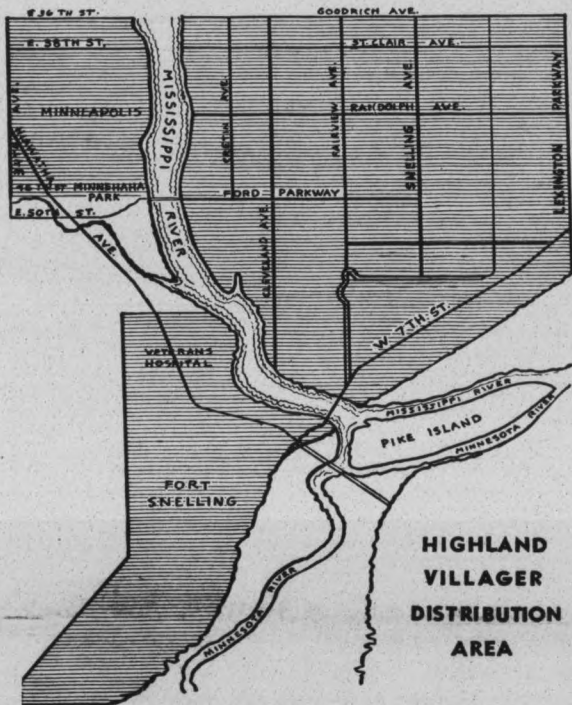

Teen-Age Code Workshop To Hear Governor Monday

Governor Orville L. Freeman will deliver the keynote address at the opening session of the Teen-Age Code Workshop to be held Monday in St. Paul.

The workshop, intended to provide more information about the Minnesota Teen-Age Code, its effectiveness as a standard for social conduct, and the best procedures of establishing a code at community level, is open to all interested citizens.

The session to be held at the St. Paul Hotel, will open at 9:30 a. m. with the outlining of youth's responsibility in the workshop by Mr. Jay Bamber, a St. John's University freshman, and Vice-President of the Governor's Youth Council. The keynote address by Governor Freeman will follow. The workshop will then break up into ten panel sessions, with each session headed by youth, parents, teachers and leaders who have had experience with the code in the more than 100 schools throughout the state which have adopted social codes since the introduction of the code by the Governor's Advisory Council on Children and Youth in September of 1956.

The purpose of the morning panels will be to learn first hand information from those communities which have had experience in the actual steps that prove successful in establishing codes in their communities. An Award-noon luncheon will be presided over by Mr. Phillip Pickman, President of the Governor's Youth Council.

Panel sessions will reconvene after the noon-day lunch, and will attempt to spell out the individual roles of youth, parents, teachers, and school administrators on their responsibilities in the implementation of a social code once it has been established in their community.

Niels Bohr, famous Danish physicist and Nobel prize winner, will give a public address at 8 p. m. Wednesday, December 11, in the Macalester fieldhouse. The public is invited. Dr. Bohr's subject will be "Atoms and Human Knowledge."

Coming here under auspices of the Macalester college Development council, Dr. Bohr will be the first in a series of internationally known speakers to appear at Macalester through the council. The speakers are being brought through the work of the special occasions committee of the Development council. Chairman of this committee is Mr. Harold Wood, St. Paul, investment banker.

The large capacity of the Macalester fieldhouse, which is at Snelling avenue and Fairmount, is 3,000.

Father of Atomic Energy
Dr. Bohr, 72, is called the father of atomic energy and is a pioneer of the study of the atom. He has just received the first \$75,000 atoms-for-peace award, which was given at a ceremony at the National Academy of Sciences, Washington, D. C., October 24.

Dr. Bohr, founder and director of the Institute for Theoretical Physics in Copenhagen, won the Nobel prize in physics in 1922. Bohr's contributions to twentieth century progress are said by many to rank with those of Albert Einstein.

It was Bohr who 44 years ago unlocked the secret of atomic structure in a path-finding work on the constitution of atoms and molecules. This, plus subsequent studies of protons and electrons, brought him the Nobel prize.

Bohr is featured in the book called "The 100 Most Important People Today" by Donald Robinson. In 1939 he solved the problem of whether it was U-238 or U-235 that had been split.

He is often called the father of atomic theory. He made the first announcement that the atom had been split at a meeting of physicists in Washington, D. C. in 1939. In 1943 to 1945 he served as top assistant to the director at Los Alamos.

Hamline Offers Ten Four-Year Grants To 'Top Fifth' Seniors

Ten scholarships with a total value of \$17,500 will be awarded by Hamline university in a competitive scholarship program designed to assist talented high school seniors get a college education, Dr. Paul H. Giddens, president of Hamline announced.

Five four-year scholarships, each with a value of \$2,000, will

be granted to students ranking highest in a competitive examination to be held on the Hamline campus, Feb. 1, 1958. The next five highest ranking students will receive four-year scholarships with a value of \$1,500 each.

The examination is open to students in the upper fifth of their senior class.

Although similar scholarship programs have been adopted by Eastern colleges, the plan by Hamline is the first of its type in this area.

In announcing the competitive scholarship examination, President Giddens said, "One of the nation's most serious educational problems is that only about half of the top fourth among high school graduates go to college. Many lack money for college expenses. Others lack encouragement. Either way, such a loss of potential brain power is a frightful waste of human resources in a day when the need for educated leadership is so acute."

Students wishing to take the examination should write to the Director of Admissions, Hamline university, St. Paul, Minn., for an official application blank.

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Valuable Anglo-Irish Books Bought For St. Thomas Library

A 2000-volume private collection of Anglo-Irish literature and historical works was purchased this week for the College of St. Thomas, the Very Rev. James P. Shannon, president, announced.

The works constitute the library of the late Eamon O'Toole, a retired professor who held the chair of Irish Studies in Trinity College, Dublin. Dr. O'Toole died in 1956.

The donor of the valuable collection is Mrs. William J. Foxley of Omaha, Neb., widow of Father Shannon's half-brother who was killed in an automobile accident last spring. The collection will be given in his memory. Arrangements to purchase the collection were made through the family of Dr. O'Toole.

Dr. O'Toole was recognized as a learned scholar in Modern Irish dialects and folklore. He was a prolific writer himself. His poems and articles appeared in numerous Irish publications and he has had several books published.

Father Shannon inspected the collection while on a trip to Ireland this summer. A check of the St. Thomas library, although extensive in Anglo-Irish works already, disclosed but 45 title duplications, and the purchase was made.

Father Shannon stated that the new collection will be given a special place in the new million-dollar St. Thomas library when it is constructed in the spring.

Arrangements to transport the books to the College are now being made by Dr. Thomas Wall, librarian of the National Irish Folklore Commission in Dublin.

You Can Prove Your Age Without Birth Certificate

No one need fear that the lack of a birth certificate will keep him from collecting social security benefits, says Victor Christgau, Director of the Federal Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance.

"Many people," Mr. Christgau said, "worry because they do not have an official birth certificate. But other evidence can be used as proof of age, too."

Mr. Christgau said any of the following are acceptable: certificate of baptism, a Bible in which the births in a family were recorded at the time they occurred, a naturalization certificate, an old hospital record showing your age

at the time, a military record, or an old life insurance policy. Your marriage license may also prove your age, although here some women find that a little white lie told a score or more years ago will come back to haunt them.

If your records will not do, the social security office will tell you how to get better evidence.

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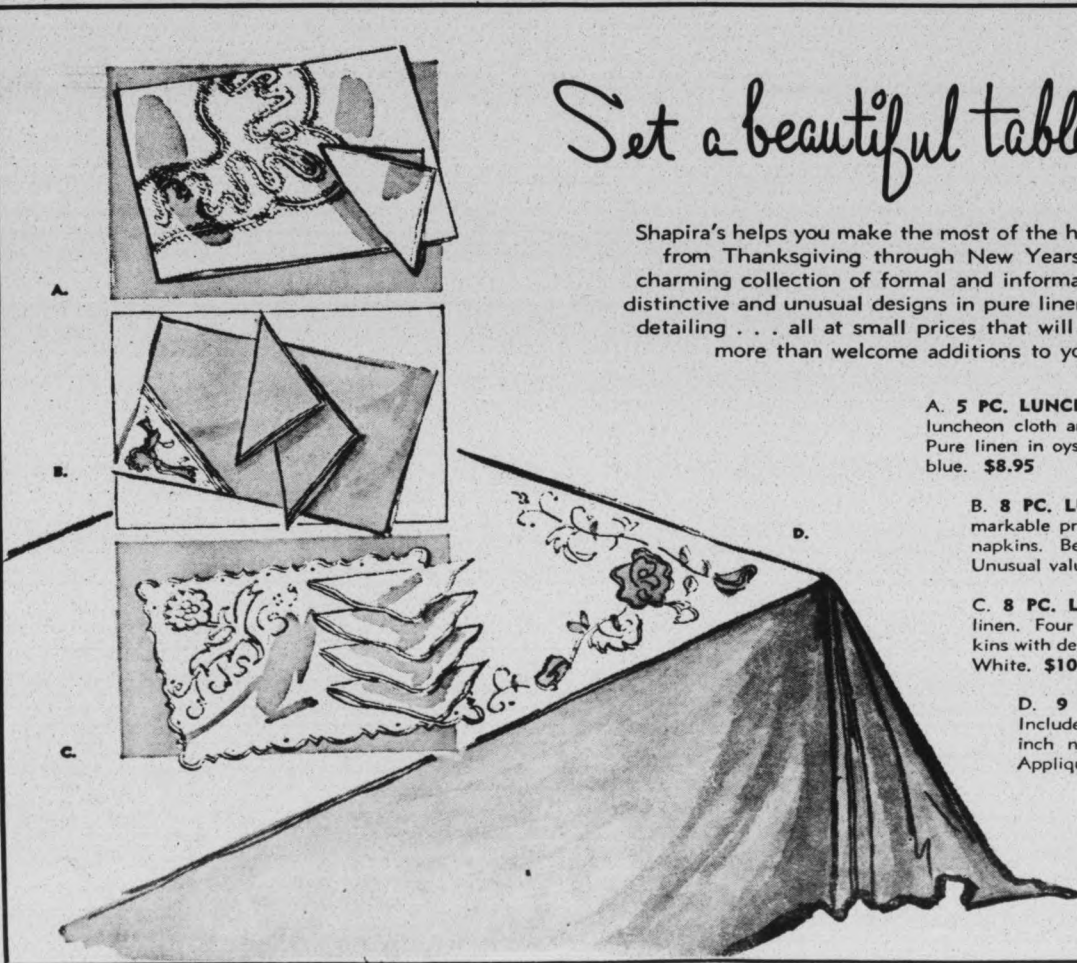

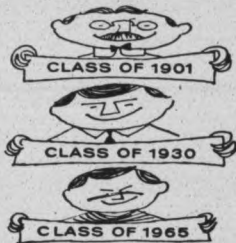

Food Specialist Gives Timely Tips on Broiling

Do you hesitate to use your broiler because it makes such a mess in your oven? Anita Dean, extension foods specialist at Michigan State, gives us some information which may help.

Not only will a moderate temperature cut down on smoking and spattering grease, but it will result in meat that is more tender, shrinks less and is more evenly cooked. To keep your broiler temperature at the desired setting, you should leave your oven door ajar while broiling.

The distance from the broiler pan to the heating unit makes a big difference, too. If you place the pan so that the top of the

meat is three inches from the heat, your steak will be nicely brown on the outside and evenly cooked on the inside whether you like it well-done, medium or rare.

Since salt tends to draw the juices out of meat, you shouldn't season it until you are ready to turn it over on the broiler. You may find it easier to wait until you are ready to serve before you season.

Finally, know what "not" to broil, she says. Veal and pork need to be well-cooked and should not be broiled. Beef and cured ham are your major broiling meats.

Who spends most?

Clothing Costs Vary With Age and Sex

Clothing bought by adults decreases as they get older, but whether women spend more than their husbands depends generally on their age bracket.

Under 30 the clothing for the wife is higher. In the 30 to 39 bracket, both men and women are at their maximum spending for clothing, with the money spent for feminine frills still a little ahead of that spent by the man.

In the 40 to 49 group both husbands and wives have tapered off in amount spent for clothing and both of them spent the same, while from 50 up studies show that men tend to spend more than women.

These figures, which came from a survey done in Minnesota by the federal Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics, go hand in hand with those telling the relationship of money spent for clothing to size of income. Results show that for families with a yearly income of \$1,000 or less, about \$49 was spent for husbands and \$47 for wives. Jumping to the \$3,000 to \$6,000 bracket, about \$111 was spent for husbands and \$126 for wives.

Of the \$211 spent per year by the average farm family, the largest expenditure is for the girl of the family in the 12 to 15 year bracket. She spends \$121. Girls two to five account for the smallest amount, \$38.

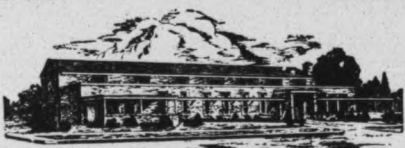

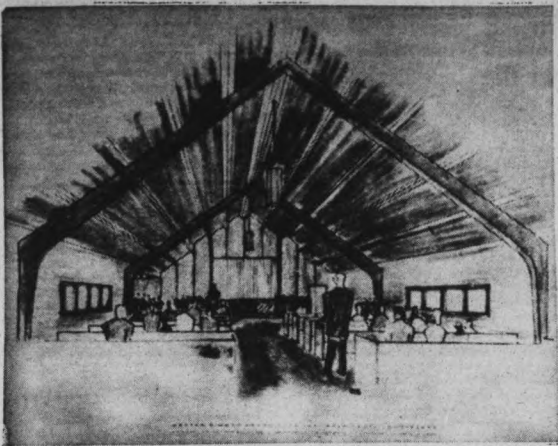

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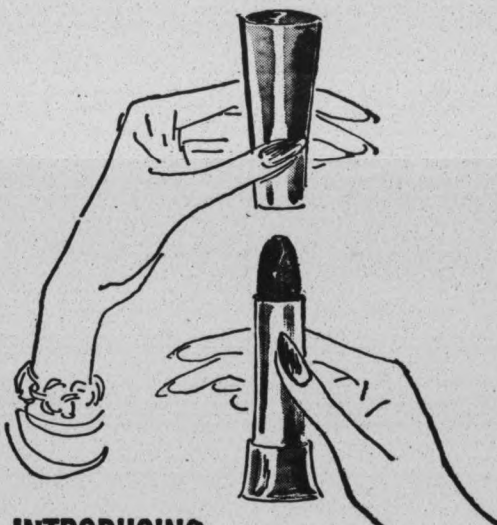

Work of the Heart Association will continue to emphasize research, declares incoming president Dr. Milton M. Hurwitz, St. Paul cardiologist. About 60 cents from each Heart Fund dollar is spent on laboratory study of coronary heart disease, rheumatic fever, hypertension, and arteriosclerosis.

No Heart Fund dollars, according to the existing charter, may be spent in direct support of heart patients.

"Patient care would be a humane service," explains Dr. Hurwitz, "but the case load would soon exhaust our funds. Our best means of aiding these persons and future heart cases is by concentrated research."

Goal of the Heart Fund in Minnesota during 1958 will be \$505,000.

Your Dental Health

(Following is the twenty-second in a series of articles on "Your Dental Health" being presented by The Highland Villager in cooperation with the American Dental Association. Today, dental bridges and partial dentures.)

The principles that govern bridge building in engineering apply to the field of reconstructive dentistry.

To replace missing teeth, dentists are able to build bridges that will withstand the heavy stresses of chewing and yet be flexible enough to "give" like natural teeth.

There are two types of bridge-work—fixed and removable. As the names imply, one is a permanently anchored bridge, the other can be taken out at will for cleaning.

One kind of removable bridge is retained by metallic clasps placed whenever possible so they will not show. A second kind is one in which inlays or crowns are fitted to the natural teeth which then support the bridge. To these inlays or crowns, various types of precise locking receptacles are attached.

In addition to bridgework, dentists are able to make partial dentures for patients where a large number of teeth must be replaced. In such cases, the soft tissues rather than the supporting teeth must take up most of the stress and strain.

The partial denture is supported much like the pontoon bridge in army engineering where floating boats hold up a platform of planks. In pontoon bridges the strain is taken by the vessels.

The dental bridge, on the other hand, is like a suspension bridge over the river where the towers support cables from which the bridge is suspended. The full strain is taken by the abutments.

Partial dentures and removable or permanent bridges can be constructed of gold, stainless steel, plastic or a combination of all three.

In making bridgework or denture work, dentists keep in mind the maintenance of mouth cleanliness, the prevention of excessive pressure on soft tissues, the prevention of interference with muscles of the tongue, the equal distribution of chewing forces and beauty requirements for naturalness in appearance.

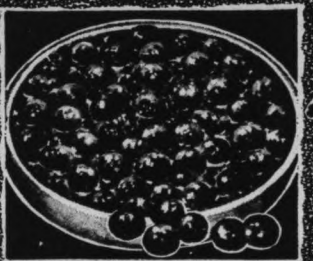

Bazaar, Bake Sale, Dinner Turkey Strutters' Ball At YW Wednesday At Messiah Episcopal

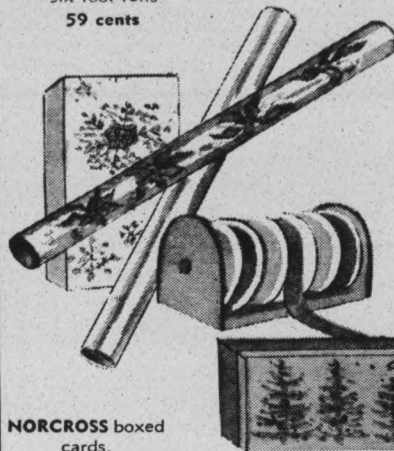
