### International Institute Swiss Open House

The International Institute, a Community Chest Agency, located at 183 West Kellogg Boulevard at Exchange, is presenting a Swiss Open House. Sunday, February 1, from 3 to 6 p. m.

Other celebrities in the procession will include the new King Boreas, George Montgomery of the NBC-TV "Cimarron City" adventure program, and Jimmy Dean, singing star of his own CBS-TV variety program. Dean is bringing his show to St. Paul for five days.

Other Saturday events are the preliminaries of the National Majorette championships in the Armory, the National Outdoor Speed Skating meet at Lake Como, the Carnival toboggan slides in the Capitol Approach, the Downtown Skating Rink at Fifth street between Wabasha and Cedar, and the World's Largest Square Dance festival in the auditorium Saturday night.

Sunday's program will highlight the ice fishing contest at 2 p. m. at White Bear Lake, the Mutt Derby at Lake Como, second day of the speed skating tourney, and finals of the Majorette Championships in the Auditorium, held in conjunction with the Carnival Musical Jamboree.

## St. Paul Public School Adult Education Program

The winter session of adult education classes sponsored by the St. Paul public schools in ten community evening center high schools will open the week of February 2.

Interested adult and out-of-school youth may enroll in one or more of the 250 classes offered through Thursday during the week of Jan. 26, 7-9 p. m., at all high school centers. Registrations also will be accepted by telephone or mail.

"If you would like to learn how to make better use of your leisure time and have fun doing it, the public school adult education program has a course for you," says Pricilla Rugg, coordinator of the program. For example, there's golf, swimming, bridge, interior decoration, gardens and flowers, oil painting, ceramics, fashion sewing for spring, driver education, family entertaining, let's take a trip, furniture refinishing, photography and some 60 other subjects offered," she points out.

## KTCA's "Private College Hour" Offers Five College Credits

Channel Two's Minnesota Private College Hour will offer five college credit courses during the second semester which begins the first week in February. The program, which is the largest producer of higher education credit courses on KTCA, is seen nightly.

Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter will present a two-credit course entitled "Marriage and Family Living." It is commonly referred to as a functional course or a preparation-for-marriage course.

"Modern European Literature," an introduction to West European literature from the sixteenth to the twentieth century, is the offering of the College of St. Thomas in St. Paul.

Another St. Paul school, the College of St. Catherine, will present "Music Literature." The course will consist of non-technical works from the symphony, concerto, keyboard and chamber music repertoire.

The College of St. Benedict in St. Joseph is offering its two-credit course in "Hereditry." The course aims at acquainting the beginning student of hereditry with the fundamental laws of inheritance and their practical applications.

A comprehensive study of the countries of the Middle East historically and analytically will be offered by the four St. Paul Colleges. Entitled the "Area Study of the Middle East," the course is made possible through a grant of the Hill Foundation.

Any high school graduate desiring college credits may enroll in one or more of the courses. Enrollment applications are available by writing the private college hour office at 2395 University Avenue, St. Paul 14.

## St. Catherine's Prepares Lectures "The Living City" for KTCA Series

Faculty members at The College of St. Catherine are preparing a series of lectures, entitled The Living City, on the significant culture of various cities for presentation on the Twin City Educational Television outlet, KTCA-TV, Channel 2. The series is intended to provide an insight into the city as a factor of culture.

The first lecture, The Living City, will be presented by Richard K. Leeman, Department of English on Tuesday, January 20. It will be an informal appraisal of the City, ancient and old, in the lives and thoughts of men.

This will be followed by a talk on Friday, January 23, on the Christian Culture of Rome, by Sister Rosalie, C.S.J., Academic Dean. Sister Rosalie will show how the inheritance of centuries of Christian culture is seen in Modern Rome.

Mrs. Lila Eisberg of the Department of Physics will give a description of Cambridge, England, a typical, even at its beginnings, a college town which retains its medieval character today, on Tuesday, January 27. The perspective of a city—Paris—which is more than its monuments, will be presented by Sister Marie Philip, C.S.J., of the French Department, January 30.

The series will then be interrupted until Tuesday, March 31, when Sister Marie James, C.S.J., of the Department of Chemistry, will speak on Jerusalem—ancient and ageless, the possession of all people.

The final lecture of the Living City series will be given by Glen Glasgow, Department of Music, on San Francisco in which geography, history and a particular pride have combined to make this a truly distinctive American City.

The lectures will be presented from 8:00 to 8:30 p. m.

## Homes That Look Better Are Worth More to You

"I've just seen an amazing thing," a realtor friend told me the other day. "We sold two identical houses on the same block. Both had good care. The same prospects looked at both houses, yet one sold for nearly three thousand dollars more than the other."

"What made the difference in price," I asked.

"One house looked like it was worth the extra money," he said.

"Now," I said, "your not talking about real estate anymore, you're talking about interior decorating."

"Exactly, my friend, and not because I want to hear you make a pitch for interior decorating either. You know, if I can get three thousand extra dollars for a house, it doesn't hurt my commission any."

Well, maybe you don't care if my friend makes a dime in the real estate business, but there is a moral to his mercenary story. Attractive interior decoration not only adds value to your property, but it adds pleasure as well.

We often do interior decorating on a new house before the owner moves in. Our decorators coordinate walls, draperies, carpeting — even upholstery and bedspreads. ## AT MACALESTER

A number of valuable documents have been contributed by Macalester college alumni to the new Macalester archives room in the college library.

The college administration hopes to make the archives a valuable adjunct to the 73 year old liberal arts college in collecting records dating back to the college's early days.

Macalester alumni around the country are being encouraged to contribute articles, clippings, letters, pictures, and objects which pertain to the college and which help to tell its history.

A geographical survey of this year's Macalester college student group has just been made.

The survey reveals that the 1511 students come from 29 states and from 26 foreign countries.

If one of the Twin Cities' promising young music composers reaches the top he will come by his music ability and interest quite naturally.

He is Vincent W. Carpenter, Macalester college assistant professor of music and composer in residence. His latest composition, "A Summer Overture," will be given its world premiere by the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra Feb. 2, when the orchestra gives a concert in the Macalester field-house.

An original miniature India ink portrait of George Washington is one of the valuable possessions in the Macalester college library.

The portrait was left to the college by its founder, Edward D. Neill, upon his death in 1893 and, until recently, has been in a dark vault. It now has been transferred to the Neill room of the Macalester library.

The portrait was done by artist Samuel Folwell and is one of two Washington originals done by him. The other is in the Pennsylvania Historical Society library, Philadelphia, according to a book, "Macalester Contributions," by Edward Neill.

The Minneapolis symphony orchestra and the Macalester college 205-voice choir will be featured in a program at 8:30 p. m. Monday, Feb. 2, in the Macalester college fieldhouse.

## Alexander Brailowsky Presents Recital For "Masterpiece Series" January 28

Alexander Brailowsky, who will present a recital for University Artists Course "Masterpiece" Series patrons in Northrop Memorial Auditorium on January 28 at 8:30 p. m., was born in Kiev, ancient cultural center of The Ukraine. His father was an oil company executive and also a zealous amateur pianist. Accordingly, his only son was introduced to the instrument at an early age.

But little "Sascha" was not brought up as prodigy. His parents saw to it that he finished high school before he was permitted to enter Kiev Conservatory.

It happened that the late Sergei Rachmaninoff attended a student recital in which the young Brailowsky played a Beethoven sonata. The famous virtuoso was enthusiastic about his performance.

Encouraged, Mr. and Mrs. Brailowsky decided to bring their gifted boy to Vienna for advanced studies with the legendary Theodor Leschetzky. Brailowsky worked with him for four years, followed by a year under the tutelage of the renowned Italian composer-arranger-pianist Busoni.

When he made his debut in Paris in 1920, Brailowsky was an immediate sensation, winning rave notices from the astute Parisian critics. By 1922, when he made his initial tour of South America, Alexander Brailowsky was a famous artist. He was to make history in the spring of 1924, when he conceived the idea of a complete Chopin cycle. That spring, at Paris, he performed 172 of the composer's solo works in six appearances—a feat he has since repeated many times.

His first New York recital that autumn drew such rapturous reviews that a projected six-week visit had to be extended to four months. Manhattan never has changed its mind about him.

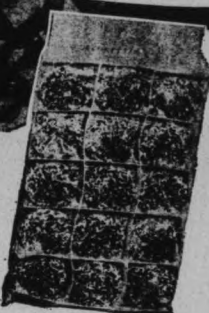
