band of heroic Americans proceeded to establish and hold one of the early "strategic hamlets."

One of the hard lessons Davidson learned is that the war in Vietnam is only part of a worldwide Communist movement. Returning to the United States, he saw similar enemies of freedom advancing the same Communist program here. He is concerned and he is disturbed. And he asks: Why are our soldiers not allowed to win in Vietnam? Why does our government send the Soviet Union and our other Communist enemies the means and material which the Vietcong use to kill American soldiers? And what can patriotic Americans do to help our servicemen?

Davidson's knowledgeable remarks, backed up by slides of his own experiences in Vietnam, will help answer these and many other questions about this puzzling war.

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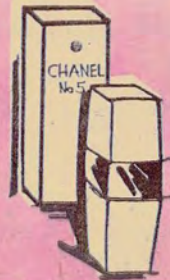
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
